Australian Defence Force (ADF) personnel arrived at Boneham Aged Care Services (BACS) last Friday to assist while the complex is enduring a Covid-19 outbreak and staff shortages.

The ADF personnel were called in after sev-

en residents of BACS tested positive to Covid and there were staff shortages caused largely by staff testing positive to the virus or needing to isolate due to being a close contact of a Covid case.

It is understood that two ADF teams have

arrived at BACS, the first consisting of five personnel of a general duties (GD) team which began duties last Friday and are due to finish today.

A second clinical team, understood to consist of three nurses, began last Saturday and

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Tony Pasin was re-elected last Saturday to his fourth term as the Member for Barker.

Fourth term for Pasin

Barker Liberal MP Tony Pasin was reelected at the Federal election held last weekend.

Mr Pasin has held the seat since 2013 and secured the seat on Saturday with 53.1 per cent of the primary vote.

Labor candidate Mark Braes received 20.8 per cent of the primary vote.

Despite a decrease in his primary and two-party preferred vote, compared to the 2019 election, Mr Pasin was reelected with 65.1 per cent of the vote with Mr Braes finishing at 34.9 per cent after preferences were distributed.

Mr Pasin said he would not take his fourth consecutive term for granted.

"It is a humbling feeling and a great privilege to be a Member of Parliament," he said.

Mr Pasin said, despite now being in opposition, he would remain passionate about a number of projects including mental health and the community's alcohol and other drug funding.

"Irrespective of the outcome, I am going to keep banging the table about mobile phone connectivity as well because it is the number one issue that people contact me about," he said.

Ready for racing

Millicent Racing Club is taking the opportunity to showcase the Millicent Cup to Mount Gambier this Sunday when it holds its second race meeting at the city's track in recent times.

A feature of the Millicent Cup race day at Allan Scott Glenburnie Racecourse will be acknowledgement of the contribution to the local racing industry by Ned, Nan and Sue Walker who were tragically killed in a car accident in November 2020.

"Last year at Penola we were going to have Ned's stable colour flag up in memory of the family but the flagpoles had been removed; this year Mount Gambier have flagpoles so we are putting Ned's stable flag up," committee member Karen Olsson said.

"We also have the trainers trophy for the Millicent Cup in memory of Ned, Nan and Sue and the winner gets a rug that has been donated. "Ned, Nan and Sue are part of the history of the Millicent Racing Club.

"Ned was a life member and the whole family were involved; he even won the cup one year with General Magic."

With the 2021 race at Penola impacted by a border shut down three days before the event, and the 2020 Millicent Cup limited to industry personnel only, the event this year is sure to be a highlight on the social calendar.

Preselling of tickets has proved popular with Bookies Shed table packages already sold out and limited tickets remaining for the Redelva Luncheon.

Club secretary Simone Berry told The South Eastern Times: "The Redelva Luncheon at \$150 a head is all inclusive and quite luxe, it includes your meal, drinks and balcony views of the whole track.

"It's actually been really successful and the community support around the cup has been amazing."

The luncheon includes a fundraising auction for the club and the opportunity to get up close to the 2015 Melbourne Cup.

"John Richards is one of the owners of Prince of Penzance, winner of the 2015 Melbourne Cup, ridden by Michelle Payne, and he is bringing the cup over with him," Ms Berry said.

"We also have our Calcutta at the Somerset Hotel front bar Friday night at 7pm and this is expected to be a big night."

The 3MP Millicent cup is a fully catered event with full betting facilities on site, and the club has arranged for two buses to leave from the Civic and Arts Centre and return at \$20 a head with tickets still remaining.

There is a generous capacity limit and general admission tickets are still available to purchase through Racing SA, the Millicent Racing Club Facebook page, Moshtix or phone 0459 428 291 for enquiries.

Organisers are focussed on bringing fun back to the 3MP Millicent Cup Fashions on the Field (FOTF) event being held at the Mount Gambier racecourse this Sunday.

For the first time music will replace microphones on the stage with participants sure to enjoy the upbeat tracks chosen especially for each category.

It's just one way that FOTF co-ordinator Helen Varcoe is wanting to make the event fun for all.

"I'm having music playing on the stage, often they go down and talk about what they are

wearing, this year we are focussing on having fun, so hopefully people will enjoy the music and tap their feet," Ms Varcoe said.

"There are a couple of people I know who are doing their first ever fashion [FOTF], they have never done it before and it's on their bucket list."

Ms Varcoe has been involved in the Millicent Cup's FOTF event for more than 10 years and is excited by the event this year telling The South Eastern Times there is about \$5,000 worth of cash and prizes for all categories.

Prizes include \$1,000 cash for the women's winner and \$250 cash for the men's winner with both categories including gift packs and other prizes.

All category winners will receive a sash this year, which is another first for the event, and all adult entrants have the opportunity to win a carton of wine.

This prize will be at the judges discretion and will ignore traditional racing fashion rules with Ms Varcoe explaining: "Fashion rules are out, the rules are pretty strict and technical about dressing for the races, but this is about dressing in whatever you feel comfortable in, it's a category about having fun and the rules don't really apply. "We also have a lucky draw for the ladies event where we have had a beautiful set of Napoleon makeup brushes donated for one of the women who get up on the stage."



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FOTF judges will include Kimmi Tincknell, of Millicent, who has been a regular FOTF entrant and has represented the state in the Myer National Competition in Melbourne.

Ms Tincknell will be joined by Geelong based Sharon Smith, who is a previous winner of the Adelaide Cup FOTF, and Chris Sutherland, a local business woman with a passion for fashion.

A family polling tradition

A last minute recruitment drive by the Australian Electoral Commission (AEC) ensured a tradition that had endured three generations of Rendelsham's Smith family continued last Saturday.

With Covid-19 induced absences among the reasons, the AEC announced last week it was struggling to find enough people to work on a number of rural booths throughout the country for the Federal Election, including Rendelsham, Southend, Furner, Nangwarry, Coonawarra and Carpenter Rocks.

The recruitment drive worked as all the booths threatened with closure in the local area were open for the day.

However, when it looked uncertain whether his home town booth of Rendelsham would open, Graeme 'Rocky' Smith said he felt disappointed.

"It's a part of history," he said on Saturday, glad that the polling booth was able to open.

"It's not just a polling place, it's also a meeting place.

"It's a good catch up opportunity," he said explaining that many ex-residents of Rendelsham return to the town's hall to vote as a means of rekindling their connection with the town

Smith family members have been voting at the hall since it was built in 1924, including his grandfather Syd 'Rocky' Smith, and his father Ian 'Rocky' Smith.

Also inheriting the nickname of Rocky, Graeme has been President of the Rendelsham Liberal Party branch for about 10 years, following in his father's footsteps who was secretary of the branch for many years.

Another former President of the Rendelsham branch, 93 year old John Stuckey drove from his current home in Millicent to vote at Rendelsham on Saturday.

Despite Millicent offering two large polling places to vote, Mr Stuckey said he drove the 15kms through roadworks to Rendelsham especially to vote, but why?

"Tradition," he answered quite simply, "and well may it continue," explaining that he had been voting at Rendelsham for more than 70 vears.

Rocky's mother Noelene had rung Mr Stuckey to apologise for not being able to offer him the traditional cup of tea at her former home in Rendelsham on election day as she was now living in Millicent.

Noelene's home used to be an election day gathering place, young Rocky explained.

"Jack Brennan would be here handing out

Dad would be handing out cards for the Liberal party," he said.

"At lunch time they would take off their 'boxing gloves' [referring to their party allegiances] and walk through the church yard to mum's where she would serve them both lunch and they would chatter away as

'how to vote' cards for the Labor party, and friends, then they would walk back over to the hall and put the 'boxing gloves' back on again.'

The statement said the ADF's GD teams provide non-clinical support, such as assistance with waste management, food service delivery, spot cleaning and companionship for residents.

The ADF's clinical teams provide qualified support, such as registered nurse responsibilities, according to the statement.

"Support from the ADF is considered by the department alongside all other available surge workforce options," the statement said.

"Through regular contact, [which] the department maintains with all Residential Aged Care Facilities in [an] outbreak, it was determined Mary Cecelia Hart Court Hostel [BACS] in Millicent, South Australia, would be best supported by a General Duties (GD) team from 20-26 May 22, and a clinical team from 21-29 May 22.

"ADF personnel are assisting with meal and laundry deliveries, restocking of PPE [personal protective equipment] and skype/window visits for residents," the Facebook statement said.

"Extra support is also being provided by other aged care providers in the region with collaborative arrangements underway regarding PPE stocks and ongoing advice, with staff currently working extended 12 hour shifts and multiple extra days to ensure shifts are filled."

Mr Filsell told the South Eastern Times: Staff and ADF have worked collaboratively extremely well and the residents have responded to their support very positively.

"Both teams were supplied through the ADE.

Confirming that this was not the first time the ADF had been called in for such purposes elsewhere in Australia, the statement said the ADF had supplemented the DOH's surge workforce since February 5 this year to support outbreaks in residential aged care facilities.

"The ADF is one of multiple providers delivering surge workforce to support facilities experiencing a Covid-19 outbreak across the nation," the statement said.

Meanwhile, statements released by BACS chief executive officer Michael Filsell, via the facility's public Facebook page, confirmed the ADF personnel were at the site providing pro-

tion day by day.

At the time of press the seven residents at BACS with Covid-19 were either asymptomatic or experiencing mild symptoms with some of them at the end of their infectious period or approaching it.

BACS remains on restrictions with visits limited to end of life and special support needs, with the emergency management team continually reviewing this status.

Visits need to be arranged in advance with the Director of Care or Clinical Nurse and visitors must RAT test and wear full PPE at all times when on site.

PCR Testing is continuing at the site every 48 hours as per SA Health guidelines to cap-ture any emerging new infections.

As the situation is constantly changing, families are urged to contact BACS or refer to its Facebook page for the latest updates.

Time capsule resealed

Millicent's time capsule, opened for the town's 150th celebrations last year, is due to be resealed at the Millicent Public Library next Tuesday for another 25 years.

Retired Kimberly-Clark Australia engineer, Richard Nobbs designed the time capsule 25 years ago and, when it was opened last November, 80 stories were in the capsule, giving a rich social history of the town.

These stories will be placed back in the capsule and additional stories collected more recently will be added, along with a letter written by current Wattle Range Council Mayor Des Noll for the future Mayor to read when the capsule is reopened 25 years from now.

The capsule sealing ceremony at the library will begin at 2.30pm and will coincide with the library's monthly local history talk which will be delivered by the former chief executive officer of Wattle Range Council, Frank Brennan, who will speak about The Brennan family from Kilkenny, Ireland, to Millicent.

Mr Brennan served as the chief executive for almost 25 years, and worked in local government for 34 years, with both the District Council of Millicent and Wattle Range Council.

Beginning his career with the Millicent District Council after completing a university degree in town planning he found his surveying skills were needed for an initial three months.

Mr Brennan then began working for the council on the outside work group which included digging graves, riding rubbish trucks and spending time on the end of a shovel.

"Most people think we used to just lean on them (the shovels) - that's only partly true," said Mr Brennan.

Former Wattle Range Council chief executive officer Frank Brennan will be the guest speaker at the Millicent Public Library's history afternoon next Tuesday when the town's time capsule will also be resealed.

Agricultural experience

Organisers of an inter-school agricultural day hope the event has planted a seed in the minds of South East students

More than 150 students from around the region, including Penola High School, Kangaroo Inn Area School, Lucindale, Naracoorte, Grant High School and Bordertown, gathered at Naracoorte High School to get a hands on look at the job opportunities in agriculture technology.

They rotated through a number of activity stations where they leant about the various roles technology and science plays in the production of cereals crops.

Director for AgCommunicators Belinda Cay said agricultural technology, plant breeding and genetics, machinery and soil science were some of the topics covered.

"The concept is that food production is not just a matter of chucking a wheat seed in the ground and hoping for the best, there is a lot more to it," she said.

"Really, the whole day was about putting the pieces of the puzzle together in how we develop wheat, barley and cereal crops for Australian consumers, and for export.

"We find that students often think careers in agriculture are farming, so we are trying to expand people's thinking so they can see that agriculture is about communication, engineering, innovation, diesel mechanics, electricians, plant breeders, geneticists, agronomists, soil scientists, data electricians,

Timber harvesting finalist

Mount Burr resident, Glenn Treloar is a finalist for the 2021 Green Triangle Timber Industry Awards which will be announced next month.

After being postponed twice due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the awards night will be held at Mount Gambier's Barn Palais on June 10.

Mr Treloar has been chosen as a finalist for the Operations - Harvesting and Infield Chipping Excellence Award.

Born and bred in Mount Burr, Mr Treloar has worked in timber related industries since he was 15 years old, first for PJ & P Huckel for eight years after the 1983 Ash Wednesday bushfires devastated the pine plantations in the South East, then 20 years with the Fennell family at G&R Logging, and for the last 10 years he has operated a harvester for Moreland Holdings.

"I'll probably stay there until I die," he said, praising his employers.

"You don't get much better bosses than Morelands."

Mr Treloar said he believed he had been nominated for the awards due to his 100 per cent pass rate from monthly audits which are conducted on work in the forest including checks on whether logs had been cut to the correct lengths with only a 3cm tolerance and with no 'tails', which are the splinters on the end of a log if it is not cut through completely.

"I enjoy what I do and I do take pride in what I do," he said.

Other finalists for the Operations - Harvesting and In-field Chipping Excellence Award include Matt Tilby, of Merrett Logging.

Finalists in other award categories include Debbie Blok, Todd Reid, Courtney Pink, Paul Roughana, Maddison Bowden, Stuart Thornton, Josh Pridham, Graham Earl and Steve Telford, while company finalists include C3, Reid Logging, NF McDonnell and Sons, Glenara Transport, and A & M Contracting.

Crafty family heirlooms

Invited to curate an exhibition for the Millicent Art Gallery, the Millicent Craft Group decided to reach beyond their own members to include work created by others in the community.

The current exhibition titled 'My Mother's Hands' celebrates women's craft work over generations and features needlework, patchwork, hand made clothing, pottery, beadwork and scrapbooking.

Group President Raz McDonald talked about the idea behind the exhibition and the inspiration behind its name.

"I was looking at Frankie's [Payne] hands, she always has something in her hands and this is where the name came from," said Ms McDonald.

"We were sitting in the Shearers Cook Cafe looking at the tablecloths that were made by Melissa's [Armfield who owns the cafe] mother and grandmother and thought there were other people in the community that could be involved.

Talking to Melissa Armfield it was revealed she still had her grandmother's hand made wedding dress and a framed photograph of her grandmother, Ila Houghton, wearing it.

Mrs Houghton made the dress herself for

her own wedding and was described in the January 23, 1942, edition of the South Eastern Times "as making a charming picture as she entered the church gowned in a magnolia satin frock with high neckline, long fitting bodice buttoned down the back and very full sleeves gathered into a cuff, forming points over the hands.

The photograph of Mrs Houghton wearing her dress, and the actual dress, are both currently on display as part of the exhibition.

(As a point of interest, Mrs Houghton lives in Millicent and will celebrate her 103rd birthday this Sunday.)

Also in the exhibition are exquisite items made by Teresa Scaglione, a previous craft group member and mother of local woman Pierina Dickenson.

Still living in Italy at the time, Mrs Scaglione made sheets of linen from her family's home grown flax, which was finely spun and woven before being decorated with embroidery.

Other items on display include quilts collaborated on by group members to celebrate other members' 80th birthdays.

The first of these was made for Frankie Payne, the only original craft group member still attending the weekly sessions.

Ms Payne recalls the group beginning under Barbara Wallace's tuition at the Millicent High School before moving to a Nissan Hut at the aerodrome, the Millicent Museum, and a garage on Mount Gambier Road before settling in to their current Fifth Street building.

It's like a second home, I look forward to Fridays every week it's a real social gathering.

An extensive collection is on display of Mrs Payne's work and she has turned her hand to different craft over the years with her exhibition pieces reflecting that variety.

Fellow member Pearl Ransley joined the group on the first day the new building on Fifth Street opened.

With an interest in knitting and crocheting Ms Ransley has also learned Sashiko embroidery with guidance from another craft group member while attending the group.

"I've enjoyed every minute of it, they are all beautiful people and it was the only thing I missed when I was in lockdown in Victoria for nine months.'

The exhibition was installed by Pat Muhovics, Raz McDonald and Tony Addicoat with valuable assistance provided by gallery volunteer Peter Dunn.

Memories of Dolly only strengthen Mrs Savage's commitment to providing parents

with resources, proof that even the most confident young people can become victims of bullying.

"With my daughter Ruby now a similiar

age to when Dolly took her own life, raising awareness on navigating the evolving cyberworld, where much of the abuse takes place, has become ever more important," Mrs Savage said.

Mrs Savage said: "Dolly's passing was a shock being such a bold, courageous young girl.

Tree to tackle the blues

Driving between Millicent and Kingston this year has looked a little different with a dead tree near the roadside painted a striking blue colour as part of the growing Blue Tree Project.

Jess Kaldvee initiated painting the tree after driving through Victoria 18 months ago and being surprised to see a dead tree painted blue.

Deciding it must mean something, Ms Kaldvee googled the words 'blue tree' which led her to the Blue Tree Project website where she discovered the trees are used to spark difficult conversations, encourage people to speak up when battling mental health concerns, and break down the stigma attached to mental health

It was a concept that resonated with Ms Kaldvee who understands the importance of talking about depression and mental health issues in families and, as a farm worker herself, she is especially concerned about people on farms.

Living and working at Conmurra Station, Ms Kaldvee knew the owner, Nick McBride, (who is also the MP for MacKillop) would be supportive of her goal to paint a tree on the property saying: "We've got a lot of dead trees up the highway and I thought it would be seen there.

Organisation of the project began in May last year but it was January 2022 when the tree was eventually painted.

"We had to keep putting it off until the weather was better, because to get to that tree the paddock can be quite wet," she said.

With a dozen helpers joining the effort, including the McBride family, employees and their families, Ms Kaldvee said: "It didn't take long to paint and because we couldn't get all the way to the top of the big tree we painted a little tree and a fallen branch next to it.

The future of Lake George, near Beachport, is under consultation, along with other coastal lakes in the region.

A series of workshops was held by the Department for Environment and Water (DEW) last week to start discussions with the community on how the lake should be managed into the future.

In addition to Lake George, the other lakes being considered in the project include Lake Bonney SE, Lake St Clair, Lake Eliza, Lake Hawdon North and Mullins Swamp.

The workshops were intended to be held in both Robe and Millicent before being moved online due to Covid-19 concerns.

The resulting online forums held last week were attended by more than 50 community members who were asked their opinions on

how they use the coastal lakes, and how they should be used in the future.

Presentations were given from DEW representatives and the National Parks and Wildlife Service about the current use of the lakes, and their environmental importance.

When asked to describe their interests in the lake, of those in attendance 64 per cent answered 'fisher', 58 per cent answered 'hunter or camper', and 52 per cent answered 'nature lover'.

Bird watchers, bush walkers, kayakers, wind surfers and conservationists were also represented at the meeting in lower numbers.

Those in attendance had many differing opinions on the questions presented, highlighting the difficult task DEW has.

Of those in attendance, 64 per cent said that existing access to the lakes should be maintained, while 25 per cent said some activities that impact the environment should be prohibited.

Over the years Lake George has been largely managed by community groups including the Lake George Management Committee.

The lakes are for the most part situated on Crown Land and are not part of South Australia's protected area system.

Some land near Lake George is privately owned and used for farming.

Commercial fishing at the lake ceased in 1999.

The feedback will be used to help draft initial project recommendations.

A town that disappeared

Memories of Snuggery, a village that existed about 10kms east of Millicent on the Princes Highway near the old Cellulose mill from 1946 to 1972, will be among many stories which fill Millicent's time capsule which is expected to be resealed next week.

Millicent's Pauline Ferguson (nee Munro) has contributed to the capsule with a written piece about her recollections of growing up at Snuggery where her family lived and operated a general store.

Mrs Ferguson's article reads, in part, as follows:

"As a small child I lived at Snuggery."

Pauline's grandfather, Anthony Dwyer, operated the Murrimbum Cheese Factory and spilt the property between his two daughters Doreen and May.

May married Robert (Bob) Munro (of Adelaide) and when the couple wanted to return to the country with their young family, Bob built a home on May's piece of Murrimbum land.

This home was on a small hill, west from the site of Snuggery Village.

"The first time I remember seeing the written word Snuggery was at the Snuggery Railway Siding as it was written in large letters on the siding."

A hint as to the origin of the name Snuggery appears in The Border Watch in 1940 where Miss Caroline Glen (descendant of George Glen who had operated Mayura Station) wrote: 'The Snuggery got its name from a hut there erected by the late Mr William Vansittart, who was a partner in the [Mayura] station. He made the hut so snug and comfortable that it gave the name to that part of the run. The hut was afterwards burnt down but the name was retained.'

"The Snuggery siding was situated just off the main road to Mt Gambier on the righthand side, just inside the fence where Apcel (Kimberly-Clark Australia) is today.

"I remember we used to walk down the road from home to catch the train to go to Mt Gambier to the football at Vansittart Park or the pictures at the Odeon Theatre.

"When the Cellulose Mill at Snuggery expanded its workforce in 1946, they built houses to accommodate their workers and their families near the mill.

"They were called the Cellulose Houses and became known as the Snuggery Village.

"The village had two main streets with streetlights and electricity for the homes." [Ed: The first tenant to move into the village in 1946 was John Morris. Altogether, 17 houses were erected and during the 26 years of the village's existence, 86 different families lived there.]

"There was a Cellulose paddock between the Village and our house, where Cellulose built a cricket pitch; there was also a scout hall.

"In 1950 my dad, Bob Munro, decided to build a shop to cater for the needs of the village.

"It was built on our land in front of our home close to the main road.

"It was named 'Munro's Cash Store.'

"He organised a petition to establish a Post Office as well.

"The Post Office facility was opened within the store as a separate identity on 5th February 1951.

"Dad managed the shop and post office

"I remember my brother Jim nicking the raspberry smiles out of the big sunshine biscuit tins.

"Some things had to be sliced such as cheese and bacon.

"Kerosene had to be bottled from a big drum.

"Children would come from the village for three pence worth of lollies from the lolly counter.

"There were lots of foreigners living in the Cellulose huts located at the mill that could not speak English."

Mrs Ferguson told the South Eastern Times that her father developed a grid reference of names which the new Australians would call an item stocked at the shop, linked with the English name for the item, so that the customer could point to the word that they understood and Pauline could follow it to the English word so that she knew what her customers were asking for. She said the grid reference was in various languages to match the residents whom came from a variety of countries including, Poland, Holland, Germany, Italy and France.

"The post office also kept me busy as mail had to be sorted when brought out by Jim Atwell and mail to be sent had to be sealed in the bag to go back on time.

"I had to do wireless licenses, child endowment, accept telegrams and deliver them.

"In the late 1960's, the Snuggery Village residents started to move into Millicent and business began to fall off.

"Cellulose started to demolish some of the houses and the shop was not needed so much. "The post office was still needed, and after the shop closed Ailsa and Don Salmon managed it from their own home.

until my oldest sister Judith left school."

Bob Munro was employed as a maintenance fitter at Ceullose, later he became the mill's fire officer and provided saw doctoring services.

"That worked well until Judy developed a rare eye condition and had to receive regular specialist eye treatment in Adelaide.

"It was then that I left school, at the age of 14 years, to manage the shop and post office."

School children went to school in Millicent on the Cellulose bus locally known as 'The Green Dragon' as it was long and painted green.

"A public phone was on the porch of the shop.

"The shop kept me busy as a lot of things had to be weighed, such as biscuits as they came in large tins, loose and sold by the pound. "Jenny Butcher took over from them. "It was finally closed in 1970."

When the village was disbanded, some of the homes were demolished, some were transferred to other sites. The last to occupy a home at Snuggery was Dennis Chapman in 1972.

A Back to Snuggery weekend was held in April 1986, 40 years after the village was first established.

The organising committee for that event comprised of former residents including President Arthur Phillips, Vice President Phyl Whelan (nee Chapman), Secretary Val Stark and committee members Arvan Carthew (nee Chapman), Val Redden, Ian Chapman, Carmel Chapman, Bob Munro, Doug Sutcliffe, Greg Waites and Pauline Ferguson.

Ford Escape E

The Ford Escape SUV plug-in hybrid is the first Ford vehicle to be sold in Australia with any form of electrification.

Ford has worked hard to reduce future vehicle emissions in many ways.

Among these will be the addition of electric power to all models, in the form of as well as standard and plug-in petrol/electric hybrids as well as pure electric EVs.

The Escape PHEV comes only in the ST-Line spec level, priced at \$53,440 plus on-road

costs. The petrol-only ST-Line sells for \$38,490

The Ford Escape has a sensible shape that looks attractive without losing interior and luggage space by having a semi-coupe shape at the rear.

This makes it relatively unusual in this class.

The front is big and bold with a large grille and headlights that run almost halfway to the windscreen.

The lower edge of the window line sloops up to meet the down sloop of the upper edge.

The seats on our test Escape ST-Line were in a soft looking black colour with red stitching that gives a real upmarket feeling.

Versatility is good as the second row of seats can be moved forwards or backwards to juggle between legroom and boot space.

Wireless charging is standard in all Escapes, so compatible devices are ready to go

at all times.

The advanced 10-speaker, 575-watt setup has been specifically developed and finetuned for the Escape ST-Line Plug-In Hybrid and Escape Vignale by specialist B&O sound engineers.

A powerful set up lets you hear music as it's meant to be heard.

We certainly enjoyed this during our 447-kilometre week in the Escape Plug-In Hybrid.

However, there's the common problem of loss of signal on the radio when the landscape and buildings get between you and a direct signal.

Escape PHEV is powered by a 2.5-litre naturally-aspirated 165 kW petrol engine driving through what Ford calls an eCVT automatic.
