## Through the years

This year, the establishment of the restored Millicent Police Station horse stables and cells as a police heritage site was acknowledged.

A second ceremony held the same day at the Millicent Old Cemetery unveiled a replica headstone for Mounted Constable George William Manhood.

Around 70 guests attended each ceremony including Dick Watts who is a direct descendant of Const Manhood who was his maternal uncle.

SAPOL Commissioner Grant Stevens APM LEM, the President of the SA Police Historical Society (SAPHS) Bill Prior and Wattle Range Council Deputy Mayor Peter Dunncliff were also in attendance.

The Gladys Smith Early Learning Centre has received a bit of a facelift following renovations to its Koala Room throughout April.

The Koala Room, which normally looks

after children between six weeks and two years old, has been undergoing work as part of rolling upgrades through Wattle Range Council.

Gladys Smith Early Learning Centre director Clara Walker said it was great to see the

works underway to start modernising rooms in the Centre.

"This year, it's the Koala Room being totally refitted because it's 46 years old, next year will be the Wallaby Room, the year after that will be the Emu Room," Ms Walker said.

"It's more or less just to update the resources, the cabinetry, it's all getting a bit dated.

"Council has been wonderful in renovating a lot of our stuff."

Early bins

Millicent residents who have their kerbside waste bins collected on a Friday are being encouraged to put their bins out an hour earlier to allow waste disposal contractors Cleanaway more time to get to Caroline Landfill.

Cleanaway requested council to alter the kerbside collection start times after attempting to work alongside the new closing time of 2.30pm at the Caroline Landfill.

The changes to the opening times was made by Mount Gambier City Council about 12 months ago in an effort to provide more time to accurately apply the cell's daily cover.

According to a Wattle Range Council report, Cleanaway has the "highest workload" on Fridays with trucks collecting the bins, travelling to the Waste Transfer Station in Mount Gambier to be weighed before travelling out to the Caroline Landfill for disposal.

Cleanaway is currently investigating which streets in Millicent will be directly affected.

Wattle Range Council director of engineering services and waste management Peter Halton said Cleanaway was working with the knowledge of the new closure times for over 12 months now yet recently notified council requesting the change of services.

Mr Halton said Cleanaway had attempted to work within the new closing hours of the Caroline Landfill yet were finding it difficult, thus prompting the review.

He said council was supportive of the new hours presented to council which also worked in with the Environmental Protection Noise Policy due to written consent from the Environmental Protection Authority.

Mount Gambier City Council general manager city infrastructure Barbara Cernovskis said the new hours were part of council's approach to managing the Caroline Landfill.

"We informed all contractors about the new hours about 12 months ago," Ms Cernovskis said.

"We changed the hours to allow staff time to apply the daily cover."

She said council was also expected to have its Waste Masterplan finalised close to the end of the calendar year.

# Changes afoot for event

For the second time since the annual Mother's Day walk began in 2011 by the Millicent Cancer Support Group (MCSG) it will not go ahead.

In 2020 the walk was cancelled due to Covid restrictions but this year the committee have decided to spend their Mother's Day morning with family instead of overseeing the day.

President of the MCSG, Lisa McCourt, said that instead of having the Mother's Day and Father's Day walk this year, they intend on having one big walk.

"Maybe in November because there are a lot of other things happening in October," she said.

Despite the walk not going ahead, the group continues to fundraise with a Last Man Standing raffle currently underway.

The \$10 tickets sold quickly with the last name to be drawn on Friday May 12, winning \$500 worth of vouchers from local businesses.

South East Property Sales have jumped on

board this year and are running a Mother's Day raffle with all proceeds going to the MCSG.

Tickets can be purchased from the SEPS office or outside Foster's Foodland on Thursday May 4th and Friday 12th and Woolworths Friday, May 5.

Lake Bonney Sporting Clays recently presented the group with a \$500 check following the annual John Hill Memorial Day Shoot and Millicent Toyota gave a \$1,000 donation to the group early this year.

Recent fundraising efforts and donations received have allowed the MCSG to donate money for an outdoor setting and armchair for the new palliative care room at the Millicent Hospital.

This donation adds to the \$15,000 donated last year to assist with the fitout of the room.

"We are also buying one of the chairs for the hospital's day surgery which is about \$3,500," Ms McCourt said.

The group recently welcomed several new members to their committee which now numbers 18.

The babies of the Koala Room have been temporarily relocated to the Centre's dining space.

Despite initial worries the change would upset the babies, Ms Walker said they had been amazing at adapting to their new surroundings.

"[Moving rooms] was pretty seamless, actually, because our staff are forward thinkers and they can see the value of renovating and modernising the room," she said.

"I think they've transitioned incredibly well, children are so adaptable.

"It's just a smaller room, but our girls have made it as creative as they can and they have done a really good job in maintaining the ratios and calmness in that room."

The only tricky part so far was coordinating nap time, but Ms Walker said rostering more staff on has helped make sure the kids can be safely moved from their temporary space to the cots.

Ms Walker said having the works done over the last few weeks has also been exciting for the older children at the Centre, with many youngsters having a great time watching everything unfold.

"Because there's a glass door there now, which was a wooden door and they couldn't see in there, especially the older kids stop and have a look and tell their mum and their dad," she said.

"They wave to the workmen in there.

"The children are excited."

# Event low key affair

King Charles III Coronation held this Saturday May 6th will be a low key affair in the Wattle Range district with no official acknowledgement of the historic occasion planned.

This is in stark contrast to the pomp and ceremony across the nation during the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II June 2nd, 1953.

As reported 70 years ago in the South Eastern Times functions and events were held across this district to commemorate the occasion.

In Millicent a street procession by hundreds of school children, Girl Guides, Boy Scouts and Brownies was led by the Millicent Primary School drummers.

Ex-servicemen from the R.S.L. formed a column near the Cross of Sacrifice.

The groups marched to the Institute hall for a public service led by Mr J. Corcoran MP and Millicent District Council Crs J.A. Sullivan and R.C. DeGaris.

The hall was packed for the public service with Mr Corcoran MP commenting on the loyalty of the people of Millicent and that he hoped the children in the audience would live to see the Queen's reign blessed with constant happiness and prosperity.

Following the public gathering the Girl Guides planted 26 Lagunaria tree seedlings in Aitken Street to commemorate the Coronation.

Mount Burr, Glencoe and Beachport all held Coronation balls, with reports almost the whole population attended the Beachport C.W.A. ball in the town's institute hall.

Royalist, Colleen Hammat, was in grade six at Millicent Primary School during the Coronation and received a second place prize for her message of loyalty written to Queen Elizabeth II.

The presentations, which preceded the march, took place on the front lawn of the school with Mr Corcoran M.P. presenting awards to several students.

All students received a copy of the New Testament from the State Government as part of the commemoration.

"I'll be watching the Coronation on TV, I'm still loyal to the royals," Ms Hammat said.

The Coronation of King Charles III can be viewed on several television channels from 5pm on Saturday May 6th or streamed online.

# Opportunity closing to have your say

Community feedback consultation on the future of the Millicent Saleyards ends tomorrow.

The saleyards require almost \$1 million in major upgrades to remain open and cattle throughput has continued to decline since an independent review in 2018 recommended its closure.

Council voted to defer further expenditure on saleyard upgrades at their March meeting until further notice.

Wattle Range residents have until 5pm on Friday, May 5th to submit a survey on the council's website.

Written submissions marked 'Future of Millicent Saleyards' will also be accepted and can be hand-delivered, emailed or included as part of the online survey.

Consultation for the installation of traffic calming measures in the vicinity of Millicent's Gladys Smith Early Learning Centre also ends tomorrow.

Concerns were previously raised about pedestrian safety and two potential measures for traffic control on Bonshor Street have been identified.

Installation of speed bumps or speed cushions are the options provided with an

## Government crackdown on vaping welcomed by group

Non-prescription vapes will be banned from importation under a federal government crackdown.

New rules will have vapes sold in pharmacies and in "pharmaceutical-like" packaging.

Certain flavours, colours and other ingredients will be banned and the concentration and volume of nicotine will be reduced.

Single-use disposable vapes will also be banned.

Those using vapes to help quit smoking will receive a prescription for "legitimate" therapeutic use.

Substance Misuse Limestone Coast project officer Sophie Bouchier said the data from the 2021 Planet Youth School survey showed up to 30 per cent of Year 10s had vaped at least once in their lifetime and 24 per cent had vaped more once or more in the last 30 days.

"This shows us vapes are easily accessible to young people and current research also shows more vapes have nicotine in them and this is not disclosed on the brightly colours packaging," Ms Bouchier said.

"Nicotine is the addictive component of

cigarettes, but cigarettes also contain cancer causing ingredients.

"Vaping is safer than smoking cigarettes and any new laws need to take into account that adults need to have access to an alterna-

tive to smoking cigarettes."

She said prohibition of drugs did not work with more than 43 per cent of Australians having tried an illicit drug at least once.

"The black market goes into overdrive

when substances are banned with no quality control and they are sold online, making it easier for young people to access with no restrictions," Ms Bouchier said.

"The best way to reduce the use of vaping by young people and the decline of the black market is to make vapes widely available and restricted to adults, as an alternative to smoking cigarettes.

"Research also shows evidence-based alcohol and other drug education in schools give young people accurate, non-sensationalised information about drugs, they delay their own onset of using until they are adults."

She said "shock factor" information could have the opposite effect and instead increased young people's interest in alcohol and other drugs.

"This also means parents and other significant adults in a young person's life also need evidence-based information and education," Ms Bouchier said.

"This highlights the need for increased investment by the Federal Government for health promotion activities that discourage young people from vaping through education."

## Wattle Range drop-outs higher

More than 10 per cent of the population living in Wattle Range did not go further than Year 9 at school, according to recently released census figures.

Data taken from the 2021 national census has shown Wattle Range has a higher percentage of people dropping out of high school than the national average.

Australia-wide, 7.2 per cent of people aged 15 years and older responded to the census saying their highest level of education attained was Year 9 or below.

For Wattle Range, 10.7 per cent of people living in the region responded that they had attained a Year 9 or below level of education.

It was a similar story for higher year levels, with 13.4 per cent of people completing up to Year 10 in Wattle Range compared to 10 per cent nationally.

There was a bigger gap for Year 11, with



12.3 per cent of Wattle Range people compared to the national figure of 4.6 per cent.

People living in Wattle Range were also less likely to hold a Bachelor Degree or higher at 9.6 per cent.

Nationally, over a quarter of the population responded to the census saying they held a Bachelor Degree or higher.

The most common education level for the region was Certificate III, with 17.2 per cent of people attaining a qualification.

# Ceremonies mark history

Millicent became the focus of last Friday's annual South Australian Police (SAPOL) Foundation Day with two formal ceremonies taking place in the town.

Since 1992, SAPOL has acknowledged the establishment of the organisation on Foundation Day and focused on themes reflecting its rich and diverse history.

This year, the establishment of the restored Millicent Police Station horse stables and cells as a police heritage site was acknowledged.

A second ceremony held the same day at the Millicent Old Cemetery unveiled a replica headstone for Mounted Constable George William Manhood.

Around 70 guests attended each ceremony including Dick Watts who is a direct descendant of Const Manhood who was his maternal uncle.

SAPOL Commissioner Grant Stevens APM LEM, the President of the SA Police Historical Society (SAPHS) Bill Prior and Wattle Range Council Deputy Mayor Peter Dunnicliff were also in attendance.

Acting chief inspector Naomi Oberscheidt was MC for both events.

The graveside service included an address by John White from SAPHS who had researched the legacy of Const Manhood and described him as a remarkable man who made an outstanding contribution to his community.

Born in Millicent, Const Manhood joined the South Australia Police in 1927 at the age of 21.

In 1938 he was appointed Officer in Charge of the Summertown Police Station and was a popular and dedicated police officer.

Tragically, in 1943 he contracted diphtheria and died suddenly.

Aged 37, Const Manhood was buried in his hometown in the Millicent Old Cemetery.

Highly regarded by the Adelaide Hills community of Summertown they raised funds for a marble headstone on his grave and the erection of a large obelisk memorial opposite the Summertown police station in his honour.

The Summertown memorial is believed to be the only one of its kind erected in South Australia for a serving police officer.

Suffering from weathering over the years the headstone at the Millicent Old Cemetery had deteriorated to such an extent that it could not be restored.

A replica of the headstone, gifted by the Police Association of South Australia and positioned alongside the original, was unveiled last week.

Mr White paid tribute to Const Manhood's wife Esther who came to Millicent with their two daughters, Shirley and Josephine, after his death.

Josephine Blowes was unable to attend the ceremony but has agreed to allow the original headstone tablet, donated by the community of Summertown, to be placed on her mother's nearby grave.

President of the SAPHS Bill Prior and President Police Association Mark Carroll APM unveiled the headstone with Commissioner Grant Stevens laying a wreath.

The crowd reconvened a short time later at the rear yard of the Millicent Police Station to witness the unveiling of the Police Heritage

Music by members of the Band of the SAPOL greeted guests as they arrived.

Receiving extensive restoration work last year the site is Millicent's only confirmed State Heritage Place in the town centre.

President of the SAPHS, Bill Prior, gave a history of the site which was first established in Millicent in 1874 by Mounted Const Shiels.

Const Shiels occupied several sites in the township as a temporary police station until the first permanent station was built in 1877.

The following year the stable and hay loft was built at the rear of the station with the stables converted to two police cells in 1948 until decommissioned in 1981.

It is the only remaining structure from the 1877 police station and is a rare example of historic South Australian architecture.

Officer in charge (OC) of Millicent Police Station, Snr Sgt first class Rick Errington acknowledged former OC Peter Brown who initiated the restoration of the historic site by bringing it to the attention of the Commissioner Grant Stevens.

Formalities on the day ended after three members of the Millicent Police Station were presented with service medals.

Const Rachel Bagshaw received the Emergency response active service medal, Snr Const Tanya Payne the 20 year clasp of the SAPOL service medal and Snr Sgt first class Rick Errington received 30 year clasp of the SAPOL service medal.

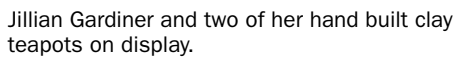

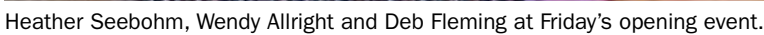




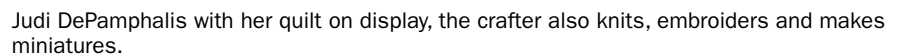

# Filipino culture on show

‘Twas a night week before Valentines Day when Penola’s Raidis Estate opened its doors to welcome guests for a night of Filipino dances, songs and food.

The group also included an ethno-modern dance piece based on Joey Ayala’s song, Magkaugnay (meaning connected) and a heartwarming rendition of I Still Call Australia Home, performed with fellow locals Naomi Baugh and her children Lea, Kiana and Lola; as well as visiting friend Aurora Emnace.

Locals were also treated to some Filipino favorites including Lechon Kawali (Crispy Pork), Lumpiang Shanghai (Shanghai-style Spring Rolls), Empanada, Chicken Adobo, Pansit Bam-I (Combination Noodles with stir fried vegetables) and Filipino Fried Rice; with Crema de Fruta, Maja Blanca, Cassava Cake and other party fares. Drinks were made available by Raidis Estate.

The multimedia presentation of Filipino culture was a first of its kind under the banner of the Penola Wellness Group.

As there were only few Filipinos residing in Penola, members of performing group managed to stage the event by also working behind the scenes: Laarni Krause and Nena Suclan teamed up on the video and audio design; Lili Auld curating the medley of songs as well as doubling as choir master; Ashe Montecillo as dance coordinator; Becky Mariano on script with Kate Montecillo as voice over talent; Jhen Richards, Nessie Manondo and Janet Borja on catering with Rolly Mariano on ways and means.

In May, the devotees flock the streets of the town in parades of colours, music and dancing in honour of the Holy Cross of Santa Cruz for Her bountiful blessings.



Ashe Montecillo and Nena Suclan perform the Bagobo rice dance known as “Sugod Uno.” The Bagobo tribe of the southern Philippine island of Mindanao celebrates rice in all its cycles – from planting to harvesting – all done with thankful hearts.



Mother and daughter Kate Montecillo and Laarni Krause perform part of an ethnic dance called Singkil where a debutante princess accompanied by a royal courtier is introduced to society.



The song, Magkaugnay (magkaugnay means connected), penned by renowned Filipino ethno-modern music guru Joey Ayala, created a dance revolution among Filipinos worldwide; the song embodies the connectedness of all mother earth’s creations be it great and small.

## New Mazda 3 coming July

Mazda Australia has released details of its MY 2023 Mazda3 hatchback and sedan due to arrive here in July.

The Mazda 3 powertrain has been streamlined to comprise of the Skyactiv G 2.0 and 2.5-litre engines, which are both mated to the 6-speed Skyactiv-Drive automatic transmission. G20 models also receive an upgrade to

the Skyactiv G 2.0-litre petrol engine, with cylinder deactivation and other improvements to the combustion process resulting in lower CO2 emissions without compromising on performance or driveability.

Fuel consumption improves by 5 per cent to 5.9 L/100km for the hatch and 5.8 L/100km for the sedan.

Stylistically, the enhanced Mazda 3 adds a

new colour to the mix, with Ceramic Metallic replacing Sonic Silver in the model's eight-strong colour palette. Inside, G20 Touring grades and above receive new convenience features such as wireless Apple CarPlay and Android Auto™, wireless phone charging and USB-C ports.

G25 GT grades and above additionally benefit from the 10.25-inch Mazda Connect info-

tainment display, as featured on other Mazda nameplates, such as the CX-5, CX-8 and CX-9.

Customers can also enjoy the 10.25-inch Mazda Connect infotainment display on entry level Mazda3 grades, such as G20 Pure and G20 Evolve, by opting for the Vision Technology package.

The updated Mazda 3 hatch and sedan will go on sale in July 2023.

## ‘Pure sports performance’: Type R takes back record

Honda's new Civic Type R hot hatch has posted a new lap record for the Nurburgring road circuit in Germany.

The latest version of Honda's three-door hottie set a time of seven minutes and 44.881 seconds, reclaiming the title of fastest front-drive production car.

That's a full half second faster than the Renault Megane RS Trophy R, which set the previous record of seven minutes and 45.389 seconds back in April, 2019. The pair have enjoyed a great tussle over the years, repeatedly swapped records at the 'Ring, nicknamed the Green Hell.

Honda says the new lap time record demonstrates that the Civic Type R, which underwent a full model change, further improved its dynamic performance compared to its predecessor model.

It adds the Type R was developed with the goal to achieve the "ultimate pure sports performance" by attaining the ultimate in both speed, which is the essential value of a sports model, and driving pleasure, which appeals to the emotion of the driver.

Honda's Hideki Kakinuma said since the start of sales in Japan in September 2022, the company had received a huge amount of customer feedback from around the world.

"However, we still had one more mission to fulfill, which was to claim the title as the

world's fastest FWD car with a record Nurburgring lap time," Mr Kakinuma said.

"Six years after the lap record was set by the previous-generation Civic Type R (FK8), we reached this new dimension as a result of all of the passions we poured in and all the advancements we made for this Type R model.

"Finally, our wish to share this title with all Type R fans all around the world came true."

Mr Kakinuma added the company hoped all current and prospective owners of the Type R would enjoy their vehicle with the pride they shared with consumers.

This time, the record-setting Type R was fitted with track-focused Michelin's Pilot Sport Cup 2 Connect rubber instead of the usual Pilot Sport 4 S tyres, providing higher levels of grip.

Civic also holds the record for quickest front-drive production car at Japan's Suzuka Circuit which it set in April, 2022.

The 2023 Honda Civic Type R is priced at \$72,600 drive-away, but you have to wait two years if you want one – that's how long the waiting list is.

It's powered by a 2.0-litre four-cylinder turbocharged petrol engine with 235kW of power and 420Nm of torque, paired with a six-speed manual transmission.

It dispatches the dash from 0-100km/h in a claimed 5.4 seconds, with a top speed of 275km/h.

# Solid fight from Penola

Penola's A Grade football side bounced back from its disappointing Round 1 performance against Kingston with a strong display against Naracoorte on Saturday.

Penola coach Brad Maney was pleased with his side's performance in their first home game of the season.

"It was a massive bounce back in a lot of ways," he said.

"We got it back to nine points with two or three minutes to go.

"It was at that point that you just never know, if we could have jagged one more you just do not know what might have happened but unfortunately Naracoorte was just a bit too classy in the end."

A late goal from the visitors sealed the deal as Naracoorte claimed a 15-point win.

"I was really proud of the boys' effort," Maney said.

"It just showed that our fitness is up to scratch this year and that is a big thing we have focussed on."

He said the main difference between the two teams was the level of understanding each player had with one another.

"There was one side who have played to-

Brad Bryant was best on ground for the Eagles after a superb performance by the co-captain.

"Brad Bryant probably played his best game for Penola since he joined in 2019," Maney said.

"He was exceptional."

Maney praised several players in the team who all stood up.

"Matt Ferguson kicked two goals four off the wing but was just involved in everything," he said.

"Garrett Ha and Brodie Foster had their moments up forward - they both kicked two goals.

"Damien Wenham continues to do lockdown roles for us and is just the ultimate teammate.

"Brad Merrett was back to his 2022 form and he just dominated across halfback as did Jayden Eldridge."

Maney was pleased with the impact Eldridge has had since joining the club in the offseason.

"Since Jayden Eldridge joined, he has been the ultimate leader and ultimate professional in the way he goes about his footy," Maney said.

"For him to have such an impact in just his second game of KNT footy, it is certainly very exciting for the upcoming games."

The Eagles will take on Padthaway this weekend, a team they defeated in the final round of 2022.

"It is going to be interesting, it is very hard to

get a gauge on the league at the moment but we are expecting Padthaway to be really strong," Maney said.

"They have got a good halfback line, Tom Edwards has been a dominant player in the league for over a decade now and they also have some classy on-ballers."

Penola needs no extra motivation for this clash as it looks to end a decade-long drought at Padthaway Oval.

"We actually have not won at Padthaway in 10 years, for some reason it is our bogey oval," Maney said.

"So we are really keen to get over that hump and move on from it.

"We know we can beat them, there is belief in that but on Saturday we only had 11 players who were in that game (last year).

"So it is a completely different team, a completely different squad but we know we can beat them, there is no worries about that."
