Police are aware of a video circulating online which shows a dangerous example of hoon driving in George Street Millicent and are investigating the incident.

The video, shared by a local social media page on Saturday morning, went viral with over 250,000 views within three days of being

Local residents believe they heard the in-

cident and said it occurred during the early hours of Saturday morning.

A police spokesperson said the behaviour of the driver and passengers is "reckless and irresponsible.'

"Not only could damage be caused to property if the car were to crash, but bystanders or the vehicles occupants could be seriously in-

"This person does not deserve a drivers licence and police will be investigating to hold this person to account for their behaviour."

Taken from inside the vehicle, the 30 second video shows the car swerving widely across the street with the wheels heard screeching.

The video begins in the vicinity of Acky's Takeaway Deli with the car heading South Easterly down George Street.

As it approaches the main intersection the car spins into a 360 degree turn before continuing to fishtail the remaining length of the street. The Grand Hotel is lit up by the headlights of the car as it spins in front of the hotel.

Hotel manager Leandra Worrell described the behaviour as "irresponsible and dangerous.

Correcting the record on school history

Concerning the article 'Birthday for bush school', South Eastern Times, August 17, 2023 drawing on Mark Greenfield's research into the establishment of the Kangaroo Inn Area School, we have to correct the statement that "the site eventually chosen ... was Section 115, Hundred of Symon'.

The site selected at the junction of Clay Wells Road and the Beachport Road on which the school is built was, in fact, section 99, Hundred of Kennion, then part of Gillap

Station owned by Max and Mary Engelhart, our maternal grandparents.

When approached, Max Engelhart declined to sell Section 99 for a school, explaining that, as a scrub block, it was essential to supply timber for station fencing and the like.

He was also concerned that the schoolchildren could disrupt sheep movements. In the event, the government compulsorily acquired Section 99 of 16 acres (7.14 ha) which was vested in the Minister of Education

(Certificate of Title 3080/70) in June 1962. The conservation value of this slice of natural scrub was not a consideration at the time and it was totally cleared.

Section 115 of 4.18 hectares in the adjoining Hundred of Symon is actually the scrub block adjoining the school oval.

It is true that the late Neil McDonald generously provided land for the school Ag Block. That was at a later date.

Winter Olympian inspires students

Regional students are learning the importance of chasing their dreams through an Olympics program looking to inspire the next

Winter Olympian Nicholas Timmings visited Kingston Community School and Kangaroo Inn Area School last week as part of the Olympics Unleashed program, sharing his journey with students and some of the challenges he faced. Mr Timmings represented Australia in the sport of skeleton at the 2022 Winter Olympics in Beijing, and the key lessons he learned in reaching that point formed a big part of his presentations. He said the program was especially important for regional students who may not have as much opportunity living away from metropolitan areas.

"I know that first hand, doing a winter sport in Australia, we don't get a lot of opportunities and it's a lot harder to compete,'

"I know how they feel and I just want to give them a bit of inspiration so if they do stick it out, they do dedicate themselves, they can get to the top level even having limited opportunities." While competing in skeleton was a big part of his life and he wanted to share that with students, Mr Timmings said the over-arching message of his talks could translate to anything they were

"The three things I've learned are taking

your opportunities, finding your own passion, then the resilience to continue,"

"I just want to impart some of the things I've learned onto these kids.

"At such a young age, they're so impressionable, so it's a good age for them to see these things and have it sink in.'

Mr Timmings said the presentations had gone quite well, with lots of students showing they were engaged and asking dozens of questions.

"I think that's the most important thing, is actually having kids who want to know more and have plenty of questions," he said.

"If you don't get an engaged group, you don't know if you're doing something wrong or if sport or your presentation just isn't interesting.

"It's just amazing to have a group of kids with so many questions."

Despite the great engagement, Mr Timmings admitted he was still more comfortable hurtling head-first down an ice track through his sport than he was doing public

"I feel pretty comfortable at the top of an ice track," he said.

"I don't know what questions I'm going to get [during presentations]."

"It's just lucky no-one was injured or killed and no damage done to any buildings," she

The new legislation allows a magistrate to disqualify or suspend a driver's licence sentence and sentence a driver to term of imprisonment for basic and aggravated offences between three-to-five years, and gives SAPOL the right to dispose of vehicle involved in hooning, including crushing them.

About 70 young environmental leaders from across the Limestone Coast made an impact on weed control recently.

Students from the Young Environmental Leaders Program met for the third time this year and gained experience working with the local landscape

The students learnt about the importance of clearing pest weeds from the landscape to reduce its impact on the environment.

Limestone Coast education coordinator Vanessa Freebairn said it was amazing to watch the landscape transport as students "embarked on weed removal" in small groups.

"The students all love being involved," Ms Freebairn said.

'When they see how many weeds they have removed in a short amount of time it is very rewarding and they are always eager to do more.

"Many hands make light work which supports the landscape officers when combating weeds in these larger areas such as the Valley Lakes/Ketla Malpi."

Students filled a chipper truck multipple times and witnessed the weeds becoming wood chips, ready to be recycled on the side of the slope which would support the native plants in the area.

They also attended a session in the morning where they learnt more about waste and recycling and were able to discuss their school's sustainability projects with their peers as the embarked on the final term of the Young Environmental Leaders Program for this year.

Stats show the reality of assisted death

The second Voluntary Assisted Dying quarterly report has been released with 40 people receiving the permit between May 1 and June

The program has received positive feedback from participants and their families, specifically concerning the support and care provided to those applying for the permits.

Of the 40 people who received the volun-

tary assisted dying permit, 32 have died aged from their 20s to 90s.

Of these, 19 people had terminal cancer and five had degenerative neurological condi-

19 people self-administered medication and eight were supported by a medical practitioner with five dying without using the medication available.

During this reporting period, 40 per cent of people with the permit died in regional South

There are also 66 medical practitioners who have completed the mandatory training with a further 46 registered or part-way through.

Of these practitioners, 49 are in metropolitan Adelaide and 17 in regional South Austra-

Veteran opens up on war

This year marked 50 years since Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War ended, with services held around the region to commemorate those who fought for Australia on Vietnam Veterans Day.

To keep the lessons of the conflict alive, Coonawarra and Penola RSL president and Vietnam veteran Peter DeGaris shared his tale of conscription into the war with the Penola

Conscription for Vietnam was introduced in 1964 to boost Australia's infantry numbers, and Mr DeGaris was one of more than 15,000 people called into service.

'Twice a year there were ballots done like the lottery you see on TV," he said.

"If you were unlucky enough to have your number called, you received your notice in the post to say you were required to report for a medical.

"If you passed the medical, you then received advice to say you were to report to Keswick Barracks in Adelaide, on the 2nd of May 1968 in my case."

Once he had been cleared to serve, Mr De-Garis was shipped to Puckapunyal, north of Melbourne, to undertake three months of ba-

"We spent three months there and learned the basics of being in the military - how to march, how to receive corporate discipline, get up with the bugle and go to bed buggered at night," he said.

"At the end of the three month training, you were then given the choice as to what corps you were going to be in.

"I was allocated infantry, as were most of the others, and sent off to Singleton, which was the infantry training centre.

There, Mr DeGaris had three months of infantry training before being allocated as infan-

try reinforcement and sent to Ingleburn, near Sydney.

He was only there for a couple of weeks before he was called up for rapid deployment to the 8th Infantry Battalion in Malaya.

With the 8th, Mr DeGaris undertook further training with British and New Zealand soldiers over a further 12 months, before a quick break back in Australia.

"I would suggest the 8th Battalion that went to Vietnam was one of the best prepared battalions to go because of that Malayan training," he said.

"[After a week in Sydney] went back to Brisbane and jumped on board the [HMAS] Sydney, affectionately known as the Vung Tau Ferry, which was a converted aircraft carrier."

Mr DeGaris counted himself lucky, having

avoided serious injury through a number of operations.

"Reflecting on it, I know I was lucky with a few minor skirmishes in Vietnam and met a lot of good blokes and made lots of memories," he said.

"Having spent five months there, we were out on operation and we came into a fire support base and they basically said to us to get ready because you're going to be choppered back to Vung Tau."

After a whirlwind trip back to Vung Tau, then Saigon, Mr DeGaris and some of his compatriots found themselves at the Sydney airport at two o'clock in the morning, which he said was to avoid war protestors.

A taxi driver told them they would be unlikely to find accommodation and offered to



take them to a friend's pub in the city.

"The publican asked where us blokes came from, but it was pretty obvious because we all had our rucksacks, and he said, I still remember this, he said 'S**t, would you like a beer?"" Mr DeGaris said.

The cook was just knocking off, and the publican told him he wasn't knocking off and he was to cook us up some steaks, so we sat around and drank until about half past seven in the morning, laughing and carrying on.

'The publican offered to run us to the airport and 24 hours after walking around Vietnam carrying an SLR, I'm walking around the seats of Melbourne airport sort of half dazed."

A few hours later, Mr DeGaris landed in Mount Gambier and was greeted by his whole

"By the time we got back home, I wasn't drunk, but I'd had plenty to drink and mum plonked a feed of roast lamb, which was my favourite tucker at the time, in front of me and I couldn't even eat it," he said.

We'd been out in the sticks for two weeks and eating rations, so your stomach shrinks."

Mr DeGaris said at the end of the day it was important to remember the Vietnam War and to pay homage to everyone that fought in the conflict, including the Vietnamese soldiers.

Vietnam Veterans Day, or Long Tan Day is commemorated every year om August 18.

Servo back

Two years since the Adelaide Road service station suddenly closed down it is set to reopen Monday morning under new owners K&S Fuels

The project has run behind schedule due to the introduction of unexpected Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requirements.

"That's what set us back until where we are at the moment," Millicent area manager for K&S Group Mark Hodgens said.

"There were a lot of civil works done to meet the EPA requirements, we've got a water treatment plant put in and vapour recovery system on the fuel pumps.

"In the end we had to tick the boxes, and we have done that.

"We are happy we've got the site up and running, it's probably six months later than we expected."

Staff are on-site at the new service station preparing to open by 8am for the first day with regular trading times to be 6am to 9pm daily.

"We are getting it all spring cleaned this week and everything fully stocked," Mr Hodgens said.

"Hopefully it's appreciated by the community."

At the time of closing in 2021 Wattle Range Council had owned the freehold of the site for more than 50 years.

By January 2021 it had been sold to K&S Fuels.

Since the Adelaide Road service station closed the only manned petrol station in Millicent has been the 24 hour facility at the Mount Gambier and Williams Road intersection.

Last month the automated Pines Service Station also closed permanently leaving the town with a single fuel outlet.

Foodbank scores grant to boost relief operations

The Limestone Coast's Foodbank SA has been deemed the winner of this year's Friends of Stand Like Stone program, which has allowed the organisation to secure a \$2,990 grant.

This grant will be used for the purchase of a pallet jack with a scissor lift feature, which will allow the organisation to improve work health and safety conditions for volunteers as well as increasing the overall efficiency for food relief operations.

The Friends of Stand Like Stone program allows individuals and organisations to provide support to the foundation through a number of methods such as donations and service.

Stand Like Stone chief executive Roger Babolka said an annual donation of \$500 helped Stand Like Stone to run the "Limestone Coast's only community foundation". "Each year we aim to grow the number of 'Friends' and increase the grant allocation," Mr Babolka said.

"As a result, the perpetual named subfund also grows, providing a lasting gift to our community and ensures the growth and sustainability of this amazing program."

Foodbank SA Limestone Coast branch manager Lynne Neshoda said initiatives such as the Friends of Stand Like Stone allowed both parties to continue their operations to serve the community.

"It's initiatives such as the Friends of Stand Like Stone Champion grant that not only enables the Foundation to respond to the needs of the communities, but it also enables organisations like Foodbank to continue to provide a critical support service to those in need in this region," Ms Neshoda said.

"The business is all in her name, it's run by her, I'll do it for six months to help out," Ms Vanderheul said.

The pair have experienced delays in getting the site ready for clients but are hoping a sensory room will be available within the next two weeks.

Sensory rooms offer a safe and quiet space for people who are overstimulated and use special flooring, sensory toys, music and lights to create the environment.

"We're waiting for the flooring, it's been a bit longer than we expected," Mary-rose said.

"The sensory room is something I've been working really hard on, it will be free for anyone to use."

Mary-rose will offer a flexible range of ses-

sions for both groups and individuals which can be booked individually or as part of a larger plan.

Gardening and cooking sessions and a Healthy Me program will be available.

Work options include cleaning and gardening work, assistance with micro enterprise, preparing resumes and basic IT skills.

Respite and transport services will be available and next year the pair plan to open a soundproof multi-media room.

Jaymee has written a 12 week filmmaking program for clients and hopes the room will become a mecca for disability filmmaking and music making in the region.

Limitless Learning and Lifestyle are unregistered providers which means it is not currently registered with the NDIS.

Both women are training for this registration and are still governed by the same rules and regulations as NDIS registered providers.

They currently work with local job provid-

ers for disabilities and other disability services in the region.

Although yet to officially open Mary-rose and Jaymee will be at 65 Mount Gambier Road site 9am-3pm each Tuesday and Wednesday and encourage anyone to drop in for further information.

"We've got coffee and biscuits here and we don't mind having a chat with anybody.

"It doesn't matter whether they're on NDIS or not or if they are carers."

"I have always been really passionate about the advocacy and collectivism of unions and the power people have in numbers, but I think in particular being a part of the education workforce for a while, I can feel the tiredness and disillusionment of so many people who are now burning out.

"Instead of sitting in the background and jumping up and down about it, which I have been doing at branch council and different forums, I thought I really needed to put my name forward and put myself in a position as someone who is based at a school at the moment to be willing to come out of that school with the perspective and go in to represent others who are in the same position.'

Mr Key said while he wanted to represent teachers from their perspective, he added there were also decisions made by the current leadership which he did not agree with.

"There have been a lot of calls made which I don't think have been the right ones and I don't feel the union is effectively representing what staff on the ground actually want from their union," he said.

"A lot of the rhetoric which has come out of the union has been talking about bringing back the attraction to country areas, but it's not looking after our members who are here

"We have been talking a lot about housing which is a bit frustrating knowing there is a really clear State Government strategy around housing at the moment and I feel like jumping up and down about this will not cause any more action than what we have already seen.'

Virtual fencing to the fore

Momentum is growing for a national animal welfare code that could pave the way for virtual fencing across Australian farming businesses.

It follows a recent dairy innovation day at Mount Gambier where virtual fencing was highlighted, and a study tour.

Each state has its own animal welfare code and while virtual fencing is allowed in other states, it is outlawed in Victoria and South Australia.

With support from the DemoDAIRY Foundation, several South-west Victorian dairy farmers recently learnt about the potential benefits of virtual fencing to manage herd grazing and movement during a New Zealand study tour.

One of the farm consultants leading the SW Farm Business Discussion Group, Angus Drummond, said there was a lot of interest in a farm using a Halter collar app for virtual fencing, prompting a suggestion to lobby the Victorian Government to allow their use in the state.

Dairy Australia principal scientist, John Penry, said a study completed in 2021 into virtual fencing funded by the Australian dairy levy with other government support was positive about the technology.

"The research work on balance was favourable about the technology," Dr Penry said.

"Dairy Australia's role is to point to the evidence base and that four-year study is still relevant. Whilst today's technology might be a slightly differently designed collar, the premise for how it works is still the same.

"Based on overseas and Australian studies and experiences, it's a reasonable thing to look at as an option."

Since completing the study, the commercial company involved has focused on applications in the northern beef industry.

"Unfortunately, animal welfare codes differ between states," Dr Penry said.

"Presently any virtual herding technology relies on an electrical pulse and audible warning. This technology can be used in other states but not Victoria and South Australia because it doesn't fit within their animal welfare

codes," Dr Penry said.

Halter representatives and a farmer in their testing program attended the South Australian dairy innovation day, creating strong interest.

"There is definitely interest around how farmers could use that sort of technology to make grazing management simpler and less time consuming, particularly during the calving period," Dr Penry said. "The technology by and large seems to work and there are relatively few animals that can't be trained on it. A next step for Australia would be to get a more homogenised between-states animal welfare code."

Dr Penry said Dairy Australia believed it would be in the country's best interests to have uniform animal welfare codes between the states.

"That's not specifically about virtual fenc-

ing but as a general principle," he said.

New smart farming 'engine' to overcome future issues

Establishing a network of long-term research trials into climate smart farming is on the agenda in South Australia, after an \$8 million grant was delivered from the Federal Government's Future Drought Fund.

Led by Flinders University and the South Australian Research and Development Institute (SARDI), the funding will bring together 39 research partners, which includes farming and agri-business stakeholders, to use a new research engine.

SARDI agronomy program leader and Flinders affiliate associate professor Dr Rhiannon Schilling said the funding would help bring together key farming communities and leading researchers.

Dr Schilling said the program would establish a network of research trials to test applied science and climate-resilient solutions.

"We are bringing together leading South Australian farmers and researchers to develop new solutions to overcome future climate challenges," she said.

"We will test, refine and deliver droughtresilient innovations for dryland broadacre cropping, livestock and mixed farms."

Vice-Chancellor Professor Colin Stirling said the funding would help the university to highlight the state's reputation as a world leader in climate-smart farming.

"This significant grant injection – the largest under the Future Drought Fund – heralds a new era of partnership between Flinders and SARDI," Professor Stirling said.

"This research partnership will drive the development of solutions to tackle drought preparedness here in South Australia and beyond and Flinders University is excited to be part of this next era of pioneering research."



The South Australian trial sites, which include areas of pastoral, low, medium and high rainfall zones, should help fast-track research.

Funds need balance: NFF

The National Farmers' Federation (NFF) has welcomed the announcement by Prime Minister Anthony Albanese and Agriculture Minister Murray Watt of \$38 million from the Future Drought Fund to boost the farm sector's resilience to climate change and dry conditions.

However, NFF vice president David Jochinke noted the funding would primarily be directed into research and long-term trials and while much needed, it did little for the here and now.

"We are staring down the barrel at an El Nino bringing drier conditions this growing season," Mr Jochinke said.

"Improving long term resilience is important, but climate research can't come at the expense of preparing for the drought just around

The NFF said the Future Drought Fund had to continue to include projects which would directly build resilience for when the next drought hits. "Resilience is farmers' middle name, but we can't outrun the increasingly severe and frequent drought cycles.

"It's imperative the government focuses on climate change resilience but not at the expense of drought preparedness. "We need to find the balance between being ready for the next drought while ensuring there's continual investment into innovation and technology so agriculture can adapt to our changing climate.

"This balance is what the farm sector needs to keep up with growing demand for food and fibre, and to reach our goal to be a \$100 billion industry by 2030."

Lamb, mutton production records broken across the board

The Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) has ly record-breaking year for Australian lamb released its quarterly statistics on livestock slaughtered and meat production, highlighting record lamb production and growth in mutton production across the board so far

According to Meat & Livestock Australia (MLA), Australia produced the most lamb on record in the calendar year 2022. For the first six months of 2023, lamb producers are tracking 7.7 per cent above year-on-year levels or 20,000 tonnes.

"This indicates another strong, potential-

producers," according to Stephen Bignell, manager, market information, at MLA.

"Following a significant flock rebuild over the last few years, we have seen significant lamb slaughter across the nation in the first half of this year.

"Over 11.5 million lambs were processed to June 2023 which is the second highest start to a year since 2018 when over 12 million lambs were slaughtered.

"This is an extra 1.24 million lambs slaughtered when compared to 2022, an up-

lift of 12 per cent year-on-year."

This quarter has also seen lamb production records broken, with 149,385 tonnes being produced in Australia, which is 4 per cent more than the previous record set in June 2018. Mutton production is also seeing higher levels than previously recorded. Sheep slaughter for the quarter was 2,550,700 head – the highest in nearly four years. According to Mr Bignell, nearly five million sheep have been processed so far this year.

"This is an extra 2,024,800 compared to the same point in 2022, equating to an ad-

ditional mutton throughput of 68 per cent year-on-year," he said.

"Victoria is contributing the most to the big jump in mutton slaughter, with Victorian processors working through one million sheep so far this year.

Lamb and sheep proceeds were above Q1 2023 levels and the same as March 2021. The gross value of sheep and lambs slaughtered increased 1.9 per cent to \$1.2 billion.

In financial year 2023, lamb and sheep farmers made \$4.8b for the sale of animals

EVs - myths versus reality

The Electric Vehicle Council (EVC), the national body representing the electric vehicle industry in Australia, has moved to dispel some of the common myths about electric vehicles.

MYTH 1: NOT ENOUGH DRIVING RANGE

Today's EVs have enough battery range to meet the average Australian's driving needs for over a week.

Current EVs have an average battery range of 480km but the technology is advancing so rapidly that new models can drive for almost 550km on a single charge.

The average Australian drives 38km per day so an EV owner can go for at least 10 days without a recharge.

Unlike petrol cars, you can recharge at home or anywhere with access to electricity.

MYTH 2: CHARGING TAKES TOO LONG

Charging times are falling quickly as technology advances.

Residential chargers are able to fully charge EVs in around six to eight hours, depending on the vehicle's capacity.

This means you can easily charge your car overnight.

Public fast chargers are able to get you back on the road much faster.

Leave your car at a charger while you go shopping or to work and in three hours, it'll be fully charged.

Ultra-rapid chargers can add 300km of range in 10 minutes.

MYTH 3: THERE'S NOWHERE TO CHARGE

While 80 per cent of EV drivers globally charge their EV at home, there is still a need for public charging infrastructure.

An ever-expanding network of public charging infrastructure is being installed across Australia.

Private companies have been building networks along highways, and both federal and state governments are now investing too.

Local councils are supporting local communities to make the change by installing chargers in local public areas, and it is increasingly common to see EV chargers in shopping

If you check out the charger map on our website, you can get an idea of coverage.

That coverage is only going to keep getting better as uptake increases and more charging stations are rolled out.

MYTH 4: EXPENSIVE TO BUY

The upfront costs of EVs are currently more expensive than conventional vehicles, however powering your EV is much cheaper - about 70 per cent cheaper per kilometre in fact.

That means the average EV driver saves \$1600 on fuel costs each year.

There are also a growing number of new mid-range EVs available in Australia this year.

These include the MG ZS EV (\$44,990), BYD on-road costs.

EVs are only going to become more affordable with time.

According to Bloomberg, falling battery prices mean that the total ownership costs of EVs is already the same as conventional vehicles and that upfront costs will be cheaper by 2025.

As competition, investment, and innovation increase, the costs of EVs will continue to fall while conventional vehicle prices stay the

MYTH 5: EXPENSIVE TO RUN

EVs have lower running costs than internal combustion engine vehicles (ICEVs).

Fewer moving parts mean that EVs require less maintenance.

With an EV you don't need to replace filters and spark plugs, change oil, or repair the

transmission, head gasket or engine.

In 2018, maintenance and servicing savings of an EV were estimated at \$300-\$400 a year.

Contrary to a popular myth, EV batteries last as long as the lifetime of your car.

Most vehicle manufacturers offer an eightyear or 160,000km warranty on batteries.

Another massive saving from EV ownership Battery EVs don't need any petrol or diesel

and are charged with electricity. The average Australian drives 15,000km d spends around \$2160 on petrol per year

(14 cents per km). An EV travelling 15,000km would cost around \$600 per year (4 cents per km) in electricity costs.

MYTH 6: EVS ARE INFERIOR PERFORMERS

Unlike conventional vehicles, EVs deliver full torque instantly, meaning they can accelerate much faster than equivalent combustion en-

EVs also often have their batteries placed along the bottom of the vehicle, lowering the centre of gravity and providing better handling and cornering.

MYTH 7: EVS ARE A PASSING FAD

Around the world, the EV industry is boom-

In 2022 10.2 million EVs were sold worldwide, or 14 percent of total vehicle sales.

China led the way with 5.9 million or

30 percent with Europe sales at 2.6 million (23%)

Australia is lagging because of a lack of EV policy leadership from governments.

In 2022 just 3.1% of total sales were fully-electric vehicles although that ratio has jumped significantly to 7.4% in the first half of 2023.

Leading the way was the Tesla Model Y which was the highest selling vehicle behind the Toyota HiLux.

As state and federal governments are belatedly recognising the importance of EVs and more and more lower cost EV models come on the market along with hundreds of new chargers being built across the country, EV sales will continue to grow.

MYTH 8: JUST AS BAD FOR THE

ENVIRONMENT

Battery EVs have zero exhaust emissions, so that alone makes them better for the environment than an internal combustion engine ve-

Research shows that even if an EV is charged by coal-fired electricity, it still generates lower net emissions that ICEVs.

As grids become cleaner, EVs become

It is an unavoidable truth that the only way for Australian states to reach their net zero emission targets is with electric vehicles.

Additionally, EV batteries can be used well after their EV end-of-life.

Once a battery reaches 70 per cent capacity, it is no longer fit for use in a vehicle.

However, vehicle manufacturers and private companies are leading the charge in battery recycling and re-purposing, ensuring that zero emissions vehicles really have a low impact to the environment.

MYTH 9: BATTERIES ARE DANGEROUS AND COSTLY

Driving a vehicle with a battery is no more dangerous than driving a traditional Internal Combustion Engine vehicle (ICEV).

In fact, evidence suggests that lithium-ion batteries used in EVs are in fact as safe or even safer than conventional fuel.

There are numerous studies that show that fires in EVs are no more likely or even less likely to occur than fires in ICEVs.

In Australia, Fire and Rescue organisations do not treat EVs as any more dangerous than

MYTH 10: EVS WILL CAUSE BLACKOUTS

Managed correctly, EVs can increase the reliability of the grid, while reducing the unit price of electricity for everyone, even those who don't drive an EV.

New EV models are now enabling battery discharging, which means that during times of peak demand EVs can put electricity back into the household or grid.

This would actually reduce the chance of blackouts by flattening peak demand.

Vote for change on table

THE Penola Football and Netball Club has passed a motion to vote on a change of leagues in 2024.

Approved by the club executive, the decision will now be put to the members with a vote held on August 31.

Should the verdict be in favour of change, the Eagles would leave the Kowree Naracoorte Tatiara league to join the six current Western Border football and netball clubs in a revamped seven-team competition next season.

"We will be going to a vote to see if we align with the six clubs who have been playing in the Western Border," Penola Football Club president Matt Tilby said.

"We are going to a vote with the need for a two-thirds majority (67 per cent) to head that way."

Tilby said the club has remained transparent with its members throughout the discussion periods, which had involved correspondence with the South Australian National Football League (SANFL) and Western Border clubs

"We have tried to keep our members informed as best we can," Tilby said.

"We have worked through with both the football and netball juniors and seniors.

"Both committees have been working hard looking at what the future would look like down that way.

"We feel there is enough evidence to suggest it is an option for our footy club."

While there had been discussions with SANFL, Tilby said the state's sporting body had taken a backseat and was not dictating the negotiations.

"SANFL has overseen the process and have been there in the background, but they have left it fairly well to the clubs to see what we can work out," he said.

That has helped keep the best interests of the clubs at the centre of the discussions.

Tilby said many of the positives surrounding the potential move were focussed on Penola's junior ranks.

"In the junior competition they run down in Mount Gambier kids can get aligned with their clubs at the age of eight," he said.

"We have a separate school boys competition which doesn't follow our senior competition" Tilby said the ramifications of that was Penola losing potential junior players to other clubs.

"We would be looking to join and have kids starting at our club earlier, which we see as a really big positive, rather than losing them to other clubs where they can play earlier - which has been a bit of a trend at Penola." he said.

In addition, not all clubs in the Kowree Naracoorte fill every netball grade, with some Penola teams not able to play each week as a result.

At this stage Penola is the only club in the mix to join the Western Border clubs.

"I believe the competition will have the potential to grow, but in 2024 if we were to join it would be a seven-team competition," Tilby said.

Information packs will be sent out to Penola members this week detailing the finer details of the move prior to next week's vote.

In the two clashes between these sides, the games have been split one win each.


