Biodiversity focus while trails closed

Care recruitment

New aged care reforms scheduled to be introduced by the Federal government this year have resulted in a call for additional staff to join the team at Boneham Aged Care Services (BACS).

From July 2023 all aged care homes are required to have a registered nurse available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, with individual resident care delivery increased to an average of 40 minutes care from a registered nurse daily.

BACS has embarked on an active recruiting campaign to implement the required increase which will see the registered nurse numbers double by the end of the year.

BACS Chief executive officer Michael Fil-

sell said they have a number of existing staff studying to become registered nurses, and the organisation has internal strategies to provide a variety of support to those staff. **Continued page 3**

New chapter begins for retiring library assistant Anne

Popular library assistant Anne Schumacher will walk out through the Millicent library doors for the last time as an employee tomorrow.

It has been 21 years since the passionate reader joined the library team but Ms Schumacher has decided the time is right for retirement and she is looking forward to spending more time with her two young grandsons with plans in place to travel.

"We love travelling Australia, we did a fair bit before covid and we just want to travel while we are still fit enough," she said.

"We have bought a new van so we've gone from a rooftop tent, which is very basic camping, to a nice caravan so it will be interesting."

Before beginning at the library Ms Schumacher was employed by the Millicent council to clean the Civic and Arts Centre (C&AC).

Involved for more than 12 years, her work there included volunteering on the C&AC committee, assisting with bookings and managing the site.

When the building was closed down for major repairs in 2002 a temporary placement in the library was found for Anne which eventually led to the offer of a permanent position.

The prolific reader hosts the monthly book club but her involvement goes above and beyond books.

Ms Schumacher is a familiar face at Baby Bounce sessions, Learning Together playgroup, school holiday activities and she visits local schools with the mobile library.

Her involvement also includes supporting Pam Lynch with the Seniors on line group.

"We do a lot of IT support for people now, someone will get a phone from their kids and

don't know how to work it" Ms Schumacher said.

"All the government agencies expect everyone to be IT literate now and they expect everyone to have My Gov accounts, we try to help as much as we can."

Over the years library patrons have regularly shared book recommendations with Ms

Schumacher, introducing her to books she would never have read.

"I like crime, but I do read anything.

"When you are a reader and your readers know you read they give you books, and you have to read them because they want to talk about it, so I've read all sorts.

"It made me read things that I probably never would have read.

Wattle Range Council's Manager Libraries and Cultural Services, Janice Nitschke told the South Eastern Times that Anne's contribution will be missed.

"Anne brought to the library experience, but she also brought a good knowledge of books and reading and the ability to work

"Libraries are community hubs, literacy underpins a library and Anne fulfilled all those attributes.

"It is important in a library to have someone who reads extensively and who is one of the community.

"They are really good people to advise about what to read.

"Anne is willing to have a look at book reviews and read outside her normal genre.

"She also had to move, as we all did, from books to IT and computers.

"Anne has adapted really well and is a really competent user and teacher and really excellent with the tech savvy seniors, they really liked Anne in that area.

Ms Schumacher remains an avid reader and will still be a regular library visitor.

Public barred from trails

Volunteers continue to caretake the Mount Burr Trails despite leasee of the site, OneFortyOne Plantations, closing the habitat area to the public.

The closure has come as OneFortyOne seek to engage the services of an arborist to examine hazardous trees along the trails.

Mount Burr Trails public officer Rob Gordon said it was devastating news for the group to receive just before Christmas.

"OneFortyOne decided in the interests of safety to close the trails until they can get an arborist and an assessment done" he said.

"This was before Christmas and we hoped it would only take a few weeks, but hopefully we get to see someone soon."

Mount Burr Trails have a license to use the 25 hectare site for walking and cycling trails and habitat conservation from Forestry SA who manage the crown land.

"The frustrating thing was that ForestrySA sent a person out to walk the trail and said to us they would be happy if we put up enter at own risk and beware of falling limbs signs," Mr Gordon said.

"They have actually got signs printed up for us.

"You know what small community volunteer groups are like and the battle we have to raise funds for insurance and all of these things, but this particular issue has created quite a bit of despondency amongst our very small group."

Although the trails are currently closed to the public the group are obligated to continue tending to trees, seedlings and weeds.

OneFortyOne and ForestrySA were contacted for comment but had not responded by time of print.

It is hoped the current work value case underway with the Fair Work Commission will result in increasing pay within the sector and put the industry on a more level playing field with hospital based and disability sector awards.

"At Boneham we offer above award rates, supported by flexible rostering to accommodate and ensure a healthy work, life, balance is maintained" Ms Lowe said.



"We have a focus on staff wellbeing and have recently appointed a wellbeing team that organises activities and information for staff on topical issues throughout the year.

"We support our employees with our Boneham Employee Assistance Program that offers physiotherapy and employee counselling free of charge.

"We are proactively building a culture of care and support within our work groups.

"What we want to achieve is to continue to attract skilled talent to Boneham and the aged care industry.

"We want to attract others out there, people that might have an interest in entering the aged care industry through the cert 3 training.

"We are currently accepting applicants for our Aged Care Traineeship program, People and culture manager Mercia Lowe and CEO Michael Filsell are keen to welcome new staff to the Boneham team.

Mr Filsell said Boneham has built a strong reputation on the foundations of work undertaken by previous and current management and encouraged potential employees to contact the site to discuss positions available.

Showcasing weddings from 1956 to 2003 the folders on show were meticulously collated by the late Phyl Whelan who volunteered at the library for many years.

Wattle Range Council's, Manager Libraries and Cultural Services, Janice Nitschke said February is library lovers month.

"We all know February 14 was Valentine's Day so we celebrated love your library," she said.

"Libraries are now all about you, they are about people and that is what we are trying to promote."

Ms Whelan copied, printed and filed every wedding that appeared in the pages of the South Eastern Times creating a social history unique to our region.

"It's been a really great exhibition, people have come and sat down and just thoroughly enjoyed chatting and looking at the memorabilia" Ms Nitschke said.

"It is an important attribute of libraries, to collect that local history.

"It is good to have it out and show people

that our local history collection has a real depth of social history.

"It encompasses the social history of our town, of our community and our people.

"It's been a really good exhibition and I think we will keep putting out different displays every month or two from our local history collection."

Ms Whelan was also responsible for keeping records of library events and gallery openings.

The library plans to display those files at the next Wattle Range Art Exhibition in November as the gallery's 30 years of celebration comes to an end.

The wedding display reaffirms that libraries are about the people within a community.

"Newspapers are still a permanent record and we have a record of weddings, births and deaths and lots of other things we have kept.

"We've got the local history about our community and everyone can come and have a look at it.

"People don't know about the hidden treasures we have here in the library" Ms Nitschke said.

Included in the display was library assistant Anne Sch umacher's wedding dress from the early 1980's.

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Glimpse of birdlife caught

While dedicated volunteers from the Mount Burr Trails group wait for the outcome of One-FortyOne's arborist report on hazardous trees, an important biodiversity project is taking place.

Using the website iNaturalist group members capture photos of wildlife seen within the trail area and upload them to the the Mount Burr Trails online profile.

Mount Burr Trails public officer Rob Gordon said iNaturalist is basically a record of everything.

"The project stems from a visit from Bryan Hayward of the Nature Glenelg Trust," he said.

"He is a senior ecologist and recommended to gain more recognition and respect for our piece of woodland we need to create a biodiversity database of everything we find.

"He said it would be helpful to keep a record with the hope that one day you find some rare creature that commands further investigation.

"Bryan thought it had great conservation significance for its hollows alone."

Adding value to the project is the introduction of a trail camera set up at random times to capture wildlife.

The motion sensor camera has been placed near a birdbath installed during a recent heat-wave.

Mr Gordon has been surprised at how quickly the birds took to using the birdbath and the variety of birds using it.

Although none of the birds captured on camera are rare, many are elusive and rarely seen in backyards.

Once the trail camera is triggered by motion it takes a nine second video and two still shots 10 seconds apart with hundreds of photos captured within a few hours.

This has led to some intriguing footage showing the behaviour of the birds with recent

video showing a trio of kookaburras splashing in the water, engaging with each other and one discovering the camera itself.

"The wattle birds will come in and have a big splash about and then the magpie will come in and bully them out of it, you are watching a real story unfold.

"Some species get along fine and others don't, the little grey fantails are tough and scare things away, it's fascinating to watch.

"The goshawk would be the biggest surprise, but we've got a few species that we haven't seen other than around the birdbath.

"The white eared honeyeater is very elusive, the yellow faced honeyeater they are not often

seen but there are plenty of them around.

"Little red-browed finches are out there in huge numbers, they are a lovely little bird and they are kind of semi migratory they come and go with the seasons.

"I've got hundreds of photos of currawongs, once they get there, everything scatters, they will take it over for hours and splash around in the water until there is nothing left."

Group volunteer Judith Driver originally had the idea of installing the bird bath and diligently cleans it and replaces the water daily.

Ms Driver is also a regular contributor to the iNaturalist site adding hundreds of flora and fauna siting's to the page.

"All those little things help and Judith has been tirelessly working on the trails snapping shots of all the little things as she goes" Mr Gordon said.

"Naturalists generally only like a photographic evidence of what you've found.

"We battle to get recognition, funding and support from the major stakeholders around for our little piece of woodland and natural habitat."

The water has been so successful a second pond has been added to offer respite to ground dwelling animals as well.

Although the Mount Burr Trails is currently closed to the public until further notice the birds being captured by video can be viewed on the group's Instagram page.

Employees and visitors are back in masks after a short lifting of the restriction lasted less than two weeks.

CEO Michael Filsell announced on 23 February that a staff member had tested positive to Covid. He said the employee had worked at the site in the previous 48 hours and there were other symptomatic staff members.

BACS confirmed yesterday a total of three staff members have tested positive over the previous 10 days. Due to the positive test results the requirement to wear a mask on the premises has been re-introduced.

Visitors can still use the common areas whilst masked and residents are permitted to leave the premises. Presentation of a negative RAT test prior to entry remains in place.

Upgrade for Walk

Wendy's Walk in Beachport will receive a \$172,000 facelift in the coming weeks as construction on the new walkway begins.

The project is being completed under a design and construction contract awarded by council to Hamlym Wilson.

After completing the detailed design works are expected to begin within early March.

The new stairs will be timber with a freestanding handrail and a large viewing platform at the top.

It will also include a rest point at the halfway mark to cater for all eager tourists and local community members.

Wattle Range Council director of engineering services Peter Halton said he was eager to see the completed project after it being years in the making.

"Originally it was a potential project the Beachport Lions Club wanted to take on but after looking at what needed to be done it was a substantial project and due to standards needing to be met we decided they would advocate for the project rather than deliver it," Mr Halton said.

"From that time on we have been working through the approval process, planning and council consideration for budgets."

After the project "finally bubbling to the top" of council's priority list, Mr Halton said the finished project would add yet another tourist attraction to the area.

"The concept is pretty close to the final design; the only thing that has changed is the resting place," he said.

"We wanted it to also be another tourist attraction rather than just providing connections and have it as a place where people can enjoy the view and walk back down again.

"Once we complete it, we need to then think about how we connect it back to Beach Road and the likes and at the moment we are planning to connect it to Foster Street but also thinking about putting a footpath near South Terrace however it is not currently budgeted for."

Mr Halton said so far the community response was "nothing but positive" with community engagement still occurring. "We have been continuing to engage with the Lions group who have been a strong supporter of coming up with better solutions," he said.

"We also put it on social media and had nothing but positive feedback but one thing I did notice was there were a lot of comments about handrails and the stairs being at a reasonable rise."

He said although he would "feel a lot better once the job is finished" he was excited the project was on its way with the demolition and reconstruction the hardest part.

"The next stage of the project is the contractor doing the job which can be challenging," Mr Halton said.

"This won't come without its challenges because it is in the sand which will be a challenge for the earth workers.

"Once they get over that stage of the project I will feel more comfortable that we can meet the design outcomes we have at the moment."

The contractors are expected to be on site in the coming weeks and will site and fence off the area until the reconstruction is complete.

Government plan for road toll reduction

THE State Government is looking to introduce strong measures to reduce deaths and serious injuries on the road following a horror start to the year.

South Australia's Road Safety Action Plan 2023-2025 has been released as part of the State Government's plan to curb serious road injuries.

While the Action Plan is a state-wide measure, Minister for Police Joe Szakacs said it aims to improve outcomes for regional road users too.

"There is disproportionate trauma on country roads, given only 22 per cent of South Australia's population reside in regional areas," Mr Szakacs said.

"Over half of all crashes (56 per cent) where lives are lost, and 36 per cent of serious injury crashes occur on regional and remote roads.

"Almost two thirds of these crashes are single vehicle crashes that do not involve other vehicles or pedestrians."

Mr Szakacs said a combination of approaches will be used including enforcement, education and public awareness to address dangerous driving behaviours.

"Poor driving behaviours, including drink and drug driving, speeding, distraction and incorrect use of seatbelts in addition to dangerous road users, will be targeted," he said.

"The Action Plan identifies measures that will contribute to a target of at least a 50 per cent reduction in lives lost and a 30 per cent reduction in serious injuries on South Australian roads by 2031."

A Department of Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) spokesperson part of this includes a commitment to ensuring roads are maintained in a safe condition.

The spokesperson said that included an investment of \$17 million in road resurfacing in the Limestone Coast, which has been scheduled to be completed by 2024.

"Wet conditions during 2022-23 resulted in increased potholes in the South East, and significant pavement repair works have been undertaken on various roads across in the region in recent months," the spokesperson said.

"The Department's maintenance contractor, Fulton Hogan inspects the road network in the South East on a fortnightly basis and attends to potholes as they are identified.

"The community can report road maintenance issues requiring immediate attention, 24 hours a day, to the Traffic Management Centre on 1800 018 313."

The spokesperson encouraged regional drivers to adhere to road rules by staying below the speed limit, not driving under the influence, and wearing a seatbelt.

Roads scheduled to be resurfaced by 2024 include:

- Southern Ports Highway (Robe to Clay Wells)
- Mount Burr Road (Millicent to Penola)Overland Track (Mt Burr to Glencoe West)
- Burrungale Road (Glencoe to Kongorong)
- Dukes Highway
- Riddoch Highway

"Most of them say 'oh I can't do this'; and then they come up with absolutely fantastic, original pieces," she said.

"I am just so proud of them - I go home each night and read what some of them have written and I am floating, I just feel so inspired."

In order to get the creative juices flowing the students have been given story prompts or challenges to get them really thinking.

"One of the exercises I do is trying to write a piece without using the letter E," she said.

Suzuki Jimny GLX delays

Picking up the new Jimny press car, I asked the Suzuki man when a prospective buyer would be able to take delivery of the test car variant, a GLX three-door automatic.

"Try next year," he replied.

Suzuki Australia also said unprecedented demand and the global computer chip issue, have stalled the MY23 Jimny three-door automatic until production catches up.

Customers with an order already inked, can keep waiting or switch to the bigger five-door, due Down Under later this year.

The three-door Lite manual is still available to order.

The Jimny has six variants, from the Jimny Lite manual, at \$30,490, plus on-road costs, through to the Jimny GLX auto.

Like all Suzukis, it's distributed in Queensland separately from those in the rest of Australia.

Like all present-day Suzuki cars, the Jimny is covered by a five-year, unlimited kilometre warranty and five-year capped-price service scheme, the latter at 12 months or 10,000-kilometre intervals.

There's a nod to Jimny's heritage with hallmark round headlamps, while washers now are standard for the LED headlights.

These, plus angled bumper edges that boost clearance at the wheels, make for confident driving in mud, dirt or sand and assured climbing over obstacles such as rocks or fallen trees.

Their moulded black material safeguards the body from stone chips and scratches.

A nifty drip rail keeps occupants' heads sheltered when getting in or out of the Jimny by helping to prevent water from dripping off the roof.

The Jimny cabin is welcoming, especially to the driver, with instruments and controls all within easy access and designed to enable he or she to focus on maintaining control with quick and easy operation.

Instruments are designed to be easily legible in bright sunlight or shadow, being lit at all times.

A touch of luxury is added with a leather dressed steering wheel, which again benefits the driver with vertical adjustment up to 35 mm.

Access to the rear seats is not so accommodating, with only two doors up front, although the front seats slide for easy operation.

Space is at a premium, with room only for a couple of compact occupants in anything approaching comfort.

Boot volume is 85 litres with the rear seats set up.

The two 50:50 rear seat backs, headrests removed, can be folded flat leaving 377 litres for cargo.

Instrumentation is basic, with a 9-inch system allowing access to an AM / FM tuner, Bluetooth, USB audio and reverse camera.

The new 1.5-litre engine, mated with its four-speed automatic transmission, stumps up more power and torque than the motor it replaces, while maintaining fuel efficiency.

The stronger torque levels are delivered across the rev range with plenty on tap low down; handy for serious off-road situations. Towing is rated at 1300 kg with braked trailer.

The Jimny carries only a three-star ANCAP rating. However, some advanced features do earn special mention.

These include dual sensor brake support, in which a camera and laser sensor, attached to the windscreen, provide visual and audio alerts to the driver, warning of risks of collision as well as an emergency braking function.

Total effective control technology consists of a body structured to absorb and disperse the force of impact in the event of a collision, while an electronic stability program monitors wheels, which when detected automatically adjusts engine torque and applies braking force to limit wheel slippage and assist the driver to stay in control of steering.

The new 1.5-litre engine with its refined four-speed auto gearbox, featuring linear shift selection, is claimed to have combined fuel economy of 6.9 litres per 100 kilometres.

The Jimny GLX auto on test recorded 7.8 litres per 100 kilometres around town and 5.8 litres per 100 kilometres on the motorway.

Like any short wheel-base vehicle, the Jim-

ny, with its off-road suspension setting, tended to produce a choppy ride on even the most unblemished on-road bitumen and concrete.

It's not a smooth cruiser.

Off road is all about keeping in touch with the terrain, which in this case a sturdy ballscrew steering system provides ample feedback with minimum chance of kickback.

If any wheel loses grip the limited-slip differential traction control automatically applies braking to the culprit, torque being shifted to the other side, enabling the vehicle to regain traction.

Harking back to the cargo carrying capa-

bility, the test car came with an added accessory of a wire mesh divider which bolted on between the front and second-row seats, converting the vehicle into a van, alternatively maybe acting as a kennel on wheels for Fido.

Sadly, the wire wall was heavy and awkward to fit via the side doors – a two-handed job, really.

Over the years, the mini-SUV has become something of a cult figure with its retro looks, while claiming to be a genuine 4x4. Followers need not fret, there's plenty here to carry on the Jimny tradition.

If only there was one to spare.

A bit of breeze has slowed anglers down over the last week, but those who braved the elements and hit the water regardless were rewarded for their efforts.

There has been plenty happening with the offshore fishing brilliant when the weather permits.

From over the shelf chasing blue eye, hapuka and other deep species, to inshore bottom bouncing chasing the sharks, flathead, nannygai and other tasty reefies, it has been fabulous.

The 60-120m area has fished well for the boaties chasing those previously mentioned species.

Both bait and jigging have gotten results, so it is just a matter of personal preference.

I have had a few commercial fisherman let me know there have been school tuna popping up out the front of the bay now for the last week or so.

They are not monsters, but they are there. There are also big numbers of bait and birds out there too, so it sounds like its just a matter of time now.

The surf anglers have enjoyed the run of northerly winds we had last week in the lead up to the weekend.

Warm nights, the wind over your shoulder and a fair few fish about made for some happy fishos

The fishing at Jonses Bay has not slowed down much at all.

We have still seen some nice snapper, along with solid whiting, the odd shark and even a few small mulloway.

Browns Bay and Piccininni have also fished well

I have seen a few snapper from down that way and local young-gun Nathan Kilsby even managed a chunky elephant fish.

Through Canunda National Park we continue to see salmon fairly regularly, which once again are fabulous in the smoker or filleted on the beach, thrown back out and turned into a nice big gummy shark, or even a bronzie.

The Coorong has fished well for sharks again.

Gummy sharks have been most common,

but we are also hearing of a few mulloway to around a metre in length - among all the snapper, salmon and bronze whalers.

The whiting fishing in the past week has been good again for most and it is not only the boaties who are in on the action.

The land-based anglers in Carpenter Rocks, Blackfellows Caves, Cape Douglas and even the Port MacDonnell jetty have all found some nice whiting.

The northerly wind has seemed to blow a bit of the inshore weed out and cleaned the place up a fair bit, so the fishing has become easier too.

The boaties have still found good num-

bers of fish in most spots, but the breakwater, Blackfellows Caves and Carpenter Rocks are all well worth a crack.

There has been plenty of activity this week on the Port MacDonnell jetty by those targeting tommy ruff.

As soon as the lights come on in the evenings, get some burley going and you should not struggle to land a feed.

There are also plenty of mullet, salmon trout and even a few mackerel mixed in with them now.

Whether you are collecting bait or a feed of fish, there should not be any issues.

Squid numbers from the jetty have been a

bit hit and miss, but persist and you should still manage to find a few.

Garfish have been in great numbers in recent weeks and this week is no different.

The weed on the beach has produced plenty of tucker for them, so they are in good nick at the moment.

All of the traditional areas have been productive - from the waders at Livingstons and Cape Douglas, to the boaties in Hutt Bay and Pelican Point.

Much the same as the whiting fishos, there are plenty of other species about.

They include tommies, salmon and trevally, so do not be surprised if a few extras pop up there too.

Inland there continues to be some cracking vabbies caught.

The wet spring has been incredible for all the little swamps and waterholes through Victoria and South Australia.

I think vabbie fishos are probably the most tight-lipped of all when it comes to sharing information.

However, there has been no shortages and it is just a matter of testing the waters in any little water holes.

The Glenelg River continues to produce some nice bream and perch.

They are spread out right along the river, but we have noticed a big influx recently of small perch.

Guys throwing soft plastics are reporting upwards of 20 or 30 small perch, with some hardly as big as the lure.

It is not a bad thing though an the river is healthy with plenty of fish which are only getting bigger.

The mulloway news again is virtually nonexistent, but there have been a couple of smaller fish boated in the last week around the Caves area.

The forecast for the coming weekend is definitely fishable, but there is still a bit of wind and swell on the way.

Keep an eye on it and if all else fails, the breakwater, river or even inland is worth a crack

Until next week, safe fishing.



Fighting his way through the pack, Skeer pushed back up to fifth, passing three at a time and feeling good.

However, some late drizzly rain took the edge off his pace and he crossed the chequered flag in seventh.

That was Skeer's best finish for the weekend, with Race 2 his worst result.

"The second race on Saturday was fully wet," he said.

"I felt pretty good in the wet in the warm up lap and got a good start and was up to third into turn one.

"I dropped back to fourth on turn two and then someone crashed in front of me and ran three of us onto the grass.

"Pu the and of the first lan I was back to



"By the end of the first lap I was back to last, which was around 29th."

From the back of the pack Skeer's bad luck was not over, with a near-crash to follow.

"Coming around turn one, which is a pretty fast corner - I'd say in the wet you'd probably be doing around 180km through there - I had a big rear-end moment and lost traction," he said.

"I saved it but I thought I was going down. "At that point I was dead last by about 15

seconds." By then Skeer had lost all confidence in the wet and his only focus was a finish.

With riders falling frequently in the conditions, Skeer kept upright and crossed the line in 15th.

The third and final race was on Sunday, which was raced in mixed conditions.
