It was a good news day for Millicent's community radio station on Tuesday as word came through that 5the FM has been granted a 12 month temporary broadcast license by the Australian Communications Media Authority

News the existing debt owed to BAI Communications would be waived by the company was welcome.

The station had recently started a Go Fund Me campaign to help retire the debt.

Chair of 5the FM, David Walshaw welcomed the news.

"Michael Ryder who is the head of com-

mercial broadcasting at BAI Communications saw our media and Go Fund Me page," he said.

"He sent us an email to set up a time to meet and have a chat with him. "By the end of the conversation he said he

would like to, subject to us getting our license, waive the debt.

"It is amazing news.

"People who have donated to the Go Fund Me page to retire that debt can have their

money back or they can leave it at the station for us to retire other debt we have."

Remaining debt at the station is now between \$5,000 and \$7,000 and mostly owing to smaller local businesses and Telstra.

Subject to the availability of BAI Communications staff to switch the transmitter on, it is planned the station will be heard on the 107.7 frequency once again next Thursday, July 6.

Caves' recognition

Sites within the Tantanoola Conservation Park have recently been provisionally listed on the State Heritage register.

The Tantanoola Cave complex under consideration includes the popular Tourist Cave, Lake Cave and Up-and-Down Rocks.

The complex contains significant geological and speleological information for South Australia and is believed it will contribute to an understanding of the state's natural history.

European discovery of the Tantanoola Tourist Cave by 16 year old Boyce Lane in 1930, when searching for his lost ferret, led to the cave being opened to the public in the same year.

It was in 1957 when Cave Exploration Group of SA members discovered the lake chamber in the nearby Lake Cave.

Lake Cave has never been opened to the public and retains a high level of integrity.

This cave is recognised as a Special Purpose Reference Cave and is likely to yield further scientific information.

Up-and-Down Rocks includes the only substantial pink dolomite exposure within the state and contains karst features which are also a focus of the provisional listing.

A walking trail follows the top of the cliffs along Up-and-Down rocks and into a dolomite quarry active in the 1920's.

Both caves have a variety of decorations and are considered impressive in their density and complexity.

Manager Heritage SA Beverley Voight said The Tantanoola Caves are the only pink dolomite caves in South Australia and include an extraordinary display of stalagmites and stalactites.

"The Tantanoola Caves were identified for assessment as part of a fossil survey prepared for a SA Heritage Council research project," she said.

The provisional listing is now subject to community consultation and a final decision will be made by the State Heritage Council.

"If State Heritage listing is confirmed it would not change public access to the conservation park and the Tantanoola tourist cave," Ms Voight said.

"Heritage listings often create an opportunity to increase awareness and recognition of significant sites and attract more visitors."

In the summary provided for the provi-

sional listing it states the Tantanoola Caves Complex presents a unique opportunity to yield important information about the development of dolomite with the South-East.

Elements of significance contained within the complex are numerous cave features with-

in substantial pink dolomite rock including 'wedding cake' column formations, draperies, helictites and flowstones.

Fossils embedded within the cave walls and evidence of animal scratchings are also considered significant.

Trio launches 11th-hour saleyards bid

Wattle Range Council (WRC) will be holding a special meeting as a trio of councillors look to throw the Millicent saleyards a lifeline.

Following council's decision to close the saleyards effective June 30, Councillors Moira Neagle, Sharon Cox and Dennis Muhovics have called on their fellow elected members to re-open discussions.

Cr Neagle told the South Eastern Times ahead of the meeting the volume of the opposition to the closure has forced their hand in calling the meeting.

"I believe it's understood that we're not going to win in terms of sales recommencing, but the compromise has to be that we keep the truck wash and transiting operational," Cr Neagle said.

"There's a lot of people that are very disappointed that sales are going to cease at the yards.

"However, in terms of biosecurity and efficiency of movement of stock in our district and out of our district, the truck wash has to operate, so we also must have the ability to transit stock from small trucks to large trucks."

John Chay and Co director John Chay said the fight to keep the saleyards open has lasted for 20 years and he thought the idea of closing was "a disgrace".

"The saleyards is a vibrant hub for the farmers," Mr Chay said.

"It's a weekly or fortnightly meeting place, it's somewhere they can gather and catch up with their mates, go into town and spend their money in the township."

Mr Chay said shutting down all facilities at the saleyards would have a serious impact on smaller farmers who rely on facilities like the truck wash and the depot for stock transit.

"Even the small blokes won't be able to bring their trailer in to the saleyards now and meet a bigger truck," he said.

"There's going to have to be some changes made to the way people operate."

Wattle Range Council was contacted for comment, but was unable to respond by deadline.

The special meeting will be held from 6:30pm on Thursday, June 29.

"It's very exciting" Mr Walshaw said.

"Thursday is a big day for us, Craig Press will be the breakfast show and we've got non-stop stuff happening all day.

"Now it gives everyone with a radio an opportunity to listen to us, not just those who are digitally literate and have a device they could listen on.

"We will still be streaming but it will be complementary to, not instead of, being free to air.

"We've had lots of comments around the world from expats listening to their radio station in Millicent via streaming and we would like to continue doing that."

The station has been streaming their content online for the last six months after the license to broadcast was not renewed in December due to breaches of the Broadcasting Services Act (BSA).

The breaches of the BSA, which included concerns with governance and transparency in the committee structure, occurred before a new board of members was elected in November last year after a vote of no confidence in the existing board.

The new board inherited debts estimated to be over \$100,000 with much of this debt being waived by the agencies and companies involved.

In December expressions of interest are available for a five year community broadcast license through ACMA and the station has plans to apply for this longer license.



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Proceeds bid knocked back

A request to help fund the Southend Community Centre through the sale of public land has been knocked back by Wattle Range Council.

At the June council meeting, the Southend Progress Association (SPA) asked councillors if money from the planned sale of public land in Southend could go towards fixing up the Community Centre.

The request was made citing previous projects in the council area funded using money from the sale of public land.

Following the meeting, Wattle Range chief executive Ben Gower said that was no longer how things were done.

"Yes, in a previous era of the former councils and the newly-amalgamated Wattle Range Council, there were a couple of incidences where assets were sold and the funds were put back into specific community projects," Mr Gower said.

"In my seven years since I've been here, money has always gone back into consolidated revenue and then allocated out based on individual merits of each project. "That's been a council policy for quite some time."

Councillors encouraged SPA to instead apply for funding through council's Community Infrastructure Grants Program.

"Council normally allocates \$100,000 - a maximum grant of \$50,000 to any one individual organisation and it's for projects exactly like this one," Mr Gower said.

"Which allows them, if they get the funding, to go for a matching state or federal government grant and double their money - and double again if they can get all three.

"That will get released as soon as the draft budget is adopted and we'll be taking submissions probably around August for a late August, early September decision on who is awarded those grants."

Mr Gower said he hoped SPA applied for the grants program as "their project has merit" and the Community Centre is very important to the Southend community.

SPA said it was unable to comment on the situation at the time of publication.

Born in Penola June 21st, 1923 and one of four siblings Mr Walker said her never got far from Penola.

He thought he could be the first Walker in his family to make it to 100.

"I don't know any others."

Mr Walker worked at the historic Coola Station at Kongorong for over 37 years when it was all horse work.

His youngest son Sid Walker said he was a good horseman.

"He was a buckjump rider and used to ride the rodeos around Penola," he said.

John's wife Betty (nee Bonney) died around 15 years ago but their seven children were all at the celebration with many of the couple's 23 grandchildren, 47 great-grandchildren and five great-great-grandchildren.

Sid Walker welcomed guests and spoke of his father's love of life.

"He's been looking forward to his birthday for quite awhile, every time I saw him he told me I'm nearly 100," he said.

"Dad had a great passion for farming and loved the outdoor life, fishing and hunting and he enjoyed gardening.

"He even won an award when he moved to Millicent for the best trust home garden, that was a mighty effort.

"He loved poetry and would recite poems,

after a few whiskey's they would come rolling out."

John's eldest daughter Margaret had travelled from Adelaide and said he was a good father.

"He's been a great dad and teacher, and taught us right from wrong," she said.

Although Mr Walker had no advice for the rest of us he did say he had a good life.

"I couldn't have wished for better, it might

not have been the flashest but I've had a good time."

Dark clouds descend on run

After running and hiking for almost six hours in a 44.6km short trail course Millicent's Dannielle Vanderheul was devastated when she was forced to stop her race just 8 kilometres short of the finish line.

Ms Vanderheul was one of 31 Australians chosen to represent the country in this year's World Mountain Trail Running Championships in Austria.

But her dreams of representing the country were thwarted by the weather which saw the race canceled.

Before leaving to head overseas Ms Vanderheul had said her goal was to finish the challenging race and to not come last.

At the time the race was canceled she was listed as 118th in a field of approximately 160.

"At the bottom of the last climb we could see a dark cloud coming over and thought we were coming in for some more rain" Ms Vanderheul said.

"We got to the last aid station and still had another two kilometre climb before we were going to be able to descend.

"It started getting quite cold.

"I had a couple of refreshments and thought I would keep going.

"I ran out and a massive downpour came, mountain rescue were standing at the side of the tent stopping people.

"I managed to slip by not knowing what was going on when mountain rescue called me back and said we are canceling the race.

"Then it was this torrential downpour.

"I went into the tent really confused as to what was going on.

"I couldn't believe I had put all this work in and had to stop, it took me a bit to process.

"I was absolutely shattered and just collapsed.

"Mountain rescue were so apologetic but they couldn't risk it because of lightning strikes.

"It's too much of a liability for them and they were really quite worried.

"They were rushing around trying to get us off the mountain."

Despite the disappointment of the cancel-

lation it was a lifetime experience for the runner who had never traveled overseas before.

Me Vanderhoul tackled running along foot

Ms Vanderheul tackled running along foot wide trails in snow, on loose rocks and atop mountain peaks with sheer drops.

She described the experience as more like sky running than trail running.

"Sky running is running on peaks of mountains and you've got nowhere to fall except for off

"There was one part it was almost impossible to run, they had guideropes along the side of the mountain pinned in because of the drop next to you.

"I held that guiderope so tight.

"The ground was not stable, it was spectacular scenery, but terrifying.

"I had never encountered something like that before."

With altitudes over 3,000 metres this was another issue which challenged the runner.

She experienced chest tightness, difficulty in breathing, nose bleed and lost her voice during the trip.

Sharing her grief with around 50 other athletes, who were also forced to stop, Ms Vanderheul has no regrets.

Her fellow short trail course athlete and room mate Madison Reynolds had the same experience and they were able to debrief together.

The next day they decided to pay a tribute to the mountains by paragliding.

"I'm not sure I like having my feet off the ground, but I liked the views.

To keep their mind off the disappointment they helped crew at the aid stations for the 86 km race.

"That was amazing, we helped out the Australians and supported the runners coming through.

"I helped change runners' shoes, which is gross" she said.

Highlights of the trip were marching in the opening ceremony, the phenomenal views

and friendships formed with other athletes from across the world.

"There were quite a few mums on the team.

"Hearing how they balance their run, work life and travel and to know they struggle as much as I do but are so determined, we named it mum strength."

Exchanging team shirts and tops became a competition amongst the athletes with Ms Vanderheul upgrading from her Australian polo shirt to a jacket from Ecuador through a series of swaps.

Although the race cancellation was initially devastating for the runner she now understands it was done in their best interests.

Relieved that her record still stands without a DNF (did not finish) by her name the athlete is inspired to keep training and aim for the 2025 world championship in Spain.

"My biggest disappointment is not having the story to tell of crossing the finish line, that was my number one fear.

"I know so many people were just as invested in it as I was, I was very worried about coming home.

"I appreciated all the support I have received, it has been great.

"The trails were phenomenal, the people amazing, we had such a great team it was such a good experience."

History of Gammon Cottage

In association with State Heritage, Penola's branch of National Trust SA has developed a mobile phone app called SA Heritage, to enable people to learn more about historic sites within Penola on self guided tours.

The following is one of the subjects from this app.

GAMMON COTTAGE

By 1869 Andrew Adams was the owner of a cottage, garden and stable on this site until it was acquired by Simon McKenzie in 1871.

Stonemason Thomas Gammon, his wife Hannah a needlewoman and midwife, sailed with their seven children from Southampton on the Talbot, arriving at Geelong, Victoria on the 25th of August 1857.

They travelled to Penola by horse and cart and lived in a two-roomed weather-board cottage and tents in Ralston Street.

Their son, Philip Francis William, known as William, married Mary Anne Testrow and worked on stations around Penola before purchasing this property from Charles Smith in 1879. Their son Frank, who became the last family occupier of the cottage, was known as the local Vet.

His claim to fame is the time that he castrated an aggressive lion for Bullen Brothers

circus, having reputedly said of the request, "No problem. He's only a big cat and I've cut dozens of them."

The Penola Pennant of 15th January 1953 reported that the proprietors offered grateful thanks to Mr Gammon for the successful operation he performed on their lion whilst in Penola.

They said, "We take our hats off to you".

In a letter to the Border Watch newspaper in 1963, an old Penola resident, Mr T Grey, told of his experiences: "In my younger days Petticoat Lane was where I spent most of my time and I still have a soft spot in my heart for this little

lane. Everyone had a hack to ride and there would be as many horses in Petticoat Lane of a Sunday as you would see on the race course. The Gammon brothers were great horsemen and colt breakers. They would ride any horse that ever stood on four legs and sit him as long as the pig skin lasted."

The building, described in 1883 as a four-roomed stone cottage with a weather-board detached kitchen and stable, was purchased in 1983 by the Penola Branch of the National Trust of South Australia.


The property has since been leased as an art-related retail venue and blacksmith shop.

Limestone Coast group arrives at their destination

On Sunday afternoon, after two and half years of waiting, members of the Limestone Coast Model Railway Group (LCMRG) held their first meeting in their own dedicated space.

The building was originally used by members of the now defunct Millicent BMX club and more recently has been a store room for Millicent Mens Shed (MMS).

An agreement with the mens shed over two years ago evolved into the LCMRG becoming a sub group of MMS.

MMS have recently finished building an extension to their Fifth Street building and this has allowed the old storeroom to be passed to the model railway group for use.

The group have wasted no time since being handed the keys a month ago with all new electricals installed, an existing roller door replaced with a new door, and lining some of the space where needed.

LCMRG member Arthur O'Connell said they are planning a working bee for Saturday.

"The working bee is to get the final touches done to get the shed finished," he said.

"Once we've got the cleaning done, plumbing finished and other bits and pieces then it will be all hands on to start building layouts.

"We should have the trains running in the next four or five months."

The club has two layouts planned for the 7.2×4.6 metre space.

Mr O'Connell is donating a half built N Gauge track the club will be able to complete, and a HO layout is planned to be built from scratch.

"We will build a good layout and down the track we will build an exhibition layout to take places.

"The layouts are built at our expense.

"We fund ourselves through membership and a member makes T-Track modules that we sell to make a few dollars.

"Our display at Geltwood Festival is popular and a really good money raiser for us."

A clash of functions means the group will be unable to host a display at this year's festival weekend but they plan open days once the layouts are up and running.

The group has a range of people involved bringing different skills to the table.

"Some people will do the scenery, other people lay track, then you get your electrical part of everything, you might all have all those skills," said member Klaas Mastenbrook.

"There is variety in the group which is good, we get along well and we all have different skills," Mr O'Connell said.

Hans Stashik always had an interest in model trains and is glad to see the group fi-

nally in its own building.

"We've been having meetings at various people's places before we started coming to the mens shed."

"It's nearly two and half years and we finally have a shed we can do something with, it's starting to get more exciting now."

The LCMRG is the only group of its kind

in the South East and has members from Kingston, Mount Burr, Mount Gambier, Millicent, Kalangadoo, Tantanoola and even Ballarat.

Rural people missing out

People living in rural and regional areas are missing out on vital healthcare access, according to a national report.

The report, commissioned by the National Rural Health Alliance, found regional people each miss out on close to \$850 a year of healthcare access.

Nationally, the figures showed an annual rural health spending deficit of \$6.5 billion.

Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP) rural chair Michael Clements said there was a lack of spending on regional healthcare as people had less access to services.

"What we know is the data is saying our rural patients are not accessing Medicare for their GPs, they're not accessing Medicare for allied health, they're not accessing their pharmacists for prescription medications or hospital services," Associate Professor Clements said.

"This is not because they're magically healthier, that the clean country air is an antidote for everything.

"It actually shows us they're not getting into see healthcare because they cant, because there's no doctors, or they have to travel so far they just avoid it."

He said people tend to just put up with worsening symptoms as they do not see any other option, which had serious impacts on the life expectancies of those living far from big cities.

"If there's no GPs or no primary healthcare services, we know that leads to poorer health outcomes, and that leads to things like lower life expectancy, increased complications from diabetes and heart disease and mental health and respiratory disease," he said.

Associate Professor Clements said there were ways to address the problem in both the short and the long term.

"We need to make sure that the health dollars are spent in ways that are suitable for the rural town," he said.

"We need to make sure when the government is giving money to the PHNs or through Medicare or through different programs, that the way it spends the money is suitable for the Limestone Coast region.

"Every town has its own way of solving problems and its own needs, so what we're calling on is each region having some self-determination in how they pool those different sources of funding and how they spend it." He also said a long-term solution would be to ensure more medical students and junior doctors were put on placements in rural areas.

"You can't be what you can't see, and if these junior doctors aren't seeing these rural towns as part of their training, then they're never going to end up there," he said.

Cluster shares in funding for drought preparedness

The Limestone Coast Food and Agribusiness Cluster, along with four other South East organisations, has received a share in funding from the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal (FRRR) to assist with drought preparedness

Cluster chair Dannielle England said the group was granted \$147,550 to build a 35 Under 35 program which would bring together a community network.

"It is an opportunity for 35 businesses owned and managed by under 35s in the region to come together, form a network, have access to mentoring, and have upskilling so the small business community in the region is able to grow and prosper," she said.

"One of the things that came about in our community consultation process... was that in times of drought or crisis, is the main streets start to look really empty because there is not the small business resilience there to enable those businesses to keep going.

"So what we're hoping is that while times are good we can set some of those future business leaders up for success so the next time we roll into drought we've got a motivated, upskilled network of young business owners."

The Mackillop Farm Management Group was granted \$75,000 for their Skill Up: Helping Community Organisations Govern program across the Limestone Coast.

The Limestone Coast Landscape Board was granted \$39,823 for their Walking the Seasons program to create a bi-monthly art workshop run by the Burrandies and Ngarrindjeri Aboriginal Corporations in the whole region.

The Migrant Resource Centre was granted \$49,000 for a Migrant Integration and Volunteering for Impact Exchange to engage recent migrants in the local community and

agricultural industry in Bordertown, Naracoorte and Mount Gambier.

Women Together Learning (WoTL) was granted \$47,000 for their Building Rural Women's Connection and Capacity for Drought Preparation program, which would be delivered in Keith and Millicent.

Ms England said the cluster was also chosen as FRRRs Limestone Coast Community Partner Lead Organisation, which meant they would coordinate the Community Impact Program in the region.

"The Limestone Coast Food Cluster has been the coordinating organisation that has been working in collaboration with FRRR to bring all the community groups together," she said.

In being chosen as the regions lead organisation the cluster was granted \$51,000 which Ms England said would help deliver a range of projects, events, initiatives, training, capability building and small-scale com-

munity infrastructure projects to assist local people prepare for future drought in the Limestone Coast.

"We want everyone in the business community to be involved, it's just just food and beverage producers, it's everybody," she said.

While the Limestone Coast has been relatively unscathed by droughts in recent years, Ms England said the programs would help business through any market change.

"It's about being able to handle changes in the market, you only have to look at the impact that the loss of the China market had on our agribusinesses and the flow on effect of that," she said.


FRRR disaster resilience and recovery lead Nina O'Brien said the grants would create opportunities for agriculture-dependent communities to increase social connection, strengthen network opportunities and identify and adopt innovative and transformative ways to build drought resilience.


of an incentive program during the month of July," she said.







Veggie Egg Tartlets

Serves: 4

Ingredients

- 12 large eggs
- Pinch of salt
- Good grind of pepper
- 1 tbsp extra virgin olive oil (garlic infused if you like)
- 1/4 red onion, finely diced
- 3 mushrooms, diced
- 3 asparagus, diced
- 2 slices lean ham, diced (optional)
- 6 sheets filo
- 60 g feta
- Small handful fresh basil & parsley, finely chopped

Method:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180 C. Brush a 12-hole muffin tray with extra virgin olive oil.
- 2. Crack the eggs into a bowl and season with a pinch of salt and a good grind of pepper. Whisk and set aside.
- 3. Heat a frying pan and drizzle with the extra virgin olive oil. Sauté the onion, mushrooms, asparagus and ham for a few minutes until softened and a little browned.
- 4. Meanwhile fold a sheet of filo in half and then again into a quarter. Cut in half to create two rough squares of 4 layers of filo. Press each into a hole of the muffin tray.

Repeat with the remaining sheets of filo to give you 12 filo lined muffin holes.

- 5. Spoon the sauteed vegie and ham mixture into each tartlet. Divide the fete, crumbling a little into each tart, along with the fresh herbs, and finally pour over the whisked egg to fill each tartlet.
- 6. Pop the tray into the oven to bake for 15-20 minutes or until slightly brown on top and the egg cooked through. Carefully remove each tartlet from the muffin tray with pallet knife and serve straight away or allow to cool on a rack before storing covered in the fridge.

Macadamia nut pavlova with mango and passionfruit

Prep time: 15 min Cook time: 1.5 hours Serves: 12 people 15g nuts per serve

Ingredients

For the pavlova

- 5 egg whites (175g)
- 225g sugar
- 1 tsp lemon juice or white wine vinegar
- 1/2 tsp vanilla extract
- 140g roasted macadamias, finely chopped

For the cream

- 300ml cream, cold
- 1 tsp Davidson Plum powder (optional)

For the topping

- 20g roasted pistachios, chopped
- 20g roasted macadamias, chopped
- 60g passionfruit pulp (~2 passionfruit)
- 1 (150g) mango
- 20g blueberries
- 50g strawberries

Method:

- 1. Preheat oven to 150°C. Line oven tray with baking paper.
- In a large electric mixer bowl fitted with whisk attachment, beat the egg whites on medium speed until bubbles start to form, about 1 minute.
- Add half of the sugar, vinegar, and vanilla extract. Then, continue whisking until soft peaks are formed, about 2 minutes.
- 4. Add remaining sugar and beat until glossy, stiff peaks are formed, about 1 minute
- Remove bowl from the mixer and fold in the chopped macadamia nuts.
- 6. Spoon the meringue mixture onto the baking tray to make 2 round nests.
- 7. Reduce oven temperature to 120° and bake for 1 hour.8. Turn off the oven and cool with the door
- ajar for at least 2 hours.
 9. In a large mixing bowl, whip the cream
- to soft peaks then fold in the Davidson
 Plum powder.

 10. To assemble the paylova, carefully place
- 10. To assemble the pavlova, carefully place one of the meringue nests on a platter.

- 11. Spoon and spread half of the cream, sprinkle 1 the chopped pistachio and macadamia onto the meringue then carefully place the other meringue nest
- 12. Spoon remaining cream, drizzle passionfruit pulp, assemble fruits, sprinkle remaining nuts and dust Davidson Plum powder on top of the meringue.

13. Serve immediately.

Tips:

• You can also make one big round nest (bake for 1 hour 15 minutes) or 20-30 mini-meringue nests (bake for 30 minutes). Assemble your pavlova at the very last minute, as the cream and fruits will soften the pavlova. Roasted almonds can be used instead of pistachios.

Alfa Romeo Giulia in focus

Alfa Romeo Giulia is a stylish Italian sports sedan built on a rear-drive platform and designed to tackle the market segment currently dominated by the premium European brands.

Although the name Giulia (pronounced Julia) was around in the 1960s and early 1970s, it didn't re-emerge until 2015 when, to the delight of Alfistis everywhere, the company broke away from using the bland numeric names 156 and 159 and returned to such a distinctively Italian one.

There are five models in the Giulia range: Ti, Veloce, Quadrifoglio, GTA and GTAm.

There's a huge difference in price, starting from around \$70,000 for the Ti and Veloce, then doubling once to the \$143,000 Quadrifoglio and doubling again to the track-ready GTA and GTAm.

Our test car was the Quadrifoglio, which is Italian for four-leaf clover and has been the symbol for Alfa racing cars for close to 100 vears.

In modern times Quadrifoglio, often abbreviated to QV, indicates high-performance road cars.

STYLING

Giulia Quadrifoglio is a real stunner.

It's very svelte and Italian in its shape and drew plenty of attention wherever we went due in no small part by the rich Montreal Green version that we tested.

Indeed, one Irish colleague was so smitten by the combination of the colour and the shamrock/clover badges (there is a difference apparently) on the sides that only my mention of the price tag stopped him from rushing off to buy one.

The exterior is highlighted by the traditional triangular shield grille flanked by two lowermounted grilles in the apron.

The bonnet has two cooling outlets for the engine bay.

There's a carbon-fibre splitter and large air intakes for the intercoolers as well as the

The side skirts also feature carbon-fibre inserts and there are gill-style outlets either side at the front to allow air to escape from the wheel housings.

The "angry-eyes" headlights, narrow on the inside and swept-back over the front fenders, add to its striking appearance.

Unlike some of its competitors, there is no wagon variant for the Giulia although the recently-released Stelvio SUV Quadrifoglio is there if a more functional interior is needed.

Giulia is built close to the ground making entry and exit difficult for less supple occupants.

Consequently, the driving position is lower than we normally like but Giulia is a sports sedan so that's to be expected.

The dashboard tilts slightly towards the driver.

Our test OV came with optional black leather with Alcantara inserts and green/ white stitching.

The front seats have tall rigid bolsters which will challenge ample-buttocked occupants, but do provide excellent support.

Cabin storage is adequate, with dual cup holders and a sizeable smartphone-sized alcove at the base of the dashboard and an adjacent USB socket.

There are two more USB ports in a small centre console storage box with a wireless

phone charging pad next to them. There's also a useful small slot in the centre console to fit the keyfob.

The rear does have three seatbelts but the centre seat is not only narrow but it sits on top of a very high transmission tunnel that makes seating, even for children, all but impossible.

Perhaps a child seat might just be squeezed in but not much else.

Otherwise the fold down armrest, with twin cupholders, will be in place all the time.

On the plus-side the two useable rear seats are large and supportive as well as heated.

As with the front seats they are finished in leather and Alcantara.

Head and legroom are reasonable and there are twin air vents and a pair of USB ports.

Boot size is a decent 480 litres although access through the narrow opening can be a squeeze.

The latest upgrade added a powered tailgate.

ENGINES / TRANSMISSIONS

Both the Ti and Veloce are powered by a 2.0-litre four-cylinder turbocharged engine with outputs of 206 kW and 400 Nm at 2250 rpm.

The 2.9-litre twin-turbo V6 in the Giulia Quadrifoglio Verde (QV) is something special with its Ferrari-inspired 500 horsepower (375 kW) twin-turbocharged engine.

That peak power comes in at 6500 rpm with the redline set at 7000 revs.

There's an impressive 600 Nm all the way from 2500 to 5500 rpm.

All engines are mated to an eight-speed ZF automatic gearbox with large aluminium manual gearshift paddles.

SAFETY

Although the Quadrifoglio hasn't been tested by ANCAP, the lower spec Veloce achieved a five-star rating including an adult occupation protection rating of 98 per cent.

Standard safety features in the Giulia QV include six airbags, active cruise control, rear cross traffic alert, intelligent speed control, driver inattention alert, traffic sign recognition, automatic high beam system, lane departure warning and lane keep assist, and forward collision warning.

There's also active blind spot assist, autonomous emergency braking, tyre pressure monitoring, reversing camera, front and rear parking sensors and rear-view mirror autodimming, and Isofix child seat anchors in the outer rear seats.

INFOTAINMENT

Display is through a small 8.8-inch touchscreen embedded in the top centre of the dashboard that can, and should be, operated by a new rotary dial on the centre console.

Traditionalists will be happy with the two large analogue instrument dials for the driver with a digital speedometer in between.

As is the norm nowadays, there's a lot of learning needed to operate what is quite a complex infotainment system including a triple split screen.

As always, given that we only have most vehicles for a week, we try to avoid being too critical of features that owners will quickly

There's built-in satellite navigation, DAB+ digital radio, wireless Apple CarPlay but wired Android Auto as well as an impressive 14-speaker Harman/Kardon system called Sound Theatre.

DRIVING

As good as the Giulia Quadrifoglio looks, it's also a brilliant car to drive.

It's a true sports model, with an all-new rear-wheel drive architecture giving it 50:50 weight distribution.

It's the first Alfa sedan to be driven by its rear wheels since the early 1990s.

Weight is kept down through the use of lightweight steel and composite materials such as carbon fibre.

Like an increasing number of new vehicles Giulia comes with a start/stop button, many of which are annoyingly tucked away out of sight behind the steering wheel.

Determined to be different, the Alfa designers have cleverly positioned the button at the bottom of the steering wheel itself.

At least it's at the bottom once the driver gets into the habit of parking, as we all should, with the wheels pointing straight ahead.

Once pressed, the fun starts with the 2.9-litre twin-turbo engine sending out a lovely V6 burble through the four tailpipes.

Around town the Giulia QV is a little awkward with ground clearance of just 100mm needing a fair bit of caution and angled approach around driveways and the like.

The Alfa DNA Driving Mode Selector offers four main drive modes: Advanced Efficiency (for poor traction conditions), Normal, Dynamic and Race.

Each of these changes the settings for the dampers, torque limiter, steering, gear shifts, all-wheel drive system, exhaust valve, throttle sensitivity and torque vectoring.

Most drivers, as we did, will spend most of the time in Dynamic rather than Normal mode as it provided everything we required.

Extra-large piece aluminium paddle shifters are fixed to the steering column encouraging their use - just for the fun of it.

Fuel consumption is listed at 8.2 litres per 100 kilometres kept down by the combination of auto engine stop-start and cylinder deactivation which shutting down three of the six cylinders when not required.

We averaged a touch over 10 L/100km during our test, still pretty good for such a sporty car.

SUMMING UP

Alfa Romeo Giulia QV is a car with the character that you expect from Italy in that combines stunning looks with outstanding perfor-

Anyone who is in the market for a midsized sports sedan should forget all their preconceptions about Alfa and at least take it for a test drive before rushing in and buying one of its mostly German competitors.

Lara Munro found herself having a good look at the ball, giving her side plenty of turnover opportunities.



Gartner said he was over the moon to finish second and that it was quite a surprise to him after a relatively scot-free race through the unforgiving desert.

"In the last few years we have been very close to getting back to the podium and for instance last year, we had a fuel issue within five kilometres of the finish which cost us another podium," he said.

"2011 was our last podium, we won that outright and we were the first trophy truck to win in the history of the Finke.

"We have had a lot of fourths, fifths and DNFs but it is good to be back on the podium."

There was only one man who had the pace to defeat Gartner and it was none other than two-time Dakar Rally champion Toby Price.

Gartner said Price's truck is state-of-the-art with the latest technology on board.

"Toby's new truck is a bit wider and longer with more power," Gartner said.

"To have a truck like that with Toby Price driving it - who would be in the top five best off-road drivers in the world - it would have been great to beat him but I'm happy to be not too far off of him either."

Action began on the Saturday with the prologue time trial where Gartner put in a solid banker time to start in sixth place the following day.

"We were happy with it but we thought we could do better," he said.

"It always worries me because if you have a mistake in the prologue and have a rollover, you spend the next 20 hours fixing your truck.

"So that is always in the back of my mind to keep the truck nice and straight before the race."

For the Sunday for the first day of the race where competitors went down to the Finke Desert, Gartner moved up a couple of places and was set to start the second day of racing in fourth.

"On the Monday for the race back, we start-

ed fourth - 20 seconds off of third," Gartner said.

"So we were in the dust for a while and we got Shannon Rentsch in the first 80 kilometres so we were into third and in a really good position.

"We pushed fairly hard and we caught up to Travis Robinson who was second and he seemed to be having a few issues because he wasn't going as fast as we thought he would.

"So we got past Travis and pretty well knew we were in second spot but we knew we had to keep pushing pretty hard because some of the quick competitors were behind us.

"We pushed hard to the finish and we were only 40 seconds off of Toby Price's time on the way home so we were pretty pleased with that because we probably lost 40 seconds in dust."

Gartner said it was one of his best Finke races and was pleased with his return to form.

"We were thrilled, the truck ran well and we are really pleased to know that we still have it and we are not getting too old," he said.

"It was probably the smoothest and quickest race that we have ever had."

Another blast of true winter weather peppered the Limestone Coast over the weekend, but for the die-hards, that is just what we need to kick a few of our favourite winter species into gear.

The offshore fishing has been tricky to say the least.

Big swell, strong winds and freezing temperatures have kept all but the keenest of anglers on dry land.

There has been tuna caught again this week, though all have been school fish

From speaking to the anglers who have been out there having a look, they reckon the numbers of fish is incredible

At times everywhere you look, tuna are jumping out of the water.

It is great to see and we know there are still big fish mixed in with them – you just have to fish through them.

Inshore, fishing around the kelp and reef areas has been productive for those targeting sharks.

The school shark have been the predominant target down the coast, but there has been a handful of nice gummy sharks mixed in with them.

Hayden Sneath and crew boated some rippers late last week, one being a horse at just shy of 30kg.

There is no secret spots down there, just find a nice area of broken bottom, some kelp, let the burley flow and they will come.

With the winter weather comes the winter garfish and they are always a bit bigger than our summer samples.

The red beakers have been in good touch this past few weeks and when the weather allows us, the numbers have been great.

Our usual land-based haunts such as the Petrified Forrest, Hutt Bay, Cape Douglas and Livingstons have all been excellent and are all areas worthy of a crack when the weather allows.

Like usual, mullet, salmon trout and tommies are in the same spots, so expect a few visitors.

I have seen a few pictures and videos recently of boaties fishing Rocklands and landing some excellent yellowbelly in around the timber.

Deep diving minnows such as stumpjumpers or similar have been great for those trolling and Get Bent shudder and spinner baits have been red hot for those casting.

A good sounder is definitely going to improve your chances over there, but that said, just being on the water puts you in with a shot.

There are a few cod sniffing around up there too and we are hearing of the odd one being landed by those targeting the yellas.

The Glenelg River has coloured up a bit in the last week, but do not be discouraged, the fish are still there, we just have to change our approach.

As is often the case when the river dirties up, the fish head deep.

They will often be on or near the bottom and a bit reluctant to feed, but vibes and blades fished in front of their faces will often result in some good bites.

Down towards the estuary its not as

dirty, but the fishing down there should fire up very soon.

By the weekend the wind and swell

are both backing off nicely and we should see plenty of the smaller trailer boats hitting the ocean again.

Until next week, safe fishing.

Janet Watson, Lois Tilley and Karen Altschwager were the ball winners.


Shots on the fairways and putts were so counted and Bailey was the fair ways winner in A Grade with 12, while Sharne Peacock posted the best in B

Mount Burr will look for the win to cement fourth spot, with Hatherleigh finding form and fast catching up, just four premiership points behind.


