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Meeting demand

In two letters to the management of Millicent's 5THE FM community radio station, 15 of its members are demanding a general meeting to be held next month to discuss concerns about the operation of the station.

According to copies of the letters obtained by The South Eastern Times, the purpose of calling this special general meeting is to discover who makes up the membership of the station's board of management and what governance procedures are currently in place.

"Where the Incorporated association is found negligent and lacking in constitutional governance, the meeting will look to establish appropriate procedures, policies and persons to ensure compliance by installing a transitional board of management," the earliest of the two letters, dated June 6, reads.

Both letters are signed by Des Noll, acting on behalf of the community, rather than in his position as Wattle Range Council mayor.

Following questions put to the manager of the radio station last month, the South Eastern Times has been unable to establish when the last annual general meeting of the radio station was held or who the chairperson is.

However, members of the Millicent Community Access Radio Inc, as the station is officially registered as, have called the meeting after obtaining a copy of the station's constitution

"Please be advised that on behalf of the Millicent Community Access Radio membership and in accordance with the constitution... the membership hereby request you to call a special general meeting within one month of this requisition being June 20," the latest of the two letters, dated June 20, reads.

"If a Special General Meeting is not called as per the constitution, then the listed members recorded in my letter to you dated the 6/6/22 will call such a meeting that will be set down for Thursday the 21st of July 2022.

The date and venue for the Special General Meeting will be advertised in the print media to the public.

"An independent MC will be engaged to conduct the Special General Meeting.'


Last month the South Eastern Times revealed that 5THE FM is being investigated by the Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA).

ACMA is the governing body that regulates media services in Australia, ensuring all broadcasters follow legislative and licencing requirements.

ACMA confirmed an investigation into 5THE FM began earlier this year after a complaint was received about the station.

The South Australian Consumer and Business Services (CBS), which monitors the compliance of incorporated bodies, was unable to "confirm or deny" if there is any investigation in relation to 5THE FM.

The radio station was contacted for comment about the call for a meeting but did not respond by print deadline.

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Upgrade for town toilets

The toilet block in the Penola Park could be upgraded with Wattle Range Council committing funds for the project in its draft budget for next financial year.

Released for public comment recently, the draft budget includes \$150,000 towards the upgrade which will include a full interior refurbishment of the the male and female toilets.

The old plumbing in the toilets will also be completely replaced.

Council's Director of Engineering Services, Peter Halton said: "The male toilets are in desperate need of an upgrade and the urinals that currently exist will be replaced with cubicles.

"The toilet block upgrade will be made more appealing for families with a different access being made available.

"Urinals are extremely difficult to manage and very hard to clean and in this day and age with different genders cubicles must be included in the toilet," he said.

Visiting Penola from Robe, the Longbottom family said: "We always use the toilets in the park and they are always very clean and tidy and with a wider self locking door now installed it has stopped all the leaves from blowing in.

"We travel quite a bit and they are far su-

perior to others we use and look forward to seeing what the upgrade will entail," they said.

Also in the draft budget, a total of \$50,000 has been allocated to upgrade the water sprinklers in the Penola War Memorial Park.

The pop up sprinklers will be changed to a sub surface irrigation system.

The water supply has been moved from a pump/bore at the Penola swimming pool due to not being suitable for the system.

A new bore was put down in the park, however the water quality has been a problem with damage being done to the War Memorial and a wall of the existing toilets caused by the spraying sprinklers.

Mr Halton said: "This system will alleviate this problem as there won't be any spraying sprinklers."

Public comment on the draft budget is open until early July.

Written submissions close on July 1, and a public meeting, where verbal submissions on the draft budget can be made, is expected to be held at Millicent's Civic and Arts Centre on July 5.

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At the toilets in the Penola Park is the Longbottom family from Robe, Paul, Heidi, Jade and Calluna. The toilets are earmarked for an upgrade in the draft Wattle Range Council budget.

National park move fear

Concerns that Lake George could be included in the national parks network were voiced at a meeting in Millicent last week.

Convened by consultants URPS for the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS), the workshop meeting on Thursday night at the Millicent Civic and Arts Centre was attended by about 75 people and discussed future management options for the South East coastal lakes.

After the workshop, the Lake George Management Committee (LGMC) released a statement to the South Eastern Times.

"LGMC is concerned about the lack of certainty about future management and is of the view that the government is intent to classify the lake under the National Parks Act 1972; with options to proclaim the area as a National Park, a Game reserve, or a Recreation Reserve," the statement said.

"If proclaimed, there are obligations on the Department to manage government land that includes pest plants and manage facilities that maybe a challenge with current departmental resources.

LGMC chair Lee Morgan reiterated: "The majority of workshop participants were keen to know what was happening with Lake George and they are very reluctant to see it go under the National Parks system.

"LGMC are resolute about keeping it as crown land and exploring those options.'

The workshop and an online survey explored management options of six coastal lakes being Lake Bonney, Lake Eliza, Lake St Clair, Lake Hawdon North, Mullins Swamp and Lake George with Lake George and Lake Bonney generating the most interest on the night.

Kathryn Nicolai, Manager of National Parks and Protected area program, explained: "We have had a number of targeted meetings before this session and what we were hearing Coastal Lakes chat: Manager of National Parks and Wildlife Service Limestone Coast Nick McIntyre (left) and Park management program team leader Kym Rumbelow (3rd left) met with land holders lan Nitschke and Peter Gregurke. from the community reinforced that these lakes are really important for the local com-

munity for recreation. "Generations of families have used them, enjoyed them and value them for their natural

value and hunting, fishing, camping. "Those themes came out really strongly

at the workshop and as an agency that wants people to be out enjoying nature that's a great thing to hear."

The online survey ended last Sunday with a total of 352 submissions received, bringing to an end the community consultation component of phase one of what is a three part project.

"The consultants (URPS) will now prepare the report using all of the information gathered from the different sources and we will provide that back to the department and share that information with the minister," Ms Nicolai said.

"The next stage will be developing some options to bring back to the community to say this is what we have heard and these are some options we think could address any management concerns.

"We were pleased to have the turnout we had, it was great to see that many members of the local community that are really interested and care enough about their lakes to come out on a cold winters night.

"The feedback was useful and constructive and we got some good information from our perspective."

Councillor Sharon Cox attended the workshop as an interested community member and agreed the night went well except for some underlying mistrust of politicians.

"I think overall it went very good, I had a feeling that people are afraid of change because people don't fully understand what that looks like," she said.

"You can't always trust them either (politicians), if the consultants stick to their word and do what they say they are going to do we shouldn't have any issues.'

Another two Covid cases at Boneham Aged Care

The two recent cases follow nine previous cases among residents and about half of staff absent due to Covid-19 over three weeks in



Mr Filsell, on social media, advised that it was believed the resident had contracted Covid while on a family outing and had been in isolation since a family member tested positive.

PCR testing of all residents was undertaken on Sunday.

Results of this testing were received by BACS on Tuesday which identified one additional case of Covid-19 in the Ibis wing.


Freezing for good cause

Tender let to fix saleyards

Work on fixing some aspects at Millicent's Saleyards will be undertaken by a Robe based business following Wattle Range Council awarding a contract last week.

After a confidential section of council's monthly meeting, the minutes of the matter were released publicly which authorised the council's chief executive officer to award the contract to Hamlyn Wilson Pty Ltd to undertake compliance works at Millicent Saleyards, subject to satisfactory negotiations.

Council's Director of Engineering Services, Peter Halton told The South Eastern Times this week that the work to be undertaken will involve the washdown bay and ramps at the salevards.

He said Hamlyn Wilson, based in Robe, will be the principle contractor which will be using various subcontractors to complete the job.

The local subcontractors are expected to include Haynes Engineering steel fabrication, of Naracoorte, Osscon contracting

of Mount Gambier, Struktura Structural Engineering of Adelaide and Agnew Bros electrical of Robe.

The double height loading ramp will be completed by two suppliers from outside the region.

Mr Halton said there is a 14 month lead time on fabrication for the double height ramp while work on the fixed ramps and washdown bay are expected to be completed over 10 weeks on site.

These are part of the works that were identified during a WorkSafeSA audit of the facility last year.

The intended works will be discussed with the council's salevards advisory committee prior to work beginning.

Mr Halton said the works will be staged to minimise any impact on sale days.

Other works to rectify issues with the facility's weigh bridge and office building will be dealt with under other separate contracts.

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A contract to undertake some work on ramps and the washdown bay at Millicent Saleyards has been let to Robe based business, Hamlyn Wilson.

It will be a jam packed program and there will be full catering, bar facilities, live music and a bucking bull.

Inaugural disc golf game held in Millicent's park

A small group of Disc Golf enthusiasts took up the challenge to trial the first sanctioned tournament in Millicent last weekend.

Held at Millicent's Rotary Park, the course was described by organiser Ryan Nicholson: "It's a nice short course with a lot of tight wooded holes through the trees and technical lines, so no real big long holes but a good balance for beginners and experienced players."

Among the players was two from Adelaide and included professional disc golfer Matt Noblett.

"For Matt it is a very casual tournament but the goal is to create exposure in towns like Millicent that don't have courses and help councils become more aware of the sport," said Mr Nicholson. Mr Nicholson runs Launch Disc Golf in Mount Gambier which has one of the best permanent courses in Australia.

"Unfortunately, since the fire on the mountain in January, the majority of the course is closed due to the high risk situation from damaged trees and damage to the face of the crater wall," he said.

This closure has meant the Mount Gambier disc golfing community is limited to playing at pop up events with temporary baskets once or twice a month rather than the unlimited access available previously.

"Having these little events means being accessible to these players when they don't have access to their home course, it's a bit of an opportunity to help them out as well."

A learning place for all

An ambitious dream by two Newbery Park Primary School educators was realised recently with the official opening of the school's new Indigenous learning space, Budinya Mraatu, which means learning on country in the local Boandik language.

Aboriginal Communication Education Officer Donna Baker and Eco learning officer Angela Jones planted the seed for the project almost two years ago and with widespread community and school support have created an impressive learning space for years to come.

The area at the back of the school once housed two long unused tennis courts and has now been transformed into a representation of Craitbul, a local Boandik creation story about the landscape.

Three mounds have been created with traditional Boandik names, Beleter, Parreen and Berrin, representing local landmarks Mount Burr, Mount Schanck and Mount Gambier, and an area toward the back is lowered to mimic the swamplands originally at the site.

The opening included a Welcome to Country by Boandik elder and author Aunty Michelle Jacquelin-Furr and a smoking ceremony performed by Aboriginal cultural heritage advisor Uncle Doug Nicholls who invited everyone in attendance to walk through the site during the ceremony.

Local musician Jason Baker led the students in a John Williamson song, Raining on the rock, and Room 6 students told and performed the story of Craitbul.

The opening was attended by representatives of several local groups, family members, old scholars and students from Newbery Park, Millicent High School and McArthur Park Kindergarten with students involved in cultural activities and native flora planting following the official opening.

Students were kept busy with more than 2200 local native plants prepared for planting throughout the space with Ms Jones saying: "I love plants and I love finding out what the Indigenous people used to do with our native plants and to bring that into the school and teach the children is fantastic.

"The connection with the animals and plants and Indigenous people is what it's all about.

"I like to take the kids out on country and today we are bringing that here."

The students learnt weaving technique from Aunty Michelle and Uncle Doug explained the Boandik seasons calendar as well as sharing artefacts and tools he has collected or made over the years, with a chance to try boomerang throwing a favourite for many.

A 75 metre long mural is planned for a fence with assistance from former Newbery Park student and Indigenous artist Tiffany Clare with Ms Baker explaining the project.

"The design will be on there (the fence) and it will be up to the kids to colour and fill it in," she said.

"It will be in the next 6-12 months the mural will kick off because we have a lot planned for the end of this term, we will keep it gradually ticking along."

Ms Baker explained to the South Eastern Times the importance of representing the local landscape with Wyrie swamp, only seven kilometres from Newbery Park, being the site where Australia's oldest boomerang and other artefacts were discovered in 1973.

"The children learned about the swamplands, they were pretty surprised that they had managed to find artefacts out in the middle of the paddocks," said Ms Baker.

"We explained that they weren't paddocks hundreds of years ago and the drainage board

has made them paddocks with drains.

"They are quite interested in learning about the history of the place which is great."

The project is ongoing with more planting and further development around the fire pit area in the immediate future.

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New hall shed planned

The pledge has been made for next financial year in council's draft budget which was released for public comment recently and is expected to be adopted next month.

Show President, Kinta Wilson said: "Currently the show society has to use the shed that is situated on the high school grounds for storage and it is inconvenient come show time to haul trestles and other equipment to Rymill Hall for the show.

"This will be a wonderful asset to us and also to the Penola Players who will also use the new shed for storage.

"It is fantastic that we can work in with the Penola Players with the use of the shed," Mrs Wilson said.

"This is what small communities are about."

Penola Players spokesperson Annie Kilsby said: "We are very happy to be able to have somewhere to store our equipment in a safe place.

"Things like costumes, paint equipment, stage sets and equipment can all be stored in the shed."

The new ramp will be a huge asset as it will be used to get heavy equipment on to the stage.

It will also be of great benefit to travelling

The shed will be situated at the western end of Rymill Hall and a new ramp will be also be included in the additions.

The current ramp on the northern side of the hall has been deemed structurally unsafe and will be removed.

The derelict old toilet block on the south western corner of the hall will also be demolished.

Council's Director of Engineering Services, Peter Halton said: "Unfortunately we don't have a time frame on the completion of the shed.

"Once the revised plans are approved the building of the shed will go out to tender, and with the shortage and rising costs of materials it may take longer than originally expected."



Award for police service

A former Millicent police officer was recently included in the Queen's Birthday honours list as one of three South Australian police officers to receive an Australian Police Medal.

Superintendent Paul Roberts joined South Australia Police in 1980 and served in Millicent as a Constable from 1988 to 1990.

He also served in Whyalla, Penong, Ceduna and Coober Pedy before becoming the Aboriginal Aide Supervisor at Amata Police Station on the Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara (APY) Lands from 1994 to 1997.

He then served in leadership roles in Port Augusta, Peterborough and West Coast operations before moving to Adelaide where he served in various roles including State Duty Officer, Northern Operations Executive, Special Tasks and Rescue Group (Combined Operations Section) and Manager, Employee Assistance Section.

Promoted to Superintendent and Officer in Charge, Far North Local Service Area in 2016, he was instrumental in leading the development of SAPOL's inaugural cultural awareness training program.

He has also worked closely with police officers from the Northern Territory and Western Australia to develop cross border legislation which is now integral to justice initiatives being implemented across the APY Lands.

Superintendent Roberts played a key leadership role in establishing the 'Remote & Vulnerable Communities - Zone Emergency Management Group' to assist in keeping local communities safe from Covid-19.

Throughout the pandemic he engaged with Aboriginal communities, speaking at numerous community meetings and interacting with elders individually or in small groups.

As State Aboriginal Communities Coordinator from 2008 to 2010 he coordinated and implemented the SAPOL response to recommendations to government inquiries focused on child abuse intervention and social justice

His work was instrumental in establishing three new police stations, and the recruitment of 25 staff including specialist child abuse and

domestic violence investigators for the APY Lands. A statement from SAPOL said he was held in high esteem by Aboriginal communi-

ties across South Australia and continues to be a trusted advisor on Aboriginal culture and relationships.

Passion for working dogs

The annual Australian Kelpie Muster at Casterton is clearly focused on the one particular breed of working dog.

The time-honoured event attracts huge crowds each year and a fair amount of kelpies.

Some accompany their owners simply for the day out, while others take part in the various events over the course of the weekend.

But there is one particular dog that has possibly broken any previous records for times at the muster.

Dusty is a 15-year-old kelpie that first attended the muster in 2007.

She turns 16 in December and was at the muster yet again on the weekend, along with her working buddy Jock.

The dogs' owner, Shane Beauglehall is rightly proud of his two workers, with a special spot for Dusty, although his love for "Jocko" is just as deep.

"Dusty has been coming to Casterton since she was six months old, back in 2007," he said. "She has been here every year except for

the Covid years.

"Up to 2019 she still competed in the hill climb - she did the hill climb as a six-monthold pup and still got to the top in 2019."

Mr Beauglehall said he bought Dusty as a three-month-old pup, then Jock in 2009.

The dogs do not work full time, as Mr Beauglehall only works stock part time.

However, there has been no shortage of time to assess the abilities of Dusty.

"She was a good working dog," Mr Beauglehall said.

"She was more suited to paddock work and was always better on a bigger mob.

"You put her on a mob of a few hundred and it suited her better than a mob of 10.

"She really read the sheep well."

Of course now it more about time to rest for the old worker, with her favourite spot either on the bed or the couch, although Mr Beauglehall said he worked her over Easter for a bit of fun

He said at this stage of her life she is content to sleep, rather than work as hard as she has done.

But the Kelpie Muster is one event she possibly has missed.

"She used to love this event," Mr Beauglehall said.

"You do the sprint race then the high jump, then her and Jock knew the hill climb was next and they would drag us across the bridge."

The best effort at the event from Dusty was a second in the triathlon and the hill climb in the same year.

Mr Beauglehall said the style of event suited her passion for not just working, but also for her owner.

"The good thing about the hill climb and all these events is she couldn't stand to be away from me," he said.

"She just had to get to me, so she ran up the hill as fast as she could to get to me, she jumped the high jump to get to me.

"She just wanted to get to me."

The connection between the man and his dogs is clear.

Mr Beauglehall said his dogs would do anything for him, which made it extra special considering he trained them himself, with Dusty the first kelpie he had trained to work sheep.

"Dusty would protect me if someone came along, for sure," he said.

"Jock would do anything for me too.

"When we were working he would just go in and whatever needed to be done, he would do it.

"He would get knocked around by the sheep but just do it to please me."

Mr Beauglehall lives in Melbourne but has travelled around the country to other events.

"Originally I bought Dusty as a pet," he said.

"She started working sheep one day on my mate's farm, then I started doing dog trials.

"I have travelled around Australia with her doing sheep dog trials, to Queensland, Western Australia, Tasmania and all over the place."

While Mr Beauglehall said Dusty was out of her depth in some of the top-level categories, where the owners worked the dogs full time with plenty of time to train them, in the lowerlevel competitions she did well.

"She does alright," he said.

"She won a few firsts and seconds in the lower-level competition.'

Although he lives in the city, Mr Beauglehall said the passion for his working dogs came from his youth on the family property.

"My mum came from a farm in South Australia and they had merinos and crops," he said.

"I used to go out with my grandfather as a kid - he had kelpies - and we'd jump in the ute and go out and muster the sheep.

"I just loved watching the kelpies work,

even when I was knee high to a grasshopper. "The dogs would jump in the ute and were

proud of themselves finishing the job.

"They are always so happy. "They live to work."

As for the Kelpie Muster in Casterton, it is an event Mr Beauglehall will always hold dear.

"Dusty is probably the longest-serving dog to come to Casterton," he said.

"She really enjoys coming here.

"She loves the events and all my dogs are very social with other dogs.

"They get on the oval and run around with another 40 dogs and just love it."

Mr Beauglehall had another two young dogs in tow, with a second place in the hill climb on the weekend with Boof, along with a fourth place in the triathlon.

It is fair to say Mr Beauglehall's time competing at Casterton is sure to continue well into the future.

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Reminiscing the SE Times

Russ Stiggants, a former journalist at The South Eastern Times from 1967 to early 1972, reflects on his time at the paper and his career that followed.

For Mr Stiggants, now 71 and living in the Barossa, The South Eastern Times was a launch pad for his career. Here is his story.

Like many visitors to the South East over the recent holiday weekend, my skin froze the closer I came to Mount Gambier – but conversely my heart warmed more and more as I came closer to my 'second home' which I have not been able to visit recently due to the uncertainty of the era in which we now live.

While I was not born in the South East, my career certainly was.

My dreams as a child and teenager of becoming a journalist came true when the late and great South Eastern Times Editor, Bob Chewings, took a chance and hired me as a cadet journalist.

It helped that I had been 'Possum' for a while as a copy-boy at the Sunday Mail/The News – but Rupert Murdoch and I didn't get on.

Until Bob showed faith in me, I tried accountancy and law (and a number of other boring career options) and in retrospect, I should have pursued those opportunities as now, some half a century later, I would have been a lot richer.

But because of those beginnings and guidance provided by Bob, my life has been made remarkable by circumstances that few other professionals will experience – a life which has not been fettered by the mundane, the tedious or the pedantic.

For the most part, it has been spontaneous.

A life where every day has been different with wildly different imperatives and outcomes -a life, which, for the most part has been an adventure.

Only others in this quirky craft of journalism and creators of photographic and video imagery will have an understanding of the wild ride this life has taken.

Along the way, I have chronicled the life and times of Australia and South Australia, including being privileged to have interviewed and discussed 'matters of State' with Prime Ministers from Billy ('big ears') McMahon to

John Howard - and from Premiers Tom Playford to Mike Rann.

Those political adventures started in Millicent with a friendship with (the then) Local MP, Des Corcoran.

Yes, The Times was 'Right leaning' back then, with Liberal doyen Ren DeGaris a frequent visitor - but both Des and Ren always took the time to talk to me.

(Later I was to work as a Press Secretary to Geoff Virgo in the Dunstan Cabinet where Des and I renewed our friendship. I was privileged to be the 'MC' at Des's 60th birthday celebrations in the Parliamentary Dining Room in Parliament House - a rare honour in front of many of SA's political, business and community elite at the time.)

Despite its editorial leanings, the Times faithfully reported local issues - the fishing boats missing at sea from Beachport, local business and community matters (including the story of a couple from Rendelsham who had the Bejesus frightened out of them by a visiting UFO (true!), the sport often covered by club 'contributors' which Bob would viciously attack with his red pen (the same pen used to whip my 'copy' into line!) and the meanderings of local councils - Bob would cover the Millicent Council, while I was dispatched to cover the Beachport and Tantanoola Councils.

On July 16, 1969, I was dispatched to the window of the electrical shop in the main street to watch Neil Armstrong land on the Moon (no new-fangled television at The Times back then!). I reported on the landing and the comments from those who joined me outside the shop. To Bob, it was just another story.....

I left the Times in 1971 (Ed note: Mr Stiggants resigned in late 1971 but stayed on until early 1972 to allow time for a replacement to be found) and went on to work in all media genres (including working in London for United Press International Television News) - all thanks to the skills I trace back to that wonderful opportunity afforded me at The Times.

Those adventures included spending a

great deal of time in South Australia's great Outback filming and reporting on the development of Olympic Dam and Roxby Downs, videoing many areas strapped to and hanging out of light-aircraft and helicopters with their doors removed, and deep underground filming the powder-monkeys and underground drillers as they opened new 'drives' into the world's richest copper and uranium mine.

Along the way, I graduated from lobster boats to warships (once being 'jack-stayed' in a bosun's chair from ship to ship in the Gulf), spent a little cruise offshore in one of Australia's Oberon-class submarines – and flew in RAAF-PC3 Orions filming the search for missing boats....a long way from climbing to the crows-nest in a cray-boat looking for missing sailors off Beachport!

I was sent to Malmo in Sweden to film Kockum submarines which were the genesis of our Collins-class subs...the first of many overseas sojourns which took me to northern and southern Europe – and behind the Iron Curtain to the Kremlin, travelling the Midnight Express train from Moscow to Leningrad.

(I could tell you why I was there but I'd have to shoot you all and eat you afterwards....!)

Along the way I have closely followed the closing and re-openings of The Times as its fortunes have wavered - and am pleased the paper is now again being published in newspaper format, thanks to the efforts of Peter and Kathy Gandolfi, from their office at the Border Watch.

Imagine my delight as I physically warmed up on a brisk walk along Commercial Street on Tuesday after the holiday that I came across the door to the new offices of the Watch above Bank SA.

I couldn't help myself and climbed the stairs to meet and congratulate the Gandolfis on their efforts.

We had a great time reminiscing – a discussion which led them to ask me to write something about my years at The Times and the adventures it resulted in for me.

I can only thank them again for breathing new life into The South Eastern Times – and I implore all South Easterners to support their local newspapers.

They not only report on stories in their regions – but can also lead to adventures than many of us can only dream about.

Long live our great rural press.

the boys was to get in front and stay in front, then you don't burn your tickets trying to claw your way back.

Thomson also noted the importance of Joel Virtanen's effort to be named best on ground.

At just 19 years-of-age the Nangwarry product certainly made the most of the moment as the game unfolded.

"The way Joel goes about his footy and how important he is to us, if we were to win a game he had to dominate," Thomson said.

'We have a lot of good footballers and we are starting to gel but if he is picking up the footy 30 times - he doesn't miss a target too often.

"Late in the game after they kicked a goal I put him straight in the middle, knowing he had to be there, getting his hands on it.

"He doesn't waste the football and the more he touches it, the better we look.'

Thomson said as the game unfolded and a victory was in sight, he ensured his players did not worry about the scoreboard.

He said in previous games this year the win was spoken of at breaks.
