## Call for funding

### **By Charlotte Varcoe**

The State Government has missed the mark on mobile blackspot funding and more specific road spending, according to Member for MacKillop Nick McBride.

Following the release of the State Government's 2022-2023 budget last week, Mr Mc-Bride said it did not address issues such as mobile-phone blackspots or roads like previous budgets and focused heavily on health.

The MacKillop electorate received \$8m

over four years for the Naracoorte Hospital, \$750,000 for the first half of 2023 for the Keith and District Hospital with a further \$1.5m per annum from 2023-2024 to 2025-2026, and a new 12-hour regional ambulance crew based at Keith.

A further \$6.6m will be allocated over two years from 2022-2023 to complete intersection upgrades at the Teys Australia Abattoir and QUBE Logistics Depot, both near Naracoorte.

Mr McBride said the Naracoorte-specific intersection funding was a continuation of the previous Government's commitment for the an emergency there is an issue." township.

"This announcement is part of the rollout from the previous Government and the turnoff lane was part of our project but I am happy to see the current State Government continue that," Mr McBride said.

"I do think the community may be a little frustrated in the sense that the budget doesn't talk about roads as clearly as they need to nor (mobile phone) blackspots at this stage because I believe if you cannot communicate in

He said it would be interesting for the community to find out if further road upgrades may come to the region as a part of the statewide funding agreement.

Compared to last year's budget I think this one is really specific to health but that does not address other issues such as the (mobile phone) blackspots and roads and there is little emphasis on education and bringing school teachers into the regions," he said.

### Thanks to troops

With no new Covid-19 cases among its residents in the last week, and staff returning following a swathe of Covid cases throughout the Millicent community, Boneham Aged Care Services (BACS) is grateful to the Australian Defence Force (ADF) which has assisted the facility and the efforts of remaining staff.

Over the last three weeks, BACS has battled and contained an outbreak of cases among its residents to a total of nine, while staff numbers. have been constantly eroded with a total of 70 staff absent at some time during the period with Covid or as a close contact of a Covid case - representing half the facility's workforce.

While the remaining staff put in an extraordinary effort to cover the shifts of their absent co-workers, they were assisted by ADF personnel who came to Millicent to help BACS through its Covid induced rough patch.

A total of 11 ADF personnel in three teams over the three week period assisted at BACS.

The first team was a general duties team of five, which was followed by a three member clinical team of navy personnel followed by a final clinical team of three army nurses from Adelaide.

The final team finished their last shift on Sunday, heralding the beginning of BACS returning to as normal as possible in the current Covid environment.

Chief Executive Officer of BACS, Michael Filsell was appreciative of the ADF's assis-

"They were a wonderful addition to our staff; they supported our residents and our staff and lifted morale during their stay," Mr Filsell said.

The residents responded positively to their presence; its something they don't see every day.

Mr Filsell also praised the efforts of staff who had stepped up to the challenge and worked on a 12 hour shift roster.

"Staff have been fantastic," Mr Filsell said also thanking residents and the family of residents for their support through this period.

"We have an amazing group of workers; they always put their hand up and I am constantly reiterating to the board and others how lucky we are to have a staff cohort like we

Mr Filsell said the efforts of staff and the organisational measures put in place had helped to ensure the number of Covid cases among its residents was limited to single numbers in a situation where Covid had swept through the Millicent community and affected many businesses in the area with staff shortages common.

However, he said the facility would remain vigilant, PCR testing would continue on an as needs basis and some requirements would remain in place including all visitors must have a RAT test beforehand and must be up to date with their Covid vaccinations and have had a 2022 flu jab. Masks must be worn and visits will be limited to the resident's room and not be allowed in common areas.

### Cemetery expansion nearly complete

After two years of work, expansion of Millicent's Lawn Cemetery is nearing completion and is expected to allow for the next 50 years of burials.

The \$50,000 project by Wattle Range Council has allowed for a new irrigated lawned area, extra marked sealed carparks between the existing and new section, and a ringed bitumen road around the new area with an exit road leading to the existing sealed cemetery car-

Work also includes the creation of a secondary unsealed large parking area near the cemetery's toilets.

The new lawned expansion area is on the southwesterly side of the cemetery, towards Vorwerk Road, and the works involved the removal of several rows of blue gums and a significant amount of rubble to level the area.

Council's Director of Engineering Services, Peter Halton said some of the trees were used as part of the nature play development in Millicent's Domain area.

"The material (rubble) removed was good gravel which has been used for resheeting Canunda Frontage Road," Mr Halton said.

"So it's a win win situation.

"The works also involved the sealing of some of the internal roadway and creation of some parking adjacent to the new area which is felt important improvements for those visiting the site.'

A small amount of the rubble has been left in the cemetery area for possible future works there, and the creation of a flattened unsealed area near the cemetery toilets immediately adjacent the new area is hoped to be used as a carpark in preference to parking on Mount Gambier Road.

"As the current sealed carpark isn't big enough for some of the larger funerals, it is anticipated with the development of this addi-

tional area people will be able to park on-site which is much safer than parking on Mount Gambier Road; additional signage will be installed to encourage this use," Mr Halton said.

The unsealed area would also provide for future expansion of the cemetery after the new area is filled.

Mr Halton said the plan currently is for the new area to be fully completed in early 2023; a new concrete beam is still to be installed, on which the cemetery plaques can be placed, and a gabion stone wall installed on the exit ramp of the new area.

"At this time it is anticipated the area will be needed noting burials are staggered across the site to prevent cave-ins."

### Recalling Queen's visit

"We could almost have touched it [the Royals' vehicle] as it came through the gate, we were so close," said Millicent resident Marlene Fennell, with vivid memories of Queen Elizabeth II when she visited the South East in 1954.

It was just two years after she ascended the throne and 68 years later the Queen is now celebrating 70 years, making her the longest reigning British monarch in history.

The Platinum Jubilee this year revives memories of the newly crowned Queen when Mount Gambier was part of her tour to Australia.

Ms Fennell was 11 years old at the time and she and her younger sister Carolyn Read were part of a large contingent of school children from around the South East, including from Millicent, to be part of a crowd said to be as large as 50,000 people who gathered in Mount Gambier to see the Queen.

"We were all so excited because this new young Queen of England had come to visit Australia; we all wanted to see the Duke as well because we thought he was handsome," said Ms Fennell.

The visit caused great excitement among the population as Queen Elizabeth II was the first reigning British monarch to visit Australia and preparations by the Millicent School, of which Ms Fennell was a student, began months before the monarch's tour to the region.

When the day arrived, students were uniformly dressed, all wearing white shirts and blue forage caps; the girls in red skirts and the boys in grey trousers.

Grade 1 and 2 students were dressed in white and were to form the word 'Welcome' alongside a large map of Australia outlined by the older students on the oval at Mount Gambier's Vansittart Park where the Queen was to later deliver a speech to the thousands of onlookers gathered there.

Ms Fennell said the school welfare club

members helped make the skirts for some parents with the material purchased in bulk, measured and cut for sewing with patterns supplied for the mums who could sew.

"It was the 26th of February and we all met up at the school where the Family History Group is now," Ms Fennell began with her memories of the day the Queen arrived.

"We walked down to the railway station [in

Millicent] when the train came in from Mount Gambier.

"It was an old steam train and they disconnected the engine to bring it around to tow the carriages back.

"As he [the train driver] was backing back it [the train] jumped the tracks.

"We had to wait for another engine to come all the way from Mount Gambier to Millicent

to draw the carriages back up.

"The kids kept running down to look at the engine and I remember the wheels in the dirt had sliced right in.

"The mothers were trying to get us back because we had white blouses on, they wanted to keep us clean."

For the young children it was a long wait but eventually a second engine arrived to pull the carriages out of the Millicent Station.

Arriving at the Mount Gambier Railway Station, the students left their bags at a nearby primary school and were marched to Vansittart Park where the large map of Australia was formed by students.

"The Millicent School had to stand in Queensland on the coastline north of Brisbane and while we were doing it [the formation] the Queen's plane flew over and around the Blue Lake.

"When they [Her Majesty and the Duke of Edinburgh] came in from the airport, she came through the top gate at Vansittart Park in a brown/green open Land Rover, we could almost have touched it as it came through the gate, we were so close."

"The overall spending sum for the Limestone Coast compared to last year is positive but the devil is in the detail."

Speaking on the funding for Naracoorte Hospital, Mr McBride welcomed the commitment but said further funding to entice doctors and general practitioners to the region was also needed.

"A large amount of the funding in the Limestone Coast has been spent on ambulances and paramedics which will be well received around our region as our volunteer system has been very thin on the ground," he said.

"But there's no point in having the Naracoorte Hospital upgraded if there are no doctors or general practitioners there."

In relation to the hospital upgrade, Mr McBride said a priority would be to update some of the hospital rooms as well as the colocated aged care sector.

"The hospital won't be expected to be finished until 2026 but it is a step in the right direction and is a good spend to upgrade a tired hospital, yet how much can be done with the amount of money and where it lands in the hospital we are not sure," Mr McBride said.

"We need more than this to bring the hospital into a modern facility rather than the tired facility it is now."

He said the Keith and District Hospital would remain as a private hospital as it had never had the funding to operate as a public hospital which would remain an issue.

However, Mr McBride said the funding sum of \$1.5m for a number of years after 2023 was better than the board and project officer's annual budget of between \$700,000 and \$900,000.

"We are hoping the funding allocated in the budget is for more services and medical practitioners than under previous Governments," he said.

### Novelist's book launched

From her hobby farm at Narrawong in Victoria, Maya Linnell returned to the region last week as part of her latest book launch tour for the fourth and final book in her debut series of novels published through Allen and Unwin.

Launching 'Paperbark Hill' at the Millicent Library, Ms Linnell was joined by long term friend and ABC Radio Presenter Rebekah Lowe, also formerly of Millicent, as they chatted about the book in front of an appreciative audience of about 90 guests.

Talking to The South Eastern Times before the event Ms Linnell explained the books are linked but stand-alone with each book telling the story of one of four sisters.

"If people pick up Paperbark Hill they glean little bits of information from previous books but it can be read alone and in any order, it doesn't matter at all," Ms Linnell said.

"Some people actually read them all again before the new book comes out which is amazing and they probably know the characters better than me."

Ms Linnell has strong connections with the region having been raised in Tantanoola and regularly visiting with family members who still live in the South East.

A former South Eastern Times journalist, Ms Linnell began her cadetship with the newspaper in 2002 crediting her background in regional journalism as great training and discipline for becoming a novelist.

"The transition was really good because I knew how to work with words, I had done the training and knew what was the unique angle of the story and what was the filler stuff that doesn't need to go in," she said.

"How to draw your reader in, you only have a short space of time to do that with the newspaper articles, you've got more time in your book but you still need to keep the reader's attention.

"I've felt so supported by the South East and having that connection from writing other people's stories to people now following the stories I'm writing on fictional characters.

"It's a perfect breeding ground for a novelist, to work for the local paper, you couldn't really ask for a better start."

Ms Linnell works from her home and structures her writing around the demands of fam-

ily, farm life and blogging responsibilities.

"Writing the first two novels I was very disciplined and then we had pretty well two years of lockdown in Victoria and the kids were being home schooled much of that time, that threw a spanner in the works for the writing of the next two books," she said.

"But I'm back in the structure now, it's getting use to making it the priority of the day.

"If you don't do the words you don't get to do the fun stuff like go out in the garden or go and make some biscuits.

"Sometimes when I'm finding it hard to focus I'll drive the car down the paddock and have no wifi, no phone, just the laptop and me and the sheep who come up to the car.

"It's amazing how productive just a bare paddock is, usually when I'm getting to the pointy end of the first draft is when I'll go into the paddock office."

Ms Linnell has already completed the first draft of her fifth book which is the start of a new series that follows a group of friends.

"It's fun and daunting to start a new series because you lose that familiarity and the characters you've worked with already, you don't know who's going to walk in the door," she said.

"Certainly a bit more difficult in some respects, but liberating in others."

The fifth book is already contracted to her publisher Allen and Unwin and they have indicated they are really happy with Ms Linnell becoming a book a year author for the top five publishing company.

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### Grant for wombats to move into new pen

Wildlife carer Narelle Marshall, from Duck-A-Roo Native Animal Sanctuary near Nora Creina, has recently become the beneficiary of a \$4,400 Community Bank Robe and Districts (CBR&D) grant to fund a wombat transition pen for young animals. The new pen is for young wombats who are not ready for a large enclosure already on site, but are becoming too big and boisterous for care within Ms Marshall's house.

Ms Marshall received support from her neighbours, Barry and Wendy Brain, who put pen to paper for the time poor wildlife carer and applied for the grant.

"The neighbours put forward what we were going to build and how much it would cost, lo and behold they (CBR&D) said 'we'll fund that'," said Ms Marshall.

"My neighbours have had quite a bit of experience with this sort of thing because they've worked with sanctuaries in Victoria and have seen the results, where I thought they'll never pick me, it's too hard." CBR&D's branch manager, Tracey Bainger, was pleased the bank was able to assist with the new pen.

"We appreciate the volunteer work Narelle does, I've used her personally when I've found sick or injured wildlife and she has been amazing; if she can't help she

points me to someone who can," said Ms Bainger.

"What Narelle does is selfless, it is invaluable what she provides the community.

"I'm sure the bank will have a long term relationship with her, we're quite lucky to

have someone like that." Ms Bainger explained the local bank gives 80 per cent of its profits to the community and has given out \$550,000 in sponsorship. "It's really nice to give back something to the animals and what Narelle does is quite unique to our area," she said.

"I imagine it's quite costly to feed the animals as well as the out of pocket expenses."

Ms Marshall has been caring for wildlife for almost 20 years and shared some of the challenges surrounding the work she does with day to day expenses being just one.

"Grain alone costs \$1300 every eight weeks and that is just one expense; there's milk supply, grains, puppy pads - I would use at least 10 a day," she said.

"The washing machine is constantly going, vet supplies, pouches, tissues, baby wipes, there's always something that you buy for them no matter what." The other challenge is housing the animals, which are not allowed to be released to the wild, with wombats being a long term commitment when they are young.

"I probably get at least a couple (of wombats) a year, some of those are passed on to other carers as I can't do it all myself," Ms Marshall said. "They are very time consuming, it's at least 18 months that they are with you, not like a kangaroo which is a lot shorter time. "You're really committed to a wombat."

### Approval to demolish servo

An application to demolish the 'card only' Ampol service station on Mount Gambier Road in Millicent has been approved. Permission to demolish the service station was granted on February 2 following an application lodged in January this year requesting the decommissioning and demolition of all buildings on 218 and 220 Mount Gambier Road, Millicent, which includes the petrol station. Ampol confirmed the plans earlier this year.

"Subject to approval of the development

application, the Ampol site at 220 Mount Gambier Road, Millicent, will undergo demolition and remediation works to prepare the land for sale," an Ampol spokesperson said in February

"Pending approval of the development application, the demolition will include the removal of all infrastructure, and the remediation works will address the contaminated soil.

"It is expected that the works will be completed in the next 12 months."

#### Obituary

When Ron Jones passed away earlier this year he left behind a legacy of a large and close family, and he will be fondly remembered by the wider community as a much loved former retail identity in Millicent.

From 1981 to 1997 Mr Jones owned and operated Millicent's menswear shop - then called Ron Jones Mensland - with his wife Marilyn but this was only part of his contribution to the area which was outlined by members of his family in a eulogy delivered at his funeral, graveside at the Millicent Cemetery on February 11.

Ronald David Jones was born at Mount Gambier on November 28, 1939, to Frank and Ella Jones, farmers of Tantanoola.

The family later grew to include Ron's sister, Kaye (now Bignell, of Beachport).

He attended Tantanoola Primary School and then Millicent High School.

Growing up on the family farm at Tantanoola, his love for sheep and cattle continued throughout his life, and he always had a dog, his last being Missie whom he loved dearly and is now Marilyn's companion.

Stories of rabbiting at Lake Bonney with his mates, and summers spent fishing at Beachport, filled his youth while his eulogy also recounted a story of his car being hit by a train when it stalled on the railway tracks at Burrungule, with Ron and a mate running down the track trying in vain to stop the train.

The wreck of that car still sits in his parents' paddock.

When Ron left high school, he began his working life as a farmhand, followed by driving trucks with his father, and later driving his own truck.

In 1965, Cellulose became his next workplace where he was a foreman, followed by a short stint as a sales representative for Cellulose Applied Chemicals after gaining his Diploma as an Analytical Chemist in 1973.

He worked as a storeman at SAFCOL after he left Cellulose in 1978 before purchasing Millicent's menswear shop in 1981 from Bob Plew.

During the 16 years operating Ron Jones Mensland, he was respected by many and often people would call into the shop just for a chat

He was well known for other activities including planting trees around the community for more than 30 years for which Ron was awarded Gold Membership to Trees for Life.


He was also a member of the Millicent Rotary Club for many years and was an injury trainer for junior players of the Tantanoola Football Club.

In his retirement he particularly loved fishing and spent a lot of time in his boat, with friends and family, fishing along the Glenelg River

But his greatest love was his family, first and foremost his wife of 61 years, Marilyn.

Marilyn (nee Heidenreich) came to the South East from Tanunda and nursed at the old Mount Gambier hospital.

On a night out with her nursing colleagues, Marilyn met Ron and his friend Trevor Bignell

Ron obviously won that competition and the couple were married in 1961, returning to Marilyn's hometown of Tanunda for the wedding. The couple began their life together at Tantanoola in June Cottage (which Ron had purchased from his grandfather, Dave Randall) where Marilyn still lives.

They had three children, Susie, David and Maryanne. There are seven grandchildren being Wayne, Andrew, Kirstie, Zac, Jami, Casey

and Chantelle, and ten great grandchildren being Jaycie, Lexi, Kenzie, Connor, Emily, Kailee, Myla, Eryn, Kiara and Ned.

Sadly, in his later years, Ron developed dementia and he passed away on February 1, aged 82.

# The history of Brennans

About 60 people recently heard former Wattle Range Council chief executive officer, Frank Brennan talk about his family's ancestry and his long association with the District Council of Millicent and Wattle Range Council.

Held at the Millicent Public Library, Mr Brennan's talk began with the migration to Australia by his Irish Great Great Grandfather, Thomas Brennan in 1855 at the age of 28.

It didn't take long for Mr Brennan's forebear to make his way to Millicent where he married Mary Kennedy in 1857 and had seven children.

This would be the start of five generations of the Brennan family living in Millicent.

One of those seven children, Mr Brennan's Great Grandfather, John Richard, lived in the family home on the corner of Aberle Street and Park Terrace with his wife Bridget and eight children.

Mr Brennan's lineage takes an interesting turn when his grandfather Frank married Veronica Shergool in 1935.

Veronica's father was an Afghan and former sergeant in His Majesty's 30th Regiment.

With Mr Brennan explaining Veronica's unusual surname: "My Nanna's surname on official documents is Shergool, being an amalgamation of her father's first name 'Sher' and surname 'Gool.'

"Sher was known by the nickname 'George', no-one called him Sher."

After emigrating to Australia Mr Brennan's maternal great grandfather, 'George' Sher Gool, worked as a cameleer for the South Australian Government Geologist before dying from typhoid fever in 1909.

Mr Brennans' grandmother Veronica had also contracted typhoid fever at the same time but survived to marry and have three children of her own, one of which was Mr Brennan's father Francis.

Mr Brennan's parents Francis and Maureen married and had four children, and moved to Callendale when he was two years old.

He attended Lucindale Area School until Year 8 and moved to Sacred Heart College as a boarder from 1971-1974.

It was his Uncle Don McDonnell, Mayor of the City of Mount Gambier (1983-2002), who advised him there was a career in local government and encouraged Mr Brennan to study for a Diploma in Town Planning, graduating in 1978.

The diploma led to a three month position surveying road and stormwater design with the District Council of Millicent and soon after a fulltime position on the council's outside workforce as a construction and maintenance worker.

The work included general labouring, tractor driving, garbage truck runner and grave digging.

"I enjoyed the tractor driving and at the time we were bringing up the Millicent aerodrome for seal as it used to be a dirt strip," Mr Brennan said

"The late Pat Kennedy from Glencoe was there and he said to me while we were having smoko - do you want to learn how to drive a grader?"

The young Mr Brennan jumped at the opportunity and Mr Kennedy said he'd give him a few lessons after smoko and see how things go.

The grader proved different to modern machines: "It had hydraulic levers all over the place and the accelerator was a de-accelerator.

"I jumped on it and he (Mr Kennedy) was sitting in the cabin with me, he said - do this, do that, shift the blades.

"We had gone about 300 yards and he said - just pull up and stop here."

Asking what to do next Mr Kennedy replied: "Get off, you'll never be a grader driver."

This did nothing to hinder Mr Brennan's 34 year long career with both the District Council of Millicent and the Wattle Range Council which included 25 years as Chief Executive Officer

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


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### **Building more life skills**

Owners of the Joanna Life Skills Centre, Rob and Carol Canala-Coleman, have worked tirelessly over the past few years to renovate and prepare the facility to be able to provide care and support to disability and mental health participants.

"When we purchased the property it was very run down and had been vacant for two years," said Ms Canala-Coleman.

"It's been a slow progress renovating each of the houses.

"Most of the plumbing and electrical work on each house had to be replaced.

"Apart from from when we required specialist people in to help, we have done the

"We have self funded the massive project and are very proud of what we have achieved

The Centre, situated north east of Penola on 101 acres of beautiful tranquil landscapes with scattered trees, native birds, animals and a homely atmosphere, is the perfect place for those needing some peace and quiet and time to help with their individual issues.

"I first worked at the Glenside Psychiatric Hospital in Adelaide as a cleaner in 1984 and when I saw how vulnerable people were I knew I had to choose mental health as my career," Ms Canala-Coleman said.

"I started my nursing studies at Uni SA in 1991 however, after two years, had to put it on hold due to family commitments and returned to complete my Bachelor of Nursing in 2005 at Flinders Hospital and then went on to complete a post graduate in mental health at Flinders in 2008," she said.

In mid 2008 Carol opened a boarding house for vulnerable people and experienced the positive effects the environment, along with support, has on a person's overall health and wellbeing.

Carol has worked extensively with complex clients and has seen many cases of people affected by mental illness and drug and alcohol

"Much of that experience came from working with great staff at Western Community Mental Health in the Mobile Assertive Care Team which provided intensive care to very complex clients, completing assessments, checking client's mental state, attending medical and psychiatric appointments, administering injections and medication, liaising with

housing, public trustee, guardianship, and many other supports to ensure people were cared for.

The couple came across the property at Joanna through a friend and knew immediately that this is where they needed to relocate.

We purchased the property in 2017 and it was the perfect size and in a perfect location," Ms Canala-Coleman said.

"The property is far enough away from anywhere but also close enough if need be."

The facility can accommodate 22 participants with 25 single and share rooms across multiple dwellings as well as a commercial kitchen, hall, tennis court, oval, and recreation room with a large television, games, books and other activities.

"We even have a pamper room," she said.

The couple would also like to establish programs including literacy, buddying and mentoring and any offers would be most welcome.

"The relaxed environment is the ideal place for people to participate in skill building activities, which promote personal resilience,

self confidence, self esteem and enable people to enjoy an increased level of functioning," she

The centre is also a registered NDIS provider and offers 24/7 support to disability and mental health participants. Respite, medium term, SIL (Supported Independent Living) accommodation and day activities are available.

The fee structure is based on the NDIS price guide. Individual assessment is made for

Referrals to the Centre can be made by health professionals, support workers, family, friends or by self-referral.

"Some people may come to the Centre to get their lives back on track," Ms Canala-Coleman said.

"It's about choice and wanting change and it is our aim to help participants become more independent and able to live their best life.

"It is our aim to help participants be able to function better, build their independence and skills, self esteem and confidence.

"However, clients must want to be here and

must be able to help themselves.

"If they don't want to help themselves we can't help them.

"It is very rewarding to see the improvement of participants while they are here and hopefully they will move forward in their journey of life.'

The Penola Pennant spoke to three participants and they said how they felt extremely safe and relaxed at the Centre.

They said there is a lot to do both indoors and outdoors and that they just take one step

The Centre would welcome any community support.

"We would love to form an advisory committee of local people," Ms Canala-Coleman

"Local people are the ones who are going through the heartache of watching family members suffer the effects of disability, mental illness, drug and alcohol problems.

"Our motto has always been 'Together we

### When the Queen visited

With Queen Elizabeth II presently celebrating her Platinum Jubilee it is timely to remember that just two years after her accession to the British throne she became the first and only reigning British monarch ever to visit Australia and she included the South East on that tour.

At the end of February 1954, Her Majesty and The Duke flew into Mount Gambier making it the couple's first stop in South Australia.

The Royal Couple's route down Bay Road and Commercial Street was lined with thousands of people and more gathered at Vansittart Park, where the Queen made a speech.

She also planted a tree - one of only three

planted during her visit to Australia - in The Lakes area.

Despite her stay lasting only two hours, such was the Queen's popularity the crowd was said to be up to 50,000 people, the largest ever to gather in Mount Gambier.

The South Eastern Times and Penola Pennant of the day reported on the event, filling their front pages with news and photographs reflecting the magnitude of the event to their respective communities.

The Penola Pennant reported that Penola became a "ghost town" as people left the town to go to the event, while hundreds of cars passed through the town also on their way to the event for 24 hours prior to the event as people jostled for a good vantage point to see the Queen.

Each town was provided an area along the Royal route to gather for the event.

These areas were called Strong Posts.

Penola's strong post was reported as being decorated with ivy and hydrangeas, while Millicent Council Staff had arrived early in the morning to set up Millicent's strong post with flags and a banner, and people viewed the procession from the flat beds of trucks.

Other town strong posts included those for Tantanoola, Mount Burr, Beachport and Robe.

Special invitations to be presented to The

Queen and The Duke were made to local council representatives including Penola Council's chairman and his wife, Mr and Mrs RR Rymill, and Millicent Council chairman and his wife, Mr and Mrs JA Sullivan.

The Millicent Caledonian Pipe Band was also part of the proceedings as were members of the Penola Coonawarra RSL.

The two front pages of the Penola Pennant and The South Eastern Times from that time are reprinted here.

### The long ride Defender

After a gap of nearly six years, Land Rover has returned the long-wheelbase 130 version to the Defender range alongside the shorter 110 and 90 models

As has been the long-standing tradition the numbers refer to the vehicles' approximate wheelbase lengths in inches.

At just under 5.4 metres in length the 130 is an eight-seater in 2-3-3 format with the second and third rows raised slightly above each other.

This together with large windows and twin

sunroofs contribute to an airy interior and excellent visibility.

There are a number of exterior and interior design enhancements as well as a new colour palette specific to the 130.

These, together with the standard Bright Pack and optional Extended Bright Pack provide a variety of styling enhancements.

Two powertrains are available, both 3.0-litre six-cylinder Ingenium mild-hybrids.

The P400 petrol generates 294 kW and 550 Nm while the D300 diesel has outputs of 221 kW and 650 Nm.

Power is transferred through an eight-

speed ZF transmission with Land Rover's Intelligent All-Wheel Drive (iAWD) system.

Off-road it uses Rover's Terrain Response system, which allows the driver to adjust to any terrain via an 11.4-inch the Pivi Pro infotainment touchscreen.

An Electronic Air Suspension system, controlled via a switch panel inside the tailgate, allows for up to 430 mm of articulation, with 71.5 mm of additional lift at the front (73.5 mm at the rear) and a maximum fording depth of 900 mm. Ground clearance is 290 mm

Towing capacity is 3000 kg.

Storage space ranges from 389 litres with all seatbacks in place, expanding to 1232 litres with the third-row folded and 2291 when both rear seat rows are down.

Family buyers will be assured of maximum safety for the kids with five Isofix child-seat anchors including one in the front passenger seat.

New Defender 130 will come in SE trim only with the D300 priced at \$124,150 and the P400 at \$131,650, both plus on-road costs.

Delivery is expected from August 1, 2022. Standard warranty is five years, unlimited kilometres with five-year roadside assistance.

### Swedish carmaker offers Volvo XC90 in four grades

The XC90 is the largest of Volvo's three SUVs.

There are four grades: Momentum, Inscription, R-Design and the Recharge plugin hybrid.

The current model dates back to 2015, while Volvo has been upgrading the tech and gradually replacing the original powertrains with hybrid or plug-in hybrid setups.

One of the car's defining features is the large, vertically mounted tablet-style infotainment touchscreen from which the driver is able to control most of the functions of the vehicle.

Being a Volvo, safety and more recently reduced engine emissions are a given and receive a high priority as you work your way through the list of equipment.

Distinctive styling sets the XC apart from competitors.

The lines are clean and sharp, with lights that are unlike anything else on the road.

Prices start from \$86,990 plus on-roads for the B5 Momentum, \$96,990 for B5 Inscription, \$98,990 for the B6 R-Design, and

\$116,990 for the Recharge Plug-in Hybrid.
Our R-Design test vehicle was also fitted with a number of accessories including the Advanced Air Cleaner (\$500), Climate Pack (\$700), Metallic paint (\$2000), Perforated/Ventilated Nappa Leather Accented Seats (\$3100), Air Suspension with Four-C Active Chassis (\$3600) and Lifestyle Pack (\$6650).

This brings the total price of the car to \$117,040 plus on-roads.

The Climate Pack adds headlight cleaners, heated rear seat and a heated steering wheel, while the Lifestyle Pack comprises tinted rear

windows, panoramic sunroof and the Bowers and Wilkins Premium Sound System.

Standard kit includes Nappa leather, metal mesh inlays, four-zone climate air, and power adjust heated driver and front passenger seats.

It has 22-inch double-spoke alloys, with automatic lights and wipers, auto-dimming rear view mirror, reverse parking with front and rear sensors, active cruise control, LED lights with automatic high/low beam, head-up display, road sign recognition, power tailgate, satellite navigation, wireless phone charging and road sign speed limit recognition.

The piece-de-resistance is the Bowers & Wilkins system, with 1400 watts and 15 speakers, including a really cool dashmounted centre tweeter.

Four room modes including 'Concert hall' and 'Jazz club' allow you to recreate the acoustics of a specific room inside the car.

Rounding out the infotainment is a 9.0-

inch vertical touch screen, smart phone integration with wi-fi hotspot, DAB+ digital radio, Bluetooth with audio streaming, in-car web apps, audio controls in steering wheel and navigation with voice control.

The mild hybrid has a 2.0-litre turbo-petrol engine, with support from an electric motor.

It produces 220kW of power and a useful 420Nm of torque, the latter between 2100 and 4800 rpm.

The all-wheel drive system is a part-timer, with drive available to all four wheels on demand via an eight-speed automatic.

Stop-start saves fuel when the vehicle comes to a stop.

Volvo XC90 scores a five-star safety rating, with seven airbags, autonomous emergency braking, lane support systems and speed assist systems.

There's a rear-view camera, excellent overhead camera, front and rear park sensors, built-in rear child booster seats, along with blind spot monitoring, forward collision warning, lane departure warning and lane keep assist.

The XC90 comes with the same powertrain options as the smaller XC60.

The XC90 weighs in at 2090kg, another 204kg more than the smaller SUV.

Throw in more passengers, remembering that XC90 is a seven-seater -- and all that extra weight could put a serious dent in the larger SUV's performance.

With a 71-litre tank, claimed fuel consumption is 8.2L/100km and it produces 186g of carbon per kilometre, and it takes 95 or 98 RON unleaded.

The electric motor provides boost for the petrol engine off the mark, but does not

power the wheels directly.

Volvo calls it the E-charger and it is designed to compensate for the lag normally associated with turbocharged engines (the time it takes for the turbo to spool up).

The air suspension can alter ground clearance from 212 to 252 mm and for the most part works automatically.

As a place to spend time the cabin is quiet and comfy, with leather, climate air, metal mesh aluminium decor and an impressive sound system (worth the extra outlay).

There's plenty of leg, head and shoulder room, with a high-tech, configurable instrument cluster and large, easy to use touchscreen that controls pretty much everything.

The three second row seats adjust individually as well as sliding forward and aft as required, with an integrated child centre booster seat.

The two seats in the third row cater for passengers up to 170cm in height.

On a down note, this model misses out on the latest Google operating system that can be found in XC40 and XC60.

Servicing is every 15,000km or 12 months and two pre-paid service plans are available: three years/45,000km for \$1500 or five years/75,000km for \$2500.

The Volvo XC90 is a likeable car, with plenty of features and prestige.

The safety story is a strong one and Volvo is taking climate change very seriously.

It's reflected in its engine choices, with a target to fully electrify its fleet by 2030, with EVs earmarked to account for 50 per cent of sales by 2025.
