Men's Shed expanding for veterans

Millicent Men's Shed has recently secured \$25,000 through the Federal Government's Veteran and Community Program that will see their long planned extension through to lock up stage. The total cost of the project is \$40,000 with the Men's Shed contributing the additional \$15,000 required from its existing funds.

Secretary of the Men's Shed, Chris Mathias said the group drew up a formal partnership with the Returned and Services League (RSL) Millicent Sub-branch last year, to provide an outlet for welfare support for military veterans in the region. **Continued page 5**

Radio examined

Millicent community radio station 5THE FM is being investigated by the Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA), the South Eastern Times can reveal.

ACMA is the governing body that regu-

lates media services in Australia, ensuring all broadcasters follow legislative and licencing requirements.

It has confirmed an investigation into 5THE FM began in April, prompted by a complaint received about the station.

While the investigation is being undertaken, the authority could not comment on the nature of the complaint or what regulations may have been breached.

Community radio stations in Australia are subject to the Broadcasting Services Act 1992,

which outlines rules for community radio stations such as not making a profit, being run by an incorporated body or charity and encouraging members of the community to participate in the station.

House prices doubling in 12 months

Millicent has had the largest real estate growth across regional South Australia in a 12 month period according to the 2022 March quarter figures recently released by the Real Estate Institute of South Australia (REISA).

In the figures, Millicent was named as having an increase of more than 50 per cent.

The statement, released earlier this month by REISA, claims the South Australian regional property market has recorded another strong year of growth with a new record median price across regional South Australia.

REISA interim chief executive officer, Cain Cooke said results continued to demonstrate outstanding growth in the South Australian regional real estate market in posting a 10.17 per cent median house price increase from the previous quarter and a 15.30 per cent increase from the same quarter last year.

"The volume of sales across regional South Australia demonstrated a cooling of the real estate market with a decrease of 14.85 per cent from the previous quarter," Mr Cooke said.

"Sales were up 1.7 per cent from the same quarter last year.

"Towns which have seen the largest growth over a 12 month period were Millicent, Berri and Mount Gambier with increases of 56.67 per cent, 36.47 per cent and 28.81 per cent respectively."

Millicent Real Estate owner Valerie Jones agreed and said: "Sales have been really good and prices have definitely gone up 50 to 60 per cent in the last 12 months, not all of them, but most houses.

"Listings are difficult to get right now because they are selling so quick, we are still getting listings but they have gone from sitting on the market for months to selling within weeks."

Tragedy memorial

It was a poignant occasion in Penola on Thursday when the families of four men killed in a tragic vehicle accident six years ago on the outskirts of the town gathered with other Penola community members to unveil a bench seat in their memory.

Christopher Sylvester, Steven Whitehead, Reece Wilkinson and Nick Roser lost their lives on their way to work on November 19, 2016.

Steven Sylvester, father of Christopher said: " On behalf of my family I would like to sincerely thank the Penola community for what they have done for us.

"Snow Merrett has been in touch with us the whole time, keeping us up to date on what was happening.

"We heard rumours that the tree was going to be cut down and we didn't want that to happen.

"If the tree went then we would have no reason to come here," Mr Sylvester said.

"We greatly appreciate the seat and special thanks to the Penola Men's Shed for building it with the assistance of the Wattle Range Council," he said.

Mr Wilkinson said: "It has been really, really wonderful the support we have had from the Penola community.

"We now have somewhere to come and reflect our memories.

"Snow Merrett (from Merrett Logging in Penola) has been absolutley fantastic in organising everything.

"We also thank the South East Car Club for their support in helping out with the car runs," he said.

Unfortunately members of the Whitehead and Roser families were unable to attend.

The whole idea was instigated by Snow Merrett's grandson Cameron who suggested a 'put out your hard hat' day with Snow suggesting a car run.

Merrett (Snow) said: "We organised the car run within seven days and the event attracted 172 cars."

Members of the South East Street Machines Club were also heavily involved.

Club secretary, Merve Heemskerk said:

"\$36000 was raised from the first car run and this money was distributed between the four families of the men that were killed to assist with funeral expenses.

"This amount came from car entry fees, sponsorship and donations."

A memorial run was held a bit later and the money from this, which was much smaller, was donated to the Emergency Services in Penola," he said.

The car club also donated \$250 to the Penola Men's Shed which went towards the making of the bench seat.

Crayfish festival's blues

The future of the Beachport Crayfish Festival is in doubt after communications broke down between the Wattle Range Council and volunteers from the event's organising committee.

The event, held on March 5, was regarded as a success by both the committee and council, selling 1982 tickets and making an expected profit of \$9000.

It was the first time the event had taken place and was a council project organised in partnership with the committee which was made up of Beachport residents and council staff.

Soon after the event, problems arose between the Beachport residents and council staff about additional council costs appearing in the festival budget, what funds will be made available for the next event, and slow payment of invoices by council.

A meeting took place this month between residents and council staff about the situation.

Following the meeting, all Beachport community residents involved in the committee indicated they would be unwilling to work under the auspice of the Wattle Range Council on any future Crayfish Festival, leaving the future of the project in limbo.

Heather Burdon, an organising committee member, said she and other members had significant experience in planning community events.

The committee claims that additional engineering costs of about \$10,000 were added into the budget after the event to cover council staffing costs that had not appeared earlier.

Ms Burdon said if the committee had known about the costs associated with council outdoor staff, alternative arrangements could have been made.

"There was transparency all the way through until the event was over, but to date, we continue to be left in the dark concerning the final financial outcome," Ms Burdon said.

"It is so disappointing for the committee because we worked so hard and were always fully involved in all aspects of the festival, including the finances."

Committee members estimated they spent around 500 hours each helping organise and run the event.

The committee was involved in the planning and running of the event and working to the budget, but ultimate responsibility for the event and finances sat with council.

Ms Burdon said the committee had been concerned about reputational damage following a long delay by council in paying businesses and entertainers for services provided during the event.

"It was not until we jumped up and down two months later when people were ringing us asking why they had not been paid, they [council staff] decided to devote some time to finalising the festival," she said.

"A lot of us run small businesses and mak-

ing those involved in the hospitality industry, who have been doing it tough, wait for extended periods to be paid is just not acceptable or the way we operate."

Development services director for the council Emma Clay worked with the committee directly along with other staff to help coordinate the event.

Ms Clay claims that the costs had been budgeted for.

"Council budgeted \$15,000 for this festival and obtained an additional \$5,000 grant," she said.

"The costs that we incurred, there was actually council funds budgeted for that."

Ms Clay rejected the idea council staff had not been transparent during the planning.

"It was always a partnership and that is why we were so transparent with the budget because we wanted them to be involved and we wanted them to have some decision making," she said.

"It is disappointing, we want to be strengthening these relationships."

Ms Clay said the partnership had been successful until after the event.

"If there are certain community or committee members that do not want to be involved at the next event, we will have to reconsider the model the event is run in," Ms Clay said.

Council chief executive officer Ben Gower said he was very grateful for the support the group had provided, but stood by the additional engineering costs.

"All of those costs were expended in setting up, supporting on the day and packing up the event; they are absolutely justified," he said.

Mr Gower said staff had been unaware of the problem with the unpaid bills until the meeting.

An official decision on the future of the event and any funding will be decided by the Wattle Range Council during budget deliberations.

"It is not cancelled at this stage, but it is also not programmed for next year," Mr Gower said.

Ms Burdon said she cannot see how the event could be held without community support.

"People have already booked in for accommodation to attend next year's event," she said.

The South Eastern Times article ('Static over radio' May 12) which raises concerns about 5THEFM's community access, volunteer numbers, programming, management and governance, fails to acknowledge the considerable market and social change and challenges confronting local media and all community volunteer organisations over the last three decades. Community radio stations, because of their 'niche-skill' nature, particularly struggle with recruiting, training, and maintaining volunteers prepared to guarantee studio and administrative commitments. alternatively, review viability and explore possible options.

Manager Sheryl Lowe has contributed enormously to 5THEFM for many years.

enormously to 5THEFM for many years. In the absence of sufficient local volunteers she has more recently sought production and programme assistance from skilled radio enthusiasts beyond Millicent.

All community radio stations throughout the South East and beyond have experienced such threats to their viability.

In this context of parlous numbers and stress, optimum collaborative decision making isn't always achieved.

The understandable organisational response is to either knuckle-down and persevere with diminishing resources while seeking scarce volunteers and funds; or The last few Covid years, has especially been a constraint to accessibility and volunteer availability.

As an aging 5THEFM volunteer making a limited weekly programme contribution, I suggest that discussion about the station be realistic and solution focussed rather than canvassing old resentment and encouraging current accusations.

A lead page article constructed by local print media featuring a council mayor without declaring conflict of interests is not a good look for all parties.

If breaches are found ACMA can take action, such as issuing an informal or formal warning, an infringement notice, giving remedial direction or even applying to the Federal Court for civil penalty orders or injunctions.

The action taken by ACMA depends on the seriousness of the breach, and how widespread or harmful the behaviour was.

Concerns about 5THE FM were publicly aired last week by Wattle Range Council Mayor Des Noll, who told the South Eastern Times that the organisation suffers from a lack of transparency and community engagement.

"I am very concerned about the radio station's direction into the future," Mr Noll said.

"There appears to be no governance structure or board of management in place that gives the radio station structure, and management transparency.



"The radio station is an important community asset, I do not believe it is currently delivering its full potential as the community and the radio station's licence would expect."

It is not known if these specific concerns are being investigated by ACMA.

The South Australian Consumer and Business Services (CBS) monitors the compliance of incorporated bodies in the State.

A CBS spokesperson was unable to "confirm or deny" if there is any investigation in relation to 5THE FM.

5THE FM was contacted for comment about the ACMA investigation, but no response was received by The South Eastern Times.

Junior innovation classes

Young Innovators Masterclass this Sunday is ideally aimed at year 7 students as part of a newly launched Innovation Festival presented by The Limestone Coast and Green Triangle Innovation Collective (LCGTIC).

Facilitated by Millicent High School tech studies teacher and international education consultant, Feresh Pizarro, the afternoon session promises to be full of rich ideas offering tools and strategies for young people to use in their daily life.

Ms Pizarro wants to create a memorable hands on experience and said: "For me education is trying to connect students to the real world that they are going to have to face.

"The Young Innovators Masterclass will give students the ability to identify real problems that they would like to try to solve and then they can create solutions.

"Once the solution has been identified, prototypes will be created out of cardboard, glue or sticks or drawn up as a plan and used to pitch the idea to the rest of the room.

"I'm going to give the students fake money and they are going to be investors.

"They have to give their investment to the idea they think is needed in their community and that could really work."

Ms Pizarro stressed the focus is not on money and is about giving the students the ability to identify what problems are worth solving.

"There are too many bad ideas out there that are making money and contributing to the problem instead of being a solution."

Teachers are encouraged to attend if they are interested in seeing entrepreneurial education practice strategies in action.

"If teachers are interested in entrepreneurial education I'm more than happy to chat, that's what I've been doing for the last two years, upskilling professional development for teachers to know how to apply this in every single one of their classrooms.

"It doesn't matter what subject it is because

entrepreneurial education is about value creation for students and how students create value for others and themselves.'

Originally joining LCGTIC as a small business owner looking for connections Ms Pizarro soon noticed there was a need to represent young people in the area.

"There are all these events happening for everyone and there was nothing for young people and that is where we need to start," Ms Pizarro said.

"I feel like I can leave them feeling empowered to not just wait until they are adults to do something.

"They can be creative and innovative and the skills they take from the masterclass can help them with their studies and everyday life.

"Things like embracing failure, being persistent, creative and critical thinking, that's my hope.'

Family connection to Kalangadoo farmers market

A family connection initiated the Kalangadoo Farmers market and its venue.

It all began when Kalangadoo resident Sandra Young purchased the former Kalangadoo Uniting Church and hall in 2010.

She had a special connection to the buildings as her late husband, Forrest, was a lay preacher at the church, and Sandra herself was a Sunday school teacher, until the church closed down in 2007.

"After my husband passed away in 2009, I wanted to buy some property," Sandra said.

"It (the property) was advertised at what I had to spend, however when the owners knew it was me they dropped the price by \$20,000.

with the buildings. "This allowed me a bit left over to upgrade the toilets and the electricity," she said.

"My first thought was to convert them "Then I had to decide what I wanted to do into bed and breakfast accommodation,

however that just seemed a bit too hard," Sandra said.

Mrs Young had a love for farmers markets and had already visited the Adelaide Central Market and markets at Willunga and Angaston.

She wanted to make it something the community could be involved in so she called a public meeting to gauge the interest in Kalangadoo and district, and the establishment of the Kalangadoo market went from there.

When Mrs Young was doing her research she was advised that a market should open weekly and must have a membership to make it work.

The market officially opened 11 years ago and has been going strong ever since, only closing four times apart from when Covid-19 caused restrictions.

Every Saturday the market offers a range

of produce, candles, preserves and jams, cakes, pies and pasties, honey, plants, fruit and vegetables, crafts and knick-knacks.

Market President, Alex Guenther, who has held the role for seven years, said: "We have a wonderful market with people, including regulars, attending from far and wide.

"We also sell on commission where people can drop in their goods for sale and we take a small fee for the service," he said.

A popular attraction is the sausage sizzle which is run by a small band of people each week.

In the church hall there is a small cafe where tea, coffee and homemade cake can be purchased and patrons can sit and have a chat.

Mr Guenther said: "We are always looking for volunteers, as many hands make light work.

Covid cases at Boneham

Six residents of Millicent's Boneham Aged Care Services (BACS) have returned Covid-19 positive results in the last week.

On Tuesday this week, chief executive officer of BACS Michael Filsell issued a statement on social media advising that: "At this point all residents are only mildly symptomatic and one has been transported to hospital for reasons unrelated to Covid-19".

Mr Filsell issued a statement last Friday when the first case, a resident of the Wyndemere wing, returned a Covid-19 positive result from a Rapid Antigen Test (RAT).

The statement said Wyndemere wing residents and their family members were notified by telephone and the wing was immediately placed into isolation with residents isolating in their rooms while urgent PCR testing was implemented.

Pathology services arrived on site the same day to undertake PCR tests of all residents across the facility.

By last Sunday Mr Filsell announced through an updated social media post that two more residents had returned positive tests.

The two positive tests from the Plover and Manor wing led to the facility being placed on the highest level restrictions.

On Tuesday, Mr Filsell announced another three residents had tested positive in the Manor, Plover and Kintore Wing.

Mr Filsell told the South Eastern Times that continued testing was being undertaken to ensure the facility is aware of any further infections in the facility

"Restrictions are likely to escalate but the situation is ongoing and rapidly changing with visitation protocols constantly under

review," Mr Filsell said.

"It's a very fluid situation, things may change so always check with the site or our Facebook page for latest updates."

All visitors to the site must wear an N95 mask and undertake a RAT test before entering and family members with concerns are asked to contact BACS for more information

At the time of print deadline on Tuesday, staff from BACS were providing daily updates to families of residents in the impacted wings and a carpark meeting had been organised to allow families to discuss issues directly with Mr Filsell

"Currently, 32 per cent of the Men's Shed's members are veterans, a number of whom have been referred to the Shed by the RSL committee," Mr Mathias said.

"This relationship has been of great value in providing a facility which welcomes veterans and offers them companionship and some purpose in life through the undertakings of the Shed.

"To provide more activities for all its members, the Shed is expanding to encompass a metal workshop to compliment the current woodwork workshop.

Mr Mathias said the extension to the shed should be finished in early August as the contract to build the shed has already been given out and work is expected to start within weeks.

He also said the Shed's membership has

more than doubled this year with ages ranging from 29 to 93 years old.

"At the end of last year we had 33 members and now we are up to 48 at the moment," Mr Mathias said.

The growth in membership includes men from the Limestone Coast Model Railway Group.

The group had been searching for somewhere affordable to set up permanent model railway tracks and approached Mr Mathias.

"They asked if I knew of anywhere and I said we are expanding and moving everything out of the current storage shed, so we offered them our storage shed; they had a look around it and said it was absolutely ideal.'

Mr Mathias said the group has been offered associate membership with half of them making the decision to sign up for full Men's Shed membership.

In an inclusive setting, women will learn the skills needed to protect their families and livelihoods in case of bushfire.

Through providing information and practical skills, the workshop's aim is to assist women in empowering and protecting themselves, their family and their community.

Being prepared emotionally, knowing how to operate fire pumps and equipment, and preparing a bushfire survival plan, are some of the topics covered.

Course facilitator, Megan Hurrell, a CFS Regional Community Engagement officer, told the South Eastern Times: "It is really important to have a plan in place and know what you going to do, whether you're going to leave or relocate early or you're going to stay at home and actively defend your property.

"While the fire danger season is finished now and we are going into winter, this is a really good time to do this course.

"It gives a lot of time to actually think about what you want to do and put those preparations in place, rather than rushing as it gets warmer leading into summer.

"You can prepare the plans, discuss them with your family and make the preparations with plenty of time, so it is a less stressful situation.

Previous Lucindale course participant Sally said: "I was reluctant to do the course.

but I am so very glad I did.

"A great kick start coming into the next fire season.

"I feel empowered and equipped to write and prepare an adequate first bushfire plan."

The workshop is open to all women, even those who live outside bushfire prone areas as people still regularly travel through high risk areas.

With embers able to travel 20kms in front of a fire-front Ms Hurrell stressed it is important to know where to go, what to do and what your family members are doing.

The Firey Women workshop is held over two Sundays with attendance required at both sessions.

government assistance in past years.

"The subsidy is an added bonus but I feel there could be another way where apprentices could benefit a bit more," he said.

"Apprentices get a fairly low wage and there should be more incentive."

"My number one priority is to employ locals," he said.

"If we can employ locals then the local community supports my business."

Mr Devereaux said: "I try to source my apprentices from local schools but this is extremely hard as there are so many other work opportunities out there.

"I started off on my own in 2014 and the business has grown immensely since then," he said.

"We are kept very busy as there is always something someone wants done.

"I am looking forward to continuing supporting the Penola community and employing more locals," he said.

"Youth employment has reached its lowest level in more than 13 years and there are a record 220,000 Australians in trade apprenticeships," Mr Pasin said.

national educational consultant, Millicent High School educator and small business owner has recently moved to the area with her family and built a new home.

Keen to do something within the community Ms Pizarro was quick to be involved in the LCGTIC when approached, recognising the region is rich with resources and wanting to connect people with opportunities they may not be aware of.

"We want to get things moving in the area, to celebrate businesses, motivate people to come to the area and also build the brand for the Limestone Coast."

Ms Pizarro is hosting the Millicent Young Innovators Masterclass event being held in Millicent and as a tech studies teacher is passionate about finding and teaching real world applications for her students.

"For me education is trying to connect students to the real world that they are going to have to face and tech gives a lot of opportunity to connect with industry that's what's really exciting for me."

Other Innovation Festival events being

Roadwork on route to Beachport

Close shave for a cause

Kalangadoo resident, Peta Rogers, put her head on the auction block Saturday night by offering the responsibility of shaving her hair off to the highest bidder.

Ms Rogers is raising funds for the Leukaemia Foundation, a charity close to her heart, and this is the second time in 13 years she has lopped off her locks for the World's Greatest Shave (originally named Shave for a Cure).

The head shave was the final item up for auction held at the Kalangadoo Clubrooms and was won by Peta's husband Nick who paid \$680 for the privilege.

Ms Rogers explained her support for the foundation: "My son Jack was diagnosed at the age of two with leukaemia.

"To be told that your two year old has leukaemia and you need to live in Adelaide for six to eight months was quite scary.

"Back then we didn't have any family in Adelaide and I didn't have any close friends that lived in Adelaide to stay with.

"But the nurses put us in contact with the Leukaemia Foundation and they were just magnificent, they gave us a fully furnished unit free of charge, it didn't cost us anything to stay there.

"Everyday they contacted me, they knew Jack's dad worked on a cray boat and it was right in the middle of the fishing season so he couldn't leave to come up.

"We also had my daughter Halle, who was 8 months old at the time and stayed home with her dad while I went to Adelaide with Jack for eight months.

"The Leukaemia Foundation were fantastic, they would ring me or pop in every day for a coffee, just to check up on us and just to see how we were."


Cancer funds




