Car park debate

A Beachport business will be allowed use of the Railway Terrace to access their business.

Mr and Mrs Reilly have requested to use the Railway Terrace carpark to access the Limestone Coast Fishermen's Cooperative, citing safety concerns.

Last September, council considered a report on alterations to the car parking register in Beach Road, Beachport related to two new businesses.

During the consultation of that matter, a submission was received from a Mr and Mrs Reilly to obtain authorisation to have access to the Limestone Coast Cooperative, through to

the Railway Terrace carpark.

The submission said this was to address safety concerns with access to the Limestone Coast Cooperative and to allow for delivery vehicles to drive through the carpark and onto Railway Terrace rather than attempt to reverse back onto Beach Road.

At the time, a motion to undertake com-

munity consultation on the matter was carried, with the consultation period ending last month.

Nearly 100 people took part, a majority of which were in favour of the request, with 69 respondents (71.9 per cent) saying they support it.

Police kept active

Limestone Coast Police, with assistance from Traffic Services Branch, State Emergency Services, National Heavy Vehicle Enforcement, Dog Operations Unit, Victoria Police and local council, conducted an operation near the South Australian border at Caroline, targeting the transit of drugs, vehicle standards and other road safety related offences.

On Wednesday April 5, police stopped over 240 vehicles, conducted 238 breath tests and 75 drug tests over an eight hour period.

All vehicles were inspected to ensure compliance with road safety standards with a number being searched under the Controlled Substances Act.

As a result, 10 fines were issued, 15 vehicles were found not to be roadworthy and were subsequently defected and three drivers were detected drug driving.

A 62-year-old Victorian truck driver returned a positive result for methamphetamine and cannabis.

He was issued a three month instant loss of licence for traffic offences and a drug diversion for a small amount of methamphetamine and cannabis located in his possession.

He will be summons to appear in court at a later date.

A 36-year-old Mount Gambier woman returned a positive result for methamphetamine.

She was found to be in possession of a small quantity of cannabis and other drug paraphernalia.

She was issued a three month instant loss

of licence, a cannabis expiation notice and will be summonsed to attend court at a later date.

A third driver who returned a positive drug driving result was a South Australian female.

She was issued also issued a three month instant loss of licence and a fine.

Further to the operation, Limestone Coast Police stopped numerous drivers over the Easter long weekend committing various offences.

About 1.30am on Thursday April 6, a 25-year-old woman from Mount Gambier was stopped driving on Kennedy Avenue at Mount Gambier.

She was drug tested and returned a positive result for methamphetamine.

She was issued a three month instant loss of licence and will be summonsed to attend court at a later date.

Just before 10.30pm on Friday, April 7, patrols stopped a 27-year-old Naracoorte man on Deviation Road at Naracoorte for a mobile driver test.

The driver was submitted to a breath test and returned a positive result of 0.108. He was reported for drink driving and issued a six month instant loss of licence.

About 6pm on Saturday 8 April, police were called to Ferrers Street at Mount Gambier after reports a motorcyclist had collided.

The rider, a 49-year-old local man, became aggressive towards police when spoken to about the crash and was subsequently arrested for disorderly behaviour and resisting arrest.

The man was breath tested and provided a positive result of 0.190 – almost four times the legal limit. He was further charged with drink driving and misuse of a motor vehicle.

His motorbike was impounded for 28 days and he was issued a 12 month instant loss of licence.

He was granted police bail to appear in the Mount Gambier Magistrates Court at a later date.

Just before 5.30pm on Sunday, April 9, police stopped a 68-year-old Beachport man driving on Beach Road at Beachport for a mobile driver test.

The driver returned a positive breath analysis result of 0.157 – more than three times the legal limit. He was reported for drink driving and issued a 12 month immediate loss of licence.

About 9.25pm on Monday 10 April, police detected a vehicle travelling at 155km/h in a 100km/h zone on the Dukes Highway at Bordertown.

Police stopped the car and spoke to the driver, a 38-year-old man from Torrensville.

He was issued a six month instant loss of licence and will be summonsed to attend court at a later date.

Over the Easter long weekend three Mount Gambier drivers were reported for driving whilst being disqualified and a forth person was charged with driving unlicensed.

All drivers will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date.

Bringing nature into calm

The new palliative care family room within the Millicent Hospital is nearing completion with the upcoming installation of a exterior courtyard mural adding the final touch.

Imagine Millicent Art Group (IMAG) approached local artist Peter Dunn to undertake the work which was requested by Millicent and Districts Health Advisory Council's (MDHAC) who were seeking a calm, nature inspired image for the space.

A bulk of the funding for the room 12 mural has been met by the IMAG who have contributed \$2,500 toward the project with MDHAC meeting the balance of the \$3,000 project.

Sandra Melrose from IMAG said it is a good way for IMAG to pay back the community for supporting them with raffle tickets and events.

"We were more than happy to do it," she said.

Mr Dunn tentatively said yes to the project and worked on a concept which was presented to MDHAC and enthusiastically accepted.

Painting of the 11.5 square metre artwork on separate weather proof fibro cement boards has been undertaken in the artist's home pergola.

The 2.4 metre high artwork is due to be installed in the courtyard next week with the boards at right angles to create a wrap around effect.

"The challenge is that it's a fairly confined courtyard, so you are never standing more than three metres away" Mr Dunn said.

"Patients and their relatives will be able to use that courtyard which connects to the room, they are the ones to have direct access to that courtyard.

"But the top third of the mural, once installed, can be seen from various distances."

The mural is a wetlands scene loosely inspired by Lake McIntyre and builds on Mr Dunn's 2015 public artwork, with a similar theme, adorning the Kentish Place shopping centre on Davenport Street.

Another public facing artwork by Mr Dunn is attached to the Millicent National Trust Museum entry ramp and can be viewed from the footpath.

"I hadn't really set out to do murals, but I

am open to doing more," Mr Dunn said.

"It's just a case of where and when, and I'd like to do something different to what I've done.

The artist considers himself a realist painter who likes to use a painterly effect with a fo-

cus on capturing atmosphere.

"I like to create an atmosphere, almost regardless of the subject matter.

"I think we always end up painting things that connects with our own inner self."

Mr Dunn is well known in local art circles

and has been painting and exhibiting his artwork for 30 years and currently has work on display in the Millicent Gallery.

He is a valued volunteer at the Millicent Gallery assisting in hanging exhibition displays for the last five years.

Co-op request sparks car park debate

26 respondents (27.1 per cent) were opposed.

Those opposed cited reasons such as a loss of car parking, the impact on other business due to loss of parking available over peak periods, the safety of the users of the Railway Terrace carpark with further congestion, that it is not appropriate to use public land for access for a business, the fact that Railway Terrace carpark is flagged for a town square and that it was poor planning and may hinder commercial development in the future.

Council also received 11 written submissions.

A respondent to the survey suggested the council could apply restrictions on the access, which the applicant was agreeable to.

The applicant indicated that access would be required from 5am to 8pm and agreed that the permit could be restricted to the cray season, but with a preference that the access be allowed from September 1 to assist with delivery when setting up the facility for the season.

LCFC's Justin Phillips addressed the Wattle Range Council meeting on Tuesday.

"It is pleasing to see an overwhelmingly positive response," he said.

He said the Cooperative was willing to work with the council and community to get the best solution.

Councillor Peter Dunnill raised concerns about the possible loss of car parks.

"We have to take into consideration the loss of carparking, there is not enough in Beachport already," he said.

"I don't want to see any car parking lost, if anything can be done about that, because it's at a premium."

Councillor Dale Price questioned how the proposal would effect the council's long term plan for that area.

Director of engineering services Peter Halton said some car parks would be affected, but the planned beautification works would not be affected.

Councillors voted to allow the residents use of the Railway Terrace Carpark subject to the conditions, which are that there is restricted access during events and limited timeframes for use from 5am to 8pm throughout the crayfish season, for five years.

Workshop lists priorities

Community members gathered recently to provide feedback for the 2024 Wattle Range Council (WRC) Disability Access and Inclusion Plan (DAIP).

The current four year plan expires at the end of 2023 and this is the second forum hosted by WRC to collate feedback from people with disability, their family and friends and those who work in the sector.

Due to a state legislative review the DAIP will now be a 12 month interim plan with priorities identified by the state government as employment and financial security, inclusive homes and community, education and learning, and community attitudes.

18 people attended the three hour workshop including WRC Mayor Des Noll, Director Development Services Emma Clay and three

other WRC employees.

Key issues identified from the previous forum were the council employment of a dedicated disability officer, transport issues, participation and quality of life improvements, and improving on the awareness of facilities already available for people with disability.

Participants at the forum were encouraged to identify what they felt were priorities for council to action, support or advocate for with employment concerns receiving the strongest results.

Those in attendance chose employing a person with lived experience with disability to act as a liaison with those in the community and employing an inclusion support officer as a priority.

Followed by educating the business community on the benefits of employing those

with disability in meaningful jobs.

Other top issues identified were the formation of a disability and inclusion committee that would meet regularly and act as a voice to council through a disability liaison officer and developing a social network for those in the region who live with a disability.

Ms Clay revealed during the forum that several budget requests to support the DAIP had been submitted for the upcoming budget.

These include training two council building officers in accessibility audits, the purchase of a wheelchair hoist for the Beachport beach chair which remains inaccessible for many with disability and \$15,000 for disability inclusion consultancy or the employment of a disability inclusion officer and \$6,000 for a disability access and inclusion committee.

"I don't know if any of those will get across

the line until we go through that budget process, but that is what I have put in there at this point in time," Ms Clay said.

Organisers plan to collate the actions suggested and create a survey to send to the broader community with responses helping to formulate the first draft.

"Anyone can come to these forums," Ms Clay said.

"Anyone with a lived disability or their parents or anyone who works in the industry."

"We are really keen to start creating a network and getting everyone talking to each other."

"If you haven't come to any of the first sessions, don't feel like you can't come to the 3rd, 4th or 5th or whatever it might be."

"We are always keen for fresh ideas and fresh voices."

Community Consultation Future of the Millicent Saleyards

Despite continued attempts to retain the facility, throughput numbers are in rapid decline and have not been at a financially sustainable level for some years. Road safety the message

SAPOL'S school holiday road safety program is coming to Millicent to teach local children the importance of staying safe on the road.

The program, in partnership with Wattle Range Council, aims to teach primary school age children the importance of safe road use, from wearing seatbelts in the car to how to stay safe as a pedestrian.

SAPOL Road Safety Section coordinator Senior Sergeant Susan O'Connor said the holiday program is a unique opportunity for kids who do not usually participate in the program through school.

"We have schools engage with us and bring their students to the Road Safety Centre where

they get road safety education, and that includes a ride around the mock road way on a bike and pedestrian safety," Snr Sgt O'Connor said.

"Obviously there are some schools that don't take up the opportunity and nor could we service everybody."

"We thought we'd give the public the opportunity to come in during school holidays and open those same sessions up to children and their parents."

She said it was the first time the school holiday program is travelling to Millicent.

"We're super excited to be coming down next Monday to try the program in a regional area and have local kids there come and enjoy the program," she said.

"It's a good way for young people to become familiar with road signs and be good pedestrians and good road users in general."

The importance of road safety could not be understated, and Snr Sgt O'Connor said children in regional areas especially needed to know how to be safe on the road.

She said the statistics show country people are overrepresented in road fatalities, so making sure children are raised with road safety messaging is vital.

"We have road safety educators that regularly attend Limestone Coast and present those sessions to school students, businesses and communities in the area," she said.

"It's a great opportunity to start having

those conversations about being safe in vehicles.

"They are younger kids, so we are trying to get that ingrained road safety message into them."

Snr Sgt O'Connor also said there can be a flow on effect, with children passing on the things they learn to their parents to encourage them to be safer road users as well.

The program will be held at the Millicent Road Safety Centre on Firth Street, with three sessions running over Tuesday, April 18 and Wednesday, April 19.

Millicent Cattle Market report shows 296 head

On Wednesday 12 April, 296 head were yarded.

A total of nine trade, export and feeder buyers competed for a yarding of good to plain cattle that were looking wintery to rates

Except for three to four pen lots of processor cattle, the majority of the yarding were yearling heifers. Top trade steers 400kg-plus

made to \$4.44 and lighter feeder steers 330 to 400kg made to \$3.85.

Top trade heifers 400kg-plus made to \$4.67, feeder heifers 300 to 400kg made to \$3.85. Most between \$3.40 to \$3.75 per kg.

Cows made to a top of \$3.20 per kg. General good clean cows with weight made between \$3.00 to \$3.08 per kg.

COUNCIL THANKED

The Mid Murray Council has thanked the Wattle Range Council for its assistance during the floods earlier this year.

In a letter to council, they said the work required by the council to protect the community and infrastructure was "significant."

"A positive that came from this was the level of support and assistance provided by Councils across the State, including Wattle Range Council," it said.

"On behalf of Mayor Bailey, our Elected members and staff, thank you for providing a trailer load of signs."

"Without the assistance provided by the sector, we would not have been able to manage our response to the flood and support the community through the devastation of the high river."

BINS TO BE OUT EARLIER

Cleanaway, who collect the bins in Wattle Range have requested altering the start time of collections on Fridays from 7am to 6am, due to the disposal location of general waste at Caroline Landfill reducing their operating hours.

Cleanaway has the highest workload on Fridays, for trucks to be able to collect bins, travel, weigh off in Mount Gambier and then tip off at landfill prior to the new closing time of 2.30pm. Due to these facts Cleanaway has requested an earlier start time on Fridays to provide the waste service for Council.

Cleanaway has proposed to implement the change in collection start time from Friday July 7, 2023.

Cleanaway is currently investigating which particular streets will be affected.

Councillor voted to approve the change in time for collection for Millicent to operate outside of Environmental Protection (Noise) Policy 2007.

SPEED REDUCTION

Councillors voted to limit the speed limit on Poonada Rd, Tantanoola after a request from a local resident.

A local resident residing on the road expressed concerns over the road due to its alignment, design and nature of vehicles using the road and requested a reduction in speed limit from 110km/h to 100km/h.

Council's engineer investigated the request and found that Poonada Road does not meet most of the criteria for a 110km/h road.

Community consultation was done, however no residents completed the survey and only one submission was received, which was

in support of the reduction.

Councillors voted to support the request for reduction of speed limit on Poonada Road, Tantanoola to 100km/hr and write to the Department of Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) requesting the change in speed limit.

ROADWORK QUERY

Councillor Dale Price has questioned why works on Kangaroo Flat Rd was not completed.

He said the road is dangerous as it is.

He moved a motion that the Council write to the Department of Infrastructure and Transport to ascertain why work on widening Kangaroo Flat Road Glencoe ceased on 30 June, 2022, despite material to create a base for widening the road being stored a few metres off the road, when edges can be described as dangerous.

Last piece of the puzzle

Artist Karen McKenzie grew up in Mount Gambier/ Berrin and has now turned her childhood memories into interactive artworks.

Now living in western Victoria, Ms McKenzie has created colourful puzzles and artworks featuring iconic locations she loves from in and around the Limestone Coast.

"I've just been painting from my childhood memories," she said.

"We used to holiday down the Limestone Coast, mum and dad had the beach house down at Southend, so we spent a lot of time down at Beachport."

Artworks turned into puzzles include the townships of Millicent, Beachport, Robe,

Kingston, Penola and Coonawarra.

Ms McKenzie said the idea of puzzles came about during the pandemic when she was playing around with her art.

"When we were all locked at home I started doing simple colouring ins for kids that could be downloaded from my Facebook site so kids could colour them in at home," she said.

"Then I started colouring in a few and they turned into puzzles."

"It's just been a natural progression."

The puzzles capture the environments in an abstract way and Ms McKenzie said they came about through hours of work.

"The idea is to get a feel of the place so I know the layout and then try and put in a lot

of things that are unique to the area," she said.

Ms McKenzie said the Mount Gambier puzzle was the first she had created, but enjoyed exploring the whole region.

"The Beachport one was really great to do, and there is a Robe one and even a Kingston one with a big Larry the Lobster," she said.

"Recently I have just done Port MacDonnell as a round puzzle, that's changed so much since I was a child so it's just really nice to go back there to see how it is now and put all that unique parts of that area in the puzzle."

While she has been getting out and about across the region to create the puzzles, Ms McKenzie said she hoped her puzzles would help increase local tourism and be a good keepsake for people who had visited the area.

"I like to concentrate on smaller places... I like to make a product that is unique to that area," she said.

Ms McKenzie was aware that some of the puzzles had been sent overseas as gifts, and said people were connecting to the Limestone Coast no matter where they were.

"It's just amazing how people connect with the puzzles in the area, it's been really, really lovely," she said.

She said she was still on her journey in creating these puzzles highlighting the Limestone Coast, but was not sure where she would paint next.

"I have a long list, people are always suggesting places," she said.

To scooter or not to scooter? Have your say

South Australians now have the opportunity to have their say on the use of private e-scooters and other personal mobility devices across the state's road network.

Currently, e-scooters are only permitted for use under trial conditions, with trials currently operating within Adelaide's CBD and North Adelaide, the City of Norwood, Payneham and St Peters, the City of Charles Sturt and the City of Unley under partnership between local councils and commercial e-scooter fleet operators.

Privately owned e-scooters, e-skateboards and other personal mobility devices (PMDs) are not currently allowed on South Australian public roads and paths.

As part of the Road Safety Action Plan

2023-25, the State Government has committed to a wide consultation with private e-scooter users and local communities on potentially moving beyond the trial phase to an ongoing model that allows riders to use their personal devices.

A Your Say survey was launched on Tuesday 11 April which is seeking feedback on whether PMDs should be allowed, and if allowed:

- What kinds of devices should be permitted;
- Where should they be used;
- How big should they be;
- How fast should they be allowed to travel;
- What rules should apply to riders; and

▪ Whether they should be registered and/or insured.

The results of this consultation will allow the State Government to ensure any future framework for personal mobility devices, including for private purposes and on public roads and paths is safe for all road users.

Community members are invited to provide their feedback on the above options until consultation closes on Sunday 21 May.

Approved e-scooter trials will continue to operate and be monitored by the Department for Infrastructure and Transport while consultation and feedback is being considered.



BEDROOMS: MORE THAN JUST A REST ZONE

WHILE bedrooms are still primarily a sleep environment, they are not just an area where we can snooze.

According to a recent study, our traditional sleep spaces are being used for various purposes and becoming more multifunctional in response to our growing spatial needs.

For the research, a team led by UNSW Sydney surveyed 304 Australian residents of different demographics, including age and gender, about their bedroom space and sleep habits.

Around 40 per cent of respondents used their bedroom as their living space, while 61 per cent said they preferred to use it just for sleep.

Age, occupation and bedroom location all affected usage and preferences.

Just like eating, sleep is fundamental for humans to survive.

But given that we spend around a third of our lives asleep, our domestic sleep spaces – and how we use them – are relatively unexplored from a design perspective.

Meanwhile, other domestic rooms, such as the kitchen, have been closely studied by designers to determine their optimal design, layout and features.

"We spend most of our time at home in the bedroom, but its use is expanding beyond its primary function as a sleep environment," says Dr Demet Dincer, lead author of the study and interior architecture lecturer from UNSW Arts, Design & Architecture.

"These initial findings help us better understand the different uses of the contemporary sleep environment and inform better design strategies for these spaces."

"While a well-laid-out and equipped kitchen is no guarantee for tasty meals, it can make hygienic cooking of better-tasting meals easier than a poorly equipped and laid-out one."

"The same could be said for bedrooms and sleep," says Dr Christian Tietz, study co-author and senior lecturer in industrial design at UNSW.

Overall, 90 per cent of respondents used



their bedroom at least some of the time for sleeping, while the remaining either did not have a bedroom space for sleeping or used it for a different purpose altogether.

"The ratio of participants who mentioned sleeping in spaces other than a permanent bedroom was not high, such as sleeping in a car or a spare room," Dr Dincer says.

"But before we have a discussion on optimal sleep conditions, it is important to note today's sleep environment might not be merely a room, including a bed, either."

A multifunctional sleep environment

According to the findings, the mean hours per day spent in a sleep environment are 9.31, while the mean hours spent sleeping are 7.12.

There was no difference in the amount of time spent in the bedroom based on gender.

Younger participants also spent more time in their bedrooms than any other age group, while they were also more likely to use the space for activities other than sleep.

Students reported using the bedroom more as a working area – even more so than

respondents who worked from home.

Respondents living in share housing were also more likely to use their bedroom as a work area, while those living in a studio apartment were more likely to use their sleep environment as a shared space.

Among the other activities in the sleep environment, watching TV was the highest activity, followed by reading, studying or working, eating and then exercising.

"Almost half of our respondents said their bedroom was their living space, even though most don't prefer that."

However, we can't change the reality that our domestic spaces, including the bedroom space, are shrinking and must accommodate more functions," Dr Dincer says.

As space, particularly in cities, becomes more of a premium, Dr Dincer says we need to rethink the different boundaries affecting the use of our sleep environments.

"Bedrooms are one of our most private spaces."

"But how much we can personalise them is very limited in Australia, particularly for



renter-occupiers," Dr Dincer says.

"It would be ideal if our laws allowed renters more flexibility to customise their space beyond just furnishings, particularly if we intend to stay for an extended period."

Previous sleep studies suggest the sleep environment significantly influences sleep quality and problems like sleep apnea and insomnia.

However, this, and the participants' health, were not the focus of the current study.

But in the next stage, the research team will use the Creative Robotics Lab at UNSW's Paddington Campus to collaborate with sleep experts and explore how different features and changes to the sleep environment affect sleep quality.

"We're looking forward to this important collaboration between designers and sleep researchers that should give us a more holistic understanding of what makes an optimal sleep environment and how they can be more flexible and responsive to changing spatial needs," Dr Dincer says. ●



Kia SUV Hybrid unveiled

Long Covid? Try long Kia. The South Korea automobile maker is suffering lingering post-pandemic 'sickness' with its Sorento Hybrid SUV being held up by supply issues and the maker offering the vehicle in top-spec GT-Line only.

The same goes for the Plug-in Hybrid.

The Sorento sports utility vehicle has been a major part of the Kia catalogue for two decades, with the fourth generation seeing the light of day in 2020 in petrol and diesel variants. Now the range is topped off with petrol / electric hybrids boasting room for seven occupants.

The hybrid range kicks off with the front-wheel-drive variant selling for \$66,750 before on-road costs.

The all-wheel-drive version carries a \$3000 premium, pushing the price up to \$69,750. The plug-in hybrid Sorento is on sale from \$80,330 before on-roads.

On test was the entry-level Sorento GT-Line Hybrid front-wheel drive, which sells for \$66,750 (\$72,566, driveaway).

Like all Kias the vehicle is covered by the manufacturer's seven-year unlimited kilometre warranty, with roadside assistance.

STYLING

While retaining much of the Sorento family physical features, the Hybrid has evolved with a new interpretation of the trademark 'tiger nose' grille. It's now wider, wrapping around the integrated LED headlights on each side.

This assertive nose is complemented by a wider lower air intake, incorporating wing-shaped air curtains to channel air around the vehicle.

INTERIOR

Quilted Nappa leather appointed seats (front heated and ventilated) set the theme for a cabin of quality materials and craftsmanship. Three-stage climate control air-conditioning means comfort all round for occupants, while rear window retractable blinds help keep the heat at bay and offer privacy for occupants.

Take time out to choose one of the 64 colours that bathes the cabin in ambient light, pick something from the Sounds of Nature soundscape, or just switch off entirely with the quiet of the passenger talk in-car intercom.

Access to the third row of seats is made relatively easy by dropping the 60:40 second-row seatbacks with a handle on the side of the base and sliding the seat forward.

INFOTAINMENT

Customising is the name of the game with a 10.25-inch full-colour touchscreen atop the centre console, plus a 12.3-inch digital instrument cluster directly in front of the driver.

A colour head-up display, includes speedo and speed limits on the windscreen.

The touchscreen comes up with Apple CarPlay or Android Auto connectivity, satellite navigation details, including a sharp map display, and access to the 12-speaker Bose audio.

ENGINES / TRANSMISSIONS

The Sorento Hybrid is powered by Kia's 132 kW / 265 Nm four-cylinder turbocharged petrol engine combined with a 44 kW / 264 Nm electric motor, charging a 1kWh lithium-ion battery situated under the boot floor.

Power is put to ground via a six-speed torque converter automatic transmission, operated by a large knob on the centre console, and front-wheel drive.

SAFETY

The Sorento gained a five-star safety rating in 2020 and includes autonomous emergency braking with vehicle, pedestrian and cyclist detection, junction assist, lane-keep assist, lane follow assist (centring), blind-spot assist, rear cross-traffic alert, parking collision avoidance, adaptive cruise control with stop and / go, front and rear parking sensors, driver attention alert, multi-collision braking and safe

exit assist, as well as 360-degree view of the vehicle when parking and blind-spot assist, on activation of a turn indicator, the wide-angle surround view monitor displays live footage of other vehicles in blind spots on the instrument cluster.

It also helps wheels keep their distance from scuffing the sidewalk.

Passive safety is taken care of with seven airbags, including front-centre side.

DRIVING

The Kia Sorento Hybrid has slipped quietly (literally) into Australia, bringing a new purpose to the Sorento family, thanks to a sophisticated powertrain and some of Kia's most advanced technology.

Setting off is under the auspices of the electric motor alone producing maximum torque on tap instantly. The petrol engine joins in tandem only when needed for added acceleration or under load.

These switches back and forth are so smooth as to undetectable to the driver.

Indeed, the only indication that the car is acting strictly as an electric vehicle is by the letters EV displayed on the instrument panel. It is not possible to control these actions manually; they are automatic powertrain decisions.

Drive modes, such as ECO, Normal, Sport and Smart can be dialled up by means of a centre-console knob. I found Smart worked well for me as a family cruiser. Kia claims a combined urban / highway petrol consumption of 5.3 litres per 100 kilometres.

The test vehicle recorded 6.7 litres per 100 kilometres in a mix of mainly town and some country driving.

Anxiety about how far the Sorento hybrid will go without flattening the powertrain battery is absent as the engine and regenerative braking do the charging automatically.

Loading is made easy by the hands-free smart power tailgate, which can be brought into operation by the key holder pausing behind the vehicle for three seconds for the tailgate to automatically open.

There's 187 litres of cargo space behind the third-row (No room for a full-size spare).

Fold these seats flat to increase space to 616 litres. With the second-row seats folded flat, 2011 litres of space is freed up. Braked towing is up to 1650 kg

SUMMARY

With hybrid orders reportedly banked up to the end of next year, the Kia Sorento Hybrid GT-Line front-wheel drive states a compelling case for being one of the best large seven-seat sports utility family cruisers around. Step up to the all-wheel drive model for access to Terrain Select to help take care of tricky conditions off road in sand, mud, snow etc.
