Radio's new start

A battle in the fight for the recovery of Millicent's 5THE FM has been won, but the war will rage on, as they face the aftermath of investigations into the station.

There is change in the air-waves, with a new committee taking over the reins, but they will have their work cut out for them as they face the outcomes of investigations by the Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA) and Consumer and Business Services (CBS).

The outcomes of the two ACMA investigations into the station were published last Friday, finding the station in breach of several parts of the code.

The station was reported to ACMA by members of the public after multiple attempts were made to contact the station with no response.

One complaint alleged that the station failed to comply with licence conditions in the Broadcasting Services Act 1992 (BSA) due to its lack of a functioning board.

In that complaint, the report states that "ACMA finds that the licensee is not encouraging members of the community to participate in the operations of its service, and accordingly has breached paragraph 9(2)(c)(i) of Schedule 2 to the BSA."

"The licensee has demonstrated it takes some steps to promote membership and volunteering," the report states.

"However, notwithstanding the impacts of COVID-19, and the small licence area that the service is located in, membership numbers are low.

"Over the previous two years 5THE has not operated in accordance with the corporate governance requirements set out by its constitution in relation to holding AGMs, and subsequently has not provided the opportunity for members to nominate for management committee positions.

"5THE has also been unable to provide re-

cent financial records.

"The ACMA is of the view that due to the concerns with the soundness of the licensee's corporate governance processes, including both the provisions of the constitution and the failure to act in accordance with the constitu-

tion, the licensee has breached paragraph 9(2)(c)(i) of Schedule 2 to the BSA."

In the second investigation, the station was reported to ACMA due to a complaint that no response was received after a complaint was made to the station.

"The ACMA complaint raised, among other things, concerns that a complaint had been made to 5THE on 22 November 2021 (5THE complaint) and no response had been received," the report states.

In a statement, LCLHN said it was looking into the development of a respiratory service to help reduce presentations to the emergency departments and length of stays in hospital.

“Part of this process is assessing the model of care required to deliver the service, that would manage chronic respiratory disease, including asthma and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, as well as acute respiratory illness,” it said.

“We will update the community on any new services in the future.”

LCLHN did not say when exactly the service is expected to be fully up and running.

Vineyards snapped up by winery giant

New start for radio: But issues linger from investigations

“The 5THE complaint addressed an issue covered by the Community Radio Broadcasting Codes of Conduct 2008 (the Codes).

“The 5THE complaint stated that coverage of the Millicent saleyards by 5THE contained inaccurate and misleading statements.”

In that investigation, ACMA found the station to be in breach of Code 7.3 (c) of the Codes.

The reports were released just one day after a special general meeting where a vote of no confidence in the previous committee was passed unanimously, and a new committee was elected.

David Walshaw was elected as chairperson, Michael Schultz as treasurer and secretary Megan Brennan and joining them on the board will be Ian Harrison, Ken lane, Chris Copeland and Paul McRobert.

John McLoughlin will remain as public officer for the immediate future, to assist with the changes.

The board got to work quickly, with locks being changed on Friday.

Mr Walshaw said the first task for the committee was working towards correcting issues discovered through the investigations.

“The Community Broadcasting Association has alerted us to the fact that CB were going to deregister the association, which would be awful, because we’d have to start all over again,” he said.

“We’ve sent them off the minutes of the AGM and the board members, their qualifications and all that sort of stuff, so hopefully, they can see now that the session is in good hands, and it is going to be positive moving forward.

“What we’ve got to do is look at the omissions that the ACMA have picked up in their investigation, we’ve got to make sure that we correct all those.

“We will be talking about governance and engagement and a whole range of things and making sure we have appropriate committee structures, First up, first thing is making sure our corporate governance is okay and our finances are where they need to be.

“We’re now looking at our policies and our procedures that support our operations - we’ve formed a small subcommittee to look at on-air content.

“That group is now looking at how we put the station back on the air. So they’ve got skills in programming, and on air activity, so what they’re gonna do is start to put together a schedule of what local content might look like over the next couple of weeks.

“Now, we’re not gonna be able to jump straight to 24/7 broadcasting, obviously, but we want get started off next week with five or six local sessions, and then gradually build up from there as the volunteers come on board - we’ve got over 60 signed up already. That’s really positive.”

“There’s just been overwhelming support from the community down here to get that station back on there and functioning as it should be.”

A Limestone Coast business will hit the world stage next year in a bid to drive international visitors to the region.

People urged to keeps testing with free access to tests

Wattle Range locals will now have greater access to Covid testing as the state’s peak health body looks to encourage people to not get complacent.

SA Health has announced South Australians have access to five free Rapid Antigen Tests (RATs) from selected collection sites, regardless of if they have been a close contact or not.

Up to 500,000 RAT kits have been made available from existing collection points for people to collect until the end of the year.

The measure has come as a way to support testing during the current wave of Covid.

Chief public health officer Nicola Spurrier said getting tested and avoiding contact with people displaying symptoms continues to vital to reducing Covid transmission in the community.

“The expansion of our free RAT distribution program will help South Australians access testing for themselves and members of

their family to help reduce spread of the disease to others,” Prof Spurrier said.

“In addition, the RAT program will also be expanded to directly support emergency service volunteers and those living and working in vulnerable settings.

“Thank you to the South Australians who continue to report their positive RAT result, as it allows us to monitor the pandemic and enables us to support eligible people to access lifesaving Covid-19 oral antiviral treatments.”

People in Wattle Range will be able to access their five free RATs from the collection point at the Millicent Hospital on Spehr Street.

RATs will also be distributed to emergency services volunteers, vulnerable communities, and people living and working in supported residential facilities.

At time of publication, there were 25 active cases in Wattle Range.

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Council accountability focus of new State panel

An independent panel will now keep an eye on serious and repeated council misbehaviour as the State Government looks to reform local government standards and conduct.

The Behavioural Standards Panel has come as part of a new conduct management framework for councils across the state to ensure elected members behave as ratepayers expect.

Minister for Local Government Geoff Brock said while the majority of council members act with integrity and professionalism, the panel aims to manage complaints of serious and repeated misbehaviour.

“Councils across the state will benefit from having a clear path to escalate serious matters, with the independent panel vested with strong powers to hold elected members behaving poorly to account,” Mr Brock said.

“These behavioural reforms set the tone for a new term of council, particularly for first-time members, who should expect to represent their community in a supportive environment, without harassment or bullying.

“As part of the new conduct management framework, mandatory training and clear standards of expected behaviour will also guide members to work together and maintain the professional relationships expected by our communities.”

The panel has been given the power to hand down sanctions on council members, including suspension of up to three months with or without their allowance.

Local Government Association (LGA) chief executive Clinton Jury said the panel will allow councils to focus on serving their communities rather than spending resources on settling disputes.

“The commencement of the new Behavioural Standards Panel is a significant milestone for the local government sector, which gives councils clearer legislative avenues to resolve any serious or repeat instances of poor behaviour within the council chamber,” he said.

“Mayors and councillors play key roles in shaping council plans, deciding priorities and decision-making – sometimes regarding multi-million-dollar projects or infrastructure – so it’s imperative they conduct themselves in a manner befitting their influential positions.

“We know an overwhelming majority of SA’s 700-plus elected members do this – however, what the introduction of this panel does is allow councils to resolve behavioural conflicts through an independent body, should they arise.”

Further to the Panel, Mr Brock has released behavioural standards to apply to all council members across the state, with each council also required to set policies on how to deal with complaints within the next six months.

The Wattle Range Council held their first meeting of the new council term on Tuesday.

It was a packed agenda, with plenty of issues to discuss.

BEACHPORT MEDICAL CLINIC TO CLOSE

More than 2000 patients of the Beachport Medical Clinic will be left without a doctor when the Beachport Medical centre closes its doors this month.

The clinic will close for good on December 16.

Councillor Sharon Cox asked about the situation at the Wattle Range council meeting on Tuesday.

Chief executive Ben Gower said the clinic was owned by council and leased to the doctors for “peppercorn rent” and that the current lessors had chosen not to renew the lease, which expired in 2020.

The lease expired more than two years ago, but the leasing doctors did not sign another one.

He said the clinic doctors had advised council that they were speaking to other clinics in the area, including Millicent to possibly take over the lease, but said there had been no formal arrangements presented to them.

He said council would be ready to handover a lease if and when a new lessor is found.

COMMUNITY TALKS ABOUT BEDFORD

A community meeting was held last week to discuss the upcoming closure of the laundromat, which is currently operated by disability employment service Bedford.

The closure has seen 22 staff lose their jobs.

Late Thursday, employees, carers and parents gathered in Millicent to discuss the issues, and come up with a plan.

Director Development Services Emma Clay said there was a lot of distress around the issue and lots of discussion.

She said there were two ways for the laun-

dry to continue - through a private enterprise taking over or a community led not for profit set up.

Ms Clay said the group is looking into that and was “tasked with actions” to move forward.

One issue that arose out of the meeting was the condition of the laundry itself.

She said the building is not fit for purpose and the equipment was at the end of its life, so one action was to find out what Bedford are selling the laundry and the business for.

Council Chief executive Ben Gower said the model of funding has changed which has prompted the closure.

“The operator was collecting large amount

from NDIS and very little was making it back in the way of wages to the members,” he said.

“That model has changed.”

However, he said new operators are likely to come in.

It was suggested that the council hold a barbeque to thank the staff for their work, with some staff working there for more than 30 years.

DEPUTY MAYOR APPOINTED

Councillor Peter Dunncliff will be the new deputy Mayor of Wattle Range Council.

He was chosen by majority vote in a secret ballot, beating out crs Moira Neagle and Chris Brodie, who were also nominated.

He will serve as deputy for two years, as per a motion received at the meeting.

He will succeed Cr Neagle, who served as deputy mayor in the last term.

OPPOSITION LEADER “WON’T APOLOGISE”

Mr Gower said he doesn’t believe Opposition leader David Speirs will apologize for comments made at a public forum regarding Wattle Range Council’s “shenanigans” regarding the proposal for the new council building.

Earlier this year, at a community forum in Mount Gambier, a member of the public raised the matter of the proposed \$9.2m Wattle Range council office, to which Mr Speirs said he would keep an eye the “shenanigans in Millicent”.

Cr Neagle asked whether Mr Gower had discussed the incident with Mr Speirs, to which he said he had taken the opportunity to asked the leader of the opposition during a recent visit to Southend.

He said he was told the clipping from a news article about the incident hung in Mr Speirs office because it “gave them a chuckle” and Mr Gower clarified the facts for the opposition leader.

However, when asked if Mr Speirs had apologised for making the comment, Mr Gower said he “did not apologise and does not intend to.”

TREES TO BE PLANTED

Councillors voted unanimously to plant a tree in each of the council’s 13 communities in an appropriate public space, in memory of Queen Elizabeth II.

The motion came from a letter sent by local woman Alice Cruikshanks, who asked that a tree be planted in Millicent.

Cr Neagle, who moved the motion, said she supported the idea but thought it should be spread to all communities.

A year of big success for Stand Like Stone

Through 2021/22 the Stand Like Stone Foundation provided \$213,255 to community members and groups across the Limestone Coast through grants and scholarships.

This achievement and more were celebrated at the foundation’s Year in Review gathering, where the board of directors, staff and community stakeholders came together to hear about the last 12 months at the foundation.

Being one of the leading community foundations in Australia, foundation chief executive officer (CEO) Roger Babolka outlined how Stand Like Stone had supported the community through the year and was pleased to report it was a successful one.

Mr Babolka said the \$213,255 was shared between four categories, educational scholarships, back to school vouchers, charitable projects and local grants, which could not have been achieved without support from the community. He said over the last financial year the foundation supplied \$71,878 through scholarships to 34 students.

“Thirty-four students across our region have received support from the foundation, that support ranges from a few \$100 to pay for equipment or fees, through to thousands of dollars for some accommodation for students who are now residing in Adelaide or Melbourne to undertake study,” he said.

“It’s a significant range of support we provide, and we’re currently going through that process now for this year’s funding.”

The CEO was also pleased to report all 40 public schools in the Limestone Coast had been supported by their Back to School vouchers, with more than 900 students assisted.

“That totals \$46,000 of \$50 vouchers that have gone out to schools across the region to support students who need an extra hand,

and that goes to pay for possibly clothing, equipment, paying for students to attend an excursion they may not normally be able to attend,” he said.

Also supported were 14 community groups across the region, with the foundation supplying \$45,377 in grants to organisations like the Tatiara Men’s Shed, Beachport Surf Life Saving Club and Riding for Disabled, Mount Gambier.

Working with One Forty One, the foundation was able to supply a further \$50,000 to community projects.

Mr Babolka said three projects were supported, including the completion of the Mil-Lel Memorial Hall kitchen upgrade, assisting more than 50 students develop confidence and resilience through Youth Opportunities, and supporting families to engage with external services and their wider school community through Australian School Plus.

“We owe a lot to One Forty One, they continue to support what we do,” he said.

The foundation also assisted in fundraising for the Penola Town Square working group, and helped them achieve their goal in creating the Generosity of Spirit sculpture, set to be unveiled May 2023.

Through the year the foundation supported three flexible learning centres in the region and auspiced a FRRR ABC Heywire Youth Innovations Grant.

Attendees also heard from chair of the board Robert Mock, who said the foundation was thankful for all the support they had been given over the year, which allowed them to give back to the community.

“I thanks the staff and all who have supported the foundation in any way throughout the year,” he said.

Mr Babolka also thanked stakeholders for their continued support and then the two men answered a few questions, before attendees enjoyed a bit of networking.

Key take homes on beef

The critical role sustainable beef production must play in an equitable and healthy food system and the need for sustainability goal setting were two of the key take home messages for the Australian beef industry to emerge from the recent Global Conference on Sustainable Beef.

Hosted by the Global Roundtable for Sustainable Beef (GRSB) over four days in Denver, Colorado, the conference brought together stakeholders from beef supply chains throughout the world to share new information and discuss priority and emerging themes.

Australian speakers at the event included Australian Beef Sustainability Framework (ABSF) Sustainability Steering Group (SSG) chair, Mark Davie, and Meat & Livestock Australia manager – beef sustainability, Jacob Betros, as well as GRSB president and Tyson Foods director of sustainability, Ian McConnell.

Mr Davie, a Central Queensland beef producer and director of Keppel Brand food manufacturers, said discussions throughout the conference highlighted the need for the beef industry to prioritise engaging in genuine conversations with customers and consumers.

“For a long time, we have heard that beef just needs to better tell its story, but we know only about 50 per cent of our target audiences are listening,” Mr Davie said.

“What we need to do is move from talking about industry to engaging in two-way conversations, to not only share the good work being undertaken by Australian beef businesses but also to understand how we are being perceived and identify areas which require our investment, input and attention.”

Mr Davie also pointed to the importance of goal setting in leading industry progress and engagement at both a regional and global level.

“There is a lot of focus from global supply chains on goal setting and development of sustainability metrics, however it is important that science-based targets are informed by the scientific research of the bio-region it is measuring,” he said.

“Production and environments across the world is highly varied and sustainability goals must recognise these differences to deliver the best outcomes for the environment and productivity in unique geographic settings.”

Mr McConnell reiterated the power of goal setting in the global sustainability discussion.

“Increasingly, the importance of livestock production to the food system is an emerging topic and the GRSB has been able to use its global goals as a platform to demonstrate

our ambition and gain access to conversations that would otherwise not be open to us,” he said.

“The Australian beef industry must now clearly state its ambitions around key sustainability topics to remain relevant and trusted.”

With a diverse group of stakeholders represented over the four days, Mr McConnell said some key issues still required consensus across industry.

“Issues like deforestation and animal welfare still need questions answered but in discussion throughout the week it was evident there is alignment to achieving a net positive

contribution to nature and ensuring a life worth living for animals,” he said.

“It’s been an important area of work for the GRSB to find that common ground and allow progress to continue without creating a binary definition of sustainability that rules some in, and some out.”

Both Mr Davie and Mr McConnell referenced a quote delivered by Cameron Bruett, JBS Foods USA, during his address to conference delegates: “Producing food is a privilege and doing it sustainably is an obligation”.

“I think the ABSF and Australia are really well positioned in sustainability and are help-

ing to lead the global work in the space. We need to continue investment in developing the right tools to measure progress and support an ongoing conversation with consumers,” Mr Davie said.

“We also have a clear opportunity to help other regions, particularly those in the developing world such as Africa and South America, to advance sustainable beef production and feed more of the hungry and malnourished population. The role of beef in nutrition and in addressing food shortage was an important and recurring theme of the conference.”



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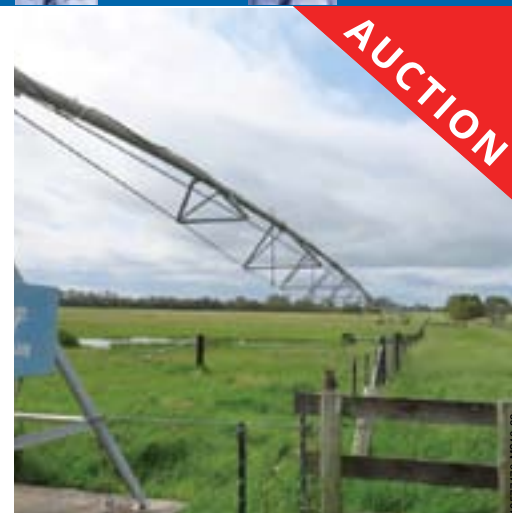

Kia Niro EV a power move

Kia Niro is a compact, five-seat crossover offered by Kia since 2016.

Second generation Niro was launched in late 2021 and is essentially a downsized vessel for Kia's electric technology.

A partner for the larger, higher-priced EV6, it's offered in three versions overseas: hybrid, plug-in hybrid and battery electric variants.

Australia takes the hybrid and fully electric versions and the one we're looking at here is the fully electric top spec Niro EV GT-Line.

All-new Niro features the latest version of Kia's signature Tiger Face, which extends from the bonnet to the bumper below.

Although the shape of the wagon is conventional, the look has been enhanced by striking 'heartbeat' daytime running lights (DRLs), a bold skid plate and coloured side cladding which combine to lift the look.

The side profile features a striking C-Pillar, finished in contrasting colours, which incorporates an air channel that exits behind the tail lights to help to improve aerodynamic efficiency.

At the rear, Volvo-like tail lights complete the look, while the heartbeat-shaped rear reflector, skid plate and lower bumper complement the front design.

Niro EV comes in two grades: S and GT-Line.

S is priced from \$65,300 and the GT-Line from \$72,100 plus on-roads.

Premium adds \$520.

Our car was finished in Snow White Pearl with a Steel Grey C pillar.

Inside, recycled materials have been used to reduce the environmental footprint.

The headlining is made from recycled PET materials, the seats are made from Bio PU with Tencel from eucalyptus tree fibres and BTX-free paint (without benzene, toluene, and xylene) is used on the door panels.

Options for personalisation include a choice of contrasting C-Pillar colours with the GT-Line: Cityscape Green or Mineral Blue can be combined with a gloss black C-Pillar, while Snow White Pearl can be paired with a C-Pillar and cladding in Steel Grey.

Standard kit includes two-zone climate air, cloth/artificial leather trim, power-adjust front seats and a heated steering wheel.

There's also heads-up display, smart cruise control with stop and go, remote smart parking assist, auto high beam, auto lights and wipers, auto-dimming rear vision mirror, a hands-free tailgate, wireless Qi charger and telematics (eCall, Remote Control, Vehicle Status Monitoring etc).

EV GT-Line adds ambient lighting, LED headlights, ventilated front seats, tilt and slide sunroof, front passenger reclining relaxation seat and V2L which means you can use the car to power other devices.

Infotainment in the GT-Line consists of a 12.3-inch touchscreen and eight speaker Harman Kardon audio, with voice control, built-in navigation, with AM/FM and DAB digital radio and the Sounds of Nature background noise.

Once again, the cheaper S gets wireless Apple CarPlay and Android Auto while the GT-Line makes do with the wired version of both.

As well as a platform, Niro shares its powertrain and battery pack with the Hyundai Kona Electric.

This means 150kW of power and 255Nm of torque, Single Speed Transmission (reduction gear) that drives the front wheels and a battery capacity of 64.8kWh.

Safety features include eight airbags, rear view camera with dynamic guidelines and autonomous emergency braking (AEB), with Car, Pedestrian, Cyclist and Junction Turning detection.

There's also Multi Collision Braking (MCB),

Blind Spot Collision Avoidance Assist (BCA), Rear Cross Traffic Collision Avoidance Assist (RCCA) and Intelligent Speed Limit Assist (ISLA) as standard across all trim levels.

Other standard safety features include Lane Keeping Assist (LKA), Driver Attention Warning (DAW), High Beam Assist (HBA), Lane Following Assist (LFA), Rear View Monitor (RVM) and Rear Cross-Traffic Collision-Avoidance Assist (RCCA).

GT-Line adds Front and Rear Parking Sensors, Parking Collision-Avoidance Assist Reverse (PCA-R), Safe Exit Assist, Power Child Lock and Emergency Service 'eCall' through the Kia Connect functions.

There are four selectable drive modes: Eco, Normal, Sport and Snow (the latter replacing Eco+).

Each has a different effect on things like the air-con and electric motor torque profile.

A 'virtual' engine sound compensates for lack of engine noise.

The dash from 0-100 km/h takes 7.8 seconds, it has a top speed of 167km/h and a very useable driving range of 460 km (WLTP) -- 5km more than the model it replaces.

The 423kg battery array is secreted under the floor and takes the weight of the car to a hefty 1727 kg.

It's a much snazzier looking thing than the previous model, with cool LED lights, an interesting rear pillar design and two-tone paint work that all make it stand out.

A new car has not been launched that hasn't grown in dimensions and Niro is no exception.

The EV's dimensions have grown 45mm in length to 4420mm, 20mm in width to 1825mm, with a height the same at 1570mm EV.

The wheelbase has also grown 20mm longer to 2720mm.

Unlike the hybrid, the EV is fitted with smaller, aerodynamic, 17-inch alloys and 215/55 R17 Michelin Primacy 3 rubber.

Boot space has grown to 475 litres behind the rear seats, with a tyre repair kit for punctures.

The dated interior of the previous model has been replaced by hi-tech, minimalist decor echoing rivals such as the Volvo and Polestar.

Colour wise, it's a combination of bone,

grey and piano black trim, with some metal-look finishers.

Some of the grey is textured, but there needs to be more colour variation.

A pair of 10.25-inch digital screens, one for the instruments and a touch sensitive one for infotainment merge to create a single sweeping effect.

Touch sensitive aircon controls sit below the centre screen, separated from the screen above by a pair of slim line air vents.

Kia says the layout removes clutter for a clean and coherent look and ensures front seat occupants can access these important controls without the need to scroll through multiple menus.

That may be so but try turning down the volume if you're the front seat passenger.

There's no physical volume knob and nothing apparent in the infotainment system.

Same goes for finding your favourite radio station.

It assumes the operator knows to swipe the screen left to expose more options including the radio.

There's no physical home button either.

Like the previous model, the drive experience is fun, punchy when necessary, with decent range to keep any feelings of anxiety at bay.

With 420 kilos of battery riding close to the road, Niro is surprisingly well anchored in corners, although weight eventually tells against it as it tries to run wide.

The ride can be harsh and bouncy at times (EVs don't like speed humps).

Performance is rapid but not what we'd describe as flat-out quick.

Punch the accelerator and it surges forward, putting annoying tailgaters in their place -- but they're not gone and forgotten.

We clocked up more than 500km at an average of 14.7 kWh/100km.

Niro EV seems reluctant to give up its stored energy, with distance to empty changing hardly at all sometimes -- unlike some EVs that chew through their charge quickly.

Charging is via Type 2 AC or CCS Combo 2 DC connections and we're happy to say the charge port is conveniently located at the front of the car.

Given a choice, I'd prefer all my EVs to

come this way, as it makes nosing the car into the charger much easier.

Note though that not all chargers you come across support all types of connection, and you may require an adaptor.

Satnav by the way keeps track of the nearest charge station.

Topping up the EV's 64.8kWh lithium-ion polymer battery from 10-100 per cent using the supplied cable and standard power point will take 27 hours 30 mins.

With a standard 7kW wall box this reduces to 9 hours 25 mins, or with a more powerful 11kW box, 6 hours 20 mins.

A fast DC charger can do it in as little as 43 minutes.

Energy from braking is reclaimed and fed back into the battery.

It can be controlled using steering wheel paddles and permits one-pedal driving.

Lift your foot off the accelerator and the car will brake automatically.

While it all sounds like fun, the purchase of an electric car is a big commitment.

Like I've said in the past, buying an EV, at least at this stage of the game, is something of a lifestyle choice.

Be warned because it could take over your life.

The previous model offered value for money in terms of an EV.

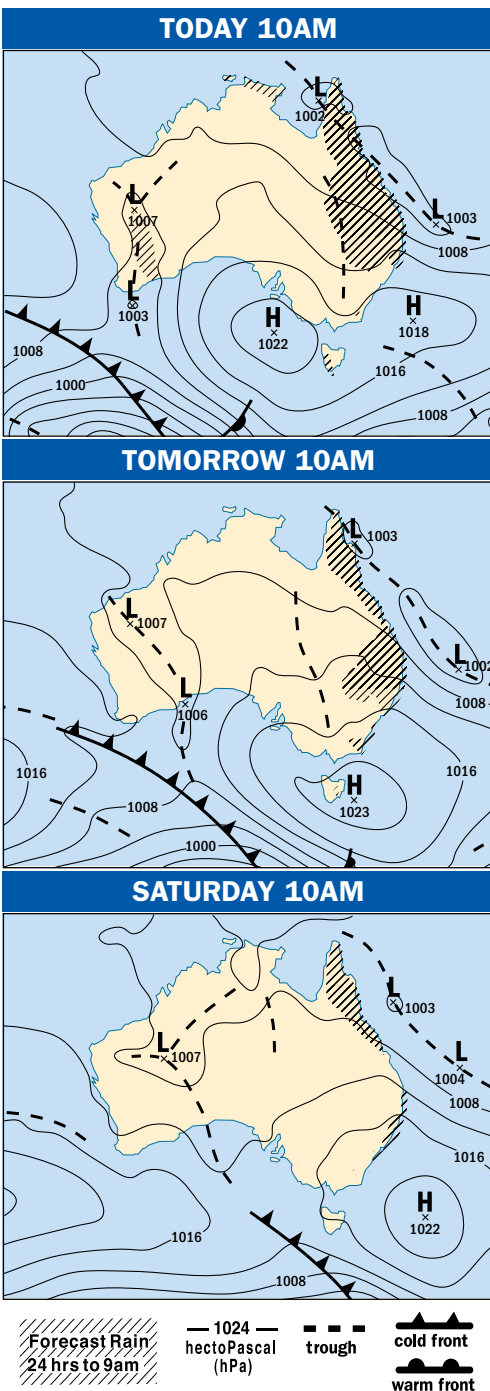
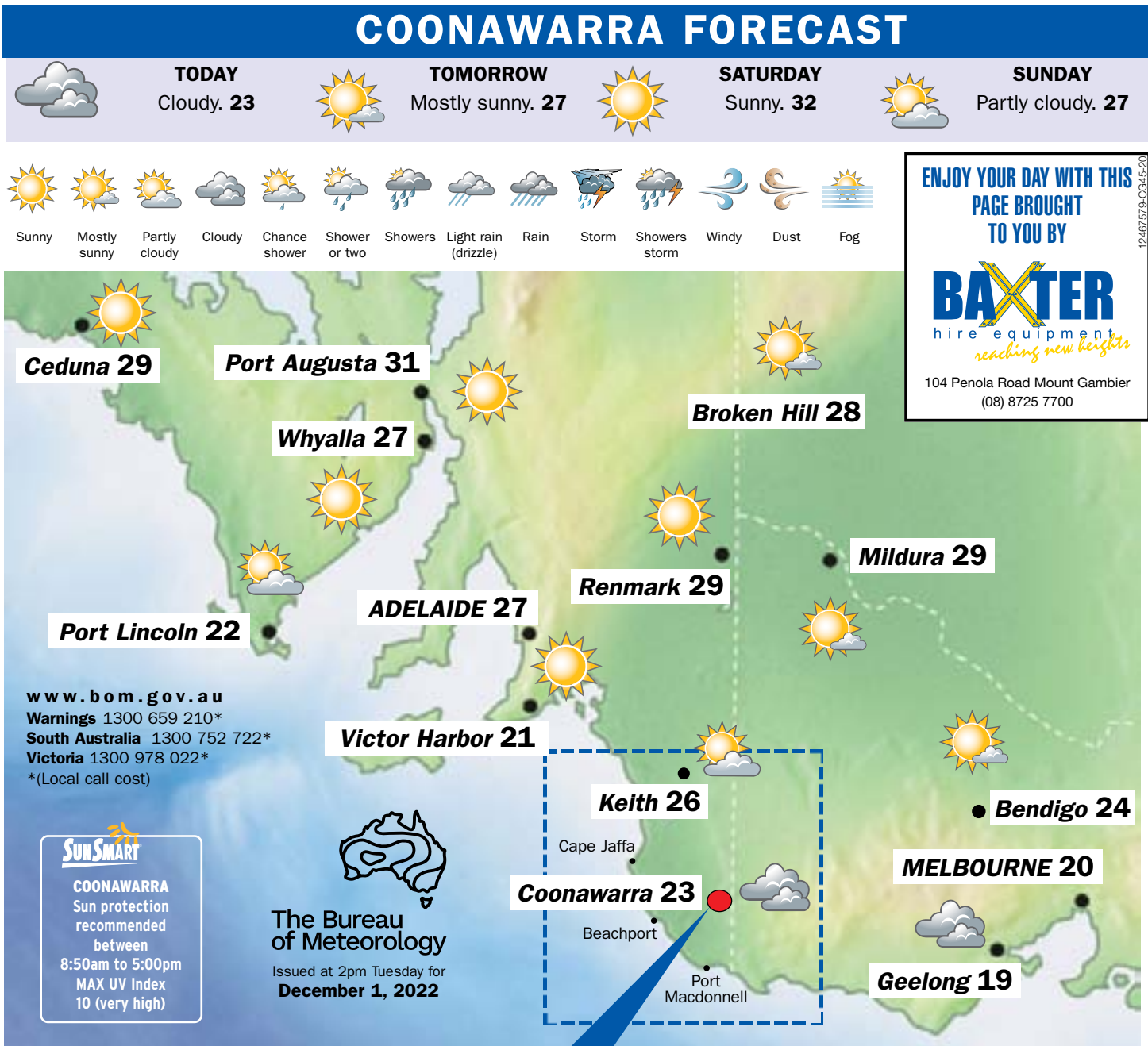

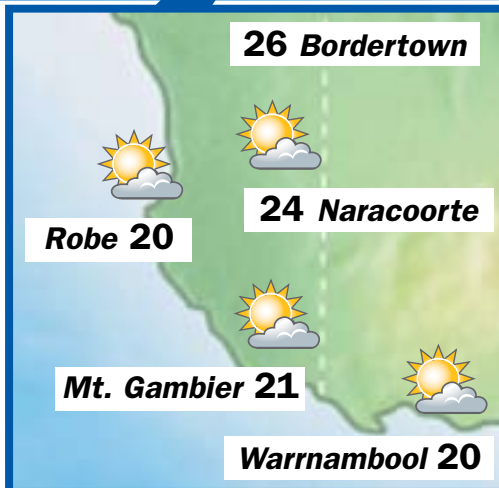

Before an Aussie version of this competition-based comedy series hits screens next year, with Tom Gleeson as its arbiter of good tasks, it's advisable to get a handle on the slightly unconventional format – season 11 of the original British version, premiering tonight, should do nicely. Quite a breezy weekend across the Limestone Coast saw only the keenest of anglers hit the water.

However, those who were not deterred by the wind and rain did manage to find some good fish out there.

The local surf anglers were into the fish from far and wide and there was a range of species caught.

Snapper were still the big one this week, with most crews finding them without too many hassles.

There has been fish over 70cm caught by those fishing the surf, which is a serious sized snapper.

Whiting numbers for the beach goers have continued to impress, with most small sandy holes within casting range of the beach worth a shot.

Areas worth trying are Cape Douglas, Joneses Bay, Blackfellows Caves and Carpenter Rocks.

Just keep on the move until you find them and you will be set.

The South East Amateur Surf Fishing Club held a competition over the weekend and it was great to hear of so many anglers hitting the beach.

Taking home the chocolates in the seniors category was Les Godrik with a nice gummy shark, while in the juniors Levi Hunter won with a solid snapper.

A few fishos headed to the Coorong over the weekend and while there were a few fish caught, the general consensus was the weed made it almost unbearable.

It is disappointing when you drive all that way, plan so much and the weather finally lines up, for you to hit the beach and be weed-ed out.

Chris and Rachel Wehl fished over Cape Bridgewater way and Rachel managed her first ever gummy off the beach - it was a ripper too.

While we are over that way, Portland Breakwater has been a hot spot over the last week or so.

Snapper to 80cm have been landed, but countless between the 60-70cm have been caught.

Fish of the week down there has to go to Byron Grinham though, who landed a beast at 86cm, which took a liking to a full squid head.

Offshore fishing has taken a bit of a back-seat while the weather has been average, but that looks to change this weekend.

There were a few small windows of opportunity late last week and even early weekend where a few did sneak out along the coast.

Much like the beach goers, the snapper were in high supply.

From Orwell Rocks down to Green Point, there were some good fish caught.

Glenn Fry and crew boated countless on Friday evening at Orwell Rocks with fish to 60cm being the norm.

Other anglers further down the coast boated fish of similar sizes along Danger and Green Points too.

When the weather settles enough to head offshore, I have no doubt the shark and reef fish will still be in good numbers, so get out and have a crack.

Boaties have found good numbers of whiting along the Limestone Coast.

There have been plenty from Danger Point and Racecourse Bay area, through the Port MacDonnell Breakwater, Cape Douglas, Blackfellows Caves and down to Pelican Point.

The size has been great for most and the bycatch these last few weeks has been unreal.

I have heard of sweep, trevally, snapper, gummy sharks and even the odd crayfish taking a liking to the baits, so you never know what might go home with you.

The garfish have remained pretty good despite less than perfect conditions.

There have been good numbers from the usual haunts around Petrified Forrest, Hutt Bay and Livingstons Bay, with boaties and waders sharing the success.

A few anglers have found some chunky tommy ruff mixed in with the gar on the odd occasion.

In my opinion, fresh smoked tommy ruff really takes some beating.

The inland fishing has continued this week.

Rocklands has been the go-to again with the cod, yellowbelly and redfin still on the chew.

Another spot which has been worth a look is Lake Charlegrark.

Murray Cod to 75cm have been caught in recent weeks from up that way and even if fishing is not your thing, it is a magic spot to camp or for a day trip.

The Glenelg River has started to clean up a fair bit and while it is still a long way from the colour we are used to, there is a noticeable improvement.

The mullet fishing has been slow again, but I have heard of half a dozen fish from down in the estuary taken on live clickers.

Clickers can be tricky to find, but the fish do love them.

The Glenelg River Angling Club held a competition over the weekend and there were some good bream caught by members.

Neville Issacson boated one beauty at 1.2kg, and my young fella Finn (Coates) caught his best perch at 37cm.

The weekend looks like we are finally in for a taste of summer as we see temperatures creep into the low 30's.

Sunday has a bit of a cool change coming behind it, but with a manageable wind forecast, it should be all good.

Until next week, safe fishing.

Dunrobin's Hayley Rees finished second in the women, followed by Fleur Barling.

Penola's Kate McDonald was the seventh woman to cross the finish line.

During the presentations, the half marathon winners gave some feedback on the course and their visit to the region.

"It was very fun, but gee those hills were tough," Batt-Doyle said post-race.

"Mount Gambier has certainly put it on for us.

"It has been an awesome weekend with the Gift on Saturday and being out at Little Athletics on Friday.

"We definitely hope to be back to Mount Gambier again."

Cocks was equally impressed by the course and while he had not visited Mount Gambier before, he does have connections to the Blue Lake city.

His father Michael is a former North Gambier footballer, while also an athlete in his own right, having run in the Hawaiian Iron Man.

"I thought the course was certainly very challenging with the hills," Cocks said.

"The volunteers and the marking and everyone who put the course together did a really good job.

"I didn't know the course that well, but at no point did I feel lost out there.

"It is great to see running and athletics growing in Mount Gambier and it is a good opportunity to get around the sport as it continues to grow."

However, these positive results have boosted confidence and given an insight into the potential we could see realised in the 2023 series.

"It was probably the best results I have had in the 600cc class," Skeer said.

"I was able to pull something out of a year which was probably looking to be one of my worst I have had.

"It was good to finish on the podium and get my first podium."

Qualifying was held on Saturday and Skeer was smart to use the early session to his advantage before the rain came later in the day.

"I qualified second and surprised myself a bit," Skeer said.

"So then I was like, we will see what we can do from the front row on Sunday.

"I was able to get the holeshot in race one and came away with second."

Skeer was passed on turn three by Harrison Voight, an overseas wildcard entry for the round.

"Then I just sat in second and tried to hang onto the leader, but he did have a bit more pace," Skeer said.

"He was another level above all of us that weekend."

However, Skeer was pleased with his performance and to come home first amongst the championship riders was a huge reward for a consistent ride.

"I sat in second for the whole race with a three or four second gap to third," he said.

"I just maintained that and did some consistent lap times.

"Every lap I did was within 0.8 of a second over the nine laps.

"I felt pretty good."

Another consistent run in race two gave Skeer his second podium for the series.

An average start dropped him back to fourth, before he found his groove and secured a top-three finish.

"By lap two I was back up to third," Skeer said.

"By the time I got into third the bloke in second had pulled a second on me and I couldn't quite get the gap back.

"I just sat in third and was just happy to finish the weekend."

Some personal best lap times paired with his consistent ride over the weekend has fuelled Skeer's drive to take things up a gear next year.

"It is really good to prove we actually can run at the front and when our package is going well, we have the pace to fight for podiums," he said.

"In that first race I was really the first one in the championship home, because Harry who won is from overseas and was a wild card.

"It just makes me more determined to go hard next year.

"I feel like I can fight for the championship now."

Skeer will now turn his attention to a few test days at home track McNamara Park, along with The Bend and Phillip Island, before setting his sights on the 2023 Supersport Series.
