Lakes backlash

Community members have slammed proposed changes to recreational usage of South East coastal lakes, with some saying they have been ignored through the consultation process.

In May, the Department of Environment and Water (DEW) released a proposal paper outlining possible changes to public us-

age of South East coastal lakes including Lake George, Lake Bonney SE, Lake St Clair, Lake Eliza, Lake Hawdon North and Mullins Swamp.

Under the proposed changes, parts of Lake George and Lake Bonney SE would remain unalienated crown land and open to recreational hunting, camping and dog walking, while the rest would be named as conservation parks.

For the parts of Lake George and Lake Bon-

ney SE that became conservation parks, hunting would be banned, but dog walking and grazing could be allowed subject to management planning and consultation.

The entirety of the other three lakes, plus Mullins Swamp, would become conservation parks under the proposed changes.

In a statement, the Conservation Hunting Alliance of SA (CHASA) said the proposal was not met with positivity in the community.

"The feedback from the local community at this stage is very negative towards Lakes Bonney and George being proclaimed as conservation parks," CHASA said.

"The feeling is that they have been ignored through the consultation process, where it was clearly stated that the community wanted these lakes to remain under local community management.

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General rates up 6pc

Kingston District Council has put its draft Annual Business Plan out for community comment.

Council described the draft budget as “conservative”, with a planned six per cent increase in general rates.

Mayor Jeff Pope said the budget was drafted with consideration to the current economic environment and cost of living pressures.

“Consequently, there is no change in service levels, including no increase in staffing full-time equivalent numbers, with the budget being determined based on the 2022-2023 operational expenditure plus known increases in electricity, insurance, and employee enterprise agreement costs only,” Mr Pope said.

Mr Pope said there were a number of

changes in the draft budget, including reducing the primary production land use code from 70 per cent to 63 per cent.

Other changes include reducing the rate in the dollar to address valuation increases, increasing the differential rates for vacant land to 135 per cent to encourage conversion to housing, and an increase in the minimum rate to \$673.20.

Council chief executive Nat Traeger said there were no new projects planned in the budget except those carried forward from previous years as council is developing a new strategic plan for the area.

“With this business-as-usual approach, roads remain our highest capital expenditure cost, with some 68 per cent of our \$1.77 million renewal budget being for sealed and un-

sealed roads, mostly in the rural areas,” Ms Traeger said.

“As well as an extensive road network and enviable parks and gardens to maintain, for a small regional council, we also have our fair share of coastal issues to deal with.

“Coastal infrastructure and adaptation strategies are forever present as a major challenge for us, particularly as we work through the immediate priorities in our Coastal Adaptation Strategy.”

Two Millicent men due to face court

Two men have been reported in relation to Operation Red Gum.

At 9.45am on Monday May 29, police were called to Picanniny Lane after receiving reports of two men cutting down a large red gum tree.

Upon police attendance, they located an abandoned vehicle, trailer and chainsaws next to a very large red gum tree (around 4m in girth) which recently had been cut down and in the process of being chopped up into firewood.

Police enquiries led to two men, a 53-year-old man and a 38-year-old man, both from Millicent who were reported for theft and interfering with native habitat.

The men will be summonsed to appear in the Millicent Magistrates Court.

Police continue to work with National Parks and Local Government in addressing the increased theft of trees under the LCLSA Operation Red Gum.

Anyone who finds people cutting down trees, or whom can hear chainsaws being operated in forest areas are asked to contact police on 131 444.

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Reconciliation side by side

The community were invited to Millicent High School (MHS) on Tuesday to join the Reconciliation Week naming ceremony for the school's Indigenous garden established 12 years ago.

Burrardies Aboriginal Corporation (BAC) in Mount Gambier were approached to assist with finding a suitable name for the site previously known as the Aboriginal Meeting Place.

Maruwinya Mraat, Miya ba Miya is the new name and is an Bunganditj interpretation of Caring for Country, Side by Side.

Tara Bonney is the Bunganditj Language Coordinator at Burrardies and was approached about naming the site.

"I come up with something to translate and send it to the Bunganditj language reclamation committee through Burrardies.

"Sometimes people are not happy for things to go forward as they are, there might be something that has a bit more cultural or family sensitivity around it.

"For the creation of the name I put forward a few options and that is the one they really liked," she said.

MHS Aboriginal education officer Jenny Bishop designed the sign and cut the ribbon to reveal it on the day.

"It's taken 12 years for us to get the Boandik name for it, it was a privilege to be here and seeing it happen."

Ms Bishop's involvement with the meeting place stretches back to its inception when herself and her daughter's, Sophie and Zoe, were Talkenjeri dancers.

The garden was created as an honorary site

for the dance group, led by Major Sumner, and was the first Indigenous garden created in a Limestone Coast school.

Zoe remembers visiting the site weekly to add plants to the bare paddock and can still identify the paver she painted for the garden in year two.

Following the ribbon cutting ceremony, Ms Bonney offered a welcome to country and

Doug Nicholls from Burrardies Corporation led a smoking ceremony for the students and dignitaries in attendance.

Joining the ceremony were Wattle Range Council deputy mayor Peter Dunicliff, Anita Hateley and Donna Baker from Aboriginal education, Damien Bickley and Vanessa Freebairn Limestone Coast Landscape Board (LCLB), staff and students from MHS.

Grassroots funding from the LCLB was received to maintain, upkeep and further develop the school's Indigenous garden meeting place and link to local First Nations heritage.

Maintenance and upkeep to the site has included a new fire pit built by Neil Reilly and his Pathways work ready crew with Dylan Clough cleaning the site and preparing the framework for the new sign.

Paying down the \$18,000 debt

Management of 5the FM have recently confirmed a debt of \$18,000 owing to BAI Communications due to unpaid invoices by previous management of the community radio station.

Since taking control of the station the new board have found debts totalling around \$120,000 with the majority of this retired by organisations and individuals, leaving the station with around \$25,000 owing.

In an online statement chair of 5the FM, David Walshaw, said

"We have applied to the Australian Communications and Media Authority for a temporary community broadcast license and hope to hear back from them over the next week or so.

"Before we can get back on air, we have to retire a debt of \$18,000 to BAI Communications who operate the Mount Burr transmitter site.

"Community Radio is the lifeblood of rural communities and we are reaching out to our community for support to help us pay off the current debt."

The new board were aware of the BAI Communications debt but had estimated it to be between \$10,000-\$14,000.

Mr Walshaw has written to BAI Communications to ask if they are prepared to waive some of the outstanding invoices or set up a payment plan that will allow the station to regain their broadcasting licence.

"Even if we could pay them half and they

will let us back on the air, we don't want to go in with \$18k debt or we will never get in front.

"Once we get back on air we can go to the community with sponsorship deals, at the moment our only product is streaming."

The current committee are also hoping to see items previously purchased for the radio station returned. They have written to people asking them to return any property to the station.

"We've got invoices from retail outlets that confirm the equipment was purchased and we would like to have it back."

Despite setbacks the committee continues to recruit and train volunteers and is organising Rocking the Rails, a major fundraiser for November this year.

"It appears to be a direct attack on the hunters and dog owners in the community as these are the only two groups excluded by the declaration of a national park."

There was a similarly negative reaction from the Lake George Management Committee, who also felt their views had been ignored in consultation. Committee chair Lee Morgan said there was a diverse range of views within the committee, but many community and non-government representatives felt their views had been ignored after the consultation process.

"Despite this consultation, the [National Parks and Wildlife Service] have generally ignored the views of the LGMC (and much of the community) regarding community led management," Mr Morgan said.

"What is proposed for Lake George is a vast overreach on the problems encountered in the area.

"It is another classic example of government saying, 'we know better' and not having the foresight of future management consequences for Lake George."

DEW said there was a wide range of feedback to consider from the consultations last year and the proposal sought to balance community use of the lakes with the need to maintain and protect their unique features.

"The community told us that they wish to protect current recreational uses and the environment," DEW said.

"This feedback directly influenced the draft proposals document now out for further consultation.

"For example, based on community feedback, the department is proposing to protect areas of high value at Lake George and Lake Bonney SE, while keeping large areas under unchanged management."

The proposal is currently out for community comment online, with feedback to be reported to Minister for Climate, Environment and Water Susan Close before a decision is made.

A homegrown best-selling author is feeling lucky to have so much community support on the week of the release of her fifth novel.

Tantanoola-raised Maya Linnell has been living her dream of being an author since the release of her debut novel in 2019.

With her latest book, *Kookaburra Cottage*, soon to hit the shelves, Ms Linnell said community support for her writing has been instrumental in making her writing dream a reality.

“To fill my days with books and words is a very special thing and one I certainly don’t take for granted,” she said.

“I’m really aware that all the support of the people in the local community is a huge factor in helping to keep my books on the shelves and allowing me to sit at the keyboard all day and do this work telling Australian stories.

“That has been humongously helpful in the books becoming bestsellers and that’s something you’ll never ever take for granted as an author.”

“So that’s really nice to have people coming up with their thinking caps on when it comes to different things that might make a good storyline, which is lovely.”

Ms Linnell said while her books have previ-

More than 100 community members across the electorate were nominated and received an award from Mr Pasin.

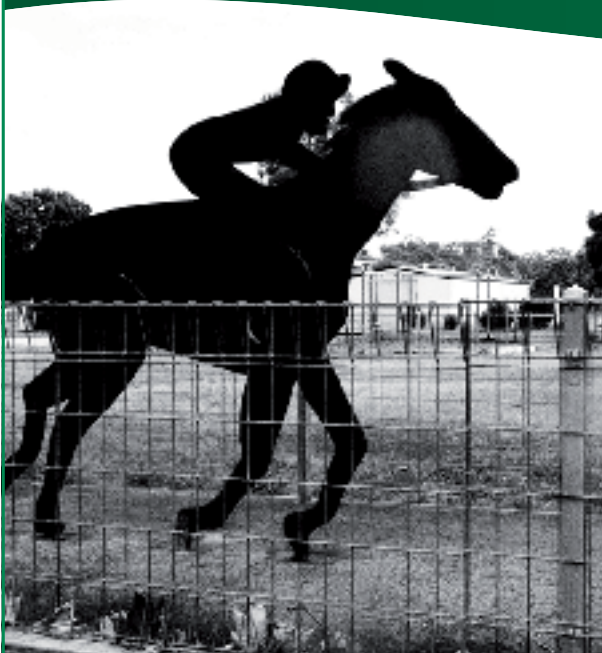
Mr Pasin said he was overwhelmed with the response and has declared the awards program a success.

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Athlete scaling new heights

Dannielle Vanderheul's training schedule in preparation for the 2023 World Mountain Trail Running Championships in Austria has escalated as the athlete prepares to fly out of the country tomorrow.

Ms Vanderheul is one of 30 athletes representing Australia in the championships and is one of only two South Australians chosen by Athletics Australia for the event.

As part of her training regime the athlete has been doing double run days, which is a fast 15km run in the early morning followed by a slower 5km run either during her lunch break or at night time.

Finding hill trails in the local pine forests and making trips to run trails through the Adelaide hills has added to her preparation.

"My coach, Dave Farrugia, has helped me find some very high hills in Adelaide," she said.

"I went up on the weekend and ran what they call the Murder Horn.

"It was 1,000kms of elevation in around 8kms, I'm physically starting to feel that today.

"It's quite secluded and there weren't any runners out there, and for good reason, it's quite tough.

"Which has prepared me well to know that I can push through and it should help me get up some steep inclines at Innsbruck."

Although her training schedule slows down for the week or so before the race Ms Vanderheul will continue her 5 km a day runs which will prove a little problematic during travel.

"I'm going to have to get through customs and run 5kms in the Melbourne airport before I fly out at 2.25am.

"I'm not sure how I'm going to do that, I'll have to try and tell someone so I don't look like an absolute madwoman.

"I think that my biggest concern at the moment is running in the airport and worried that I'm going to get taken by security" Ms Vanderheul jokingly said.

Another concern for the athlete is the delay of her official green and gold uniform caused by a postal mixup, with the athlete hopeful the uniform arrives before she leaves.

Ms Vanderheul's Innsbruck motel in Austria is on the trail she is running and the athlete has the opportunity to inspect the course before race day.

"There's been an update in the last couple of weeks that it's been snowing, raining and wintery.

"I've never seen snow and never run in snow.

"According to the course notes it's very slippery, so they are looking at deviations to avoid some of that."

The wintry weather may be in her favour as Ms Vanderheul likes running in the rain, recently achieving one of her fastest runs during a Millicent downpour.

The runner is candid about her chances at the championships.

"I'm very realistic about the level of athletic ability that is there," she said.

"They are amazing athletes that have a very high advantage over me, I will honestly just be

happy to finish.

"If I don't finish last that would be an achievement but it's just to go and have the experience and the exposure."

One of the highlights for Ms Vanderheul, besides the stunning scenery, will be joining the other Australian athletes in the Parade of Nations which includes all 60 nations represented at the event.

Her involvement also means being present at both the opening and closing ceremonies.

Local support for the athlete has come from family, friends and the running community who have contributed to the Danni V Gofundme page.

The honour boards, three from Tantanoola Primary School and two from the Tantanoola

CWA, were installed by WRC and are now on display within the main hall.

Carnival in times gone by

To celebrate the 100 years since the start of the Harry Meyer Cup in the summer of 1924-1925, the SA Country Cricket Committee have commissioned a publication to celebrate this centenary of this special carnival that brought the best country cricketer from across the state to test their skills on the suburban grounds in Adelaide.

Initially played over two weeks, usually starting at the end of January, in recent years it now has been reduced to a one-week tournament.

The South East's first title was in 1935 and they won a second in 1939, both captained by Max Dinning.

Co-author of the book, highly-respected cricket historian Geoff Sando said the trip from the South East to Adelaide was much more of an ordeal prior to the Second World War than it is today.

"This largely explains why the region was unable to field strong teams in the early years of the SACA Country Carnival, despite the fact that the cricket played in the region was well-organised and of a high standard," he said.

"One of the reasons for the strength of cricket in the South East was the Whitty Shield, which was first competed for by the Associations of Naracoorte, Mount Gambier, Millicent and Penola from 1919-20. Tatiara and Frances Border were included from 1963-64.

"The first South East team appeared in the Harry Meyer Cup competition in the 1925-26 season.

"Because of distance, players were predominantly from the Tatiara area and all five matches were lost.

"A second foray was not made until 1929-30, when a single win came from six matches.

"Slight improvements came in 1932-33 and 1933-34 before a strong team was cobbled together for the 1934-35 campaign.

"In this title winning team of the seven matches played, six were won and the other

was drawn.

"Centuries were scored by CG Toms, JF Caddy and H Scown, while W Marshall claimed 7/29 against Lower North.

"Caddy would be the highest scoring batsman in 1935-36 with two centuries amongst his 481 runs.

"William Kidman, a 17-year-old from Naracoorte, scored 103* in 35 minutes for South East against Eyre Peninsula in 1938-39, including 46 runs from the last over of the game.

"The eight ball over was boosted by a no-ball and realised an impressive yield - 466464466.

"It would be the last match in the competition until after the war."

A number of South East players performed admirably when the competition resumed.

In 1947-48 George Gapper hit 12 fours and 6 sixes in a century against Upper North and Watty Case scored 105 in 98 minutes against Mid North, Bruce Little claimed five wickets in seven balls against Upper North and followed up with a hat-trick against Mid North.

Gordon Remphrey scored six centuries from 1950-51 to 1964-65.

The South East third title was in 1970, with Penola legend Peter Haddrick as the

on-field leader.

A decade later, a golden epoch arrived with Haddrick still involved but now in an off field role, with Steve Skeer, Dale Bateman, Rob Ellis, Greg "Muddy" Williams and in '99 Anthony Lowe as skippers of dominant teams. A dozen Harry Meyer Cup wins in less than two decades.

"South East won the Harry Meyer Cup in 1969-70," Sando continued.

"Peter Sleep and Ziggy Golebiowski were two talented Mount Gambier cricketers who appeared briefly in the 1970s, preceding an extraordinarily successful period when 12 titles were won from 1979-80 to 1998-99.

"Steven Skeer, Dale Bateman, Greg Williams, Rob Ellis, Peter Harfield, Geoff "Pep" Vivian, Neil Quirk, Anthony Lowe and Gavin Reed were some of the South Eastern champions who dominated the competition in these years.

"The bowling was penetrative and the batting was aggressive, particularly by Jon Clayton, who struck up 80 against Murray Districts in 1997-98, including 40 off an over, with 6 sixes and a four off a bonus no-ball."

Some 16 years later at the then called Railways Oval (now the rebuilt Karen Rolton Oval) the South East were back on the winners list in 2015 under the leadership of Robert Drenthan, with a match winning partnership between George Kidman and future SA Outbacks captain Matt McInerney a key component in the game.

There were two more wins in 2016 and 2020.

Builds up a head of steam

At a mere year or so old, the Ioniq 6 electric vehicle is already among hallowed company.

Back in the 1930s, steam locomotives were battling for bragging rights all over British railway routes.

The height of the Art Deco period saw the birth of the A4 Class streamliner ('streak' to the young trainspotters of the day), designed by Sir Nigel Gresley, with its sleek profile, spats and aerodynamic surfaces based on the Bugatti racing cars of the day.

Indeed, Sir Nigel, a friend of Ettore Bugatti, spent time in France studying his work, incorporating it into the A4s, one of which, the Mallard, still holds the world speed record of 126 mph (200 km/h) for a steam loco. It's ironic that the record was set on a run ostensibly to test a new braking system.

Fast forward to today, with Hyundai's new Ioniq 6 EV design measuring up to the streak. At Cd 0.21, the swoopy sedan is the most aerodynamic vehicle the company has made, resulting in a claimed zero-to-100 km/h acceleration time of 5.1 seconds for the twin-motor all-wheel-drive Techniq and Epiq models on to a top speed of a 'Mallardian' 180 km/h-plus. No slouch.

At first glance the Ioniq 6 stirred memories from this former young railway enthusiast of the 'ten o'clock streak' taking on Copley Hill after steaming out of Leeds Central Station on the up line to London. The sleek profile does it.

However, that's where the heavily polluting fossil fuel burning 'iron horse' is left far behind by the iconic Ioniq 6. First of all, there are fewer emissions with the EV – none, in fact.

And much of the material used in the Ioniq 6 is eco processed genuine leather, recycled and bio-material fabrics, bio paint, recycled fish-net carpets and mats, and recycled pigment paint.

Roadside support is available for the first two years and beyond each time the car is serviced at a Hyundai dealer and up to ten years of map updates.

Coming in three variants, Dynamiq, Techniq and Epiq, on test was the first mentioned, which sells for \$74,000, plus on road costs. A rear-wheel drive sedan, it is trumped by the two all-wheel drive versions costing \$83,500 and \$88,000 respectively.

STYLING

As well as recalling the deeds of a famous engineering icon, Hyundai says the innovative streamlined design is a rendering of smooth curves of perfectly weathered stone. Sleek exterior lines are further enhanced with flush-fitting door handles which pop-out automatically when unlocked, while 18-inch aero wheels, with six offset panels windmill style, present a perfect base.

The car measures 4855 mm in length, 1880 mm width and 1495 mm height, with a 2950 mm wheelbase, similar to Hyundai's petrol-powered Sonata, but 50 mm closer to the road and with 110 mm more between the wheels.

It did attract a somewhat cynical comment from one onlooker relating to the car's fulsome rear. With a continuous strip of LED tail-lights and double-decker rear spoiler,

there was the suggestion of an automotive Botox-style cosmetic enhancement.

INTERIOR

Despite being entry-level the Dynamiq is well equipped, with standard features including, head-up windscreen display, dual 12.3-inch display monitors, 10-way powered driver and front passenger seats, eight-speaker Bose audio, wired Apple CarPlay and Android Auto, multi-Bluetooth connectivity, Blue Link Connected Car Services and a powered boot lid.

Seats are of eco-friendly material, as are recycled fish-net carpets and mats. Seating up front is comfortable and spacious, unlike behind which has limited headroom thanks

to the curvy roofline and no toe room because the front seats rest on the floor.

Storage includes a 401-litre rear boot, with underfloor area, and 45 litre front boot, the latter enough to take the charging tackle.

INFOTAINMENT

The dual 12.3-inch screens provide stacks of info and once mastered (time consuming)

the system is quick, responsive and fairly easy to navigate.

Bluelink connected car service allows users to set a charging time, and pre-set the vehicle's climate control to take advantage of off-peak electricity; also, remotely monitor the vehicle's distance to empty and can restart charging if required.

The app allows the owner to find EV charging stations and send the address to the car's sat navigation. A tool will show on a map the driveable radius with 80 and 100 per cent battery charge levels.

ENGINES / TRANSMISSIONS

The single motor, front-wheel drive Dynamiq stumps up more than 600 kilometres range from its 77.4 kWh battery, which, the maker says, can go from 10 to 80 per cent

in just 18 minutes on an ultra-fast 350kW charger. A home or work wall box will take almost 12 hours.

The rear-drive Dynamiq model takes a claimed 7.4 seconds to reach 100 km/h from rest.

SAFETY

Hyundai SmartSense is a super suite of safety systems that can intuitively take care of car and occupants with all-round aplomb. Included are forward collision avoidance, lane change assist, blind spot monitor, speed limit warning, smart cruise control, surround view, rear occupant alert and lots in between. Five-star safety rating is a given.

DRIVING

The Dynamiq is powered by a single rear-mounted electric motor developing 168 kW and 350 Nm, good for a claimed 0-100km/h time of 7.4 seconds, and 614 km of claimed driving range on Europe's WLTP lab-test protocol.

The transmission is controlled by the twist of a steering wheel-mounted stalk on the right, while drive modes – eco, normal and sport – are selected via a single button on the left of the steering wheel rim.

An i-Pedal mode allows for single-pedal driving that can slow and bring the car to a stop without touching the brake pedal, creat-

ing more generative power, always a boon in heavy city traffic.

There's an eerie engine noise from under the bonnet, as in a bitter winter wind whistling through a badly insulated medieval pile, does insinuate itself in the cabin.

However, there is all but a total absence of wind noise, but tyres do rumble on course road surfaces.

No bother, the Bose sound system, on command, can fill the cabin with the sounds of nature – calm ocean waves, for example, providing the soundtrack for the selectable ambient lighting. Unfortunately, beeps and ding warnings ring out too often, disturbing the otherwise relaxed atmosphere of the space.

Vehicle systems such as locking, air-conditioning and locating the car can be done from a smartphone. Special features for EVs include scheduling charge times, finding the nearest charging stations and remote viewing of charging status.

Over-the-air updates of controller software, free for ten years, means the Ioniq 6's systems can be upgraded to latest versions without visiting a service centre.

Offshore fishing was off the cards so die-hards found plenty of other ways to entertain themselves.

Lucky for us here in the South East, we have plenty of options, so even when the weather is not on our side, we can still wet a line.

The tuna news – when anglers can get out there – is still red hot.

We have had a few days off with the weather not playing the game, but if the last couple of months is anything to go by, the first couple of days back out there after the blow should see some explosive fishing.

The live baiting has still been super productive, but a few anglers are still fishing lures such as the Troll So Hard and Bonze offerings and nailing the fish.

Tyson from Want To Fish Charters chased the big tuna right up until the weather turned and in one of his last days out, they managed three for the day, two of which

they tagged and released.

The weather looks to be improving this weekend, so we hope have more tuna pictures and news by then.

In other offshore news, it has been hard, we have struggled to get on the water, but like the tuna, we will see anglers back out there this weekend.

On the sand, the salmon in the Beachport Salmon Hole have kept anglers busy this past weekend.

I mentioned it last week – the worse the weather, the better the fishing and that has rung true.

A few lads I know fished down there on Friday night and had a real day out, managing to catch upwards of 30 salmon, some being beauties nearing that 2kg mark.

Flicking lures was the best on the weekend and with the wild sea and bit of wind on, it is not surprising.

There has not been much else to report from the sand this week.

The usual keen anglers who fish this time of year were put off by that strong wind, but

I know a few of them are already looking forward to the coming weekend and lighter winds.

The garfish have played the game for those who just need to get out and on the water.

The beauty of our rugged coastline is that it does not matter what direction the wind is coming from, there are always a couple of the good garfishing bays that are sheltered and fishable.

Like weeks gone by, the usual haunts such as Cape Douglas, Hutt Bay and Livingstons have all been productive and it does not matter if you are a wader or a boatie, you will take home a feed.

Mullet have arrived in numbers in the same sort of areas and they will eat the same things, so if you manage a few fresh mullet in the bag too, that is always a win.

There have been a fair few fish up the river this week.

The mullet are kicking into gear slowly but surely and this week I have seen some more nice fish caught.

The hot spot still seems to be the Sandy Waterholes area and pillies and squid are the most popular baits.

Fish to 85-90cm have been boated, but most around that 70-80cm mark.

The bream have been in good touch throughout most of the river and both the bait and lure guys are getting in on the action.

Bream have been found mostly along the deeper rockwalls and drop offs, where as the perch I have heard of have been on the edges and in the snags.

It is the same story as last week regarding the popular lures – the cappuchino nemesis powerbait is a classic, as are the 2.5inch motor oil zman grubs.

If fishing those deeper sections, do not be afraid to go a bigger jig head to get you down deep – it can really make a difference.

Saturday will see the swell and wind both start to settle down, so hopefully it does what we want it to and we can get back onto the water.

With players out in two key positions, it forced Penola to get creative in its structure.

"Gus Eckermann had to go to centre-halfback, I had to go to fullback and we had to put Kaleb Messenger and Ned Skeer through the ruck who are two very inexperienced players," Maney said.

"So it threw us out a fair bit and Scott Merrett even had a turn in the ruck.

"We were trying lots of different things and
