Changes are being proposed to both the constitution and existing committee structure of the Millicent Business Community Association (MBCA) at the next Annual General Meeting scheduled for Wednesday, August 24.

MBCA committee is making moves to replace the current structure with an executive board consisting of four or five members and are looking for external funding options that would pay for a part-time executive officer who would report directly to the new executive.

Current chair of the MBCA Lee Morgan said about the planned changes: "It is for improved governance, the executive officer drives the functions of the MBCA rather than committee members being expected to volunteer and do things over and above running their business.

"The executive officer reports to the executive on critical actions.

"It makes it a bit more streamlined, the executive committee will get regular reports on a monthly basis and they have to approve certain actions.

"The executive officer reports who they have interacted with and what things have been achieved - that way you are tracking the progress occurring and it becomes far more professional.

"This is a far more efficient and effective way of doing it; of course, you have to pay someone.

Changes to footy loom

The future of football and netball in the region is under review by a South Australian National Football League (SAN-FL) investigative committee.

All three South East leagues will be involved in the analysis, in the wake of the Casterton Sandford Football and Netball Club's application to move from the Western Border to Mid South Eastern competition.

Should their application be approved by the state body, it would leave the Western Border as a five-team competi-tion, reigniting the discussion for a possible restructure.

"I'm prepared to do this for the interim period, with the implication that I would have to step down as chair because I can't do both from a separation of powers perspective."

Mr Morgan is hopeful this approach would attract aspiring community leaders to consider being on boards and build an understanding of good governance, with the group already in discussions with potential executive members.

The proposed new executive would include chairperson, deputy chairperson and two others with financial and business interest oversight with the executive officer taking on the secretarial role.

Constitutional changes being proposed are changing the name to chairperson throughout as it currently interchanges with president, and bi-monthly meetings instead of the current monthly ones and approval to hold meetings online via Zoom or Teams. The quorum will be 50 per cent plus one of the executive and amending responsibilities of the executive officer.

All members of the MBCA are welcome to attend the AGM at Millicent's Shearer's Cook Cafe at 7pm.

Tree change for metal recyclers, starts new chapter

After 40 years of family ownership, Millicent's scrap metal recyclers has changed hands.

The new owners, Emma and Gary Soghomonian, have relocated from Sydney to take over the business, after Mr Soghomonian and his father sold their own family-owned automotive recycling enterprise after 20 years of ownership.

Ms Soghomonian explained how they decided to make the move to the region.

"We were having a look around for something new and there wasn't anything catching our eye in NSW, then we started to venture further and further and we found ourselves in Millicent.

"It wasn't planned that we were coming to South Australia but it just so happened that Manny and Judy (Valcarcel-Fuentes) were ready for their next adventure and we saw the business.

"We made a few trips here, sort of fell in love with the area and thought it was about time for a change.

"Also meeting the original owners Joe and Anne has been great, Gary and Joe share their Spanish heritage and get on well, so they have formed a bit of a bond.

"It is daunting coming into a small country town where everybody knows everyone, we are not going to make huge changes, we'll keep it as it is, improve on our quality of service and keep supporting the locals around here."

The new owners are still settling into their new business with settlement taking place early July.

"We have all the same employees here, one has retired, and we have since hired a truck driver and another to help in the yard."

In 1979, the business started from humble beginnings in Kalangadoo by Joe and Anne Valcarcel-Fuentes where the couple were caretakers for the local rubbish dump for half a day each Sunday. From collecting and reselling scrap metal, paper and recyclable cans and bottles to eventually purchasing what was known as a Marine Dealer's licence, the business outgrew the family's small backyard.

Eventually, the family returned to Millicent and later set up the Aberle Street business in 1999, with their two sons Juanito and Manny taking over the business in 2010.

NYE dry zone extended

Wattle Range Council have approved changes to alcohol-free "dry" zones in Beachport, despite concerns from Councillor Sharon Cox the move could impact tourism.

At a meeting earlier this month, the council moved to implement another dry zone over New Year's Eve in addition to previously implemented zones. The new short-term dry zone will be in effect for 24 hours from 12pm on 31 December, along the Beachport foreshore area.

The dry zone area encompasses Beach Road as well as the beaches, jetty and public spaces from the drain outlet through to Glenn Point, where the consumption or possession of liquor will be prohibited. The dry zone will not affect the consumption of alcohol at private properties.

According to council chief executive Ben Gower, the new zone was a request from the local police force.

Cr Cox raised concerns at a council meeting earlier this month the change could deter tourists from visiting or impact Beachport Brewing Co, which is next to the dry zone.

She said during the discussion she is worried people who had bought sealed goods from the business may be hassled by police when transporting them through the dry zone.

Mr Gower said during the meeting he, along with other council staff, had met with police representatives, who said there had been problems with underage drinking at the previous New Year's Eve celebrations, and the change would allow them to better control future incidents

Cr Cox said she could not understand why the change was needed, as underage drinking is illegal outside of dry zones already, and the move could be an overcorrection for a few minor incidents.

Councillor Agnew was supportive of Cr Cox's comments, but other councillors pres-

Association calls for more court support

A long-term plan to enhance the social side of the Millicent and District Basketball Association (MDBA) through a new \$700,000 viewing platform and function room is well underway to completing stage one of the two stage project.

Initial plans were to complete the ambitious build in one stage but a lack of funding has broken the project into two phases.

Stage one is to complete the lower level of the viewing platform which will be encased in glass along the front and sides, and includes two large glass windows to view the back courts.

Plans for this space include a kitchen, bar, seating and amenities block with disability access, and a row of courtside seating along the outside of the new space.

MDBA stadium manager Peter Seebohm said: "The project we are going to finish is about \$540,000. We were lucky enough to get a \$211,000 grant from the previous Federal Government's Building Better Regions funding and \$40,000 from the Wattle Range Council.

"The balance of the project we have either fundraised or borrowed against the project for ourselves."

Three years for cannabis

A Beachport man has been sentenced to more than three years in prison, having been caught growing more than 300 cannabis plants on Crown land.

Ronald Herbert Nieuwenhuizen was sentenced for one count of cultivating a large commercial quantity of a controlled plant earlier this month at the Mount Gambier District Court.

The court heard that in November 2020, when checking a property on Sir William Mills Drive for a suspected illegal firearm, police found two plastic resealable bags of cannabis and 345 immature cannabis plants growing on nearby Crown land.

A further 54 cannabis seedlings were found in a small cottage on the premises.

After searching a neighbouring property, police found Nieuwenhuizen, who had been living in a caravan on the lot, who later admitted to planting the cannabis.

The court heard it was Nieuwenhuizen who was responsible for watering and caring for the cannabis plants with hopes of eventually selling the marijuana so he could upgrade his caravan.

He admitted to drinking heavily and consuming drugs at the time of the offence, which Nieuwenhuizen's counsel claimed had impaired his ability to make rational decisions.

Judge Geraldine Davison, when handing down her sentence, highlighted Nieuwenhuizen's role in the operation. "You were a willing and central participant in this drug operation for the purpose of profit," Judge Davison said.

"Your role was to prepare the pots, plant the seedlings, tend the seedlings, and tend to the plants as they grew to maturity.

"I am not satisfied that your role was as limited as your counsel initially submitted.

"I am, however, satisfied that you were not the sole participant in this large enterprise."

Nieuwenhuizen's guilty plea had been considered in the judgement, receiving a prison sentence of three years, four months, and 25 days, which would have been four years had he been found guilty bytrial.

A "relatively low" non-parole period of one year was set by Judge Davison due to Nieuwenhuizen's health and role in relation to the cultivation.

While a suspended sentence was considered, Judge Davison ultimately decided it was not appropriate.

"This was a significant and planned criminal operation that could have had a major detrimental impact upon society," Judge Davison said.

"I have taken into account your personal circumstances, including your poor health.

"However, this does not outweigh the need for general and personal deterrence.

"I have determined that there is no good reason to suspend the term of imprisonment that I have imposed; nor can it, in your circumstances, be served on home detention."

No reply

Community member David Walshaw is planning to write to Consumer and Business Services (CBS) about local community radio station 5THE FM, after no response to membership applications has been received.

Mr Walshaw was one of 70 community members who submitted membership applications last month, but no response has been received to any of the applicants.

"We have had no response, I am concerned the membership applications have not been actioned," Mr Walshaw said.

"People who were at the meeting are asking what is going on, as they have heard nothing."

Mr Walshaw told the South Eastern Times he plans to write to the CBS compliance and enforcement unit about the situation.

"I want to let them know what has happened with our membership applications, why is there no public officer, why has there been no notification of the Annual General Meeting (AGM)," he said.

"All we are asking for is some transparency...all we are hearing is a deafening silence from the radio station.

"There are 70 local people who want to know the progress of their application and what has happened to their application money."

The station has not publicly advertised its AGM, which according to a copy of its constitution, must be held within three months of the end of the financial year.

The South Eastern Times made multiple attempts to ask 5THE FM for information on if the memberships would be processed or when the station's AGM would be held. No response was received at time of print.

Lest we Forget

Locals will gather at the Penola War Memorial today and pay tribute to the brave Australians that fought in the Vietnam War for Vietnam Veterans Day.

The day, which is also known as Long Tan Day, commemorates the brave Australians that fought in the Vietnam War.

It is held on August 18 to commemorate the Battle of Long Tan where, in a rubber plantation, Australian soldiers fought one of the fiercest battles in 1966.

The men of the 6th Battalion Royal Australian Regiment faced a force of around 2000 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong troops.

The battle resulted in the largest number



of casualties in a single operation since the Australian Task Force had established its base at nearby Nui Dat the previous April, with 17 Australians killed in action and 25 wounded.

Penola Vietnam veteran Neville Dixon said he joined the army at the young age of 21, in search of a great adventure to get him away from his farming life in Kalangadoo.

"I enlisted in 1966, because I missed the call up," he said.

"I just wanted to get away from home for a while because we're out on a farm, so I joined the Army in September 1967 for three years."

He was sent to Wagga Wagga for recruit training and then to Ingleburn for infantry training, which was "fairly intense".

"The battalion had to be ready by November 1968 to go to Vietnam, so training was very intensive to get us ready."

He was then posted to the ninth battalion, which embarked to Vietnam on November 10, 1968. "Before I went in I didn't know a lot about Vietnam, but to me, it was an adventure until things got a bit real."

Like many that served in Vietnam, he saw many of his fellow soldiers fall, many to landmines, and had a few close calls himself.


"In one case, I was walking through a gap in the bamboo and the lad behind me walked on a landmine and it went off, but luckily it went off in the ground and never sprang out the ground," he said.

"It threw him about 10 metres and I was just in front of him, he broke his legs but he came good - he was very lucky.

"Another incident not long after that, there were three of us standing with our platoon sergeant, and he stood on a mine, and we were sort of standing in a group.

"The thing jumped out the ground and never went off."

Although the experience was tough, and





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He said things became more real for all the men once they landed in Vietnam.

"None of us had ever been overseas before. I think reality sort of struck when we were getting off the boat - before we got off the boat, they handed us live ammunition," he said.

"In Australia you'd use blanks and things like that, and then it suddenly dawned on us, this is real."

In his company he served with keen young men that had signed up willingly, but also with national servicemen - men who were conscripted.

"I've always felt that we shouldn't have called people up and send them off to Vietnam, because we didn't even do it in the First World War," he said.

"That was my feeling, but I was keen to serve.

like many other returned soldiers, Mr Dixon experienced trauma and loss, he left the service with many good mates.

"It was an experience - sometimes I wonder why I did it but with me coming from a farming area around Kalangadoo, I had a fairly sheltered life," he said.

"The thing that I liked the most is I got to know and become good mates with people from the inner suburbs of Melbourne and Sydney.

"You become good friends when people normally wouldn't. So I had friends from outside of farming - that's what my father told me, he told me he said, 'You need need to get away and mix from other people besides the farm boys."

New build forum

Wattle Range Council held a community forum on Tuesday night in Beachport to answer questions and take feedback on its proposed multimillion administration office.

Held at the Beachport Cinema, only around 10 local community members attended the interactive session. The event was run similarly to the forum in Millicent last month, with

council chief executive Ben Gower giving a presentation during the session outlining the main details of the project. The audience was encouraged to ask questions during the presentation, with many taking the opportunity. Most questions were about the design of the building and the consultation process that has been undertaken. The new centre would provide for all office-based council staff who are currently working in three separate locations, including

the main office which was built in the 1930s as a school and Mr Gower said was beyond renovation. Similarly to the Millicent forum, Mr Gower offered to show community members the current council offices. The decision to proceed with the new service centre is expected to be made by the newly elected council in early next year and if successful, will go to tender. If approved, the new office building will not be in use until 2025.

Nominations open for local council elections

Nominations open for local government elections across the state next week on Tuesday, August 23 and close two weeks later at midday on September 6.

All positions, including Mayor, are open to nominations in the four yearly local election.

The current Wattle Range Council has seen the resignation of three councillors since the 2018 November election with Corcoran Ward councillors Glenn Brown and Graham Slarks and Rick Paltridge from Riddoch Ward not seeing out their full terms. Mr Brown resigned within 12 months of the election count with a supplementary election called and Councillor Dennis Muhovics filling the role.

Rick Paltridge from Riddoch Ward resigned in August last year and was replaced

unopposed by Councillor Chris Brodie.

Due to the resignation of Mr Slarks within 12 months of the next election date, no supplementary election was needed. Mailout of ballot material to electors will begin October 14 with voting closing November 10.

Limestone Coast wine show opens

Entries are open for the 2022 Limestone Coast wine show, held from October 17-21.

This will be the 21st showing of the event. The event is open to any producer who sources fruit from the Limestone Coast zone, with online nominations open until Friday, August 19

Organisers are anticipating a strong re-sponse from exhibitors on the back of a highquality vintage and revamped trophy system, with a new Cabernet award up for grabs.

The event's most popular class has been split into two categories according to vintage: the HR (Ron) Haselgrove trophy for the best Cabernet Sauvignon up to three years old from the Wrattonbully wine region and the Seguin Moreau for the best Cabernet four to six vears old.

"The Limestone Coast produces Australia's best Cabernet and the growing number of exceptional entries in this category reinforces the quality.

"Limestone producers are very proud of what they are bottling and are willing to put it forward for judging scrutiny, so we want to make sure that they are given the best possible platform to shine," organiser Mr Aulrich Grey-Smith said.

While entries of Shiraz and red blends have remained steady over recent years, growth in the other red's category has prompted organisers to split the Peter Wehl trophy for best other single variety, categorising entries according to French or Iberian origin to not only capture style differences but reflect the rise of alternative varieties being grown locally.

In further changes for 2022, the Museum trophy will award both a white and a red wine winner, while the Provenance class, which celebrates wines with consistency and strong cellaring potential, will have a single trophy rather than separate awards.

The two major awards are the Bill Redman trophy for the best wine of the show and the Arthur Hoffman trophy for the Viticulturist of best wine of the show.

"The changes in the trophy line-up reflect the evolving nature of the wine industry as producers respond to both local and global consumer trends and continue to innovate."

The Limestone Coast has a long and proud history of winemaking, but it is our progressive approach to all aspects of the craft from viticulture to marketing that ensures our continued success, and this is something that the wine show is really keen to celebrate," Ulrich said.

While the 2021 wine show was judged by an all South Australian line-up, this year's event will also welcome judges from Western Australia, Victoria and Tasmania.

The 2022 show will also see the return of the International judges following a Covid pause, with the New Zealand editor of Gourmet Traveller Wine, Jane Skilton MW accepting an invitation to take part.

Jane last attended the event in 2016, declaring the 2014 Majella Shiraz her stand out wine.

Tasmania's Stargazer Wine chief, Samantha Connew, the 2007 International Winemaker of the Year, will return for her third year as Chief of Judges.

The 2022 wine show committee members are Sarah Pidgeon, Ulrich Grey-Smith, Amy Blackburn, Lewis White, Lauren Hansen, Sean Murphy, Matilda Innes, Natalie Cleghorn, Daniel McNicol, Carolyn Brown and Steve Brown

Judging will take place at Rymill Hall in Penola from Monday, October 17.

Winners will be announced at a trophy dinner hosted by the Mount Benson/Robe wine regions on Thursday, October 20.

Increase to worker spending

Robe Council approved a \$215,000 increase to the council's employee budget in a council meeting last week.

According to the report written by council chief executive James Holyman the increase is being sought following a review of the corporate services and finance portfolio of which gaps in staffing and duties were identified.

Mr Holyman said in the report said the additional funds would help bring some of the work in-house that consultants had previously been completing.

"Much of this funding already exists and has been spent on key consultants and advisors over the last two years," the report said.

'Savings are likely to contribute to a percentage of this amount long term."

The funds will help fund four new positions, the asset and project officer, community wastewater management systems officer, contracts and work from home officer, and a governance office. A further \$20,000 will also be made available for the environmental health officer position.

The motion was carried at the council meeting last week.

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Container concerns

Wattle Range Council has raised concerns about shipping containers that are being used unlawfully within the region.

With a building materials shortage and a contractor shortage, many in the region have started to look for alternative and affordable ways to create new structures when needed, leading to an increase in interest for shipping containers for storage, or even habitation.

Wattle Range Council staff have observed a recent spike in the installation of shipping containers on land without the required development approvals, and the council's Building Officer Jake Turner said some community members do not seem aware of the rules around using shipping containers on properties.

"In some cases, people are simply placing them on their properties without knowing that it is unlawful development," Mr Turner said.

"Shipping containers and Atco Huts are just like any other building and need to go through the same planning and building approval process."

Council have warned the maximum penalty for an unlawful development is \$120,000, and they generally are made aware of any such developments wither by anonymous reporting, routine property compliance inspections, or from conveyancer checks associated with the transfer of property ownership.

Director Development Services Emma Clay said it was important to get the proper approvals.

"Getting the right approvals ensures that development is appropriate for where it is proposed, constructed in a way that is safe and compliant with the Building Code and Australian Standards," Ms Clay said.

"Council wants to ensure that the use of shipping containers does not detrimentally affect the quality and amenity of our local community."

To avoid problems, Ms Clay said she recommends residents considering using a shipping container should contact the Council before purchasing.

"We have a team of planners and builders who are happy to provide some preliminary advice about the planning process, if there will be any issues with zoning and where on the property a proposed shipping container can be situated," says Ms Clay.

"Getting this information at the start will avoid unnecessary headaches down the track, including possible enforcement action by the Council."

GSR an off-road machine

Mitsubishi Pajero was introduced in Australia in January 1983 where it was in the vanguard of the move to refined, easy to drive suburban SUVs.

It provided levels of comfort and convenience that were unknown in moderatelypriced off-roaders at that time, yet with the macho look of a true off-roader.

Now, nearly 40 years later, Pajero is still competing strongly against a vast range of competitors in the large SUV segment.

The current Pajero Sport isn't a variant of the standard Pajero, now discontinued, but a vehicle in its own right.

It comes in four variants: five-seat GLX, seven-seat GLS, Exceed and GSR.

All are powered by a 2.4-litre turbo-diesel engine.

GLX and GLS come with the choice of two or four-wheel drive; Exceed and GSR are 4WD only.

Prices range from \$44,440 for a 2WD GLX to \$61,440 for the 4WD GSR.

Our test vehicle was the flagship GSR model.

Pajero Sport comes with the latest iteration of Mitsubishi's Dynamic Shield styling, with the projector headlamps positioned outside of the daytime running lights in a continuation of the grille.

The grille features a black honeycomb design.

All the exterior lights are LCD.

Depending on the variant there are up to seven body colour options, two of which, Black Mica and White Diamond are exclusive to the GSR.

It also features black exterior and interior accents, with matching black 18-inch alloy wheels, front and rear bumper garnish, radiator grille and roof rails.

The Diamond Black GSR also gets a black roof.

Inside the Pajero Sport the design is neat and functional with soft touch features adding a premium feel.

Its seats are large and comfortable and the steering wheel is adjustable for both height and reach.

The centre console has a modern shape and there are lower trays in the dashboard forward of the shift lever and under the tunnel-type floor console, allowing access from both sides, giving improved utility and convenience.

There's plenty of headroom in all seats and second row legroom is reasonable.

The second-row seatback can also be tilted. Third row seats, as always, are best suited for young children.

Rear storage space in the seven-seat Pajero Sport is minimal with the third-row seats in place although the base can by folded back allowing the back to fold perfectly flat to expand the space up to 673 litres depending on the variant.

and emergency stop signal; stability, trailer and traction control; forward collision mitigation system; hill start assist and descent control; adaptive cruise control; reversing camera; rear parking sensors; and two Isofix child seat anchors.

Exceed and GSR add blind spot warning; rear cross traffic alert; lane change assist; misacceleration mitigation system; adjustable speed limiter and speed limit display; multi around monitor (optional on the GLS); and front parking sensors.

All models get an 8-inch colour touchscreen, upgraded to LCD in the Exceed and GSR.

The entry-level GLX comes with Bluetooth connectivity with voice control and audio streaming; digital radio; Android Auto and Apple CarPlay smartphone mirroring; four USB sockets and one HDMI input; and a 4-speaker sound system.

GLS adds two extra speakers and integrated satellite navigation.

Exceed and GSR also get an 8-speaker pre-

There's also a shallow compartment in the floor the full width of the back with a lid to hide smaller items from view.

Power comes from Mitsubishi's tried-andtrue 2.4-litre MIVEC direct-injection turbodiesel engine with outputs of 133 kW at 3500 rpm and 430 Nm at 2500 revs.

Transmission is an eight-speed automatic.

All Pajero Sport 4WD models come with Mitsubishi's Super Select II 4WD system.

There are four drive modes: 2WD High Range, Full Time 4WD and High and Low Range 4WD with locked centre differential.

Four Off-Road modes are also available: Gravel, Mud/Snow, Sand or Rock.

Standard safety features include seven airbags (front, side, curtain and driver's knee); ABS brakes with emergency brake assist, electronic brakeforce distribution, brake override mium sound system together with access to a smartphone app which allows a range of features to be operated from outside the vehicle including tailgate opening; vehicle status check; fuel consumption check; car finder function; set-up notification and Apple watch connectivity.

Pajero Sport is a large vehicle so getting into it can be a task for smaller occupants although a side step and grab handle should alleviate the problem.

Variants above the GLX also come with a powered tailgate and a kick-motion sensor.

As with most of its direct competitors Pajero Sport is built on a utility platform, in this case the Mitsubishi Triton with which it also shares the same engine.

There's plenty of grunt when needed and semi-serious off-road credentials but still smooth and comfortable on the bitumen. Featuring seven seats, the new Pajero model still holds comfort for all passengers and gives the vehicle a premium feel.

Towing capacity is 3100 kg.

Around town it has a tight turning circle for its class of 11.0 metres.

Power assist has been calibrated to reduce steering effort when stationary or at low speeds while providing greater feedback at higher speeds.

The Pajero Sport offers an easy, relatively refined drive with a nice blend of power and control.

Given its real off-road capability it is not as compliant or gentle as those bitumen-only SUVs but it's certainly comfortable enough. Fuel consumption is listed at 8.0 litres per 100 kilometres, we averaged 9.6 L/100 km.

Mitsubishi Pajero Sport is a genuine allrounder that's equally at home carrying out domestic duties in the urban environment where it's likely to spend most of its time, as it will be in demanding off-road territory that would stop its softer rivals.

It's well-priced and comes with Mitsubishi's well-promoted 10-year warranty – provided that its always serviced at a dealership and doesn't travel more than 200,000 kilometres in that period.



CURIOUS AUSTRALIA SBS Viceland, Thursday, 8.30pm

If you're in need of some heartfelt inspiration on an ordinary Thursday night, do yourself a favour and tune in for this enlightening escape into the fast-paced world of an athlete. "Run Girl" is part of SBS's Curious Australia initiative, which champions a diverse range of innovative documentaries that explore under-represented people in contemporary Australia. This thoughtful doco follows Olympic track athlete and Ethiopian refugee Bendere Oboya (pictured) as she pivots from the 400m track to the 800m. Dealing with both self-doubt and enormous ambition, it's a rewarding exploration of determination and courage.



"What that change looks like is yet to be determined, but SANFL is very much looking to be collaborative with clubs.'

Ford said the cooperation and feedback from clubs would be vital in steering the outcome over the next 55 days.

"We are hoping clubs can now put their best ideas forward and hopefully we can work out a way together," Ford said.

"The last thing we want to do is come in and start telling people what to do.

"Everyone has a real option now to be in a driver's seat and help us map out a way forward.'

Ford said communications had been ongoing with the MSEFL, WBFL and KNTFL, with amount of work done over the an "enormous" last two years.

He said a large issue currently faced by clubs in all three leagues was the crossover between grades, as some players are required to back up two or three games across juniors or seniors.

In addition, the dominance of some clubs within any of the three leagues can not be denied, while in contrast, bottom-order teams often struggle to fill sides each week.

The situation is not unique to the Limestone Coast and Ford said similar issues are faced across the country.

"This isn't an isolated region - this is happening all over Australia at the moment," he said.

"We are seeing it in different leagues all over the country at the moment.

"Right now, over the next 60 days, we are encouraging all leagues to be open and transparent.

"We are really hoping everyone gets on the front foot here and declares their position ght now, from juniors, through to netball and

from a SANFL point of view, Ford said the simple answer was no.

Throughout the year SANFL has conversed with players, coaches, captains and executives from all three leagues in both netball and football ranks.

"Everyone you speak to has a different idea, but the flow on effect is it doesn't necessarily fit with the opposing sport, or the younger leagues," he said.

"At the end of the day, someone will be upset

"There is no perfect answer, which is why we need to continue having these conversations and see where it all lands.'

Ford said there are already a handful of options on the table, which started to take shape in the lead up to Casterton Sandford's vote last week.

However, he was unable to disclose any information on what they might be.

All things considered, Ford stressed a pro-

ed by us, will now trigger an independent investigation committee," he said.

"That will be formed by three community football committee members.

"They will start to put a 60-day plan in process, as of (Sunday).

"That means they have 60 days to review the entire region - how Casterton fits into Mid South East, what happens if that was to go forward and where that leaves the other five (Western Border) clubs.'

Ford said all options are on the table and SANFL has now called on leagues and clubs to have their say on the matter.

It will not be the first time clubs have been pressed for their opinion, with the WBFL and MSEFL surveyed last month on a proposed combined 16-team competition for 2023.

While the proposal was voted against, the verdict went down to the wire.

Faced with a possible restructure of football and netball as we know it in the region, the main problem which has been encountered so far is the imbalances between the two codes, as well as the junior ranks.

"To give a scope of the conversations which are happening on a daily basis - if people were to draw a line straight across the A Grade (football) teams in the entire region, it is quite simple to work out who plays who based on strength," Ford said.

"What it is really difficult to try and ascertain is how does that impact the juniors below them and how does it impact the netball as well.

"Those things need to be considered."

During an uncertain time, Ford said there was one certainty - change is imminent.

openly have honest conversations."

Ford said the sustainment of clubs and their history was of the utmost importance and he understands the coming months would be a sensitive time for many.

"One thing we really do need to be aware of is SANFL certainly isn't coming in to say if you are struggling, that is the end," he said.

'We are coming in and saying how do we best help those clubs that are struggling and what is the best way forward so we can make sure they can continue building their club into the future?

"We are not coming in and trying to cut up competitions just for the sake of it, we are really working with everyone in the region to try and find the most sustainable outcome for football and netball moving forward."

When asked if there was a perfect outcome

active approach was a necessary action.

"We are really trying to get on the front foot here and are requesting the assistance of the current leagues and the clubs within those leagues, to come help drive the strength of South Australian football into the future," he said.

"I think everyone right now is in the driver's seat at club level and they can have a real say on how this goes.

"What we would strongly encourage now is for people to take the blinkers off and have a look at what this thing looks like in 20 year's time, when the kids who are only just starting out, are coming through to play A Grade football or netball.

"It can't be a matter of what does the future look like next year, or the year after that - we are really starting to future-plan moving forward."
