Stage two of the student nurse accommodation adjacent to the Millicent Hospital was completed earlier this week.

Volunteers took advantage of the five bedroom facility being vacant for a week to install a new kitchen.

Beachport Rivoli Bay Lions club members helped remove the old kitchen and painted the walls in preparation for the new install.

Members of the Millicent and Surrounds Health Support Group (MASHSG) and other volunteers undertook tiling and installation of the new cabinetry.

New vinyl flooring has been laid and new tapware installed.

While the building was vacant new ceiling fans were installed in each of the bedrooms.

MASHSG member Simone Berry said they were "really nice" and were purchased from Loneragan and Muhovics who donated the labour to install them.

"It was a big job, both boys were here for a good part of the day," she said.

"They are all low ceilings and there is not a lot of crawl space up there."

Installation of the ceiling fans has completed stage one of the project with some minor repairs needed and the removal of old air-conditioning units from two bedrooms planned for the end of the year.

"So far it has been a positive response from a couple of the students," Ms Berry said.

"It has been a hectic week but it's been a lot of fun," she said.

The work undertaken by MASHSG has not gone unnoticed and the group were invited to have a representative at Monday's Limestone Coast Health Network board meeting held at Millicent Hospital and have been nominated for a LCHN Volunteer award.

Drivers caught breaking road rules in Limestone Coast

A number of Limestone Coast motorists will appear in court after separate traffic incidents in the South East last week.

About 1.16pm on Monday, July 24, a 35-year-old Mount Gambier man was stopped while driving on Pick Avenue while his licence was disqualified.

The man underwent a roadside screening test and returned a positive result for methamphetamine.

He was reported for these offences and will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date.

About 2.51pm on Tuesday, July 25, a 60-year-old Millicent man was stopped while driving on Railway Terrace East in Tantanoola.

Police will allege that the driver was travelling at 58km/h in a 50km/h zone.

He underwent a breath test and returned a positive result of 0.109.

The man was reported for exceeding the speed limit and drink-driving.

He was issued with a six-month immediate loss of licence notice and his car was impounded for 28 days.

He will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date.

Just before 5pm on Friday, July 28, a 38-year-old Millicent man was stopped by police on Riddoch Highway, Tarpeena.

Police checks revealed he was disqualified from driving and he also returned a positive drug test.

He was reported and his vehicle was impounded for 28 days. He will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date.

Farm hit with \$12k fine

Topfield Farms has been fined \$12,000 for clearing native vegetation contrary to clearance control.

The land - which was located on East Shaw Road, Shaugh - had an already established centre-pivot irrigation system native vegetation areas on the land had been cleared.

In April 2022, the Department of Environment and Water observed piles of vegetation, debris, two clay pits - one of which was new and the other showed signs of having been extended - machinery marks in the soil, evidence of vegetation regeneration and soil mounds.

In total there was 8.48 hectares of native

vegetation in three distinct areas which had been cleared by chain and tractor blade.

The vegetation cleared would have likely consisted of 75 different native plant species.

According to sentencing remarks, Gregory Gartner - who was the first defendant - cordoned off the northern fire access track and ceased use of the area as well as stopped using clay pits and no longer placed clay on the tracks surrounding the pivots.

The submission report stated the clearing was an “honest mistake” with Mr Gartner relying on what the former owner of the land and a valuer had said.

Mr Gartner said when he bought the property in late 2019 he had “verbal clarification” he was allowed to make a fire track on that

particular side of the farm.

“That area has specific scrub and we were allowed to chain it or blade it but not plow it,” Mr Gartner said.

“We also had written confirmation we were allowed to do that as well.”

He said he had just wanted to put a fire trail in the property to allow workers to get out of the area.

“We put this track in to get out of the area and clayed a centre-pivot circle,” Mr Gartner said.

“Two things we did that the department was not happy with were two particular areas we thought we did not need to seek permits for.”

He said he was “disappointed” in the de-

partment for not taking into account he had previously been told he was allowed to put the track in.

“The department didn’t listen and went along and issued us with a court hearing,” Mr Gartner said.

“The easiest thing I could do - because I didn’t want to get tied up in court - is plead guilty.”

“In the court hearing, the judge did the best they could and the judge fully understood but knew he had to give us at least the minimum.”

Mr Gartner said he would continue to look into obtaining more documentation to prove he was allowed to put in a fire track on the property.

‘Breath of fresh air’: Positive future for MacKillop MP

Roads and health will be the main topic of discussion for Member of MacKillop Nick McBride following the Parliamentary mid-winter break.

Mr McBride told The South Eastern Times he was feeling “refreshed” and ready to represent the constituents of MacKillop after recently resigning from the Liberal Party and becoming an Independent.

He said as an Independent member, he found it “like a breath of fresh air” that his focus was now able to be “solely on MacKillop and the greater Limestone Coast”.

“This is for the greater good of the Limestone Coast and I have got a number of topics that sit right at the top,” Mr McBride said.

“Health is certainly one of those and we are going to be working very closely with the Minister for Health and try to address some of the infrastructure shortfalls in the region.”

He said he was also hoping to “pick up” on hospitals and services within the region which “have been forgotten about for maybe more than 20 years”.

“I am hoping the State Government will also take into consideration what role the Naracoorte Hospital means for the greater area of MacKillop and the Limestone Coast and what role our hospital will play for specialists that will integrate,” he said.

“We are already hearing from doctors they know the hospital precinct does not meet the town’s needs.”

As well as the Naracoorte Hospital, Mr McBride also wanted to bring the hospitals of Bordertown, Millicent, Kingston and Tailem Bend to the State Government’s attention.

“Roads and infrastructure are also major issues and we have got a number of roads that are in the top 10 by Grain Producers South Australia that are in despair and are difficult for heavy vehicle transport,” he said.

“There are issues on roads between Kyby-

bolite, Frances and Bordertown and we also have the Southern Ports Highway between Beachport and Millicent plus more.”

Mr McBride also confirmed he would work closely with local councils within MacKillop to discuss road infrastructure and the heavy infrastructure of roads which was needed for forestry close to Glencoe and towards the boundary outside Mount Gambier.

“We have roads there that are not keeping pace with the heavy transport as well,” Mr McBride said.

Speaking on his time thus far as an independent member, Mr McBride said it was “refreshing” and “exciting”.

“The first week was tough, not knowing how it was going to be received,” he said.

“I would have to say some of the language of my departure was not that complimentary which is fine but I have ignored it and ploughed on.

“It is all about MacKillop now and what I can do for my electorate.”

He said he hoped he could “surprise the

constituents of MacKillop” by being independent and working well with the State Government.

“I think my chance of getting funding for MacKillop is a lot greater and higher as an independent than as it was when I was a Liberal backbencher,” he said.

“I am glad to be stepping back from the opposition role and now solely focused on MacKillop for all the right reasons and addressing what has been a shortfall for a couple of decades.”



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Fields return with awards

Both awards are in recognition of her two years working with the Wattle Range Lioness as they moved to becoming a charter club.

The dedicated Lion member now heads into the new year as the Global membership approach coordinator and the Global Service Team Coordinator.

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On the Voice to Parliament

Australians are preparing to vote either Yes or No in a referendum this year to decide whether an Indigenous Voice to Parliament will be enshrined into the Constitution.

The Voice to Parliament is expected to give Indigenous communities a way to inform policy and legal decisions which impact their lives.

The proposal was first introduced five years ago in the Uluru Statement from the Heart and called for “the establishment of a First Nations Voice enshrined in the Constitution and a Makarrata Commission to supervise a process of agreement-making and truth-telling” about Indigenous history.

We spoke to two Limestone Coast residents - one who will vote Yes and one who will vote No - about why they are voting as they are.

VOTING YES: GEORGE BECK

Mount Gambier/Berrin resident George Beck openly stated he will vote ‘yes’ to the Voice to Parliament referendum expected to take place later this year.

Mr Beck said he wanted to vote in favour of the proposal to ensure Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders are recognised in the Constitution as the First Australians.

He also stated having a permanent body to give advice to parliament on matters which directly affected them was the best way to “streamline representations” on issues such as Indigenous health, education, housing, safety and economic development.

“I believe in lobby groups and advisory bodies because my existence as a farmer relies on them,” Mr Beck said.

“I trust groups like the National Farmers Federation to represent my interests as a sheep and cattle producer to Canberra as a united body.”

He said although he did not agree with “every single policy” the federation had, he was mostly satisfied he would always have access to that conduit.

Mr Beck said if the referendum was successful, it would give a voice back to those who had historically been voiceless.

“My family has been voiceless in the face of terrible government policy,” Mr Beck said.

“To start with, my grandmother Linda was one of the Stolen Generations, she was forcibly taken from her parents and never saw them again.

“When Linda had her first and only baby - my mother - Mum was forcibly adopted at birth.”

He recalled the effect forced adoptions had on his family and said it “disproportionately targeted Indigenous mothers”.

“My grandmother was forcibly sterilised at that time without any knowledge or consent,” he said.

“Family is core to who I am, so it is heart-breaking to know my grandmother really wanted to have a family, and the policies and

practices of that time robbed her of that ability.”

Mr Beck said to those who were unsure of how to vote leading up to the referendum to ask themselves whether having an Indigenous advisory body in Canberra would affect them.

“This is an opportunity to try a different approach,” he said.

“We need to start somewhere and this is the opportunity to do just that.

“It won’t change two centuries worth of relative failure overnight but it is a step in the right direction consulting the people for whom policies are being made for.”

VOTING NO: LACHLAN HAYNES:

Limestone Coast resident Lachlan Haynes said he would be voting against the Voice to Parliament because he believes a referendum change always had to be “heavily considered”.

“This is not to be done lightly, that is why so many referendums do not pass because it is a very serious document and I don’t believe it [the Constitution] should be tampered with unless for a very, very good reason,” Mr Haynes said.

“I support the 1967 referendum which was overwhelmingly supported by Australians and I think that was a great decision because it really took race out of the Constitution.

“I believe in very fair and decent people that see Australia through an egalitarian light and that is why - should I have been around during the 1967 referendum - I would have absolutely supported that as well.”

Mr Haynes said he was also very “fearful” of making constitutional changes and he believed the Voice to Parliament would “reinsert race back in as a conversation” in the Constitution.

“Outside of constitutional change I believe Australians have become a really great egalitarian and decent society where we have all viewed each other as equal,” he said.

“We try to see everyone and as a very large multicultural society, I think we see each other removed from race, skin colour and ethnicity which is what has made Australia really good.

“I want to see that continue and I don’t want to see us reverting from that.”

He said he believed the Voice to Parliament was not the mechanism for assisting Indigenous people with future issues and said there was “not enough explanation or detail” coming out about why or how a constitutional change would address Indigenous community issues.

“I am happy to see in the future things that are voted on that I think are meaningful and that will work but I believe we are getting a level of detail to make me confident of this change through voting,” he said.

“I think we could be enshrining race again as a discussion in the Constitution but I don’t see us formalising through the Voice any mechanism going forward that will improve Indigenous outcomes meaningfully.”

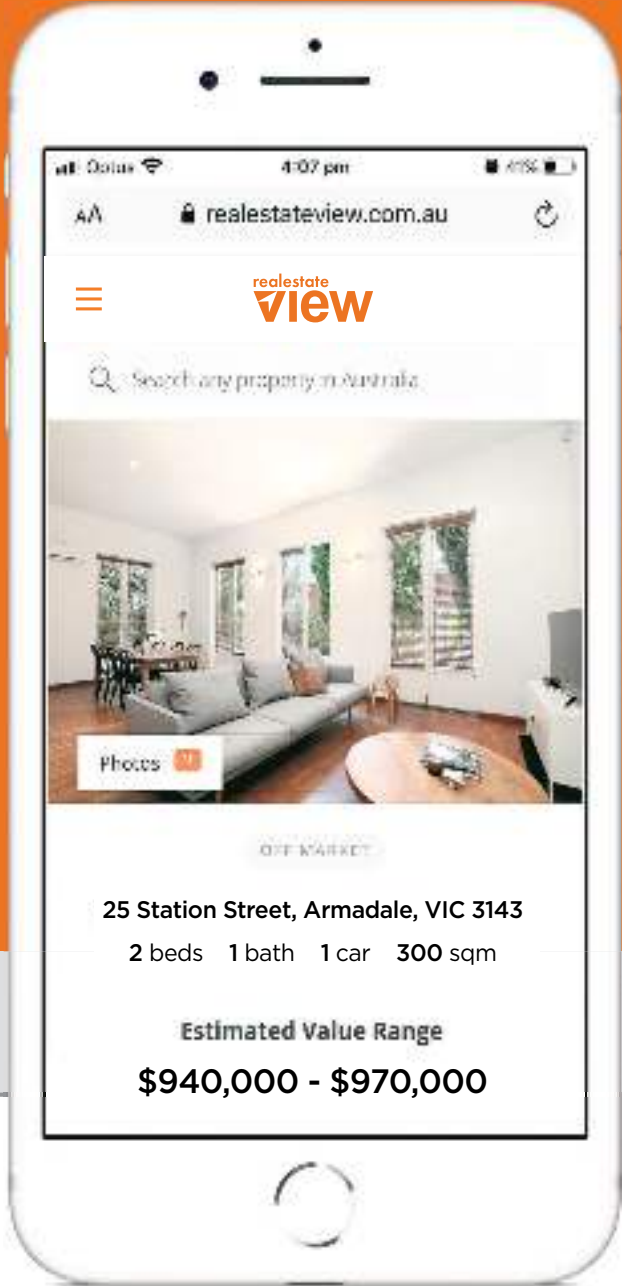
"Her experience is extensive, and her honest and objective feedback on our local wines will be invaluable," Mr Grey-Smith said.

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History of the cottage

In association with State Heritage, Penola's branch of National Trust SA has developed a mobile phone app called SA Heritage, to enable people to learn more about historic sites within Penola on self guided tours.

The following is one of the subjects from this app.

WILSON COTTAGE

William Wilson was born in Fifeshire, Scotland, in 1818. He worked as a gardener before serving in the British Army as a member of the Black Watch Regiment. Wilson with his wife Agnes (nee Barclay) immigrated to Australia in 1849.

He arrived in the Penola district where he found employment as a shepherd at Killanoola Station and then at nearby Maaoupe Station.

The discovery of gold in Victoria led to a rush of men to the diggings.

William Wilson joined the throng pushing a wheel barrow with his possessions from Penola to Ballarat. He left his wife and three children for almost two years, during which time he and his mate accumulated a good amount of gold. Unfortunately, while William was planning to return to his family, his mate absconded with the gold. William stayed on for another few months finding enough gold to return home, pushing his wheel barrow all the way back to Penola.

On his return William purchased this allotment and established a remarkable market garden and orchard on the site.

The produce from the fruit trees, vegetable patch and grape vines became extremely well known throughout the South East of the state,

and Wilson made regular trips to Naracoorte and Mt Gambier with his spring cart loaded with produce.

In 1890 John Riddoch, owner of Yallum Station, recognised the quality of the fruit and grapes produced on the rich terra rossa soil of the Wilson garden and, after obtaining advice from agricultural experts from Adelaide proceeded with his dream of establishing what became the Coonawarra Fruit Colony.

There are many descendants of William Wilson in this district including the Redman, Brand and Balnaves families who are all still involved in the Coonawarra Wine Industry.

In 1985 this cottage was donated to the Penola Branch of the National Trust of South Australia by Mrs Myra Neilson and her daughter, Heatherjean Hetherington on behalf of Mr Ron Neilson, descendant of William Wilson.

Presently Jill Mooney's vintage clothing and collectables shop it is a popular attraction in Petticoat Lane.

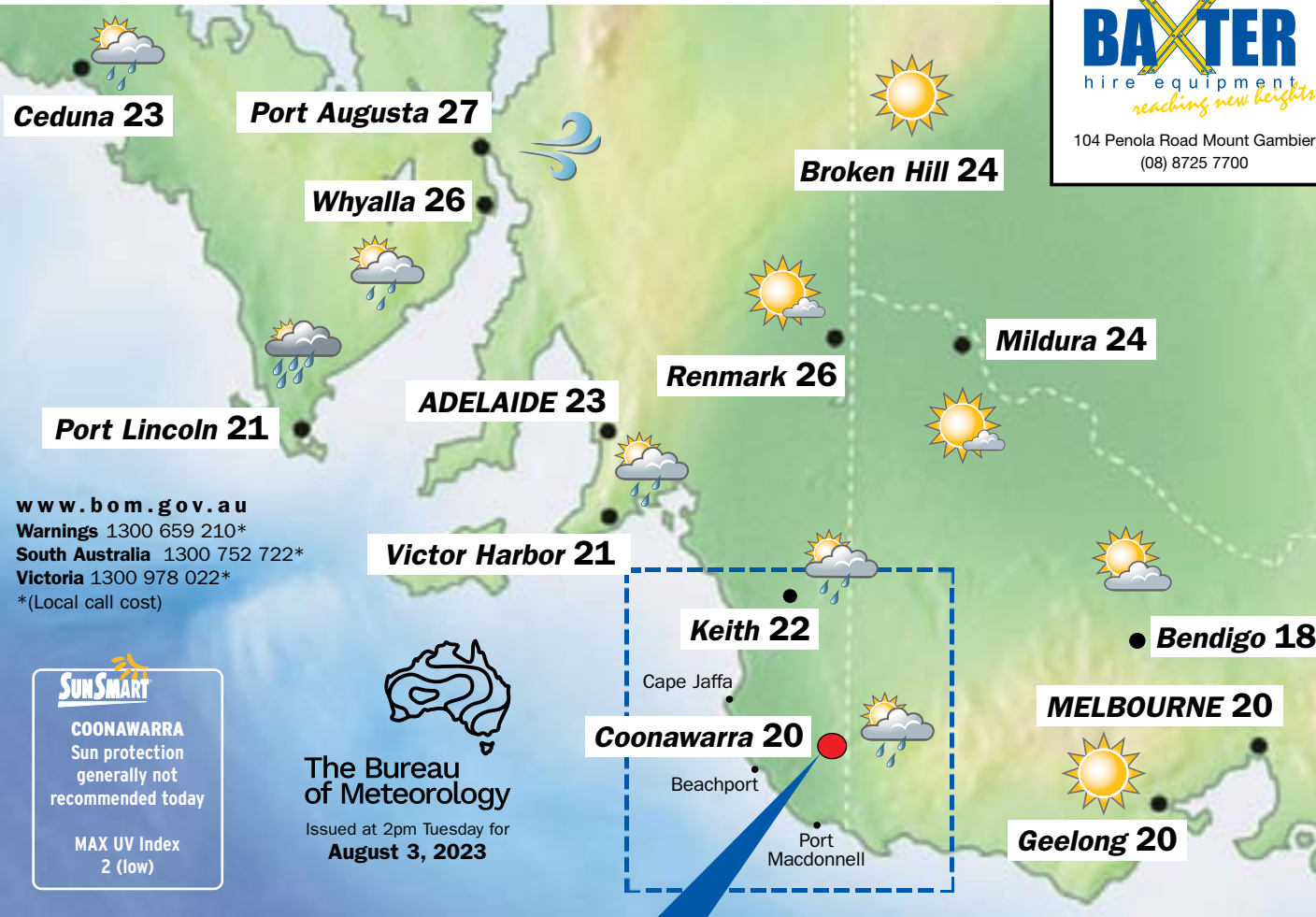

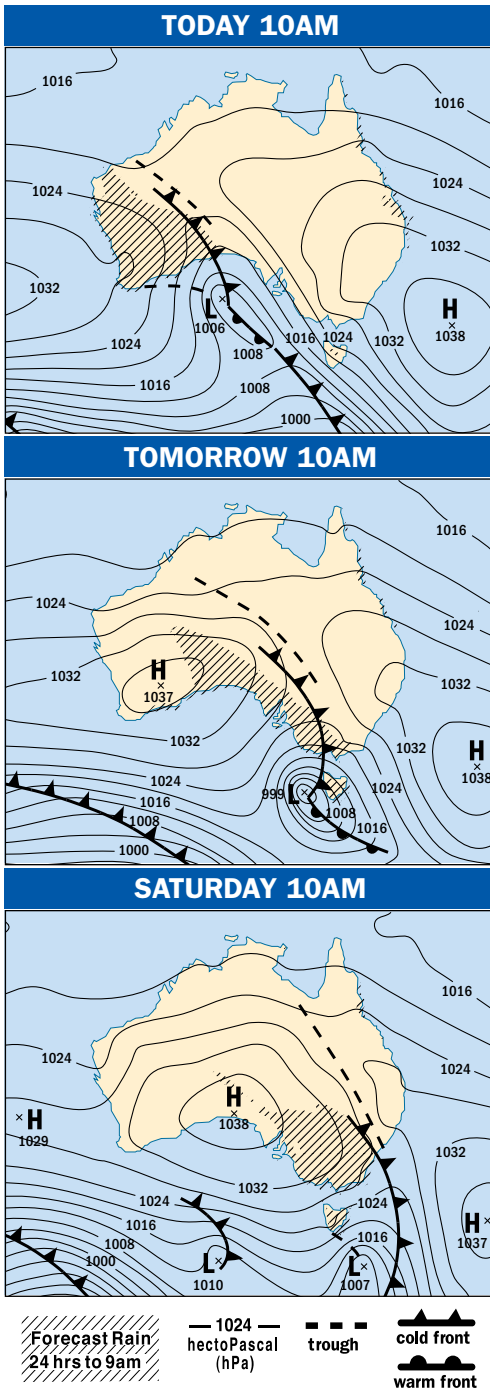

Choc Hazelnut Egg Bread Braid

Serves: 10

Ingredients

- 4 cups (600g) bread flour
- 2 tsp (7g) Active Dry Yeast
- 2 tbsp caster sugar
- 1 tsp salt
- ½ cup (125ml) cold water
- ½ cup (125ml) cold milk,
- 60g cold butter, finely diced
- 2 eggs, slightly beaten,
- ½ cup (140g) chocolate hazelnut spread, warmed
- 1/3 cup toasted salted peanuts, coarsely chopped
- Icing sugar to serve

Method:

1. Place 2 cups of the flour, yeast, sugar and salt into the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment. Mix well at low speed for 1 minute
2. Add water, milk and diced butter and beat at low speed for 1-2 minutes or until butter has been incorporated.
3. Remaining at low speed, gradually add beaten eggs a little at a time. Increase speed to medium and beat for 2 minutes. Mixture should be glossy and sticky.
4. Remove paddle attachment and insert dough hook. Beat on low speed and slowly add remaining flour, ½ cup at a time until it forms a firm dough. Increase speed and knead for 5 minutes or until dough is smooth and elastic.
5. Tip dough onto a lightly flour work surface and form into a ball. Place in a lightly oiled bowl and turn to grease top. Cover; and allow to rise for 1-1/2 hours or until doubled in size.
6. Punch down dough and roll out to form a 30cm x 35cm rectangle. Spread chocolate-hazelnut spread onto dough leaving a 1 1/2cm border on all sides. Sprinkle over chopped peanuts.
7. Starting from one of the long sides, roll up dough to form a log. Position roll in front of you and with a sharp knife cut the centre lengthwise, leaving intact the edge farthest from you, so that the two halves of dough are not completely separated but remain attached. Braid the two edges without tightening and try to keep the dough with the choc hazelnut facing up. Place onto a greased and line baking tray. Rise in warm place for 15-20 minutes (note: dough is ready when indentation remains after lightly touching)
8. Preheat oven 200°C/ 180°C (fan forced). Bake 25- 30 minutes until golden brown. Check at 15 minutes and if browning too fast, cover with foil. Cool on wire rack and serve dusted with icing sugar.

German Potato Salad

Cook +prep time: 30 mins
Serves: 8

Ingredients

Potato Salad

- 1kg baby chat potatoes
- 2 rashers bacon, cut into short matchsticks
- ¼ cup mint leaves
- 4 hard-boiled eggs, sliced

Quick Pickled Onion

- 2 tbsp white wine vinegar
- 2 tbsp caster sugar
- 1 red onion thinly sliced, into rounds

Dressing

- ½ cup (120g) sour cream
- ¼ cup (75g) mayonnaise
- 2 tbsp seeded mustard
- 2 tbsp chopped chives

Method:

1. Place the potatoes in a large saucepan of cold salted water. Bring to the boil and cook for 10–12 minutes, or until tender. Drain and set aside to cool slightly. Cut in half and place in a large bowl.
2. While the potato is cooking, place the vinegar and sugar in a small bowl and whisk to dissolve the sugar. Add the onion and set aside for 5 minutes.
3. To make the dressing, place sour cream, mayonnaise, mustard, chives, salt and pepper. Drain onion pickling liquid into the dressing and reserve the onions. Whisk dressing to combine. Add most of the dressing to potatoes, and toss to combine. Place potatoes on a platter with the pickled onion.
4. Heat a large non-stick frying pan over medium heat. Cook bacon for 4-5 minutes or until golden and crisp. Drain. Sprinkle over the salad.
5. Top salad with eggs and drizzle with the remaining dressing. Serve scattered with mint.

Egg & Trout Croissants

Cook +prep time: 15 mins
Serves: 4

Ingredients

- 4 eggs
- 4 large croissants
- ½ cup crème fraiche
- 1 tbsp chopped chives, plus extra to serve
- ½ lemon, grated zest and 2 tsp of juice
- 1 cup watercress
- 100g smoked ocean trout slices
- Lemon wedges, to serve

Method:

1. Heat oil in a large non-stick frying pan on medium high. Crack eggs one at a time into hot pan. Cook for 2 minutes, until whites set and are crispy around the edges.
2. Split croissants in half and place cut side up on an oven tray lined with baking paper. Cook under grill for 30 seconds to 1 minute, until toasted and golden.
3. In a small bowl, combine crème fraiche, chives, lemon zest and juice. Season with salt and pepper and mix well.
4. Spread bases with crème fraiche mixture. Top with watercress, folds of trout slices and then a fried egg. Scatter with extra chives and pepper. Serve with lemon wedges and any extra crème fraiche mixture.

X-Trail puts in the e-power

Not to make too much of a point about it, but beating of chests by automobile manufacturers about their fight to save the planet appear to be getting louder.

Take Nissan, for example, with its new X-Trail petrol / electric hybrid SUV.

Badges announcing e-Power and e-4ORCE, the company's commitment to electrification, are plastered prominently all-round the vehicle on top of the restrained EV initials (for electric vehicle) found on rego plates of similar cars.

Under the skin e-POWER is a 100 per cent electric motor-driven system Nissan claims gives the owner same high-performance driving experience as an all-electric car.

It uses the EV technology perfected in the Nissan Leaf and adds an efficient, petrol engine to charge the lightweight, lithium-ion battery pack when needed.

First introduced in Japan in 2016 with the Nissan Note at its core is electric motor-driven technology used to deliver instant torque, power, efficiency and a high-level driving experience.

In high power demand situations, such as strong acceleration, the petrol engine and generator are used to keep the battery pack charged and can directly power the electric motor, but not the wheels directly.

Not satisfied with the improved powertrain alone, Nissan also has upped the ante with new electric-drive four-wheel-control technology from e-4ORCE, which optimises the balance between powerful and unprecedented control, with a smooth ride for all, thanks to superior handling on a wide range of surfaces.

Where does the hybrid sit in the SUV scheme of things? The Mitsubishi Outlander comes only as a plug-in hybrid, while direct competition comes from Toyota's RAV4 hybrid AWD and GWM Haval H6 Ultra hybrids. The Tesla Model Y is fully electric and there's no hybrid Kia Sportage or Hyundai Tucson as yet.

The X-Trail hybrid comes only in the premium Ti and Ti-L models with a starting price of \$54,190, plus on-road costs, putting the hybrids \$4200 above their 2.5-litre petrol-only siblings.

They are both covered by the standard Nissan warranty of five years unlimited kilometres with capped price servicing and prepaid maintenance plan.

STYLING

At a tad under 4.7 metres long, a bit over 1.8 metres wide, and 1.7 metres tall, the fourth-generation X-Trail squarely takes a mid-size SUV spot and follows a distinctly Nissan angular design direction, sharing several sharp lines with the Pathfinder and Qashqai, the e-Power hybrids differing from equivalent combustion-engine-only models with a revised V-Motion grille and badging.

Lighting is up present-day standards with auto LED headlamps, LED tail-lights, daytime running lights and fog lights.

The 19-inch alloy wheels, a floating roofli-

ne with panoramic sunroof, auto rain-sensing wipers put the finishing touches to the newcomers.

INTERIOR

Inside, the surroundings are a blend of quality craftsmanship and materials highlighting comfort and convenience all round.

Comfort is covered by 10-way power-adjustable (and heated) front seats, three-zone climate control, six-speaker audio (with digital radio), leather-accented trim, a leather-trimmed steering wheel.

Move to the back and the first thing you notice is the rear door opening to 85 degrees, which makes it easier to get in and out.

The rear seats (split 40 / 20 / 40) can slide forward for more boot space, or back for maximum passenger room.

With all seats upright cargo space is 575 litres, a mere 10 litres less than the combustion-only X-Trail.

Lower the rear seat and that volume increases to around 2000 litres.

A power tailgate eases loading.

There's no spare wheel of any sort, only a puncture kit.

The centre console has a floating design, with room for large items in a rubberised section underneath.

A shift-by-wire gear selector is compact and user-friendly.

Also on hand are buttons for EV and e-Pedal modes, as well as a rotary dial to access drive and terrain systems.

INFOTAINMENT

The all-new X-Trail Ti and Ti-L hybrids continue the debut of three new info displays, including a 12.3-inch touch-screen, 10.8-inch head-up windscreen display and 12.3-inch

digital instrument cluster, with customisation of information clearly and easily accessible.

Smartphone integration has been upgraded with wireless smartphone charging and wireless Apple CarPlay for seamless connectivity, along with additional USB-A and USB-C charge ports for keeping smartphones and tablets topped up.

ENGINES / TRANSMISSIONS

Nissan's e-POWER system includes a petrol engine with a power generator, inverter, battery and an electric motor. The electric motor delivers power directly to the wheels, using energy stored in the battery pack.

Used for charging the battery pack or powering the electric motor, the petrol engine eliminates the need for an EV charger. There is no direct link with the wheels.

Towing capacity for e-POWER models is rated at 1650 kg, compared to 2000 kg for petrol versions.

SAFETY

The X-Trail hybrids earn a five-star ANCAP rating under 2021 test conditions and added information and testing. Active safety is covered by forward autonomous emergency braking (pedestrian and cyclist), adaptive cruise control, lane departure warning and ProPilot lane keeping, traffic sign recognition, rear cross-traffic alert, driver attention alert, and reverse autonomous emergency braking (pedestrian).

Pedestrians close to the vehicle are alerted by an external audible warning when it is in almost silent EV mode.

Seven airbags include a centre airbag between front seat occupants.

DRIVING

With responsive electric motor control in fractions of a second and instantaneous torque on tap, e-Power delivers smooth almost silent ac-

celeration off the mark, courtesy of noise cancelling measures in the cabin.

When called on for more power, the petrol engine and generator chime in with a not-too-unpleasant hum, keeping the battery pack charged and, if needed, directly powering the electric motor.

There is no direct connection between the engine and wheels, the power plant acting only as a generator recharging the battery through an inverter.

EV or e-Pedal control are instigated by means of buttons on the centre console.

EV is what it says – no petrol engine input here – and can be operated for a short distance.

On test, press of the EV button was answered by a message saying the battery was not charged enough to sustain electric-only operation.

Maybe at a later time.

The e-Pedal had no such impediment, leaving the accelerator to apply the brakes automatically when the foot was lifted off, calling on the regenerating capacity to slow the car almost to a halt.

Nissan claims combined urban / highway fuel consumption of 6.1 litres per 100 kilometres. The test car recorded 7.4 litres per 100 kilometres during a normal working week in the city and 4.8 kilometres per 100 kilometres on a motorway run.

SUMMARY

In its performance the Nissan X-Trail Ti e-POWER with e-4ORCE does lean more to the full electric vehicle rather than the hybrid SUV. However, there's the added running cost of buying petrol.

The premium purchase price over petrol-only models is covered somewhat by the increased Ti / Ti-L equipment.
