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## Cancer challenge

A group of South East men are preparing to once again take on the 2023 Apex Outback Postie Bike Ride and raise funds to support cancer patients.

From Thursday, September 7 until Sunday, September 10, postie bike riders Darren Walters, Terry Fabish, Jim Slattery and Charlie Matthews will take on 1,000km of rough terrain through the Flinders Ranges.

The men, along with around 70 other riders from around South Australia, do it all for a good cause in raising money to alleviate pressures on people undergoing cancer treatments.

All funds raised go towards Apex Copper Coast Retreats which, in partnership with the Cancer Council, give families affected by cancer a week-long getaway in Wallaroo.

For Mr Walters, while it started as "just a group of blokes from TAFE", being a part of the Outback Postie Bike Ride has become a meaningful part of his life.

He said most of the group, excepting Mr Matthews who is in his second year of participating, have risked a lot and broken bones to take part in the ride, but there were good reasons to keep coming back every year.

"Camaraderie, friendship, good times and also being able to make a small change in the world," Mr Walters said.

"It is a hard ride, a very hard ride, and I'm getting older, not younger."

Mr Walters said there were also personal connections for the group to take part every year despite the challenge.

"Jim Slattery's brother was one of the originals that started it; him and a few others were riding around upper South Australia and they were trying to make it harder and harder," he said.

"It originally started off as an insane ride, but then they worked out very quickly they

could make money out of this, and that's when it went into the Cancer Council.

"Then it turned into doing a business plan and then getting into the retreats [at Wallaroo]."

Mr Walters said there was always plenty of support from the community, with places like

Trident Tyre Centre regularly contributing to the group's fundraising.

"Realistically, we're probably looking at raising nearly \$10,000 if we can - us four," he said.

"On average, the actual ride itself raises between \$100,000 and \$120,000.

"By all means, donate to either one or all four of us, or if a bigger business wants to come to us and donate, we'd appreciate that as well."

# Guide takes up the fight against feral deer

A new guide to managing feral deer is set to improve landholders management of the pests.

Landholders impacted by the increasing threat of feral deer will benefit from a new management tool thanks to the release of the Glovebox Guide to Managing Feral Deer, from the Centre for Invasive Species Solutions.

With six species of invasive deer established in Australia and numbers continuing to climb, the negative impact on Australian agricultural production, the environment and public and private infrastructure will only continue to grow without integrated control measures rolled out over the coming years.

The new guide offers practical solutions for all land managers in helping manage and reduce the impact of feral deer.

Lead author David Forsyth, from the New South Wales Department of Primary Industries Vertebrate Pest Research Unit, said the Glovebox Guide is based on the best practice science available for managing feral deer across Australia.

"Much of the information contained in the guide has been distilled from the extensive research undertaken over the past five years by the Centre's feral deer research projects," he said.

It follows the recent release of the Annual Costs of Feral Deer in Australia report which highlighted the increasing economic impact of feral deer, estimated at a substantial \$91 million annually. With feral deer populations found across large parts of Australia and their numbers continuing to swell, their impacts

will only worsen if control measures are not in place.

The Glove Box Guide is an important tool in seeking to implement such control measures and South Australian Department of Primary Industries and Regions National Deer Management Coordinator Annelise Wiebkin said with no control measures in place, what

is currently 30 deer may become 500 deer in just 10 years.

"Through providing practical and real-time advice on feral deer behaviour, the Guide assists land managers in ensuring the right control methods against the pest," she said.

Community connection, mateship, and helping others are just some of the reasons the members of the Millicent Men's Shed get together every week.

The Millicent Men's Shed, which is open Tuesdays, Thursdays and Sundays from 10am to 2pm, encourages men to connect with each other and keep busy through a range of projects.

Millicent Men's Shed vice president coordinator Tom Briggs said it was a great place to come in, have a chat and keep busy.

"It's a good place, especially for single men like myself, I'm widowed," he said.

"You've got somewhere to go, someone to keep company with, and it's open to ages from 12 years old to 100 years old, so no restrictions on age or colour or anything like that.

"It is very good, it is very stable and all members that come there seem to enjoy themselves."

For Mr Briggs personally, going to the Men's Shed has been a vital link to his community, especially now that it is harder to get out and about.

"As a social thing, it gives me an outlet where I can go because I'm a person that can't go out at night anymore or go on holiday, so it's that reason for living," Mr Briggs said.

"It's great because I've got no other outlet in the cottages here now, I'm sort of buggered with arthritis and can't move around that well.

"I help look after the place and see that men are doing well - that's the main part of my role and I enjoy that."

The shed has also played an important role in the lives of students out of Millicent North Primary School, teaching children a range of skills outside of the classroom.

Students were able to come into the shed on Friday afternoons and, under the supervision of its members, undertake projects ranging from learning woodworking skills to help-

ing in the community garden.

Mr Briggs said that had taken a backseat recently with a lot of Men's Shed members away on holiday, but when it was on, it gave students responsibility and creative freedom.

"We don't treat it as a classroom-type thing, we try and make them responsible for what they're doing," he said.

"They've got to find the project they want to make and we just assist in helping them

make that project.

"Then they've got a chance, when they go into their secondary education, they know a little bit before they get there.

## Event promotes year-round mental health check-ins

With R U OK? Day just around the corner, the Wattle Range Suicide Prevention Network (WRSPN) is reminding people that checking in with people should be an everyday thing.

This year, R U OK? Day falls on Thursday, September 14, encouraging people to check in with their friends and family and have potentially life-saving conversations.

WRSPN secretary Marg Chapple said R U OK? Day is an important date on the calendar as it makes conversation around mental health "that little bit more prominent".

"It is getting more prominent in the country areas, which is great," she said.

"People hear the words more regularly

and are becoming more comfortable with asking the questions.

"There are a lot more support networks popping up in the regions, especially Mount Gambier where people can drop in when they're feeling their mental health needs some support."

But while it was pushing positive messages, Ms Chapple highlighted that people should be checking in on their mates regularly.

"R U OK? Day is just one day of the year that it becomes a little bit more visible," Ms Chapple said.

"It's not just for today, checking in on your mates, your family, your friends, it's every day."

Ms Chapple said mental health had a ripple effect around small communities, with one loss of life having wide-reaching impacts.

"Because it is a smaller community, it affects the family initially, but then there's a ripple effect right out into the community because so many people know that person," she said.

"People are quite connected in a small community, so they feel the pain as well."

She said WRSPN was limited in what it could do to help, but encouraging people to check in with someone who is struggling could end up saving a life.

"Sometimes it's hard to get appointments with the professionals that can help with

these areas, so our encouragement as a network is once you find out someone is struggling, just encourage them to get to their GP," she said.

"To stay with that person and make sure they get an appointment, take them to the GP, that's as far as what we encourage.

"None of us are counsellors, we're all volunteers who just have a passion for this topic, our goal is just to bring awareness to the community and make them feel ok about asking the questions when they know someone is struggling."

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# Heading to the polls

The date for Australia's first referendum this century has been set, with the vote to determine if an Indigenous Voice to Parliament will be implemented.

Prime Minister Anthony Albanese spoke at the launch of the Yes23 campaign in Adelaide on Wednesday and announced October 14 would be the day to vote.

The vote will give Australian citizens the chance to say either yes or no to a proposed change to the constitution regarding the implementation of an Indigenous Voice to Parliament.

Mr Albanese said for many years Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people had advocated for constitutional recognition through a voice.

"Our government, along with every single state and territory government, has committed to it," Mr Albanese said.

"Legal experts have endorsed it and people on all sides of the parliament have backed it.

"Faith groups and sporting codes and local councils and businesses and unions have embraced it and an army of volunteers from every part of this great nation are throwing all of their energy behind it."

He said on the day, each Australian would have a "once in a generation chance" to bring the country together and "change it for the better".

"Referendums come around much less often than elections and this will be the first one this century and they are very different," Mr Albanese said.

"On October 14, you are not being asked to vote for a political party or for a person, you are being asked to vote for an idea.

"In the words of the Uluru Statement from the Heart, 'when we have power over our destiny our children will flourish'."

Mr Albanese said all Australians would get an equal say and encouraged those who were

unclear on the proposal to "ask questions" and "find out more".

"Have a listen to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander leaders...have a read of the Uluru Statement from the Heart, it is just one page full of grace and generosity, inviting all Australians to walk together to a better future," he said.

A spokesperson for the Australian Electoral Commission said all Australians who were on the electoral roll would be able to vote via a number of voting options.

"Polling places on voting day will be open

from 8am until 6pm local time," the spokesperson said.

"Pre-poll voting centre opening times will be published in due course.

"If voters anticipate they will be away or unable to cast their vote on October 14, we recommend heading to a pre-poll voting centre or applying for a postal vote."

Polling places in the Limestone Coast will be revealed soon.

Applications for postal voting will close on October 11 at 6pm.

## More time for grant applications

Flinders University Rural and Remote Health SA has extended its application period for the 2023 Community Partnership Grants.

In 2022 the grants assisted in supporting projects across the state including meal packs for underprivileged members of communities, music packs for dementia sufferers, community safety awareness program, community health and wellbeing sessions, and art and craft workshops for disadvantaged people.

## Grants for Friends groups

Applications have opened for South Australia's environmental volunteers to apply for a share of \$175,000 in funding to support conservation programs in the state's parks and national reserves.

Grants of up to \$5000 are available through the Department of Environment and Water (DEW), and will be awarded to eligible nature-based initiatives through the Friends of Parks Small Grants Program.

DEW Community and Nature Partnership Director Mary-Anne Healy said that the state's volunteers in the Friends of Parks groups play important roles in protecting our national parks.

"These dedicated volunteers spend countless hours weeding, planting and improving our national parks and reserves so all South Australians can enjoy the ben-

efits of nature," she said.

"Their hard work, passion and commitment is inspiring, and these grants help ensure volunteers can continue to make a positive contribution to conservation and biodiversity in our parks."

South Australia's 143 Friends of Parks groups are eligible to apply for the funding to put towards a range of initiatives, including threat abatement, threatened species recovery, revegetation and habitat monitoring as well as European or Aboriginal heritage conservation.

Funding applications opened on September 4, and all projects nominated for the grants must be completed within twelve months.

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# Teachers push for change

Teachers from all around the Limestone Coast, including Millicent, Penola and Naracoorte, came together to strike against the overwhelming workload in public schools, making their voices heard in Mount Gambier last Friday.

Starting off at the Mount Gambier Railway Lands, the group of about 150 people marched down Commercial Street West to the Limestone Coast Regional Office for the Department of Education and Children's Services, as their chants for a fair deal were supported by onlookers.

Members of the Australian Education Union (AEU) and teachers expressed their frustration for the current state of the industry.

Australia Education Union (AEU) SA Branch presidential candidate Matthew Key said during his speech the future of classrooms, schools and teacher's careers was now at stake.

"We stand here not just as educators, but as advocates for a brighter future," Mr Key said.

"We are the ones who have dedicated our lives to shaping the minds of the next generation, it's a travesty that the South Australian government has turned a blind eye to the overwhelming workload we face day in and day out.

"Our dedication has been taken for granted and our pleas for relief have fallen on deaf ears."

Mr Key said the main purpose for the rally was to support retention for staff in country areas, as well as to ensure School Support Officers (SSOs) were receiving the conditions they deserved.

He also said the original three per cent wage increase offered by the state government was an "insult" to teachers, as it did not address the issues such as cost of living or lack of support.

"Our commitment to education should not come at the expense of our own well-being," he said.

"We will not stand by and watch our profession crumble, we will not let our students suffer, we will not let our public education system be devalued any further.

"Let our voices echo through these streets, through the halls of power, until it reaches the ears that have refused to hear it."

Mr Key said he was "excited" by the turnout, which he said showed how tired teachers were of their conditions.

"The passion and the voices being heard today will rival anything which has been going on in Adelaide and I think it speaks to how dire the situation can be in country areas when it comes to our working conditions right now," he said.

"I know historically, the word on the street has always been how no one ever strikes against the Labor Government, which is what we were out doing.

"I am sure it's going to hit the heart of Peter Malinauskas, who was a trade union leader for a very long time, so he will understand what we have come out here to do and if he doesn't understand, then he has really lost touch with his roots.

"I think by coming out, we are really calling upon the better nature of the government to show we are not asking for a better deal, we are demanding it."

Mr Key added if action was not taken by the government to improve teacher's workloads and support, there would be a need to "escalate action".

"This isn't just about teachers or SSOs, it's about the future of our state and about our children," Mr Key said.

"We always seem to be a bit of a political boxing bag when things go wrong, people always seem to blame education and schools so people are tired of that as well."

"I think one of the nice things is how so many parents are already on board and understand what we are doing.

"I think the media does play a big role in 'teacher-bashing', social media as well can be an absolute cesspool and the way politicians talk about us when things aren't going well all contribute to a culture where teaching isn't a respected profession."

Miriam, a teacher who attended the rally, said she wanted to take action due to how she believed industrial action was the best way to attract the government's attention.

"It's in crisis, it's crumbling and everyone is so overwhelmed while trying to do their best, but anyone else who had to work in these conditions just wouldn't bother," Miriam said.

"I have been a little shocked coming back to Mount Gambier to see the amount of disparity between the middle and upper classes.

"We have a population of fairly lost students and family and there are not many services here for them and it's easy to judge people, but if you can't get the support or encouragement, then it's no good blaming teachers or the students."

Miriam said a large issue facing public schools was how the private school sector often poached staff by offering higher salaries.

She also said she had witnessed five staff leave teaching for another profession in the past eight months.

"I would love for someone of a political persuasion or parents to come into the classroom and spend a week with teachers just to see what the job is," she said.



# Wind farm plans on hold

A development application for an offshore windfarm at Kingston SE has been withdrawn.

The Kingston Offshore Wind Farm project being proposed in partnership with Skyborn Renewables and Australis Energy, to be built off the coast of Kingston between Cape Jaffa and south of Coorong.

The developers submitted preliminary scoping reports to state and federal agencies in 2022, but last month it was announced on the website that Skyborn and Australis have decided to withdraw their development application for the Kingston windfarm in the state waters, following discussions with several state departments.

“The application in State Waters will also be formally discontinued by State Gazettal,” the statement said.

“We are continuing development in the Kingston area and we are exploring options to develop in the Commonwealth waters in collaboration with the SA Department of Energy and Mining.”

If constructed, the project will have a capacity of a between 1 and 2 GW, with the wind turbine generators (WTGs) now to be located solely in Commonwealth waters.

“This means the project would be located further offshore than originally planned.

“Normally, the State and Commonwealth jurisdictions border is three nautical miles (5.5 km) from the shore, with South Australia governing the waters up to three nautical miles, after which the waters are under Commonwealth government control,” the statement said.

However, locally in the Kingston area (Lace-

pede Bay), this border is extended further out into the Southern Ocean, to a maximum of about 15km offshore.

“Previously the closest WTGs to Kingston would have been within 15km of the shoreline within State waters, whereas now the plan is for the closest WTGs to be located about 15 km offshore, all outside the State waters and State Marine Park. Relocating the WTGs into Commonwealth waters will further reduce any potential for visual impact from shore, and minimise any environmental impacts.

“The Commonwealth area beyond the State waters boundary has excellent wind resources

and suitable water depth, which is why we are continuing to pursue offshore wind development opportunities in the Kingston area.

“Under the Offshore Electricity Infrastructure Act 2021 (OEI Act), a suitable area in Commonwealth waters will need to be declared by the Federal Energy Minister prior to developers applying for a Feasibility Licence. “At this stage, no declaration of an offshore wind zone around South Australian borders, apart from the proposed Southern Oceans Offshore Wind Zone around Portland which spans into South Australia, has been announced, but we remain hopeful that South Australia will be targeted in

a future offshore wind zone declaration.”

The state government recently made a submission to the commonwealth asking that South Australia not be included in the Commonwealth’s proposed Southern Oceans Offshore Wind Zone offshore wind farm zone that runs from Warrnambool in Victoria to Port MacDonnell, following a groundswell of locals against the project.

Any active environmental and geophysical works for the Kingston Offshore Wind Farm project will be paused while discussions with the State and Commonwealth governments are on-going, but the website will remain active.

## Still more to do for childcare after commission report

The Royal Commission into Early Childhood Education and Care handed the State Government a suite of recommendations with the release of its final report, but there is still plenty to do for regional areas.

According to Kingston Early Learning and Childcare Services (KELCS) working group chair Kirsty Starling, the Royal Commission’s report has been well received overall.

“Its findings were that there is quite a divide between rural and urban areas, which we know and have experienced, so it was really good to see that there in black and white,” Ms Starling said.

“It would be great to see the State Government adopting a lot of the recommendations.

“Recommendation 10, ‘The State Government actions to support childcare accessibility’, so we were really pleased to see that got a clear definition and is really supporting accessibility in rural areas.”

While the recommendations were a good start, Ms Starling said there was still a lot to do at a local level to bridge the gap between

urban and rural childcare accessibility.

“We’re still pushing forward with our plans locally and we’re hoping that Royal Commission document supports everything that we’ve been saying,” she said.

“We have been meeting regularly with the team working out of the early years office at the Department for Education and with our delegates from local council.

“For us, it’s still just pushing forward with our plans here.”

Ms Starling was also pleased to see the report openly acknowledge the effort and dedication of regional activists in fighting for childcare accessibility, but the focus remained on outcomes from the Royal Commission.

“More than anything, we still just want outcomes - we didn’t do it to have our names written in a document,” she said.

“It shows the work that regional people are willing to put in to just to have the access their urban counterparts get on a daily basis.

“They don’t need to fight, they don’t need to advocate, they don’t need to put thousands of hours of work towards getting access to childcare.”

Community awareness for prostate cancer will be available this month with the Limestone Coast Prostate Cancer Support Group (LCPCSG) hosting a public forum.

Four speakers have been secured for the event including urologist Dr Adee Davidson, radiation therapist Liam Jukes, prostate cancer nurse Tracy Bryant and nurse practitioner Stuart Willder.

Speakers will provide information covering their area of expertise with time after each speaker available for questions from the audience.

About 10 men in Australia die from prostate cancer each day with LCPCSG chairperson Richard Harry saying the event would also be a safe haven for wives and partners to attend and discuss how cancer could affect all members of the family.

“We are certainly hoping wives and partners will come along as well because I know from personal experience when you get that diagnosis of cancer, you tend to turn it off,” Mr Harry said.

“The specialist will go on speaking but you do not take in the information and that is when your partner does so it will help for them to come along as well.”

Mr Harry said there would be free buses from Naracoorte, Penola and Millicent for those living out of Mount Gambier/Berrin.

“The entire evening comes at no charge and people will have the opportunity to ask questions of the specialists if they feel they cannot ask them publicly,” he said.

“We are hoping to raise awareness about prostate cancer and let people know men from the age of 50 are entitled to one free prostate-specific antigen test per year.

“That is unless they have a family history of prostate cancer in which case they can start at

40 years of age.”

He said the support group also wanted to de-stigmatise prostate cancer tests with many men still believing the “rubber glove” was still the way.

“There are very few specialists or general practitioners in this day and age who will do a digital rectal examination, they will instead do a blood test,” Mr Harry said.

“If you are in for a health check and they are taking bloods it is just a matter of them taking a little extra.”

Alongside the forum, the local support group will work alongside Member for Barker Tony Pasin to host a barbeque with all proceeds going towards the Prostate Cancer Foundation Australia.

The forum will be held on September 18 at Mount Gambier City Hall and will begin at 7pm.

# Lower demand for beef

Beef markets around the world – other than the United States – are seeing softer consumer demand, with global cattle prices now split into two distinct groups: those in North America and Europe, and those in the rest of the world, Rabobank says in its recently released Q3 Global Beef Quarterly.

The report says declining supply and strong consumer demand in the US is driving cattle prices higher, while lower domestic beef supply has also held up prices in Canada and Europe.

In most other regions, however, the opposite – increased supply and lower demand – is making prices softer.

Report lead author, Rabobank senior animal protein analyst Angus Gidley-Baird said US cattle prices have increased almost 30 per cent over the past 12 months, while Australian cattle prices have dropped by more than 30 per cent.

## Australia

After falling for most of the year, Australian cattle prices had levelled out in mid-June, the report said.

Mr Gidley-Baird said the market had “seen heavy steer prices rise towards the end of July before dropping again. Meanwhile national saleyard restocker steers have drifted down slightly in August. The EYCI (Eastern Young Cattle Indicator) was down 45 per cent year-on-year for the month of August to average AUD 5.40/kg.”

Through May and June, prices had eased

on producer concern about the seasonal outlook, which added additional cattle to the market, he said.

“At the same time, producer buying activity dropped as cattle numbers were building, processing capacity remains constrained and consumer markets are still soft. This saw prices fall to their lowest levels in five years through July. But with some rain through cattle-producing areas in July, stability returned to the market,” Mr Gidley-Baird said.

Weekly national slaughter volumes for year to date (as week 33) were up 23 per cent on 2022 volumes with the increased cattle inventory flowing through to finished cattle numbers.

## Australian export volumes rise

For Australia, the Q3 2023 Beef Quarterly says, export data for July shows beef export volumes up 30 per cent year on year.

However, Mr Gidley-Baird said, markets are mixed, with congestion generally limiting volumes to Asian markets, such as Japan, while strong demand in the US and an increase in Australian cow slaughter is seeing stronger volumes exported to the US – up 103 per cent for July.

## High livestock numbers

Mr Gidley-Baird notes Q2 Australian cattle slaughter numbers were up 16 per cent year on year, while 1H slaughter numbers were also up 16 per cent compared with the first half of 2022 year.

## ‘Better times lie ahead’: Dairy exporters look to SE Asia

South-East Asia presents a ‘bright spot’ for Australian and New Zealand dairy exporters in an “increasingly lethargic global economy”, Rabobank says in a recently-released sector report.

The specialist agribusiness bank says “better times lie ahead” for the dairy markets of the Philippines, Malaysia, Thailand, Singapore and Vietnam, beyond short-term headwinds currently at play across the region.

And this means South-East Asia will continue to provide growth opportunities for dairy exporters in the medium term, the report, titled South-East Asia – in Transition to Better Times, says.

This is positive news for Australian and New Zealand dairy exporters, says report author, Rabobank senior dairy analyst Michael Harvey, with Oceania traditionally dominating dairy exports to the region.

However, he cautions, opportunities are opening up for the emergence of new competitive players.

## Transition

Dairy markets in South-East Asia are in transition, the report says, as they cycle out of a period of channel disruption, sluggish consumer demand for dairy products and downstream margin pressure that had culminated in a slow down in trade growth between 2020 and 2022.

Dairy trade growth into the region slowed to just 1.4 per cent average annual growth during the pandemic (from 2020 to 2022), down on a compound annual growth rate of 3.3 per cent over the past decade.

South East Asia has not been immune to global pressures, Mr Harvey said, with economies across the region posting weak growth between 2020 and 2022.

“However, from 2024 onward, the region

will present a bright spot against an increasingly lethargic global economy,” he said.

“Consumer market conditions are improving, with a more meaningful recovery expected from 2024 as inflation eases, food service demand improves and marketing and investment activities increase to support demand growth.”

The International Monetary Fund (IMF) forecasts growth of between four and seven per cent across South-East Asian economies between 2023 and 2028, the report cites.

## Milk deficit

Collectively, South-East Asia has a significant milk deficit, the report says.

And while local milk production is growing in most countries in the region, it is coming from a low base.

Mr Harvey said challenges associated with feed quality, genetics, capital and other resources remain major hurdles to domestic milk supply growth in South-East Asia.

Rabobank estimates the region's combined

dairy import stood at 9.9 billion litres in 2022 – compared with China's 14 billion litres in the same year.

With the region at the beginning of a trade recovery, Rabobank expects total dairy import volumes for South-East Asian countries to be two per cent lower in 2023 before import growth accelerates by three per cent in 2024.

And “further over the horizon”, the bank expects South-East Asia's import deficit to widen even more as demand growth collides with local supply limitations.

## Renault Arkana Intens

Renault Arkana is a stylish mid-sized SUV that arrived here in 2021 effectively replacing the short-lived Kadjar in Renault's three-model SUV range.

It sits between the compact Captur and the family-sized Koleos.

It's slightly larger than Kadjar in all exterior dimensions but with almost identical engine outputs.

Renault Arkana comes in three variants: Zen, Intens and R.S. Line.

There's a single drivetrain combining a 1.3-litre four-cylinder turbo-petrol engine with seven-speed dual-clutch transmission and front-wheel drive.

Arkana joins an increasing trend in the evolutions of SUVs with a smoother sloping rear profile that emphasises styling rather than all-road performance.

With this in mind Renault is marketing Arkana as an SUV Coupe.

Combining the two different components can be challenging but the Renault designers have managed to do it and have put together a very attractive vehicle.

One feature is a high (200 mm) ground clearance which lifts the Arkana without making it look too gawky.

Arkana R.S. Line adds comes with a specific front bumper design with an F1-inspired aero blade, 18-inch diamond-cut alloys, R.S. Line badging, gun metal grey door trims, and front and rear skid plates.

LED lighting is used extensively including the headlights; daytime running lights; tail lights and turn indicators.

A small powered sunroof is optional on the Intens and standard on the R.S. Line.

There are seven colour options, only Blue is standard the others are cost options.

Our test vehicle was the Arkana Intens with the optional sunroof which, together with the coupe-like lines, meant that entry proved a bit awkward.

The driver's seat has power adjustment but with a limited height range which, even at its lowest level, meant that my head grazed against the roof.

The R.S. Line has carbon-look interior trim, alloy sport pedals, a perforated leather steering wheel with R.S. Line badging, red and grey contrast stitching, and R.S. badging.

It has a fully digital 10.25-inch instrument cluster, a frameless auto-dimming rear-view mirror, and a sunroof.

Rear space is excellent with surprisingly good headroom given the sloping roof and, courtesy of the 2720 mm wheelbase, plenty of kneeroom.

There's leather and suede upholstery in the Intens and R.S. Line as well as electrically adjustable, heated and ventilated seats for both driver and front passenger.

The centrepiece of the interior of the Intens is its 9.3-inch portrait shaped touchscreen which not only displays the normal infotainment features but also, through its multi-sense system, controls the pre-set Eco and Sport drive modes to adjust the powertrain and steering.

There's also a MySense feature which allows the driver to customise these settings to suit their own individual preferences.

Directly below the touchscreen are a series of small buttons including quick access to the multi-sense system, front seat heating / cooling and door locking.

Sensibly, the air conditioning is controlled by three large knobs that are easy to reach and simple to operate.

Unfortunately, the same can't be said for the audio volume controls which require either a series of taps on small tabs at the bottom of the touchscreen or on small buttons on a steering column stalk behind the steering wheel.

There's a good-sized space at the centre of the front console for storing smartphones and, in the R.S., includes a wireless charging pad.

There are two adjacent USB ports directly above it as well as AUX and 12-volt power sockets.

A small storage box sits below a slide-out armrest in the centre console.

The boot features a split-level floor that can take up to 485 litres at its lower level.

With the 60/40 rear seatbacks folded that can be expanded to 1268 litres.

A space-saver spare wheel sits beneath the lower floor setting.

Arkana has a 1.3-litre, four-cylinder turbo-petrol with outputs of 115 kW at 5500 rpm, and 262 Nm at 2250rpm.

It drives the front wheels through a seven-speed dual-clutch automatic.

Renault Arkana comes with a five-star AN-CAP safety rating with a high level of features in all variants including six airbags; electronic stability control; adaptive cruise control with speed limiter; blind spot warning; autonomous emergency braking including pedestrian and cyclist detection; lane departure warning and lane keep assist; traffic sign recognition; front, rear and side parking sensors; rear view camera; automatic headlights and windscreen wipers; ISOFIX child seat anchorage points; and tyre pressure monitoring.

The Intens and R.S.Line add rear cross traffic alert and speed limit alert.

Renault's Easy Park Assist is standard in all models and uses a combination of sensors and rear-mounted camera for hands-free parking.

Arkana uses the Renault Easy Link multimedia system through a 7.0-inch landscape touchscreen in the Zen and a 9.3-inch portrait touchscreen in the Intens and R.S.Line.

Likewise, the higher-spec variants get a 7.0-inch driver's digital instrument cluster with the option of a full-digital 10.25-inch screen while the Zen has a 4.2-inch display.

Satellite navigation isn't offered in the Zen but is standard in the Intens and R.S.Line.

All variants get a six-speaker Arkamys Auditorium Sound system, Apple CarPlay and Android Auto connectivity.

Arkana uses the Renault credit card style key and includes 'walk-away' automatic door locking.

Although the rear window is large, its shape together with the broad C pillars do limit side and rear visibility quite significantly.

Arkana is quite sluggish off the mark with little low-down torque and a jerky dual-clutch transmission.

Switching to Sport mode makes a big difference and, apart from motorway cruising, we spent most of our time with it switched on.

There is a bit of torque steer to catch the unwary.

Steering is sharp and responsive with there's only minimal body roll through corners although it is more SUV than coupe in that regard.

Ride provides a nice balance between firmness and comfort.

The extra ground clearance infers off-road capability, however that's offset by the absence of an all-wheel drive option.

Fuel consumption is listed at 6.0 litres per 100 kilometres, we averaged a fairly good 7.2 L/100 km. Renault Arkana is a classy looking, well-equipped and competent vehicle that's sure to appeal to lovers of French marques and anyone else looking for something away from the mainstream.

In terms of pricing, Arkana can be assessed as either a budget-priced Euro premium SUV-Coupe competitor a la Audi Q3 Sportback and BMW X2 or as a fairly expensive offering in the congested and highly-competitive small SUV segment.

The buying public will make that decision. Renault Arkana comes with a five-year unlimited kilometre warranty, five years of capped price services with an impressive 30,000km service interval and five years roadside assistance when the services are done by an official Renault dealer.

# Scrambled Egg and Salmon Bagels

Serves: 4

**Ingredients:**

- 6 eggs, at room temperature
- 1/3 cup milk
- 2 tbsp finely chopped chives
- 4 fresh plain bagels, split
- 2 tbsp butter, chopped
- 1/3 cup light spreadable cream cheese
- 100g sliced smoked salmon
- Lemon wedges, to serve

**Method:**

1. Whisk eggs, milk and chives in a bowl until well combined. Set aside for a few minutes to allow foam to settle. Meanwhile, toast bagels to your liking.
2. Heat a medium non-stick frying pan over medium heat. Add butter, melt and swirl to coat pan base.
3. Add egg mixture and cook without stirring for 30 seconds. Using a wide spatula, push the set eggs around outer edge toward the centre of the pan, tilting the pan to allow the uncooked egg to run over the base. Gently push eggs around pan every 15 seconds until soft folds form and one quarter mixture is unset. Remove from heat. Gently fold the egg mixture once more.
4. Spread toasted bagels with cream cheese. Top with smoked salmon and scrambled eggs. Season to taste. Serve with lemon wedges.

## Shaved eggs and bean salad

Cook + prep time: 25 mins

Serves: 4

**Ingredients:**

- 4 eggs
- 500g green beans, tailed
- 200g rindless streaky bacon, chopped
- 2 French shallots (or half a small red onion), finely sliced
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 2 tsp Dijon mustard
- 1 1/2 tbsp red wine vinegar
- 3 tbsp olive oil
- Salt and pepper

**Method:**

1. Bring a large pan of water to the boil and cook eggs for 6-7 minutes or until medium. Place eggs into cold water to prevent further cooking. Cool and peel.
2. Blanch green beans in boiling water for 3 minutes. Refresh in cold water. Drain well. Transfer to a salad bowl.
3. Cook bacon in a frying pan until golden and crisp. Toss through beans.
4. Combine French shallots, garlic, mustard and vinegar together in a small bowl. Mix well. Whisk in olive oil until thick and thoroughly combined. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Drizzle 3/4 of the dressing over the beans and bacon. Toss to mix well.
5. Grate eggs over the top of the salad. Drizzle with remaining dressing. Serve immediately.

## Egg, Mushroom & Pesto Tart

Cook + prep time: 45 mins

Serves: 4

**Ingredients:**

**Cheesy Sauce**

- 2 tbsp (40g) butter
- 2 tbsp plain flour
- 3/4 cup (185ml) milk
- Salt to taste
- 1/2 cup (50g) pizza blend cheese

**Toppings**

- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 100g sliced button mushrooms
- 1 small clove garlic, crushed
- Salt and pepper
- 1/4 cup pesto, plus extra to serve
- 1 sheet puff pastry, just thawed
- 4 small eggs

**Method:**

1. Meanwhile, preheat oven to 220°C/200°C (fan-forced). Line a baking tray with baking paper.
2. Working inside the pastry square, score a smaller square approx. 1-1 1/2 cm from the edge. Prick middle of pastry several times with a fork. Bake 10 minutes. Pastry should have browned and puffed up.
3. Push down cooked pastry centre and spoon over cheesy sauce leaving the pastry border free. Dollop over pesto and arrange mushrooms over the top, leaving room for the eggs to nest in.
4. Crack an egg into each space and season with salt and pepper. Bake 10-12 minutes or until eggs white are cooked and yolks still runny. Stand for 5 minutes. Cut into 4 large squares, serve warm.

However, the deficit was too great and despite producing their best quarter for the game, the four-goals-two was not enough in the end.

Millicent added two majors for good measure and at the final siren claimed a comfortable victory.

Gallio credited a solid team performance, with no passengers on the day.

He now prepares to lead the Saints into a third consecutive WBFL grand final.

"We are really stoked with the result, but I think the way we played and the way we won was even more pleasing," Gallio said.

Not unlike the 2022 campaign, Jacob Cargier proved he is an invaluable finals footballer on Saturday.

He played a strong captain's game for Millicent and produced four goals in a best-on-ground performance.

"I think good players stand up in big games," Gallio said.

"He really did that and he is one of the ones who got us going early.

"He worked really hard and got plenty of ball through the midfield, but then when he went forward he was dangerous also."

Leading into the match, Gallio said he expected good things from two young Saints.

He was on the money, with both Hamish

McRae and Harry Tunkin among the best players.

"Hamish has super pace and he is really aggressive with what he does and Harry is just classy all around," Gallio said.

Fellow young-guns Josh Werchon and Kallan Shanks also featured, while ruckman Finn Grimes earned a mention for his efforts against some tough opponents.

"I thought Finn was really good," Gallio said.

"He battled hard for us and spent most of the day in the ruck.

"His stuff around the ground too, just his second efforts and his tackling pressure – that is what he brings to our team."

Other multiple goal kickers included young talent Kobe Gibson and Mitchell Reilly, with the duo slotting two majors each.

The Roos looked to Todd McPartlan on the day and he made the Saints work for forward entries, while Tom Holmes proved valuable around the contest.

Todd Lewis featured highly for his ruck work, while Michael Minuzzo, Joseph Ferguson-Lane and Lewis Lean rounded out the best.

Holmes top scored for West with two goals, with the other five majors all coming off different boots.

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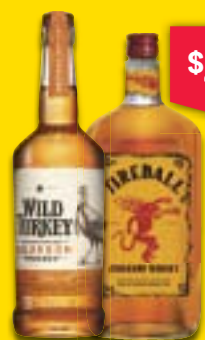
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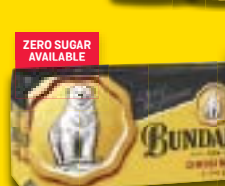
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
