Rally car sends a message

Like many who have been diagnosed, former Wattle Range Council mayor Peter Gandolfi would not have known he had prostate cancer if he didn't ask his local GP for a PSA blood test – now he wants all men to know how important it is to get checked as they get older.

At 55, Peter was diagnosed with prostate cancer following a regular blood test showing a sudden increase in his PSA (prostate specific antigen) in February this vear.

By May he underwent a radical prostatectomy. The cancer was at stage three.

"I have been very fortunate," Peter said. Continued page 3

Station sits idle

There remains no plans to reopen the Kalangadoo police station with residents and Wattle Range Councillors now calling for the vacant police house to be repurposed for other government workers.

The police station has been unmanned since 2017 with former Police Minister Corey Wingard originally citing a statewide review of regional policing service delivery. Since then, there has been no announcement of the review and the Kalangadoo station remains closed.

Alongside the police station, a dedicat-

ed home for an officer in Kalangadoo has remained vacant since the decision was made. Wattle Range Councillors discussed the

decision at this week's chamber meeting following a string of correspondence from local politicians. Police Minister Joe Szakacs wrote to Member for MacKillop Nick McBride confirming there were "no current plans" for the office to be reopened.

"I can reassure local residents, however, that the Kalangadoo area police response continues to be served by police officers based out of neighbouring police stations of Millicent, Penola and Mount Gambier," Mr Szakacs wrote in the letter.

"Police response to the area is based on identifying and deploying the nearest patrol to an incident, regardless of the police station of origin or shift commencement.'

He also stated Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Tom Koutsantonis was responsible for reallocating the vacant home for other government workers, stating the home was "considered a single location" for the Govern-

ment Employee Housing program and thus he could not utilise the home for employees outside SAPOL.

Kalangadoo resident Jane Fetherstonhaugh initially wrote to a number of Limestone Coast politicians regarding allowing other government workers to live in the home.

"There was someone in the home for the first few years after it was built and that was the town policeman but since then there has not been anyone," Ms Fetherstonhaugh said. Story page 5





Winemaker stands out

A coonawarra winemaker is on cloud nine after taking out top honours at a national awards ceremony.

Penley Estate winemaker Kate Goodman made history when she became the first person from Coonawarra to win the Halliday Wine Companion Winemaker of the Year award.

Ms Goodman said the award was evidence that Penley is on the right track, with the winery also being shortlisted for Australian Winery of the Year.

"Since the beginning, Bec and Ang Tolley have given me the complete support and encouragement to turn things on their head, and push to the point of failure to really work out what our vineyards can do," she said.

"That's incredibly rare and offers me and our team the opportunity to create great things.

"winning this award and being shortlisted for Winery of the Year is recognition and confirmation that we are on the right path, and we don't have to keep second guessing ourselves."

Penley Estate co-owner Ang Tolley said the award was well-deserved, with Ms Goodman obviously looking to invest in the winery's vision.

"Kate's leadership, together with viticulturist, Hans Loder feels as though we have taken an almighty breath of fresh Coonawarra air and we are totally inspired to continue to push boundaries and create," she said.

Halliday Wine Companion chief editor Campbell Mattinson said Ms Goodman's achievements at Penley were "quite astonishing".

"It's rare - if not unheard of - that a winery do everything well," he said.

"And yet somehow Kate is producing everything from the avant garde to the traditional to an exceptional standard.



"She's obviously getting people excited about Penley but I'd also go so far as to say that she's turning people on to Coonawarra itself."

It was a good weekend for Limestone Coast wineries, with Padthaway's Landaire Wines also winning two award for the estate's 2021 Chardonnay, grown and bottled in the upper south east.

Carolyn and David Brown, of Landaire Wines, are celebrating with their team after their wine won the Chardonnay of the Year and the overall White Wine of the Year for the 2024 edition of the Halliday Wine Companion. Mrs Brown is a former CSIRO research scientist and said the vineyard is well suited to producing a Chardonnay.

"The soil is our greatest asset, allowing us to manage the vines to produce a small crop of flavourful grapes," she said.

We pick the grapes on flavour... I love the acidity in our wines."

Mrs Brown said that the award was unexpected and a great surprise.

"Our wine brand is quite small, and we only make a certain amount of bottles but have a wide variety of what we produce," she said.

Mrs Brown said that the vineyard and la-





bel has been in work since the space was purchased and she and her husband are very proud of where it is today.

The Halliday Wine Companion Award was the first for the vineyard.

"We recieved 98 points (out of 100) for the Chardonnay and won that category, and then the top white wines went against each other for the overall White Wine of the Year, which we were thankful to receive," he said.

"Our wine from this little part of South Australia went up against wines from around Australia."

"If it wasn't for my wife Kathy and local GP, Dr James Bushell I wouldn't have had a clue that I had prostate cancer.

"Kathy insisted that I have a regular blood test and Dr Bushell referred me to a urologist after noticing a spike in my PSA – I had no signs whatsoever.

"Without a PSA test there would have been a very high chance of it spreading well beyond my prostate."

One in five men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer before they reach the age of 85 and more than 3,000 men die from the cancer each year in Australia.

A motorsport tragic, Peter had purchased a tarmac rally car just prior to being diagnosed with prostate cancer.

"My prostate cancer experience highlighted to me the importance of PSA testing and I thought the new rally car would be the perfect billboard," Peter said.

"During my down time following surgery, I thought about signwriting the car with the 'Get Checked' message.

"With help from the Prostate Cancer Foundation and local signwriter Matt Cockrum we worked on the design and while I was recovering at home, I would spend an hour or two a day in my shed attaching the new livery to the car.

"It was a great distraction during recovery and kept me entertained while stuck at home."

Peter said blokes are very involved in motorsport.

"While I'll never be competing at the V8 Supercars level, I can do my little bit at getting the message out to competitors and spectators at the local club level." Peter's first outing in the newly sign written rally car proved the message was working.

He said he pulled up at a service station at The Bend Motorsport Park last month and the

bloke next to him asked if he was a doctor? "No, but I was a patient," Peter told him.

"A lucky one?" he asked.

"Yes, a lucky one," Peter told him, realising that the sign written car had worked in that it had given him the opportunity to give the perfect response.

"Only because I got checked with a simple blood test," Peter said, encouraging him to think about doing the same.

Peter's stickered up rally car spent the following morning running around The Bend at a track day and he hopes the message it carried inspired more of the mainly male participants to think about getting checked for prostate cancer.

Major investment planned

An ambitious goal to modernise the Millicent Golf Club continues with doors currently being replaced with large glass sliding doors allowing wheelchair and disability access.

Upgrades have been made available due to a \$28,800 grant from the State Government's Thriving Communities Program.

The club has 12 months to complete the project which includes a deck at the front of the clubrooms accessible to all.

But the club has not stopped there with plans and grant applications are underway for a \$500,000 dollar project to further upgrade course facilities.

Club president Mark Pilmore spoke to the South Eastern Times about the club's goal to improve course irrigation and fully automate the watering system.

"Watering is a costly exercise every summer, it's a very labor intensive exercise" Mr Pilmore said.

"You lose a lot of water during the daytime due to the wind, and there is overwatering and underwatering.

"It's very archaic and a fulltime job.

"Unfortunately we have just lost our greenkeeper, Colin Vanderheul.

"He has been with us for 15 years and decided to retire, his last day was on Monday."

The retirement of Mr Vanderheul has left the watering as a completely volunteer job with Mr Pilmore saying they have people organised to head out at 6am to water the course with the use of sprinklers.

As part of the project on-course toilets and an all-weather undercover driving range are also in the planning stages.

On-course toilets will bring the course in line with many others that already have these facilities with a toilet planned for each of the front nine and back nine holes.

Members of the Millicent Ladies Golf are already on board and helping with the fund-

raising which they believe is important to encourage more women to play.

Heidi Muhovics and Bec Shanks have only been playing golf for the last 12 months but are helping with the fundraising.

"It takes about four or five hours to do the course and toilets are common on other courses," Ms Muhovics said.

"Fundraising and grants will hopefully get us there, we are just going to keep going until we can do it.

"We are at the preliminary stages with other fundraisers in the works."

Ms Shanks said it would be a big benefit to the course.

"Instead of having to go in the bush in the middle of summer when there are snakes around," she said.

Mr Pilmore believes the planned undercov-

er driving range will also be a game changer for the club and open opportunities for golfing workshops and schools to use the facilities as part of their sports programs.

"It's a lot of fundraising and a lot of work," he said.

"But everyone at the golf club are really hard working volunteers.

"It is a big investment, but we're going to do it to keep moving forward."

Advocates to tour region, speaking up for mental health

Mental health advocates Ben Pettingill and Mike Rolls will visit the Limestone Coast this week and next to host several community events to help normalise conversations around mental health and suicide.

Mr Pettingill, who lost 98 per cent of his vision at 16-years-old, said he and Mr Rolls, who lost both his legs to meningococcal at 18-years-old, would share their stories of overcoming adversity.

"We're just a couple of blokes who have been though some s**t, have been through some tough times, just as all of us have, and we're going to share a bit about it," he said.

Jokingly referring to themselves as Legless and Blind, Mr Pettingill said the visit to the South East would form part of their wider mission of bringing awareness to regional and rural communities.

"We have partnered with Ski for Life, a South Australian charity focused on promoting mental health wellbeing and suicide prevention, to deliver what we have called their



not being afraid to ask for help when you need it."

Mr Pettingill said the sessions would be appropriate to anyone and everyone in the community.

"Our target audience is anyone that experiences a tough time in life from time to time and that can be big, small, any shape or size," he said.

"Most of us go through a tough time every now and again so therefore it is appropriate for everyone."

He said the sessions would encourage people to band together and keep battling to make it through to the other side.

"Sometimes the most important thing is just sitting and listening, you don't have to give advice, you don't have to have the solutions, you don't have to fix the problem, you've just got to be there and start the conversation, " he said.

During the week long visit to the region Mr Pettingill said he and Mr Rolls would also deliver 15 sessions across seven Limestone Coast schools, including Millicent and Penola, which would have a different focus than the public sessions.

Mates on a Mission program," he said.

Mr Pettingill said the sessions would be relaxed and conversational and not too serious with lots of laughs.

"It's not your stereotypical mental health information session, that's for sure, especially when it's delivered by two blokes called Legless and Blind," he said.

"That's pretty intentional because quite often when you've got a mental health information session you don't get the people coming that probably need to come.

"That's why we do it a little bit differently and why we pitch it as a story telling night where you'll hear our own personal stories of overcoming adversity."

"The four key messages there are about building a team, leaning on your mates, calculating your control, and taking one step at a time."

Kalangadoo resident Jane Fetherstonhaugh initially wrote to a number of Limestone Coast politicians regarding allowing other government workers to live in the home.

"There was someone in the home for the first few years after it was built and that was the town policeman but since then there has not been anyone," Ms Fetherstonhaugh said.

"We would just like to know one way or the other what will happen and if they are going to close the station then just close it.

"Everyone has resigned to the fact the police station will not reopen but given the

house is a fairly modern new house with nobody in it and there is a shortage of housing for key workers it makes sense.'

She said following the recent announcement of four new key worker houses being built in Mount Gambier, she believed the Kalangadoo home could be open to all government workers rather than just police officers.

"The house could be supporting a worker in any of the surrounding towns and the people of Kalangadoo just want to know and want something done with the police station and the house," she said.

"It is disappointing not to have a dedicated police officer and it has been talked about with the police review being underway since 2018 but it is still not out.'

Ms Fetherstonhaugh said while the review was underway the house had been sitting empty, labelling it as an "absolute waste".

"Hopefully we can get a family in there and kids can go to the primary school here," she said.

"We have all the facilities and it is a great little town and it will bring a family into the community

"We need an answer and the house needs to have someone in it and if they are not going to use it then sell it to someone who will come into town."

In a statement provided to this publication, Mr Szakacs said the "strategic deployment" of police and operation resourcing was a decision undertaken by SAPOL.

"SAPOL have advised me they have no plan to change the staffing arrangements in place

since 2017 at the Kalangadoo Police Station," Mr Szakacs said.

"The State Government and SAPOL are dedicated to ensuring those who live or visit the South East are as safe as they can possibly be.

"The Limestone Coast Local Service Area proactively responds to emerging trends to best dedicate resources to form a collaborative approach to ensuring community safety."

During this week's council meeting councillors elected for Mayor Des Noll to write to the relevant ministers to advocate for both the home and police station to be changed from a single government used facility to a multigovernment use facility or if not possible for the station to sell it for further use.

Members for MacKillop Nick McBride supported the change of the housing facility and said he would work with the government to advocate for it.

"I have seen this police station empty for nearly all my political term and we have not been lucky enough to have a police station there because I think it is too close to Mount Gambier," Mr McBride said.

Now it has been exhausted, the house and infrastructure there would be better served by other government workers and I will do everything I can to make sure that will happen if the police station will never be policed again.

"The next step will be working with the ministers to see what we can do whether it make amendments so the house can be taken up by other government sources like health or education.

'Weathering the storm': Ups and downs of wine industry

The state's wine industry continues to struggle with market access, over supply, supply chain issues and an increased cost of production yet Coonawarra Vigneron president Dan Redman says the Limestone Coast region was "weathering the storm" better than other areas.

Mr Redman said although other regions found themselves in difficulty - with some grape growers and producers walking awaythe Coonawarra region was not facing as many challenges.

"Coonawarra is not immune from issues but the region is weathering the storm better than other regions," Mr Redman said.

"We are facing challenges but not as much as others and there is a little bit of light at the end of the tunnel with China lifting tariffs on Bali and politicians stating the next tariff target is the wine industry.'

Shadow Minister for Regional South Australia Nicola Centofanti said she had been made aware of a number of concerns from vineyard owners following a number of factors including market access, over supply,

supply chain issues and increased cost of pro- there was a risk of vineyard owners walking duction.

Ms Centofanti said due to these issues

away from their land.

"What this will create is a potential bios-

ecurity risk as well as potential biohazard for various regions," Ms Centofanti said.

"In addition to that it would mean what was once productive land now becomes unproductive and for the viability of our regions going forward I think it is important to keep that land productive.'

Ms Centofanti said she had called on the State Government to provide greater support for growers so the land and owners could stay productive.

"Whether this includes support to stay in the sector or support to diversify agricultural or horticultural practices on their land," she said.

"It is about keeping our region and land production.'

She said she had been made aware of issues in the Riverland, McLaren Vale, South East and more areas

"Growers are doing it tough and they are facing one of their toughest periods in living memory," Ms Centofanti said.

"They would like some support in terms of allowing them to either stay in the wine grape sector or to leave the industry with some dignity and diversify into other practices."

With the blessing of the complex owner, Dave Foster, Clr Neagle placed a small collection of potted plants in the space and encouraged others to join her.

Located between Shearer's Cook Cafe and Odd Socks Laundromat, the laneway is used as a thoroughfare by those accessing businesses from the rear carpark.

It has become a thriving patch of greenery softening the stone, pavers and asphalt environment with Cr Neagle and others continuing to add to the initiative.

Inspiration for the project came from a segment on the ABC Gardening show which featured a Sydney laneway the local residents were beautifying

"My first thought was of McLaughlin Way but I decided it was a bit large and decided to start small," she said.

Keeping a regular eye on the pots and plants and making sure they are watered when needed Cr Neagle is delighted the idea has grown and said "we lose plants, but gain more.'

Community support is also growing with South East Property Sales offering funds from their Community Funnel for larger pots and planters and Banner Mitre 10 Millicent recently donating unsaleable damaged goods which are to the project.

"I got a message from Mitre 10 offering some damaged pots, torn bags of potting mix and some plants that need TLC.

"I'm really thrilled, it was just a little idea that is growing," Ms Neagle said.

He was reported for drink driving and lost his licence on the spot for six months.

He will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date.

Buffalo Dundee opens up

A Beachport man has recounted his story of a run-in with a buffalo which left him injured.

Since 2015 Beachport resident Gordon Sargeant has spent a substantial part of each year living close to nature at King Ash Bay in the Northern Territory's Gulf Country.

Last month, the 73 year old was collecting firewood with two friends about a kilometre from their King Ash Bay campsite when he was charged by a wild buffalo and gored.

The shocking incident has left Mr Sargeant shaken, injured and incredibly grateful to his friends, Stevo Nicholls and Roger Smith, who played a crucial role in saving his life.

Sited on the bank of the McArthur River in the heart of remote Borroloola fishing country, the area attracts hundreds who enjoy the camping facilities on offer.

Mr Sargeant loves the lifestyle and although he travels up by himself most years for four or five months he said he's never alone.

"I go up as a one man show but that doesn't mean I'm on my own because I've got that many mates doing the same thing.

"My camping setup is very crude, practical and simple.

"It does me, I go up there and enjoy myself fishing.

Mr Sargeant, who camps with Mr Nicholls and his partner Karen Huntley on their block, was joined by Beachport resident Roger Smith.

The trio of men were collecting firewood and saw the buffalo running past Mr Smith's Land Cruiser but were out of its line of sight.

Once the buffalo passed the vehicle, it did a quick u-turn and charged the group of men who were about 10 metres away from their vehicle.

"We heard this noise and didn't know what it was," Mr Sargeant said.

"It sounded like horses galloping and all of a sudden it was there.

"I was in the middle and received the full impact of the initial head butt.

"Stevo was on my right and also was hit and received bruises and Roger got some scratches as well

"I was knocked to the ground and the buffalo proceeded to impact my right leg with his head while using his left horn to thrash around my lower legs.

Face to face with the estimated 500 kilogram beast Mr Sargeant said he managed to keep hold of its right horn to protect his stomach and chest.

"Stevo was shoulder to shoulder with the buffalo," he said.

"I was on the ground and just fighting, but he was physically facing it, beating it and trying to save me.'

At one stage Mr Sargeant was tossed upwards and received a puncture wound penetrating his lower right buttock with the tip of the horn exiting higher up.

Mr Sargeant said he did not know what had happened or feel it at the time.

It was at that moment when Mr Nicholls grabbed a piece of wood and hit the animal on the neck and back which gave him the opportunity to haul his friend off the ground.

Mr Nicholls later recalled his friend felt like a feather when he was dragging him to his feet.

They found shelter behind a small tree with Mr Smith which offered minimal protection as the men dodged the horns of the buffalo

With the three men behind the same tree, Mr Smith decided to run to the Land Cruiser, this manoeuvre distracted and confused the buffalo which then ran off.

It was only then the extent of Mr Sargeant's injuries was realised and the trip to Borroloola's medical clinic began.

"The Land Cruiser did not have wings but we flew into Borroloola," he said.

"There was no way of calling for an ambulance because there's no phone service.

He credits Care Flight for preventing serious damage as Thigh Compartment Syndrome was starting to develop, which could have caused irreversible muscle and neurovascular damage.

Unable to bring himself to contact his wife Yvonne Sargeant back in Beachport, Ms Huntley made the difficult phone call.

"I was extremely shocked and horrified," Ms Sargeant said.

"My phone was home on charge while I was busy doing church flowers and then I saw all these messages when I got home.

"My heart absolutely sank of course."

Miraculously, Mr Sargeant spent only four days in the Darwin Hospital before spending time recuperating with Beachport friends Mike Coonan, Dianne Roach and Heather

With a thorough checkup undertaken and his dressings changed at Mount Gambier Hospital, he was able to return to his Beachport home

Mr Sargeant is still recovering and may have a greenstick fracture to his lower left leg.

He has completed a course of heavy duty antibiotics, but still has many grazes from the incident and will remain scarred.

The incident has resulted in national media coverage with the story featuring on the front page of the NT News and the Advertiser printing a cartoon by their editorial cartoonist, Peter Broelman.

Mr Sargeant has said the incident will not prevent him from returning next year.

"We're living with nature, I'm not upset about the buffalo, we're in their environment,' he said.

"It's an open site and not fenced off from

"I always thought crocodiles were going to be my worst enemy, not the buffalo."

Since recovering, Mr Sargeant has contacted Care Flight to thank them and ask if there was any fee for their service.

"There was absolutely no cost to me, because it's mostly voluntary," he said.

"I've actually ended up donating because they are looking for donations all the time."

Care Flight are holding their annual Hangar Ball fundraiser next week where Mr Sargeant is likely to make a pre-recorded video appearance telling his story.

"The main thing I want to do is to thank everyone sincerely," he said.

"The King Ash Bay Fishing Club and community, and especially Stevo and Roger who saved my life."

"I would like to do more regional performances because not only is this music beautiful but also I would like to share it with more audiences to get more exposure for it and give opportunities for other people to perform this music as well."

Art of brewing on show

For the first time a newly established artist studio in Hatherleigh opened to the public for this year's South Australian Living Artists (SALA) festival.

Selena and David Smith moved to the historic home in the township with Selena's parents, Elizabeth and John DeKoke, seven months ago.

The family has settled into the district and set about converting an old barn into a working artist's studio on one side and a home brewery on the other.

The unique SALA event is titled Nest and includes drawings and sculptures by Ms DeKoke, photography by Mr DeKoke and paintings by Ms Smith.

Outside, a path leading to the studio, winds its way through a garden installation of nests created from natural foraged and upcycled items

"It's been going really well, I'm really pleased with the local support," Ms Smith said.

"People have come from 50 minutes away because they've seen the brochure or the article in the paper.

"It's been a good networking event to integrate with locals and other artists.

"We will be able to build on SALA and make it a bit bigger for the region next year, and we've all sold something which is nice.

"It's nice to see people still believe in the arts and what it can do, and come and have some time out."

Ms DeKoke agreed and said they have had people through everyday.

"That is reassuring and I've got to thank all those for backing us," he said.

Included as part of the event, for three days only Mr Smith, gave brewers talks about his personal beer brewing journey over the last 30 years which led to the creation of Blanket Flat Brewing.

In an hour long presentation Mr Smith set about demystifying the brewing process and explained the art of brewing beer in simple terms

The impressive home-brewery includes the old Grand Hotel wooden fridges installed and in use.

Further work is planned with pizza ovens being built, and development approvals, liquor licensing and ATO approvals to become a producer underway.

Mr and Mrs Smith both talked about creating a community through their combined interests of brewing and the arts in the future.

"I'm not in the business of becoming a millionaire from this, but my philosophy is the community," Mr Smith said.

"We have talked about, once a month, let's have people around.

"You can drink beer if you want, or wine or water or whatever you like.

"We will open the place up, put the pizza

Looking into the history of Sharam Cottages

In association with State Heritage, Penola's branch of National Trust SA has developed a mobile phone app called SA Heritage, to enable people to learn more about historic sites within Penola on self guided tours. **The following is one of the subjects from**

this app: SHARAM COTTAGES

English-born Christopher Sharam sailed to Australia and in 1845 arrived in Portland, where he worked for the Henty brothers as a bootmaker, and as a hut-keeper guarding the sheep flock at night from the safety of a 'watch-box'

In 1848 Christopher Sharam was 29 and working for Donald McArthur on Limestone Ridge Station as a bootmaker when he married 15 year-old Ellen Patching, a shepherd's daughter from nearby Glenroy Station. With no local Anglican priest available they travelled 120 miles of winding track through dense bushland to Portland where they found their only option was to be married by the Presbyterian minister.

They moved to Penola in 1850 at the invitation of Alexander Cameron who was keen for Christopher to set up a boot-making business. Here in Petticoat Lane Christopher built this two-roomed cottage with a bark roof and walls of vertical slabs cut from the blackwood trees on the banks of a nearby swamp.

Their second son William, born here in 1850, was thought to be the first white child born in Penola. This 'tiny pale pink bundle was a source of wonderment' to the nearby Aboriginal women who would steal him away to their camp and suckle him.

Christopher built the second cottage of

sawn slabs in the mid-1860s to accommodate his growing family of fifteen children. In 1875 he was elected Warden of St Mary's Anglican Church, a position he held until his death in 1890, following which a marble memorial was erected in the church.

Ellen was 16 when her first child was born and 41 when Alice, the last of the fifteen children, arrived. She at first lived through extremely difficult times but later became healer, adviser and confidante to many and became affectionately known as 'Granny Sharam'.

The cottages remained in the Sharam family, with descendant Sarah, known as 'Granny Davis', being the last to live there until 1941 when they were purchased by Bob Fennell. The Penola Branch of the National Trust of South Australia purchased this State Heritage Listed property in 1981.

The Petticoat Lane experience, of which these cottages are a part, is very popular with people visiting from all over Australia and indeed the world.





Strawberry & Almond Tart

Prep time: 1 hr 30 mins Cook time: 55 mins Total time: 2 hrs 25 mins Serves: 1

Ingredients

- Pastry
- 250g Plain Flour
- 100g Unsalted Butter, Chilled & Chopped
- 100g Caster Sugar
- 2 Egg Yolks

Method:

Making the Pastry:

- 1. Place the flour, butter, sugar & salt in a food processor.
- Pulse in the food processor until the mixture resembles breadcrumbs. Add the two egg yolks & vanilla bean paste
- 3. whilst blending, then add 3-4 tbsp of chilled water until the mixture comes together.
- When the mixture just combines, stop the processor & form a disc in your hands. Ŵrap in cling wrap & chill in the refrigerator for 1 hour.
- Preheat oven to 180°C fan-forced (350°F). 6.
- Grease & line with a circular disc of baking paper a 28 cm loose-bottomed tart pan. On a surface with a large piece of cling wrap underneath (you may need two pieces 7. joined together), roll the pastry until it is round & 4-5mm thick, using a dusting of flour occasionally.
- With the cling wrap still attached to the pastry, carefully lift the pastry & gently flip 8. into the tart tin pastry side down. Trim the edges by pressing down with the heal of vour hand.
- Chill for 10 minutes in the freezer or 20 minutes in the fridge.
- 10. Remove the cling wrap, prick the pastry with a fork then line with baking paper & fill with pastry weights.
- 11. Blind bake your pastry for 10 minutes. Remove pastry weights & baking paper then bake for another 5-10 minutes, until just cooked through.

I pinch Salt

- 34 tbsp Chilled Water 1 tsp Vanilla Bean Paste
- Strawberry & Frangipane Filling
- 125g Unsalted Butter, softened
- 150g Caster Sugar
- 1 tsp Vanilla Bean Paste
- 2 Large Eggs
- 200g Almond Meal Slivered Almonds
- 250g Queensland Strawberries, hulled and halved

Strawberry Filling:

- Whilst the pastry is baking, make the filling.
 Place butter, sugar & vanilla in an electric mixer & beat until butter mixture is light &
- creamy. 3. Add eggs one at a time & make sure they are fully incorporated before you add the next. Finish by adding the almond meal & mix
- through gently. 5. Spoon this creamy Frangipane mixture
- evenly over the pastry, smoothing out the top when finished. 6
- Place the strawberries over the top of the almond mixture, pushing slightly into the batter. Finish with a scattering of slivered almonds. 7. Bake for 35-45 minutes until it has turned a
- golden brown on top. Cool in the tin for at least 30 minutes before serving with fresh cream, vanilla bean ice cream or Greek yogurt.

Notes:

• Don't skip the resting/chilling process. It is essential to stop the shrinkage of your pastry. You can also make this pastry a day or two in advance, simply keeping it chilled in the refrigerator as a rolled ball, wrapped in cling wrap

Spinach, Ricotta & Egg Torte

Serves: 6

Ingredients

Spinach filling

- 1 tbsp olive oil, plus extra for greasing
- 1 small onion, finely diced
- 1 large stick celery, finely diced
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 3 x 250g packets frozen spinach, thawed and squeezed of excess moisture
- 150g firm ricotta

Method:

Spinach filling

- 1. Heat oil in a large non-stick frying pan over medium-high heat and add onion, celery and garlic and cook for 3-4 minutes until softened but not coloured. Transfer to a mixing bowl and cool. Stir in spinach.
- 2. Add ricotta, parmesan, lemon zest, egg and season

- ½ cup (40g) grated parmesan
- 1/2 tsp lemon zest

1 egg

Salt and pepper to taste

Ricotta filling

- 500g firm ricotta
- ¹/₂ cup (40g) grated parmesan
- Salt to taste
- 4 whole small eggs, plus 1 beaten egg for glazing
- 2 sheets shortcrust pastry, just thawed
- 1 sheet butter puff pastry, just thawed

loaf tin, lining the long sides with pastry and gently pushing into the edges of the tin. Brush edges with beaten egg.

- Cut remaining shortcrust pastry in half across ways 4. to line the ends of the loaf tin. Press overlapping pastry to join the pastry together.
- Brush egg wash all over the base and sides of pastry. Spoon cooled spinach mixture into the tin and smooth out Add ricotta and press down evenly

with salt and pepper. Mix well and set aside. **Ricotta filling**

- 1. Mix together ricotta and parmesan. Season with salt. Assembly
- 1. Place a baking tray onto the middle rack of the oven and preheat to 220°C fan-forced. Grease a 21cm x 9cm (base measurement) loaf pan with oil. Line with baking paper, making sure to leave a 5cm overhang on both long sides.
- 2. Place a shortcrust pastry sheet onto a lightly floured work surface. Cut the other sheet of shortcrust pastry in half. Attach it to the first sheet by brushing one edge of the pastry with beaten egg, overlapping sheets by 5mm and rolling over seam with a rolling pin to secure. You should now have 1 1/2 sheets of pastry attached together.

3. Use a rolling pin to carefully place pastry inside

Make 4 holes along the top of the ricotta. Crack an egg into each hole. Brush all the edges with beaten egg.

- Cut 2/3 of the puff pastry sheet to make the top. 6. Place onto the loaf and press down gently over the egg. Trim off excess pastry from the edges.
- Pinch and fold over edges to seal. Cut out leaf shapes 7. from remaining puff pastry and arrange over the top. Glaze the top with remaining beaten egg.
- Place loaf tin on preheated baking tray and cook for 8. 15 minutes. Then reduce temperature to 180°C (fanforced) and cook for a further 45 minutes. If pastry is browning too fast, cover the surface with foil. Cool completely in tin.
- 9. Serve warm or cold.

Electric, compact SUV

Although the name BYD will be well-known to electric vehicle buyers, it's still largely unknown in the Australian motoring mainstream – but that's about to change.

Somewhat quirkily BYD stands for Build Your Dreams and the Chinese company is actually the world's second-largest manufacturer of fully-electrified vehicles, second only to Tesla.

When plug-in hybrids (PHEV) are added, it's the largest, with over 1.6 million built in 2022.

Although there were a couple of BYD models sold in Australia from 2017 onwards these were private imports.

It wasn't until the arrival of the Atto 3 in June, 2022 that the brand made any impact, and an impressive one at that, with sales of nearly 7000 in its first year.

A fully-electric compact SUV, the Atto 3 comes in two variants.

There's Standard Range and Extended Range, priced at \$48,011 and \$51,011 respectively (plus ORCs).

That's around the same price as its closest competitor and compatriot, the MG ZS EV which also comes with standard and longrange variants.

With a length of 4455mm, Atto 3 is around the same size as Mazda CX-3, Nissan Qashqai and Toyota CH-R – but 135mm longer than the MG.

Although the overall design of the Atto 3 is neat and attractive, it's relatively conservative especially when compared to the Ioniq 5 and Kia EV6.

As with most electric cars there's no real or pretend grille.

A horizontal bar with the BYD insignia on it merges into narrow sweeping LED headlights with a thin band of LED daytime running lights between them.

The profile is similar to many similarlysized SUVs although we did love the design of the 18-inch alloy wheels.

We find the 'Build Your Dreams' lettering spaced across the rear a bit too quirky.

We understand that some owners have been able to successfully remove the letters without causing damage – but don't take our word for it.

The rear also features a full width LED brake light and powered tailgate.

Four colours are offered. White is standard while the other three (grey, blue and red) are \$700 extra.

When you step inside the BYD Atto 3 Monty Python's catchphrase "And Now For Something Completely Different" springs to mind.

It is very different with a number of groundbreaking interior features.

We reckon buyers who are willing to think outside the square and buy a BYD will love the adventurous approach of this newcomer to the Australian market.

and provide excellent air flow.

In front of the driver is a 5.0-inch screen that effectively combines a head-up display with a digital instrument panel cluster.

The front seats are large, supportive and comfortable although the headrests are moulded into the seatbacks, so they can't be adjusted.

They also partially block forward vision of rear-seat occupants.

Otherwise, rear passengers are well catered for with a similarly comfortable bench seat, although they do have adjustable headrests.

There's plenty of leg, ankle and headroom with the flat floor making the centre seat more bearable than vehicles with a transmission tunnel.

The air vents are the same design as those in the front.

The panoramic sunroof extends across the full roof with a powered blind, although only the front section can be opened.

Available boot space ranges from 440 to 1340 litres with a powered bootlid and two adjustable floor levels.

There is no spare wheel, just a tyre repair kit below the boot floor.

Atto 3 scores a full five stars for safety, with an extensive list of safety equipment, starting with seven airbags, six radars, adaptive cruise control with stop/start, automatic emergency braking, front and rear collision warning, blind spot monitoring, lane departure warning, lane keeping assist, rear cross-traffic alert and braking.

There are front and rear parking sensors, rear-view 360-degree cameras, Isofix child

Sound comes through an eight-speaker Dirac digital audio system.

There are USB-C and USB-A ports underneath the centre console and also in the rear.

The cameras provide a large variety of features including a dashcam which automatically records and saves action in front of the car.

The videos are stored on a memory card which can be extracted and the videos transferred to an external source.

Very handy if there are any incidents or even to monitor the driving habits of different drivers.

Young or inexperienced drivers – you have been warned!

At this point in time, BYD doesn't have the same media fleet as almost all other brands, so we weren't able to conduct our normal weeklong test.

Fortunately, however, one of our neighbours recently bought an Atto 3 and she was able to give us a guided tour of the car and let us take it around our usual drive route.

Apart from the normal key fob the Atto 3 comes with a plastic card which opens and closes the car by tapping it on the driver's side door handle.

Entry is quite easy even for larger occupants and the seats are large, supportive and comfortable.

There's an aircraft-style gear selector which is fun to use.

Like all other electrified vehicles, the instant torque provides exhilarating speed off the mark.

e mark. The dash to 100km/h takes 7.3 seconds

mance and we found the Extended Range Atto 3 a little more sluggish than competitors with lighter batteries.

So, something of a trade-off there.

The car's regenerative braking has only two modes, standard and high, operated by a small toggle lever on the centre console rather than the more convenient steering wheel paddles of most EVs.

Nor is there a single-pedal option so the brake pedal needs to be employed to bring the car to a stop.

Atto 3 is built on 400-volt electrical architecture and supports maximum AC charging (Type 2) of 7 kW (standard) or 11 kW (option) as well as DC fast charging (CCS2) at a maximum rate of either 70kW (Standard Range) or 80kW (Extended Range).

It does have V2L (Vehicle-To-Load) charging which allows external items to be powered from the vehicle.

More and more people are asking us about fully-electric cars.

Our standard response is to hold off until prices reduce and the driving ranges increase.

That time is moving closer, triggered mainly by the arrival of Chinese EVs such as the MG ZS EV, GMW Ora and – most impressive of all – the BYD Atto 3.

Although it lacks the head-turning looks and performance of rivals such as the Hyundai Ioniq 5 and Kia EV 6, the Atto 3 is significantly cheaper and, at the end of the day, most EV owners are looking for sensible, affordable transport rather than sportiness.

There's no doubt the Atto 3's interior, with its combination of quirkiness and gee-whiz

With predominantly sculpted soft-touch materials, overall build quality and fit and finish of the Atto 3 is excellent.

Some of the features are gimmicky, others are functional.

Some are both, such as the three guitartype strings that act as sides of the door storage pockets, but which are just asking to be twanged.

We shudder to think how annoying that could be on a long trip with children in the rear.

After initially searching for the interior door handles, we found they were flip-up levers on top of the small round speakers in each door.

In this case however form and function combined nicely and we quickly adapted to them.

Large circular air vents dominate the front of the centre console but are easy to adjust

seat anchor points and hill descent control.

The standout feature is the 12.0-inch highdefinition tablet-style touchscreen which, at the touch can rotate between landscape and portrait format.

So, for features like map and camera displays it works best in landscape, while for most other features, portrait is not only more suitable but also brings the screen within closer reach of the driver.

The original Atto 3 did not come with either Apple CarPlay or Android Auto but these have been added with the MY2023 update and will also be installed as part of the latest upgrade for earlier models.

Apple CarPlay is wired, Android Auto is wireless.

There is a wireless smartphone charging pad at the base of the front console.

which is brisk but not nearly as quick as many EVs.

Drive is to the front wheels through a single speed transmission, with a single electric motor for the front axle that puts out 150kW of power and 310Nm of torque.

The standard model gets a 49.92kWh battery and the long range, 60.48kWh.

Regardless, energy consumption is 16.0kWh/100km with a driving range that is listed for the two variants at 410km and 480km under the old NEDC system or 345km and 420km using the more realistic WLTP measure. Our test car was the Atto 3 Extended Range variant.

Its larger battery brings kerb weight to 1750kg -- 70kg heavier than the Standard Range.

technology, will attract most sales.

So, if you are going to take one for a test drive, and we'd certainly recommend doing so, then set aside plenty of time to experiment with the many features.

It's an ideal size for a small family and for urban commuting, with very competitive pricing.

And, with zero emissions, the planet will thank you.


