Millicent resident David Walshaw has announced he will seek nomination to the 5THE FM committee following the recent community to discuss the future of the Millicent community radio station.

 $\dot{\text{Mr}}$ Walshaw was present at the meeting last month and said he wanted to help secure the station's future in whatever way he could.

The station has been subject to allegations from community members about a lack of transparency in its operations, but it was Mount Gambier 5GTR FM's chairman Nathan Butler's comments about the 5THE FM's ability to have their licence renewed that caused Mr Walshaw's immediate concern.

The Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA) currently lists 5THE FM's community broadcasting licence as expiring on October 3 this year.

A representative from the organisation confirmed 5THE had submitted an application to renew its licence which ACMA is currently considering.

"We may not have a community radio station beyond October when the licence renewal comes up," Mr Walshaw said.

"Unless something is done quickly, the situation may impact the ability for the station to get a licence.

"It is very important for a community broadcaster to get its licence renewed, to demonstrate significant community involvement.

"I am not sure, hand on heart, we can say that at the moment.

"That is my greatest fear that through no fault of the communities, we lose our radio station because of the inaction of the board."

Mr Walshaw recently retired from his position as the Red Cross regional services manager for the Limestone Coast and Riverland and previously has worked as the chief executive for local hospitals.

Code blue for region

Residents in the Wattle Range area should prepare for some wild weather in the coming days, with a 'code blue' activated due to the extreme weather.

A code blue - which opens up emergency accommodation for those sleeping rough - has been called in the Limestone Coast until August 9. People experiencing homelessness in the Limestone Coast can call the 24/7 Homelessness Connect SA on 1800 003 308.

Potentially damaging winds and heavy rain are forecast for the next five days across many parts of South Australia, and the South Australian State Emergency Service is advising people to take precautions before the weather strikes and secure loose items around your property. Robert Charlton, SASES State Duty Officer said taking a sensible approach to securing items in your yard or putting them away can help minimise potential property damage.

"We all know weather can be unpredictable, and I think we've all seen the videos of trampolines and outdoor furniture being blown around during intense wind gusts," he said.

"While we are not expecting destructive winds over the coming days, it pays to err on the side of caution.

"For the next couple of days, the SASES will be at a heightened level of preparedness and we will be constantly monitoring conditions.

"We will be ready to respond if required.

Life is better when it's done together

Millicent Community Church (MCC) is welcoming the community to join them for a weekly free breakfast each Wednesday morning.

Senior Pastor Shaun Mulick is hosting the breakfasts designed to reach families.

"We've got a lot of single mums that come, the goal is to take a little pressure off, not just for struggling families," Pastor Mulick said.

"It's the kind of thing that when you create these services sometimes people can be embarrassed to take part in it, if you make it for everyone it makes it more inclusive, more ac-

"It's a tough enough job getting kids off to school in the morning so we have snacks and

muesli bars for lunchboxes, fresh fruit, yoghurt and we do pancakes, cereals and toast for breakfast.'

Pastor Mulick serves breakfast from 8-9am during the school term and has a tray of pancakes ready for when people start arriving.

"The mums that have to get to school are usually gone by 8.30am but it's one less thing to think about on a Wednesday morning in the middle of the week, they (the children) just have to get their uniform on and have breakfast on the way.'

With a kitchen set up on the premises MCC $\,$ also offer a free breakfast of bacon, eggs and sausages every Sunday at 10am.

This breakfast leads in to the church's Sunday service but there is no obligation to stay with Pastor Mulick highlighting the benefits of those who choose to.

"I think the real value is the community because it's conversations around the table, just like a cafe, and life is better done together.

"We just want to make space for people so they feel like they are living life with meaningful connections to others."

In 2019 MCC began hosting free weekly breakfasts in Jubilee Park, attracting between 60 and 80 people each week, including students on their way to school or families walking children to school.

The arrival of Covid-19 put a stop to the outdoor breakfasts and it has only been this year the church has started regularly hosting breakfasts from their Williams Road premises.

Stories to be discovered

Since 2017 members of the South East Family History Group (SEFHG) have been tending graves in Section D, the oldest part, of the Millicent Cemetery.

Five years since receiving permission from Wattle Range Council to meet monthly at the site, they began to repair some of the worst damaged graves unearthing history along the way.

The latest secret revealed was during the levelling of four unmarked children's graves by volunteers where a rectangular piece of stone was found by SEFHG president Noel Boyle.

"The headstone was found side on and you couldn't read anything and it was just put aside.

"It's only when I came out several days later and it had been raining, a little bit of the dirt was washed off and I thought it looked like a scratch of a J.

"I washed it and to me it looked like John Mott, by checking records at the history group we knew a John Mott had died in Millicent and was buried in the Millicent cemetery.

"It was before records were kept so to find that means a lot, just to find one unmarked grave."

Further research by Mr Boyle revealed the grave belonged to John William Francis Mott, born December 29 1877 to parents John and Mary Anne Mott (nee Francis).

John William Francis Mott died in Millicent of tuberculosis February 16 1881 age 3 years, he was one of six children.

Burial records of the Millicent cemetery did not commence until October 8 1894, which means there are no records of burials prior to this date.

"By finding the stone with John Mott's name on it we are now able to place a plaque on the grave, register the plot number and name on the SEFHG records, and council records.

"Although I have known there are people buried at the Millicent cemetery before records were kept, this is the first time I have found a discovery like this.

"The stone will be returned to his grave," Mr Boyle said.

The four children's plots that are next to John Mott's grave, although unmarked, are already registered with council records.

Tony Manhood has been working with John Nicholson and Mr Boyle to add borders to the four children's dirt graves.

Volunteering at the cemetery for over 12 months Mr Manhood said a friend was helping out and he decided to come along.

"I said if you need volunteers, it's some-

thing I can do.

"So I did and I started restoring the old cast iron ones (fences), and it's just gone on from there.

"When the wind farm mob (10 volunteers from Vesta) came out last year, well what took me three months to do took them three hours so we left that.

"We've got it all ready so if they volunteer again we can get them to help, they are professional welders, they know what they are doing."

Volunteers are not making substantial changes to the plots, restoring what is practical and achievable with sympathetic materials.

The group have worked on approximately 150 graves by adding gravel or stone to sunken graves, welding broken cast iron fences and making stone borders and have about 30 graves left to finish Section D.

Over 50 new plaques have been added to previously unmarked graves with relatives, if known, contacted and asked to cover the \$30 cost of the marker with most families taking up the offer.

The initiative began with about 15 volunteers but this number has dwindled over the years mostly due to ageing group members.

People are welcome to help with the cemetery project either regularly or on occasion, with the small group meeting the first Sunday of the month and each Thursday between 9am-11am.

"We just need a couple of extra people with stronger backs.

"Some people think cemeteries are a sad place but I think we are recognising and acknowledging people's lives and their stories," Mr Boyle said.

"I have over 35 years of significant senior leadership experience, particularly in governance," he said.

"I think I can bring some skills and experience to that radio station to help them get over the current hump they are in."

Mr Walshaw said he had found the lack of response from the 5THE FM about the allegations disappointing.

"I am not suggesting anything sinister going on, but in the absence of any information, you have to wonder what is going on there," he said.

"There have been lots of allegations, and they may not be correct, but nobody is rebutting them. No one from the committee is saying yes, we have a properly constituted board with this many members. "There are public documents that the people should be allowed to see, and we are not seeing them.

"It is a lack of transparency that makes me very worried about the future of that radio station."

Mr Walshaw is encouraging the station's manager and committee to start a positive and open dialogue with the community so people know how they can help.

"Once you engage lawyers, you take the ability of that across-the-table conversation to occur," he said.

"We are asking for something that should be publicly available to us as community members.

"Tell us what is going on, we are more than happy to help, but the silence is deafening." Mr Walshaw confirmed he is not affiliated or involved with the Wattle Range Council and had not taken this step at the request of any council staff or members.

"I am not aligned with council or anything like that," he said.

Mr Walshaw said he had not been involved with the station before his recent membership application but had been a long-term listener.

"I always wanted to be involved, but work got in the way," he said.

"Now that I am retired, I would love to do some on-air presenting...one of my great loves is music."

Despite recent criticism, Mr Walshaw said 5THE FM could still have a positive future.

"I think there is great community sup-

port for the station to continue," he said.

"There is a lot of expertise in the South East in terms of broadcast experience, I just think they should be given a chance.

"As services withdraw more and more to capital cities, regional communities have got to be hanging onto those things they have that are near and dear to them. For many in Millicent, that radio station is near and dear to them.

"I just hope it is not too late."

Des Noll said completed station membership forms have been forwarded to the station's legal representation but had not received a response from the 5THE FM committee.

The 5THE FM committee was contacted for comment, but no response was received by print deadline.

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Forums on new \$9m home

Wattle Range Council will be hosting community information sessions in Penola and Beachport about the planned \$9 million council offices following last month's session in Millicent.

The first session held in July at the Millicent Civic Arts Centre was well attended by the community, with many taking the opportunity to ask council chief executive Ben Gower questions on the multi-million dollar project.

The Council has responded to all 39 questions submitted during the session online, with many queries concerned about the cost of the project and the consultation process.

When asked about the cost to ratepayers, the council said it would cost an average of \$15 per ratepayer.

"Council is currently cash positive, where our cash reserves are greater than the combination of our short and long-term debts," it

"While a considerable amount of these cash reserves have been ear marked for the renewal of other assets, some of it is depreciation money that has been collected over many years to fund the renewal of the current Council office."

To the question as to why Millicent needed such an extravagant building, council responded that It is important that the design and function of this building meets the needs of the organisation and the community it services

"The most recent version of the concept

plans incorporates public spaces with an appropriate level of local materials on display, featuring a formal Chamber with a public gallery that opens into the foyer to allow for larger public meetings," the response said.

"It has an all-ability customer service area, several separate interview and larger public meeting rooms, as well as two all-ability public toilets. The back-office area is more functional and can accommodate up to 80 staff in a flexible open plan design with an appropriate allocation of meeting and collaboration spaces, lunch, toilet, shower and change room facilities.

"It has been specifically designed to accommodate the future needs of the community."

The incoming Council will be tasked with making the final decision on the new building after the elections in November.

Mr Gower has previously said the meetings at Penola and Beachport would be considered based on community interest.

The Penola session will be held on August 17 at 7pm at Rymill Hall on Cameron St.

Two weeks into his role at Millicent High School (MHS) as a wellbeing dog Basil is already making his presence felt, particularly as office partner of Tam Gould who is forming a bond with the new addition.

The 12 week old cocker spaniel belongs to MHS finance officer Shannon Nicholls who purchased the dog with his role as a support for wellbeing co-ordinator, Ms Gould, in mind.

Ms Nicholls was not looking for another dog at the time but having two cocker spaniels at home already she decided if it was going to happen it needed to be while her other dogs were still young.

"It was going to be now or never, this was my only opportunity to help the school," she

"I'm bringing him here each day, working with Tam and training him for the school, we will slowly introduce him to the classrooms

"At the moment it is just getting him familiar with all the noises, people and the goings on at school, just to make him a relaxed dog.

Basil's role at the school is to help calm students and not to become a distraction in the

Ms Nicholls said the breed is a good fit for the role as they love to be around people and will show affection to anyone that shows it to

It has been a long process to get approval for Basil with former principal John Shelton signing off on the suggestion of a wellbeing dog before he retired at the end of last year.

"We were looking at getting a dog, I've always wanted one at the school so when Shannon came to me at the start of last term and said, I know you're interested in getting a dog what if it was my dog, I said absolutely," Ms Gould said.

"I wasn't in a position to have a puppy and this way if it doesn't work out then he just goes to Shannon's

"He's going to be a real resource we can use in our wellbeing space which we've integrated into the school over time.

"We have our own huddle space and he will be part of that which is fantastic, sometimes students don't need to have full on conversations, they just need a break.

"They can come in here and have puppy cuddles for five minutes and go back to class, it's that circuit breaker more than anything."

Part of Basil's training is to become accustomed to the classroom environment with his first brief visit taking place on Monday.

"He will get to see a lot of people at the library as well when Tam has her door open, nothing too overwhelming at this stage" Ms Nicholls said.

Last week Flow students received an unplanned visit as Ms Gould was away and with Ms Nicholls busy undertaking end of month

work the decision was made to send Basil across to the Millicent Community Learning Centre building.

"We are not doing a lot of that just yet but I was really busy and with Tam being away I had trust somebody over there to watch him." Ms Nicholls said.

"He should really be with Tam or myself at all times so we can pick up on his cues if he's had enough.

"It worked because they had five students there at most and they are a bit older, so they know not to be noisy.'

Both Ms Gould and Ms Nicholls have noticed a change in the atmosphere at school already, among both staff and students, finding that Basil helps spark conversation easily.

But at the end of the day the wellbeing of the dog is the most important thing.

"If it's not working for him, its' not working," Ms Gould said.

Ms Gould's role at MHS is focused on wellbeing across the school and replaces the role of school counsellor, supporting students through special education, attendance, funding support and day to day conversations about wide ranging subjects.

Bank SA on history app

In association with State Heritage, Penola's branch of National Trust SA has developed a mobile phone app called Penola Walk With History to enable people to learn more about historic sites within Penola on self guided tours. The following is one of the subjects from this app.

Bank of South Australia

The Bank of South Australia first operated in Penola through an agency or in rented prem-

W J George was the manager from 1876 to 1888 and Robert Goldsmith from 1883 to 1888.

In 1882 the vacant block on the corner of Church and Robe, now Riddoch, Streets was purchased and the plans were made to build the bank and residence.

Mr Barber, who also built the bank at Kingston, was the contractor and red sandstone from cave range Monbulla - the same kind used at Yallum House - was selected.

The South Australian Chronicle and Weekly Mail of March 1, 1879 reported: "At last the Kelly scare has reached Penola. The unusual movements of the police during the past few days and the precautionary measures taken to protect the banks have naturally led to the con-

clusion that the Kellys are expected! Mr Currie, Inspector of the Bank of South Australia, with three other persons who are known to be Adelaide detectives, arrived by coach this after-

Thankfully this scare came to nothing.

The Adelaide Evening Journal of August 13, 1889 reported: "On Saturday afternoon Mr Charles Newman, Manager of the local Bank of SA reported to the Police £11 in gold had been stolen from the teller's cash sometime after 11 o'clock at which time he used the tin containing it. So far there is no clue to the thief".

The Border Watch newspaper June 25, 1892 reported: "Today was the last day of the life of the Bank of South Australia (now merged in the Union Bank) in this town, and depositors and others were busy arranging their financial affairs with the bank officials ... the majority of the customers of the bank have transferred their accounts to the National Bank".

From 1901 to 1908 Doctors Prior and Magee rented the building as a residence and surgery.

It was then used as a private residence until 1939, when it was purchased for an office and store by the stock firm Goldsbrough Mort.

When they merged with Elder Smith & Co Ltd in 1962 this State Heritage Listed building became redundant for a period, before once again becoming a private residence.

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Short stays come at cost

The rise in popularity of short-term accommodation websites such as Airbnb combined with holiday homes has put pressure on the ability of Robe's businesses to find staff, according to Robe Council chief executive James Hoylman.

The town's popularity as a tourist destination has led to a housing shortage for people wanting to relocate there permanently, with properties used as private holiday homes or short-term holiday rental accommodation.

Despite a difference in the population of more than 24,000, at time of print Robe currently had more properties listed on Airbnb than Mount Gambier.

According to 2021 Census data, 923 houses in Robe are unoccupied, making up 58.8 per cent of the town's dwellings. The same data lists the entirety of the Limestone Coast's overall unoccupied dwellings at only 17.4 per cent.

The impact of a limited supply of housing for permanent residents means there are restrictions on the local workforce, which still needs to support the town during peak seasons.

Mr Holyman said the town's challenges are no different from other popular tourist destinations

"With the residential market running reasonably hot, the ability for workers to find accommodation is going to be limited," Mr Holyman said.

"If people wanted to come to Robe for the summer and have a working holiday, there would be no places for them to stay.

Vacancies for workers in town have been longstanding, according to Mr Holyman, with the council struggling to find enough workers at times.

"We have had a large number of vacancies

we have had difficulties filling," he said.

"We know some local businesses have given up, they have advertised for six or 12 months and have not been able to attract anybody, so they are just running on lower numbers."

My Hoylman said the council was in a tough spot, balancing the priorities of tourism with long-term residents. He said the council would look at solutions, but quick fixes would be hard to come by.

"I have had a conversation with people who develop in Robe, but that end of the market [affordable housing] is not as lucrative for them as building high-quality homes," Mr Holyman said.

"There is already a two to three year wait to get a local builder in Robe.

"Ideally, you would hope market forces would drive through demand somebody to step in and fill the gap in the market, but I do not think that is going to occur."

This pressure has contributed to rental shortages affecting the whole region, which is particularly strong in Robe. According to 2021 census data, only 134 of Robe's 1573 dwellings are rented out long-term.

"Robe has always not had a lot of long-term rental accommodation," Mr Holyman said.

"I think it has gotten worse, particularly because of the increase in living prices."

For those looking to work in Robe, Mr Holyman said perhaps people would need to consider living outside of the town.

"The other interesting one, when you look at it, is whether people have to live in the place they work," My Holyman said.

"If you were in Adelaide, it would be normal to travel 30 to 40 minutes to work, and Kingston is half an hour away.

"Are there other places people could have a more affordable base than Robe?"

The rugs, towels and linen that can't be sold are sent on to other charities like the SE Animal Welfare League and Salvation Army.


The shop now has EFTPOS facilities which has been a great asset in the short time it has been available.

A fascination for fungi

A fascination for fungi and their medicinal, therapeutic and environmental uses has led Feresh Pizarro on a journey to hosting mushroom foraging tours within her local community of Greenways as part of her new business, South Spore.

Ms Pizarro recently held five workshops at the Greenways oval after a commercial license with Forestry SA to hold tours at Mount Burr was rejected.

Initially receiving support and encouragement from Forestry SA the license application eventually failed at the last hurdle due a policy found within their regulations not allowing any fungi to be removed from trees or the forest floor.

"Unfortunately I couldn't hold them in Mount Burr as planned so we had them at Greenways oval instead" Ms Pizarro said.

"The community was so supportive, everyone was involved, neighbours came in to help me set up and another neighbour cut wood for the participants to be nice and toasty because it was quite cold some days, it's been wonderful."

The events are aimed to not only educate people on how to identify, forage and cook mushrooms but to expose people to the richness of fungi diversity in the area.

"A lot of people are scared of fungi because of poisonous mushrooms and it is really important to educate people about what not to eat and how to be certain what you find is an edible"

South Spore is based at Ms Pizarro's Greenways home which her and her family built and moved into two years ago.

"My husband and I use to be architects and we didn't want to invest in a massive million dollar debt for the rest of our lives so we came here, bought a piece of land and designed our own off the grid home.

"I'm going to be 100 per cent off grid and at the moment I am about 90 per cent waste free, in about three more months of experiments I'll be 100 per cent waste free as well."

Experiments underway to reduce the property's carbon footprints further include using farming by-products for the substrate to grow the mushrooms.

"I have a laboratory where I do all the culture work, I get the spores from mushrooms, reproduce them, clone them, find the best specimens and then inoculate my bags of substrate.

"But you have to put them somewhere there is high humidity and temperature controlled so they fruit to their maximum capacity and I'm building a chamber for this, with big refrigeration panels and air filtration, that's all off the grid as well and quite specific."

Although yet to officially launch South Spore Ms Pizarro was keen to begin educating people about the value of what is in their own backyard mentioning that some common mushrooms to the area sell for \$75 a kilo in Adelaide's Central Market.

Plans for the Greenways based business will include farm gate sales of mushrooms in fresh, dried and capsule form for supplement,

stocking medicinal products, teas, tinctures, creams, grow-kits, books for identification and foraging gear like baskets and knives.

"There will be workshops all year round in our house and in a tepee near the farm, about being off-grid and growing mushrooms, anyone with a tiny little greenhouse can grow mushrooms at home."

In the future Ms Pizarro is hoping to donate 10% of all profits from South Spore to fungi research which includes many possibilities, with certain mushrooms recently discovered to eat plastic, converting it from a toxic product to one that is fertile for the soil, and other research into using fungi to clean up oil spills.

"The research is really important, they are decomposers and recomposers, they turn death into life, they are amazing.

"We have soil because of fungi, otherwise we would be kilometres high of rubbish, dinosaur bones and who knows what.

"We are in a symbiotic relationship with them, we breathe in between 1 to 10 spores every breath and help them reproduce by just walking in the forest because we are spreading the spores.

"People don't realise how much we are interlinked and interconnected with fungi and how much fungi can help us solve so many problems we have."

With a strong belief that local people will benefit from knowing more about fungi Ms Pizarro is hopeful people of the South East take pride in the mushroom diversity found in the region and the potential they offer.

"We are so lucky and I'm thankful that people have been so receptive to this, because I thought I was weird.

"I met a guy from Beachport when foraging locally, in the middle of the forest there is this man with big gumboots the same as me, a big basket, a knife and a hoodie, and I'm like yes.

"He knows so much about it and I was so impressed and I kept coming across people, so it's not that weird I think" Ms Pizarro said with a laugh.

The foraging tours received positive feedback from the 65 participants involved in the

new enterprise with Mount Gambier resident Serena Wong summing up the day "It's so great to explore our own backyard, be more connected to our surroundings.

"Foraging for your own food, and learning more about fungi is such an empowering and rewarding experience.

"I learnt so much, and I really think anyone with an interest in living a more sustainable way would really get a lot out of it."

Jolion Ultra fills a niche

Jolion is the latest offering in an expanding range of SUVs from Chinese manufacturer Haval GWM. By the way, Jolion means 'first love' in Chinese.

You remember them, the guys that got the tradies all hot and bothered back in 2009 with cheap utes, followed soon after by the X200/ X240 SUV based on the same platform.

It was all about the price, but safety soon became an issue and the brand disappeared off the lots for a while it addressed this prob-

A couple of years ago Great Wall Motors became simply GWM, but it's still a bit confusing because Jolion is a Haval and a GWM at the same time -- and it carries both badges.

Whatever. The vehicles now come with a full array of safety equipment, with a range that chops and changes but now includes Jolion, the larger H6 and H6GT (coupe-shaped).

Jolion is the smallest and cheapest of the SUVs.

STYLING

Styling is a bit of a mixed bag. It doesn't add to the genre, but then it's in keeping with most of the offerings in this segment.

Jolion is priced from \$28,490 for the Premium grade, \$30,990 for the Lux, \$33,990 for the Ultra, and \$34,485 for the recently added Vanta with a fashionable black visage. Metallic paint adds \$495. All prices are driveaway.

Standard kit includes two-zone climate air, PM2.5 air filter, faux leather upholstery, real leather wrapped steering wheel, heated front seats, six-way electrically adjustable driver's seat four-way adjustable passenger seat.

Jolion Ultra sits on 18-inch alloys, with a panoramic sunroof, LED headlights, DRLs and fog lights, auto-dimming rear view mirror, auto lights and wipers, rear parking sensors plus a 360-degree camera.

It is backed by a 7-year unlimited kilometre warranty, 5 years roadside assist and 5 years Capped Price Servicing.

INFOTAINMENT

Infotainment consists of a big, bright 12.3inch touchscreen, six-speaker audio with DTS sound processing, Bluetooth, AM/FM radio, Android Auto and Apple Carplay, wireless phone charging, with a front USB port for data and charging and another one in the back for charging only -- plus a single 12-volt outlet in the front.

Bearing in mind that Ultra was the top-ofthe-line model, until Vanta came along, what it doesn't get is satellite navigation or DAB+ digital radio -- two big ticket items in car entertainment these days.

Yes, you can hook up your phone through CarPlay or Android Auto, and use it to provide navigation directions -- but try getting it to work when you don't have access to internet.

ENGINES / TRANSMISSIONS

Power is delivered by a 1.5 litre four-cylinder turbocharged petrol engine with outputs of 110kW from 5600 to 6000 revs and 220Nm of torque from 2000 to 4400 revs. It's the latter available across a reasonably wide band that gives the car its get up and go.

The engine is mated to a new generation 7-speed DCT transmission (twin clutch auto), with power pushed to the front wheels.

Jolion is yet to be tested by the ANCAP organisation, but offers a comprehensive range of safety support systems, including seven airbags, a rear-view camera with guidelines and Autonomous Emergency Braking with pedestrian and bicycle detection.

There's also Heads Up Display, Lane Departure Warning (LDW), Lane Keep Assist (LKA), Adaptive Cruise Control (ACC), Traffic Sign Recognition (TSR), Lane Change Assist with Blind Spot Monitoring (BSM) and Rear Cross Traffic Alert (RCTA). Of note is the driver fa-

tigue camera that protrudes like an accusing finger from the front, driver-side pillar is quick to tell you when you're doing the wrong thing.

In fact, you're likely to get sick of it and go looking for a switch to turn it off. We thought about it.

DRIVING

Jolion is quite large and comfortable for the price, with heated power-adjust front seats, air for back seat passengers and a handy-sized boot, with a space saver spare under the floor.

But BLEEP, the steering wheel does not have reach adjustment.

There are four driving modes, Normal, Eco, Sport and Snow, with fuel consumption a claimed 8.1L/100km on the combined cycle from a 60-litre tank.

Built on the company's new LEMON global lightweight modular platform, Jolion replaces the previous, smaller H2.

It's 4472mm long, 1841mm wide, and 1619mm high, with a 2700mm wheelbase, with a kerb weight of 1345 to 1370kg, giving it the edge over many competitors.

The ride feels reasonably comfortable on well-formed surfaces, but can be harsh at

Swap to a Japanese SUV for comparison purposes and you might change your mind, however. Mitsubishi's Eclipse Cross is a good example, because it has a far more refined

The 1.5-litre turbocharged engine offers a good compromise between performance and fuel economy.

But again, there is an issue with refine ment, because throttle response is jerky and sporadic, and can be an issue in low-speed parking manoeuvres.

Like a lot of twin clutch transmissions, it can be slow to hook up.

Changing between forward and reverse with the round gear selector can also be tricky when you're in a hurry, say if you overshoot a driveway and have to do a short, quick backup.

To switch between drive modes, you need to access the infotainment system.

We tried Sport mode which became intolerable after a while, but it is one of the few cars that we have driven that will stay in the selected mode between starts.

The head-up display is a bonus. So is speed sign recognition.

But the adaptive cruise control system could also do with some refinement, especial-

ly when it brakes for no apparent reason, with constant tugging on the wheel even when the indicator has been activated (which should indicate to the system you are changing lanes on purpose).

Then there's the repeated warnings that you're too close to the vehicle in front. Drop back and someone is sure to cut in.

And what about the "smart dodge function" which steers the car to the right if you're passing a truck or bus.

Accessing the trip computer can be a challenge. The trick is to hold down the OK button on the right side of the steering wheel and wait for the display to change, which can take several seconds.

After that, you can cycle through the different screens, but it quickly reverts to the standard screen once you're moving.

The audio is okay, but not quite on par with competitors, even with DTS processing.

We were getting 7.8L/100km after 537km, with another couple of hundred kilometres to go, and it takes standard 91 RON unleaded.

Boot space is a generous 430 litres with the rear seats in place, or 1133L with them folded and the wagon has a 1500kg braked tow ca-
