Dry times ahead

The Millicent Swimming Lake looks likely to remain closed for the upcoming summer as Wattle Range Council seeks to start muchneeded upgrades.

During Tuesday night's council meeting, elected members voted in favour of opening up the reconstruction of the swimming lake's surface to tender.

It was discovered earlier this year that the lake had been using excessive water and it was

discovered that much of the lake floor had likely to be contributing to the leaks, which are been compromised.

Much of the lake pipe work and associated equipment is outdated and in unknown condition unknown, and there up to fourteen other visible defects across the lake floor that are

"significant" and require immediate attention.

There are also some operational issues that require attention before the floor treatment is addressed.

Livestock funded

Cattle and sheep farmers will be celebrating the news that South Australia's livestock industry is set to benefit from an injection of up to \$6.2 million of industry funds to support the sector.

The funds collected into the Sheep Industry and Cattle Industry Funds during the 2022-23 financial year will go towards 29 projects recommended by the Livestock SA Sheep and Cattle Industry Fund Boards to help maintain market access, support animal health, disease surveillance and traceability, predator control and more, while dedicated Sheep Industry Funds will continue to support the maintenance and rebuild of the Dog Fence.

Some of the 2023-24 projects to be funded

- The continuation of the Footrot Management Program delivered by Biosecurity SA to reduce the animal welfare issues and economic impact of footrot in South Australian sheep.
- Ongoing Sheep Lice Compliance Program aimed at minimising the impact on the industry by providing education, advice, inspection services and compliance action.
- National Livestock Identification System (NLIS) Compliance Programs for both sheep and cattle to support industry monitoring and enforcing compliance with identification and traceability standards for the purpose of disease control, food safety and market access.

The Sheep Industry Fund and Cattle Industry Fund are established under the Primary Industry Funding Schemes Act 1998 and provide a way for South Australia's primary industry sectors to raise funds so they can favourably position themselves in the national and international marketplace.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said the funds were raised by industry for industry and are particularly aimed at supporting animal health management and biosecurity, key focuses for the livestock sector.

"Our sheep, wool, cattle and dairy industries are important parts of the state's economy jointly generating \$3.7 billion in revenue in 2021-2022 and supporting up to 29,000 jobs," she said.

"The funding for these programs helps make our livestock industries more sustainable and profitable into the future while also benefiting producers in their day-to-day activities.

"The programs are also designed to assist in maintaining access to existing markets, securing new ones and supporting sustainable and efficient production.

President of Livestock SA Joe Keynes said the projects identified for support in the current financial year again enable producers to influence the direction and development of their industry.

"A successful livestock industry relies on its people, so it is important that the sector is confident that funding raised maintains robust and relevant programs," he said.

"In addition to the animal health and biosecurity projects, there has been a significant investment in predator and pest control including \$460,000 into wild dog control and \$150,000 into feral deer and wild pig eradication.

"The funds are also investing in capacity building for the industry by sponsoring the annual Sheep Expo, the SA Junior Heifer Expo and bringing LambEx back to South Australia in 2024"

McBride backs medicinal cannabis call

Member for Mackillop Nick McBride has backed a neighbouring member's call for medical cannabis to be legalised in South Australia.

Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell presented a motion in the Lower House asking for recognition of the growing importance of medicinal cannabis and cannabidiol as an alternative treatment option for South Australians.

The motion also supported expanded research and clinical trials into the treatment of conditions including endometriosis, Alzheimer's, Parkinson's and chronic pain alongside requesting the streamlining of access to locally manufactured products for residents.

Speaking in Parliament, Mr Bell said he believed South Australian residents "deserve access to the highest quality, modern and affordable healthcare available to them".

"For a growing number of South Australians, this includes treatment with medical cannabis," Mr Bell said.

Speaking to the motion Mr McBride said many general practitioners were increasingly being asked about medicinal cannabis as a treatment option, but there were obstacles in place stopping them from prescribing it.

"I hear that the most potential for streamlining access to medicinal cannabis is in the area of palliative care," he said.

"Sadly, in many palliative care cases we often see patients bedbound and medicated at a level that leaves them in a highly sedated state.

"If medicinal cannabis were an option for GPs for palliative care patients, it is my belief it could potentially provide an elevated quality of life in their final days.

"It could be the medication that provides the important balance of adequate pain relief along with some cognitive function at the end of their life."

He said no one wanted to see patients access medicinal cannabis illegally and he would like to see it become embraced as a mainstream treatment.

"I hope that the current joint committee

can provide some recommendations to navigate a pathway forward for more mainstream medicinal cannabis use," he said.

"We need to continue to take up opportunities to research and promote the use of

medicinal cannabis for a range of conditions and I do hope that parliament and the state embrace medicinal cannabis or medical treatments as an alternative where modern medicines have failed."

The works, if they go ahead, would see the existing surface replaced with concrete, along with changes to the lake's pipework and drainage.

Elected members discussed a number of options on how to proceed, including if it

was possible to patch current leaks enough to "limp through summer".

However, Wattle Range Council director of engineering services Peter Halton said that option was no longer viable.

Mr Halton said previous years had seen patch works done to plug the leak, but those

works were only short-term options that did not often make it through the season.

"We've kind of got to rip the band-aid off," Mr Halton said.

Mr Halton said council would receive regular updates on the tender process, alongside how the works would proceed. While the elected members voted to open up the tender, there was no motion specifically stating the swimming lake would definitely be closed.

More information on what actions council will take is expected in the coming weeks.

Unusually dry spring weather ahead, says Bureau

After one of the states warmest and wettest winters the Bureau of Meteorology has now warned the South East could have an unusually dry spring.


Bureau senior meteorologist Angus Hines said all of South Australia was likely to have a below average rainfall this spring.

"Most of the state has an increased chance of an unusually dry spring, with the South Eastern corner having the highest chance of an unusually dry spring," he said.

On this, Mr Hines said the South East and Mallee were one of three areas in the state with an increased fire risk this season.

"Australia's fire agencies have identified increased fire risk this spring for parts of the South Australia, including the the far south-west corner next to the WA border, the far north-west corner next to the WA and NT borders, and the grasslands and Mallee Heath areas in the south-east towards the Victorian border," he said.

"Prepare and review your bushfire plan wherever you are, know your weather and know your risk."

South East sewer wipe out

South East sewer habits are causing problems for SA Water, with "troublesome unflushables" often blocking up wastewater pipes in the region.

SA Water has lifted the lid on the South East, with recent data showing the region caused 62 blockages by trying to dispose of fats and oils in the sink, along with wet wipes and other foreign objects going down the loo. During 2022-23, Mount Gambier / Berrin was ranked second for regional centres recording the most blockages, with Naracoorte and Millicent also in the top 10. SA Water senior manager of maintenance Lisa Hannant said the Millicent wastewater treatment plant saw a very high volume of wet wipes come out in the sewerage.

"Our operators are physically removing several kilograms of wet wipes from the plant's primary treatment tanks each week, with no let-up in sight unless people change their flushing habits," Ms Hannant said.

"Unlike toilet paper, which breaks down in around 30 seconds, wet wipes contain multiple layers of woven fibre and are designed not to disintegrate, causing them to clump together and block the flow of sewage.

"This means if they don't cause blockages in our network of pipes or pump stations before even arriving at our plant, there's a risk of damaging the plant's infrastructure and reducing its ability to operate effectively."

Ms Hannant said Mount Gambier / Berrin and Naracoorte were just as bad, which led to a lot of clogs.

"Millicent isn't our only hotspot in the South East, with our treatment plants serving Mount Gambier and Naracoorte also sharing a similar experience, especially across our network of pipes and pump stations in these towns – and local residents are continuing

to take a gamble every time they flush wet wipes," she said.

"If we look at regional SA's total of 318 sewer blockages during the past 12 months, twothirds of these occurred at a property's connection before even reaching our pipes – let alone our treatment plants – which increases the risk of an overflow inside your home, and trust me, nobody wants to experience this.

"Luckily, the solution is ever-so simple and all you need to remember is to only flush the three Ps – toilet paper, pee and poo – and put

everything else in the bin to help protect your pipes and our sewers."

SA Water spends around \$2 million a year in redirecting non-flushable materials from pipes, pump stations and wastewater treatment plants to landfill.

SA spruiks wine, taxes to poach business from Victoria

Victorians are being sold the allure of a better life across the border as South Australia fires up an ad campaign aimed at poaching businesses from interstate.

SA Premier Peter Malinauskas spruiked the festival state's more attractive corporate tax regimen and superior lifestyle, leaving his Victorian counterpart Daniel Andrews incensed.

"We know that the state's tax regimen is extremely competitive in comparison to every other state around the country, including Victoria. We want to tell that story," Mr Malinauskas told reporters on Thursday, September 7.

The Business is Better in SA campaign, which is already running across billboards and social media in Victoria, flaunts better tax breaks for businesses, including zero payroll tax for wages under \$1.5 million.

It also claims better training, traffic, beaches and wine.

The campaign highlights that South Australians pay more than \$2100 less in taxes per year compared with their Victorian counterparts, and follows the Victorian government's imposition of an \$8.6 billion levy to pay off its Covid-19 debt.

As property prices soar across the country, Mr Malinauskas was also keen to point out that land was more affordable in his state for businesses and individuals.

"(South Australia has) far less land tax, far less stamp duty, a highly competitive payroll tax regimen," he said.

"That's what we want the eastern states to be aware of, so when they choose to expand their businesses or establish a new one, they look to South Australia to do so."

Mr Andrews claimed to be unfazed by the campaign, but used the opportunity to stick the boot in over what he perceives to be an unfair carve-up of GST revenue among the states.

"I'd be more worried about South Australia stealing Victoria's GST, frankly," he said.

"If it's so rosy over there, if it's such a great place, maybe they don't need our \$670 million worth of GST that we paid them."

Mr Malinauskas brushed off Mr Andrews' criticism and maintained the pair are on a unity ticket of clawing back their fair share of GST revenue from Western Australia.

He also said SA boasted the fastest-growing economy in the country, with Australian Bureau of Statistics figures for the June quarter showing state final demand grew by 1.3 per cent.

Victorian shadow treasurer Brad Rowswell said he didn't blame SA for trying to lure businesses across the border, but urged them to stick fast.

"Please bear with us for the next three years, it won't always be the Andrews Labor government that's in charge," he said.

The SA government intends to expand the campaign to other states after its initial \$160,000 run in Victoria, which ends on September 16.

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Call for action on hunting

Birds SA has welcomed a Victorian Parliamentary Inquiry report encouraging the state government to end the recreational hunting of native birds and is calling for similar action in South Australia.

The inquiry had eight key recommendations including ending the annual recreational native duck and quail hunting season opening on all public and private land from 2024 and retaining Traditional Owner hunting rights.

A Birds SA spokesperson said they hoped an inquiry, currently taking place in South Australia, would heed similar results.

"The SA Inquiry will hear the same or very similar evidence – there is no reason why it should not come to the same conclusion to end the hunting of native birds," the spokesperson said.

"This would then bring SA in line with the other states that have banned duck hunting decades ago."

The Victorian inquiry received mixed reviews with BirdLife Australia backing the findings and the Shooters, Fishers and Farmers Party saying the select committee had taken a "ride on the emotional bandwagon led by minority animal activists".

Despite mixed feelings across the border, Birds SA have applauded South Australian deputy premier and minister for climate, environment and water Susan Close and the Malinauskas government for instigating the South Australian inquiry, expected to be handed down in December or January 2024.

"We now urge the SA government to read the Victorian report and to use that information to accelerate this SA Inquiry," the spokesperson said.

"We also call on the Malinauskas government to declare no duck and quail hunting season for 2024 pending legislation to permanently ban this cruel, archaic activity in South

As part of the ongoing South Australian inquiry The Australia Institute found a permanent ban on native bird hunting in South Australia was supported 76 per cent of the public and would have minimal impact on the state's economy.

The Australia Institute SA director Noah Schultz-Byard said native bird hunting was deeply unpopular, benefited very few people and imposed costs on the community,

"Ending native bird hunting would have a minimal impact on the economy and would provide substantial benefits to residents and businesses near hunting areas," he said.

"Claims that hunting is economically significant rely on biased survey results and economic modelling techniques that make no consideration of environmental costs.

"It is time to do what a majority of South Australian people, and presumably birds, want and end this cruel and economically damaging practice."

"I reckon there might be some pictures and maybe some canteen menus, and maybe old books and stuff that they used to use," he said.

"Maybe a memory of how life was back then," he said.

He said photos would be probably be of students or the school and its events.

Jack said in 1973 life might have been more strict and students would not have had the good quality equipment like they have now.

"Like our laptops would be better and they would have had chalk boards a while ago, but I'm not sure if that's how long ago," he said. George, year 4, said 50 years ago school would have been very old fashioned.

"They would have had chalk boards and they might not have even had computers," he said

He there might be old coins in the time capsule and said if they were making their own he would definitely put money in there so people in the future could see how it changes

George was also excited to see if one of his relatives who attended the school might have put something in the time capsule.

"Some people in my family went to this school... my Uncle Deano, he might have put something in there," he said.

Ms Fitzgerald said as well as opening the time capsules visitors would be able to enjoy morning tea and take a tour of the school.

Depending what is inside the time capsule Ms Fitzgerald said they would likely display the contents or return it to its original owners.

Penola parishioners have celebrated the 150th anniversary of St Mary the Virgin Anglican Church with a special service featuring a sermon from the Archdeacon of the Diocese of the Murray.

Father Lyndon Sulzberger has been the church's chaplain for about three years and said it was an honour to be at the helm for the milestone.

"It's an honour to honour those that have gone before us, because it's nothing I've done," he said.

"It's over 150 years, there have been many priests and many people all working together and that's what it's about, working together under God to show God's love to others."

About 70 people came out for the celebration and Fr Sulzberger said it was great to see so many people.

"We had people from Beachport, Millicent,

Kalangadoo and Penola and visitors that used to be here came from all around," he said.

"Mary MacKillop ventured into the colonial backwater of Penola to do something about the injustices and sufferings of the people.

"We are called to rise to the occasion, to let loose the spirit, to rouse the comfortable, to radically embody the Gospel of justice, love and mercy and to declare the year of jubilee."

Fr Sulzberger said the church surviving for 150 years showed the communities commitment and dedication to God and each other.

"The great commandment is to love the Lord your God with all your heart, mind, soul and strength and to love your neighbour as yourself," he said.

"And so by us working in the community, we're loving others like we would love to be loved and we come to worship God and to pray for people because of what God has done for us in Christ Jesus."

After the service parishioners were invited to lunch and Fr Sulzberger said many memories of the churches history were shared.

Papaya Chia Treat

Prep time: 10 minutes Plus soaking time: 30 minutes Serves: 2 large or 4 small

Ingredients:

- 1 medium-sized Australian papaya
- 1/3 cup yoghurt of choice
- 1/2 cup Granola
- Chia pudding

Australian Papaya

- 1/2 cup white chia seeds
- 2 1/3 cups coconut milk
- 1 tsp pure vanilla extract
- 1 Tbsp lime juice
- 1 tsp lime zest
- Chocolate nice cream
- 2 frozen bananas, chopped
- 1 Tbsp cacao powder
- 2 Tbsp coconut milk

Method:

- 1. Make chia pudding by adding all ingredients to a bowl and whisking together. Set in the fridge for 20 minutes.
- Cut the papaya in half, and remove the skin and seeds. Put half the papaya in a small blender and blitz until smooth, then dice the other half. Set aside.

Papaya 'Lox' Bagel

Prep time: 10 minutes Serves: 4

Ingredients:

- 1 small Australian papaya
- 4 Bagels
- Macadamia cream cheese (see below)
- 1 Tbsp capers
- 2 sprigs fresh dill

- 1/2 red onion, thinly sliced
- lacksquare 1 baby cucumber, thinly sliced
- Salt and pepper, to taste
- Macadamia cream cheese
- 1 cup raw macadamia nuts, soaked 2 hours
- 2 Tbsp coconut yoghurt
- 1 tsp lemon juice
- 2-4 Tbsp filtered water
- 1/4 tsp fine grain salt

Method:

If making the macadamia cream cheese:

1. Drain nuts, then place in a highpowered blender with remaining ingredients (starting with only 2 Tbsp water). Blitz until very smooth, adding more water if necessary. Transfer to a clean jar and set aside.

To assemble the bagels

2. Prepare papaya by cutting in half, and using a very sharp knife to remove skin

and seeds. Take care to cut the papaya into even slices, about 3-4mm thick. Set aside.

3. Cut bagels in half and spread generously with cream cheese. Add 3-4 slices of papaya, then top each bagel with cucumber, onion, a 1 tsp capers, dill and salt and pepper. Press bagels in a sandwich press until lightly browned, and enjoy straight way.





Plugging generational gap

Mazda sports utility vehicle sibling rivalry just got hotter, with a reborn five-year-old CX-8 refitted out and snapping at big brother CX-9's heels, while fending off the challenge of the mid-size CX-5.

Available in six grades – Sport, Touring, Touring Active, GT SP, Asaki and Asaki LE – with petrol or diesel power front or all-wheel drive, the entry-level Sport FWD petrol comes to market at \$42,060, plus on-road costs, while the Asaki LE diesel AWD tips the scales at \$71,410.

Rearranging the chairs, the Touring Active takes over where the old Touring diesel stood, while the GT SP fills the gap left by the absence of the petrol and diesel Touring SP and GT models.

On test was the GT SP petrol, which takes in premium touches such as power sliding and tilting sunroof and burgundy or black leather seat trim.

Mazda's five-year unlimited kilometre warranty, with roadside assistance, applies across the model range, with service intervals of 12 months or 15,000 kilometres.

Mazda designers have modernised the CX-8 exterior with bold new front and rear bumpers, and tailgate, LED headlamps and tail lights, while a new front grille maintains the company's Kodo – Soul of Motion design tradition.

New signature wings add a premium quality feel, a metallic finish reflecting light in motion, enhancing vehicle dynamics, maybe the colour too, in this case Soul Red Crystal Metallic.

Black metallic and machined finish 19-inch wheels give a lift to the sleek styling and sophistication of the GT SP.

Three rows of seats, with quality finishes, offer enough space to fit all but the most broad-beamed family members comfortably on short trips or long journeys.

Massive rear doors open to almost 90 degrees – there are sun shades too - but there's still some clambering to do to settle in the third row.

Once in, the upright back rest and the cramped knee situation are not conducive to long-distance comfort.

There's limited head room here but the GT SP does have the power adjustment and rear seat heaters of upper specced variants.

A non-too generous 209 litres of cargo

space is available with all seats in operation.

A removable base boots capacity to 242 li-

tres.

There is nothing worse than sticky finger-prints on the touchscreen.

The CX-8 centre-console rotary control setup is my kind of connection.

Some previous CX-8s had only half-smart levels of phone mirroring.

Mazda has fixed this and updates now offer Android Auto and Apple CarPlay wirelessly. Also newly included is wireless device

charging and 10-speaker Bose audio.

On offer is the choice of two engines – a 2.5 litre four-cylinder petrol or 2.2 litre turbodiesel – both mated with a six-speed automatic

transmission.

The test vehicle included the former, which came up with maximum power of 140 kW at 6000 rpm and maximum torque of 252 Nm at

Diesel versions boast all-wheel drive, while petrol motors have to make do with front-wheel operation only.

The Mazda CX-8 was a five-star rating when it was introduced in 2018.

Massive interior space allows for comfort on both long and short trips.

As little has been significantly changed the Australasian New Car Assessment Program says it will not be retesting the latest version.

Included are blind spot monitoring, lanekeep assistance, rear-cross traffic alert, tyre pressure monitoring, traffic sign recognition and Isofix child seat anchors for two of the rear seats.

A reversing camera is standard across the range but only in the Asaki and LE is there a full 360-degree system.

The 2.5 litre four-cylinder motor sends a maximum 140 kW of power and 252 Nm of torque to the front wheels only, putting the brake, so to speak, on top-notch towing.

Maximum rating is 1800 kg.

The six-speed transmission is left behind by rivals with more cogs but it doesn't seem to affect the CX-8 unduly, producing a smooth run through all but the upper echelons of the rev band.

Engine noise is the downside here.

Fuel consumption is claimed to be an average of 8.1 litres per 100km for the petrol frontwheel drive on the combines urban/highway cycle.

The test vehicle came up with 11.4 litres per 100 kilometres in city and suburban work and 6.1 litres per 100 kilometres on motorway cruising.

With a bit of heft to handle, the ride can be hostage to some bumps and bangs over bad roads.

Steering responds with feeling and is particularly efficient in parking manoeuvres at lower speeds.

Front-wheel-drive versions of the CX-8 miss out on the Mazda Mi-Drive switchable driving modes allowing the driver to choose between Normal, Sport, Off-Road and a towing mode.

All-round vision for the driver is limited by

large rear-view mirrors and a slim rear window but I do rate the clarity of the head-up (any head-up) windscreen display.

Fitting in can be a challenge to anyone going through adolescence.

Doing a person's best for elders can be elusive and so could be the case of the CX-8.

Thankfully Mazda has taken the large SUV and planed off some of the prickly sides to its character, leaving an acceptable member of a growing family.

He is a bull around the contest and that showed in the first semi final, where he and ruckman Mitchel Kelton ensured the Tigers had control over stoppages.


