Plan for progress

Wattle Range Council endorsed its new Draft Strategic Land Use Plan at a meeting this week following the consultation.

The new plan will help guide the Council on local land matters until 2047 and looks at all townships within the Wattle Range area.

The plan identified Millicent as the key ser-

vice centre for the district, with 13 key actions to guide the town's land into the future. Actions in the plan for Millicent:

- Support the development of Millicent's town centre consistent with the Town Centre Concept Design, including potential residential development which is ancillary to, or does not prejudice the operation of, commercial facilities.
- Support the development of age-friendly housing including Independent Living Units and Residential Aged Care, particularly close to the town centre, including with public realm upgrades.
- Support the development of the railway lands precinct, including seeking a rezoning of the site under the Planning and Design Code.

 Seek to amend the Planning and Design Code to rezone Lake McIntyre to a Zone reflective of its use for recreational purposes and an important space for biodiversity.

Support, in principle, industrial development in the Strategic Employment Zone to the west of the town.

Cash for community

Community, sporting and recreation groups are now invited to apply for Wattle Range Council's (WRC) current round of grant funding.

The funding consists of Community Financial Assistance Grants up to \$2,000, Sport and Recreation Grants up to \$2,000 and Community Infrastructure Grants up to \$50,000.

Millicent Bowling Club were one of four clubs to receive an Infrastructure Grant in the last round, successfully applying for and receiving \$13,143 to underground their power supply with a last minute application.

Last year the club had received notification of a successful Federal Government grant from the Office for recreation, sport and racing for \$43,300 to build a new shelter between the A greens.

Finding out after the paperwork had been filed and approved that the work could not begin until the power line that ran above the existing shelters was removed.

"The people who were going to put it up weren't allowed to work under the lines, plus if the lines break or something then you're in trouble." Steve Carnellor Vice President of the club said.

Club secretary Sarah Ross said "It was perfect timing, when we found out we that we had to do it we only had a week to put the grant application in.

"We weren't thinking of applying for it until

"If we knew beforehand that the lines had to be shifted we would've factored that into our original grant, but we didn't and it was the Wattle Range grant to the rescue."

The Federal grant assisted in funding the installation of the new shelter and extensive paving and the WRC Infrastructure Grant covered the cost of removing the stobie pole, putting the power underground and upgrading and moving the existing power box.

Both grants required a 50 percent contribution from the club.

Ms Ross spoke highly of the assistance received from council during the process "There is someone at the council who can help, we took all our stuff in with us and they told us what we needed."

Four WRC groups received Infrastructure Grants in the last round totalling \$123,143.

106 years young

Boneham Aged Care Services (BACS) resident Dardanella Williams recently celebrated her 106th birthday with a birthday cake and lunch at the site's La Fromelles cafe surrounded by close family.

Better known as Dell, she was born and raised on a farm at Lillimur in Victoria to Florence (nee Powell) and William Williams on August 2, 1916 the eldest of four siblings, Elva, Ruby and Allen.

Her birth was during World War 1 and this influenced the name choice with Florence's brother, Jack Powell, serving during the Dardanelles Campaign in Turkey.

Mary Altschwager has fond memories of her aunt and spending school holidays with the Williams family.

"She was great when we were kids because mum had the hair salon in Millicent so in school holidays my brother and I were packed off to Bordertown to either stay with grandma or grandpa or with Aunty Dell.

"Aunty Dell having seven children was great for us, and on a farm, we had a lovely time."

Mrs Williams and her husband Harry had five boys and two girls, and farmed at Bordertown for many years eventually retiring to Kingston.

Her son Bruce Williams said "They spent a lot of time at Hervey Bay with the caravan travelling around and then moved to Mount Gambier.

"Dad was feeling a bit crook at times and that's one of the reasons he bought mum to Millicent because she had two sisters here, Ruby Rogers and Elva England, they've since passed away."

Harry Williams died in 2002 and Mrs Williams remained living in her own home for the next 16 years until she was 102, reluctantly taking up residence at BACS and selling her home.

It was a difficult decision with Ms Altschwa-

ger saying "Della had been such an independent woman for so long.

"She lived in the same street as my mum, Ruby, and would walk half the length of Fifth Street to play cards together.

"Occasionally they would get into arguments about the rules of the game but they were always great friends, really close.

"They moved to Millicent so that Dell had her sisters close by if anything happened, and as it turned out it did, and they were all there for each other."

The family all commented on her skills as a crafter and a cook and daughter Anne Wicks said "She loved all sorts of crafts, her crocheting was just beautiful." These days Mrs Williams hearing and eyesight are failing and her mobility is slowing her down, until as recently as last year she was still helping to cook scones at BACS.

Four of Mrs Williams children travelled to be with her on the day, coming from Geelong, Bordertown, Murray Bridge and Mount Gambier with one son in Perth, who phones every Sunday, unable to make the trip.

Sadly two of Mrs Williams sons have predeceased her.

The siblings rarely get the opportunity to get together with Ms Wicks saying "She had a lovely time, and we are lucky she is in such a wonderful facility."

Landing zone: Start on jetty renovations

After months of delays, works on the Southend Jetty have commenced, with Beachport soon to follow.

Organised by the Department of Infrastructure and Transport (DIT), the works will help maintain the two jetties relied upon by local fishermen to complete their work.

The works commenced last week and will repair the four lower landings by September. Other maintenance on the structure is expected to be completed in early 2023.

Works on the Beachport Jetty are expected to begin in September, which will refurbish timber piles framework, decking and rails on the structure, as well as install new safety ladders, replace decking, and repair landings, handrails and fenders.

While the works on Southend Jetty landings will be completed ahead of the crayfishing season, Beachport fishermen will not be so lucky, with works on their jetty expected to last around a year.

When the project is underway, the end section of the Jetty will be closed to the public, with the shore end closed intermittently. Jetty fuel supply is expected to be impacted, but DIT has stated prior notice will be provided.

"The Department for Infrastructure and Transport is working closely with the local commercial fishing industry to ensure there are no adverse impacts to their fishing operations while this important work is undertaken," a DIT spokesperson said.

According to DIT the delays were caused by a legnthy procurement phase and difficulty supply of some materials. The Department did not respond to questions on why the Beachport project would take longer than initially planned.

An action point on the installation of fur-

ther Norfolk Island Pine along Beachport's Railway Tce was taken out of the plan at the meeting. According to the State Government, the contract for the work was given to Maritime Constructions, with 25 full-time equivalent contractors needed to complete the projects.

Infrastructure Minister Tom Koutsantonis said the renovations would ensure the future safety of the facilities.

"Beachport Jetty is one of the longest and most picturesque jetties in South Australia, it is a state heritage asset and is a popular fishing and recreational hot spot, both for locals and for visitors to the region," Mr Koutsantonis said.

"As well as being used for recreational purposes, Southend Jetty is one of the busiest commercial jetties during the fishing season, and the local commercial fishing industry relies on its six lower landings for its operations."

- Consider rezoning the part of the Strategic Employment Zone to the south of the Southern Ports Highway (Rendelsham Road) for a zone which is more reflective of its mixed-use nature.
- Support the development of a non-government secondary school campus.
- Allow smaller allotments in the existing Rural Living Zone, without expanding the spatial extent of this zone and allow for the future expansion of the Rural Neighbourhood Zone into the adjacent Rural Living Zone.
- Seek to amend the Planning and Design Code to rezone the Employment Zone on Lossie Road for residential purposes.
- Consider streetscape upgrades and a township entrance statement along the Princes Highway on the eastern fringe of Millicent, as well as seeking to amend the Planning and Design Code to rezone the existing Employment Zone to reflect its mixed-use nature.
- Seek to amend the Planning and Design Code to rezone the area of Rural Zone between Willow Bank Road, the railway line and the Princes Highway for township-sized residential development.
- Seek to amend the Planning and Design Code to rezone the cemetery and quarry with an appropriate zone to reflect their use.
- Support the development of a variety of infill sites across Millicent.

The report highlighted that Millicent's population is not expected to grow substantially over the next 25 years, but new areas for land still needed to be considered. "It is unlikely that there will be strong demand for expanded commercial or retail development in the town centre, with some potential excess land," the report stated.

"Millicent's population increased by only one person between the 2016 and 2021 Censuses, to a population of 5,110 in 2021, Millicent had 78 net additional dwellings over the same period.

"This illustrates the way that new land supply is needed, even in situations where the population is stable."

Key priorities for Penola included additional zoning of residential and industrial land, and supporting the implementation of aged care facilities or developments.

Within Beachport, 13 actions were identified which would help combat future erosion and help ease land pressures within the township by allowing threestory builds and expanding commercial and light industrial activities to the nearby Muggleton. The plan was finalised in July by consultancy firm Holmes Dyer. The consultation report stated that feedback on the Millicent section was "generally supportive" with minimal changes made from the initial plan.

Any actions from the plan that review code amendments will still need to go through a targeted community consultation process.

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Mary MacKillop feast day

Last Monday was the celebration of Mary MacKillop Feast day at Penola.

It was a day to celebrate Australia's first and only Saint.

A whole school mass was held in St Joseph's Catholic Church with other visitors also attending including students from schools in Western Victoria.

After Mass, students returned to classrooms and continued learning about Mary and participated in a series of activities for the remainder of the day.

"It is a very special day and people come from everywhere to visit the centre at Penola," Catholic parishioner Claire Larkin said.

Mary was born in Fitzroy in Melbourne in 1842 and in 1860 at the age of 18 moved to Penola.

It was in Penola where she met Father Julian Tenison Woods, a priest and scientist, and set up her first school, holding lessons in a small cottage.

In 1866 she set up her first dedicated school in a stable.

This site is remembered today as the Mary MacKillop Stable School park and is located on Queen Street.

In 1867 the classes moved to a purposebuilt school now referred to as the Woods-MacKillop schoolhouse, located on the corner of Petticoat Lane.

While in Penola she also started up the Sisters of St Joseph's with the help of Father Woods.

Within weeks of the schoolhouse opening, Mary boarded the steamship SS Penola for the journey to Adelaide where she went on to establish the Cathedral school hall, officially took vows and became Mary of the Cross.

Within five years of taking her vows she

The idea to create more connections with Millicent High School (MHS) students to areas around the school has led to the latest arts project being undertaken.

Six redgum totem poles are currently being painted by students Demi Bevan, Deni Brown, Chloe Gysbers and Ebony Gardin with guidance and assistance from MHS Aboriginal Education Officer Jenny Bishop.

With themes representing the Aboriginal, Torres Strait Islander and Australian flags, local animals, respect and meeting places the totems will be placed in front of the school facing Mount Burr Road.

The site will be landscaped and paved and include the installation of a newly painted picnic table to complement the totems and create a space to meet.

Ms Bishop said "We've got four girls that are helping to do these totem poles.

"I picked who I knew was going do a good job and what these young girls are doing is beautiful, they are such good little artists.

"I wanted non-aboriginal kids to be involved in this as well as its about them to, it's not just about my little mob.

"They get right into it, they love it."

MHS principal Todd Watson said "For a long time we have had the garden (Indigenous meeting place) that a lot of time and effort has gone in to, and that is a great meeting place for special occasions and some of the projects we do but it is a little bit out of the way.

"Here is an opportunity to have something that is pride of place in front of the school to recognise the connections that our school does have.

"And it doesn't need to just be Indigenous students, if we want coming together we want everyone to have a part in it, and the kids are really on board.

"Any opportunity we get to have our kids

have a connection to school and connection to country I think it is fantastic."

Ms Bishop added "That is why I like doing meeting places because when you all come together you come together as one"

"I think they are going to look beautiful, it is a privilege to do it and having something here of my art and the kids art, I think its great."

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Hotel in the march of time

In association with State Heritage, Penola's branch of National Trust SA has developed a mobile phone app called Penola Walk With History to enable people to learn more about historic sites within Penola on self guided tours. The following is one of the subjects from this app.

PRINCE OF WALES HOTEL

In the early years of Penola, Alexander Cameron's Royal Oak was the only licensed hotel in the town.

In 1860 its former licensee, John Bowden, built his own hotel, the Prince of Wales.

His son-in-law, AJ Edwards, who married feisty horsewoman Catherine Jane Bowden, owned the hotel in 1862 and sold it to John Reilly in 1882.

Members of the Reilly family managed the hotel and in 1949 changed the name to Reilly's Hotel.

When Charles Reilly died in 1951 the busi-

ness was leased.

A galvanised iron building at the rear acted as sample rooms.

Merchants from Adelaide and Melbourne would visit the town regularly to display and sell their goods from these rooms.

Advertisements in the Border Watch in 1882 offered "Every Accommodation for Commercial Gentlemen and South-Eastern Line of Royal Mail Coaches call daily". The Basheer family from the Kalangadoo Hotel purchased the hotel from Messrs JK & LJ Reilly, Mrs H Hubber and Dr John Rollison in December 1963 and took over the management in 1964.

In 1965 they demolished the old building and built the present one, renaming it the Log Cabin Hotel-Motel.

This was opened by Mr F Walsh, Premier of South Australia on July 11, 1966.

Soon after the change of ownership, and before the demolition of the old building, there was great interest one Saturday afternoon following Penola Football A Grade team winning the premiership when three local identities, Bray Kidman, Andy Anderson and Graeme Robertson each rode an elephant from Bullen's Circus down Church Street.

The elephant handler, who had been in the pub for some time, took a bet that he could have his elephant reach through the front door of the pub and take a glass of beer from the bar. He almost succeeded, but lost the bet.

The elephant was quickly removed when it

was discovered that the cellar was immediately beneath him. Mr Fred Basheer, one of the new owners,

was reported as having a conniption before the elephant was moved. A conniption is described as a feeling of panic or hysteria.

There have been many different owners since and in recent years the name of the pub was quite rightly changed back to the original Prince of Wales.

Roach, an extremely talented musician, vocalist and story teller passed away recently after a long illness.

Sue Bell from Bellwether Wines said she was extremely sad when she awoke to the news that Archie had passed.

"Archie was a true survivor, yet died too young after an incredibly tough life.

"He was the ultimate optimist even though he was a member of the stolen generation," Sue said.

Roach survived homelessness, alcoholism, a stroke, lung cancer and losing the love of his life, Ruby Hunter.

Throughout life's challenges Roach always said it was love and music that always saved him and brought him back.

"One of my favourite memories at Bellwether was when Archie came to Coonawarra as our guest for the 2016 Penola Coonawarra Arts festival.

"The show was supported by Nancy Bates and Kelly Menhennett.

"An evening of stories and song with only 75 people, all mesmerised by Archie's warmth and ability to tell stories of harsh truth, yet make you smile, laugh and cry in as many moments," Sue said.

Roach survived much hardship but he always got back up and looked for the positives in life and spread alot of love.

He educated the world about Australia's dark history of the stolen generation with his music.

He was able to make people listen and try to understand the hurt it caused.


"I am so sorry Archie's life was unfair in many unnecessary ways, and to his family at this time.

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Pharaoh is on the move

Millicent High School's (MHS) 7 foot tall limestone pharaoh statue has stood as a silent sentinel on school grounds since 1969 and after approximately 20 years at its current site, a grassed island at the front of the building, it will soon be re-located.

The pharaoh and nearby limestone pyramid will be moved to make room for a new Indigenous statement sculpture currently being painted by students and Jenny Bishop the MHS Aboriginal Education Officer.

MHS principal Todd Watson said "I still want to keep them because to me they are a part of the history of the school.

"Some people question why it is front of our school, it is still part of our school history that students have been involved in."

The plan is to relocate the pharaoh to the Western entrance in the corner of the the existing playground which is very close to the site on which it was originally carved.

To unravel some of the mystery that surrounds the why of the pharaoh the South Eastern Times spoke to Ian Were the MHS art teacher behind the project at the time.

"I was appointed (to MHS) in 1966 and stayed for four years, 1969 was my last year, I was young and enthusiastic and not that much older than some of the students who were 16/17.

"I was greatly taken with the limestone quarries when I visited, they always reminded me of an archaeological site.

"My memory isn't clear but I believe each student was given a small block of limestone and we did some smaller carvings at one stage to work out what might be appropriate and what you can carve, limestone is soft and can easily break the forms can't be overly complicated.

"It was this particular fourth year class of boys and I thought it would be a great project for them, everyone designed something and

one of the students did a small pharaoh.

"There were lots of possibilities and we could've done a simple abstract shape but we decided that we liked the idea of a person.

"The pharaoh was good because the hands weren't hanging out and there weren't bits that could be easily broken, the shape of the throne meant there was less carving.

"When the block was delivered I think it

was 3 cubic metres or something like that, it was a hefty block.

"I was keen to do different things and we did whatever we could that involved the students outside the classroom.

"One of the projects was in the admin building, there was the tall atrium with windows around the top, we got a very tall ladder and measured the windows and did some contemporary stained glass windows using

cellophane and cardboard, that was a fun project to do."

Mr Were was appointed to Mount Gambier Technical High School after his four years at MHS and spent a total of seven years in the South East "It was a really interesting time to be there at a relatively young age and many of us were involved in things like the Company of 7.

"We started painting backdrops for their various productions and other staff members were in those productions."

Although Mr Were said he enjoyed teaching in the country he did not find the city placements as fulfilling and left teaching to make his own artwork for a number of years eventually moving into arts writing and editing in the mid 90's.

Now living in Brisbane for almost 20 years his links to Millicent don't stop with the pharaoh as he currently writes for a local online newspaper the Westender edited by ex Millicent resident Jan Bowman.

"I met her accidentally in the West End in Brisbane and she said she came from Millicent and we worked out the year I left the school she started as a student."

Mr Were has been back to view the sculpture from the roadside in recent years and in a 1969 edition of the South Eastern Times that recorded the carving he was quoted as saying "If it looks any good when it's finished, it'll stay."

The five fourth year students that worked on the seven foot high statue were Graeme Manhood, Dale Zadow, Stuart Iain, Ronald Thomas and Peter Moorfoot.

The nearby pyramid was carved by Ivo Tadic around the year 2000 and the pharaoh was painted a few years later in 2006.

Hannah Wilson was a year eight student at the time and confirmed she was involved in the painting "It was done as part of a community project to beautify the school, my group decided it would be a good idea to paint it.

"We didn't do any research into the back story of how it got there at all."


"We need more committee members and volunteers to come on board so this event can continue on to make it the success it is.

Roadworks are nearing completion

Line marking along the Southern Ports Highway near Millicent should soon be completed, according to the Department of Infrastructure (DIT).

The works which started in May have been long delayed, initially set to be finished in early June before being pushed delayed multiple times.

A DIT spokesperson said the line marking should be completed by the end of this week, barring any further delays to weather.

As soon as the line marking is completed, speed limits along the section of the highway should return to normal.

The spokesperson said any remaining patching and resurfacing works along the Southern Ports Highway would resume when the weather improves and ground temperatures increase which is expected from September 2022. Other highways within the region have also been subject to line marking delays, which the department claimed were due to weather and a shortage of available line marking contractors.

The workshops that were held throughout the festival were very well supported and it is planned to run these in 2023.

The committee will be searching for financial assistance in the way of grants to help run the festival. The John Shaw Neilson Art competition will once again be held and with a \$12,000 first prize there will be many artists starting to prepare their entries.

BMW iX3 looks the part

BMW iX3 is the full electric version of German marque's mid-sized X3.

It has no internal combustion engine to provide extra range if its batteries run out of power.

It's sold in Australia with quite a few features that are frequently extra cost options; these include metallic paint and the M Sport package with 20-inch M aerodynamic wheels. **STYLING**

Very BMW. While other makers of electric vehicles like to go for a different perhaps futuristic look, the iX3 looks instantly like a Bimmer from any angle.

There are some blue highlights on the outer edges of the lower sections of the front and at each corner of the lower panel at the rear.

There are also blue colours on the BMW "radiator grille".

Obviously, it doesn't have a grille because there is no water being cooled there.

BMW and other EV, makers do include a grille because buyers feel that a plain front end just looks wrong.

Mind you Elon Musk's Teslas don't have a grille either and are selling faster than the factory can produce them...

Also standard is a panoramic sunroof that covers most of the roof area.

INTERIOR

The dashboard area is divided into three distinct areas. That in front of the driver has a 12.3-inch digital instrument cluster.

There's another 12.3-inch digital screen in the centre of the dash area.

It's wide, but rather too low which means the view ahead on the screen if our using it for navigation isn't as far ahead as we like.

On the other hand, the width of the screen means you can see a lot of the things that you are missing out to the side of your road.

Which may mean that you see things that you hadn't realised were there, and perhaps decide to visit if you're on a sightseeing trip.

Comfort and space in the front seats is good, with a wide range of electric adjustments. It has under-thigh cushion extenders, which I really enjoy as I have long legs and these add further ways of getting comfortable.

In their own way these cushion extenders probably add to the safety on long trips because drivers are safer if they aren't wriggling about to stay relaxed.

INFOTAINMENT

Our iX3 had the BMW Connected Package Professional which has Apple CarPlay and Android Auto and a Harman/Kardon 16-speaker surround sound system.

There's wireless smartphone charging which saves having to wrestle with cables. Just put your phone in its spot and you're getting more juice into it.

POWERTRAIN

eDrive is the new drive technology found in all BMW i models and plug-in hybrids, and is essentially comprised of an electric motor, highvoltage lithium-ion battery and an intelligent energy management system.

ants. However, the iX3 has not been tested at this stage.

Ways of avoiding a crash are strongly featured in this electric Bimmer.

It has automatic emergency with crossroads warning, lane-keep assist, blind-spot monitoring, front and rear cross-traffic alert, evasion assistant, speed limit assist, as well as Steering + Lane Control Assistant (Level 2 autonomous mode).

DRIVING

Performance! This is why we like driving all electric vehicles.

They have instant reaction to the accelerator pedal. BMW has always produced vehicles with a sporty feel in everything they do and that performance is just wonderful in any model they make.

This is going to sound childish but I like nothing more than to sit at a red traffic light beside a big car that's got a lumpy sounding V8. I look at him, and he looks at me in my black SUV and blips his throttle - ready to make me look silly when the green lights come on.

The lights change and that instant electric torque pushes me back in the seat, in about three seconds we are up to 80 km/h and I back off. The other driver comes alongside, checks out the tame looking Bimmer and shakes his head.

Handling of the BMW iX3 is pretty good, but there's a feeling of heaviness when you're taking corners at speed due to the fact that you're carting about half a tonne of batteries about.

There's good feel through the steering wheel and the seats support well so you don't shift about when driving hard and can concentrate on the road.

BMW says the iX3 can cover 460 kilometres on a full battery charge. During our testing on motorways, in the suburbs and on country
