Tribute to a son

Frankie Payne stoically held it together on Tuesday until one of her son's former work colleagues hugged her, then the tears fell as she stood with others at the Rendelsham Cemetery 40 years after Mathew Payne's tragic death.

Now 85 and a resident of Millicent's Boneham Cottages, having moved from her Rendelsham home, Frankie was surrounded in shared grief by family and friends from the local area and about 60 serving and retired police officers who had travelled from Adelaide to pay tribute to their fallen colleague.

At the age of 22, Mathew was a police officer serving at Darlington Police Station in Adelaide when he was killed in a high speed pursuit on March 29, 1982.

Also killed was fellow police officer and south easterner, Warren Matheson, 24, of Mount Gambier, who was in the patrol car with Mathew that fateful night.

Forty years to the day, on Tuesday the emotional connection of so many people to that event was palpable at the cemetery where Bob Payne, who passed away in 2015, was buried alongside the son he lost 33 years before.

Along one fence of the picturesque and secluded cemetery is a row of trees planted by Bob which made a poignant back drop for the group gathered there to remember his son.

While a sad remembrance, chatter among the group uncovered only pleasantries for Mathew, and Frankie discovered for the first time that her son had been given a nickname by his police colleagues who affectionately referred to him as 'Charlie' in reference to a top class Australian Rules football player by the name of Charlie Payne who ended his career with North Adelaide in the 1970's.

Several of the people in attendance had trained at Fort Largs police academy with Mathew and others had served with him or been associated in other capacities.

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You don't forget: Frankie Payne, 85, lost her police officer son Mathew 40 years ago. She remembered the event on Tuesday with a large group of serving and retired police officers who travelled from Adelaide to visit Mathew's grave at the Rendelsham Cemetery 40 years after his death.

Shop front face lift funding opportunity

Town centre businesses throughout the Wattle Range Council area will soon have the opportunity to update their shop facades with support from council.

Upcoming changes to the Community Grants, Scholarship and Sponsorship Programs Guidelines will offer local business and shop owners the option to apply for up to \$4,000 to aesthetically improve the appearance and/or accessibility of their premises for those with a disability.

Building and business owner Adam Wiese from Ignition Fitness told the South Eastern Times: "I'm interested in looking at the application for this program as it could help improve access for existing clients and make the gym more accessible to others."

Director of council's Development Services, Emma Clay, said application forms for the Shop Facade Upgrade Program are being finalised and will hopefully be available for people to access within weeks.

"Funding for the Shop Facade Upgrade Program will be assessed on application and is available while money is still available in the budget; if the money has been used businesses will be encouraged to apply the following year," Ms Clay said.

Previous community consultations held by Wattle Range Council have continually highlighted the need to improve shop facades in the council's central business districts.

Ms Clay is predicting the new grant, in conjunction with the Wayfinding Signage strategy

being currently designed, will raise the standard and amenity of the central areas of local towns.

"The new signage throughout the region will be an ongoing project that will add signage where needed and amalgamate or remove signage that needs simplifying," Ms Clay said.

"The current green, brown and blue signage used throughout the council area will

be updated with branding that identifies and unites the entire council region."

The Shop Facade Grant will be targeting town main streets and eligible businesses need to be an open shop and spend in excess of \$1,000 on their upgrade.

Applications must be matched by a 50 per cent contribution from the applicant and home based businesses are not eligible to apply.

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Museum's mystery night

Tickets are selling fast for the interactive theatre performance, Murder at the Museum, this Saturday.

It will be the first time since the Covid-19 pandemic began that the popular event is held and its popularity is showing with good ticket sales, so get in quick to reserve a spot in one of the sessions to be held during the night.

The first showing of the performance will be at 5.30pm and the last at 8pm.

With a plot written two years ago, the performance was shelved due to the pandemic but a large cast of local actors are pleased to finally be able to pull their costumes out of storage ready to entertain once again.

The fictional plot this year revolves around Millicent's infamous ship, the Geltwood, during a voyage of which Lord Formley's body is discovered.

As a wealthy property owner there are plenty of characters associated with him who would have a motive to cause his demise.

As performance goes proceed around the rooms of the museum, they will learn from local actors in period costume about the motives of each of them and performance goes are able to ask questions of the characters during the performance and clues are given to thicken the plot.

At the end of the event, performance goes are asked to guess which of the characters was the fictional murderer and the first correct entry drawn from a barrel wins a four course dinner for two at Mayura Station Tasting Room.

Tickets are \$10 each with children under 15 years free if accompanied by an adult.

Tickets also entitle the holders to free entry to the museum the following day to view the award winning displays without the distractions of the entertaining performance from the previous night. Bookings are essential at the Millicent Tourist Information Centre at the museum entrance.

Rendelsham's Graeme (Rocky) Smith went to school with Mathew who had attended Rendelsham Primary School and Millicent High School before joining the police force and he spoke with members of the group, along with Mathew's sister Suzanne (Sue) Lesslie and younger brother William (Bill).

Sue remembered being in the laundry when police came early in the morning to advise she and her parents that Mathew had been killed; Bill had already left to attend class at Millicent High School and he remembered being pulled out of class and sent to the head office where the awful news was delivered to him.

"I was in my dressing gown," Frankie said, "it was early in the morning when the police came to tell us, William had just gone to school.

"When someone is sick or old you know [they might die] but it is a shock when it just happens like that," she said.

"Devastated," Frankie said, it was a single word that meant so much.

"You don't forget, even though it was a long time ago."

Also in attendance was Mathew's fiancée at the time, Rosemary Downing (nee Osborne), formerly of Donovan's Landing, who had travelled from Werribee in Victoria to be at the remembrance event.

After leaving Rendelsham, the group rode to Millicent and regrouped at the RSL hall, and then rode onto Mount Gambier, via Tantanolola, where they paid tribute to Mathew's colleague, Warren Matheson, at the Mt Gambier Police Station where a memorial wall remembers fallen officers.

Parcel lockers in place

Millicent's main corner is now looking a little different with the installation of an imposing Australia Post red parcel locker located on the post office's George Street frontage.

Acting Manager at the Millicent Post Office, Grace Keatley, told the South Eastern Times that the parcel lockers had been requested quite some time ago and had finally been installed.

"The lockers were requested by post office staff to handle parcel volumes which are only increasing," Ms Keatley said.

"The benefit for customers is one of convenience; they can now receive parcels 24/7, the lockers are filled every week day and topped up throughout the day."

There are more than 80 parcel lockers able to be accessed by a code sent to the customer.

The secure postal lockers are under surveillance and can only be used to collect parcels that include a phone number when lodged.

Parcel lodgement is also available to use via the lockers but customers will need to register their details through the Australia Post website to access this service.

The custodians of news

With this edition marking the first for the returned South Eastern Times and the Penola Pennant it is timely to reflect on their combined history of more than 200 years of providing news to their communities.

On Saturday, July 11, 1891, the first edition of the South Eastern Times came out as The Millicent Times.

It was printed by Millicent grocer, Roland Campbell who printed the four pages of the first edition on a hand-operated, second hand press he had purchased in a back street of Adelaide and repaired himself.

Originally from Robe, Roland Campbell finished his schooling at the age of 10 to manage the family farm.

Working as a farm labourer around Millicent, he went on to become a builder, news correspondent for *The Border Watch* and Mil-

licent store keeper.

In 1894 his brother, Donald, who later became a Member of Parliament, took over the paper.

His left of centre editorials were not appreciated by the rural community his newspaper circulated in and there was a threat to tar and feather him.

In 1906, a group of South East businessmen, called The South Eastern Producers, led by Henrich Wilhelm Altschwager, became the new owners and the name of the paper was changed to The South Eastern Times.

The first managing editor was J C Harper, of Woodend, Victoria, who left for Broken Hill in 1907 to manage the Barrier Truth.

Reuben Cranstoun Mowbray, who had recently arrived from Gippsland, Victoria, to take a position as reporter, became editor.

He became the major shareholder and, in 1921, sole owner.

In 1952 Mowbray sold the business to his staff including Sid McRostie and Bob Chewings, the latter of whom became editor until his retirement in 1989 when Sid's three sons and their wives purchased the newspaper.

In 2006 the newspaper was sold to Allan Scott and it became part of the The Border Watch Media Group along with The Penola Pennant.

The first edition of *The Penola Pennant* was published in July 1946 by Edwin Thiele.

New Zealander Kenneth Dohnt purchased the paper in 1950 and ran it until his death in 1971 when the paper was purchased by long-time employee of The Pennant, Lyle Shurdington who sold it to South East Telecasters in 1978 (then publishers of The Border Watch) of

which Allan Scott was a major shareholder.

Both The South Eastern Times and Penola Pennant, along with The Border Watch, were closed by the Scott family in 2020 in the midst of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Two months later, TBW Today Pty Ltd purchased The Border Watch along with the mastheads of The South Eastern Times and The Penola Pennant.

While The Border Watch has been published weekly since then - with one page devoted to each of The Penola Pennant and The South Eastern Times - TBW Today is pleased to now be reviving The South Eastern Times and The Penola Pennant in their own right and with it the history that these papers had of covering the issues and events of the local communities of Millicent and Penola and the surrounding districts.

Fresh start for groceries

A 32 year involvement in the supermarket industry finished last week for the owners of Penola's IGA Fresh supermarket.

Shane and Kerry McPherson decided to retire from business.

"We knew the time was right and when the opportunity came up, we said this is for us," the McPhersons said.

The supermarket has been sold to the Rugless family from Adelaide and the business is now operated as a Foodland store. Supermarket operators for more than 40 years, the Rugless family also own Foodland stores at Happy Valley, Mount Barker and Yorketown.

The McPhersons moved to Penola in 1989 and purchased the then DJ Lynn and Co supermarket in Arthur Street.

They continued in that premises under the banners of Serv-Wel, Foodtown and IGA.

In 2008 the McPhersons took the plunge and built the Penola IGA Fresh.

"We had 19 years in the old store and felt the town needed a bigger and more modern supermarket with a bigger range," Mr McPherson said.

"We wanted to cater for the needs we thought the town deserved," Mr McPherson said.

"The opportunity came up to sell and after a family discussion we decided to go ahead.

"Our children have their own successful businesses and careers and weren't interested in taking the business over."

The couple has been overwhelmed with well wishes, messages of appreciation from

sporting groups, schools and organisations in the town.

The Penola High school even had a school assembly inviting the couple and they were presented with gifts of appreciation.

Throughout their time in business the McPhersons have won many awards including the National Ch2 Store of the Year in 2011, Community award in 2019 and they were inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2021 as well as many department awards.

"These awards would not have been possible without the efforts of our excellent staff," the McPhersons said.

"We are so grateful of the community support we have had over the years and look forward to spending more time with our family.

"We are just going to slow down, relax and unwind."

New general manager, Wes Burgan said: "We purchased the supermarket as it was a good opportunity to operate a very well run store which is extremely well presented with a great customer base in a great country town.

"The ethics matches our other stores and we look after the community and our staff," he said.

Staff in the store include store manager,

Daimen Crafter with 40 years in retail experience, group operations manager Ben Roosa and Michael Rugless, a third generation of the Rugless family.

Staff will retain their jobs and the group is looking to offer more positions.

"Our focus is customer service, premium fresh food and competitive pricing," Mr Burgan said.

The store will be stocking produce from local businesses including Windara Bakery.

As with the McPhersons, the group will continue to support local sporting groups and organisations.

Old lounges and used mattresses recently left at Penola's St Mary's Anglican Op Shop have caused a dilemma.

Church Warden, Dean Burrows said nobody wanted the items, and they were difficult to dispose of at the waste depot.

"I tried to give them away for nothing, but nobody would take them," Mr Burrows said.

"And the waste depot won't take chairs with fabric, or mattresses, unless you strip them down, which takes quite some effort."

Mr Burrows said it would be preferable for people not to leave mattresses or fabric lounges at the Op Shop.

"We really appreciate clothing and other stuff that people donate for the Op Shop, but we just can't cope with old lounges and mattresses," he said.

Donated items appreciated include clothes, books, toys, handbags, jewellery, knick nacks and kitchenware.

"The volunteers do a wonderful job with helping people, particularly those who are struggling, making sure they get the basics - and we make sure we keep our prices down."

The Op Shop is staffed by volunteers from the Millicent and Penola Anglican parish. Proceeds from the Op Shop assists the church and people in need in the local community.

Pinchunga resident, 73 year old Peter Haines, did not let Covid-19 get in his way.

It was when Pinchunga was in lockdown that Mr Haines decided to start an unusual project and it began on December 20 last year.

"You can't just sit in your room all day and do nothing," he said.

Then the wool came out and a loom, which was donated by a local person, and away he went knitting a scarf with his aim to break the world record of more than 4,000 metres.

Prior to beginning this project Mr Haines had made smaller scarves and beanies.

Mr Haines has kept a record of all the hours he has spent knitting and at this stage his vibrant coloured scarf measures 201 metres.

"I just can't thank the community enough for their donation of wool and support," he said.

Later in the year he hopes to take the scarf to the football oval and display it from one end of the oval to the other - from goal post to goal post.

Donated wool for Mr Haines' project can be left at Pinchunga or St Mary's Op Shop in Penola.

Mr Haines said he would love to get some sponsorship as a fundraiser, with monies raised going towards purchase of equipment.

All sponsorship will be managed by the hospital auxiliary.

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Seaside church salvation

History continues for St Nicholas Anglican Church in Beachport; following its sale in 2020, it is being reinvented into a family home.

Sandy and Talitha Cameron were holidaying in Beachport in 2020, with no plans to buy in town, when they happened to drive past the church on auction day.

“We were renting over the holidays in 2020 and we drove past and saw St Nicholas was on auction as we were leaving town,” Mr Cameron said.

“Talitha was keen to stop and I said under no circumstances.

“So of course, we ended up signing the contract of sale!

“It took us over 12 months to decide on a plan for developing the property, integrating a new building into the church was a really challenging process.”

Originally opened in 1923, the building was used for services for decades.

The church hosted its last Anglican service in 2018 before being closed.

The Camerons decided to create a family home with four bedrooms, a garage and practical living areas, while ensuring the spirit and the history of the church continues.

“When you drive around Beachport those few historical buildings left are just so important to the fabric of the town,” Mr Cameron said.

“We started from the premise that the church has to be front and centre, it had to remain as the focus of whatever we built.

“But we also wanted to create a practical and beautiful home.”

The church is not heritage listed, so the new owners could have simply demolished the church.

Mr Cameron said it would have made it a much simpler build, but it is more rewarding to work with the current site.

The structure did require some flexibility in the design compared to a normal house, but Mr Cameron said the design all came together working with Hosking Willis Architecture and MacGregor Builders.

“The way the church is sited on the block made that quite difficult to achieve as we

needed to wrap most of the new build around the back of the church,” Mr Cameron said.

“Our architects, Hosking Willis Architecture, absolutely nailed the brief, the new section blends seamlessly with the original.

“The living, dining and kitchen is within the original church and all the bedrooms, bathrooms and functional spaces are in the new build.

“It just works so well.

“We have also opened the space with new windows and doors transforming what was quite a dark area into a beautiful light-filled room.

“This was Talitha’s vision and once again,

she was right!”

The belltower will also be a feature of the new house.

With the bell removed, a spiral staircase will be installed and it will become a space to enjoy a quiet drink and a nice view from the viewing platform.

Mr Cameron grew up in the region before relocating to Melbourne 20 years ago but continues to regularly visit the town.

The new house, when completed, will be used by the family for holidays and rented out as accommodation for others looking for a getaway in Beachport.

“People who visit Beachport know what a special place it is, it’s such an iconic original town,” Mr Cameron said.

“It has not changed much since I was a kid and I love that about it, it’s a local town with kids on bikes, wild landscapes and, most importantly, no crowds.

“We hope to use St Nicholas first and foremost as a family holiday home, but we will also be looking to make it available for rental as premium accommodation.”

As to when people in town may see it completed, Mr Cameron said he is hoping it would be ready in October.

“The foundation stone for St Nicholas was laid on 10th January 1923; we hope to celebrate the building’s 100-year anniversary with an open house event on 10th January 2023,” Mr Cameron said.

“It will be a nice way to celebrate the church’s reinvention as a family home.”

rettes to the town youth, making sure he gave them the strongest tobacco available.

“This was to make sure they felt quite sick and stop them returning to buy more.”

Mr Huppatz assured the South Eastern Times he wasn’t one of the young cigarette buying customers.

The two open afternoons attracted a

Work proceeds on upgrading Mount Burr service roads

Stage Two of a Wattle Range Council project to upgrade Mount Burr’s service roads is underway.

Totalling about 575 metres, reconstruction is underway on a service road at the Penola end of Mount Burr, and another opposite the old timber mill.

The work is of a similar extent to Stage One of the project which was completed last year to upgrade the town’s two other service roads, opposite the shop and on the entrance from Millicent.

Like those already completed, the new work will involve upgrading the dirt service tracks to bitumen sealed roads with designated access points.

Wattle Range Council’s Manager of Assets and Environment said the upgrade work will reduce the amount of dust which occurred with the unsealed service roads, improve drainage and make it safer.

“There will be less dust going into the houses, better drainage and by formalising the access points it will be much safer for cars and pedestrians,” she said.

The work has involved removing ten large

trees and nine small tress to allow for the new roadwork.

Ms Oxlade said with the removal of these trees the health of the remaining trees would need to be considered.

“We had to remove one tree just because it was going to be in the way of one of the roads, and it looked fine and healthy on the outside but once it had been cut down it was found to be rotten to the core,” she said.

“So we’re still a bit concerned about the health of the others - while they look okay on the outside they might not be,” she said adding that Council would undertake some sampling to ensure the other trees were safe to remain.

Work on the upgraded roads this week will include beginning to build a base with sandstone and limestone to be put in place and rolled ready for further layers before sealing work can be undertaken.

At the time of sealing the new roads, a second layer will also be put on the already sealed service roads completed last year.

This Stage Two of the project is expected to cost \$400,000 and will be completed by the end of June.

Timeframe set for yards

A new committee has been given 12 months before Wattle Range Council will reconsider the future of Millicent's saleyards.

At Council's monthly meeting earlier this month, councillor Moira Neagle successfully moved a motion to defer two previous motions of council which were aimed at exploring future possibilities for the saleyards which have been experiencing falling cattle numbers for some years.

The deferred motions included calling for expressions of interest for the purchase of the saleyards site, highlighting any applicants long-term intentions for the site including the operation of sales, and the Rider Safe Program lease which allows classes for would be motor-bike licence holders.

The other motion deferred was for council to invite expressions of interest from companies, organisations or a consortium for the operation of the Millicent saleyards with a lease for 10 years with a right of renewal for a further term.

Cr Neagle's successful deferral of these motions also followed the recent establishment of a section 41 committee of council, made up of representatives of stock agents, vendors, carriers, stock contractors and elected members, to advise council on the operational management and long-term planning of the Millicent saleyards.

Cr Neagle was the impetus for the formation of this committee after council committed in December to spending \$689,000 on the saleyards to address maintenance and other needs identified by a safety audit.

"In putting forward this motion I am not questioning the value of the two motions, I am asking for them to be deferred because I want the section 41 committee to be established and get some clear air," Cr Neagle told the March meeting of council.

"This would allow time for the establishment of the saleyards section 41 committee and for them to voice their opinions on the management of the yards and what they can do to increase throughput.

"By that time the SafeworkSA audit measures will be completed and thus any contracts to sell or lease would be simplified and easier to develop.

"To action those two motions now will create an enormous workload on staff when they are already under the pump.

"An improved working relationship between council and the users of the yards has been developed recently through the passing of the motion to establish a section 41 committee and this could be compromised by immediate moves to sell or lease the yards.

"Council has agreed to spend a significant amount of money on the yards and the management has been transferred to Engineering.

"Thus the management of this asset has improved in ways which have not been achieved in decades.

"Calling for expressions of interest now would be complex ... I believe it would be sending a sense of confusion ... simultaneously wanting to call for expressions of interest to lease while then on the other hand wanting to spend money on this."

Cr Dale Price said, while supporting the motion, that he could see troubles ahead with other regional saleyards closing around Australia.

"In New South Wales another saleyard closed this week," he said.

"Mortlake had 5,000 head last week - in one sale - it has soft flooring, under cover and Auctions Plus so people can bid from their own home.

"Cattle are coming from this area [Millicent district] to Mortlake.

"Give me a reason to keep the yards open ... I think we are looking at the end of the saleyards but I wish them [the committee] every success."

Cr Dean Burrows supported the motion.

"If we are going to spend \$600,000 we should eliminate the sale of it ... maybe as Cr Price says it is inevitable that it is going to close, then why spend the money," he said.

While wishing to give the new committee a chance to have an effect, Cr Peter Dunncliff believed improvements being made at Mount Gambier's yards would take stock away from Millicent.

"It does worry me that we are spending so much money ...," he said.

Whitty said that tough approach to training had been beneficial for many on the list, although he noted a few others could be more committed.

However, he said all was going well so far.

"From my experience, I would say (about a dozen blokes) are 100 per cent committed," Whitty said.

"We have a few others who are genuine A Grade footballers and the work rate has been good for a dozen of them.

"We also have our youth ready to step up - they won a flag a couple of years ago so we are going to put a lot of effort into them this year."

As with many other clubs, Whitty hopes that focus on the youth will pay dividends.

He said last season they had the chance to prove their worth but some did not respond well.

"Some of those lads were amongst it last year but didn't take the bull by the horns," Whitty said.

"It is about self belief.

"I am a believer, it doesn't matter how old you are, if you are 15 or 16 you should go in with the attitude you can make an impact.

"I think this year for us it has to be about the belief and a positive outlook to it.

"We will be focused on trying to encourage them to have more confidence and the belief they can mix it with anyone."

Last season was certainly tough for the Hawks, with 11 of the top players out with season-ending injuries.

Edwards said those positive numbers spanned right through the pre-season.

He said the players were committed and excited, with the first real test this weekend against Kalangadoo.

"That will be a challenge first up," Edwards said.

"We just have to try to play our style of game and not get too wrapped up in last year.

"We have to trust the process, try to play our style of game and take it head on.

"Glencoe and Kalangadoo have always had a good rivalry and they are a reasonably good side at the moment.

"It will be a challenge first game but I think the boys are up to it."

Much of the hopes of the club could hinge on the performance of a young brigade coming through from the Senior Colts.

Of the young roster, 10 have emerged from the colts ranks, with several of those pencilled in for the A Grade side already.

It will be a major focus for Edwards this season.

"We want to put an emphasis on putting them in and giving them a good taste of senior footy," he said.

"We want to give them a license to play with a bit of flair and bring their natural game into it.

"It is a good tight-knit club and we generally keep most of the kids who come through.

"Overall it has been a good start to the year, so hopefully it will be a good season for us."

Whitty said the top 10 players probably contributed to around six games for the club, which began early in the season.

"We had good depth last season and I thought our side was better than we played," he said.

"Even though we had injuries, it is football and you have to deal with that but it made it hard with so many.

"Last year we beat Glencoe in Round 1 - Kongorong hasn't beat them for a while.

"That seemed to be a turning point but the next game we played Kalangadoo and had six go down in that game, or didn't even make that game.

"By the end of that game I think we had eight injuries that we never got back for the rest of the season."

Despite a tough year, Whitty is confident of a resurgence in 2021.

"It is a great football club, the committee is strong and are giving 100 per cent to change the culture of the club," he said.

"They want to be successful at senior level - they have been successful at junior and reserves level but we are graded on our senior results.

"The colts are the ones who are on the doorstep of playing A Grade and we want them to be playing senior football so they own the club."

The addition of Watson and Hunter will add to the depth and strength of the Eagles' mid-court.

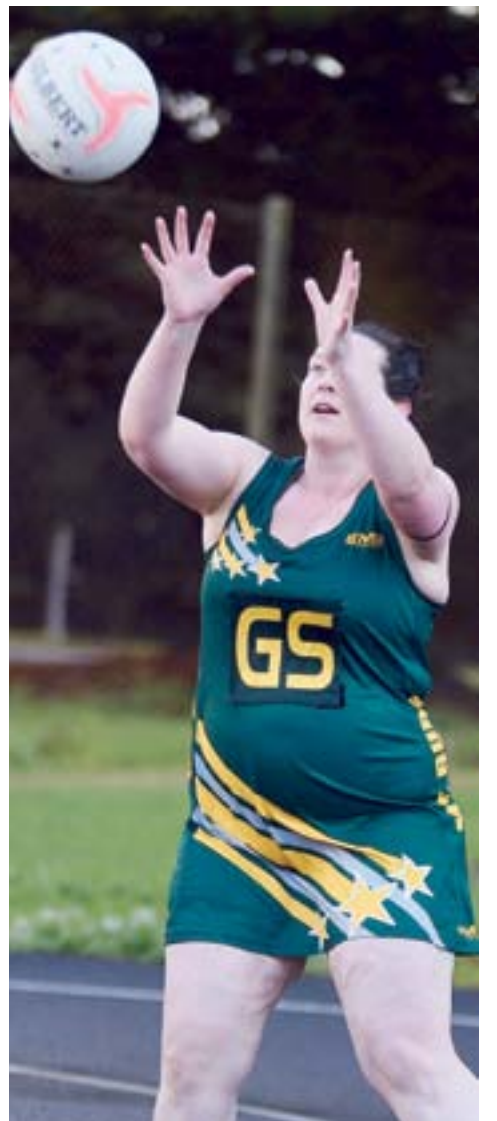
