Future unknown

The future of the Millicent saleyard is up in the air after Wattle Range Council voted to temporarily suspend repair works for two months.

During the council meeting on Tuesday, January 17, saleyard repair works to the tune

of \$1 million were put on hold following a lengthy debate between elected members.

Council voted to suspend the works until the incoming Section 41 advisory committee was able to review the operation costs and stock numbers heading through the saleyard,

with the discussion set to be picked up again in the March meeting.

Following the meeting, Council chief executive Ben Gower said saleyard patronage has been in decline over the last 20 years and a critical decision would need to be made in the

near future regarding whether the repairs go ahead or if the saleyard gets shut down.

"About nine months ago, we got four Safe-Work notices for infrastructure upgrades that were required," Mr Gower said.

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Centre in WRC hands

Wattle Range Council has taken back control of the Beachport Medical Centre after the previous lease expired.

Council chief executive Ben Gower said the premises has been vacated and successfully handed back to Council.

Mr Gower said it was unfortunate that it had to happen, but the previous lessees were unable to fund any doctors to operate the centre, which was the key decision in their withdrawal.

He said elected members discussed future lease arrangements in January's council meeting, but more specific information would remain in confidence for the moment.

St Joseph's Church the first of its kind

In association with State Heritage, Penola's branch of National Trust SA has developed a mobile phone app called SA Heritage, to enable people to learn more about historic sites within Penola on self guided tours.

The following is one of the subjects from this app.

ST JOSEPH'S CHURCH

St Joseph's Church, which was consecrated and opened in August 1924, and later extended, stands on an historic site.

In the 1840s the Penola district had been settled by those whom former parishioner, Mary MacKillop, later described as 'staunch old Catholics – most of them Scotch'.

Adelaide priest, Father Michael Ryan, ministered to them on six visits between March 1848 and November 1854, when another Irish-

man, Father Peter Powell, was appointed first resident priest. The 'roughly built wooden store' on this site became his presbytery and church.

It was subsequently designated 'the first place in the township where public worship was held [and] the first footstep of civilisation was stamped on the South Eastern district'.

Powell's successor, Father Julian Tenison Woods, arrived on 19 March 1857, the feast of St Joseph, and two years later completed a stone church that he named after the foster-father of Jesus. This 'beautiful little edifice, with its neat belfry', was deemed to be 'quite an ornament to our bonnie little town'.

An elegant brass chandelier from the old church hangs inside and the wooden Pilgrim Cross used at Mary MacKillop's 1995 Beatifica-

tion Mass, celebrated by Pope John Paul II in Sydney, is also on display.

The Mary MacKillop Shrine at the rear of the church was completed in 1998 and features a striking stained glass image of Mary.

Earlier examples of such craftsmanship are three 'beautiful Gothic windows of stained glass' from Father Woods' church.

Now in the new porch, they were restored for the 2016 sesqui-centenary celebrations related to the co-founding of the Sisters of St Joseph by Father Woods and Mary MacKillop here in 1866.

The adjacent Mary MacKillop Interpretive Centre, which was opened in 1998, houses exhibitions on the lives and achievements of Saint Mary MacKillop and scientist-priest, Father Woods.

Locals encouraged to be part of Indigenous Voice

Indigenous people across the South East will be able to put their hands up to represent their culture in State Parliament later this year.

Announced last week, the State Government will be introducing the nation's first Indigenous Voice to parliament after securing the votes.

The draft model, put together by former Limestone Coast resident and Minister for Aboriginal Affairs Kyam Maher, involved a three month engagement process which took place last year.

The process also included 40 members from across six regions throughout South Australia.

Mr Maher said he encouraged Indigenous voices from the South East to nominate themselves later in the year when nominations officially opened.

"We have had a couple of rounds of con-

sultation with the Indigenous community and they have been very interested in telling us what they want to see out of this," Mr Maher said.

"I am quite sure we will have strong representation on both the local areas which includes the South East but also on the state-wide voice from Indigenous people.

"I think having a South Eastern voice is critically important and I think it is also important that we have a diversity that represents the whole of issues that affect Indigenous South Australians."

Mr Maher said the South East was a "strong and thriving" Indigenous community and he personally would "love to see their voices properly represented".

"We heard loud and clear during the consultations that it is vitally important that there is a diverse geographical representation for Indigenous voices," he said.

"The issues that are facing and concern Indigenous people in metropolitan areas are

different to those of the APY lands which are again different to the South East."

The process would allow for any and all Indigenous people listed on the state electoral roll to vote or nominate.

Indigenous people from each region would then be able to voluntarily vote in who they wish to represent them on the committee.

"We are hoping to open up nominations later this year and have our first representative elected by the end of the year," Mr Maher said.

"In the lead up to the process we will be doing a lot of education on the topic and I encourage as many people as possible to get involved and make sure they are on the State electoral roll to nominate themselves and be a voice for the community.

"This is for Indigenous people, elected by Indigenous people and will result in an Indigenous voice in Parliament."

Rail trail gathering steam

Wattle Range Council is exploring the creation of a new rail trail between the Millicent and Tantanoola.

During the council meeting on Tuesday, January 17, Councillor Moira Neagle put forth a motion to engage the State Government to take care and control of the former railway line between Cattle Bridge Road, Millicent and the Tantanoola town centre.

While Council supported the idea, there was a lot of discussion between elected members as to whether more research could

be done before taking that step.

Council chief executive Ben Gower said there was a lot of history behind the rail corridor, with Council expressing an interest in buying the land back in 2018.

“We then spent three years doing contamination audits and found the contamination to be significant enough that we could not develop the land for commercial or residential purposes,” Mr Gower said.

“Mount Gambier found the exact same issue with the rail lands there and the only thing you could turn it into was parklands, and then you still have to deal with the con-

tamination and, in Mount Gambier’s case, they buried all the contamination under concrete footpath.

“If you dispose of that soil in any other way, it’s got to go to Adelaide, so trucking soil to Adelaide is thousands of dollars.”

Cr Neagle’s motion was then amended to said Council would negotiate with State Government subject to a report being bought back to the elected members during the meeting in March.

Mr Gower said putting a report together would allow more research to be done so elected members had the information they

needed to make a more informed decision.

He also said a Millicent rail trail was part of Council’s strategic plan over the next few years.

“I love the idea of a rail corridor going through, not just to Tantanoola, but going all the way to Mount Gambier,” he said.

“We’ve not got the Millicent one listed in the next strategic plan.

“The challenge is going to be \$1.5 million in grant money, but we got it last time because we had a master plan - we do need to do that work and get it right.”

“We went through the entire facility, did a comprehensive review, came up with a list of all the things that needed to be repaired - after three or four iterations with SafeWork, we landed on an agreed list and we estimated the cost to be over \$1 million.

“Since then, the numbers have continued to decline down to 5000 cattle per annum in the last 12 months and it is at the point where we need to make a key decision around whether we continue to invest \$1 million in just keeping that asset safe.”

Mr Gower said Council initially agreed to go ahead with the repairs following significant community support, but since then there has been a further 40 per cent decline in the number of cattle coming through the saleyard.

“The debate [during the meeting] was about getting that Section 41 committee back up and running post-election, having one final conversation with the agents, getting the agents to recommend whatever needs to be done, and then Council makes the decision on whether they continue to invest in the SafeWork infrastructure requirements or make an alternative decision,” he said.

“That conversation will be coming up again.

“We want to make sure we have those discussions with [the agents] before we bring back whatever the recommendations are to the chamber.”

Mr Gower said the facility is costing Council hundreds of thousands of dollars in ratepayer money each year.

Alice is doing her bit to honour the Queen’s legacy

Local resident Alice Cruickshanks was present last Wednesday to see the first of 13 English Oaks planted in each of the Wattle Range Council’s towns in honour of Queen Elizabeth II.

The Royalist first approached Mayor Des Noll during Seniors Month suggesting the council plant a tree in Millicent honouring the long reign of her majesty after the Queen’s passing in September.

Mayor Des Noll suggested Ms Cruickshanks write a letter to council so the request could go through the correct channels.

Ms Cruickshanks eventually wrote the letter and said

“I thought it would be good to commemorate Queen Elizabeth’s memory.

“She had an affinity with trees and was trying to keep the world’s forests alive.

“The Queen did support tree and forest growing around the world, and I thought it would be nice if we could have a memorial tree for her.

“It would be good as a memory of all her years of service and her loyalty to the public in the commonwealth, as well as Britain.”

During the last council meeting of 2022 the motion was passed to plant a tree in memory of Queen Elizabeth II and Councillor Neagle moved that a tree be planted in each of the 13 townships in the Wattle Range Council (WRC) district.

This motion was passed and 13 advanced English oak trees have since been



ordered, with the Millicent one the first to be planted.

“I thought it is quite a fitting tribute to Queen Elizabeth and I hope that many people find shelter and sunshade under its leafy branches when it grows” Ms Cruickshanks said.

WRC’s parks and gardens department prepared the ground and planted the three metre tall tree in the parklands along North Terrace under the watchful eye of Ms Cruickshanks.

WRC looking to our youth

Wattle Range Council is aiming to engage young people through a new discussion group to future-proof the region with the next generations of community leaders.

During January’s council meeting, elected members voted to get the ball rolling on a Mayoral and Youth Representative Discussion Group to better connect with younger community members.

Councillors also voted to have chief executive Ben Gower put together a report with draft terms of reference for the Discussion Group to be bought up in a future council meeting.

Mr Gower said Council had previously sought to form a Youth Advisory Council to sit in on meetings, but Covid put the brakes on that idea.

He said that may have been a good thing, as the extra time to think on it allowed Council to refine the idea to make a Discussion Group potentially more attractive to young people.

“The original proposal was to develop a youth council and we were going to get one representative from each of the three high schools in the council area,” he said.

“They would meet on a regular basis as a sub-committee of council, they would attend regular council meetings, we might be able to ask them for their thoughts and input.

“It’s probably not that attractive a role for a young person to sit in to a council meeting that runs for four or five hours listening to topics

they potentially have very little interest in.”

Mr Gower said the new plan would mean young people would be able to meet directly with the mayor and interested councillors, along with setting the agenda to discuss things that were important to youth.

“They will have to opportunity to come to a council meeting if they choose to, but we’ve made it a bit more flexible and attractive to youth because we don’t want it to be a burden,” he said.

“We want it to be something they enjoy doing.”

Mr Gower said he hoped to see young people getting around the idea as it could potentially nurture the next generation of community leaders and encourage people to stay within the region.

“We know demographically we tend to lose younger people from the regions to the metro shiny lights,” Mr Gower said.

“What we want to do is start some of those conversations with youth, have a look at what other opportunities are available regionally and find out what we can do to help them go get their tertiary qualifications and attract them back again.”

“We want to encourage that in our younger people, so having this type of arrangement where we regularly touch base with a youth committee through council, we also hope we’ll be able to mentor, coach and encourage our future community leaders.”

School zones back in force

As the school holidays come to an end, and kids get ready to return to school, drivers are urged to be cautious in school zones.

Schools across the region start on Monday, meaning school zones will be in force.

According to more than 350,000 motor insurance claims across the Australia from 1 July 2021 to 30 June 2022, Fridays were the worst day of the week for accidents (16 per cent), while afternoons between 1pm and 4.30pm (which coincides with school pick-up) proved the most common time with almost one third (29 per cent) of crashes occurring during this timeframe.

Russell White, CEO and Founder of the Australian Road Safety Foundation said road safety is all drivers’ responsibility, and urged Aussies behind the wheel to follow the road rules, pay attention and help save lives this year.

“People don’t realise that speeding, even a few kilometres over the speed limit in a school zone, can be the difference between life and death for our children.

“With the new school year upon us, we’ll be seeing kids as young as five starting school for the first time, many of which will not have developed strong road safety skills, and so it is up



to drivers to ensure we are following the road rules, adhering to speed limits, and being attentive when behind the wheel.


“No one leaves home with the intention of having a crash, let alone a road incident that involves a child, and that is why we’re partnering with AAMI to encourage Aussies to take care on our roads – especially around schools.”

Top Tips for Back to School Road Safety

- Expect the unexpected - children have limited road-safety awareness and experience
- Always look out for children disembarking from buses or cars
- If dropping off or picking up your children, follow your school’s safety directives
- Avoid driving distracted, and follow all road rules and signage.

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Big year ahead for RDALC

There are a lot of exciting developments in store for the region in 2023, according to Regional Development Australia Limestone Coast (RDALC).

RDALC chief executive David Wheaton said this year will see a lot of interesting projects and opportunities coming to the Limestone Coast.

Mr Wheaton said opportunities would come across not only a range of industries, but also in terms of the people and communities.

“Probably every year, there’s at least one or two things that you go, ‘This is exciting to be involved in and important for the region,’” he said.

“Housing, the development of emerging leaders across the region, the big renewable projects - they’re all pretty exciting things to

get involved with.

“I feel very lucky at times, as the RDA chief executive, that I get such a diverse and interesting range of projects to be involved in.”

He said he was especially excited about renewable energy, with upcoming offshore wind projects emerging as an industry that could potentially create many jobs in the years to come.

“Two years ago, there was no offshore wind farm industry in Australia, so this is a brand new industry with potentially significant employment opportunities for our region,” he said.

“A key priority for us this year is getting across what is a new and emerging industry.

“I’m told that we’ve got some of the best offshore wind in the world - I make a joke about when I went over the Kingston to learn a bit about the project there, I opened the car

on the main street and the wind nearly took my door off.”

While there was a lot to be excited about for the year, Mr Wheaton said there were still numerous challenges around attracting new workers to the region that would continue into 2023.

“Across the region, we’ve seen a fair bit of turnover in employment and jobs - we’ve got an unemployment rate across the region of around three per cent, so it’s really challenging for employers to find good people and to hold onto them,” he said.

“We’ve been no different in that regard, but it has been really pleasing to see some really good, talented people join our team towards the end of last year.

“And we’re really looking forward to getting into the challenges of this year with some fresh thinking and the enthusiasm that an injection of new people brings into your organisation.”

Mr Wheaton said the development of local leadership was critical to the region and he hoped RDALC’s Emerging Leaders Program would lay the foundations for ensuring the growth of communities.

“Our leadership across the region does tend to be of that ageing demographic, so it’s really important that we’re bringing through that next generation of people who are going to become the board members, elected members to councils, sitting on hospital boards, running our sports clubs,” he said.

“It’s critical to the vibrancy of our communities.

“It’s also about broadening the diversity of leadership across the region so that it represents the wider community.”

Mr Wheaton said RDALC would also be focussing on strategically positioning the region over the year in terms of the circular economy, resilience, and helping small businesses.

State funding to benefit community groups available

Limestone Coast community groups will have the opportunity to share in \$15,000,000 to support initiatives to better South Australian regions through new State Government funding.

The Thriving Regions Fund (previously the Regional Growth Fund) is there to support small projects that build social resilience through facilitating greater community participation.

Funding will go towards projects to build new or improve old infrastructure and equipment, access to services and programs, or events with wellbeing outcomes.

Minister for Regional Development Clare Scriven said the SA Government understood the needs of regional communities and the Thriving Regions Fund was created to meet those needs.

“Our regions contribute \$29 billion to the state’s economy, and we look forward to rolling out this program and several others as we work together with communities to build even stronger regions,” she said.

“Our regional areas are great places to live and work and this grant program will enable community focussed projects that further enhance liveability.”

Grants will range from \$20,000 to \$50,000 and applications will close once the full funding amount has been allocated, or by June 30.

A love of Beachport and its natural attractions underpins the work 21 year old Liam Mills does for his community.

Having lived in Beachport all his life he learned from a young age the importance of learning to be safe with the ocean.

This passion continued from Vacswim lessons to becoming a leading member of the Beachport Surf Life Saving Club (BSLSC).

"It all started from when I first did Vacswim when I was young, then volunteering, then becoming an instructor for Vacswim," he said.

"This led me to becoming involved in the surf club."

Mr Mills has been involved in BSLSC since it was established in 2016.

Beginning as a youth and supporting the Nippers as an age manager he applied himself and trained for both the Bronze and Silver medallions.

Phillips praised Mr Mills calling him one of the club's success stories.

"He has just thrown himself into the club and got qualified in just about everything you can be qualified for in surf life saving," he said.

"It is great for us because if it wasn't for Liam, we wouldn't have the drone or the jet ski."

The young cray fisherman is also passionate about videography and photography and has his own video production business, Mills Media Productions.

Developing an interest in photography while travelling Australia with his family this talent has led to several award wins and calendar features.

Wattle Range Council recently approached the photographer about his work and now one of his drone photos of Beachport adorns the town's new entrance sign.

His videos have been used by local business to promote what Beachport has to offer

Today Mr Mills is recognised for his input to the community as he accepts the Australia Day Citizen of the year for Kintore ward at Beachport's award ceremony.

"I was very surprised by the award as I didn't know I had been nominated" Mr Mills said.

Bequest aids community

Residents, staff and community members recently gathered at Sheoak Lodge nursing home to celebrate the informal opening of the newly refurbished Zander function room.

The remodelling was the result of a \$150,000 donation from Mount Burr resident, Andrew Zander, who named Sheoak Lodge nursing home as the beneficiary of his last will and testament.

Mr Zander was a resident of the nursing home for 11 years from 2006 until his death in 2017.

The donation allowed for the redevelopment of the function room creating a welcoming room for residents, their families and staff.

The room has undergone a complete makeover with the installation of a wheelchair friendly kitchen, new flooring, new window furnishings and lighting, and chairs specially designed to be comfortable for long periods while watching football or a movie.

A dining table custom made from Mount Burr cypress pine, by TK furniture in Penola, takes pride of place in the dining area.

With a wall of brightly coloured artworks created by Mount Burr Primary School are above the table and reflect love, community and family.

Millicent Hospital's Executive Officer and Director of Nursing and Midwifery Michelle de Wit said

"We want the community to be engaged and we want the residents to still have that connection to the community and their families.

"That's what has been really important to us.

"One of Andrew's loves was food, so that is why this space has been created.

"People can cook if they are in a wheelchair or they can't stand for a long period of time, we've made that accessible.

"We've been using this space but we haven't been able to do this informal opening because of covid."

Work on the upgrades started toward the end of 2019 but slowed dramatically during the covid 19 pandemic outbreak in 2020, finally reaching completion within the last 12 months.

The Mount Burr local was well known in the community and especially the football community taking on the role of scoreboard keeper for around 20 years.

"Andrew loved football and movies so we've got the lovely tv with surround sound and block-out blinds so we can create that darker environment" Ms de Wit said.

Chair of the Millicent Health Advisory Council, Kevin McGrath, welcomed guests and spoke about Mr Zander before declaring the room open.

"This space has been remodelled and refurbished for the residents connections to their families and community" he said.

"We hope this space will be used for gatherings, special occasions and farewells for loved ones and many joyful activities to be shared with the Sheoak community and beyond.

"A lasting parting gift from someone who has been a well known member of the Sheoak family and wider community.

Mr Zander's closest relative to attend the opening was Wayne Alcock from Mount Burr.

Mr Zander, his twin sister Elizabeth and oldest brother Malcolm lived with Mr Alcock's family on their farm at Mount Burr.

The boys had been boarding at Struan

House near Naracoorte and were working on local farms before eventually moving to Mount Burr.

"I was the only one in my parent's family and the kindness of my parents brought the three of them up to the farm" Mr Alcock said.

"I can remember I was probably 10, or I might have been younger, when Malcolm first came down.

"The three of them then had a house in Mount Burr at one stage, they worked in the Burr mill."

Coincidentally Mr Alcock's mother also spent her final years living in Sheoak Lodge.

Wilma Moore also attended the opening and had many memories to share of Mr Zander.

"He was involved with the football scoreboard, they certainly missed him after they left because the kids would do it" she said.

"They said get Andrew back, at least we know the score is right!

"I used to tease him all the time, he loved coming in to help me in the garden, he use to pull all the flowers out instead of the weeds or he would prune a bush right back to nothing.

"Andrew loved his smokes, loved his music and he loved his Phantom comic books."

During last Thursday's opening two long standing Millicent HAC members, Brenton Dohnt and Jeniene Davis, were presented with plaques to recognise their commitment by Ms de Wit.

Mr Dohnt has been a member of HAC for 28 years, acting as chairman for over eight of those, and Ms Davis has been a member for 12 years.

Rural Matters

Think before you spray

With the wet spring, and ongoing cooler conditions heading into summer, producers are being reminded to consider not only their immediate neighbours but the potential for spray drift damage well away from their property when planning spraying operations in coming weeks.

With last season's wet summer leading to spray drift impacts, the Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA) is once again emphasising the need for producers to ensure they are following label directions, best practice advice and closely monitoring weather conditions.

Climatic conditions over recent months across the state's agricultural areas have been favourable for weed and fungal disease establishment, making it highly likely that producers will need to undertake chemical control during the course of this summer.

Without proper consideration and planning, chemical spraying comes with significant risks, particularly in regard to spray drift which can impact sensitive neighbouring crops, environments and even rural communities.

General Manager, Plant and Food Standards at the Department of Primary Industries and Regions of PIRSA Dr Ross Meffin said with the amount of spraying likely to take place over summer, absolute diligence will be required round planning and applying.

"Given the potential for spray drift impacts to occur quite some distance away from the original spray application site, spray applicators cannot afford to overlook spray drift risks, no matter how far they are from a sensitive crop or neighbouring town," she said.

"Even now with improved information and resources available including new weather station technology and the implementation of larger droplet size requirements on labels, chemical users still need to pay attention to the details of their spray activities including having the right chemical required for the job and being up to date on potential weather conditions.

"It is of critical importance that no spraying should take place under hazardous inversion weather conditions which generally exist from late in the evenings, right through the night until early morning.

"If a hazardous inversion is present or likely to occur, then the advice is 'do not spray.'"

Grain Producers SA Chief Executive Brad Perry said that while chemical application standards and practices have significantly improved in recent years and are followed by the majority of growers, it only takes the actions of a minority of poor operators to not only cause

significant damage, but to also threaten major markets with residue detections from spray drift.

"Fortunately, there are now many resources to assist growers in their planning, including the Mesonet weather station grid in the Mid North, Mallee and Riverland, designed to identify potential weather inversions in their area.

"It is also important for growers to adhere to the industry endorsed Code of Practice for Summer Weed Control and we are also encouraging communities of growers to work together through the 'Keep your droplets to yourself' campaign to further minimise spray drift risks."

In investigating reports of spray drift, PIR-

SA will pursue any instances of deliberate or negligent use of chemicals in contravention of label instructions. Offences carry a maximum penalty of \$35,000 per offence, reflecting the seriousness of not following mandatory label instructions. PIRSA will also be proactive with auditing to identify any poor spraying practices this season.

Grain Producers SA is also boosting awareness of spray drift issues through its 'Keep your droplets to yourself' campaign, a proactive program designed to both educate and warn growers of the critical need to maintain best practice with their spraying operations. If you suspect incidents of spray drift in your neighbourhood or that sprayers may not be carrying out applications to the legal requirements, you are encouraged to report to the Agricultural and Veterinary Chemicals Hotline on 1300 799 684. Reports can be made anonymously. PIRSA will act on any such reporting.

Grants to improve sustainability open

New funding will support Australian farmers to demonstrate their sustainable farming practices, leading the way on developing a provable product-claim that assures key export markets.

Applications are now open for the new \$4 million grant round of the National Agriculture Traceability Sustainability Reporting Uplift program.

Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry Murray Watt made the announcement from Berlin where he was holding talks with his EU counterparts to promote Australia's sustainable farming practices.

Minister Watt said this new funding would help stakeholders verify sustainability credentials through consistent collection, measurement, and reporting of data.

"Australia has a great story to tell but

there are gaps in the data, frameworks and credentials we have available to tell this story," Minister Watt said.

"We need better cohesion on sustainability reporting across commodities and the whole supply chain.

"Demonstrating the sector's sustainability credentials is becoming increasingly important for Australia's agricultural production and export, including market access."

Minister Watt said providing provable claims would assure key export markets of our sustainability credentials.

"Improved data capability can reduce compliance and regulatory costs, aid in meeting emerging international requirements and better meet Environmental, Social and Governance (ESG) reporting requirements," he said.

"Better data and governance also ensures value-add benefits from agricultural traceability are realised at the farm gate.

"That means farmers can prove and leverage their natural capital for economic benefit."

Grant funding is available to peak industry bodies, research organisations and consortia applicants.

Organisations can apply for grants between \$50,000 to \$500,000 for projects lasting up to 24 months - ending in June 2025. Applications close on Thursday 23 February 2023.

Palisade is big and bold

Palisade is the largest model in Hyundai's SUV range.

At a smidgeon under five metres, it's around the same size and price as competitors such as Toyota Kluger and Mazda CX-9.

Launched in late 2020 it was given an upgrade in May 2022 with updated exterior and interior design elements, improved safety and tech features.

Palisade comes in two equipment levels, Elite and Highlander, each with the choice of 3.8-litre petrol FWD or 2.2-litre diesel AWD.

Prices range from \$65,900 for the Elite petrol 2WD to \$79,900 for our test vehicle, the Highlander diesel AWD.

Not only is Palisade a large vehicle but it has styling that accentuates its bulk, starting from the front with a huge version of the parametric grille that's being progressively rolled out across the Hyundai range.

The grille is flanked by vertically stacked triple LED headlights, together with similarly shaped taillights, that emphasise the height of the Palisade.

The Highlander variant that we tested came with exclusive design touches, including a satin chrome finish for the grille with matching badge and skid plate finishes.

There are hidden-type turn signals, body-coloured cladding and exclusive 20-inch wheels with a 15-spoke turbine design.

The 3.8-litre petrol V6 generates 217 kW of power at 6000 rpm and 5200 Nm of torque with standard unleaded fuel.

The 2.2-litre CRDi diesel has less power (147 kW at 3800 rpm) but extra torque (440 Nm between 1750 and 2750 revs).

Both have a recently updated eight-speed torque converter automatic transmission.

The diesel AWD uses an active on-demand HTRAC system.

Inside, Palisade comes with a full-width front air vent and a great-looking and feeling four-spoke steering wheel capped off in Highlander with a two-tone finish.

A floating centre console angles up to merge with the dashboard, with a large space below for out-of-sight storage as well as a USB-C and 12V sockets.

There's plenty of additional storage space at the rear of the centre console with two adjustable drink holders and another pair of USB and 12V jacks.

Palisade comes with two seating options, the more conventional 3-3-2 eight-seat family-focused arrangement or an executive 3-2-2 seven-seater with a pair of individual captain chairs in the middle row.



The Palisade's safety rating ensures everyone gets where they need to.

The boxy styling of Palisade means there's excellent headroom in all three seat rows.

Legroom is also good with the centre row seats able to slide back and forwards to cater for both easier access and extra comfort to third row passengers.

Highlander also gets heated and ventilated front and second-row seats in both seven- and eight-seat variants as well as quilted seat inserts, quilted and perforated door trim inserts, suede headlining and stainless-steel front speaker grilles.

With all seats in place there's a reasonable 311 litres of cargo space, expanding to 704 litres with the third-row seatbacks folded and a van-like 2447 litres with all rear seats down.

All variants come with seven airbags including one between the front seats, full-length curtain 'bags, and lap-sash safety belts for all occupants rather than the normal lap-only belt in the centre-rear spot.

Other advanced safety features come with the Hyundai SmartSense system and include Blind Spot View and Collision-Avoidance Assist, Driver Attention Warning, Forward and Rear Cross-Traffic Collision Avoidance Assist, Lane Following and Lane Keeping Assist, and Safe Exit Assist.

Highlander adds a Blind-Spot View Monitor, Parking Collision-Avoidance Assist and Surround View Monitor.

Palisade is the first model in the Hyundai range to get the company's BlueLink Connected Car system with safety features that include automatic collision notification and

emergency call function.

Other convenience features provided by BlueLink include remote unlocking, climate control setting and engine start.

Standard in both Palisade models is a 12.3-inch high-definition touchscreen multimedia system.

It comes with Apple CarPlay and Android Auto (both wired), six USB-C and one USB-A ports, Bluetooth message playback, embedded satellite navigation with live traffic updates, Qi standard wireless smartphone charging, and a voice memo function with up to 70 minutes recording time.

A second, fully-digital, 12.3-inch screen in front of the driver displays the instrument cluster as well as blind spot view monitors, activated with the turn indicators on either side.

Both variants come with a 12-speaker Infinity premium audio system.

As well as the previously mentioned safety features, BlueLink Vehicle Reporting allows owners to check a number of features on their smartphone including tyre pressures, fuel level and range.

Through the BlueLink Send To Car feature, satellite navigation directions can be pre-set on a smartphone and synced to the car before departure.

Initially, the large dimensions can be a bit intimidating when you first get into the Palisade but the various assistance features together with its high driving position and excellent visibility help to quickly overcome these concerns.

Also, with its comparatively tight turning circle of 11.8 metres it can handle the average shopping centre with room to spare although the backside tends to jut out.

While other eight-seat SUVs are based on a heavy-duty four-wheel-drive 'ladder frame' chassis, the Hyundai Palisade is built like a car.

That means its centre of gravity is lower and steering and suspension should be more like the average passenger vehicle. Travelling in stop-start city low-speed conditions, this is the case.

Out on the motorway the Palisade cruises smoothly and quietly with little clue that it is powered by a diesel. Most of our time was spent with either one or two occupants on board but it felt that it would have no trouble coping with the maximum eight people.

The steering is well-weighted and gives good feedback.

Combined cycle fuel consumption is listed at 10.7 litres per 100 kilometres with the petrol engine and 7.3 L/100km from the diesel. We averaged 8.7 L/100km during our test.

Hyundai Palisade is an impressive vehicle that combines the practicality of an SUV while coming close to being car-like in the way it drives.

It's reasonably priced and comes with plenty of safety and tech equipment.

Palisade comes with Hyundai's standard five-year, unlimited warranty.

BlueLink is also free for the same five-year period but incurs a charge from then onwards.

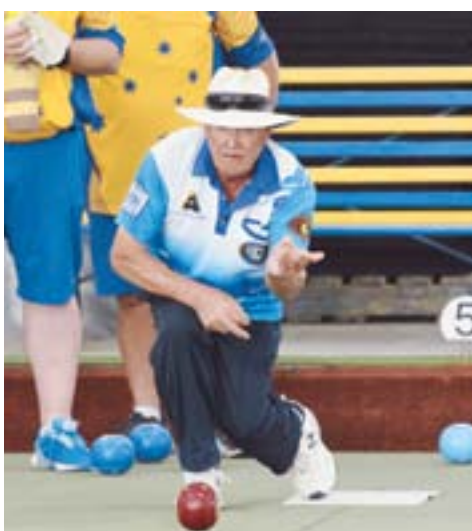
