Fight for radio

Past presenters, volunteers and others concerned about the future of Millicent's community radio station, 5THE FM, have requested a special general meeting.

This is the second time an attempt to hold a special general meeting has taken place with the first planned for three months ago in July.

After organisers received a letter from the radio station's lawyers stating the meeting request did not satisfy the criteria in the current constitution the meeting was changed to an informal community gathering.

Over 60 attendees at the informal meeting took the opportunity to fill out membership forms and pay \$10 each, which is the membership fee listed in the constitution.

At least 15 of these people have now requested in writing a special general meeting believing the criteria has been met.

David Walshaw is the public voice for those concerned about the direction of the radio station and said there had been no response from the station committee.

"We've had no response from the station yet but the date we've locked in is Thursday, November 24th, 7pm at St Alphonsus Hall," he said.

"This is reflective of our independent legal advice, that we should go ahead and have a special general meeting.

"In our view members have signed up, paid and we have deposited the money with the lawyers.

"It is how the station told us to do it.

"We have submitted the forms and now some have said they want to have a meeting so we've asked for that to occur.

"People want to know where is their money and where is their membership application."

The meeting is for anyone to attend and Mr Walshaw would like to see board and committee members of 5THE FM attend.

He said that if attendees at the meeting are in agreement, an attempt to form a committee will take place.

The radio station is currently operating on a temporary license due to expire on December 30, 2022 and is subject to an investigation from Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA).

The station is also under investigation by the South Australian Consumer and Business Services (CBS).

Mr Walshaw said the temporary license and investigations add a sense of urgency to the meeting.

"There is a nervousness about it, they have resisted all sorts of approaches from us" he said.

"Their lawyers aren't communicating with our lawyers, we've asked for professional mediation and that hasn't happened."

"That is what worries me, that all this stuff is going to cascade down on top of us.

"There is the issue with the peppercorn lease on that property, if there is no radio sta-

tion operating what happens to that? pitcl

"Do Department Planning, Transport, Infrastructure (DPTI) take it back, if the station doesn't have a license, is it in breach of that contract?"

Mr Walshaw revealed there was a group of local residents actively listening to the radio station's programming and they believed there was approximately two hours of local broadcasting content a week.

"If they had come out earlier and spoken to us, we wouldn't be here, we could've all pitched in to help and get the station back up and running" he said.

"It's our last sort of resort, we are at an impasse and we've tried every single thing.

"We cant' just sit around on our hands waiting for the investigation to happen, because it could take awhile, in the meantime we could lose our radio station.

"We need to break our impasse, we need to get community members along to a special general meeting and go from there."

September date for servo start

Old garden with a purpose

Beautiful wrought iron gates in a high stone wall mark the entrance to The Glen at 35 Wilson Lane, Glencoe.

For the first time these gates will be open to the public to raise funds for the Glencoe Woolshed heritage restoration.

The 14-acre property at Glencoe consists of six acres of garden and an organic orchard with loquats, cumquats, feijoas and crab-apples. The original stone house built in 1910 was semi derelict and surrounded by compacted driveways and fenced yards when purchased in 2010.

The new owners, Carol and John Berger, spent the first few years renovating the house and cutting through the vegetation in order to start creating a garden.

Passionate gardeners, they had no particular plan or theme other than to create a number of garden rooms.

There are now three roughly circular outdoor rooms focussed around specimen trees.

A large golden elm, a birch tree, and a round rose garden that was originally a horse training yard.

Carol said "The idea of rooms comes from the Victorian idea of a pleasure garden which can be strolled through after dinner with different vistas to help clear the mind and help the digestion."

New lawns and garden beds have been added with a golden willow walk planted from cuttings.



The expansive garden at Glencoe, The Glen, will soon be open to the public for the first time.

Flowering cherries line the drive and a bush garden is planted mainly with natives and succulents.

Approximately 200 roses have been progressively planted, with 100 bearded irises, a selection of dahlias and perennials and a collection of different lilacs and wisterias. A wall at one end of what used to be a

bowling green includes a lion's head fountain.

The Glen will be open Saturday and Sunday, November 12 and 13, 10am to 4pm.

It's necessary. Anyone who has seen the current working conditions will understand something must be done. Having staff work in three rented facilities in Millicent is not good for productivity nor for the legal requirements for work places. As much as many residents may be attached to the old school building it is unrepairable and too small. A new building is the best solution. Other sites have been examined and none compare with the site at the old netball courts. It's less expensive to build there and there is space without tearing down the RSL Clubrooms or losing the Jubilee Park.

The suggested building isn't beautiful but it's practical. Landscaping will solve the appearance problem. It will look fine and professional. Cost wise, it is the responsible solution.

It will never be as cheap as it is today. Further delay will blow out costs.

I support the proposed new council office complex for the following reasons, but with some financial expectations.

The current office is no longer fit for purpose, being too small, in poor condition for its 100-year life, and difficult to access due to its location. The council staff are currently working in four different locations, two of these being leased properties. One of the CEO's KPI's is to manage all staff, but this is extremely difficult due to the spread of the staff. I believe the location is the least contentious, with it not being on parkland and being owned by council, hence no cost, having the ability to expand and has the area for an appropriate car park.

I voted to support Councillor Price's motion to keep the cost of the building to \$5.5 million. The project is currently being costed and the final decision whether to progress will be up to the new councillors. It is important to me that when the final plans are approved, no alterations should occur or there will be cost blow outs which will hugely impact on the project. All staff and current councillors have had the opportunity to have input into this new building.

This is my opinion and not necessarily the view of the Wattle Range Council.

So, it is time to move ahead and I say this with a sense of excitement as to what it will mean for our Council and our community.

There is no doubt that a new administrative hub is needed for Wattle Range Council and the proposed North Terrace site is the most suitable location.

Architects are working on detailed designs and costings and then the final decision will rest with the incoming 2022-26 council.

In my view, the cost will be a "red button issue" with news reports this week indicating that the price of building materials has risen by 16pc in the past year and there are predictions by mainstream economists that the inflation rate will soon exceed 7pc.

Given such factors, Council must closely scrutinise the contract it will strike with the builders and ensure the cost of the new administrative hub does not blow out.

I have overseen major building projects in my previous working life as a senior pub-

lic servant such as the \$6 million extension to Sheoak Lodge aged care facility which was delivered "on time and on budget" under my watch when I was the Millicent Hospital Chief Executive.

Wattle Range Council elected members will not have a day to day role in the construction of the new administrative hub as I did with Sheoak Lodge.

However, councillors have the responsibility to ensure the new administrative hub is delivered promptly and in a cost-effective manner while all financial aspects are transparent to the wider community.

At some stage in the future Council will have to upgrade the Administration Building. Present offices can no longer provide standards expected for inside staff. Lindeman's clean sweep

A classic Coonawarra cabernet sauvignon has dominated the 2022 Limestone Coast Wine Show.

Lindeman's Wines 2019 St George Cabernet Sauvignon was awarded the Bill Redman Trophy for Best Wine of Show at the celebration dinner held at the Robe Mechanics Institute, after earlier collecting the HR (Ron) Haselgrove Trophy for Best Cabernet Sauvignon (Current to 3 Year Old), the Trophy for Best Individual Vineyard Wine and the David Wynn Trophy for Best Red Wine of Show.

Chief of Judges, Samantha Connew, described the winning red as a stand-out among 465 entries. "It's a wine that encapsulates the very best of what the Limestone Coast has to offer," she said.

Grapes for the limited-release St George Cabernet Sauvignon are sourced exclusively from the 45-year-old St George Vineyard in Coonawarra, with viticulturist Ben Briggs collecting the Arthur Hoffmann Trophy for Viticulturist of the Year. Lindeman's Wines' astonishing trophy haul climbed to seven when the 2019 Lindeman's Limestone Ridge Shiraz Cabernet was awarded Best Blended Red and the 2019, 2014 and 2008 vintages of the same wine won Best Wine of Provenance.

Judge Philip Rich praised its consistency and common stylistic thread.

"They were three excellent wines with demonstrated ability to age well; it illustrated both the variety and the region well," he said.

The 2022 Ottelia Riesling made with grapes grown in the Kongorong area southwest of Mount Gambier won the Colin Kidd Trophy for Best White Wine of Show and the Karl Seppelt Trophy for Best Aromatic White Wine. "It just had everything – it was a wine that jumped out of the glass with lovely flavour, and you just wanted to drink more," said judge Liz Heidenreich.

Landaire based at Padthaway Estate was

another big winner with a four trophy haul; the 2021 Chardonnay won the Pam Dunsford Trophy for Best Chardonnay and was named the Chief of Judge's Wine to Watch. Landaire's 2022 Rose won the Trophy for Best Rose, with judge Cath Oates proclaiming it a "fresh and delicious stand-out".

The family-owned company's Padthaway Estate Eliza Blanc De Blancs was named Best Sparkling Wine for the second year in a row, again winning praise for its beautiful complexity and balance.

Meanwhile, it was a triple trophy treat for Wangolina. The Mount Benson winery's 2021 Wangolina A-Series Tempranillo won the Peter Wehl Trophy for Best Single Variety of Italian, Portugese, Spanish Heritage, and cemented the region's reputation for outstanding shiraz when the 2021 Wangolina Originals Syrah won the Small Batch Experimental Wine Award and the International Judge's Award.

New Zealand judge Jane Skilton MW described it as a modern take on a traditional style that was true to its origins.

"I was looking for deliciousness above all else, but it was also a fresher wine with slightly lighter tannins," she said.

"The Limestone Coast's reputation is built on wines that age which is brilliant, but if you're going to get some of the newer consumers who want to drink wines of provenance and place but maybe don't have the appetite for long aging and want more of an immediate style, this is a terrific wine."

Rounding out the awards, the 2022 Reschke R-Series Malbec won Best Single Variety of French Heritage, the Eric Brand Trophy for Best Shiraz went to the 2018 Wynns Coonawarra Estate Michael Shiraz, and Coonawarra also came to the fore with the Brands Laira 171 Cabernet Sauvignon claiming the Trophy for Best Cabernet 4 to 6 years old. The 2013 Peppertree Wines Block 21A Cabernet Sauvignon from Wrattonbully won the Ewen Fergusson McBain Trophy for Best Museum Wine, and Padthaway's Farmer's Leap Wines won the Trophy for Most Successful Exhibitor.

A total of 43 gold medals were awarded during the 21st anniversary event after two days of judging.

Toyota's rogue element

By Derek Ogden, Marque Motoring

With the Hilux Rogue, among the varied dictionary definitions of 'rogue' comes 'an individual deviating from the normal, usually inferior'.

My time with Toyota's MY21 top-dog ute had a complaint or two.

For a start the Aussie-designed and developed motorised roll-top tub cover pulled up short, literally, on my first attempt to store it, jamming inches away from being fully retracted.

No amount of pressing opening and closing buttons freed the apparatus.

A little less annoying was the key fob, which was erratic with its door locking and unlocking functions activating only when a few metres from the cabin.

Equivalent automotive security systems usually can be operated from greater distance to the vehicle: often handy in a crowded car park.

Generally, it's a credit to local engineers and designers, who were tasked with producing a combination of toughness, complemented by a more recreational focus for a vehicle designed to go anywhere and be sold in markets around the world.

Toyota Australia's role in developing and evaluating the 2.8-litre four-cylinder turbodiesel engine, rear suspension and hydraulic power steering was supported by teams from Japan and Thailand, as well as representatives from other markets

The Rogue sells for \$68,990, plus on-road costs and options.

The HiLux, in general, continues its reign as the best-selling vehicle in Australia and like all Toyota vehicles is covered by Toyota Service Advantage, with each of the first scheduled services costing just \$250 each.

Out of Toyota's Melbourne design studio comes a dark vertical grille that cascades from the bonnet down to the prominent lower bumper and under-guard.

LED headlamps, with dark internals, combine with bold outer corners of the bumper, which links to strong fog lamp surrounds.

An aggressive side profile continues the theme with robust fender flares, unique wheel-arch mouldings and an integrated resin sports bar making its debut.

Wheel-arches also are generous enough to take bigger, fatter alloys than the factory-fitted 18-inchers.

A new sports bar, made from resin, is easier to mould than steel, allowing it to have a more artistic 'sailplane' shape.

Out back are redesigned bumper and tailgate.

The tub itself is kitted out, up the walls too, like a fully carpeted lounge room, with marine-grade, the liner lifting appearance and coverage.

The design makeover is made complete by a chrome Toyota tailgate badge and new deals on the tailgate and sports bar

speaker sound system.

One USB point and two AC 220-Volt accessory sockets are standard.

Restyled instruments consist of an analogue speedo and rev counter with blue pointers flanking a 4.2-inch multi-information display, which now incorporates a digital speed readout and a pictogram showing the angle of the front wheels.

Satellite navigation is easier to use with enhanced voice recognition, while other additions include an electro-chromatic rear-view mirror, new ornamentation and blue illumination.

The upgraded 1GD turbo-diesel engine now develops 150 kW at 3400 rpm and 500Nm between 1600 and 2800 rpm, gains of 15 per cent and 11.1 per cent respectively.

The six-speed automatic transmission was recalibrated to allow earlier lock-up for improved acceleration and to ensure Tovota's temperature tolerances, especially when towing, were observed.

The HiLux Rogue carries a five-star safety rating on 2019 testing and is equipped with Toyota Safety Sense, including a pre-collision system with autonomous emergency braking and the ability to detect pedestrians around



The cabin is dominated by hard surfaces, which is hardly a serious criticism for a hardworking ute.

However, coming to the classy rescue are black perforated leather-accented seats with grev outboard accents.

The front seats are heated while the driver's seat has eight-way power adjustments.

Front and rear carpet mats are included for Rogue.

There's a deep cubby in the centre console and a double-decker dash-mounted glovebox, the upper section cooled.

Door storage includes convenient bottle slots.

Pride of place is a larger eight-inch display touchscreen plus control knobs, an upgraded multimedia system with Apple CarPlay or Android Auto, and a premium JBL nine-

the clock and cyclists in daylight.

It is also equipped with high-speed active cruise control, lane-departure alert with steering assist.

Electronic systems include anti-skid brakes, vehicle stability and traction control, brake assist and electronic brake-force distribution, trailer sway control, downhill assist and an emergency stop signal (hazard lights).

Like every HiLux, the Rogue is equipped with seven airbags and a reversing camera.

Driving has been made easier than before by work done on the rear suspension, improving unladen ride comfort while a new variable flow-control power-steering pump offers more help in low-speed manoeuvres such as parking.

Braked towing capacity has been uprated by 300 kg to 3500 kg, courtesy of the higheroutput engine and a recalibrated six-speed electronically controlled automatic transmission.

Toyota claims a combined urban / highway fuel consumption of 8.4 litres per 100 kilometres

The test vehicle worked out at 11.7 litres per 100 kilometres in suburban streets down to 6.4 litres per 100 kilometres when on the motorway.

Improved ride and handling are all-encompassing with the MY20 Rogue.

Leaf springs and shock absorbers were retuned to improve unladen ride comfort without compromising the vehicle's ability to carry loads over uneven terrain, while low-friction rear shackle bushes add to ride comfort.

Rear stability benefits from leaf spring front bushes with increased lateral stiffness.

Revised chassis mounts reduce vibrations

and noise transfer to the cabin, particularly on rough roads.

A variable flow control power-steering pump improves steering feeling on winding country roads and reduces steering effort when parking.

Pity about the outsize 12.6 metre turning circle

There's also a low-range mode for off-road driving.

The Rogue is up against some of the stiffest competition in the premium luxury ute market.

It's fair to say the power roll top would be considered an important selling point for the Hilux 'hero' and the failure of the accessory on test is not what we have come to expect from Tovota.

Fast weekend for Norris

It is a long way from an Adelaide wrecking yard to the Legend of the Lakes hill climb, but for Anthony Norris, it has become a regular pilgrimage.

Norris runs Grand Auto Wreckers in Reynella, a Nissan and Datsun wrecking yard specialising in 4x4s and SUVs, through which he has been a sponsor of the hill climb since its inception.

But on his time off the pace of everyday life changes and one weekend a year he roars up the Valley Lakes looking to remain at the pointy end of the Marque Sports class.

He has the right equipment under him too, with a well-prepared Nissan Silvia, S15, 200SX, which he uses to good effect at various other hill climbs throughout the year.

But Mount Gambier, set to roar into life on November 11. 12 and 13, holds a special place in his heart, for many reasons.

"I can't praise them up enough," Norris said of the South Eastern Automobile Club who run the Legend of the Lakes hill climb.

"The organisation is amazing and the vol-

unteers do an amazing job.

"If there is an incident on the track they are straight onto it and don't hold up the productivity of what is happening during the day. "It is always a sensational event."

As a sponsor, Norris has been allowed to do runs on Fridays, which he used well last year. "Last year on Friday, straight off the bat I

almost broke the record first run up the hill," he said. "Everyone was astounded by the run.

"I thought the car felt good so I put the pedal to the metal, took it to the limit and did the fastest time of the day.

"I am honoured to be allowed to run on the Friday.

Norris's rear-wheel drive Silvia is in basic form.

The SR20 turbo charged is standard and produces 340 kw at the rear wheels.

It runs an R33 Nissan Skyline gearbox, is lowered with good suspension components, a roll cage and sticky tyres.

Norris is regularly at the pointy end of his class and simply puts it down to experience and seat time in the car.

At 52 years of age Norris has no real plans on slowing down, with the sport of hill climbing well entrenched in his family.

"I just love hill climbs," he said.

"I think it is in my blood.

"My father is a state champion - Jim Norris over in NSW - and every time there is an Australian championship we fly each other over and race each others cars.

"Unfortunately I can say my father beat me by two-tenths of a second in my own car.

"That is hard to say.

"But he is 78 and building his next race car, a 350z with 370z running gear."

As for the course at the Valley Lakes, Norris said it is sensational.

"The track is really good, it is very well prepared and very fast," he said.

"Up the top of the hill, the bus stop, is amazing the way they have set it up.

"I also find the on-camber, off-camber section going through the esses really special.

"You don't think of the guard rails on each

side of you, you just concentrate on getting to the top as fast as you can."

Fast he certainly is, with speeds of around 150 to 160 kilometres per hour up the open section before standing on the brakes for the bus stop, equating to course times in the low 50-seconds.

That particular section is another of his favourites

"It is a beautiful thing the way they have set the bus stop up," Norris said.

You get to the top and see the full crowd up there and wow, just seeing the crowd is inspiring."

At the end of the day Norris certainly enjoys his time in Mount Gambier for what has become a must-do event on the hill climb calendar.

His hopes for this year, apart from good weather, are quite simple.

"It is such a great atmosphere and the rivalry is good," Norris said.

"But I just want to have fun, enjoy myself and drive it on the trailer at the end of the weekend."

A breezy but fishable weekend across the Limestone Coast was taken advantage of by keen anglers, with plenty of fish caught right across the board.

The offshore fishing at Port MacDonnell has been busy over the last week or so, with plenty of fish coming off the bottom.

The shark fishing from 50 metres through to 100 metres has been good again and as per the last few weeks, a good mix of schoolies and gummies have been caught, with fish of both species over 20kg.

To go with the sharks, the reef fish have been great too.

We have seen some red snapper, blue morwong and flathead, along with a few nice snapper.

In trolling news, Port MacDonnell is yet to see any action from the second tuna run, but the Portland fishing has heated up.

There have been some nice fish caught over there in the last few days, from around 80 kilo, through to one caught by James Varcoe, Jason Fulham and Dylan Tincknell that was over 128kg.

The boys landed a couple of fish and both fell to a pair of Troll So Hard lures which are all hand made here in South Australia.

Over the weekend a few anglers had a crack off the beach and found some nice fish.

Young gun Connor Maidment landed his first legal beach mulloway on Saturday evening with a ripper 85cm fish caught at Browns Bay.

The guys also managed a few smaller gummy shark, which were released for another day.

The back of Beachport along the five and 10 mile beaches fished pretty well for gummy shark and salmon this weekend.

Speaking to a few of the locals from down that way, apparently the beaches from Carpenter Rocks through to Beachport were like Rundle Street.

One bloke compared it to the Kingston comp weekend, the beaches were so busy, so to catch a fish with all that going on tells me there must be plenty around at the moment.

The Coorong fishos have had much the same, gummy sharks, salmon and a few mulloway too.

The beaches seem to be getting better up there week by week, and I would expect that to be the trend from now on.

The stir up over the last week or two has been great for whiting fishos across the region.

The swell and wind whipped up a bit and gave the water back a bit of colour.

The land based fishos have had it a bit tricky with the wind and swell being a bit of a hindrance in quite a few spots, but those who are not afraid to brave the wind and rain have ended up with some nice bags full of whiting.

The areas worth a crack if you are land based are still Cape Douglas, Carpenter Rocks or the Port MacDonnell jetty.

The boaties have been doing well in similar areas, they have the ability to chase the fish around until they find them.

Gar numbers are still good, as is the size – it is just the weather that is holding us back.

The fishos in more exposed areas such as Livingstons Bay or Pelican Point have really had to pick their days, whereas areas offering a bit more protection like Cape Douglas or Hutt Bay have been a bit more accessible, even on the average days.

The by-catch is still mullet and salmon trout, but a few decent tommy ruff have been sniffing around too.

There are still a few squid when the weather allows and we are seeing some big samples too, including the odd fish over 3kg.

The Glenelg River is filthy.

The water coming down from its inland catchment areas has turned the river into a chocolate milkshake and while there are still fish there, they are playing hard to get.

The estuary area or around the Nelson township is probably the best bet for bait fishos at the moment to target a few bream.

When the tide is incoming, the flow is slowing up, so those lower sections at the moment are probably the pick.

Lure fishos have found the odd perch over the weekend, but metal vibes or quite heavily weighted soft plastics have been the go-to.

Mulloway have been tough.

I have not heard of any in the last week or so and I would expect that to be the tune until we see the flow slow a bit and the clarity start to return.

Until next week, safe fishing.

Has there been a better time to be training a greyhound

IT was in 2013 – not so long after TAB racing commenced at Tara Raceway – that the Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club (MGGRC) built its first slipping track at the Lake Terrace East venue.

In fact, the MGGRC was the first in SA to construct a slipping track – a fenced area where greyhounds could safely free-gallop as part of their training regime.

These days, there are two tracks, side by side.

MGGRC president, Noel Perry, said the automatically-watered tracks had been of great assistance to the local "back yard" trainers involved in the sport.

"We'd like to see more of these types of trainers involved." he said.



A look at an old South East Greyhound Racing Club race book makes for interesting reading.

Not so many interstate greyhounds racing at Tara Raceway back then but trainers were nominating from larger SA towns such as Naracoorte and Millicent – and plenty of smaller ones as well.

Interestingly, at one stage Naracoorte had been seriously considered as the spot where the South-East greyhound track would be built.

Such was the greyhound population at Millicent that a Millicent Cup day was held annually at Tara Raceway.

These days there are no racing greyhounds in either town.

So what does greyhound racing currently

function in or out of the out at

"You certainly don't need acres of land to train a greyhound providing there is access to free galloping.

"Plenty of good dogs have come from back yard environments."

Perry said the club was now hopeful of making the slipping track area into a complete training facility with the addition of a "bullring" which could be a popular innovation for many trainers.

A bullring is simply a miniature track which is operated manually and is a great education tool.

It gives young dogs an introduction to what is required when it comes to chasing an artificial lure.

"Shortly, we will be talking with Greyhound Racing SA (GRSA) representatives re-

garding the proposed upgrade of the training facility," Perry said.

"We believe not only will it be of benefit to all trainers in the region, but also to greyhound racing in general."

Perry also said a proposed business plan by Adelaide-based GRSA director David Lewis looking at increased participation in greyhound racing in South-East was to be the subject of a forthcoming workshop in Mount Gambier.

through with Mount Gambier club representatives," he said.

"Among the topics to be discussed are 'How do we attract new trainers?" 'How to train a greyhound and keep it healthy' and 'What does GRSA need to do to support new trainers?'

"As far as an introduction to greyhound racing goes, it has been suggested a 1-2 hour seminar at Tara Raceway to go through all aspects of becoming a trainer.

"Also suggested has been a visit to an existing trainer and quality promotional material."
