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Geltwood festival thrills

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blaze of colour

Three Adelaide based street artists visited the region over the weekend leaving a trail of colour behind them in both Beachport and Millicent on two privately funded walls

After visiting the region earlier in the year two of the artists Ryan Schlink (Ee karm) and Brian Lacsina (Mosha) were invited back by co-owner of the Beachport Hotel Stewart Wells to paint a shipping container on site.

The duo brought a third artist, Shanyon Fan (Moshe), to assist on the projects.

The proposed site had become an eyesore over recent years with the advertising signs wearing away.

Co-owner of the hotel Stewart Wells said

"I wanted to get rid of the old advertising so I ripped everything off and painted it blue.

"We were then going to decide what to do with it and these guys popped up.

"They were in the bar and I overheard them saying they did street art.

"We asked if they could come have a look at the shipping container and they asked if I had any ideas.

Mr Wells floated the idea of having a Kraken's tentacles grabbing a Beachport sign on a piece of driftwood and was happy to let the artists interpret that how they wanted.

"They were really good, really efficient and worked through the rain and wind.

"We will get them back again, we have an outside courtyard area we want them to fresh-

The second mural project undertaken by the trio was commissioned by the owners of Millicent's iconic two storey art deco Savings Bank building in George Street, Helen Joyce and Colin Davies.

After recently meeting the artists at local arts event Ms Joyce hoped to schedule the men to paint the boundary wall along their

rear driveway facing Davenport Street during the Geltwood Festival.

"I've always looked at that wall and thought it's the perfect opportunity for something" Ms Joyce said

"We've got the Mimby Jones Robinson water goddess at the front of the building that's bright colours and I love bright colours.

"I saw that these guys were going to be here in October and I thought it could be a bit of a performance for Geltwood.

"I knew there was going to be an artwalk for

the festival and thought it would be good so those people could see it actually happening.

"The art very much draws from street art tradition, this is not fine art.

"I did give them free reign pretty much, my only restriction was that it couldn't incite violence or discord.

Ms Joyce encouraged the artists to work to their strengths which has resulted in large graphic lettering surrounded by colourful alien creatures and landscapes that peek through the bricks.

"It's growing on me, I wouldn't say it's my fave around town, but it's different.

"We need different artists, not the same artists, I think we should be trying to get as many different artists as we can.

"It's a bright spot on a dull day."

The three artists were upfront about their graffiti roots and acknowledged the artform as an important learning ground for not only art but making connections with others in the



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

Art and craft displays adorned shop windows with free entertainment dotted throughout the town centre.





Motoring

All class behind the wheel

Mercedes-Benz has updated its E 350 sedan, coupe and convertible models with mild hybrid technology adding extra power, smoother engine response and lower fuel consumption.

Five variants are available: E 200, E 350 and AMG E53 with the coupe body plus E 350 and AMG E 53 convertibles.

The E-Class is the mid-sized model in the Mercedes-Benz passenger car range.

The current Benz family styling has been adopted with a diamond patterned infill to the grille and the traditional three-pointed star in the centre.

Headlights are Multibeam units with 84 individually controllable LEDs with adaptive high beam.

The wheels on the E 350 are 20-inch AMG multi-spoke alloys.

The optional Night Package adds some at-

tractive exterior design elements.

Although most current convertibles come with solid roofs Mercedes has catered for the

motoring purists by sticking with a traditional fabric roof.

There's a wide range of body colour

choices, nine of them standard or no-cost option colours available as well as two cost options.

The standout to our eyes, and most who

saw it, was the rich burgundy Rubellite Red in our test car. Four fabric soft tops are available, we had

the matching dark red.

Obviously, as a two-door, access to the rear seats is through the front doors, unless you're young and agile enough to jump over

when the top is down.

Once seated there's decent legroom although the passenger sitting behind the driver may occasionally need to compromise.

To cater for rear seat occupants the front doors are wide and need to be opened cautiously in tight parking spaces.

All Mercedes E 350 variants have leather upholstery with a choice of five different colour combinations.

All three E350 variants come with a 2.0-litre, four-cylinder turbo-petrol engine generating 220kW of power and 400Nm of torque with a nine-speed automatic transmission sending power to the rear wheels.

The EQ Boost system uses a 48-volt integrated electric motor to add up to 10 kW and 150 Nm for short periods.

Additionally, the system utilises high-efficiency energy recuperation to supply power to the battery, making it possible to drive without the combustion engine.

The E 350 sedan and coupe variants do the zero to 100 km/h sprint in 5.9 seconds with the convertible only marginally slower at 6.1 seconds.

Standard safety features across the E-Class coupe and cabriolet range include nine airbags, enhanced ABS brakes; electronic stability control program; acceleration skid control; active bonnet; tyre pressure warning; run-flat safety tyres; traffic sign assist; and a 360-degree camera.

Attention Assist uses a sensor and detailed algorithm to detect fatigued driving behaviour

Driving Assistance Package Plus adds active distance assist; autonomous emergency braking; brake assist with cross-traffic function; lane keeping and lane assist; stop-andgo assist; blind spot monitoring; evasive steering assist and route-based speed adaptation.

Pre-Safe Plus helps prevent, or reduce the effect, or rear collisions crashes.

If the car's rear radar detects a potential

rear-end collision, it rapidly flashes the rear hazard warning lights to alert the driver.

Specific features in the E-Class convertibles include with head air bags in the doors and specifically-designed roll-over protection.

A head-up display is available with the Vision Package option.

The Benz E250 uses the latest version of the company's MBUX widescreen multimedia system.

Information is displayed on two 12.3-inch high-resolution digital screens.

In front of the driver is the digital instrument cluster with the central touchscreen providing access to the usual range of features including smartphone integration with Apple CarPlay and Android Auto; Bluetooth phone and audio; wireless smartphone charging; and embedded NTG6 satellite navigation.

Our test car had the optional Burmester premium sound system.

There's also remote interactivity with other vehicle functions through the Mercedes 'me Connect' app.

At start up the central information screen displays the following warning, no doubt at the behest of the M-B legal team, "Do not let the system distract you from the traffic situation".

While this clearly applies to every new car nowadays it's even more relevant to the E-Class because there's so much to learn before hitting the road.

There's also a plethora of tiny controls on the chunky Nappa leather AMG steering wheel feels great

We couldn't have picked better weather for our test and did a couple of open-air runs along our favourite route on the Central Coast hinterland.

Opening and closing the roof takes around 15 seconds and can be done at speeds up to 30 km/h.

We escaped from Sydney's urban jungle, including its numerous tunnels, with the roof

closed and found the interior to be quite well insulated.

Once the top was folded, we were able to activate the Aircap auto draught-stop and air scarf neck-level heating systems to reduce the effect of the outside elements.

Although we didn't need it, seat heating is available.

Fuel consumption is excellent, listed at 7.8 litres per 100 kilometres on the combined cycle.

We averaged 8.2 L/100 km overall, managing just 6.4 L/100 km during our two rural grand touring cruises.

With so many SUVs on the road, all providing differing degrees of sensible and practical motoring it was an absolute delight to enjoy a really enjoyable driving experience with the Mercedes-Benz E 350 Cabriolet.

There's sufficient interior space to almost qualify as a family vehicle although most of the time should be spent out on the open road

It's high comfort levels, smooth and powerful engine and excellent fuel economy make it an ideal long-distance grand tourer.

Solid week of fishing

Matt Bell with his Callop

We had it all this weekend, rain, sunshine, strong winds and at times even no wind.

Luckily the worst of the weather still was not too bad and fishos managed to hit the wa-

The offshore fishos found fish from out on the shelf, through to the inshore reef systems.

Those who did venture to the shelf found some good numbers of Blue Eye Trevalla and Hapuka in the 400-450m depth range.

Geoff and Zac Currie boated some very nice samples of both species, including Geoff's first

On the way home the boys stopped for a quick drop in 150metre waters and Zac picked up a ripper tassie trumpeter just as the cherry on the cake.

Boaties from up around Beachport and Robe have been into the sharks over the last

Wayne Walker boated a couple of beauties last Monday in the Beachport area, a schoolie over 20kg and a beast gummy of nearly 30kg.

This time of year is always great fishing for sharks in the bay there.

Schoolies and gummy sharks are in good numbers and you've got the protection of the bay, so when conditions are right, it's worth having a crack.

In a bit closer to shore off Port MacDonnell, the bottom fishing in 55m to 70m has remained excellent.

I've heard of Snapper to 80cm, Blue Morwong to 70cm and Nannygai over 2kg, that's

before we even mention the sharks. Gummies and schoolies over 20kg have been common, and some guys have been

boating multiple big sharks in a session and just letting them go. There have been whispers there could be

tuna still sneaking about along the front but no one has hooked up.

Speaking with a few boaties out there, one crew saw School Tuna jumping in 100 metre waters late last week, while some cray fisherman have spotted big bait balls with birds. seals, dolphins and whales feeding on them which is exactly where the big tuna will be

The surf fishing has been good, and the salmon numbers are still impressive.

Guys throwing lures have found plenty in the Beachport Salmon Hole again and a real mix of sizes have come through.

If the weather is perfect for us, it's usually too good for the salmon, and they'll be hanging back hard on the reef.

On days where the sea is up and the wind is blowing, salmon are in the middle of the bay and just about everyone will be within casting

The Canunda and Carpenter Rocks fishos

have found some more nice fish but it seems to be the bait anglers with the upper hand.

The concentration of fish is unlike the Salmon Hole, so the beauty of the baits is the fish will come and look for the smell.

In other off-the-beach news, there's been a few early season whiting caught around Cape Douglas, Nene Valley and Carpenter Rocks in the late afternoons which has been great to

The Port MacDonnell Breakwater has been on the go again, the boaties have had no trouble finding a nice feed of whiting, while the land-based guys who fished the jetty and boat ramp in the evenings

have both been finding some good fish.

Other areas for the boaties have been Green and Danger Points, Blackfellows Caves and Carpenter Rocks.

Garfishos have had another great week on the fish, and to echo the last probably 8 weeks now, it's been a good even split of fish between the boaties and the waders.

The usual hotspots such as Petrified Forrest, Hutt Bay and Cape Douglas, Livingstons Bay and Pelican Point have all produced well.

October is always a great month for the squid fishos in Livingstons Bay. We just need a couple days of flat seas and

the water clears up just nicely and is perfect for squidding. There has been some absolute beauties

caught over the last couple of weeks, one beast

Hill climb back and bigger

It is almost that time of year when the Valley Lakes precinct erupts with the roar of race engines as the annual Legend of the Lakes hill climb events hits town on November 11, 12 and 13.

After two years of Covid-affected events, this year will see the biggest field in the 17-year history of the hill climb, with a bumper 90-car entry list for the Friday and 150 starters for the Saturday and Sunday.

The list includes current "Legend" Dan Day with his wild Subaru WRX, along with former title holder Kevin Mackrell, who have missed the last two years due to Covid border closures

Both have made several improvements to their cars, which adds up to an exciting weekend for the outright honours.

Day currently holds the record for quickest time up the hill, with a blistering 49.89 seconds, which he has not been able to break.

By all accounts the time is on the edge of how fast the course can be traversed, but that will not stop Day, or anyone else, from attempting to lower it further.

Day has further incentive to not only set a fast time, but to win the event, which would be his seventh in a row, equal to Peter Gazzard's long-standing record.

The event, run by the South Eastern Automobile Club, was the brain child of Lionel Stingers, which he saw come to fruition before his passing.

Since then the running has been taken over by long-time club members, including clerk of course Kevin Raedel and assistant clerk of course Peter Lock.

an exceptional event, albeit with some compromises to include such a large field.

"It is the biggest field we have ever had re-

Raedel said all was looking good to put on

"It is the biggest field we have ever had really," he said.

"We have over 30 reserves for Saturday and Sunday and we will try to run 90 cars on Friday instead of 75.

"It might be a bit slower but it should go well.

"We will then have 150 starters for Saturday and Sunday – last year we had 145 entries and started with 132."

Lock said the club always looked to include as many runs up the hill per competitor, which set the event apart from other similar hill climbs around the country.

"I think we have more runs traditionally than most other hill climbs," he said.

"Some will pull the pin at three or four, but we are disappointed with only five.

"If everybody plays nice we will be right."

A new challenger for the outright honours has also emerged, with Adelaide driver and engine tuner Doug Johnson ready to take on the likes of crowd favourites Day and Mackrell.

"Doug Johnson has a two-door GC8 WRX," Raedel said.

"He won the Port MacDonnell hill climb and has come back for Legends.

"He will be fast.

"Track knowledge could hurt him a bit, but by Sunday he should be right."

Of course the focus is not just on the outright victory, but also the class battles throughout the field.

A wide range of categories ensure many vehicles are catered for by all levels of driver and machine.

A popular category is the Group N, which includes some classic vehicles such as older GT Falcons, Mini Coopers, Toranas and the like.

Lock pushes his Mini up the hill each year, but concedes he is not in the running for outright honours.

That goes to one particular GT Falcon.

"There is one GT in particular I can't beat," he said.

"The other one I can beat, but not (Rob) Vanderkamp.

"He is head and shoulders above the rest of the class.

"We all fight for second spot ... he is unbelievably quick.

"I watched him around Mallala a lot of

years ago and he is the same there.

"He just makes other GTs look like learners."

Vanderkamp, like many other entrants, has attended every running of the hill climb, creating a strong following from the Limestone Coast supporters.

A large contingent of Subarus and Mitsubishi Evos will be present, along with various other more exotic vehicles, such as Porsches, Lamborghinis and the like.

This year the live streaming will continue, bigger and better than before, so while there will be no big screens around the venue, spectators can keep up to date with everything in real time, including split times up the course.

Busses have also returned, with spectators able to head down to the bottom of the course between runs to take in the entire atmosphere of the event.

"We really want to get the spectators down the bottom to soak up the atmosphere,' Raedel said

"We haven't had people down there for two years now, but this year there will be plenty of catering at the top and bottom of the course.

"People can walk through the pits, chat to

the drivers and see all the cars.

"They can watch the start line and enjoy some static displays."

The size of the field this year could be attributed to the lack of Covid restrictions now in place around the country.

The Victorians were shut down for a long time through the pandemic and missed a lot of racing.

Now that has all changed, the numbers have again swelled, but also the financial support for the event.

"It the biggest ever sponsor list we have had in 17 years," Raedel said.

"They are mainly locals and a few from Adelaide starting to chip in.

"It is pleasing to see so many sponsors jump on board."

There will be no event at the Rail Lands on the Thursday prior to the hill climb, but the organisers hope to have a welcome at the Valley Lakes instead.

Entry for Saturday and Sunday is just \$10, with Under 16s free, so it is well worth heading up to the Lakes to see what all the hype is about.
