Wellbeing boost

Adding another string to the bow of Millicent High School's (MHS) current wellbeing program is the announcement the school will benefit from a mental health practitioner on

Following a trial of nine schools in 2022 the state Labor government program is being rolled out to 65 schools this year.

The service aims to support young people with mild to moderate and emerging mental

Eligible high schools in the \$50 million program were selected on a range of criteria including social disadvantage and it is designed to complement the range of existing mental

health and wellbeing services already available in schools.

MHS currently has a range of wellbeing programs in place for students across all years with year 12 students having the option to be mentored weekly by a teacher or Student Support Officers (SSO).

Principal Todd Watson said the idea is for

20 minutes per week.

"Some weeks it might be a bit more or some weeks it might be less, depending on how the student is travelling," he said.

"They can work on ways and strategies with study or if they are having trouble with things between school and work.

The forum addressed key priorities of inclusive communities for all, leader-ship and collaboration, accessible communities and learning and employment.

Fire causes \$80,000 in damages

A harvester fire in Maaoupe has caused an estimated \$80,000 in damages to equipment and produce.

Emergency services were called to the property just after 5.30pm on Wednesday, February 9.

The Country Fire Service was on the scene within five minutes, with farm fire fighting units already in attendance when they arrived.

The fire had spread from the header, but fire crews were able to contain the blaze by putting a control line around the fires edge saving nearby livestock and paddocks.

The farmer was able to escape, with no known injuries.

With harvesting continuing this late into the season, CFS has encouraged farmers to reduce the risk of fire by regularly cleaning out dust build up in harvesters.

Glenrowan heritage

In association with State Heritage, Penola's branch of National Trust SA has developed a mobile phone app called SA Heritage, to enable people to learn more about historic sites within Penola on self guided tours.

The following is one of the subjects from this app.

GLENROWAN

Probably built by local stonemason George Gladstone, the owner in 1861-62, then purchased by Stock and Commission Agent Charles Jonas Valentine who in 1866 sold it to Benjamin Pickworth Hunt, an Inspector in the South Australian Police Force.

Used as a family residence for the major part of his police career it was named Glenrowan due to his association with the arrest of the bushranger, Ned Kelly.

Inspector Hunt was awarded the Imperial Service Medal and is believed to be the longest serving member of the South Australian Police Force.

In 1901 it was sold to Jessie Balnaves, wife of storekeeper William Balnaves who became the owner in 1941. After his death in 1952 the property was sold to John and Eileen Mulligan and during this time the verandah was added to the building.

Remaining as a residence there has been a succession of owners since then.

During Benjamin Hunt's ownership, occupiers were James Naulty & Patrick Drummond

Petition for radiation treatment grows

Sandra Melrose has volunteered to collect signatures in Millicent and surrounds for the Radiation Treatment for the Limestone Coast petition.

The petition has been circulating the Limestone Coast, after plans to build a radiation treatment centre in Mount Gambier were quashed and the funds reallocated.

At time of publishing, it had more than 2300 signatures.

The cause is one close to Ms Melrose's, heart having lost her own mum to cancer when she was 13 years old.

"It's always quietly been in my heart and when I was approached by Laurie (Dacy) I said yes to helping." Ms Melrose has been dropping the peti-

tions in to Millicent and Beachport businesses and the Southend general store.

While sitting at Woolworths Ms Melrose told the South Eastern Times that it was not difficult to get people to sign the petition.

Many who signed were sharing their own stories and those of family members who have to travel to Adelaide for treatment, where they find they can be isolated from friends and family and the distance impacts on their ability to work.

"The blue represents if you are having a down day, you are feeling blue."

WRC Mayor Des Noll is chairperson of the group and picked up a paintbrush on the day to assist.

"Enthusiastically the team has come along and completed the job today," he said.

"It stimulates our community to have this conversation around mental health and suicide prevention which is an important thing

"As a community we should be having a continued conversation, we should all be talking about it and sharing and looking after each other as we do at RUOK day."

Not council problem

There has been no noticeable increase in the number of complaints this year to Wattle Range Council (WRC) about the destruction being caused by flocks of Little Corellas

Although Emma Clay, WRC Director Development Services, acknowledged that it was an ongoing issue.

"This is a really tricky issue, as it is not just contained to our council area and it isn't something that is within the council's control" she said.

"Council will not cull corellas, as it has been proven to be ineffective at addressing the issue and there is a breed of corella in our region that is protected.

"When we receive complaints, if the complaint pertains to private land, we encourage the landowner to try some management techniques, such as scaring via sounds, installing scarecrows or other visual deterrents and modifying habitat to reduce access to food and wa-

"If a complaint pertains to council land, the council response will be proportionate to the damage that is occurring – which may range from periodic monitoring of the site to daily scaring/ dispersal techniques.

"The National Parks and Wildlife Service and the Limestone Coast Landscape Board are able to provide advice on the Management of Corellas (as stated on the Department of Environment website).'

The birds have recently caused extensive damage to school ovals at Newbery Park (NPPS) and Millicent High and the Millicent Football oval, resulting in a delayed start to this year's Little Athletics

"It's just an extra sounding board for the student to help support them through year 12."

The school has in place a wellbeing hub, wellbeing coordinator Tam Gould, and Basil the wellbeing dog who is at school as much as is practical.

Headspace are on site two days a week and Christian Pastoral worker Xandia Obst is available four days a week building relationships.

Both of these programs have been expanded since they began due to their success. "We've always had a strong foundation and

ideology around wellbeing and we recognise if the wellbeing is not right then how do we expect someone to learn" Mr Watson said.

"It's been a very strong standpoint for us but I recognise that anything extra we can get is going to be fantastic."

It is early days for the school in the implementation of the program but it will allow a mental health practitioner on the site for up to two and a half days a week.

Mr Watson believes the program will add support to the school's current program and is in early conversations with the Department of Education of what that support will look like

"We are at the early stages, it's exciting when you get something like this, it's only going to support us and I see it as a real positive.

"I hope this helps to continue to build and push to get the other resources that are required to for the region.

"We know how hard it is for most health care to be serviced and accessed let alone

Kalangadoo remembers

Kalangadoo will remember those lost during the Ash Wednesday fires with a private memorial service held tonight.

Today marks the 40th anniversary of the fires which took 14 lives and more than 60 homes

A further 400 properties were burnt out with thousands of cattle and sheep also lost.

Kalangadoo resident Peter Savage said it was important the community remembered those lost on the day.

"Ash Wednesday was a really hot day and people were aware it would be a fire danger day," Mr Savage said.

"It was a traumatic experience for us all and to hear about people getting caught in the fire, they deserve recognition.

"Throughout the past 40 years there were a lot of people who were here on the day that have also departed so it is about recognising history and remembering it and those who were involved."

Mr Savage said despite Ash Wednesday being a traumatic part of Kalangadoo's history, it was still history and family members of those departed deserved to be recognised.

"The community knows the anniversary is coming up, we can all feel it," he said.

"Once it is February we know it is coming and needs to be marked one way or another.

"It is something that is on our mind and people will bring it up now and then but it is hard not to think about it, especially when some trees still have scorch marks."

Kalangadoo resident Frank Ousey remembered the time well, including fighting the fires.

"It was terrible conditions and I was captain of the local fire brigade at the time," Mr Ousey said.

"Penola told us to turn our siren on and get a crew ready so we did.

"We eventually got a call out to Millicent Road and so we hopped in the truck and about eight kilometres out we saw the fire coming."

Mr Ousey said he and his crew fought many fires around Kalangadoo that day, but it was the fire which started in the yards at the railway which was most concerning.

"After putting out a few fires around the area we saw there was one in the yards at the railway yards and we needed to put that out because if it had jumped over then it would have taken out the whole of Kalangadoo," he said

"Eventually we got that fire out and we got a call that it was going to jump over Nangwarry Road so we went out there to fight it and all of a sudden we heard a rattling noise coming

from the pines.

"A bloke came out on his bulldozer and asked us to put out the fire that had started in his engine and once we put that out he just turned around and went straight back in."

Throughout the day, Mr Ousey said it was due to his crew and the fire truck that he had survived.

"I could never have asked for a better crew at the time and the truck was also fantastic with high sides," he said.

"The high sides are what saved us."

Also in Kalangadoo on the day was local resident Andrew Auld, who was only a teenager at the time of the fires.

Mr Auld said he was at the coast on the morning of Ash Wednesday and decided to head back home after seeing plumes of smoke.

"It was because of the smoke, the heat and the wind that I decided to come home and help dad on the farm," Mr Auld said.

"When I got home, I didn't know exactly where the fire was because of the smoke.

"The fire was heading south but then the wind changed and the whole from came across and I knew our shearing shed was alight because I could see it burning."

Mr Auld said while he was travelling home in the tractor, before he knew it he was in the middle of the fire and kept driving off to the side of the road due to poor visibility.

"I was on the road in the tractor and all of a sudden I was right in it," he said.

"Everything went black then red and I even had a fire behind the seat because of clippings and rags.

"I didn't know where I was going and hit the edge of the road because I couldn't see."

Upon returning home, Mr Auld said there was no electricity, no water pumps working and all garden hoses were melted.

"We had to use a lawn mower catcher and scoop water from the bath into it to try and put out the fire on the house," he said.

"We managed to save the house but everything else had burnt.

"Ultimately we were no different to everybody else and it wasn't until the next day that we had a sense of what actually occurred."

Despite the difficulty the Kalangadoo community had experienced, the three locals agreed it was beneficial to commemorate the event.

Search on for doctors to reopen Beachport clinic

Wattle Range Council is actively pursuing the return of medical services to the Beachport community and is exploring options to fill the medical centre left vacant by the previous lease in December.

Last Thursday council CEO, Ben Gower, released a statement providing an update on the occupation of the Beachport Medical Centre.

"After initially indicating their desire to renew the lease, council was only advised by the former operator on the 14th of December 2022 that they would not be doing so, and that they would be vacating the council owned building on the 31st of December.

"The building was formally handed back to council in early January after a handover inspection was completed on site."

The statement revealed high level discussions had been held with medical service providers and a formal expression of interest process would soon take place.

"The lease terms and conditions are extremely competitive and have been specifically designed to attract potential operators to continue to provide local medical services to the Beachport community" Mr Gower said

Lifelong Beachport resident Elaine Donaldson told the South Eastern Times the community had always supported the medi-

"We as a community need to find another services like it was back in the early 70's.

Emma Castine stood down

Emma Castine has been stood down from the Wattle Range Council, after a failure to return her declarations form.

Ms Castine was recently elected in the Riddoch ward. She is one of 46 councillors around the state to be stood down due to a failure to lodge campaign returns to the Electoral Commissioner of South Australia.

Candidates must lodge two returns for a periodic election - The first must be lodged with the returning officer in the period between 22 to 28 days after the close of nominations and the second must be lodged within 30 days after the conclusion of the election.

Speaking at the council meeting on Tuesday. Chief executive Ben Gower said the council was not allowed to support her in any way as an administration, but said he had done a welfare check twice.

"She is very upset by the process," he said.

Councillors expressed frustrations with the system, with many saying they had issues with their submissions.

Councillor Dale Price said he had issues with returning his own declaration form.

"I had to ring twice, I submitted both and with the second one I was so unsure I sent an email to support it and I still have no idea if it was received," he said.

Likewise, Councillor Deb Agnew said she had to phone the electoral commission twice due to issues.

Mr Gower said he recommended councillors provide feedback to the ECSA,

"They are open for public consultation right now, I would encourage a significant number of you to share your views," he said.

Mr Gower said the council could request a countback to find the next closest candidate to fill the position.

Railway land under offer

After three years the final unsold allotment of disused railway land in the centre of Millicent is now under offer through South East Property Sales and Management.

The latest 3.7ha lot includes the former 1926 railway station building, home to Millicent's community radio station, and a telecommunications tower.

Both are under current lease arrangements with the radio station lease, through the Department of Infrastructure and Transport (DIT), due to expire in 2031.

Current zoning of the Railway Terrace land includes a mixture of Suburban Activity Centre (commercial) and Community Facilities.

Five separate lots totalling 5.2 hectares, or about 12 acres, were put on the market by DIT in 2019.

The land stretched from the Northern corner of Cattle Bridge Road through to the Southern end of Towers Road.

Millicent Real Estate sold the first lot to Millicent Farm Supplies who purchased the allotment adjacent to their business in 2020 and have since expanded on to the site.

In September 2022 the sale of the two remaining Cattle Bridge Road blocks sold to Perry's Fuel Distributor.

Perry's have received approval to build an unmanned service station on the site from the Environment Protection Authority, Commissioner of Highways and Wattle Range Council.

The 1.55ha site along Towers Road is currently zoned Community Facilities and was settled in December last year.

Cr Moira Neagle passed a motion at February's Wattle Range Council meeting to negotiate with the State Government to take care and control of the former railway line between Cattle Bridge Road, Millicent to the centre of Tantanoola.

When informed of the latest allotment under offer Cr Neagle spoke on behalf of herself and not WRC.

"I put up the motion because we didn't buy the bit that Perry's got and I thought we've got to get control of the rest," she said.

"Council has had a long term idea of turning it into a walking/riding track but if you don't have control of it, you lose control of it

"When it came up for discussion the view around the chamber was very positive."

The rationale of the proposal was to avoid others purchasing the site and to develop the former railway line as a walking and bike trail between the two towns.

The proposal was subject to a report being brought back to council at next month's March meeting.

The railway land is registered with the Environment Protection Agency as being a contaminated site.



The latest block to go under offer runs the length of Railway Terrace in Millicent with the exception of a house toward the Southern end of the street.

Youth science forum was a blast

Talented 17 year old Millicent High School student Dalbir Castignani recently attended the National Youth Science Forum (NYSF) during the summer holidays.

The program is a offered to year 11 students interested in careers in STEM and Dalbir was encouraged to apply by Mathematics teacher Hoveida Saberi.

Ms Saberi first met Dalbir as a year seven student at Tantanoola Primary School when she was contacted by the Principal at the time, Moira Neagle.

Ms Neagle said that Dalbir had an advanced knowledge of maths when he joined the school and their teacher was not in a position to teach him any further in the subject.

This request led to Ms Saberi tutoring Dalbir once a week with the student undertaking some year 10 work while still at primary school.

"I encouraged Dalbir to apply for the program because I can see the potential in him" Ms Saberi said.

"He is a very capable young person and I actually look forward to a day in maybe five or 10 years time, when I hear his name and I can say, oh I know that person."

Roles were reversed for the NYSF as Ms Saberi reached out to Ms Neagle to help Dalbir write his application for the program.

Ms Neagle encouraged Dalbir to write the application himself which she helped edit before it was lodged.

"Obviously it was successful, I'm pleased it was because I wasn't sure he had got it in on time."

The two week program entailed one week of online engagement with the second week spent in Adelaide visiting a variety of science and technology based institutions.

Over the course of the week Dalbir visited Adelaide and Flinders Universities, the Australian Institute for Machine Learning, Defence Science and Technology Group and the Australian Space Discovery Centre.

He said highlights of the forum were seeing a robotic dog trained to follow a green ball around the room and the explosives experiments

"They got a piece of copper, put a leaf on



top of it and then put a plastic explosive on top of the leaf," he said.

"They blew up the plastic explosive and it actually imprinted the leaf into the copper, that was cool.

"They chopped it up and we got to keep a piece.

"Before I went I had a pretty clear idea of what I wanted to do already, I wanted to go into robotics and build robots.

"But after going there I have now decided I want to build space robots, that would be cool, putting a rover on the moon or something."

Millicent Rotary supported Dalbir to attend the forum by paying the cost of his \$1,950 application fee.

The local service club has a history of supporting students interested in STEM and have assisted several students to attend the NYSF over the last two decades.

"We've done it several times and then of course Covid bowled everything over," Millicent Rotary Club secretary Phil Golding said.

"They decided rather than fly people into Canberra, they would have pods in Australian capital cities to have experiences there.

"That just came back this year and Dalbir was the candidate for it.

"It is an important scheme and great for kids who are interested in science, we've been doing it for a number of years."

Millicent Rotary have also contributed to aid students to attend the ConocoPhillips Science Experience over the last decade and in the last two years they have supported local students attend the three day One Forty One Science Experience at Uni SA's Mt Gambier Campus.



Nissan Z sportscar here

Nissan's much-anticipated new Z sportscar has now arrived in Australia.

Note that it's simply called the Z, thus breaking from the long tradition of previous models, from the 1970 240Z onwards through the 260Z, 300ZX, 350Z to the 370Z which the new Z replaces.

The Nissan Z is a two-seat pure-bred sports machine from the Japanese company that's famed for its high-performance machines.

Indeed, it's well known for building a huge variety of cars, SUVs and other machines and is one of the world's largest vehicle manufacturers.

Back to the Nissan Z.

It has a lot going for it – excellent styling a, large turbo-petrol V6 engine and the solid build quality that means it's likely to run for many years with no problems.

The Nissan Z was recognised as a Good Design Award Winner in the Product Design Category in recognition of outstanding design and innovation.

We certainly agree with that award.

The car looks great from any angle with its very long nose, an aggressive rectangular grille and bold headlights.

The roof slopes down all the way from the top of the windscreen to the tail, where a tiny lip spoiler completes the package.

There are seats for only two as this is a pure sportscar.

The luggage space is easy to load thanks not only to the size of the opening but also because the tailgate opens high.

However, the luggage area is shallow, but of course this is a sports machine not a family hatch of SUV so there's probably enough.

As it's a two-seater it's only going to be carrying a couple of people and their luggage so there's enough room for a holiday trip away.

The Nissan Z is powered by a 3.0-litre twinturbo V6, replacing the naturally-aspirated engine in the outgoing 370Z.

It has variable valve timing and small-diameter turbochargers regulated for maximum spooling speed and to balance power output and throttle-response time.

Maximum power output is 298 kW at 6400 rpm with torque of 475 Nm from 1600 revs.

Nissan Z's six-speed close-ratio manual gearbox is paired with a high-performance clutch supplied by Japanese motor racing specialist Exedy.

It drives to the rear wheels via a carbon-fibre composite driveshaft.

It has what Nissan calls Downshift Rev Matching.

The Nissan Z is also offered with a nine-speed automatic transmission as a no-cost option.

We plan to be testing one shortly and will do a road test review to provide our thoughts on it.

The Nissan Z hasn't been crash tested by Euro NCAP or Australasian NCAP at this time.

It has six airbags, radar cruise control, automatic emergency braking with pedestrian detection, forward collision warning, blindspot monitoring, lane departure warning and rear cross-traffic alert.

Rear camera plus front and rear parking sensors are handy in a car which isn't easy to see out of

The latest Z has an 8.0-inch infotainment screen, relatively small for contemporary vehicles.

There is no built-in satellite navigation, not a serious omission given the quality of smartphone-based systems available through either Android Auto or Apple CarPlay both of which are wired.

The quality of the sound from the eight-speaker Bose system is pretty good, though for

obvious reasons it tends to be hard to hear at times over the sound of the engine and, to a less extent, the sound of the tyres on the road.

There's a high-resolution 12.3-inch information screen that can be customised to suit driver preferences.

There are USB-A and USB-C ports at the bottom of the front console along with 12V sockets both there as well as in the centre console

The hot Nissan Z car offers three driving modes – Standard, Enhanced and Sport.

We tried all of them at various stages and in different areas of our week's road testing.

Standard is fine for day-to-day use. Enhanced gives it some more grunt.

Sport is on the harsh side, fair enough as

this is a sports machine.

The Z's braking features a virtually track-

ready setup.

There are four-piston 355mm front and two-piston, 350mm rear.

They work very well and never showed the slightest sign of fading during our road-testing regime - which obviously didn't come as a surprise as this is a very serious machine.

It's a sheer delight to drive in many ways.

There's virtually no free-play in the steering.

It responds instantly to steering wheel

movements and sends good feedback as to what the front of the car is doing.

Noise levels are high on some road surfac-

es, particularly on recently laid bitumen that hasn't smoothed down yet.

There's quite a bit of bump-thump on con-

crete surfaces.

However, there's an active noise cancella-

However, there's an active noise cancellation that trims the sounds to acceptable levels. Downshift rev matching is brilliant as the Z

lets you have it in the correct gear for all occasions in very fast changes without the having to match the revs correctly.

"Okay I hear you ask, I enjoy driving cars and getting the very best of them without the car doing it for me."

I completely understand that, it would be interesting to try the new Z on track days and see if you can beat drivers you know from other track days and compare times with them using the various vehicle settings.

Fuel consumption during our test period averaged 10.5 litres per hundred kilometres, which was pretty close to the 9.8 litres per hundred quoted by Nissan.

Nissan Z is an interesting two-seat sports machine that can be used as a daily driver and taken out to track days if you want to get push it to the max.

It would certainly be on my list of cars to buy, but only if I could afford a second car or SUV for day-to-day driving.

Scores were level after the mixed doubles, and again level after the singles were com-



Dream catches offshore

A breezy but fishable weekend across the South East was welcomed by anglers and although the weed has still been a bit of a problem, there was still some very nice fish caught. Kicking off with the offshore news, there has been a bit of a buzz coming out of Portland this past weekend, with Matt Hunt Fishing Services putting their clients on to an almost 300kg mako shark.

After nearly two hours on the rod and using only 24kg tackle, the anglers finally got the shark to the boat before making the trek back

There were other makes caught by other boats too and most around that 30kg to 50kg

Offshore from Port MacDonnell, we have seen more sharks from this way, but gummy and school sharks have been the targets.

Fish to 20kg have been boated in the 60m through to 100m depths, along with the usual mix of tasty reef fish such as snapper, nannygai, knifejaw and flathead.

The Magic won the 2019, 2020 titles, while the 2021 season was cancelled due to Covid and the Magic did not enter a team in the 2022 competition.


Howe's 24 points was the best for the match, while Winter shot 23 and also received the MVP award for the grand final.
