Artist's flair

Millicent metalworker Toni Greenwood has proven art is sometimes not all about natural-born talent but also about learning.

Six years ago, Ms Greenwood had no prior experience in the art of metal work, until she decided to ask for welding tips from her husband which created a deep passion for her.

While speaking to The South Eastern Times, she mentioned she had not studied art previously and said it was purely a hobby she enjoyed to "keep things interesting".

"I get bored if I have to do the same thing over and over and by doing so much variety it really keeps things fresh and new," Ms Greenwood said.

Ms Greenwood began by making horse jumps for her daughter's riding practice, progressively moving to more difficult garden art and other decorative pieces.

Millicent's Sit and Stitch craft group is part of a global community of keen quilters supporting displaced and homeless Ukrainians through their quilting skills.

During a recent craft session, a member

mentioned a social media post from German quilter, Claudia Pfeill, asking for donations of 8.5 inch material blocks for a project called Piece for Peace.

Ms Pfeill offered to piece the blocks together to create finished quilts for citizens fleeing the war in Ukraine, requesting 100 per cent cotton blocks using any design or technique in yellow and blue to reflect the Ukrainian flag.

Across the world quilters have picked up the call and are making the blocks and posting to Germany, with Ms Pfeill needing to reach out to local quilters to help put together the large number of blocks she is receiving.

The local Sit and Stitch group decided they would like to be involved with group member Wendy Frankling saying: "It makes us a part of the global community of quilters and gives us a way to help.

This year there are three age categories and a major prize for each one with participants sending photographs of their catch through email or text to competition organisers for judging.

In addition to the Rivoli Bay junior fishing competition is a photography competition where young fishers are encouraged to take photographs of anything they like while waiting for a bite with the winning photograph chosen by votes on presentation day.

Other activities on the program include apple picking in Kalangadoo, a treasure hunt in Hatherleigh and making bird hollows in Millicent.

Grape stomping and learning petanque will be on offer in Coonawarra and a non-competitive Colour Run beginning at the Coonawarra rail siding will have participants head off in a riot of colour.

There are a range of craft workshops, virtual reality and green screen activities, storytelling, Lego club and video game competitions also being held in different locations across the region.

Wattle Range Council's Director Development Services Emma Clay told the South Eastern Times: "The events are intentionally spread throughout the district to make it easy for local children to be involved and encourage people to explore the region."

"We can see the results through daily updates on social media where photos are shared of deliveries being received and completed quilts being handed to those in need."

Fellow member, Sheila Boyle added: "We feel a bit helpless about the situation; when we saw Claudia's post on Facebook it was

something we thought we could do to help. "Being quilters we all have bits of yellow and blue fabric in our stashes."

"My husband built a gate at the front of our property and I wanted to decorate it with horseshoes," she said.

"He said the only way it would happen is if I did it myself so I asked him to teach me to weld and it has only built on from there."

She added that heavier projects are rare for her because of the lack of facilities she has and the effort it takes to manoeuvre the extra weight.

"I have started doing more detailed projects but with the space I have currently, I don't tend to focus on bigger artworks," she said.

"I made a turtle out of copper and steel which is currently my favourite piece because of its detail."

Ms Greenwood showcased the turtle at the Kingston Fringe recently, which she said was the first art exhibition she had participated in

She said she also attended previous markets to sell her artwork, with some of her pieces said to have reached as far as Queensland and Tasmania.

"I have a Facebook page where I tell people to go and learn more information about who I am and what I can and cannot do," Ms Greenwood said.

She revealed that she took her inspiration from her parents and grandparents.

"They were very hard workers," Ms Greenwood said.

"All of them, and my father in particular, liked what they did and enjoyed sharing it with others.

Ms Greenwood said people considering taking up the same hobby must be prepared to learn how to weld and be prepared to suffer frequent minor burns.

"Imagination is important for any artist and if welding becomes an interest and if burns do not put off others who want to do this, then it is very enjoyable," she said.

"The welding can be learned but the ideas and the creativity has to be something which comes naturally.

Historic factory for sale

About 300 people attended the opening of the former Penola butter factory in 1939 but today it stands on the market, abandoned, and waiting for a possible new lease on life.

Selling agent, Jo O'Connor from PPHS, said the site offers unique opportunities.

"I would love for somebody to appreciate its history and bring it back to its former glory," Ms O'Connor said.

"There could be an opportunity for it to be turned into a hospitality and accommodation venue."

According to records provided to the Pennant by the Penola History Group, a consor-

tium of Penola and Coonawarra businessmen met at the Coonawarra Soldier's Memorial Hall in early 1938.

A company was formed called 'The Penola Dairying and Cold Storage Company' and together they raised 10,000 pounds to build the factory in Penola.

By October 1938, an Adelaide builder was contracted and building works had started.

With much fanfare, 300 people turned out for the opening of the new factory.

It expanded its range of products to include cheese as well as butter.

During the 1950's, the factory was producing 600 tons of butter a year.

Over the years, the factory changed ownership a number of times and ceased operations in the 1980's.

It was sold at auction in 1994.

The property was listed as a State Heritage Place in 1985 and any redevelopment of the site would require council approvals.

The two acre site was recently placed on the market by its current owner with an asking price of \$450,000.

The agents state that the property has dou-

ble frontage entrance, 100 metres wide and on one title.

"There are two separate buildings with a large court yard so if you had the dream of wanting to open a craft brewery and tasting rooms or some sort of accommodation facility, this property would be ideal," according to the sales material.

"This property is situated on approximately two acres of land which would be perfect for a market garden or for parking.

"Other features of this property include 3 phase power, 40,000 gallons of rainwater and two 10 horse power pumps."

Raising awareness about domestic and family violence

A community run/walk in Millicent tomorrow will enable participants to Run Against Violence (RAV).

Everyone is welcome to join in the event beginning at 10am from the Jubilee Park barbecues where co-founder of RAV, Kirrily Dear, will be joining in.

This will be a precursor to a RAV teams event to be held in August.

For the past five years Millicent residents have joined runners and walkers from across Australia and the world to Run Against Violence.

Teams of up to 20 join forces to travel 1300 kilometres in just 19 days to raise awareness for domestic and family violence.

Limestone Coast spokesperson, Belinda Seaman said: "Domestic violence is one of Kirrily Dear, co-founder of Run Against Violence, decided to take action.

She started with a solo 860km ultramarathon to raise awareness and money.

It was a huge success but she wanted more.

In conjunction with Brad Smithers she came up with the crazy theme for the 1300 marathon from Broken Hill to Sydney.

Kirrily ran almost 70kms per day for 19 days to complete the marathon.

Obviously the ordinary person could not do that so it became a team challenge for teams of 10 people to try and beat Kirrily across the virtual finish line, which meant all runners ran at home and recorded their distances online as a team.

Throughout the event, RAV shares family violence stories from survivors to educate the community.

"The way RAV provides a safe place for survivors to open up and share their stories with us is humbling," Belinda said.

As well as helping those currently experiencing violence to seek help, RAV strives to break the cycle of violence.

To do this RAV has partnered with the National Association for the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect (NAPCAN) 'Love Bites' program, which educates teenagers on what

Police ask communities to drive with care this Easter

Limestone Coast police are appealing for the community to "drive to arrive" this coming Easter.

With a busy Easter period anticipated, police will again be providing a high visibility on our rural highways as well as dedicating patrols to focus on driver behaviour within townships across the Limestone Coast. Limestone Coast Police will take part in Operation Safe Holidays Easter which is a State-wide operation running from Thursday April 14 to Monday April 18.

The operation will target the 'Fatal Five' driver behaviours that contribute most to the lives lost and serious injuries on SA roads: Distraction, drink/drug driving, speeding, failure

to wear a seatbelt and dangerous driving.

"We want road users to understand that the early intervention of these behaviours could be the life or death change needed to avoid catastrophic consequences in a road user's journey," said police superintendent Campbell Hill, officer in charge of Limestone Coast local Service Area. Easter in the Limestone Coast is a busy time of year for all emergency services, frontline and health service workers.

Police are also urging for the sensible use of recreational vehicles in and around beaches, sand dunes, national parks and on water craft to ensure all those visiting the Limestone Coast enjoy their break and return home safely.

Discovering the depths

Staff, committee members and volunteers at Noorla Yo-long have worked together to complete the first step toward offering caving exploration on-site through the assistance of a OneFortyOne Community Grant and the generous support of Bunnings Mount Gambier.

A new deck has been built over a hole leading into the cave system completing stage one of the project, this had been an existing safety hazard for some time and is now covered by the deck containing a safe access point to the caves.

Senior Constable Geoff Yates Noorla Yolong facilitator said: "Through this partnership we now have a good deck where we can build a rope belaying system to drop people into the cave.

"There's about a 4.5 metre vertical tube that goes down into the 60 metre cave system with challenging pinch points."

Senior Constable Yates explained staff still need to undertake formal training and safety exercises before caving happens as a formal activity to ensure the highest quality and safety experience is on offer.

"The goal is to have caving ready for groups by the end of term four although there is still planning and logistics ahead with extra funding needed for head torches, overalls and gloves."

The caving activities will help the growth of leadership with communication and working with others an important aspect of underground exploration.

Senior Constable Yates explained the need to support our community and youth: "They've needed a lot of that recently with Covid, missing out on so many experiences, school camps haven't happened and they get extra learning outside of the classroom, it's an important way to learn and it's what we do."

Taking several months of physical labour from staff and volunteers and many months of planning the project would not have been possible without the successful \$3200 from the OneFortyOne grant.

Charlene Riley, One Forty One external affairs manager said: "The viewing platform at Noorla Yo-Long looks great, glad we could support with a Community Grant."

Bunnings generosity in supplying a substantial amount of extra materials purchased with the grant money and the donation of 100 species of native plants has helped the project get to this stage.

Repairs for Anzac Day

Inscribed names on Penola's Soldiers Memorial in Penola War Memorial Park have been severely damaged by water spray from sprinklers.

The problem is believed to have occurred when the water supply in the park was connected to the town supply but then changed to a bore.

Damage to the memorial's names has occurred since this change and it is believed the damage has been caused by an iron bacteria in the water.

It has also severely discoloured the northern wall of the park's toilet block.

Coonawarra-Penola Returned and Services League (RSL) President, Peter DeGaris said he had made Wattle Range Council aware of the problem some time ago.

Council had tried to repair the damage



but with an unsatisfactory result, however personnel from monumental masons in Mount Gambier worked on the lettering last Saturday to at least make it legible in readiness for Anzac Day.

"It (the monument) is desperately in need of some maintenance," Mr DeGaris said.

"It has had a bit of touch up over the years but nothing much.

"We are going to apply for a grant in the near future to carry out major repairs and bring it right up to scratch," Mr DeGaris said. Inscribed names on the monument are

from Penola's fallen soldiers who did not return from World Wars One and Two, Vietnam and the Boer War.

People gather at the monument for services on Anzac Day, Remembrance Day, Vietnam Vets Day and VP day.

Unveiled in 1927, the monument was moved to its current position in the 1930's

A sculpture is to be added in the Penola Town Square in the near future.

To be titled 'Generosity of Spirit' the sculpture will be a tribute to all the women who have shaped the Penola and Coonawarra community through their generosity of spirit and supported the generations of women who have followed them.

Dr Anne Johnson, a member of the Penola Town Square Working Group, said: "The idea was mooted some time ago but we wanted to get the practical things done in the town square first like paving, tables and chairs, entrance panels etc.

"It was a long process in deciding on the sculpture as we wanted it to be positive, uplifting and to depict a tribute to women of the Penola community," she said.

The sculpture will be made of Corten (weathered steel which takes on a rusty appearance) which will match the entrance panels at the front of the town square.

"We had to choose a sculptor who was creative and highly regarded in working with Corten," Dr Johnson said.

Adelaide based sculptor, Gerry McMahon met all the credentials and was awarded the commission.

The group is aiming to raise \$40,000 and is looking for donations from the public to make this happen.

Partnered with the Stand Like Stone Foundation all donations of more than \$2 are tax deductible.

The foundation will be handling all contributions.

"The concert band repertoire included a wide variety of pieces including several from shows and film scores.


"The concert was a success and the audience was very appreciative, despite the requirement to sing with masks," Mr Bleby said.

Things are changing all the time according to Lepley.



Childhood memories of Victorian artist Karen McKenzie are finding their way into Limestone Coast people's homes and hearts through her colourful art.

Ms McKenzie has been reproducing her whimsical paintings of Limestone Coast towns, including Millicent, Mount Gambier, Robe and Kingston, as popular jigsaws puzzles.

Beachport is the latest town to have its image taped to the artist's desk with the townships of Penola and Southend planned for the near future.

Ms McKenzie left Mount Gambier in the early 1990's to follow her goal of studying art and design at Deakin University in Warrnambool but it wasn't until 10 years ago she revisited art in her quest to "get happy" after quitting her job.

Recognising the difficulty of buying souvenirs that weren't mass produced, Ms McKenzie began painting local scenes and creating resin pendants of her bright designs for regional tourist outlets but with the arrival of Covid-19 this tourism based income stream came to a halt.

Growing up in Mount Gambier, Ms McKenzie knows the Limestone Coast well with school holidays spent in the coastal towns of Beachport and Southend.

"Our family had a beach house at Southend for around 40 years and before that we holidayed in Beachport every year," she said.

"The Southend shack was at the top of a hill overlooking the beach; at lunch and dinner mum would raise a beach towel as a flag

"I like anything thing that's a bit quirky and put stuff in that makes me laugh; I like to paint smaller places that don't really have anything like this."



Toyota Yaris GR Rallye

With 200kW of power, a manual change, allwheel drive and tipping the scales at 1280kg, the Toyota Yaris GR Rallye puts away the zero to 100 km/h dash in just 5.2 seconds.

As entertaining as it might be, this little bundle of bravado does not come cheap - not at more than \$50,000.

The Rallye edition, priced from \$54,500 plus on-roads, introduces lightweight components and performance parts specifically designed for drivers who want to experience a higher level of performance.

The Rallye is distinguished by bespoke Frosted White crystal pearl paint and bright red brake callipers bearing the Toyota Gazoo Racing logo.

Inside, it boasts synthetic leather-accented sports front seats which feature large bolsters, red stitching and perforated Ultrasuede inserts.

A uniquely numbered GR Yaris Rallye plaque is fixed to the centre console with an additional Rallye badge on the rear hatch.

Standard kit includes dual-zone climate air, suede and leather trimmed sports seats, heated front seats, smart entry and start, and an auto-dimming rear mirror.

Drivers also receive complimentary map upgrades for 3 years.

Infotainment is provided by 8-speaker JBL audio and a 7-inch touchscreen display with Bluetooth, voice recognition, DAB+ digital radio, Apple CarPlay and Android Auto, along with one USB and 12V outlet in the front.

The Rallye edition is powered by the same 200kW/370Nm 1.6-litre single-scroll turbocharged three-cylinder petrol engine as the GR.

Toyota reckons it's the world's most powerful, series production, three-pot, able to propel the car from rest to 100km/h in 5.2 seconds.

Power is fed to all four wheels through the clever GR-FOUR all-wheel drive system via a six-speed intelligent manual gearbox with revmatching for up and down shifts.

Rallye features the latest Toyota Safety Sense technologies including a pre-collision safety system with autonomous emergency braking, intersection assistance, high-speed adaptive cruise control, lane trace assist and road-sign assist.

Other safety features include emergency steering assist, blind spot monitor, head-up display, reversing camera and six airbags.

While a standard Yaris gets a five-star safety rating, the GR is a significantly different vehicle and this rating does not apply.

Key upgrades include circuit-tuned GR suspension, Torsen limited-slip differentials on the front and rear axles, an ultra-light highperformance wheel-and-tyre package and improved front brake ducting to improve cooling.

The front MacPherson strut suspension from the GR Yaris has been upgraded with stiffer springs and anti-roll bars to realise the new model's full performance potential.

cated ahead of the rear differential.

It features three driver-selectable modes Normal, Track and Sport -- which deliver a different distribution of torque between front and back: 60:40, 30:70 and 50:50 respectively.

Two Torsen limited-slip diffs control distribution between left and right wheels to deliver natural and direct control with enhanced stability, cornering performance and grip.

A plastic, carbon-fibre reinforced roof, aluminium bonnet, doors and tailgate, with liberal use of lightweight, high-tensile steel - underscore the performance potential.

It's also equipped with lightweight, highstrength 18-inch BBS forged alloys.

Michelin Pilot Sport 4S high-performance 225/40ZR18 tyres are standard, but our test vehicle had been fitted with Dunlop SP Sport Maxx (the tyre normally fitted to the non-Rallye model).

You won't find a spare in the back either.

A puncture repair kit is supplied instead -to save weight. It could also have something to do with the fact the battery is located under the boot floor (to make way for a larger air cleaner under the bonnet).

The driver-focused cabin is fitted with a small-diameter, leather-wrapped steering wheel with fingertip controls, leatherwrapped short-throw gear shifter and handbrake, plus aluminium pedals.

GR Yaris is the car they used to homologate Toyota's World Rally Championship contender.

Two rear seats feature IsoFix anchor points and are split 60/40 to expand the 141-litre luggage space to 737 litres when the seats are folded.

With a 50-litre tank, Rallye takes the good stuff, 98 RON unleaded and uses a claimed 7.6L/100km.

Vine rootstock field day

By Kathy Fennell

A successful rootstock field day was held at Coonawarra last Tuesday at a Wynn's Coonawarra Estate vineyard.

The contingent of 25 people experienced a practical day and listened to speakers David Hansen, principal consultant from the Hansen Consulting group in Melbourne, and Nick Dry from Foundation Viticulture in the Barossa Valley.

The trial of rootstock in Coonawarra is a partnership between Vinehealth Australia, Coonawarra Vignerons and Wynn's Coonawarra Estate

Data has been collected over the past five years.

"We wanted to wait until the vines had matured before we did this underground testing," said Suzanne McLoughlin, Technical Manger of Vinehealth Australia, who organised the field day.

"It was the first time we have actually looked underground to look at the vine roots, she said.

Nine pits were dug at different locations throughout the vineyard and each pit was viewed separately.

"We don't look underground enough," Ms McLoughlin said.

The locations showed all different types of root patterns.

Mr Hansen spoke in depth about the root system and how it works.

"The root system develops differently with different varieties and soil types," he said.

Another topic included wheel traffic throughout the vineyard.

"This can also have an impact on root patterns as after years of driving between rows can compact the soil and affect root growth," Mr Hansen said.

Mr Dry, a specialist in propagation, spoke about the importance of the right genetics, healthy and strong rootstock and soil conditions being major factors in establishing a vineyard.

Mr Hansen will complete a report on the field day and it will be available in the near future

Ms McLoughlin said: "It was a very successful field day and it was great to have the variety of discussions on rootstock variety, soil, climate, yield and quality.

"Everyone enjoyed the opportunity to ask questions and gained a lot of beneficial information from the day.'

There will be more onsite field walks planned for later in the year.



"I was happy with our determination in the first game, we were winning the contest early but struggled to convert on the scoreboard.


"We probably ran out of experience and legs in the last half but we took a lot of positives out of that.
