Millicent's contemporary and architecturally adventurous St Alphonsus' Catholic Church has recently been provisionally heritage-listed on South Australia's (SA) heritage register.

The SA Heritage Places database states the church is one of the largest built in regional SA after the Second World War and meets three relevant criteria that make it eligible for the listing.

The building demonstrates important aspects of the state's history, and is an example of post-war regional development occurring as a result of the Playford government's industrialisation strategy for the state, and of the migration which supported it.

It was built during a period of rapid growth between 1947 and 1966 when the population of greater Millicent grew by 89 percent due to industrialisation attracting workers and their families to the town.

Many of these workers were migrants contributing to growing numbers of the Catholic congregation which led to the construction of the new church in 1965-1966.

Chair of the SA Heritage Council Keith Conlon said

"We had this massive post war migration boom and baby boom.

"There were people coming to places for new and expanding industries.

"Millicent had a big growth period after

"Industrially, economically and population, it all happened at once.

"St Alphonsus is a really nice positive example of that."

St Alphonsus' Church is noted as an outstanding example of a particular class of place known as post-war churches, and of cultural significance being the first South Australian church to respond directly to the Instruction on the Liturgy.

This is a series of documents from the Second Ecumenical Council of the Vatican (1962-1965) (Vatican II) produced to direct the life of the church in the twentieth century and into the future.

It was the first time that pews were fanned around the church sanctuary demonstrating a key stage in the development designed to encourage active participation in worship.

"One of the things that is really distinctive for the Catholic Church is when the Vatican II completely changed the way the liturgy worked," Mr Conlon said.

"It was a big change in the way the priest and congregation related to each other and how the church operated.

"It is more like a theatre in the round, there is more involvement and it changes the way the you worship.

"It changes the relationship between the priest and the clergy and that shows up literally in the form of these (post-war) churches."

No mayors for months

The Mayoral positions in Robe and Kingston could be vacant for four months, from November 2022 until Mach 2023, following a lack of nominations for the position.

Kingston District Council chief executive Nat Traeger said initial discussions with the Electoral Commission of South Australia (ECSA) might not start the supplementary elections until the November elections have concluded.

The current process for the November elections has taken around three months, if a similar timeline is followed for the supplementary elections, it could be into 2023 before either town has a mayor.

"There is every likelihood we won't have a new mayor until March next year," Ms Traeger said.

"The Local Government Association is currently getting some legal advice for how we manage in that interim period."

"We have more than enough area councillors...so we can at least form a Council.

"As I understand it, Council will likely be given two options, to appoint an acting mayor and a deputy mayor...or elect a deputy mayor and they act as the mayor."

A more pressing unknown for Ms Traeger is what would happen if an elected councillor decided to run for mayor, which she views as a likely scenario.

"They may have to resign as the area Councillor giving up their seat, and there could be someone out in the community could run against them resulting in a councillor losing their seat," she said.

"I do not know if any of them will want to do that.

"So there is every chance our mayor could end up being someone who was not favoured by the community in the first instance."

The ECSA changed Council Election protocols this year for nominee identities to be kept secret until nominations closed, and outgoing Kingston Mayor Kay Rasheed said the change impacted the nomination results.

"In the country where you have limited numbers of people, I think if we had known beforehand that there were no nominations, I would have rallied around and tried to find someone," Ms Rasheed said.

"The fact we did not know made a difference, I think. I was surprised that no one put their hand up.

"We did get nine nominations for seven councillors, so it is not as though there is no interest, I think people are still keen to see things go from good to better in town.'

But for Ms Rasheed, a lack of nominations should not kickstart any talk of amalgamation, a hot topic in the region after Premier Peter Malinauskas announced a plebiscite to gauge interest in joining to other Limestone Coast councils later this year.

"I don't think we should be forced into an amalgamation, that is my personal view," Ms Rasheed said.

"This is the first time that [no nominations for mayor] has ever happened that I am aware

"We had the chance to amalgamate when the last lot went through, and there were quite strong feelings that we should be stand alone."

Robe Mayor Alison Nunan echoed Ms Rasheed's comments about the impact on candidate turnout from the new nomination process, but also said that being a small Council meant there were less potential candidates for the position.

"I think people are aware of the time commitment that is required to do it, and not everyone can give it that sort of time," Ms Nunan

"It is a big role, and a complex role and if you are going to take it on you have to be prepared to do it justice and that requires a lot of

"Not everyone has an interest in Council, in small community by the time you take out the people who are not interested in Council.

"Certainly, being a small community has had an impact on it."

More clarity on the process for the two councils moving forward is expected in the

'Unique' church could be preserved on heritage list

Finally the church demonstrates a high degree of creative, aesthetic and technical accomplishment, and is an outstanding example of particular construction techniques and design characteristics of late 20th century ecclesiastical Modern Movement archi-

Some of the distinctive features of the two storey church are its wedge shape with rounded corners, pre-cast concrete columns and reinforced concrete frame, with a roof structure supporting 21 metre steel spire that passes through the roof topped with a


The curved glass front facing George Street contains six stained-glass windows salvaged from the first St Alphonsus' church with other unique internal elements mentioned in the heritage register entry.

St Alphonsus is a standout example of a post-war church and is noted as retaining a high degree of integrity and intactness, displaying characteristics at a high quality.

Mr Conlon said

"Some of these buildings simply couldn't be built using traditional techniques.

"They relied on new engineering and new materials that gave them these great big spaces inside and a totally different ap-

proach to worship."

The provisional listing on the South Australian Heritage register is now open for three months of public consultation and the Heritage council welcomes comment.

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Plan makes room for more

Kingston District Council is looking to ease local pressures on the housing market by launching a project that encourages people to rent out spare space.

The pilot project, dubbed "Room 4 a Roomie", has been pitched to the Kingston community through an online survey.

If the project gets off the ground, it would involve encouraging homeowners to rent out spare rooms, farmhouses, holiday homes, or any other liveable space.

Council chief executive Nat Traeger said it was an alternative solution to turning to bricks and mortar.

"We don't have the capacity to deliver an infrastructure-based housing solution, but we can galvanise our community into action,"

Ms Traeger said it would be a way to ease the rental crisis while offering shared expenses and social connection.

Kingston Mayor Kay Rasheed said the idea was originally to help house employees working for local businesses, but there could be potential to attract new residents too.

"Obviously, the more people that live here, the more money they will spend, injecting economic stimulus into our community, Mayor Rasheed said.

"We are aware that we have a high percentage of non-resident ratepayers, and this presents as a simple and quick fix to a long term and complex problem.

"I encourage those who have a spare room,

empty holiday home or other option to express their interest and learn more about this

The project will initially partner with Ray White Kingston to match possible tenants with accommodation options.

Skill up to lend an ear

Last Thursday on national RUOK day Dawn Williams, volunteer with the Wattle Range Suicide Prevention Network (WRSPN), spent her time sparking conversations with others at McCourts Garden Centre Cafe.

The cafe hosted the network's display of brochures along with the reflection bench hand carved by group member Rick Errington last year with assistance from Millicent Men's Club members.

Ms Williams spoke about the importance of keeping the conversation continuing after RUOK day and recommended this Sunday's free Conversations Around Suicide course as a great starting point.

"It is a good course and it gives you a few extra skills, carrying skills costs nothing.

"It is important to keep the conversation going and to have the skills to be an active listener so that you are actually listening and reflecting on what they are saying.

"Lots of times people don't hear, they don't hear the whole sentence and you can be thinking one thing and they are thinking something entirely different.

"It's good to be an active listener and know how to use open-ended questions instead of questions that get a yes or no answer, that keeps the conversation going, it's

important to have those basic skills.

"One on one conversations are worth gold with someone who is actually listening to you, you can't beat it" Ms Williams

MP Pasin steps up for childcare services

Barker MP Tony Pasin has renewed the fight for childcare services in Kingston SE.

Prior to the 2022 state election, both the Labor and Liberal parties pledged \$1.8million to build a new childcare centre.

It is sorely needed, with no other options available for parents.

Mr Pasin raised the issue in parliament recently, declaring that he will not give up the

'While the Labor government held a talkfest last week about skills and employment and have indicated they will support the unions in their fight for more membership, they've failed to do something very simple to assist the Kingston South East community see more parents re-enter the workforce," he said.

"Lack of child care has been holding back that community for many, many years.

"Enrol children before birth and drive 140 kilometres or don't work: those are the options available to parents crying out for childcare services in this regional town already struggling to fill jobs.

"The existing childcare service has a waiting list as long as the coastal town's jetty. Despite the Labor Party making an election commitment to match the coalition's funding of \$1.8 million for a new childcare centre to be built, the community has heard nothing but crickets about the election commitment from those opposite.

"The project all hinges on this funding. Without written confirmation from the federal Labor government—and Minister Alv in particular—of the \$1.8 million and the time frame on delivering this funding, the project cannot move forward.

"An issue that has been talked about for 40 years, a proactive community who have been working on this issue together, with my full support, and a local council working hard over five years all culminated in the announcement of federal funding from both major parties during the recent election campaign. And, yet, now the dust has settled from their election win, the Labor Party are now nowhere to be seen or heard.

"The community who suffered during the Black Summer bushfires but didn't receive the same support or attention as other re-

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Rain in 'serious deficiency'

Areas of the region are still in serious rainfall deficiency, according to the Bureau of Meteorology. In its latest drought statement, BOM listed a section of land in the South East covering Kingston, Robe and Beachport travelling inland as being the only place in South Australia with a serious deficiency of rainfall over the last nine months. Soil moisture in the region has also been shown to be below average.

A serious rainfall deficiency is classed as within the lowest 10 per cent of historical observations since 1900.

But there have been improvements from the last drought report, with the area with the deficiency shrinking substantially, with no more areas listed as in severe deficiency.

"Compared to the 8-month period ending July 2022, the strength and spatial extent of rainfall deficiencies have generally eased slightly across southern Australia, with rainfall for the period now generally above the lowest 10 per cent of historical observations for those areas of south-east South Australia shown in serious or severe deficiency last month," the statement said.

The Limestone Coast region overall is still shown to be very much below average when looking at multi-year rainfall between Sep-

tember 2018 and August 2022.

But more rain may be on the way, with the BOM Climate Outlook released at the start of



the month predicting above median rainfall for September to November for the eastern two-thirds of Australia.

Swooping magpies 'just defending their young'

It is spring time and it is also magpie swooping season.

According to Dr Karl Hillyard, Department for Environment and Water Principal Ecologist, Wildlife, magpies breed between August and October.

"The males defend their nests from the time the eggs are laid until the young birds are ready to fly and they will attack anything they consider to be a threat, from another bird or a dog or human," he said.

Magpies have excellent recall for faces and very long memories, so if you have been swooped before, or even if you just look like someone they swooped last year, you are likely to be swooped again.

"They are not malicious birds, they are just defending their young.

They only defend their nests within about a fifty metre circumference, so the best way to avoid a magpie visit is to take a detour around known nest sites if it is possible," Dr Hillyard said.

A group of Penola social cyclists ride around the town regularly and certainly know the magpie hot spots.

The cyclists said the hot spots are up the northern end of the town and warn cyclists and walkers to be aware.





A mighty monarch

The recent death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II has stirred many memories for those who were children at the time of the Royal visit to Mount Gambier in 1954.

Schools from across the district organised students to be transported via train, bus or car to Vansittart Park to form a map of Australia for the Queen's visit. It was the first time a reigning British monarch had visited Australia.

Marion Galwey was eleven at the time and attended the event with her younger sister Aldyth dressed in their Brownie uniforms.

The girls took part in the activities and formed part of the guard of honour at Vansittart Park's main gates by local Brownies and Girl Guide groups

Ms Galwey said "the queen came along in her Landrover and they stopped, if I had walked out of the guard of honour I could have touched her car, we were very close to her and very excited.

"Mum and dad took us up in our old car and they went on the way to the lakes and watched from up there.



"I then made a book at primary school of the royal visit, it's got all cut-outs of the Woman's Day articles or whatever mum had.

"It has each different state she was in and I've glued a crown on the front, it's got my name Marion Davies on it and I still have it.

Liz Sutcliffe also formed part of the Brownies guard of honour on the day but as she was only seven years old her memories are not clear.
