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Station signs off

Last Wednesday Millicent's community radio station 107.7 frequency was turned off but new presenters ensured the station went out on a high.

The Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA) recently refused to renew the station's community broadcasting

licence after considering the five year licence application submitted by the previous board.

This decision has left the organisation without their traditional exclusive frequency.

5THE FM chair, David Walshaw, said it was a sad day for Millicent to hear the transmis-

sion broadcasting from the station cease after 30 years.

11 new presenters continue to host shows from the Railway Terrace studio, which can be live streamed through the My Radio Stream website.

Four volunteers Ken Lane, Chris Copeland, Craig Press and Paul McRobert were available for the final show on the 107.7 frequency and reassured the community they could still be heard through the internet.

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A good business

ATAR excellence praised

Four Millicent High School (MHS) students received final Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) scores over 90 with 17 year old Amelia Ballantyne winning the school's Uni SA award for the highest result.

The MHS vice captain received an ATAR of 91.50 with a final score of 97.6 after adjustments.

Amelia told the South Eastern Times that she was expecting low 90's but didn't think her final result would be as high.

"I feel like I worked hard enough to get a good ATAR but I was still a little bit shocked" she said.

"My parents were very happy, mum was pretty emotional."

The dedicated student tried not to think about her results once exams had ended but jumped online first thing December 19 to check the outcome.

Time management and Chemistry were Amelia's biggest challenges of the year.

Chemistry is not her favourite subject but one Amelia found rewarding once she wrapped her head around the concepts.

"All my family knows I'm not the best at getting things done on time so time management was probably my biggest challenge.

"My teachers were really good, they definitely helped me a lot, they were on my back a little bit more because they knew what I was like" Amelia said.

The Mount Burr netballer and junior coach has plans to study nursing next year in Adelaide and follow this with a midwifery degree.

Isobelle Fewster, Harry D'Onghia and Clayton Nicholls received the next highest ATAR scores at the school.

Isobelle wished she had received a higher final grade but was happy with her score of 86.95 resulting in a final ATAR of 94.55.

Receiving straight A's in her overall grades Isobelle believes her psychology results were her best achievement for the year.

On top of her year 12 workload Isobelle began an Aged Care traineeship and found juggling the two commitments a challenge.

"With weekly training days in Mount Gambier I would miss important content in my year 12 classes.

"It meant I had to catch up on this learning independently as well as ensuring I was completing my traineeship work."

Amelia is taking a gap year in 2023 and will continue working in aged care.

The following year she plans to move to Adelaide and pursue medical and psychiatry degrees.

Her goal is to practice psychology followed by further study and eventually working in psychiatry.

This year's DeGaris cup winner, Harry D'Onghia, received 86.85 before adjustment's and a final score of 94.5.

Receiving similar grades to what he expected Harry said

"There were some some discrepancies with exam results and SACE markings which did cause some small changes.

"Even though these were only slight, they did disappoint me a little, but overall I was quite excited by my score."

Harry told The South Eastern Times that winning the DeGaris cup was his best academic achievement of the year with his biggest challenge finalising assignments and preparing for exams in the fourth term.

Harry is heading to Flinders' University to study psychology alongside fellow student Clayton Nicholls.

Clayton's ATAR of 84.1 resulted in a score of 92.4 after adjustment.

Happy with his final result Clayton said teachers gave good updates throughout the year to let students know how they were going with their studies.

His biggest hurdle was overcoming Biology, although he studied the subject in year 11, he felt it was during year 12 that his skills really developed.

"I knew it was one of my challenges, I really

tried my hardest in it and it worked out pretty well.

"I have some new skills and know some of the topics.

"It definitely wasn't one of my strongest subjects but I feel more confident in it now."

Clayton will be moving to Adelaide in February to live in Flinders Hall and has plans to study Psychology Honours.

Radio station is overwhelmed by community support

Paul McRobert acknowledged the widespread community support the station has received by playing Cliff Richard's Power to all of our friends as the final sign off song.

5THE FM chair, David Walshaw, agreed with the sentiment and praised the widespread assistance they have received.

"Millicent Lions Club were very supportive and offered us a leg up to help pay some outstanding utility bills to keep us on air" he said.

"We are very appreciative of the Lions and their support of our community radio station."

"That kept the lights going, the toilets able to be flushed and the post office box open.

The generosity continued with businesses responding to requests for help quickly and freely, including electrical work from Quentin Pietsch of Elec-Air and Dennis Muhovics assisting with antenna repairs.

Patrick O'Donnell, General Manager of Southern Cross Austereo (Triple M and SA FM) in Mount Gambier, recently donated over 600 cd's to the station to supplement their current music library.

"They advertised them on Facebook for \$1 each and I rang them up and asked if they would like to donate these to a community radio station and they said yes" Mr Walshaw said.

A station volunteer has offered to catalogue the music library and there are plans to introduce new software if the station continues in the new year.

The upgraded interactive server software would allow presenters direct access to the station's music catalogue from the studio desk.

Austereo have also advised 5THE FM there may be an opportunity to provide the community station with two audio desks after they upgrade in the new year.

"They are far more modern than the ones we've currently got, we've only got the one on loan from 5GTR, and our service technician also from 5GTR said he would install them for free" Mr Walshaw said.

"It's that support we get from people in our community that makes us want to continue."

"This sort of chaos at the station gives us the opportunity to look at how we have been operating and see if there is a better way of doing it.

"You need a disaster sometimes to make you think outside the square, this is obviously one of those opportunities."

While the board and committee work toward obtaining a temporary 12 month licence for the station in the new year Mr Walshaw assured the South Eastern Times that the existing building lease is secure for now.

The railway building is in the ownership of the Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) who charge the organisation a peppercorn lease for use of the site.

Mr Walshaw explained if the existing association ceased to exist, which is a possibility with the extent of debt being uncovered, then any new association would need to approach DIT about a possible transfer.

Membership applications are still available while the station is live streaming.

There are currently 80 paid members which is an increase on the 17 listed by the previous board in the renewal application.

"We would love people to come and plonk \$10 down to support us and keep our radio station on the air" Mr Walshaw said.

Boneham costs' concern

Millicent's Boneham Aged Care Services (BACS) held their annual general meeting (AGM) November 23rd revealing the organisation continues to struggle with operational costs due to the ongoing impact of dealing with the Covid-19 pandemic.

BACS Chief Executive Officer, Michael Filsell told the South Eastern Times that grant funding is expected to flow through from the Commonwealth to offset some costs but this will follow in the next financial year.

"The costs impact largely in one financial year and the restitution from the Commonwealth comes later on" Mr Filsell said.

"Operationally it was a challenging year, that is probably the easiest way to put it.

"We are certainly not alone in the industry, the operational cost of managing an aged care facility throughout a covid pandemic was evident in the last financial years figures."

Board members and executive presented comprehensive reports at the AGM with Mr Filsell summarising them.

"We appointed a HR manager throughout the year which expanded our executive team and was necessary given our large workforce.

"Key components were the fact that we lived and survived through a pandemic with excellent results from our staff and community support, we also managed to develop a new strategic plan."

BACS received \$275,000 through the Feder-

al Government's Business Improvement Fund to develop a new three year strategic plan which was passed by the board late last year

The strategic plan included upgrades to

software systems and implement training in these new systems.

Updating the asset register and its management plan was also included as part of updat-

ing the business structure.

Mr Filsell said the asset revaluation was a positive and showed some improvement in asset value which was reflected in the financial report.

"Staffing is consistently challenging, if you look at other aged care providers both regionally and metropolitan based they are all struggling.

"We are running active recruitment and our traineeship program is working well in terms of getting people into aged care and developing their skills.

"Our staff attrition rate is below the national average which is good, but it is certainly a challenging industry.

"By July 1 next year we have to have 24/7 registered nursing on site, which we largely do now, so that won't be overly difficult.

"But the mandated registered nurse minutes we move toward, that's 40 minutes of registered nursing per resident per day by October 1st, 2023 is going to be a challenge for a number of regional providers.

"What we are looking at roughly is having to at least double our registered nursing staff in the next 12 months which will be significantly challenging to do at Millicent, when every other organisation has to do that as well.

"Moving forward into the current financial year the introduction of a new funding tool looks initially to be a success story and I think ongoing recruitment and support from our current cohort of staff is certainly positive."

A look at January

The year started off with some challenges with Covid-19 cases spiking and bushfires raging,

New Years Eve celebrations in Robe were blamed for a spread of the virus, and rapid antigen tests became a hot commodity.

The Coles bushfire raged on south of Lucindale, which sadly took the life of CFS firefighter Louise Hincks.

It started in a gum plantation on January 19 and burnt 3,800 hectares of land.

CFS resources were then stretched further as a fire broke out at Mount Gambier's Crater Lakes, with 50 hectares being burnt.

More than 125 firefighters attended the fire with 20 trucks from the Country Fire Service (CFS), Metropolitan Fire Service (MFS) and National Parks combined.

It wasn't all bad news however, with long-time community volunteer Mary Anne Stuckey, Mount Burr Football Club life member and President Maurie Puiatti, Millicent Gymnastics Club head coach Fiona McDonald, Penola legend Kathy Fennell, Carol Grbich, Millicent GeoVenture and Stand Like Stone Fashion Market named in the Wattle Range Council for its Australia Day Citizen of the Year awards.

April review

Covid once again reared its head in April, causing school closures.

The families of Millicent North Primary School students received a letter to inform them of a school closure due to Covid 19 cases escalating at the school.

Imposed by the Department for Education, the closure is a four day circuit breaker which began Tuesday due to the increase in positive cases both in students and staff.

Opening their doors in early April was Happi Belli Vietnamese street food takeaway, offering Vietnamese pork or chicken rolls (Banh mi), spring rolls, wontons and a noodle dish with vegetables.

Millicent Museum's Popular mystery night returned to a great crowd of 150 people.

Thing were looking up in the wine industry with a trade deal signed with India.

Then-Federal Minister for Trade, Tourism and Investment Dan Tehan signed an Australia-India Economic Cooperation and Trade Agreement with India's Minister of Commerce and Industry, Consumer Affairs and Food and Public Distribution and Textiles, Piyush Goyal.

February brings new faces to Millicent

In February, Coonawarra winemakers expressed concerns over wine export tariffs, which saw huge losses in the industry, and shipping difficulties.

Exports to mainland China declined by 97 per cent in value and 93 per cent in volume resulting in a loss of almost \$1b in value and 90m litres in volume when compared to the 2020 calendar year.

Millicent High School welcome in lots of new faces with a new leader at the helm, and a cohort of year 7 students for the first time.

At the age of 35, Todd Watson was appointed to the top job at MHS following in the footsteps of John Shelton who retired after 17 years in the role.

His first year out of university was as a Year 8 Physical Education teacher at MHS and he rose to become Senior School Leader last year.

His 11th year in teaching has him leading the school he knows well and he says he was encouraged to take on the role because of the team at MHS.

His first year as Principal has already thrown up challenges with Covid-19 delaying and splitting the return to school for classes, and it is the first year in which Year

7 classes have been incorporated into high school.

With about 360 students enrolled at the

main Millicent High School campus, about 70 of them were in the new Year 7 classes for the first time.

The first edition of The Penola Pennant was published in July 1946 by Edwin Thiele.

Both The South Eastern Times and Penola Pennant, along with The Border Watch, were closed by the Scott family in 2020 in the midst of the Covid-19 pandemic, but two months later, TBW Today Pty Ltd purchased The Border Watch along with the mastheads of The South Eastern Times and The Penola Pennant.

The Border Watch was pleased to revive The South Eastern Times and The Penola Pennant, and has enjoyed bringing you then news that matters each week.

Meanwhile, white ants had a field day, chewing up the floors of the Penola's St Mary the Virgin Anglican Church, causing a disruption in seating arrangements for its congregation of about 25 people.

In Millicent, friend and family and around 60 serving and retired police officers gathered at the Rendelsham Cemetery to pay tribute to Matthew Payne.

At the age of 22, Mathew was a police officer serving at Darlington Police Station in Adelaide when he was killed in a high speed pursuit on March 29, 1982.

Also killed was fellow police officer and south easterner, Warren Matheson, 24, of Mount Gambier, who was in the patrol car with Mathew that fateful night.

Office build blowout brings council under fire in June

Wattle Range Council came under fire in June, when it was reported that the estimated cost of its proposed new office building had increased by almost 70 per cent from its original targeted price and is set to become a highly political issue with local government elections due later this year.

With an original target of \$5.5m, a report presented to council in June advised council that the cost of the new administration office was now estimated at \$9.2m.

The report prompted Council to decide to progress the project by authorising architects of the building, Chapman Herbert, to proceed to the detailed documentation phase which would provide sufficient information for the project to go to tender among builders.

This follows the project being revised from an initial estimate of \$11.4m, which was revealed publicly for the first time on Tuesday

night, with the new estimate being achieved through a reduction in the size of the building of about 10 per cent to just under 1600 square metres, while some architectural elements of the build were also removed.

It was a good year for grape growers, with growers reporting in June that quality rather than quantity has been achieved with the 2022 vintage expected to rival the 2021 vintage in the Penola/Coonawarra area.

Mount Gambier based horse, Clever Man, trained by Trevor White, won the Millicent Cup at Mount Gambier's Allan Scott Glenburnie racecourse.

By far the best news of the month was the historic win by Nangwarry Football Club when the Saints claimed a 10-point win over Tantanoola to end a winless drought which extended back to July 2014.

May a month to remember

Making news in May was the radio silence from Millicent's 5THE FM radio station.

Wattle Range Mayor, Des Noll questioned the structure and management transparency of Millicent's community radio station 5THE FM, kicking off investigations into the station and its management.

At the time, he told The South Eastern Times as a private citizen, and not on behalf of council, that he was concerned that the radio station had lost its way.

The investigations into the station's governance continues.

In Penola, More than 150 people attended the opening of the 30th Penola-Coonawarra Arts Festival at the Penola High School where Penola artist, Dagny Strand was announced as the winner of the 2022 John Shaw Neilson Acquisitive Art Prize.

Taking home the prize of \$12,000, sponsored by the Balnaves Foundation, Strand

was stunned when the announcement was made so much so that she struggled to find words in accepting the prize.

Other winners announced included the Local Prize going to Stella Scanlon with her artwork called 'My Smiling Queens', there were also four highly commended prizes awarded to Lorna Beagan with her painting 'Neilson's Flowers', Rod Bax with his painting 'Magpie in the Moonlight', Narelle Smith with her painting titled 'Furrows of Brown', and Hamish with his art titled 'Strange Voices'.

A Design Prize was won by Natania Hollingsworth whose winning entry will be used to help promote the 2023 Penola-Coonawarra Arts Festival.

Literary award winners also announced on the night were 10-12 years Maggie Bell; 13-15 years Nellie Lear, runner up Mia Gartner; 16-18 years Bec Negrant with runner up Seth Lear.

Waving bye to Beach in July

Making waves in July was the news Penola environmental activists had been waiting for - Beach Energy announced it was leaving, having packed up their Church Street office and made plans for the Katnook Gas Plant to be mothballed.

The company declared that it had no plans to continue with gas exploration in the South East in the future and in a statement, it confirmed that although Katnook plant is still producing gas into the South East, with the natural decline in production, they will temporarily "shut-in" the Katnook processing plant in the next three to six months.

"Supply of gas to the South East customers will not be impacted by the shut-in of the Katnook plant, as the South East pipeline connects into Port Campbell in Victoria, where Beach has already added significant production capacity in 2021, with more planned in the coming year," it said in a statement.

Chair of the Limestone Coast Protection Alliance Angus Ralton, of Penola, said at the time that Beach Energy leaving was good news for the whole community.

Also making a splash was AFL legend Gavin Wanganeen, who inadvertently found himself in a sticky situation in Beachport, becoming bogged on a local beach with friends.

Mr Wanganeen and his family were enjoy-



ing a morning four-wheel-driving with a fellow family along beaches between Beachport and Robe. Along the last beach, before you hit the Scenic Drive in Beachport, the car became bogged.

At first, another car drove onto the beach to help them, before becoming bogged themselves.

Luckily a group of Beachport locals were able to lend a hand on the Saturday morning to recover the vehicles from the beach.

In council news, for the second year Wattle Range Councillors voted to fly the rainbow flag outside its Millicent council office during the Feast Festival in support of LGBTIQA+ community members.

At the council meeting, elected members supported Councillor Sharon Cox's motion to raise the flag in conjunction with the Adelaide-based festivals' Pridevember initiative.

Changes with September

There were changes within the Millicent business community in September, with eight members of the Millicent Business Community Association (MBCA) meeting to elect office bearers for the organisation.

Due to existing commitments Mark Braes and Fiona Telfer will share the role of chairperson for the immediate future.

The treasurer role is filled by Jo Dean and Lisa Braes steps in to the secretary position which has remained unfilled for almost two years.

Council election fever really kicked off, with candidates hitting the pavement to campaign hard.

One of the busiest times on the Coonawarra calendar, the Coonawarra Cabernet Celebrations, officially launched, to a crowd of around sixty people at Rymill Estate.

Regarding the amalgamation plebiscite, A group of concerned ratepayers in Penola and Coonawarra wrote to the Premier requesting the recent amalgamation plebiscite to include a review of the Wattle Range Council.

The letter, signed by a handful of ratepayers, was sent to South Australian Pre-

Penola previously had a ratepayers association after the amalgamation of the Penola and Coonawarra Councils, that represented the towns on key issues such as the Penola bypass. But the group has been in recess for a number of years.

In Millicent, the Geltwood Festival made a triumphant return. The return of Millicent's Geltwood Festival after a two and half year delay has been worth the wait.

Millicent was abuzz over the weekend as locals and visitors to the town took advantage of the spring weather to enjoy the events on offer.

Geltwood Festival was officially launched at Friday night's exhibition opening of Rachelle Denny's stunning and unique quilt display at the Millicent Library.

Ms Denny is an award winning international tutor with a passion for free motion quilting and opened this years festival.

Worst grain roads named

Imagine you are travelling along a country road, and you're jolted as your car tyre lurches in and out of a deep pothole. It's unfortunately an all too familiar experience for many across regional South Australia.

Now imagine you are in a truck loaded with grain and your tyre dips in and out of that same pothole. Not only does that hole get bigger, but the safety of the truck driver (and others on the road), as well as his load of grain is potentially at risk.

For far too long the South Australian grain industry, which is expected to contribute almost \$4.5 billion to the state's economy from the 2022/23 harvest, has been forgotten when it comes to road maintenance, repair and upgrade.

For this reason, Grain Producers SA (GPSA) undertook the 'Worst Grain Road' campaign to find the route in the poorest condition in the state.

These routes are key to getting grain to port.

The campaign saw almost 60 different roads across the state nominated, however it was the Upper Yorke Road on the Yorke Peninsula, Nine Mile Road in the Murraylands and Worlds End Highway in the Mid North that were voted the top three

'Worst Grain Roads'.

Comments from grain producers and truck drivers to go with the submissions should have decision makers immediately concerned and in fact, I'd be worried if they weren't already concerned.

As one grain producer put it when com-

menting on the Upper Yorke Road: "It's a prime agricultural area that is producing millions of dollars in grain and sheep, yet we've got a third-class road to travel on".

During the campaign we heard that some heavy vehicle drivers are having to veer onto the opposite side of the road to avoid bumps, potholes and undulating surfaces.

Some said they struggled to control their truck when tyres dropped off the edge of the narrow roads.

These roads are key freight routes for South Australian grain producers that transport significant volumes of produce, ultimately providing a return to the state's economy.

The lack of investment into our Federal, State and Local Government run roads, results in grain producers losing productivity, as well as putting themselves and the safety of other road users at risk due to the poor conditions of these roads.

The total road maintenance backlog in South Australia was estimated to be at almost \$800 million in 2020 and growing by \$100 million every year.

It's high time that improvements are made, so GPSA is calling on immediate investment into the top ten 'Worst Grain Roads' in South Australia.

Weeding out pest plants

A new project targeting weeds in the Limestone Coast is aiming to reduce the burden of eradicating pest plants for primary producers.

Limestone Coast Landscape Board (LCLB) and Primary Industries and Regions SA (PIRSA) have teamed up to take the fight to weeds running wild on local farmlands.

LCLB chair Penny Schulz said weeds cost primary producers millions each year, both in terms of eradication costs and lost production.

"We all know that weeds threaten the environment and biodiversity and productivity on farms," Ms Schulz said.

"This work will focus on farm, but also look at even roadside weeds as they threaten farmland."

"Being a farmer and a landholder myself, having a few extra tools in the toolbox or people to help with planning is always helpful."

She said there will be a multi-faceted approach to taking out weeds, including the use of herbicides, manual removal

and grazing livestock.

"If we can use more education, more action to control those really hard to kill weeds and invasive species in general in our landscape, it has both an economic and an environmental benefit," she said.

"The timing of actions is really important [and] it's generally a multi-year approach as well."

Ms Schulz said one of the most "prolific" and hard to kill weeds in the region at the moment is African lovegrass, particularly in the upper Limestone Coast.

"The Board in the past has already invested some significant funds, over \$50,000 just in roadside and with landholders to control African lovegrass," she said.

"In many aspects, it up to the landholder to take responsibility to take a notified weed like that under control.

"But it is such a difficult weed that we've been helping a number of landholders with that."

LCLB will be looking to leverage new funding and a newly-created weed control officer position through PIRSA to better target pest plants in 2023.

The year of the deer culling

Limestone Coast Landscape Board (LCLB) is looking to ramp up its deer eradication efforts in 2023 following a year of trying to reduce the pest's numbers in the region.

Feral deer have been creating headaches for primary producers in the Limestone Coast, with numbers predicted to explode in the next decade.

According to LCLB chair Penny Schulz, this year's focus on culling feral deer numbers was just the beginning.

"We did a fair bit of work previously in feral deer control, but this is certainly an eradication phase now," she said.

"Over the year we have taken out nearly 3,500 feral deer from the region.

"That's the most we've ever taken out from the region in a 12 month period and we hope to do even more next year."

Ms Schulz said planning is already underway for LCLB's 2023 aerial shooting program and encouraged primary producers in the region to get involved.

"We have got more landholders and access to land than ever before to cull feral deer in the landscape, which has been very fruitful," she said.

"It's no secret feral deer are not welcome in this region.

"We'll continue that into next year and the years to come."

Genesis GV70 luxury look

It's still not a household name, certainly in motoring circles, but Genesis is the luxury sub-brand of Hyundai in the same way as Lexus is to Toyota.

Like Lexus before it, Genesis marketers see the brand as a competitor against the upmarket German marques.

Despite the major impact Korean cars have had in recent years, that's unlikely to happen to Genesis any time in the immediate future.

Then again, Hyundai has surprised us before – so who knows?

The current Genesis range comprises two sedans (G70 and G80) and three SUVs (GV60, GV70 and GV80) and includes petrol, diesel and electric powertrains as well as two- and all-wheel drive in the SUVs.

GV70, the subject of this test, covers all bases with the choice of 2.5- and 3.5-litre turbo-charged petrol engines, 2.2-litre turbo-diesel and pure electric.

The entry-level 2.5T comes with either rear or all-wheel drive.

All other variants are AWD only.

We're checking out what is likely to be the volume seller – the 2.5GT AWD, together with the optional Luxury Sport Line package and eye-catching Brunswick Green matte paint.

GV70 is one of the most attractive vehicles that we've ever driven, one that drew positive comments wherever we went.

The lines are SUV but without the boxiness or semi-coupe look that many competitors have adopted.

The large mesh-filled grille follows the Genesis family pattern, with the number plate attached inside the grille.

The Genesis badge, which does have an uncanny resemblance to that of Aston Martin, sits at the front of the bonnet.

The split horizontal front and tail lights are another Genesis feature and broaden the vehicle's front appearance.

A panoramic sunroof with tilt and slide panel and powered blind is standard across the range.

The Sport Line Package adds 21-inch five-spoke G-matrix alloy wheels, sporty front and rear bumpers, gloss black sport radiator grille, front skid plate, roof rails and dark chrome for the grille surround and window frame trims.

Others will no doubt love the G-matrix wheels but we found them a bit gaudy for the otherwise elegant looks of the car.

Genesis GV70 offers 10 exterior colours, including three matte lines that add \$2000, seven interior colours and four trim inserts – to let buyers express individual preferences.

There's a real premium look to the interior of the GV70 Luxury Sport Line tested with Nappa leather and suede appointed quilted sport seats, suede headlining and pillars, a sports steering wheel, alloy pedals and aluminium trim.

There are sport gauges for oil temperature, torque and turbo boost to let the driver extract the best from the engine.

Rear seat space is pretty good, with buttons that allow occupants to adjust the front seats as well as air conditioning controls.

Rear storage space is 542 litres with the rear seatbacks in place, expanding to 1678 litres when they are folded.

A space saver spare wheel is under the boot floor and there's also a clever roadside safety kit with a range of items to help in an emergency – such as gloves, hi-vis vest, towel etc.

Genesis GV70 comes with a choice of four drivetrains, starting with the 2.5T with a 2.5-litre turbo-petrol four-cylinder with 224kW of power and 422Nm of torque paired with an eight-speed torque converter automatic that drives either the rear wheels or an electronically controlled AWD system.

Flagship GV70 3.5T has a 3.5-litre twin-

turbo petrol V6 with 279kW and 530Nm mated with the same transmission and AWD,

GV70 2.2D has a 2.2-litre four-cylinder turbo-diesel that produces 154kW of power and 440Nm of torque.

It uses an electronically controlled AWD system.

The most recent addition is the GV70 EV, the first-ever fully electric vehicle from Genesis.

Our Queensland team is currently testing it and we'll bring you their review in the near future.

Every GV70 model comes with a comprehensive list of safety equipment, starting with eight airbags, including one between the front seats to prevent serious injury due to potential driver and passenger contact.

Among other features are blind spot monitoring and collision avoidance, forward collision avoidance with cars, pedestrian and cyclist detection, rear cross-traffic alert and collision avoidance, lane keeping assist, smart cruise control, 360-degree surround view monitor, front and rear parking sensors and safe exit assist.

The standout feature at the front of the GV70's cabin is the 14.5-inch touchscreen.

It certainly looks spectacular although the combination of extra width and low height mean that functions on the left of the screen require too much of a stretch even for a tall driver.

Also, the shape of the screen compresses the satellite navigation view more than is practical.

There's a 12.3-inch colour screen in front of the driver with a digital instrument cluster.

A camera is activated either side of the screen each time the turn indicator is used.

Bluetooth provides two connections, one phone/audio, the other just for audio, with USB ports on the front and rear centre consoles.

There's wireless (Qi standard) smartphone charging, and both Apple CarPlay and Android Auto – both wired.

If you need relaxing there's a Sounds of Nature feature with a choice of six pre-set sounds.

Our favourites were twittering birds and ocean waves.

Not sure about the soothing effect of the roaring fire though.

Audio comes from a nine-speaker Genesis

sound system with an external digital amplifier.

The 3.5T gets a premium 16-speaker Lexicon by Harmon unit.

GV70 is quite a large and heavy vehicle, but doesn't feel like it when cruising on the motorway where it's smooth, comfortable and quiet thanks to extra insulation.

When pushed along the feeling and sound from the turbo engine is akin to that of a decent-sized six-cylinder unit.

Out on the open road GV70 is well-balanced and corners better than expected for an SUV.

It's not a sports machine but comes closer than many others in the class that we have tested.

There are five drive modes (Eco, Comfort, Sport, Sport+ and Custom), and three Terrain modes (Snow, Mud and Sand).

So, plenty to play with here.

The eight-speed automatic transmission

is reasonably quick to respond with shift paddles on hand if needed.

Fuel consumption on short trips was well above the listed figure of 10.3 litres per 100 kilometres but dropped noticeably, to around 8.5 L/100 km in motorway cruising.

This is the first time that we've driven a Genesis SUV and we could not have been more surprised and impressed by the GV70.

It's beautifully crafted, both inside and out, well-equipped, enjoyable to drive and with prices starting from just under \$70k, excellent value compared with its more-established competitors.

Dedicated owners of vehicles from the three big-name German brands will no doubt scoff at the arrival of Genesis nee Hyundai, much as they did when Lexus emerged from the shadow of Toyota nearly 30 years ago.

However, for anyone willing to think outside the square, we'd suggest the Genesis GV70 is well worth checking out.
