Office blow-out

The estimated cost of Wattle Range Council's proposed new office building has increased by almost 70 per cent from its original targeted price and is set to become a highly political issue with local government elections due later this year.

With an original target of \$5.5m, a report presented to council by chief executive Ben Gower on Tuesday night advised council that the cost of the new administration office was now estimated at \$9.2m.

The report prompted Council to decide on Tuesday night to progress the project by authorising architects of the building, Chapman Herbert, to proceed to the detailed documentation phase which would provide sufficient information for the project to go to tender among builders.

At one point in the design process, the estimate reached as high as \$11.4m which was revealed publicly for the first time in Mr Gower's report. This estimate, being more than double the original target of \$5.5m, caused the project revision with the new estimate being achieved through a reduction in the size of the building by about 10 per cent to just under 1600 square metres, while some architectural elements of the build were also removed.

Despite this, no money has been allocated for the project in the current draft 2022/23 council budget, which is out for public consultation now.

With council elections to be held in November, the project's future will be in the hands of a newly elected council.

'Given that Local Government elections will be held later this year, any decision to tender for and award a contract to build the Council Service Centre will need to be made by the new Council in 2023," said the report from Mr Gower.

Mayor Des Noll has defended the cost of the proposed new administration building telling The South Eastern Times that a new office is required.

"As a community, we all have a responsibility to ensure that the staff that serve us have a workplace facility that is safe and fit for purpose," Mr Noll said.

"Currently this situation does not exist. "A 90-vear-old schoolhouse built in the 1930's does not provide this.

"The current Council office is not fit for purpose.

"Employees are now spread over three

separate and worn-out offices within our community - this is unproductive and inefficient

"It is no longer acceptable to expect professional employees to be asked to work in such conditions."

Rates to increase after deliberation

Wattle Range Council elected members delayed approval of its \$31m draft annual business plan and budget last week because they didn't have the opportunity to read it before the meeting.

The minutes of the meeting state that Mayor Des Noll, with the approval of two-thirds of the members present, suspended meeting procedures for 90 minutes to informally discuss the draft budget due to the elected members "not having had the opportunity to view the report prior to the meeting".

Following the informal discussions, council decided to raise an additional 5.36 per cent in rate revenue next financial year according to its draft budget.

The draft budget indicates that .26 per cent of the increase in rate revenue consists of new rateable properties as a result of developments such as new homes and sub-divisions.

Despite the increase in rate revenue to \$20.44m, council plans an operating deficit of

more than \$3m for 2022/23.

"The 2022/23 draft annual business plan and budget as presented forecasts a net operating deficit of \$3.151m based on operating income of \$28.246M and operating expenditure of \$31.397m, including \$6.341m in depreciation," according to the council report.

The report also states: "Council is proposing to increase general rates by 5.1 per cent plus growth (0.26 per cent) from 24 new rateable assessments.

"The increase is in line with current Consumer Price Index (CPI) amount, and given these inflationary pressures the proposed revenue increase keeps pace

with the majority of proposed expenditure increases."

Council said it will continue a number of initiatives that were implemented as part of its response to the Covid-19 emergency including; "the provision for further employment opportunities to our community ..., focus on generating economic stimulus to the greater community through major infrastructure projects, provide an allocation of \$100,000 to enable community groups an opportunity to access these funds for major infrastructure projects."

Rural, commercial and industrial properties will pay a lower rate-in-the-dollar than residential properties, with primary production paying 67 per cent and commercial and industrial 92 per cent of the residential rate.

According to council, property values have increased more than 22 per cent in the past 12 months.

Council has released the draft budget for public consultation and members of the public have until Friday, July 1 to provide written comment and a public meeting will be held at the Millicent Civic and Arts Centre supper room on July 5 where verbal submissions can be made.

Premier indicates support for KCA plans

During a tour of Kimberly-Clark Australia (KCA) Millicent Mill last Thursday Premier Peter Malinauskas was shown how investment in technology is improving productivity at the site.

Speaking to the South Eastern Times following the tour Premier Malinauskas was asked about the importance of KCA to the economy.

"Obviously it is a major employer here within the Limestone Coast but more than that it is a significant contributor to the supply chain both for consumers and also for people who produce goods that KCA require," Mr Malinauskas.

"This is a good employer, they pay good wages, they make a very significant economic contribution to the region and to the State.

"It's a demonstration how investment in technology can improve labour productivity which benefits the economy at large." During the tour mill manager Adam Carpenter briefed the Premier on the proposal to build a new \$70m hydrogen plant at the Millicent site in partnership with Adelaide based diversified renewable energy company entX (formerly known as PhosEnergy).

"The visit by the Premier and Deputy Premier gave us a great opportunity to share with them our current operations, challenges and our future vision for sustainability," Mr Carpenter said.

"These were very well received by the Premier and his team and we will continue to work with them on how government can support our Millicent Mill operations into the future."

Premier Malinauskas responded positively to the briefing saying: "What KCA understand, is what the government knows and that is that hydrogen represents a massive opportunity for industrialisation in our state.

"We've got a \$596 million dollar commitment that we are making to hydrogen opportunity in South Australia and we will actively pursue opportunities with the private sector to help facilitate their investments.

"We applaud them on their examination of how hydrogen can help fuel growth at this site, and reduce costs for the business and also make a positive contribution to the environment.

"It's the exact sort of innovation that our investment is trying to spur on."

KCA uses about 5.5 terajoules of energy daily and annually this is around two thirds of the South East's total gas consumption.

This consumption makes KCA one of the three largest energy consumers in South Australia.

Reducing this reliance on natural gas through the proposed hydrogen plant would initially see the mill reduce its consumption by 10 per cent and assist their aim to achieve a carbon neutral status by 2030.

Massive museum boost

A \$520,000 allocation in Wattle Range Council's draft 2022/23 budget has volunteers at the Millicent Museum planning for an exciting upgrade for the award winning attraction.

Released for public comment last week, the draft budget includes \$520,000 for the "renewal or replacement of transportable buildings at the rear of the Millicent Museum".

Chairman of the Millicent National Trust, Barry Long welcomed the impending council expenditure and showed The South Eastern Times around the buildings earmarked for replacement which had been inspected by council officers about two years ago and found not worth fixing.

"It's like a tent," Mr Long said pointing to the ridge of the roof of the timber framed buildings which are owned by council but used by the museum to store some of its extensive through-the-ages clothing collection while another part is used as a workshop for rejuvenating machinery for display including its extensive array of horse drawn vehicles which is believed to be the largest public display of its kind in the southern hemisphere.

Obvious dips in the ridgeline are a hint to a bigger problem under the buildings with the timber stumped foundations rotting away and the floor uneven as a result. The buildings were erected in 1952 as additional classrooms for the former Millicent Primary School.

"These timber buildings were never meant to be permanent," Mr Long said. While the Millicent National Trust members had not yet had an opportunity to meet to discuss the council's plans, informal discussions had already ignited exciting possibilities.

"This could help us to apply for dollar for dollar grants which could allow us to do even more," Mr Long said adding that it may enable the museum to expand its display areas while enhancing its storage and workshop areas.

"We could look at building something that is purpose built; a storage area, airconditioned and lined, and vermin proof, for the clothing collection; and double the size of the workshop.

"That would allow us to get more organised with a proper workshop area, a painting room, and a tool shed.

"This would make these areas more accessible to visitors to show people what we are doing in the workshop."

Mr Long said it would also provide an opportunity for the electrical system to the buildings to be upgraded.

"Weld in here now and the lights dip and flicker," he said.

"We're very grateful and think it is a wonderful opportunity to expand and make the museum even better than it is."

Mr Noll said the timing to build the new council office was ideal.

"There has never been a better time to build them a fit for purpose service administration centre," Mr Noll said.

"Our Council is in a sound financial position to deliver this project.

"Carrying very little debt, moderate cash reserves and the ability to borrow money at incredibly competitive rates.


"The project can be financed over a long term at low interest rates with a minimal impact on your council rates.

"Twenty-five years after amalgamation, it is now time for Wattle Range Council to have a functional, safe, and fit for purpose service centre so that staff that we employ can serve the entire community to the best of their ability."

Mr Noll said the \$9.2m estimated cost for the new council office may change.

"It is important to understand that Council is currently at the detailed design and development approval stage and it should be noted that the financial figures put to council are estimates," Mr Noll said.

"The actual cost to build the council service centre will not be known until council

determines to run a competitive tender process."

Mr Noll said that members of the public are invited to tour the current council office.

"I invite those community members who may wish to visit the current administration office on George Street for a tour of the site to contact the chief executive officer," he said.

According to the report tabled at council's meeting on Tuesday night from chief executive Ben Gower, council has 66 administra-

tive staff who are currently based in three locations which are planned to be amalgamated into the proposed new building.

The current offices include the main office at Millicent's George Street near the round-about, offices within the former Elec-Air building on Ridge Terrace, and council's engineering office on Davenport Street.

"Building rules specify that the current principal office can accommodate a maximum of 25 staff; it has significant structural

and maintenance issues; it has limited expansion options; and is no longer fit for purpose," said Mr Gower's report.

The proposed site for the planned new building is on parklands off North Terrace which were previously used by the former Millicent Netball Association and, while its courts have been removed, the association's clubrooms remain but would be demolished to make way for the new council building if it proceeds.

Council's cost pressures

Wages, increases in waste management and government placing more responsibilities on local government are some of the reasons ratepayers will face an increase in rates of more than five per cent next financial year, according to Wattle Range Council.

In its draft business plan and budget document, council states that inflation - the Consumer Price Index (CPI) - was 5.1 per cent for the March quarter and the Local Government Price Index was 4.5 per cent for the same period.

Other pressures pointed at the rates increase of 5.4 per cent include an increase of costs over and above CPI such as electricity and fuel, and the increase in the compulsory superannuation guarantee payments to employees from 10 to 10.5 percent. Council employees are also expected to receive a five per cent pay rise according to the council draft budget.

The draft budget also highlights a lack of funding provided to the Coastal Protection Board to assist with protection/rehabilitation of coastal assets and townships.

Council claims waste management costs are also set to increase by CPI after years of increases beyond CPI.

"In previous years the largest driver of the increase is the Solid Waste Levy (a levy imposed on the disposal of waste) which has had significant escalations in past years of 40 per cent in 2019/20, 15 percent in 2018/19, and 20 per

cent in 2017/18," according to the draft budget. According to the draft budget the "ongoing

impact from State Government cost shifting" has placed extra cost pressures on council.

"In changes to the Local Government Act 1999, there is a new requirement for councils to have the Essential Services Commission of SA (ESCOSA) review their Long Term Financial and Asset Management Plans, in order to provide commentary in respect to council's long term financial sustainability," the document states. "The charge [by the State Government] for this review is \$52,000."

In addition, in 2017/18 Housing SA's properties located within the Wattle Range

Council area were transferred in 2017/18 to Unity Housing (a private entity).This transfer resulted in a financial impact to ratepayers of \$96,000 annually, as Unity Housing was deemed eligible for a 75 percent mandatory rebate of rates. While a State Government tax, council is also required to collect a Landscape Levy from property owners.

"In 2016/17 ratepayers were significantly impacted by an increase of 213 percent in South-East Natural Resources Management Levy; in 2022/23 the now Regional Landscapes Levy is set to increase by 2.5 percent," according to the draft budget.

The draft budget document was released last week for public comment until early July.

Kimberly-Clark Australia (KCA) found itself in the firing line recently as social media internet sensation Granny Daffy, from the Central West of New South Wales, blasted the company's operators online, leading to the 94 year old visiting the company's Millicent Mill last week.


After purchasing two packs of 24 roll Kleenex toilet rolls and finding every single roll was missing its 'flap', Daphne Pearl, affectionately known as Granny Daffy, and her granddaughter Melissa started a campaign to 'bring back the flap'. In the video, which has had thousands of views and comments, Daffy explains the difficulties and pitfalls of not having a flap to easily find the start of each roll.

The campaign soon attracted the attention of KCA as the company was repeatedly tagged into the viral video. KCA Millicent Mill manager Adam Carpenter responded to the video personally, extending an invitation for Daffy to visit the site, assuring her there was no conspiracy to remove the handle or 'flap' and they were conducting an investigation as to why it had happened.

"We suddenly realised that we had found a consumer that had an issue with some of our toilet paper and we really wanted to engage with Daffy and Melissa and show them what we do," Mr Carpenter said.

"We make about 1.2 million rolls a day here, our quality inspection although very regular and thorough, it's impossible to check 1.2 million rolls."

Daffy and her granddaughter Melissa decided to take up KCA's offer and three weeks after making the initial video they began their journey to the Millicent Mill site. "When Kleenex



extended the invitation I said to nan it's totally up to you (if we go), she said let's do it but I can't go without you as I'm quite shy," Melissa said.

Assuring her nan, who hadn't flown for 25 years, that they would go together they drove to Canberra, caught two flights and made their way to the mill site where Daffy was welcomed for the day as official Granny Toilet Paper Tester. Daffy was impressed with the response from Kleenex and realised she'd never spent a moment wondering where her toilet paper comes from.

"I have never ever thought how toilet paper was made, it was just made that's all," she said.

With another Kleenex campaign on her mind Daffy asked if the big boss was around, finding out the managing director 'Mr Kleenex' is actually a woman, Daffy wanted to let her know: "Tell her we want flowers and butterflies on our toilet paper, bring that back too."

After a day touring the factory and exploring the site Melissa said: "We were shocked when we got a reply (from Kleenex) and think it's amazing. "There are a lot of companies out there who wouldn't do what Kleenex have done and given us the opportunity to come down and see how it happened."

Mr Carpenter agreed the opportunity was a good one: "There is the occasion where one or two rolls come through (without their flap), Daffy saw today what they check for and how that could possibly occur."

Impressed by the response from Kleenex, Melissa said: "Honestly, we've always been Kleenex supporters and will be forever and ever now."

Daffy and Melissa began the Daffy's Wise Words Facebook page in August last year and already has nearly 130,000 followers with one video nearing the 2m view mark, yet Daffy takes the viral videos in her stride.

"I'm dashed if I know why they watch me, I'm sick of all the overseas American trash like all the fake stuff, normal and truthful that's what people want," she said.

"I don't think about it I'm just Daffy, I just let it flow over, it's part of living."

After her whirlwind trip to the KCA Millicent Mill, Daffy did not think she would be going out for the next six months and said: "I'll go to bed early tonight."

Moves to purchase land

Wattle Range Council is progressing with its intention to purchase vacant land along Fifth Street in Millicent after a public consultation period ended recently with seven submissions received, many of them concerned at the potential for the land to be on sold for residential development.

Earlier this year, council decided to ask the associated State Government department to revoke the community classification over the land which would enable the council to purchase the land from the government.

This would enable the community facilities on the land including the Men's Shed, Road Safety School, Craft Group, service groups and Community Garden to be combined on one land parcel to enable the lease arrangements with these bodies to be managed without the complexity of having to go through a government process each time one of the groups wished to alter something on the land.

The move would also enable a currently vacant portion of the land to be potentially used for future residential development.

The latter was the focus of the majority of the submissions received from the public.

Tabled at the council meeting on Tuesday, the submissions from residents across the road from the vacant land wished for the land to remain vacant as it was used for recreational activities.

"The main reason we decided on this house was because there was vacant land across the road, so we still had the feel of living in town but without being closed in with neighbours on all sides," wrote Barb Rowland, a resident of Fifth Street, in her submission.

"I just don't see why this land needs to be residential ... surely there are other blocks of land for this purpose.

"This is a nice area and well used for people walking their dogs and kids riding their bikes,

playing cricket, footy etc."

Another Fifth Street resident, Chris Mathias supported council's moves in relation to the community groups area but wished the remaining vacant land to be retained as parkland.

"... it is currently used frequently by the surrounding residents, and others from further afield, for outdoor recreation," he wrote.

"The availability of this open parkland is one of the attractions in this part of the town, therefore it would be beneficial to retain at least some of this area as parkland." Mr Mathias wrote that there were other areas in the town that had been identified in the draft Wattle Range Strategic Land Use Plan for residential development.

"These include land surrounding the existing residential development around the high school, land near Teagle Excavations, and to the south of Fred Bolton Sports Park," he wrote.

"Ideally, these should be the priorities for residential development rather than popular and frequently used parklands.

"If residential development was to go

ahead, it would need to include a buffer zone between housing blocks and the north-west end of the Community Hub.

"Failure to include this would result in complaints about workshop noise from neighboring residences.

"A buffer zone of at least 30 metres, preferably more to leave some area of recreational parkland, would be necessary.

"If development was to be progressed, it would be best limited to the north-west of the Aberle Street road reserve ..."

Tony Glowacki, President of the Men's Shed, was in support of the consolidation of the Community Hub land but recommended that the vacant land be reserved, and possibly improved, as parkland.

"If residential development were to go ahead around the Aberle Street road reserve, the additional recreational parkland would be an attraction for potential home buyers in the vicinity," Mr Glowacki wrote.

"Primarily, we are concerned with any residential development close to the Men's Shed, as the northern end of the Community Hub contains workshops which run machinery during the day, creating an element of noise that may not be welcome in houses built close by."

"In future this land may still be needed as parkland," wrote another Fifth Street resident, Rosemary Millar.

"Why not put the land adjacent to the radio station to better use and clean it up; future residential expansion could occur (there)."

Council decided at its meeting on Tuesday to provide a copy of the submissions report to the Department for Environment and Water and advise the Department of council's continued commitment to purchasing the land at an agreed price of \$71,500.

The State Government first approached council to ascertain its interest in purchasing the land in 2020.

Discussions on erosion

Shoreline erosion was the topic of discussion at the Southend Community Club last week when Wattle Range Council (WRC) presented the findings of a Rivoli Bay Data Collection and Modelling Report to residents.

Prepared for WRC by coastal engineering specialists, Baird, the report's key focus was to reduce the rate of shoreline recession and increase beach widths along the foreshore east of the Lake Frome Outlet.

Fifteen interested community members attended the presentation given by WRC's Director Engineering Services Peter Halton with Mayor Des Noll and Manager Assets and Environment Lauren Oxlade in attendance.

"We got some positive feedback and lots of discussion around the multitude of solutions, both the benefits and consequences of every option," said Mr Halton.

Mr Halton told the South Eastern Times that concerns raised by community members at the session included the idea that the community had already accepted a retreat option and their immediate concerns were with storm damage rather than seasonal changes.

"The retreat option is council's adopted position, but based on feedback provided in the meeting not the community's," he said.

"We acknowledge the feedback for an investigation into the best ways to manage erosion relating to major storms."

He went on to explain the sand works undertaken last summer in front of the caravan park.

"This was purely emergency work funded by the Coastal Protection Board and council," he said.

"It was a soft engineering strategy, with the lowest impact; an interim sacrificial treatment which has protected the Southend Caravan Park."

Manager of the Southend Tourist Park, Claire Hubbard, said their highly prized sites at the beachfront caravan park are at constant risk of erosion from storms.

"The sand replenishment was an emergency, it was never going to last long and it meant we didn't lose our main beach-view sites," she said. "We recently went from such a long stretch of great weather and nothing much changed on this beach for 6-8 months, then we had one bad week and we lost the entire slope, one more bad week and we are nearly back to square one in the corner (of the caravan park).

"Everyone's noticed the storm damage since the sand replenishment; it's a lot more obvious what one week of really bad storm weather can do."

Ms Hubbard is glad to see progress on the issue of erosion but is concerned that a solution still seems a long way off while the beachfront continues to erode.

"Council know something has to be done but I think the worst part is how expensive it will be to do anything," she said.

"There are no definites with erosion and that's where the main concern is, it's trying to find the right option, not just any option; we have to be careful we're not going to make something worse elsewhere."

Three options were progressed in the report for detailed assessment and included the removal of the Lake Frome outlet's eastern groyne, an offshore breakwater in front of the caravan park and lengthening and lowering of the existing three eastern groynes.

Community members on the night put forward variations on those three options which included using T-bar groynes and leaving gaps in the offshore breakwater.

With Ms Hubbard hopeful that council will explore these suggestions, she said: "I think the community were concerned there wasn't enough options, it was just three or four that had been decided in previous years that may work."

In response to the retreat option Ms Hubbard said: "Council's preferred option is to retreat but we don't know what that looks like, where does it begin or end, what is sacrificed and what is saved?"

There were several apologies for the meeting and the decision was made to present another information session in September with Mr Halton saying the second meeting gives council the opportunity to re-present the current options and prepare a response to comments raised at the June meeting.

Southend beach access is currently closed due to erosion from recent storm damage.

Conversation course in Beachport


The next Conversations Around Suicide course is being held in Beachport this Sunday from 10am.

Council employee numbers increase

Wattle Range Council intends to employ eight additional staff next financial year according to its draft 2022/23 budget document, and the wages bill is set to increase by \$2.955m to \$13.952m.

This is further to the nine additional employees approved by council this year outside of the budget process.

The draft budget document reported: "During the 2021/22 financial year council approved employment of staffing numbers over and above the changes detailed in the original budget.

"Council supported the employment of these staff members to partly provide employment opportunities in the council area but also to address resource deficiencies in a range of sectors within Council such as administration," the draft budget document stated.

"These changes also provided capacity building opportunities for Council to expand services particularly in the areas of parks and gardens and road maintenance and construction."

The draft budget document outlines the further increase in council employees and their proposed roles.

"The employment changes in 2022/23 is the second stage in a range of staffing changes," reads the draft budget document.

"The proposed changes... are focussed on addressing administration resource deficiencies that have occurred as a consequence of

growth in both capital and operating projects over a number of years.

"The changes also further support the proposed expansion of service delivery by Council in the areas of parks and gardens and CWMS [CommunityWastewater Management Schemes] and pool maintenance."

The draft budget document stated that the eight full-time equivalents proposed to be added next financial year include new positions of governance officer, manager financial services, information technology officer, senior planning officer, general inspector, maintenance officer, parks and gardens operator, and asset management officer.

At the beginning of the current financial year, council employed 125 full time equivalents.

Following budget variations for additional staff this financial year, and the planned increase in staff next financial year, the total full time equivalent staff will be 143.

Council's draft budget was released for public comment last week.

School based apprenticeships popular

Wine 'young gun'

Coonawarra winemaker Luke Tocaciu has taken out the 2022 Young Guns of Wine Award in the Danger Zone category.

This is the only trophy in the winemaker awards that goes to a wine product, and it recognises a wine that successfully pushes the boundaries.

The Young Gun of Wine Awards started in 2007 and are open to young wine labels as well as winemakers on the rise within established wineries.

Other categories in the awards are the People's Choice, the Winemaker's Choice, the Best New Act and the Vigneron.

The top trophy, the Young Gun of Wine Award, goes to an emerging producer that is not only making outstanding wine but also demonstrates vision and leadership while nailing the entire pitch, packaging and presentation of their product.

Entries came from all over Australia, with half being South Australia based and the rest from other wine regions.

"This was the first time I had entered the event and it was a lot of fun," Mr Tocaciu said.

The winning wine is the 2021 Patrick Of Coonawarra Methode Eucalypt Cabernet Sauvignon. Mr Tocaciu said: "It's great to be recognised for this fun, experimental wine that pushes boundaries in Coonawarra and Cabernet Sauvignon.

'It's a wine that speaks to our unique Australian grape growing landscape."

The fruit for this wine was mechanically harvested and grown within 50 metres of red gums on the Patrick Home Block in a medium depth terra rossa soil which is dotted with red gum trees.

Mr Tocaciu said: "The resultant wine showed significantly increased eucalyptus aroma and flavour which developed into a blackberry, raspberry character being very balanced on the palate.

"This matured into a distinctly Australian Cabernet Sauvignon that expresses the environment in which it was grown."

These grapes were harvested into bins separate from the main harvest and a total of 1.7 tonnes was then crushed without destem-

ming and allowed to spontaneously ferment with natural yeast.

The ferment was then plunged daily for seven days before being basket pressed and transferred to two oak puncheons.

The wine was then allowed to completely malolactic ferment and aged for 12 months before bottling.

"We bottled 2500 bottles, which is quite a small amount, and it wont last very long," he said.

Mr Tocaciu said: "It has been well docu-

mented that eucalyptus trees in close proximity to vineyards have an influence on the resultant wine flavour."

He was presented with a trophy at a presentation dinner in Melbourne where Ryan Ponsford from Entropy Wines in the Gippsland was announced as the top award winner.

"I would encourage all young winemakers to enter this fun event," Mr Tocaciu said.

"I really enjoyed mixing with a great group of young winemakers from all over Australia,' he said.

Rise and fall of council waste charges

The service charge of bin collections in Wattle Range Council will be reduced by three per cent but sewer fees will increase according to council's recently released draft budget for 2022/23.

The draft budget states that the annual waste collection service charge for the threebin service will decrease to \$334 from \$346 while the two bin service will be \$261 down from \$270 due to "cost savings" on waste collection costs.

Council will also continue to offer a discretionary pensioner concession rebate to eligible ratepayers of \$120 for those who have a three-bin service and a \$90 fixed discretionary pensioner concession for pensioners who have a two-bin service.

Council provides two bin and three bin kerbside collection and recycling services in defined collection areas within the council area.

The two-bin service is provided to properties in residential rural living areas and commercial CBD areas, utilising a 140-litre bin for the collection and disposal of putrescible (nonrecvclable) waste and a 240-litre bin for the collection and disposal of recyclable waste.

Committee disbanded

A Wattle Range Council committee, aimed at providing community advice, care and management of Kalangadoo's Riddoch Institute Memorial Hall, has been disbanded.

At council's meeting last month, councillors made the decision on the basis of a report from staff that included advice that the committee had not met for more than two years and that two committee members, including Chairman Nick Hunt had resigned.

Established in 2004, the committee did not have enough members to make a quorum.

"In lieu of these membership issues and resultant complications in obtaining a quorum and on the back of declining volunteerism across the whole of sector, the likelihood of the committee reforming and attracting the required membership is questionable," the council staff report said.

"Based on this situation and in consideration of council's evolution and maturity in Asset Management particularly in buildings assets over the past five years, Council is well placed to better oversee asset condition, building maintenance and renewal of building assets such as the Kalangadoo Riddoch Institute Memorial Hall."

The report said council now had the ability to undertake the duties of the committee through the employment of an asset management officer, using asset management computer software, regular independent condition assessments of buildings, and the employment of three tradespeople within council.

"These changes have put council in a more proactive position to undertake planned maintenance and schedule renewals of buildings when required," the report said.

"With council's development in asset management over the past five years, the requirement to have a section 41 Committee to oversee the care, management, protection and operation of this asset has now been superseded."

In light of this, council agreed to the staff recommendation with Cr Deb Agnew moving and Cr Dale Price seconding the motion to discontinue the operation of the Kalangadoo Riddoch Institute Memorial Hall Management Committee.

Council has written to Mr Hunt and other committee members to thank them for their years of service.

It will also place a notice on the door of the hall advising the public of how the hall can be booked.

The Tantanoola Hall committee was also recently disbanded for similar reasons.

Gaol renos locked away

The historic former lock-up behind the Millicent Police Station is currently receiving extensive work expected to be completed next year with plans for the Police Commissioner to attend the official opening of the restored building.

Work includes replacement of the roof and gutters along with restoration of the stonework but at this stage the full scope of works remains unconfirmed. The humble stone building constructed in 1874 is Millicent's only confirmed State Heritage Place in the SA Heritage Register within the town centre and is described as a finely designed and constructed stone building.

After working at the Millicent Police Station for 10 years, Senior Sergeant officer in charge of the Millicent police station Rick Errington told the South Eastern Times he is pleased about the project.

"We are very excited about the progress of

"The works are tracking according to the guidelines and timeframes.

"It's a long burning project, it's going to take a while to sort it all out but we are very excited to showcase this wonderful structure that's in our backyard, it's a wonderful project for the community of Millicent."

Originally built along with a police station and stables when the first resident Police

Trooper was appointed to the town, the lockup is the only building on the site remaining from this era.

The historic law-enforcement structure is listed on the heritage database site as having rare, uncommon or endangered qualities of cultural significance, and an outstanding representative of a particular class of place of cultural significance.

The building stands as a reminder of early police-work in an isolated rural community.

Brooke shines in capital

Former South Eastern Times journalist, Brooke Littlewood, had the honour of asking the opening question at a recent National Press Club address in Canberra.

The televised appearance was part of Ms Littlewood's award for winning the Caroline Jones Women in Media Young Journalist's Award for 2021.

Named in honour of Caroline Jones AO who paved the way for women in media during her long and successful career, the highly regarded award seeks to highlight outstanding reporting by female journalists working across the regions.

First applying for the award in 2020, Ms Littlewood's application was 'highly commended'; reluctant to enter again she made a last minute decision that proved successful.

"I'll never forget when Caroline Jones phoned me to inform me I was the winner, I think I said something along the lines of: Are you bloody serious?" Ms Littlewood told the South Eastern Times recently.

"If anyone knew Caroline you would understand the humour in this, she responded with: Yes Brooke, I am serious. Are you okay?

"It definitely was a 'Pinch me I'm dreaming' moment and it still is."

It was difficult for Ms Littlewood to choose a single highlight of her award year but she noted the honour of being personally chosen by Caroline Jones as a standout.

Devastated that Ms Jones died suddenly aged 84 only a week before they were due to meet in person, Ms Littlewood spoke highly of her mentor.

'She was a remarkable journalist, friend and human and always showed an interest in what I was doing," Ms Littlewood said.

"We kept in contact via email, so even though I didn't personally meet her I still got to know her.

'Caroline said to me: 'Remember to have confidence in your outstanding ability' and whenever I'm in doubt, I'll remind myself of her kind words

"She paved the way for generations of women in media, a generous mentor, her leg-

acy will live on forever."

Spending a week in Canberra as part of the award, Ms Littlewood embraced networking opportunities.

"Women In Media are an incredible organisation, they show a genuine interest in what you are doing and believe in you," she said

"I know I now have those contacts and mentorship for life and I am forever grateful for that."

Shadowing talented photographers and journalists during her time in Canberra, Ms Littlewood spent a day at ABC Canberra TV studio with Louise Willis watching the 7pm News created, a day spent with ABC Rural's Kath Sullivan and Lucy Barbour at Parliament House and spent time with Chief of Photography for The Canberra Times Karleen Minney.

Ms Littlewood was honoured to ask the first question at the National Press Club address to speaker Aminata Conteh-Biger, an author, inspirational speaker and founder and chief executive officer of the Aminata Maternal Foundation.

Ms Conteh-Biger was one of the first Sierra Leonean refugees to be settled in Australia following her kidnap, imprisonment and subsequent release by rebel soldiers during the 11year civil war.

As part of Ms Littlewood's award a celebra-

tory dinner was held in her honour at the National Press Club and attended by Women In Media members.

"I couldn't believe so much time and effort had gone toward organising things like this for me," Ms Littlewood said.

"I left with renewed enthusiasm and inspired for what lies ahead in my career, no dream is ever too big."

Ms Littlewood also received a \$2,500 personal development grant but is still deciding where to invest it.

"I'm keen to develop skills in multi-platform storytelling, as I've always been predominantly print and I am also interested in photography and videography.

"Otherwise, there is an International Federation of Agricultural Journalists congress held each year, which I would love to attend."

Now based in Perth, Ms Littlewood has been working for Farm Weekly since March last year with livestock reporting her main news round and the role offering plenty of opportunity to travel throughout rural Western Australia.

"Livestock is such a diverse round - there's more to it than sheep and cows," she said.

"I love getting out on the road, listening to farmers discuss how and why they do cer-

tain things in their programs, changes they've made over time, what's worked, what hasn't -basically everything.

"I feel so grateful that people trust me to share their stories and always hope I can give them the justice they deserve.'

Beginning her cadetship at The South Eastern Times aged 17 in 2010, Ms Littlewood acknowledged the support received played an important role in her journey.

"The South Eastern Times was the best training ground for someone starting out in the industry, I covered everything from crime to council and events," she said.

"Regional and rural newspapers play such an important role in keeping communities informed of what is happening locally, it is important we continue to support them.

"Growing up, I have fond memories of The South Eastern Times.

"Nanna (Margaret Gordon) would save copies of the paper for me to read when I visited.

"As a kid in primary school, I dreamed of one day seeing my by-line on a page in the local rag.

Ms Littlewood completed her cadetship in 2013 and left the industry choosing to work in hospitality instead, firstly at Eucla Roadhouse in outback Australia then internationally in both England and Ireland.

On returning to Australia she secured a second stint reporting at The South Eastern Times for two years before moving to Mildura and reporting for the Sunraysia Daily eventually finding her way to her current job at Farm Weekly in Perth where she now lives with her sister Jess.

Reflecting on winning the Caroline Jones Award, Ms Littlewood said: "I can't explain how much it means to me or how grateful and thankful I am to have been chosen and for the opportunities that lie ahead.

'The readers and people who have supported me along the way - including everyone in Millicent - played a part in me receiving this award.

"The award goes far beyond recognition; it has given me validation and boosted my confidence, something I've always struggled with."







Polestar's Swedish twin

By Ewan Kennedy, Marque Motoring

Sweden is in the forefront of thinking when it comes to global warming and is working hard on reducing emissions from its vehicles.

Polestar is a sub brand of Volvo and shares some components with the Volvo XC40 Recharge which was tested recently.

The Swedish Polestar 2 is a pure EV, running on batteries without any internal combustion engine to back it up.

Three variants are offered: Standard Range single motor, Long Range single motor, and Long Range dual motor.

Polestar quotes expected range of 474km, 542km and 482km respectively.

It's a five-door hatchback and, in the Swedish style, is neat without being designed to impress.

The front has a sort of radiator grille, perhaps to suit potential buyers who aren't keen on a car which looks different from the norm.

At each side of the grille are the famed 'Hammer of Thor' shaped lights as used in all Volvos

The seats are large and comfortable.

However, the foot space in the front isn't as wide as expected, probably due to the fact that it's based on the similar platform as the smaller Volvo XC40.

The panoramic roof is huge, there's even an illuminated Polestar logo reflection, but you can only see it from the back seat.

The roof is tinted, but there's no blind or electro-chromatic setting to lessen the amount of light and heat that can be come through on a sunny day.

This wasn't a problem as we tested the Polestar 2 in winter here on the Gold Coast.

We will try to get another one in summer and see how it feels.

There's a real look and feel of upmarket luxury inside, the soft-touch fabrics and other materials around the cabin are that well-mated and blend of high-quality minimalism.

The Polestar uses a Google-sourced Android Automotive infotainment software.

The Hey Google voice assistant and control some of the car's functions as well as the infotainment and navigation features.

If you log in with a Google account, you

can search for things on your phone and have them available in the car seamlessly.

Polestar 2 is offered with in three models; single motor and standard range, single motor with long-range and dual-motor with a long-range battery pack.

The Polestar 2 we tested is the "big gun model" had dual electric motors and longrange batteries.

Its official range is 480km.

Polestar is closely related to Volvo and the company has had safety built into it's vehicles for many decades.

It has a five-star safety rating.

Dual frontal, side chest-protecting and side head-protecting (curtain) airbags are standard.

A centre airbag which provides added protection to front seat occupants in side impact crashes is standard on all variants

Autonomous emergency braking (Car-to-Car, Vulnerable Road User and Junction Assist) as well as a lane support system with lane keep assist (LKA), lane departure warning (LDW) and emergency lane keeping (ELK), and an advanced speed assistance system (SAS) are standard on all variants.

When we got into the car we looked in vain for a Start-Stop button.

Only to find it doesn't have one. Put your foot on the brake pedal and select either Drive or Reverse and the Polestar is ready to go.

It's a bit spooky at first because there's no noise, but you soon adapt the brain to it.

Handling is generally neutral as the centre

of gravity is lower than in a petrol- or dieselpowered vehicle.

It's a fairly heavy vehicle because batteries have a lot of mass and it weighs in at 1.9 tonnes.

This does give it a slight reluctant to change direction

Country running on twisty roads is good but you wouldn't put it in the sports coupe category

The excellent instant acceleration that we love in all pure electric vehicles is a major feature.

It will beat anything off the line that's powered by a V8 or hot six-cylinder petrol engine.

Around town and in the suburbs there's little noise inside the Polestar 2.

On the motorway section of our road testing the noise did penetrate more and disturbed the serenity.

There's some tyre bump thump when crossing bridges.

Energy consumption is officially rated at 19.4 kWh per 100 kilometres.

We averaged 16.8 kWh during our road testing of the Polestar 2 as we did a fair bit of suburban running and the vehicle charges itself when slowing down.

Indeed, on our run over the high Gateway Bridge it's indicated range increased when we freewheeled in on the down slope.

Polestar 2 gives us a strong insight as to what motoring will be like in the future.

It's low running costs and strong performance are impressive.
