Options explored

Wattle Range Council's move to close the Millicent saleyards came after all other options were exhausted, according to chief executive Ben Gower.

During the ordinary council meeting on

Tuesday, June 13, elected members voted to close the Millicent saleyards.

The decision did not come lightly, with councillors debating the motion at length before coming to the vote.

Following the meeting, Mr Gower said the decision has been brewing in the seven years

he has been with council, but earlier reports suggested it was on the cards for much longer.

"We found an annual report from 2004, I think it was, where we had 28,000 stock sold through the yards that year," he said.

"In the intervening 15 year period, it has plummeted and it's been in steady

decline ever since.

"We have explored absolutely everything."

Mr Gower said council's recent public survey asking whether the yards should remain open or not did not make the decision any easier.

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New life for Davidson Cottage

In association with State Heritage, Penola's branch of National Trust SA has developed a mobile phone app called SA Heritage, to enable people to learn more about historic sites within Penola on self guided tours.

The following is one of the subjects from this app.

Davidson Cottage

Sharam Cottage was the only building in Petticoat Lane when in 1861 Peter and Isabella Davidson purchased this property from Alexander Cameron and with their son John a carpenter, built this cottage with pit-sawn timber and a shingle roof.

Between 1889 and 1895 Petticoat Lane was a dead-end street with a lane-way in front of this cottage which was leased to the Anglican Church as a Rectory for 40 pounds per annum. Reverend Teape, whose description of Petticoat Lane is quoted in the interpretation sign at the entrance to the Petticoat Lane was the first of the Rectors to live here.

The cottage became a ruin in the 1970s and was used as a horse stable until Penola Branch of the National Trust of South Australia purchased the property in 1987.

At the time of renovation a surprising number of old wine bottles were recovered from the old well. Also collected and now held by the National Trust were many small items including old nails, fragments of glass, porcelain, plastic, leather, wood and bone.

This building is now leased and used as Bed & Breakfast accommodation.

Community comes together for redevelopment

In 1992 community and business donations to the Millicent Hospital contributed to the then renovation of the hospital's palliative care room.

31 years later room 12C has undergone a major redevelopment, largely due again to support from local community groups and individuals.

The renamed family room was officially opened last Friday afternoon and more than 20 people representing various community groups had the opportunity to tour the new facility.

Millicent Hospital's Executive Officer and Director of Nursing and Midwifery Michelle de Wit greeted those in attendance.

"Today wouldn't be happening without all of you around this room" she said.

"You've been supportive of the health service for a very long time and we continue to appreciate your efforts to support us provide the best care we can and the best environment we can.

"We know palliative care can go on for a very long time and we wanted to freshen the room and give it a more family approach."

The redevelopment has included a totally refitted bathroom which is now fully accessible for those with disability.

Generous donations meant the redevelopment could include higher end products including the \$7,000 king single bed and an almost \$1,800 reclining high lift chair for patient use.

"The bed is a bit larger than our other beds and it provides much more functionality" Ms de Wit said.

"We can change it into multiple positions more easily and it's completely electric so removes that risk for staff as well.

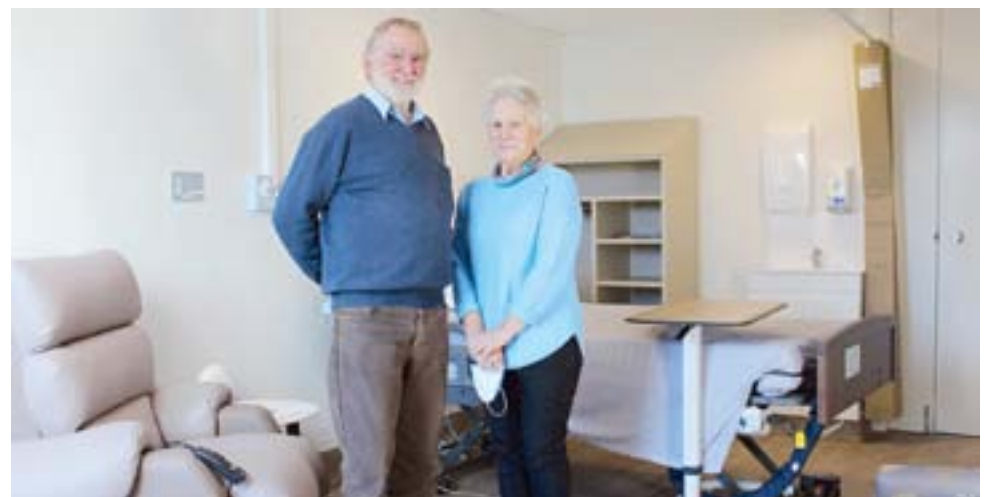
"We have also got an attenuating full air mattress which is a pressure injury prevention device.

"That is going to be fabulous for people who may be more bed bound than others."

Another major change to the remodel has been relocating access to the courtyard from inside the bathroom to the main room.

This now allows a view, and direct access, to the courtyard which includes a Lake McIntyre inspired mural painted by Peter Dunn.

for the courtyard have been purchased with donations and an existing park bench was restored by residents of the Mount Gambier prison.

Other additions to the room are a sofa bed, bedroom sink that includes a vanity and open shelving for ease of access.

Acknowledging those who contributed to the project Ms de Wit said

"It's been a significant amount of money the community have provided to support this space."

It has taken years of planning and work for the room to be completed and Ms de Wit is already looking toward the next possible projects.

"There is some work in Sheoak that we

would love to do but that will need significant planning and funding, so we will be working on that progressively.

"We would like to move our pharmacy for acute into a much better location, so that potentially is the one that will be next but we will wait and see.

"I've always got things I would like to do but it is just a matter of being able to do them and having the funding."

Donations for the new family room redevelopment were provided by Millicent Country Women's Association, Kevin and Toni McGrath, Millicent Cancer Support Group, Evening Ladies Auxiliary, Wattle Range Ladies Auxiliary, Give Me 5 For Kids (Triple M), Matthews family and Millicent Senior Citizens Club.

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Call out for new members

Although primarily thought of as a business association the group is encouraging community organisations to consider involvement as well.

The possibility of shifting focus and direction of the MBCA will be raised at the meeting.

The association has successfully been the auspicing body for the Imagine Millicent Arts Group (IMAG) since its inception in 2017.

Auspicing IMAG has allowed the arts group to apply for and receive local and state grant funding under the MBCA banner.

This partnership has seen several success-

ful public art projects implemented throughout Millicent and is a model that could be offered to other groups seeking similar support.

An expectation would be that groups would contribute two members to the current committee.

Co-chair of the MBCA committee, Fiona Telfer, said the committee is in desperate need of new members to keep it active.

"Without them, we may be forced to recess the committee," she said.

"The MBCA has been a crucial player in

promoting the growth of our business community, and we have accomplished a great deal over the years.

"However, our current membership numbers have dwindled.

"We understand that everyone is busy, but even a small commitment of time and energy can make a significant impact."

Ms Telfer has drafted a calendar of events for the next 12 months which includes four workshop training sessions free for members.

Details are still being finalised but sessions

include cyber security, business accounting, business branding, and staff motivation and engagement.

It is planned these workshops will proceed with the support of Wattle Range Council even if a MBCA committee is not formed.

All positions will be declared vacant at the upcoming AGM with new committee members needed if the association is to continue.

Interested parties are welcome and encouraged to attend the AGM, 7pm on Wednesday, July 5 in the Grand Hotel Breakfast Room.

You can help Millicent community radio

Millicent's community radio station continues to go from strength to strength since a new board was installed late last year but they still face hurdles to get back on air.

Since taking control of the station in November current committee members discovered substantial debts.

They have worked with several agencies to see many of these debts waived or heavily discounted. An existing debt of almost \$20,000 to Broadcast Australia is one that needs to be paid before the station can regain their license to broadcast from the Mount Burr transmitter owned by the company.

On discovering the total of the most recent debt the station reached out to the community for donations to help pay it down.

Community money was received but it is not coming in as fast as organisers would like to see to get the station back on air.

This has led to chair of 5the FM, David Walshaw, starting a GoFundMe campaign to help retire the outstanding debt.

"When we took back the station it had no members, it had lost its sponsors and presenters and had accrued significant debt," he said.

"Much of the financial records, corporate

history and station equipment is still currently unaccounted for.

"Since the loss of the broadcast license, we have only been able to stream our content through the internet, and this medium has kept our online presenters' skills honed for when we can commence broadcasting again.

"We have applied to the Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA) for a temporary broadcast license and a component of that license has now been approved.

"We are desperate to crowdfund so that we can retire the debt and get our radio station back up and running."

5the FM now has their their link license from ACMA approved which allows transmission from the Railway Terrace station to Mount Burr.

"We've got the link frequency which they told us could be up to seven months, but we have worked with them closely and have got that sooner rather than later.

"We are still waiting for the temporary broadcast license which is the frequency that transmits from Mount Burr.

"I'm thinking in your heart of hearts they wouldn't give you a link frequency if they weren't going to give you a main broadcast

frequency.

"I'm optimistic we might hear back in the next week or so about the license.

"We hope they have listened to some of our streams to see the quality of content going to air."

The current committee has built its membership base up to 120 members.

The single on-air presenter at the time of the takeover has now been joined by 11 others who regularly host weekly shows streamed online.

\$10 memberships are now due and Mr Walshaw urges the community to show their support by signing up.

"That support goes a long way but we are noticing many people are giving us \$50 and sometimes \$100 so that's been really good.

Meanwhile further fundraising plans are in motion with the station's programming committee working toward a major event in November.

"We have written to Kasey Chambers to see if she is going to be in the South East or could get to the South East in November and make a cameo appearance for us."

Donations can be made direct to 5the FM community radio station or through the GoFundMe website.

"If you look at the survey responses, and while technically it was 52 to 48 in favour of keeping it open, when you remove the potential six duplicates that came through, it was a dead even 50-50," he said.

"I think we will have elements of the community, as we saw through the survey results, will be happy because they personally thought it should have closed years ago.

"And we'll have other elements of the community who will be upset at seeing it closed, so I think you're going to get a lot of mixed responses."

He said the next step is to look to wrapping up operations at the yards.

"We'll have to work with the EPA because we will still need to monitor the wastewater and effluent management system for quite a period of time, I would imagine," he said.

"We'll have to work with the agents for some type of farewell, for a 50 year icon in the district and make sure everybody gets a chance to grieve or at least acknowledge the significant contribution the yards have made to farming.

"What happens after that, whether it gets sold or repurposed for something else, that will come with time."

Memories of George St

In a unique project to capture local history before it is lost community members are invited to attend an informal monthly gathering at the South East Family History Group (SEFHG).

Local researcher Colleen Hammat is keen for the event to become a regular on the social calendar with a different theme discussed each month.

The first event is scheduled for Tuesday July 11th and 1.30pm at the SEFHG with the theme of local businesses.

People who worked in George Street or other local businesses during the 1950s and 1960s in Millicent are invited to share their memories to help build on current knowledge.

"I'm encouraging people to come along and share their stories," Ms Hammat said.

"Memories of working in local businesses or owners of businesses, or even customers who can remember things like Eudunda's flying fox or what they used to do at work.

"Stores like Munyard and Brown or Gil-

pins, which is now where the Stellar Super Mart store is.

"All the women who worked at Gilpins used to wear black and white.

"We will start off in that era but then the next one might be weddings or courtings and engagements or the local dances.

"Where they went to, what they did and how they got there.

"We previously interviewed Lorna Watts who talked about going to the dances at Nangula and how they had to walk through mud.

"Lorna used to take her shoes in a sugar bag on the back of a horse and buggy because the roads were so muddy.

"Hearing people's stories before the memories are lost is so important."

Ms Hammat hopes to record the meetings and transcribe parts so it will be another source of local family history.

"I don't think anyone has done it like this before."

All are invited to attend the free afternoon.

Promoting mental health

Having the courage to speak up and seek help with mental health was the main message from Naked Farmer Ben Brooksby's visit to Penola High School.

Mr Brooksby spoke to Penola students on Wednesday morning about his experiences with anxiety, his work as The Naked Farmer, and the importance of talking to someone.

He said coming to schools and encouraging young people to speak up was something he is very passionate about.

"Coming to schools, it's an important part to my mission because I believe that, not fixing the mental health problem, but helping combat the issue is about educating our kids," he said.

"They're the next generation coming through and it stems from the kids, they go home and talk to their parents and grandparents.

"It really helps make that change and the change in talking about mental health in the home."

Mr Brooksby said it was important to normalise conversations around mental health with students as they would be parents themselves one day and will be more easily able to discuss it with their families.

"It's one of my favourite things to do, to come to a school and talk, because I know the impact it's going to have in the longterm will compound on itself," he said.

"It's about bringing that normality to it and that conversation around mental health for generations to come."

During his presentation to the students, Mr Brooksby was joined by Stevie Judd, who grew up on a farm in the region and has featured in a number of The Naked Farmer projects.

Ms Judd brought many in the audience to tears with her experiences with mental health growing up and reinforced the message that seeking help is vital, especially for young people.

"Definitely just trying to get it out there so people can not feel like they're off in their own boat, we can be in the same one whether it's a yacht or a dinghy," she said.

"Just make it normal, let it be spoken about."

She said one of the best, most simple things people can do is learn to just have a good cry.

"Whether it's only for a couple of minutes or what, it just releases," she said.

"Your body has a thing of holding onto trauma and crying is a great way of getting rid of it.

"You can feel the knots in your gut and the lump in your throat, but it will ease."

Wattle Range Council budget released for consultation

Wattle Range Council (WRC) has released its draft Annual Business Plan and Budget for community consultation.

The draft budget proposes a 7.9 per cent increase in council rates, in line with Adelaide's Consumer Price Index (CPI).

WRC chief executive Ben Gower said he did not expect a positive reaction to that number, but it was necessary to keep council's essential services running long-term.

"The major driver was probably looking at our long-term financial plan which was adopted at the last council meeting," Mr Gower said.

"That was linked to the ESCOSA [Essential Services Commission of South Australia] report we received earlier in the year about our long-term financial sustainability."

Mr Gower said council has averaged two per cent below CPI over the last five years, but that was not sustainable.

"We've had to at least match CPI and our long-term financial forecasting suggests we're going to need to maintain CPI, plus one or two per cent, for the next several years to catch up on that five year leaning period," he said.

"It's a large-ish number, but that's where inflation is sitting at the moment and sadly we can't control inflation."

He reminded the community that the

proposed budget is a draft and encouraged people to have their say on any changes they wanted to see.

"We'll be using our Engage Wattle Range consultation platform, so there will be QR codes and websites and Facebook links to all of that where you can have your say," he said.

"You can come along to any of the budget review meetings - we do have a meeting scheduled in early July for the community.

"Local Government Act allocates a minimum of one hour, but we'll go as long as we need to with as many community mem-

bers as want to come along to ask questions, voice your opinions, all those types of things."

Consultation on the draft budget is open until Thursday, July 6.

Council is expected to adopt the budget during its July meeting.

Players' sights set on play

The Penola Players will continue with Ulrich Grey-Smith taking over the role of president.

"The Penola Players will celebrate its 75th anniversary in 2025 and although it has been down a little bit lately I do think we have it in us," Mr Grey-Smith said.

He said there had been a lot of people in the group's productions over the years with Rymill Hall still home to 70 years worth of costumes.

"We are hoping to keep it going and we are still standing, which is a good way to look at it," he said.

Mr Grey-Smith said there were a number of local plays which he was interested in producing but was focused on finding a good calendar time to host it.

"There are also life memberships to celebrate as well and I am meeting people in Kalangadoo who have also written a murder mystery play recently which we will probably help with," he said.

"We are hoping to get one in this year but we will have to recruit membership as there are a lot of interested people who will come back."

He said he was first introduced to the group in 2003 and has since been in a number of productions.

"Being on stage is addictive and it is good fun to entertain people and the teamwork that goes into putting on a play is something I enjoy," Mr Grey-Smith said.

"Annie Kilsby has written a few plays as well and we have talked about putting one of those on."

Ms Kilsby - who currently remains at the Penola Player's secretary - first joined the group in 1978 after being coerced into filling

in for a small role.

"They needed someone to take a small part and came and approached me so I decided to give it a go and I just loved it, it was so much fun," Ms Kilsby said.

"I have enjoyed the camaraderie and getting up there and knowing you are helping someone else have a good laugh is great."

Now encouraging others to join, Ms Kilsby said Penola residents had been questioning

when the next performance would be.

"The Penola Players have been a part of Penola for so long that people have been asking when the next play was and we hope it is soon," she said.

"Some of the biggest challenges is finding cast members, especially when it is a big cast but I don't think there are all that many challenges overall.

"We are not actors as such but it is the smell of the grease paint and the lights which gets the adrenaline going and it is so much fun."

Ms Kilsby said being a part of the Penola Players involved commitment more than anything with the group originally putting three plays on per year and travelling to other communities close by to perform.

"Everyone is so time poor now that we did go back to one a year but since Covid-19 this is the longest break we have had," she said.

"It was three months of practice including learning lines and going in one or two nights a week to rehearse and we have a good reputation so we are not going to put on anything that is half baked."

Moving forward, Ms Kilsby encouraged all residents in surrounding areas to support the group.

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Taking the plunge for MND

After successfully raising more than \$25,000 for last year's Big Freeze campaign this year's tally is sitting close to \$20,000 and expected to rise.

For at least six years Ms Nowak and her supporters have been raising funds for Fight MND to help fund research into the debilitating disease which affects the nerve cells controlling the muscles.

The campaign is personal for Ms Nowak as her father Reg Hamilton lives with MND for which there is no known cure.

Nine participants from both Hatherleigh and Port MacDonnell donned animal costumes to take the plunge into the tank's icy cold water in the name of raising funds for further research.

An overcast and wet day the weather was not looking kind for participants until half an hour before they climbed onto the dunking seat the clouds and rain cleared for a little respite.

Following last year's example Mr Hamilton was tasked with the job of smashing the dunking button with a hammer for each dunkee who climbed up to the seat.

"Dad loves it, Sunday he came over with us to count the money and he was so happy," Ms Nowak said.

"He loves the day and it's worth it to see the smile on his face."

Millie Smith, Matt Nettle, Tim Merrett, Dylan Clough, Tom Bell, Hayley Goodwin, Cathie Williams and Kelly and Montanna Millard were each supplied a tin to raise a minimum of \$500 for the privilege of facing the dunking tank.

The participants raised well over their goal with their combined tally reaching \$13,063.55.

For Kelly and Montanna Millard from Port MacDonnell, the day is particularly difficult as the mother and daughter team cared for their mother and grandmother until her death from MND four and a half years ago.

"This year the theme was animals, the only two that weren't in costumes were Kelly and Montanna who have lost their mum and nanna to MND" Ms Nowak said.

"They wore t-shirts with her picture on them instead.

"It was very special for them, you look to the wider community, so many families are

affected by it.

Housing initiative welcome

The devil will be in the detail following the South Australian State budget this week, according to ac.care acting chief executive officer Kirsty Barnett.

Last week's budget announced a further 164 public houses to try and ease the current pressure on the rental market with the stopping of selling a further 580 public housing properties.

It also announced a significant energy bill relief, allowing thousands of South Australian residents entitled to receive a rebate of up to \$500 on electricity bills while child protection would also receive an increase in funding to meet the higher cost of children in care.

The State Government also announced it would abolish stamp duty fees for first home buyers of new homes valued up to \$650,000 or those purchasing vacant land valued up to \$400,000.

Ms Barnett said these were all pleasing announcements but there were still details needing to be sorted out.

“We are pleased about increasing the number of public houses and as a homelessness provider in the current housing crisis, the stamp duty abolishment and helping others to own their own homes may free up the rental market, but we will wait to see how many people will be able to afford to purchase in the current market,” Ms Barnett said.

“It is a bit of a mixed response in regards to that but we are pleased about the announcements in child protection, whether that is new money or a continuation of supporting these initiatives.”

She said the not-for-profit organisation was also pleased at the increase in foster carer payments who were also experiencing the cost of living crisis.

“These are people putting their hands up and volunteering to take care of other people's children so it was really good to see the increased funding for the number of children entering care,” Ms Barnett said.

“It does need to keep up to date with the number of kids going into care.”

She said the cost of living funding an-

ouncements were also “interesting” with the energy relief funds being a positive for a number of South Australians.

“Some of those payments may not cover the energy rises potentially coming to us and there was moderate effort addressing the cost of living for concessions,” Ms Barnett said.

“It is a bit neutral around the cost of living efforts and was pretty silent in regards to the middle band of people.

“I don't know anyone in government in recent times who has done anything around that middle band so I do think it will continue to be tough for those people.”

She said the question also remained about how many more people could become vulnerable if they were not supported.

“The State Government has put in a lot of initiatives targeted to vulnerable people and it looks like there is a lot of emphasis on infrastructure projects for health which could possibly miss the majority of the middle ground of our community,” she said.

“These are the people starting to require help from us.”

Despite this, Ms Barnett said she was happy to see an increase in public housing which meant those in need could have a safety net for those in need and called for a number of houses to be implemented in the country regions.

Egg Skirt Dumplings Recipe

Cook + Prep Time: 13 mins
Serves: 2

Ingredients

- 2 eggs
- 12 frozen dumplings of choice
- Soy sauce, chilli oil, sliced spring onion and toasted sesame seeds, to serve

Method:

1. Whisk eggs and set aside.
2. Place a medium-large frying pan over medium-high heat. Add a little neutral oil and arrange your dumplings in a single layer.
3. Once they begin to sizzle, add ¼ cup of water and place a lid on the pan*. Cook for 3-4 minutes then remove the lid and let the remaining water evaporate, if any.
4. Pour the eggs between the dumplings and cook for another 3-4 minutes

until set. If the top is still jiggly, pop the lid back on for another minute or two.

5. Slide onto a plate and top with soy sauce, chilli oil, spring onion and toasted sesame seeds.

Tips & Hints

- If using a pan which doesn't have a lid, you can cover the pan with aluminium foil instead.

Best friend for the family

The new BMW X1 is a little car with big ideas.

BMW has imbued the third generation of its compact SUV with extra space, higher tech and more features to make it what the maker claims is the segment leader.

I tend to agree.

Coming to Australia in two petrol powered variants – an electric version is penned for later this year – the entry-level is the X1 sDrive18i front wheel drive, which leaps to the X1 xDrive20i all-wheel drive.

Added attractions have upped prices to \$60,400, plus on road costs, for the sDrive18i and \$70,400, plus on-roads, for the xDrive20i.

Two added-cost enhancement packages are available.

An M Sport Package pumps the price up to \$73,400.

Leaving the former model in the feature remaindered rack, the base model now includes such things as keyless entry/start, sports seats, a 10.7-inch multimedia touchscreen, a 10.25-inch instrument cluster, 'Hey BMW!' voice control, a head-up display, GPS with augmented reality view, dual-zone climate control, adaptive LED headlights, a powered tailgate, adaptive cruise control, automatic parking assist and a blind-spot monitor.

The sDrive18i on test sported Enhancement One, which delivered metallic paint, panoramic glass sunroof, driving assistant professional, electrically adjustable front seats and sliding rear seats, harman/kardon premium audio and 19-inch alloy wheels, all for an extra \$6513.

However, there is one oddity: a subscription system by which the bones of heated seats and steering wheel are embedded in the Aussie released X1, but the skeleton will only come to life by the owner paying a subscription starting at \$29 a month up to a lifetime \$589.

BMW claims it saves the buyer money: really!

The car is covered by a five-year unlimited kilometre warranty, with three years complimentary 24 / 7 roadside assistance.

While the new X1 has put on the inches, the compact SUV maintains near perfect proportions, all the way from its expansive rejigged signature kidney-style radiator, via a curved roofline, to a neat-and-tidy no nonsense rear.

With a typical squared-off SUV stance, extensive glass makes for panoramic views of surroundings from all seating positions.

With the X1 now rivalling the dimensions of the first X3m it's no surprise this new car feels like a medium SUV.

Wrap around front seats offer excellent support in day-to-day motoring, and while on the firm side, maintain a level of comfort welcome on long trips.

Two adults can sit in relative comfort behind a similar pair in front, with good head, knee and legroom, even with the panoramic roof.

The middle position is fit only for short trips or small children.

ISOFIX anchors are positioned on the outboard seats as well as top-tether points across all three.

Comfort is bolstered by adjustable air vents behind the centre console, two USB-C charge ports, pockets behind the front seats, bottle holders in the doors and a fold-down centre armrest with cup holders.

Behind the 40:20:40 split folding rear bench is room for 540 litres of cargo with all seats in use, expanding to a generous 1600 litres with the second-row seat backs folded flat.

No room for a spare, only a tyre repair kit.

Bye-bye buttons is the catchphrase here, with the need to dig into the touchscreen for several vehicle systems, the most annoying being for the climate control air-con.

Gone is the iDrive rotary control knob of yore too.

In its place is the engine start/stop button, electronic gearshift switch and audio volume roller.

The centre console itself is a bridging version with a large open space underneath for easy-access storage.

At the base of the centre stack is a phone charging point which holds the handset in a near vertical plane, making it easy to view when in position.

A 10.7-inch centre screen, plus 10.25-inch digital instrument display are sharp as a tack to view and responsive to inputs.

'Hey BMW' voice commands now have more options.

Power in the X1 sDrive18i comes from a 1.5-litre turbocharged three-cylinder petrol engine developing 115 kW at 6500rpm and 230 Nm between 1500 and 4600 rpm, driving the front wheels via a seven-speed dual-clutch transmission.

The X1 carries a five-star safety rating based on 2022 Euro NCAP tests.

Standard features include upgraded autonomous emergency braking forward and reverse with pedestrian and cyclist detection and junction assist adaptive cruise control including stop/go, blind-spot monitoring, forward collision warning, high-beam assist, lane change warning (blind-spot), lane departure warning, parking sensors front and rear, rear cross-traffic alert, reversing assistant and surround view (360-degree cameras).

The body structure has had a boost and there are front, side, curtain and front-centre airbags on hand in the event of an 'unscheduled incident'.

Despite featuring a three-cylinder turbocharged petrol engine, the X1 sDrive 18i performs as well as the ditched four-cylinder motor at low speeds in city traffic.



Although its looks can be deceiving, the new BMW X1 is packed full of tech and features to make anyone want one.

Tuning is the key here, with the newbie, following an at-times tardy take-off, running with relative ease through the rev band.

No neck-snapping acceleration, but according to BMW, at 9 seconds, 0.6 seconds sooner to 100 km/h than the previous model's time on the way to a 215 km/h top speed.

Overtaking on the open road can raise a few questions about the missing pot, though.

The maker claims combined urban/highway fuel consumption of 6.5 litres per 100 kilometres.

The test X1 sDrive 18i clocked an average of 7.2 litres of 95 RON premium unleaded petrol over the test period.

Steering has been the subject of attention from engineers and is smooth and responsive in town, yet able to cope with assurance on the open road or hilly twists and turns.

Wind and engine noise allow a normal level of conversation between occupants, the only blemish being some tyre noise on courser road surfaces.

Traditionally blinkered by driving performance at the expense of features, BMW has flipped with the new X1.

With the vehicle's ambitions to be a medium-size SUV, it is well on the way to being a friend of the family.

Mount Gambier's Warren Munro finished sixth overall and Penola runner Jake Rowe finished 12th to sneak into the men's top 10.

The final distance was the 5km, which was dominated by South East competitors.

Youngster Peter Izzard won the event with a time of 30:01.85 from fellow Mount Gambier runners Andrew Crouch and Luke Scott.

Flynn and Ryan Turner were next across the line, followed by Dale Robertson, all from Mount Gambier.

Naracoorte's Carolyn Rossgregor finished seventh overall to claim the women's win over Coleraine's Tara Baker and Mount Gambier's Bronwyn McCallum, while Penola's Madeleine McGregor finished a close fourth for the women.

combating Sanderson but she thrives on such challenges and will contest every delivery to the Saints shooter.

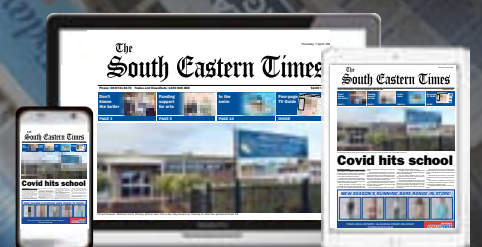
The Cats would not be expecting to win but they would have set themselves a goal to limit the Saints after giving up 94 goals the last time they met.

Alan Schultz found the Scotch.

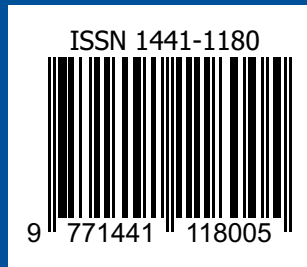
