Millicent Returned Services League (RSL) has found itself in hot water after an unauthorised person made a comment on an Aboriginal artist's social media in regards to 'Invasion Day' shirts.

After designing a shirt specifically for the public holiday, Adelaide artist Scott Rathman advertised the design and became confused when the Millicent RSL social media page made a public comment in regards to the shirts.

Mr Rathman has since re-posted the comment as a screenshot on his own page.

The comment, which was left by the RSL sub-branch Facebook page, claimed the artist incited racism and everyone should 'co-exist'.

"You say we should coexist but you insite racism [sic]," the comment stated.

"We are all Australian, let's stop this racism, listen to your elders if what you hate is so bad you can leave [sic]."

Millicent RSL president Chris Mathias stated the comment was made by an unauthorised person who found access to the social media account with a current investigation underway.

Mr Mathias stated publicly the comment was not made by the local sub-branch.

"I can assure [you and anyone else who is concerned] that the RSL Millicent sub-branch neither condones nor tolerates any form of abusive or inciteful comment," he said.

Phone app shares Peake's Folly past

In association with State Heritage, Penola's branch of National Trust SA has developed a mobile phone app called SA Heritage, to enable people to learn more about historic sites within Penola on self guided tours.

The following is one of the subjects from this app.

PEAKE'S FOLLY

Many years had passed since the first discussion about the building of the railway.

In 1885 John Riddoch, who fought for the railway while in Parliament, turned the first sod for the track in Mount Gambier.

The completion of the line in 1887 brought about the termination of Mr McKeand's Mail Run. In June of that year Mr McKeand sold one hundred horses, his collection of coaches and wagons and all the associated gear.

There was a great controversy when the first weatherboard station was built on the western side of the railway line.

The townspeople complained about the inconvenience and were finally successful in having it moved to the eastern side. It was opened on 28 January 1888 and dismantled and rebuilt at the Coonawarra siding in 1909 when the new station was built.

Minister for Transport, Mr A H Peake who came from Naracoorte and had a brother L W Peake who was the Penola District Clerk, was said to be influential in having this rather elaborate structure built in Penola.

It was opened with a gold key by Mr Peake as Premier on January 29, 1910 and became known as Peake's Folly.

The building, similar to the one in Moonta, was designed for its convenience and architecture.

A heavy foundation with metal ballast was required due to the swampy nature of the site. Coonawarra dolomite was used for the walls and a contrast of Mount Gambier stone for the quoins and arches of the windows.

The central portion of the station was open on the western side, and formed a lobby for passengers and their friends when waiting for the trains. The booking office and spacious and convenient accommodation for the officials was on the northern end.

The two-storeyed part with a tower at the southern end housed the ladies' waiting room with a staircase leading to the washroom and toilets.

Cantilevered verandahs surround the building. There was no platform: an American ground loading system was used and porters provided steps for passengers to embark and to alight.

Following the opening of the broad gauge in 1952 this building was used by The Royal Antediluvian Order of Buffaloes (RAOB), known as Buffs.

In 1982, this State Listed building was purchased by the Wighton family who have made significant renovations for use as a residence.

Heat is on for fridge thief

A George Street business was disappointed to recently discover their premises had been broken into for the second time in around 12 months.

Arriving at work on Wednesday morning a Cool Moose Refrigeration employee found his work van had been pried open and parts were missing.

Items taken included a vacuum pump and reclaim unit and the thieves attempted to take an air-conditioning condensing unit.

The 35-40kg unit was dragged 40 to 50 metres and pushed through the hole cut in

the fence used to gain entry, with the unit left abandoned outside the property.

Cool Moose Refrigeration senior technician Kieran Swift said

"It's disappointing, we are a very community based business, and now we are a van down on the road because we don't have the specific equipment within that van to do those tasks.

"We are a technician down and it can take an affect on a business.

Mr Swift estimates the value of the equipment stolen is about \$8,000.

"The stolen items are obscure as well, it's not something that's off the shelf" he said.

"They didn't target the usual sort of bits and pieces you think they would take, they are they are specialised tools for what we do.

"Unless you know what you are doing with it you wouldn't know how to use it.

"One of the items is a vacuum pump which evacuates the system, so it pulls all the air and moisture out of the system.

"That is a specific tool for one purpose it's

quite a unique item."

The break-in and subsequent theft has been reported to police and a police spokesperson said

"Police are continuing their investigation into a break-in and theft at a Millicent business.

"Anyone with information is asked to call Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.

"Any reports of suspicious activity around business premises should be reported immediately via the Police Assistance Line on 131444."

"We are investigating the source of the alleged comments, but the admin of that page has removed them, which makes tracing them difficult."

Speaking with The South Eastern Times, Mr Mathias also confirmed there were now procedures in place to prevent future unauthorised comments from being made.

Returned Services League South Australia chief executive officer David Grenvold stated the sub-branch would now receive re-education on sub-branches' obligations around representation of the organisation.

"We will be looking at this incident as an opportunity to change some policies, especially around who has access to social media and the governance around various pages," Mr Grenvold said.

"The ability for individuals to create a platform page channel and use the league's IP is easy to do, so there is an element of trust for each state branch that the governance of the page will be done properly and now is a good time to review that."

Mr Grenvold said the comment was clearly a "personal opinion being expressed without it being specified that it was a personal opinion".

He said it was expressed using the Millicent RSL platform and clarified the comment was "contrary" to the league's constitution and bylaws.

"We have addressed the issue with the individual sub-branch and re-education is the primary remedy at this stage," he said.

"We will also be investigating further and if we believe it is necessary, take further action."

Mr Grenvold encouraged the community to "keep this [the comment] in context on

the opinion of an individual and be careful how that opinion is construed".

"Coming into Australia Day, the RSL remains an organisation that is bound on equality and in this sense, uniting a nation rather than dividing it," he said.

Mr Rathman said he used the social media platform to say what he wanted to say, stating "not many Aboriginal people have a voice."

"I am using this to bring awareness that these type of people still walk amongst us and they are still out there," Mr Rathman said.

"I have since had comments and private messages from former armed service people

who said they were not impressed by the comment either."

The Aboriginal artist said he was now concerned about the cultural awareness within the South Australian RSL community, stating cultural education would be the best way forward.

He also questioned the cultural safety of the RSL and its sub-branches considering the comment was made publicly.

"I am concerned that someone in the RSL has this view and those types of views are a concern because people may use that bias when working with Aboriginal people.

"It is not about the organisation that made the comment, but about the view in the first place and now I wonder what the RSL is going to do to educate its members on Aboriginal issues and make them more culturally aware."

Mr Rathman also questioned how an "unauthorised person" had access to the sub-branches social media, stating he believed someone may have expressed a personal view unaware they were commenting as the RSL.

"This is embarrassing to the RSL as a whole," he said.

New mayoral elections on

The Robe and Kingston communities will be given a second chance to choose a mayor during supplementary council elections in March.

Minister for Local Government Geoff Brock announced nominations have opened for the mayoral positions at both the District Council of Robe and Kingston District Council.

The second elections have come after both council areas did not receive a mayoral nomination during the local government elections in November 2022.

Mr Brock said it is vital to see people nominate for mayor to ensure their local council can best represent the community.

“These supplementary elections are a second chance for anyone looking for an opportunity to shape the future of their local community,” he said.

“My years as a councillor at Port Pirie Council, and subsequently as mayor, were among the most rewarding of my life.

“If you’re interested in nominating or just want to know more about the vacant roles in your area, please attend a candidate briefing session.”

Community flags issues

A letter to Wattle Range Council caused quite a stir in Millicent and the wider region, sparking debate between religious groups and members of the LGBTQIA+ community.

Millicent Baptist Church secretary David Hallett penned the letter in December to raise an issue with Council's flying of the rainbow flag through November.

Mr Hallett wrote that the leadership team at the church believed Council "should not be in the business of promoting alternative sexual lifestyles".

"Society is being heavily sexualised and there are different opinions regarding the promotion of non-heterosexual lifestyles as opposed to the acceptance of these lifestyles," Mr Hallett wrote.

"A flag flown at an official government building sends a message which is different from the holding of street parades, festivals etc as these latter are considered being temporarily allowed by Council rather than being permanently promoted."

He also said Council should "remain neutral" and only fly official government flags, and finished the letter by asking that councillors reconsider their decision to fly the rainbow flag.

The comments garnered a big response from the community, with LGBTQIA+ community group Limestone Coast Connect (LCC) hitting back within a day of the letter appearing in the Council agenda.

LCC chair Patrick Smith released a statement against the letter and said that the rainbow flag was not flown to promote alternative lifestyles, but rather to show LGBTQIA+ people in the community that they are seen, valued, loved and accepted for who they are.

"It is important to our young people that there is local visibility of the LGBTQIA+ community," he said.

"That is why we fly the flag, that is why we have community days, that is why we have days of significance and encourage everyone to get involved.

"Explicit statements of support from Wattle Range Council and other like organisations

by flying the rainbow flag will ensure that our community is showing that it is creating a sense of safety, inclusion and respect."

Those words were echoed by Millicent Combined Churches president and Millicent Community Church pastor Shaun Mulick, who emphasised the importance of creating an accepting community.

"The flag is representing a group of people in the community that deserve to be seen and valued and loved and told they belong," he said.

"It is important that we build bridges rather than stand on top of our walls yelling about who is right and who is wrong.

"Our community is always going to be

stronger celebrating our diversity rather than trying to tear it down."

During the Council meeting on Tuesday, January 17, councillors agreed to take no actions as a result of Mr Hallett's letter.

Wattle Range Council chief executive Ben Gower said a couple of councillors "expressed their disappointment in the initial letter", but it was Council's job to consider all views and represent everyone in the community.

"The councillors spoke at length about the necessity to appreciate all aspects of our community, and for the interactions between community and Council to always be respectful, considerate and inclusive," Mr Gower said.

"The ability to express your views is an important fabric of society and Council's role is to listen to all of those views, and then make an informed decision.

"I would say unanimous, right across the chamber, everybody shares that view of inclusiveness and considering all elements of the community."

Mr Smith said after the meeting he was pleased that Council noted the letter and took no action, and that he was thankful that Wattle Range strives to be inclusive and welcome everyone.

The Millicent Baptist Church declined to comment.

New roof for Penola Stadium, as council works begin

Ms McKenzie returned to Millicent in November 2021 after her animation studies at JMC Academy in Melbourne were interrupted by covid lockdowns.

"I really recommend JMC, it's a small niche for those people into animation and music, it was such a good environment.

"I love animation, I love story-telling and I love art and they come in the middle perfectly with animation and comic books."

Exhibiting for the first time at last year's Wattle Range Art Exhibition the artist has since taken steps to become more involved in

the local arts community and will soon begin painting a reading nook in the Millicent library's children's section.

The artwork has been digitally designed and hand painting the nook is expected begin within the next few weeks.

Ms McKenzie is also participating in an arts project for this year's Youth Week celebrations and is currently painting canvas' for a new gallery venture by Yonty Chambers.

But it is the 150 page graphic novel, Our Faraway Minds, which took the artist a full year to complete that she is also rightly proud of.

When Melbourne was in lockdown for two years and her studies interrupted Ms McKenzie decided to turn the downtime in to an opportunity.

The artist completed all aspects of the full colour comic digitally by herself.

From the rough idea, character design, dialogue, sketches and panelling, only the printing was left to a Melbourne graphics company.

"I always thought comics were a thing that only people in studios and teams were able to do, but I thought I can do it by myself.

"Drawing the same character hundreds of times takes a bit of work.

"But I want to encourage other people, if you've got an idea just do it.

"It doesn't matter how dodgy it is, it's better to have something to work with than just an idea in your head.

"Just put it on paper, see what it looks like."

Ms McKenzie's book covers themes such as isolation, depression and self esteem with the protagonist venturing in to her dreams and going on self realisation journeys with the people she meets and a cat.

A copy of Our Faraway Minds will soon be available in the library for members to read.

"Art has always been the most important form of expression to me, from drawing dragons in primary school to now doing paintings, digital art exhibits and creating my own comic book.

"It's a way to visualise and beautify all aspects of the world around us and within us, which I love.

"My goal in my artistic pursuits is to inspire others.

"I want all the young people drawing anime characters in their books to keep doing what they are doing and to know how important it is to do so.

"I also believe art is a way of connecting people and expressing the most complicated parts of ourselves.

"I want to continue to work with the community in any way I can to help others be creative!"

Ms McKenzie was keen to thank those who have supported and created arts opportunities for her including Janice Nitschke, Wendy Thomson, Sandra Melrose and Yonty Chambers.

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Honour overwhelms Sue

Community volunteer Sue Lines will receive the Corcoran ward's Citizen of the Year award as part of Wattle Range Council's upcoming Australia Day celebrations.

The Tantanoola resident has been volunteering in the community for around 35 years and is not sure who nominated her for the award, but is thankful to whoever it was.

"I was stunned, overwhelmed and very pleased" Ms Lines said.

Ms Lines' volunteer work includes over 30 years involvement with the Millicent United Soccer Club.

From being the president of the Ladies committee in the early days to her present role as secretary, the club stalwart has given untold hours to the organisation.

Ms Lines even donned the boots for a two year stint while her, and husband Ian, were instrumental in getting the Millicent Women's soccer team going.

"I ended up playing for a couple of years because we didn't have a goal keeper, it was me or no one" Ms Lines said.

"The Millicent Women's formerly finished end of last year and I was involved in that for the whole 18 years or however long it was going.

"I was team manager for the senior women for quite awhile."

In recent times the community minded resident has re-established the Tantanoola playgroup in the local Institute hall.

The original playgroup was relocated to the Learning Together program at Newbery Park Primary School in Millicent after the Department for Education (EDU) suspended classes at the Tantanoola Primary School.

Ms Lines was an employee of EDU as playgroup leader at the time and continued in that role until funding for the program ceased in 2020.

In 2021 the playgroup was voluntarily re-started under the guidance of Ms Lines and has become an important social outing for children and their parents.

The group has about dozen children accessing playgroup and as the program continues Ms Lines is seeing the benefit for adults as well as connections are formed.

Through playgroup Ms Lines has helped to re-establish Tantanoola's annual Biggest Morning Tea.

"Arvan and Bruce Carthew used to do the Biggest Morning Tea, that shut due to covid, so playgroup got it up and going again.

"We hosted it because we could see the benefit to the community and a lot of people had been asking for it.

"It was a long standing event, I kind of

pushed it because I could see in the middle of covid how people are isolated and missing all these things."

The local Uniting Church and Tantanoola Progress Association (TPA) also benefit from the involvement of Ms Lines with TPA hosting the first official Australia Day event in Tantanoola next week.

It has been about 18 months since the TPA was restarted with Ms Lines acting as chairperson.

The group have been instrumental in successfully receiving grant funding to assist in upgrading Tantanoola's State heritage listed railway buildings.

"The progress association has taken on the Australia Day event, that was another thing that Bruce and Arvan Carthew did that

stopped because of Covid" Ms Lines said.

"This is the first time for a couple of years this event will be held, and the first time it has been held officially.

"It was the same as the biggest morning tea, in conversation, people would say they were missing that as well.

Ms Lines is also the friendly face behind the scenes ensuring things are in order for Tantanoola's Uniting Church monthly service.

The service is performed by a retired minister the first Sunday of every month with Ms Lines leading the service if the minister is unable to attend.

"It's like a lot of those things, if something has to happen you just put up your hand and do it" Ms Lines said.

New life for silo bags investigated

A project to look at options for the reuse and recycling of grain silo bags in South Australia is underway thanks to a \$60,000 grant awarded to Grain Producers SA (GPSA).

GPSA will undertake a feasibility study to better understand the challenges and opportunities in repurposing and reducing waste of grain silo bags, as part of the 'Circular Economy Market Development Grant' program through Green Industries SA. GPSA Chief Executive Officer Brad Perry said grain producers had increasingly raised the problem of used silo bags and lack of recycling avenues available.

"There is currently a successful recycling stewardship scheme for plastic chemical containers called 'DrumMuster' as well as pilots for plastic seed and fertiliser bags with 'Bag-Muster', however there is a gap when it comes to used grain silo bags," said Mr Perry.

"Through the 'Grain Silo Bag Circular Economy Feasibility Study' we are seeking to understand the scale of silo bag waste on grain farms in South Australia, what recycling avenues currently exist, and what investment strategies can be developed to provide industry participation and circular solutions for used silo bags.

"Grain producers want to harvest their crops as quickly as possible and are increasingly utilising temporary plastic grain silo bags as a convenient storage solution.

"These silo bags are single use and once finished with, they are stored on farm or producers try to find alternate uses.

"As use of silo bags grows, the amount of plastic waste generated on farms is increasing, as is awareness of the associated waste management responsibilities.

"It's hoped that this Feasibility Study will lead to potentially innovative recycling solutions to this problem if no existing recycling avenues are identified as feasible."

GPSA will work with a consultant to develop the Feasibility Study and will also develop an awareness campaign aimed to educate key stakeholders identified in the study on used grain silo bag recycling, avenues

for recycling, innovative uses, and circular economy best practices.

Grain Producers SA is the peak industry body representing the 4,500 grain farming businesses in South Australia.

Mandate a win for SA timbers

The South Australian Forest Products Association has praised the state government over a new policy, which will see them turn to South Australian products first.

On Sunday, the government announced that public houses built in South Australia must use products manufactured in this state, under new mandates.

From now, South-Australian manufactured products must be used on public housing construction and maintenance programs, where available.

Nathan Paine, Chief Executive Officer of SAFFPA said it was a "big win" for manufacturing industries in South Australia.

"Timber frames are a core manufactured product in South Australia that supports our residential construction and building industries, and we are pleased that locally grown trees will be building and refurbishing affordable public homes for South Australians", said Mr Paine.

"The South Australian forest industries processes about 35 per cent of Australia's structural house framing timber and about 25 per cent of the nation's particleboard, and its great news that this policy will support our domestic manufactured product over imported product thereby support local jobs".

"Not only will this initiative be supporting forestry, but it will be supporting job creation in our regions, our local and state economy and most importantly, our regional communities who rely on thriving forest industries", said Mr Paine.

"Also, with Timberlink expected to complete their new CLT and GLT plant in Tarpeena this year, it will secure the South East as one of Australia's leading timber manufacturing regions, unlocking further economic activity for the region."

"SAFFPA are pleased to welcome the State Government's announcement and look forward to supplying South Australia's building and construction industries with our locally grown timber."

Peugeot 3008 GT Sport

Style is evident than with the latest Peugeot 3008.

There is no mistaking this car for anything else on the road, although one of the Chinese brands has imitated its distinctive cascading grille.

Facelifted in 2020 the five-seat 3008 is Peugeot's biggest selling model in this country and a leader in the European market.

So, what makes this compact SUV so special?

Three grades are offered: Allure, GT and GT Sport, along with a plug-in hybrid version of the Sport – GT Sport PHEV.

Petrol, diesel and petrol-electric hybrid powertrains are available, priced from \$44,990 for the 1.6-litre Allure.

Only the PHEV is all-wheel drive.

A sunroof adds \$2500 to the price, while Celebes Blue (pictured) is the one, no-cost colour choice.

Metallic paint is \$690 more, while Premium paint adds \$1050 – with a total of eight colours from which to choose.

Our test vehicle, the GT Sport, priced from \$59,840 plus on roads, comes with the 'Black Pack' as standard which brings black trim and exclusive black 19-inch 'Washington' diamond-cut alloys with a unique 'Black Mist' finish.

This model also gets Nappa quilted leather upholstery, Lime Wood dash and door trim, two-zone climate air, with heated front seats and eight-way electronic adjustment and massage function for the driver plus a panoramic sunroof.

There are also adaptive LED headlights, LED daytime running lights, digital instrument display, 360-degree camera, rear privacy glass, auto dipping mirrors, auto lights and wipers, front and rear parking sensors plus semi-autonomous parking assistance (parallel and 90 degree).

The automotive component shortage has not been kind to the 3008, with the removal of wireless charging, a power tailgate and Focus audio system.

The 3008 is covered by a 5-year unlimited kilometre warranty along with 5-year roadside assistance.

Service intervals are 12 months or 20,000km and add up to \$2639 over five years, or an average of \$528 per visit.

Infotainment comes in the form of a 10.0-inch touchscreen, Bluetooth, satellite navigation, voice control, AM/FM/DAB radio, with Apple CarPlay, Android Auto and Mirror Screen.

We can't tell you what the actual audio system consists of, although we count seven speaker grilles.

Connectivity is supported by three 12-volt sockets (dashboard, rear cabin and load area) with one USB socket in the front and another two USB in the back for passengers.

GT Sport is powered by a 1.6-litre turbo-charged four-cylinder petrol engine.

It's the same engine as in the GT but has been tuned to produce more power and torque, with 133kW of power at 5500 rpm and 250Nm of torque at 1650 rpm.

That's still short of the diesel in terms of torque (130kW/400Nm) but less than the hybrid for both power and torque (147kW/300Nm).

Drive is to the front wheels through an eight-speed automatic transmission with paddle gear shifts and auto engine stop-start to reduce fuel consumption.

The 3008 scores five stars for safety, with six airbags, autonomous emergency braking between 5km/h and 140km/h, with cyclist and pedestrian detection as well as forward collision warning.

Other safety features include adaptive cruise control with stop and go, lane positioning assist with road edge detection, blind spot

detection, high beam assist along with speed limit recognition and recommendation.

Take note the safety rating was due to expire at the end of 2022 and presumably the car needs to be tested again.

Three drive modes are available and activated by a toggle on the centre console comprising of Normal, Sport and Eco.

Top speed is 222km/h and it does the dash from 0 to 100km/h in a claimed 8.8 seconds.

Fuel consumption from the 53-litre tank was claimed to be 5.6L/100km and it takes 95 premium unleaded.

The 3008 is 4447mm long, with a wheelbase of 2675mm and is a cousin to the excellent Citroen C5 Aircross.

GT and GT Sport feature a different front grille with an elaborate light arrangement that incorporates Peugeot's new "Fog Mode" function.

In this mode with low-beam selected the LED headlights operate at reduced intensity whenever the rear fog lights are activated.

Inside the cabin has a premium upmarket feel and is designed around a tiny steering wheel and 12.3-inch fully digital instrument panel, the latter located high on the dashboard, avoiding the need for separate heads-up display.

If you like your wheel set high, as we do, the rim is apt to obscure the instrument panel which is a bit silly.

Being digital the dash can be configured to display a number of different configurations,

from barebones with just a digital speedo to a more traditional style with an analogue tacho and speedometer.

It's pretty cool, especially when the dials fold aside, not to mention the burnished copper colouring.

The touchscreen is a good size and comes with a row of shiny piano keys below it for quick access to the most used functions.

The driver's seat is snug but comfortable, with power adjustment, memory for settings and a massage function.

Rear legroom is okay but not what we would describe as generous, with rear air vents, 12 volt and 2 x USB ports, plus a fold-down centre armrest with two cupholders.

The cupholders are only large enough to accommodate a small coffee cup.

Finally, the boot is a good size, with 591 litres of space with the rear seat in use and hides a space saver spare.

With second row seats folded to transport stuff, the boot floor can be positioned higher to provide a level load area.

At 1429kg the 3008 is relatively light and it shows in the way the car steers and handles, as well as in the amount of fuel it uses.

Obviously, the heavier a vehicle is, the more effort it takes to move it.

Performance is fine with a driver and front passenger in place, but you need to work harder at it with four adults aboard.

Sport mode helps to compensate for the extra weight, but is too busy to use all the time.

Eco is unnecessary.

As smooth as the Aisin tranny might be, there is some lag between pushing the accelerator and the car responding.

With four aboard the car sits noticeably lower at the back and looks a little meaner.

GT Sport rides on 19-inch alloys, with 205/55 series Michelin rubber.

Strangely, the less expensive GT with 18s gets wider 225s (hybrid with 19s gets 255s).

Ride quality is generally okay and the cabin is genuinely quiet, making for easy conversation even at motorway speeds – but background noise ramps up on coarse bitumen.

Little bumps and imperfections are too evident – too often – and could be easily ironed out with some local suspension tuning as demonstrated by other importers.

Steering and brakes are good, but the brakes can be touchy.

Auto parking is fitted and works with reverse and parallel parking, but doesn't quite know what to make of 45-degree rear to kerb parking in many country towns.

No review of this car would be complete without mention of the Euro-style cruise control stalk.

We've said it before and we'll say it again, it is unnecessarily complicated and has been for years.

In fact, it has been made even more complex by the need to factor in adaptive cruise and fine adjustment for the gap between you and the vehicle in front.

The last Citroen we drove, the C4 Shine, had seen the light so to speak, with the operation finally moved to the steering wheel like most other brands.

Why Peugeot persists is a mystery.

It's okay to be different, but not at the expense of practicality.

We were getting 6.9L/100km after more than 1000km.

If you're in the market for a Euro SUV, the Peugeot 3008 GT Sport is an impressive alternative.

It looks amazing, it's comfortable, goes pretty well, doesn't use much fuel and is extremely quiet inside.

You can argue the GT Sport is expensive, or view it as a relatively cheap alternative for those wanting some Euro chic.

The unenviable challenge for Peugeot is getting buyers to accept a car with less equipment for the same price.

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Heat, breeze a challenge

A hot but breezy weekend across the South East was a little bit of a challenge for most anglers, but those who were keen still wet a line and we saw some pretty decent fish caught.

The offshore guys did well late last week and even Saturday morning.

The shark have certainly played the game for boaties, with the 50m through to 120m line of depth producing some rippers.

After a little while off the boat, it is great to see Wilba and crew from Southerly Charters back on the water and doing what they love – putting their clients onto a boat load of fish.

The crew managed to land over 15 sharks before lunch time, keeping a couple for the table and sending the rest back for next time.

Other species have been on the go too.

We have seen some nice red snapper, flat-head, blue morwong and terakhi, just to name a few.

Up the coast a bit there has been some nice tuna caught off Kingston and Cape Jaffa by the trollers.

Small skirts and minnow-style diving lures seem to be doing the trick.

There are kingfish out there too and they will quite happily eat the same stuff, so you never know your luck.

The surf fishos across the district are gearing up for the Kingston Lions Club Annual Surf Fishing Contest which kicks off this weekend.

There has been a bit more news filtering through this week, including that of some nice one-metre-plus mulloway landed.

The location has been kept pretty secret since it is competition weekend, but the fact that they are on the chew is very encouraging.

Sharks, big salmon, big snapper and even big flattys have been caught this week, which will make for a real mixed bag in the fish display come Sunday morning.

We have plenty of entries for the competition still available until close of business on Thursday evening, so swing in and get organised.

Locally this week there has been some nice fish caught from the beach.

The Beachport and Southend area has been exceptional, with mulloway, shark and snapper all copping a mention.

Rivoli Bay has been great, as has the 10-mile and the back beaches.

Nene Valley, Browns Beach and Piccininni have all fished well.

Snapper have again been the most prolific species, but the odd shark, small mulloway and salmon have still been caught.

Elephant fish are starting to pop up more often now and they are beautiful on the table too.

Snapper fishos are having no problem in the boats finding the fish.

It does not seem to matter where the guys are fishing now, the snapper are everywhere.

The usual hot spots such as Green and Danger Points, Orwell Rocks, Blackfellows Caves and Carpenter Rocks have all continued to produce not only good numbers of fish, but big fish.

Nate Little fished with his dad and pa over the weekend and boated plenty of nice fish in a hot session in around the kelp beds.

There have been a few salmon, pike and even squid eating the pilchards destined for a snapper, so you never know what else might be lurking around.

One crew chasing snapper at Livingstons Bay got a bit of a surprise when young Hamish Ferguson pulled in a 60cm kingfish.

He had a quick happy snap then released it to fight another day.

Our dream run of whiting has continued again this week.

Land-based fishos are probably getting just as many as the boaties.

The Port MacDonnell breakwater has been fantastic from both the jetty and the boat ramp for whiting and even across at the Hammonds Drain rock spit.

Alongside the whiting, I am seeing salmon, mullet, tommy ruff and even some big sea bream thrown in.

The boaties have been doing well inside the breakwater, Hutt Bay, Cape Douglas

and Pelican Point.

The gar fishing has been excellent this week again.

We are seeing more fish and bigger sizes, so everyone is happy.

The usual spots like Livingstons Bay and Cape Douglas are always pretty reliable, but if you are after somewhere a bit more spread out and not as busy, just look for a semi-protected bay with a good patch of ribbon weed and that is all the gar need.

Get the burley flowing and they will come.

The Glenelg River is slowly but surely coming back to its beautiful self.

The water is clearing slowly, but the fish are starting to move around nicely now.

The bream and perch are spread from the bottom of the estuary, right up into the sticks up river now.

They are being caught on hard-bodies and soft plastics – just mix it up a bit until you find their flavour.

The mulloway have been tricky.

I have heard of one nice fish in the mid-80cm range from the Dry Creek area, but not a lot else.

There are some thumping mullet getting caught at the moment down there by the land based and jetty fishos, so it is a great time to get down and have a crack.

The forecast for the weekend looks like it could be a little breezy, but it is definitely fishable for most.

If you are heading offshore, just double check and make the call in the morning.

To all those heading up to the Kingston Surf Fishing Comp, Good luck, stay safe and lets hope we see a few big silver slabs hit the beach.

Good year at greyhounds

Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club (MGGRC) president, Noel Perry, has described 2022 as a successful year as far as the 50-year-old club is concerned.

Speaking after the recent MGGRC's Annual General Meeting at its Lake Terrace East venue, he said the appointment 12 months ago of Mark Dwyer as club manager saw him quickly adapt to a change of racing codes and work in well with participants and patrons.

Perry also reiterated the club remained committed to further expanding its training facilities at Tara Raceway in order to cater for the education of young greyhounds.

"We now have in place two automatically-watered side-by-side slipping tracks for the galloping of greyhounds," he said.

"And with an area of land adjacent to those tracks now having been cleared, we are hopeful that a bullring will be erected by mid-year."

From a racing point of view, the highlight of 2022 had been the running in April of the club's first Group 3 race – the \$36,000 Mount Gambier Cup over 512 metres – first run in 1981 at Glenburnie when won by Tara Topar.

"We were fortunate to have Carlin & Gazard MG on board as the cup sponsor," Perry said.

"Winner of the race was Departure Gate, trained locally by Jason Newman at Moorak for the Adelaide-based Yeah Nah Syndicate.

"In July, the Exchange Printers Anniversary Cup (512m) was won by the Tracie Price trained Giant's Flash who equalled his own track record of 29.19 seconds.

"This was Price's third successive win in the event – following on from Spring Cuervo and Tandiki.

"Then in September the one-off South East Greyhound Racing Club 50-Year Anniversary Cup (512m) resulted in another win for Departure Gate.

"The Christmas Cup (512m) was won by Aston Ziebell and gave Allendale East trainer David Peckham his fourth success in the race."

Mount Gambier's 2022 Ian Badger Leading Trainer award was won by Tracie Price with a record number of winners – 181.

The 2022 Mount Gambier Greyhound of the Year was Departure Gate, a winner of 15 Category 2 races.

"The late Ian Badger, a six-time president and life member of the MGGRC, was also the club's inaugural leading trainer in 1978-1979," Perry said.

"And we're hopeful Judy Sellen (formerly Badger) will be on track on Sunday, February 19 for the presentation of the awards."

He also acknowledged the charitable efforts of the Tara Tipsters over the past three years.

Local charities to receive support have included the Sunset Community Kitchen, Foodbank, the Visually Impaired Club of Mount Gambier, the Grantville Court Thrift Shop, Four Reasons Why, Quaran Care and the Mount Gambier Community Christmas Luncheon.

"From humble beginnings, the Tara Tipsters are now coming from far and wide in their quest for bragging rights at the twice-weekly race meetings," Perry said.

"Currently, Adelaide-based Tim Aloisi and Scott Blacksell of Cape Bridgewater share the lead ... Scott Blacksell? Surely not!"

Perry also acknowledged the work of Greyhound Racing SA Director David A. Lewis in putting together a Participation Action Plan.

"David was down here last month with GRSA CEO Bodelle Francis to meet with our committee and discuss actions that could be developed to increase greyhound racing participation in the Mount Gambier region," he said.

The MGGRC president also expressed sincere thanks to those trainers – both SA and Victorian-based – who continue to travel long distances to race at Tara Raceway.

"Your support is much appreciated," he said.

Meanwhile, following last week's MGGRC Annual General Meeting, returning to the committee are Scott Blacksell, David Lewis, Ruth Lewis, Jason Newman, Noel Perry and Michael Robinson.

Also joining the committee is race-day regular Mark Roberts of Terang.

Club manager Mark Dwyer will also be in attendance at committee meetings.

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Limestone Coast well represented

After a break of two years, the Australian Country Junior Basketball Cup and the Southern Cross Challenge, the highlight events for talented junior basketballers throughout Australia return, with the Limestone Coast well represented.

Major venues for the 2023 Cup are the Lauren Jackson Sports Centre in Albury NSW and the Sports and Leisure Centre, Wodonga Victoria.

"But he has a great record at Penola and likes to get to the outside, so by the time he got to the mounting yard gate I knew he was going to win.

"It was the first time he has won beyond 1300, so he might be able to run a bit further."

As for Opperman's efforts, Creek said he suited Wild Willy.

"He is a pretty difficult horse, hard work," he said.

"Jacob has a good quiet way about him and is strong and firm, which you need to be with him.

"That's his fourth or fifth win with him."

Opperman was pleased to claim the cup win, going in confident of Wild Willy's ability over the 1700m distance.

"He ran good the start before and we thought 1700 would be his go," Opperman said.

"We were slightly confident, depending on how the race was run.

"It is my first local cup down here – I have won a Casterton Cup, so this is the first Limestone Coast cup, which was good."

As the race unfolded Opperman said he didn't expect to be so far back, but was still confident Wild Willy could run home strongly.

"He switched off and relaxed beautifully during the run which allowed us to keep moving into the race when we wanted to," he said.

"They went quite hard up in front which allowed us to get going.

"Come the corner I thought he was definitely going to get there.

"It was just a matter of picking up the second horse, which we did.

"He always goes good at Penola."

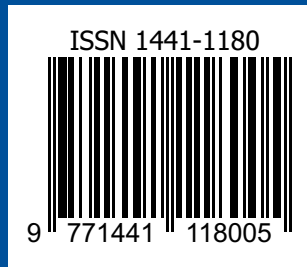
