Domain damage

Wattle Range Council (WRC) received a report of damage to the lawned area in the Millicent Domain on Tuesday, May 30th.

Following the report, council posted to social media requesting information from the public in regard to the incident, which involved a vehicle.

Two other ovals in the region were the tar-

get the following evening with both suffering similar damage.

Police stated they are investigating extensive damage to the Millicent High School (MHS) oval caused by burnouts believed to have occurred about 2.20am on Wednesday,

The Tantanoola Football Club (TFC) oval was also damaged around the same time.

President of the TFC Matt Cytrowski said he was alerted to the vandalism last Wednesday morning.

Volunteers had to be called in to repair the oval in time for Saturday's Sponsor's and Re-

"There is a bit of damage at the far end of the football ground, they've got their vehicle onto the ground and done some burnouts on there" he said.

"It means we have to rely on volunteers to get the oval back in a safe state to play football.

We have volunteers at the club who do lots of things and it's just extra work we have to do. "It is disappointing."

Peter Halton, WRC Director of engineering services, also expressed disappointment in the latest act of vandalism in the town centre.

Cash flows in for projects

Limestone Coast projects will be supported in the state government's first round of a new program.

Three projects from the Limestone Coast are set to benefit from the State Government's \$600,000 Thriving Communities Program.

The program, launched in January this year as part of the Thriving Regions fund is aimed at facilitating small projects that build social resilience through facilitating greater community participation, and ease of access through initiatives such as new or improved infrastructure, plant and equipment, access to services and programs, or events with wellbeing outcomes

The initial successful projects under the Thriving Communities Program include \$36,000 for the Glencoe Woolshed Branch, National Trust towards construction of upgraded toilets including disabled toilet facilities, \$21,000 for Naracoorte District Men's Shed for stage two of its new engine shed and \$28,802 for the Millicent Golf Club for wheelchair and disabled access works.

Secretary of the National Trust Glencoe Woolshed Branch, Carol Grbich, was delighted to hear the grant application had been successful.

"It is absolutely fantastic, I've tried so hard to get money for the toilets" she said.

"There haven't been any public toilets in Glencoe apart from the woolshed ones.

"Everybody uses them and you can imagine the condition after 40 years.

"We've designed them already so we can start building them as soon as we get the money and as soon as we can find someone to do it."

A spokesperson for the Millicent Golf Club told the South Eastern Times that club president, Mark Pilmore, applied for the grant back in January and didn't think much more about it.

"The club currently has no disabled access from outside of the clubrooms," he said.

"This grant allows us to make all our clubroom areas accessible to wheelchair users and those with walkers.

"The grant focussed on disabled access and also building a deck out from the club for the enjoyment of patrons.

"It would be ideal to build a deck at the front of the clubhouse because of the natural scrub out there attracts the birdlife and the wildlife and to be able to have the enjoyment and take in the atmosphere of the natural environment."

The Thriving Regions Fund was a \$15 million commitment per year to support projects that enable regional industries to grow jobs and strengthen regional communities.

Minister for primary industries and regional development Clare Scriven said the successful projects will enable the provi-

sion of important infrastructure and services that enable local on the ground organisations to further contribute to their local communities.

"The State Government wants our regional communities to thrive through improved liveability, ability to attract and retain people to live and work, and to capitalise on growth potential

"Thriving Communities help create vibrant, resilient towns in which people want to live and participate, supporting, maintaining, and growing this important part of our state."

Eligible local community associations and registered charities are still able to apply for

grants ranging from \$20,000 to \$50,000 under the Thriving Communities Program until June 30, unless the full funding amount has been allocated beforehand.

Water cycle in spotlight

Students at Robe Primary School learned all about water and wastewater management recently as part of an interactive program led by SA Water.

The educational program, The Well, toured the South East, stopping Mundulla, Mount Gambier and Robe, to teach students how water is delivered from source to tap and what happens after it's flushed down the toilet.

SA Water's acting senior manager of brand, communications and media Kellie McDonald said it was important everyone understood the value of water and the role they play in protecting the essential service.

"The feedback we get from students taking part in our on-site and in-school activities is they love discovering the fascinating process of water treatment, and they always ask some great questions, such as 'How can water be recycled?'," she said.

"Using props and interactive discussion, we took students on the journey of water, providing a more technical look at water treatment, and encouraging students to think about their own responsible water use.'



Staff from SA Water visited Robe Primary School to teach students all about the water cycle.

Ms McDonald said students learned drinking water provided by SA Water was most commonly groundwater, water from the River Murray, or a combination of both.

"We aim to teach students to appreciate the enormous amount of work that goes into

making sure this safe, clean water is available when they turn on the tap and the environmental benefits of reusing treated

wastewater, which in South Australia is recycled for uses from toilet flushing to irrigating green open spaces," she said.

"Our education sessions are a fun way for students and teachers to discover valuable insights into water and wastewater processes, sustainability practices and how we deliver services every day to more than 1.7 million South Australians.'



Pool's now a prized site

Beachport's Pool of Siloam received national recognition recently as the site of the award winning video artwork Witness.

South Australian artist Ida Sophia won the prestigious \$100,000 Ramsay Art Prize with her 12 minute 12 second long video filmed in a single take at the lake in early spring 2022.

Eight crew members, including the artist, arrived at the site just before the sun rose and Witness was performed for about 30 minutes

"It was intensely cold," Ms Sophia said.

"We were prepared with wetsuits, blankets, hot tea, heaters in the car and a safety officer on site throughout the shoot, as hypothermia

"Working in the cold and in water can be very dangerous so we took precautions to ensure every member's safety.

"The pool was very beautiful, calm and still before dawn break.

"It felt special and the light that emerged as we began to shoot was worth getting up so early for.

Ms Sophia was born in Mount Gambier, lived there as a child and spent her childhood swimming in the lake.

At age seven, she moved to Adelaide.

The video is inspired by the artist's experience of witnessing her father's profound baptism in a Mount Gambier church at age eight.

Being invited to witness the moment had a deep impact on Ms Sophia as a child and her own devoutness.

The video begins with the artist being dunked in the lake by collaborating artist Michael Schaefer.

It grows in intensity as the underwater plunging continues, it is relentless, and the artist's exhaustion is felt as the work progress-

The constant camera movement by director of Photography, Claire Bishop, was created by fashioning a buoyant pillow for the camera to float on as she moved through the water towards the pair.

An underwater hydrophone and directional microphone were used to capture the natural sounds both above and below the water during the performance.

These recordings formed the foundation of the sound composition by the artist's husband, Joseph James Francis.

"I had a clear brief for the sound to make the viewer feel physically affected by the re-

"Joseph and I worked with the ideas and he used to great effect, the collected sounds, synthesisers, and samples to create an atmosphere that is so immersive and visceral.

Witness was conceived and developed during a residency at Post Office Projects in Port Adelaide in late 2021 and took about 12 months to complete.

"From there, I began writing grant applications, forming the crew, planning, testing and site visits to Beachport," Ms Sophia said.

"After the shoot, we had a period of post production editing and collaboration on the sound composition.

"The idea and the location choice were more or less simultaneous.

"I always knew it would be there.

"In my practice, I believe that every element of a work must be meaningful, so, locating the work at the Pool Of Siloam made sense both personally and conceptually to the idea."

Ms Sophia has been a practicing artist for five years and during this time has exhibited both nationally and internationally.

Through dedication to her career and studio practice the artist has embraced international training and mentorships including a period at The Marina Abramovic Institute in

Wattle Range Council is acknowledged in the film's credits but Chief Executive Officer Ben Gower and Mayor Des Noll were unaware of the project until the winner was announced.

'This whole thing came as a complete surprise to me, I had no knowledge of it at all but it is wonderful news," Mr Gower said.

Council approval to film at the site was applied for and approved in 2022 before filming

It aims to support and encourage contemporary Australian artists to make their best work at a pivotal moment in their career.

Witness can be viewed at The Art Gallery of South Australia as part of the Ramsay Art Prize exhibition until August 27.

Reliving historic team-up

Edenhope will recreate a historic moment this weekend.

Some 35 years ago, an Indigenous team came to Edenhope to re-enact the journey of the first XI Aboriginal cricket team.

John McGuire Captain of the 1988 Cricket team has requested his team from all over Australia return to the "birthplace" of the first Aboriginal Cricket team of 1868 for what could be their last visit. Edenhope are hosting their Cricket Reunion this June long weekend.

The story begins at Bringalbert with Tom Hamilton initiating his all-round sportsman skills to teach the Aboriginal men at the station to play cricket.

This became a social event for the district. He bought his team to Edenhope to play against the Edenhope Cricket Club (1862) on the shores of Lake Wallace Edenhope at the request of William Hayman, the manager of Lake Wallace Station.

It was the beginning of the most memorable moment in Australia's cricketing history, leaving Edenhope to journey through Kadnook onto Queenscliff to play in the UK.

This weekend, there will be an opening of a new Museum to honour the Edenhope Cricket history dating back to its formation in 1862, along with the recognition of the 1988 team and their Kowree President's XI opponents who were skilled cricketers from the district.

The Kowree Presidents XI's were from Hamilton, Yahl, Millicent Casterton, Bordertown, Naracoorte, Penola, Netherby, Nhill, Edenhope, Noradjuha and Dimboola.

From Penola was Steven Skeer and from Furner was Dale Bateman.

Although much older, every member of this team have been found and invited to the reunion. There will be a tribute to the deceased members of both teams at the dinner Saturday

The aim of Edenhope museum is to en-

Southern rock lobster fee discount to end

Fee relief for southern rock lobster fishermen will come to an end this financial year with the State Government stating it will not continue.

Minister for Primary Industries Clare Scriven has confirmed the one-year 50 per cent fee relief would not roll over to the 2023/2024 financial year despite China still banning im-

Ms Scriven said it was clear from the beginning the fee relief was one for one year which was announced prior to last year's State elec-

"The notifications have gone out which went to all license holders," Ms Scriven said.

"I do not think this will be a surprise to anyone as it was only ever envisaged as a one-year relation program.'

She said so far she had received "one or two" pieces of correspondence about the fee relief, both of which asked whether it would continue.

"It has had very welcome feedback but we are cautiously optimistic that the trade issues with China will be resolved in the near future with the Federal Trade Minister Don Farrell remaining in negotiations," Ms Scriven said.

"There is certainly a lot of positivity there, especially around the fact that the timber imports were now back to China with the limitations being lifted."

She said she hoped the same future was in store for the southern rock lobster industry, claiming she believes the industry's future was looking good.

"There is still high demand for a very high quality product which is work renown here in the Limestone Coast," Ms Scriven said.

"I think the future of the industry is good notwithstanding the fact there are still large challenges at the moment."

Unique learning for school

For several years Rendelsham Primary School (RPS) students have experienced their learning in an outdoor classroom each week.

Scrub Day was a regular part of the preschoolers curriculum until four years ago when the junior primary students were included in the day and it is now an integral part of the school's program.

The group eagerly walk to the nearby scrub plot each Thursday morning during term two and three and return to school at around 2.30pm.

During the walk they take turns to transport supplies for the day and carry their own backpacks.

The children have made a map of their journey which names landmarks and places of interest along the way.

For an eight week period, First Nations Elder and Boandik educator, Aunty Michelle Jacquelin-Furr joins the students for Scrub Day in the morning before returning to the school and spending the afternoon with the upper primary students.

At Scrub Day students gather around the campfire site they have built and discuss the day ahead.

They welcome Aunty Michelle and other guests before enjoying a brief respite called sit time.

During sit time, students listen to the sounds around them, notice the small things nearby or create things from the items they find, while remaining silent.

Once sit time is over, and their experience shared with each other, active work begins.

Some students explore the bush and others work on their cubbies created over many weeks and sometimes years.

Students look for bugs and insects, two young girls assist Aunty Michelle in making a net while others collect wood to help with the fire that will cook everyone's lunch - baked potatoes.

RPS teacher Sally Gower said the children learn to risk take and assess that risk themselves, with life skills organically evolving from their engagement during Scrub Day.

"We are very blessed, they love it, it's that freedom of being able to explore uninterrupted and problem solve," she said

"They get to be in nature and use real tools.

"They learn to respect what they can take from nature to support them build their cubbies.



On arrival at their camp site on Scrub Day the children discuss the day's activities.

"We do potion making, we cook on the fire, it's just lovely to be out in nature.

"We are very lucky to have this opportunity, it brings us so much joy."

The children were happy to share their favourite things about Scrub Day.

"I like to come out to scrub, I saw a slug,' Finn said.

"I have another favourite thing, I can find bugs."

Audrey has been working on a cubby site

for many months.
"I like building cubbies with my friends out

of tarps, ropes and nature," she said.
"One of the best things was challenging myself to climb trees, I used to be quite scared

I was going to fall.

"It was hard but I ended up doing it."

Jack is helpful when it comes to keeping the fire going for lunch

"I don't know how to start the fire but I know how to rub the sticks together," he said.

"I like playing in the scrub, climbing trees and using saws and shovels."

Aunty Michelle usually delivers a whole school eight week programme she has developed called 'Annie's story - Living on Boandik country' but after discussion with the RPS teachers the programme has developed into something different.

"This method of delivering cultural teaching for the eight weeks has been unique," she said

"The teachers gave ideas and suggestions which have turned the programme on its head.

"I now have a routine which includes weaving, story telling, sharing rules and law of the land.

"Foods Aboriginal people ate then and comparing them to foods eaten now, fire making, making hides, discussing songlines, dancing and ceremony, Boandik counting, making string and medicines."

Aunty Michelle's last week of the program will be held at Honan's Reserve, Glencoe where she will meet with all RPS students and teachers.



The reserve is the closest thing to the Boandik's natural scrub before colonisation.

During the outing the children and teachers have agreed to only bring the kind of foods the Boandik would have eaten.

Ms Gower praised the program.

"It's been wonderful having Aunty Michelle with us because she has integrated how the Boandik would have used the land, and how similar it is for us and what we are doing."

Parents urged to get kids the flu jab

Parents are being urged to vaccinate their children against the flu with figures revealing only 14 per cent of eligible kids having had the jab.

A new SA Health campaign 'Stop the fluvaccination for children six months to under five years' has begun hoping to increase the take-up of the vaccine for the key age group.

The flu vaccine is free for children aged six months to five years or a child six months and older with certain medical conditions.

So far there have been 576 cases of the flu in children aged between six months and five years with last year totaling 1556.

According to the State Government, 33 per cent received the vaccine in 2021 and 38 per cent received it in 2022.

Latest figures announce there have been 3970 cases of the flu reported in South Australia this year with 413 people requiring hospital admission and one death.

Through the National Immunisation Program, the flu vaccine is free for people aged six months and over with certain medical risk factors, all children aged six months to less than five years and all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged six months and over.

It is also available for free for people aged

65 years and over, pregnant women, adults and children who are experiencing homelessness.

A Fresh Take on Kedgeree

Serves: 4

Ingredients

- 4 large eggs
- 3 fillets (about 350g) snapper (or whatever fish you fancy)
- 2 cups milk
- 1 tsp black peppercorns
- 2 bay leaves
- 2 tbsp extra virgin olive oil

- 2 cloves garlic
- 1 tbsp grated fresh ginger
- 1 tbsp curry powder
- 1 leek, finely sliced
- 450g packet cooked brown rice (or use leftover cooked brown rice that has been kept in the fridge)
- 1 cup frozen green peas
- Handful of fresh coriander (or parsley if you prefer), washed and roughly chopped
- 2 green onions, sliced

Method:

- Place the eggs in a saucepan, cover with water and simmer for 8 minutes to hard boil. Drain, pour over cold water and when cool enough to handle peel and quarter. Set aside.
- 2. Meanwhile place the fish in a frying pan and cover with the milk. Add the peppercorns and bay leave. Bring to a simmer, cover with a lid and cook for about 5 minutes (depending on thickness of fillets) or until the fish is cooked through. Remove the fish from the pan, take off and discard the skin and roughly flake the flesh leaving in nice bite sized chunks, removing any bones. Remove the peppercorns and bay leaves from the milk, reserving the milk.
- 3. Wipe out the frying pan and heat the

- extra virgin olive oil. Add the garlic ginger and curry powder. Stir for 30 seconds or so until fragrant. Add the leek to the pan and sauté for a couple of minutes to soften, taking care not to let it burn.
- 4. Add the rice to the pan and stir through to cover with the spice mix. Pour in about half of the milk and cook for a few minutes until the rice absorbs most of the milk. Add a little more if it dries out.
- 5. Add the peas to the pan and stir through, cooking until heated through. Add the fish along the fresh coriander and gently stir through. Season to taste.
- 6. Spoon into warmed bowls and top each bowl with a quartered egg and scatter with the green onions.

Chicken and cashew curry

Prep time: 10 minutes Cook time: 30 minutes Serves: 3

30g NUTS PER SERVE

Ingredients

- 4 tsp curry powder
- 1 tsp garam masala1 tbsp olive oil
- 5 cloves garlic (20g)

- 1 red onion, diced (125g)
- 2 red chilli (5g)
- 1 tomato, diced (100g)
- 1 stalk lemongrass (tender base only, 10g)
- 1/4 cup coconut milk (100g)
- 1 cup water
- ¹⁄4 tsp salt
- ¼ tsp pepper
- 90g cashew, soaked
- 350g chicken thigh, diced

Method:

- 1. Rub 2 tsp curry powder and salt into the chicken and set aside.
- Blend garlic, onion, tomato, lemongrass and chilli in a blender until a smooth paste is formed
- 3. Heat olive oil in a medium saucepan. Cook blended mixture, remaining curry powder and garam masala over low heat. Stir constantly, cook until fragrant, about 5 minutes.
- 4. Add chicken and cook for about 2 minutes.
- 5. Add cashews and water. Allow to simmer over low heat for 20 minutes. Stir occasionally.
- 6. Add coconut milk, stir, and allow to come to a boil. Turn off the heat as soon as it boils.
- 7. Serve hot with white rice and papadums on the side.

Tips & Hints

 You can soak cashews in warm water for 20 minutes to soften the nuts and allow for better absorption of flavours.

Wages score another rise

Minimum wages in Australia will see another increase effective immediately from July 1 this year according to the Fair Work Commission.

The increase now puts wages at \$23.23 per hour nationally, while award wages will also be affected with a 5.75 per cent increase.

Shop, Distributive and Allied Employees Association (SDA) secretary Josh Peak said the increase would be "critical" mostly to many retail and fast food workers.

Other industries Mr Peak said would benefit from this increase included disability, aged care and early learning.

"Over the past year, skyrocketing inflation has meant that many workers have struggled to pay their bills and put food on the table," Mr Peak said.

"It's a welcome relief for millions of workers across the country and it will help keep them and their families afloat as inflation remains high.

"Many essential workers are among the lowest paid in Australia and this increase ensures they're fairly recognised for the important work they do.

"Many businesses have posted record profits this year, they can afford to pass this wage increase onto workers."

Mr Peak said although it was a welcome change to a much needed area of improvement, the wage increase only affected one in four workers in reality.

He said to ensure every worker had their fair share, the SDA was currently negotiating to find the best possible outcome for all Australian wages.

"There are many workers who are facing the same cost of living pressures but don't know when their next pay rise will come," he said.

"The SDA is currently negotiating Agreements at a number of major retailers and pushing for them to guarantee strong increases this year and into the future so these workers don't miss out."

Other changes to the wages include a 15 per cent increase for workers of the aged care sector and an increase of 11 per cent, up from 10.5 per cent, for superannuation guarantee rates.

'Common sense' reminder to reduce house fire risk

The Metropolitan Fire Service (MFS) is reminding people to stay vigilant to prevent house fires this winter as part of Home Fire Safety Week.

MFS Mount Gambier station officer Adrian Puust said house fires are often preventable by being proactive in testing smoke detectors and making sure heaters are well maintained.

"Make sure you don't have any furniture or clothing too close to the heater itself, especially during winter if you're trying to dry clothes," he said.

"If your smoke detector is more than 10 years old, replace it.

"All common sense stuff, but we all need reminding on it and sometimes we just get busy and put off doing maintenance and checking heating equipment."

Mr Puust said even something as simple

as regularly cleaning the lint trap in the tumble dryer could prevent a future house fire.

"We need to be a bit more diligent as householders and make sure our houses are safe because we can prevent most fires," he said.

"When someone has a house fire, even a minor fire, all the soft furnishings will need to be cleaned or replaced, they can be without a house for several weeks, if not months.

"And I'm talking up to 18 months if it's a significant fire, especially with builders being so busy."

Mr Puust recommended other actions to help prevent house fires including cleaning out the flue for combustion heaters, not leaving electric blankets on all night, and stocking up on extra blankets to avoid using heaters overnight.

Diversity has kept the car relevant to the market, with a sedan, coupe, wagon and convertible available, along with various powertrains, including the sledgehammer 500kW AMG C 63 S 4MATIC+.

It all comes together in a heady, amazing mix of style and technology which will take your breath away.

So could the price -- up to \$15,000 more than the previous model.

Prices start from \$78,900 for the C 200

Our test vehicle, the more expensive, more powerful C 300 sedan, is priced from \$90,400 plus on-roads.

But that's not the end of the story with a mind-boggling list of options and -- just quietly -- not many Benzes leave the dealership without at least some of the boxes ticked.

The process can see the price of the car rise quickly and dramatically -- none are strictly necessary, however.

The test car was fitted with the \$3800 Vision Pack plus Cavansite Blue Metallica paint at \$1600, taking the price to \$98,900.

The pack adds a sunroof, seat memory and heating, head-up display, traffic sign recognition and augmented reality for navigation.

Once upon a time, C-Class came with a choice of classic or dynamic styles, with a different radiator grille to match.

Now the AMG Line exterior package is standard and comes with a body kit and bold new diamond grille with star design in chrome (little Benz three-pointed stars).

LED headlights include headlight assist and adaptive high beam, while the optional digital light package uses 1.3 million micromirrors per headlight for extremely highdefinition output.

The rear-end features new tail lights with a two-piece design, with light functions divided between the outside and boot-lid lights.

Three optional new paint finishes - Spectral Blue, High-Tech Silver and Opalite White - have been added to the colour palette.

The instrument panel has become a freestanding, 12.3-inch high-resolution that sits behind the wheel, with a variety of colours and configurations from which to choose.

Australian models reportedly benefit from a higher level of standard equipment, including a number of features that were previously unavailable or optional.

Features include AMG Line exterior and interior packages, 11.9-inch central media display, 360-degree camera, keyless entry and start with automatic powered boot closing, front centre airbag, fingerprint scanner and active safety systems including adaptive cruise control.

C 300 adds a more powerful drivetrain, with full leather trim, larger 19-inch AMG multi-spoke two-colour alloys and rear pri-

Inside there's sporty AMG Line trim and floor mats, plus 64-colour ambient lighting, an illuminated front door sill with 'Mercedes-Benz' lettering, keyless entry and start and dual-zone climate control.

C-Class is covered by a 5-year unlimited kilometre warranty.

Service is due every 12 months or 25,000km and the first five years will set you back \$5200.

The second-generation Mercedes-Benz User eXperience (MBUX) infotainment system is a stunner, fronted by an 11.9-inch, portrait-style touchscreen.



The Benz C-Class is the shining light of the range.

It includes Bluetooth, voice recognition, built-in navigation, AM/FM and DAB+ digital radio, plus wireless Apple CarPlay and Android Auto.

When following the navigation, a forwardfacing camera creates an augmented view on the centre screen, which is basically video of the road ahead with an arrow superimposed

The display includes an ergonomically placed fingerprint scanner for secure and easy access to different profiles.

You can also access the infotainment system via a console-mounted touchpad, or track pads embedded in the multi-function sports-styled steering wheel.

There are two USB-C ports in the centre console and another at the bottom of the dashboard next to the wireless charging pad but none in the back.

There's no mention of the audio system, either in the sales brochure, specifications or technical data.

Guess it's generic or perhaps another victim of the global components' shortage.

At this price, you'd expect and demand a

Entry C 200 is powered by a 150kW 1 .5-litre turbo hybrid.

C 300 gets a larger more powerful turbocharged petrol engine together with an electric motor/48-volt starter-generator, sandwiched between the engine and transmission that provides up to 15kW and 200Nm at low speeds.

The hybrid system is designed to provide assistance at low engine speeds and to provide significant fuel savings, but it cannot be driven in electric-only mode.

It's paired with a nine-speed automatic transmission and delivers 190kW of power at 5800 rpm and 400Nm of torque between 2000 and 3200 rpm, with overboot providing an extra 20kW briefly.

A comprehensive standard safety suite includes 10 airbags, including a centre-front airbag for the first time.

Autonomous emergency braking (Car-to-Car, Vulnerable Road User, Junction Assist and Backover) as well as a lane support system with lane keep assist (LKA), lane departure warning (LDW) and emergency lane keeping (ELK), and an advanced speed assistance system (SAS) are standard.

There's also adaptive cruise control, drowsiness monitoring, a 360-degree camera and active parking assistance with park sensors.

At 4793mm in length, the C-Class is 107mm longer than before, with a 25mm longer wheelbase, which in theory means more room inside.

Drive is to the rear wheels, with paddle shifts, auto engine stop-start and four drives modes available.

The dash from 0 to 100km/h takes a brisk

It takes the good stuff too, premium 98 unleaded, with fuel consumption a claimed

The interior of the C-Class is a masterclass in style and technology.

There are elements of the old, the in-between and the new emerging age.

The eye-catching Tesla-style vertically mounted touchscreen flows seamlessly into the centre console.

Did I say eye-catching?

If it wasn't for the second smaller screen that replaces a conventional instrument panel, it would dominate the cabin

At night the whole thing lights up like a Christmas tree.

In fact, it could be a little too over-the-top, especially for techno-challenged post millennials. It could do with an off switch.

Touch sensitive controls (they're found everywhere) are tricky to operate and functions can be difficult to find -- the trip computer is a case in point.

The column-mounted gear lever is something of a throwback, but it's easy to operate and paves the way for the clutter-free console.

At the same time, we were left wondering hat would happen if one accidentally se lected reverse while driving, thinking it was the indicator stalk?

We weren't game to find out (but there must be some kind of lockout).

The back seat is deep and inviting, but is surprisingly lacking for legroom, even though this model has a slightly longer wheelbase.

Those in the back get air vents and a fold down centre armrest, but little else to speak of -- charge ports would be nice?

The boot is a good size at 455 litres and has a power operated boot lid.

Arriving home for the first time the car slammed on the brakes, believing we were about to run into the back of the car already in the driveway.

We must have been going a little too quickly for the system -- it scared the bejesus



A button at the end of the gear lever puts the car into Park, but it's not clear whether this engages the electric parking brake -- the indicator comes on only when you turn off

Back on the road, the drive experience is cruisy and comfortable, apart from some tyre noise and tyre slap from time to time depending on the road surface.

Choosing the appropriate drive mode is accomplished via a toggle to the left and below the touchscreen air controls.

Sport and Sport+ amp up the drive experience, but the transmission dozes off and tends to lag when you ask it the question, as it drops down a gear or two.

This was especially obvious when it came to overtaking.

Punch the accelerator and the car fails to respond immediately and it becomes necessary to pull back in again.

A switch to manual mode and using the shift paddles to change gears rectifies this situation.

Although the suspension has been lowered, it's still a bit soft and bouncy to be called really sporty and bottoms out easily.

The steering is nicely weighted but the brakes are over sensitive.

Just a dab is required.

Applying what we consider a normal amount of pressure elicits an abrupt re-

Overall, it is a car better suited to touring than race tracks and that is exactly what it is designed to be.

In terms of fuel consumption, we were getting a long term 12.0L/100km after more than 900km and 8.2L in the short term -- nowhere near the 7.3L promised.

A tyre repair kit is provided in lieu of a spare

It's good, but all that glitters isn't necessarily

There's no physical volume knob, no-name audio and navigating the infotainment system can be a challenge - especially underway. The engine is a bit disappointing too, both

in terms of performance and fuel consump-

For this kind of money, the C 300 needs to tick all the boxes - and frankly it doesn't.

Small school fish abound

Wild weather dominated last week, but perfect timing saw favourable fishing conditions over the weekend, with the wind and sea finally settling down.

Charter boats and a couple of small boats did battle through the wind and swell last week chasing tuna out off Port MacDonnell.

The barrels were hard to find, but a combination of a full moon and a huge swell will often slow them down.

One positive though, the smaller school fish around the 12 to $15 \, \text{kg}$ range have turned up in big numbers.

I would almost suggest the majority of fishos prefer catching these smaller fish because there is less chance of breaking your back.

As the sea began to settle down from Friday, the bigger fish started to fire up.

I am not sure of exact numbers, but know of half a dozen or so up around the 100kg mark boated.

The kelp beds down to the East are still fishing well for school shark and gummys.

The seven gill shark can be a bit of a nuisance at times though.

Some guys are only using burley as a last resort so as not to attract them – a bit of a Catch 22 situation.

The South East Amateur Surf Fishing Club kicked off its winter season Saturday night and what a competition it turned out to be.

Nathan Thomas took out first prize with a ripper school shark that went 15.83kg.

Second place went to Aung Mo with a lovely 6.305kg gummy.

A good number of salmon to 2kg were also

weighed in.

Our winter run of salmon over the last few

years has been ordinary to say the least. This season thankfully has been exceptional, with all the usual hot spots fishing well.

The Beachport Salmon Hole, Canunda, Cape Banks and Nene Valley are all producing the goods.

The water was still fairly stirred up over the weekend after the coast was slammed by the big swell mid-week but we still saw good numbers of big garfish caught.

Livingstons fished well as did Hut Bay.

I think the boaties proved more successful than those wading because they could get out that little bit further and find clearer water.

Young Mitch Millard fished Hut Bay for a couple of hours on Sunday and bagged an impressive catch of big fat winter gar.

Winter is our prime time for big garfish in the Southeast when you fish the right conditions.

The Glenelg River saw good numbers of estuary perch caught right throughout the river all last week, but a crashing barometer shut

them right down on Sunday.

These fish are very barometer sensitive, but the switched-on angler uses that to their advantage.

Look out for a rising or steady high and the fish should be more cooperative.

Shane Murrell had a good session of the mulloway Saturday night, boating three lovely fish on squid to just over a metre.

Dry Creek through to Sandy still seems to be the most consistent area.

A couple of decent fish were also boated on trolled lures just below Sandy on Sunday arvo.

Looking at our long weekend weather forecast it is all over the place.

With predominately northerly winds fore-

cast, it has potential.

Stay safe and we will catch you next week.

Runner-up in Seniors was John Leach and local Bruce Oakley from Dartmoor finished in third position.

South East Member Ron Rhook shot 178/200 to take out the Veterans category from Rob Shawyer and Eddy Magee.

The Masters Category was won by the experienced John Torresan with 156/200, with runners-up Pros Van Der Zalm and Daryl Mawson

Ben Hastings is a third generation shooter from South East Field and Game and used his pedigree to score 159/200 and claim the Junior championship from promising young Adelaide shooter Jimmy Papaioannou, with Tyler Brown in third.

Renae Birgan, the 2018 Ladies FITASC world champion, shot 172/200 to claim the Ladies title over Bianca Norris and Janette Densley.

"The event at Burrungule Park was as close you can get to shooting English Sporting in England." Birgan commented after the event.

"It was a flawlessly run event from the office, target presentations and canteen, by a group of dedicated volunteers.

"You Guys nailed it and should be really proud of the event you created."

A Grade was claimed by Max Colenso scoring 159/200 from Daniel Torresan and South East local Tim Lloyd.

Malcolm Price took out the B Grade with 162/200 from Rohann Stebbings from Tasmania and Jody Wallace in third.


