happening already including the coffee and chat, a walking group and also a digital inclusion program where there are volunteers who are teaching older people how to use smartphones and computers as well as the basics such as how to set up a MyGov account."

Ms Spark said by having these programs readily available it would allow those who were socially isolated to learn new skills and connect with others.

"It brings a sense of belonging and gets people into more skills, builds resilience and connection to their community in other ways as well." she said.

"It is a good indication that Millicent is tracking along well and we have had the Mount Gambier funding for a long time which was shared with Millicent but we have done a lot in Mount Gambier and now with this extra funding we can get more done in Millicent."

Ms Spark said ac.care was now asking for members of the community to step forward and volunteer to run programs in Millicent to better support those in need.

"We now want people in the community to let us know what they would like and we are continually on the lookout for volunteers whether it be with special skills or repair skills, anyone that thinks they could run an activity," she said.

"In Mount Gambier we have a craft group on Tuesdays, a Mums and Bubs group which is about to start up as well as music Mondays and we also have a couple of male volunteers who come in each week and cook up lots of different foods for lunch."

She said the Mount Gambier/Berrin community centre also has a bike repair workshop which happens in collaboration with other businesses in town.

"Volunteers at OneFortyOne are teaching people how to maintain their bikes and repair things which go wrong which has been good," Ms Spark said.

"We are working on more and more things and trying to get feedback from people who use the centre which is all quite exciting at the moment."

Minister for Human Services Nat Cook said the government "took great care" to ensure the funding was "fairly distributed" across the state to allow it to go where it was needed and where it would "make the difference to people's lives that it should".

The Choral Society will be presenting a varied program with fun songs, some modern sacred music and choral favourites.



Research looks to seaweed for skincare

Rivoli Bay seaweed could be the next big thing in anti-aging skincare, with researchers at Flinders University finding the plant can stimulate and boost the skins collagen production by as much as 16 times the normal rate in 48 hours.

Flinders University College of Medicine and Public Health professor Wei Zhang said they found South Australian brown seaweed extracts had huge potential to be used to help slow the effects of aging on our skin.

"Collagen acts as a building block for bones, teeth, muscles, skin, joints and connective tissue, while elastin gives skin its elasticity and strength – and both these proteins are popularly promoted by the beauty industry as essential for the appearance of healthy skin." he said.

"Our findings will help to fill knowledge gaps and sustainably develop brown seaweed advancement in topical and supplement skincare products."

Species of seaweed studied included Ecklonia radiata, Cystophora moniliformis, and Cystophora siliquosa which were collected from freshly deposited beach-cast seaweeds in Rivoli Bay, Beachport.

Prof Zhang said researchers found extracts from the seaweed not only stimulated the growth of collagen, but also inhibited a process called glycation, which leads to the deterioration of collagen and elastin.

"So far anti-glycation agents haven't been strong enough to have a major impact on anti-aging, so our discovery is really exciting as we can see the potential to develop stronger anti-glycation extracts from brown seaweed," he said.

The professor said a patent had been filled and the research team were now looking for investors and industry partners.

Securing up property against fire

Eighteen farmers across the Limestone Coast have received grants to help them build Farm Firefighting Units (FFUs) to protect their properties in the event of a fire.

Round two of the Regional Capability Community Fund saw one person each from Wattle Range and Kingston District Councils as well as four people from Tatiara District Council, two from Grant District Council, and 10 from Naracoorte Lucindale Council receive the funding.

The FFU grants support landowners to purchase equipment like water tanks and pumps or first aid kits and personal protective clothing to improve community safety and capability to respond to fire emergencies.

Minister for Emergency Services Joe Szakacs said FFUs were crucial to help farmers keep their loved ones, properties and livestock safe.

"Those that apply for these grants are often the first on the fireground and they must be properly resourced," he said.

The grants were part of the state government's budget promise of \$2 million over four years and allow recipients to be reimbursed between \$200 to \$3,000 for the purchase of eligible equipment.

With almost 200 grants given throughout the state Mr Szakacs said it was great to see so much uptake in the program.



Farmers surrender sheep

Local farmers have begun surrendering their ewes, rams and lambs to shelters and other properties due to growing fears for the upcoming summer season.

This comes following the announcement of an El Nino development for Australia, which is predicted to cause hotter and drier weather nationwide, which has prompted concerns of a limited food supply for farmers to support a full flock.

Limestone Coast saleyard markets have been severely impacted and sheep farmer Dale Price, who has had more than 50 years of experience in breeding Poll Dorset rams, said sheep farmers have taken an income cut between "50 and 60 per cent" compared to the previous year.

However, Mr Price said he had personally been "blessed" by the current season his property was having and was optimistic about making it through summer comfortably.

"It was like this many years ago and it really reflects the sell-off in areas which are affected by current or pending drought at the moment," Mr Price said.

"I am more optimistic, we are in a very fortunate part of Australia and at this point in time our season continues to be good.

"We have a surplus of hay and other feed from previous years so if necessary, we will use that to tide us over during the summer period."

Mr Price said mutton prices are expected to drop by 75 per cent compared to last year while surplus stock of sheep will potentially be \$150 cheaper to sell than previous markets.

"The viability of many farmers will start to look pretty sad and the unfortunate thing about it is the people who will be most impacted will be the young farmers who are trying to establish businesses, often with quite a bit of debt, the current interest rates, the decline in income and the cost of production will come together and will make it a very challenging task," he said.

Mr Price said the biggest factor affecting the current issues with feed was the amount of rain in the region, but added it was not a concern for his own flock.

"The other thing which compounds it is the ban of export for live sheep from Western Australia because they don't have the processing capacity over there to handle all of the sheep and it has shaken the confidence of farmers I have been in contact with from Western Australia." he said.

"It has indicated that more people are likely to go out of sheep production and it is an issue because not only does it impact the Western Australian farmers, it will also impact those in the eastern states as well in time.

"Unlike other areas, we are not forced to sell stock due to a lack of feed which is caused by a lack of rain.

"A general rain across Australia would turn the situation around rather quickly, so I am quite confident about that, but of course the El Nino prediction continues to cause concern among producers who have already been hit

by the dry season."

Animal Rescue Cooperative (ARC) South Australian coordinator Rebecca Alexander said the orphan lamb rescue farm she managed was being overrun by a large number of lambs and pregnant ewes being surrendered to the property.

Ms Alexander said this caused costs for feed such as hay and lucerne to jump which affected her total budget.

"This year, we have had just over 30 orphan lambs come in, the number varies each year and depends on what farmers go out and check their lambs," Ms Alexander said.

"We also had about 12 pregnant ewes surrendered this season and they have all dropped lambs, whether it has been twins or triplets, so we had at least an extra 25 lambs from them, which luckily they were all great mums to them.

"I think we have used three bulker bags so far, so our food has tripled and we have started feeding them hay earlier than what we would, just because of so many which we have, so we can't sustain them on just grass."

Ms Alexander said one case of surrender in particular was from a farmer who was unable to keep caring for the animals and did not want the lambs to be used at the saleyards or for meat.

"He (the farmer) wanted them to stay as pets so we could potentially find pet homes for them once they had their lambs," she said

"We couldn't turn them away when he sought us out and really wanted them to come here so we could find the best homes for them.

"We are still a rescue, which usually means short-term care only, so we do have to do adoptions and it is obviously very hard to put out sheep or lambs as pets and to try and do everything we can so they go to pet homes and won't just be sold for meat."

Ms Alexander said she and her husband would be in a "desperate situation" in terms of their own food if they received a continuous number of surrenders, but still welcomed them regardless.

"It's a tricky one because we are self funded, so we are already overstocked on our land as such because we have had all the extra come in this year plus the 30 extra orphaned lambs," she said.

"We are looking at the costs to maintain what we already have because we wouldn't want to take anything we can't afford to feed.

"We want to make sure we still have the funds to care for them, give them food and provide vet expenses because obviously they are quite high as well."



Concerns for increased risk in upcoming fire season

Forecasts of drier than average conditions has local Country Fire Service (CFS) personnel concerned the Limestone Coast could be in for a rough fire season.

CFS Region 5 Commander Jason Druwitt said having dry conditions in the months ahead will lead to an increased risk of fires.

"CFS is going to be monitoring this closely and taking this into consideration," he said.

"CFS is actively encouraging people to start preparing their properties for the impending fire danger season."

To aid in preparations, Mr Druwitt encouraged South East residents to get a jump start on their bushfire preparedness to reduce the risk to their families and properties.

"Clean around and in your gutters, mow

the grass and any fence lines you've got, remove any flammable materials you may have close to your house," he said.

"Having a bushfire survival plan is really essential, whether it's the five-minute plan you can get off the CFS website, or something more in-depth.

"The real key part is, once it's been developed, we really want them to include their whole family in that bushfire plan or part of their preparation as well."

Despite concerns CFS was low on volunteers in the region, Mr Druwitt said numbers had been stable over the last few years, but having more certainly would not hurt.

He said volunteering was just one way people could make an impact and help CFS when it actually came to battling blazes. "Not only are they volunteering with the Country Fire Service, a great organisation, they're actually volunteering for their community," he said.

"Another really good way is the preparation piece, because when something does start and our crews are out fighting a fire in the landscape, the best thing is if people know what their survival plan is and they've also undertaken preparedness activities.

"When or if there is a fire impact within the community, it's not just about CFS, our community is who we are so to rally around your people in your community and make everybody feel valued."

Mr Druwitt also thanked all current CFS volunteers, along with the families and employers who support them through their duties.

'Every tree is regrown': Deforestation claim rejected

A report into deforestation across the globe has ranked Australia in the top five for average deforestation between 2015 and 2020 despite a decrease in deforestation since 1990.

The Utility Bidder report states within 2015 and 2020, a total of 416,840 hectares of forest was removed from the nation.

This is down by 209,360 hectares from

Brazil reported the highest deforestation between 2015 and 2020 with 1,695,700 hectares. It also states India has had the highest increase in deforestation between 1990 and 2020 of 284,400 hectares.

Speaking to The Border Watch in response to the report, South Australian Forest Production Association chief executive Nathan Paine rejected the idea of deforestation in Australia stating it was all sustainably sourced.

"When it comes to native harvest of the forest, every tree is regrown and all those

crops have been harvested before, sometimes on multiple occasions," Mr Paine

"What we do is everytime we harvest a tree we plant it again which is a critical point when we talk about deforestation."

He said on a global scale deforestation needed to cease despite an increase in demand for fibre.

"We have situations such as the end of native harvesting in Victoria and we will import from other countries which are not up to the same ethical standards," Mr Paine said.

We need to make sure we are not importing someone else's deforestation and make sure we have sustainable fibre into the

He said now was the time to plant more trees in the ground to enable the future need for fibre products such as paper, compost or structural framing.

"We need more trees in the ground and that will ensure we have the capability to have all our fibre needs domestically rather than imported where they might not have the same ethics," Mr Paine said.

"We need to make sure we are not importing deforestation and make sure we have the right policy setting to get trees in the ground for the future.'



Red meat demand surges

Shoppers are increasingly putting red meat in their trolley as retail prices push back against the inflation trend being seen more generally at the supermarket checkout.

This is according to Meat & Livestock Australia (MLA), which provides free and transparent market information and analysis service to the red meat industry. As part of this commitment, MLA has analysed the relationship between prices seen for livestock at the saleyards, and prices of red meat at the shops.

Throughout this year livestock prices for cattle and sheep have declined significantly following historic highs in 2022. While livestock prices have decreased this year, MLA notes that the reduction in average retail price of red meat lags prices paid to producers by approximately eight months. This is due to the amount of supply available, demand for Australian red meat in export markets, and rising input costs through the value chain.

In the previous 12 weeks to 13 August 2023, retail prices for beef and lamb have declined significantly, following a trend that's continued throughout 2023, demonstrating that the fall in livestock prices has started to impact the price paid at the checkout.

Retail prices and demand

The performance of Australian lamb and beef in the domestic market remains solid, with both proteins growing in sales volume and overall value. When comparing the last quarter with the same period last year, value growth for beef is 1.8 per cent and for lamb is 4.2 per cent.

Data from NielsenIQ HomeScan shows a 7.3 per cent reduction in the price consumers are paying for lamb compared to a year ago, which is supporting a 12.4 per cent increase in volume of lamb purchased at the cash register.

According to Nathan Low, General Manager of Marketing and Insights at MLA, lamb has seen a boom in purchases in recent months, as consumers notice its falling price and jump on the opportunity to purchase a high quality and nutritious protein.

"The price reduction is translating to increased purchasing frequency for several cuts," Mr Low said.

"This is especially the case for the most popular cuts like lamb legs and chops, which are up 20 per cent compared to one year ago.

"Consumers see these price reductions and purchase more as a result. As this happens, retailers are looking to bring in customers with competitive pricing through catalogue promotions, and increased stock on the shelf," Mr Low said.

For beef, NielsenIQ is reporting 7.1 per cent growth in volume in the last quarter, compared to the same period last year, with an average retail price decrease of 4.9 per cent. Frequency of purchase and volume per purchase

are both up in the latest quarter as well.

"Consumer perception of beef and lamb is strong," Mr Low said.

"Tracking by Kantar, commissioned by MLA on behalf of industry, said that consumers see both beef and lamb as increasingly worth paying more for due to their high quality and taste."

Relationship between livestock and retail meat prices

Historically, data on supply, pricing and consumer demand shows that it takes about eight months for livestock prices to translate to the retail shelf.

The last time in recent history that beef prices dropped considerably was in 2012, with

the lag to shelf arriving eight months later, with those lower prices remaining for about nine months.

For lamb, which has seen a drop in prices in the fourth quarter of the calendar year every year since 2018, it experienced significant price drops in 2012-13 and 2016-2018. Correspondingly at this time, retail pricing took about nine months to fall.

According to Mr Low, there are a variety of factors that drive pricing in the retail market, as well as additional supply chain pressures occurring currently.

"Livestock prices are only one component of retail meat prices," he said. "Producing retail meat requires investment in energy costs, transport and freight costs, labour costs,

packaging and disposal costs, retailer margins, processor margins, PPE and hygiene, all of which have increased in price over the last year, along with almost everything else.

"This is important to remember when considering when livestock prices increased as they did to historical highs last year. When saleyard prices were at those highs a year ago, retail prices increased but not at the same rate.

"What we are seeing now is that same trend, just in the opposite direction. Consumers need a degree of certainty for their shopping basket and retailers smooth the retail pricing impact over the longer term, rather than sharply increase or decrease the price of meat in accordance with livestock prices."

Championing red meat

Australians who are passionate about the red meat industry are being sought for the next round of the highly successful Red Meat Ambassador program.

The program is run by Meat & Livestock Australia and is now taking expressions for interest for a series of courses to be run later in 2023 and the first half of 2024.

The Red Meat Ambassador program is an intensive development opportunity that offers participants professional training in communication through media and social media, community engagement and building trust with consumers.

MLA industry engagement manager Lindsay Kasprowicz said the program continues to be highly rated by participants, with more than 300 people now equipped with the skills to effectively tell the great story of Australian red meat production.

"When it comes to areas that matter most to consumers – animal welfare, sustainability and nutrition – Australian red meat stands out as having the highest standards and quality in the world," Ms Kaspro"The ambassadors program is all about equipping passionate people with the confidence and skills to engage with people outside of agriculture to help grow the community's confidence in our industry's credentials."

MLA will deliver seven Ambassadors workshops in the 2023-24 financial year, with one in Adelaide on February 28-29, 2024.

"Participants will gain new skills to effectively communicate with consumers about red meat production, industry sustainability, and best practice farming," Ms Kasprowicz said.

"MLA's consumer sentiment research shows our industry has great support from the Australian community, but we need to be proactive in reaching out and engaging with them. This program will equip our industry's finest to do just that."

Emergency drinking water requests up 250 per cent

Rural Aid has experienced a drastic increase in the number of drinking water requests from Australian farmers.

The charity has been delivering water tank refills to registered primary producing families for a number of years.

In the past year, drinking water requests have increased by 250 per cent.

Rural Aid chief executive officer John Warlters said dry times have hit early and hit hard.

"Farmers around the country have been unsettled by how quickly the rain 'tap' has been turned off," Mr Warlters said.

"In June last year, Rural Aid received six requests for a water tank refill. In June this year, Rural Aid received 21 requests for a water tank refill

"It's a huge increase and shows that the pain of low rainfall is already being felt in the bush.

"Rural Aid believes no Australian farmer should live without access to clean drinking water"

In addition to paying for water carters to deliver fresh drinking water to farmers, Rural Aid also runs a tank delivery program.

In the past year alone, Rural Aid has delivered 163 water tanks to primary producing households across Australia.

Victorian dairy farmer Mark Laity said the water tank he received from Rural Aid was a huge boost.

In the past five years, he's faced severe drought, life-threatening bushfires and floods on his East Gippsland property.

Mark and his family ran out of drinking water in the drought.

"There was no water left here at all, not even a drop in any of the dams, they were all bone dry. The creek stopped running; the whole lot," Mark said.

He thanked Rural Aid for his tank, which provided much needed water security.

More time for sheep report

An extension has been granted to the independent panel overseeing advice on how and when the government will phase out live sheep exports by sea.

Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry, Murray Watt agreed to the panel's request for a short extension to enable them to complete their research, deliberations and recommendations.

"My priority has always been, and continues to be, ensuring the phase out occurs in an orderly way, and this includes proper planning," Minister Watt said.

"Since consultation started in March the panel have received more than 800 written submissions and over 3300 survey responses.

"They've also listened to diverse stakeholder perspectives at public forums in person and online.

"With the volume and range of consultation information now known, and the commissioned work now received, the panel has requested a short extension to wrap up the analysis.

"I acknowledge the panel's commitment to providing recommendations on a pathway forward, and I commend their diligence to honing the report during the coming months.

Minister Watt confirmed the end date for the phase would not happen during this term of parliament. "We know farmers and other industry participants need time to prepare for the pathway forward," he said.

"The report is vital to developing a considered and orderly implementation plan that advances animal welfare, examines the needs of impacted individuals, business and local communities and identifies opportunities for future sheep industry growth.

"I thank all stakeholders who provided input into how and when the phase out should be implemented, including what's needed to seize new opportunities, such as expanding onshore processing and exporting more of our high-quality sheep meat to the world."

More information about the phase out of live sheep exports by sea, is available on the Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry website.

The independent panel is chaired by former chief executive of the Murray Darling Basin Authority and senior public servant, Phillip Glyde.

The panel also includes Western Australian agriculture expert Ms Sue Middleton, former federal minister the Hon Warren Snowdon, and former RSPCA CEO Ms Heather Neil.

The panel will provide its report to the Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry by 25 October.

'Too much': Farm insurance pushed through the roof

Farmers for Climate Action, an organisation representing more than 8000 Australian farmers, says two recent insurance reports have laid bare the rising cost of climate change inaction.

Research by the Actuaries Institute released earlier this month says the median home insurance premiums are up 28 per cent in the year to March 31, the biggest increase in 20 years.

People in flood prone areas are facing price hikes of up to $50~{\rm per}$ cent.

The actuaries noted that part of the increase was due to higher building supply costs, but it was also "driven by climate change impacts we're already seeing."

This follows a recent report by consumer group Choice, which found 87 per cent of policyholders in Australia have seen insurance premiums rise, and two in five people reported having their homes impacted by an extreme weather event in the last five years.

Ulmarra farmer Peter Lake says climate

change has made floods on his northern New South Wales farm more frequent and severe, and made his farm insurance unaffordable.

"We've dealt with major floods in 2009, 2011, 2013, and 2021 but nothing could have prepared us for February 2022. We lost fences and fodder and were forced to sell most of our stock. Even when the waters receded we were flood free but not mud free. We battled mud for months," he said.

Since then the member of Farmers for Climate Action has seen his insurance bill skyrocket.

"I was quoted \$19,000 per year to insure my farm which is just too much. We've had to weigh up not insuring our farm equipment, sheds and fences. We're only insuring the house and a horse float now," Mr Lake said.

"To stop the costs of climate change going higher we need urgent action to reduce emissions, including from coal, oil and gas, right now, this decade."







Sweet Salad Choice

Prep time: 15 minutes Cook time: 15 minutes

Ingredients:

- ½ Australian papaya, sliced
- ½ cup quinoa
- 1 avocado, chopped
- 200g punnet cherry tomatoes, halved
- ½ cup mint
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 2 tbsp lime juice
- 1 cos lettuce, shredded
- 1 BBQ chicken with skin and bones removed and shredded
- 100g Greek feta, crumbed

Method:

- 1. Cook quinoa according to directions on the packet.
- 2. In a bowl, toss cherry tomatoes, avocado and mint with lime zest and olive oil. Leave to marinate.
- 3. Place shredded lettuce in bowl. Scatter chicken and quinoa on top.
- 4. Toss through tomato, avocado and mint mix.
- 5. Place papaya slices on top of salad.
- 6. Crumble feta over the top and serve.

Chinese Pork Open Omelette

Prep time: 15 minutes Cook time: 25 minutes

Makes: 4 Omelettes **Difficulty:** Easy

Ingredients:

Sauce

- 2 tablespoons light soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons hoisin sauce
- 1 teaspoon sesame oil
- 1 chicken stock cube, crumbled
- 1 cup (250ml) water
- 1 tablespoon cornflour

Omelette

- ¼ cup vegetable oil
- 3 cloves garlic, crushed
- 1½ tablespoons ginger paste
- 300g pork mince
- 100g white mushrooms, chopped
- 2 cups (160g) shredded Chinese cabbage
- 3 green onions, shredded, plus extra for garnish
- 2 cups (110g) bean sprouts, plus extra to serve
- 8 eggs
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons toasted sesame seeds

Method:

Sauce

1. Combine soy, hoisin, sesame oil, stock cube and water into a saucepan. Bring to a boil, stirring over a medium heat for 2 minutes. Add cornflour and cook for 3 minutes or until sauce thickens to a thin gravy consistency.


- 1. Heat 1 tbsp oil in a small non-stick frying pan. Add garlic and ginger. Cook, stirring, for 30 seconds or until fragrant. Add pork mince and cook, stirring, using a wooden spoon to break up any lumps until browned. Add mushrooms and cabbage and cook, stirring, for 4-5 minutes or until softened.
- 2. Add green onions and sprouts and cook a further 2-3 minutes. Remove from heat and place in a heatproof

bowl. Set aside and keep warm. Wipe pan clean.

- 3. Whisk eggs together and season with salt.
- 4. Heat 2 teaspoons of oil in the same pan over medium heat. Add 1/4 of the egg mixture and cook for 2-3 minutes, tilting the pan to form a round omelette. Turn over and cook for a further 1 minute or until the egg is set. Turn out onto a plate. Repeat with the remaining oil and eggs to make four omelettes.
- 5. To serve, spoon pork and vegetable mixture on top of omelettes. Drizzle over sauce. Garnish with extra sprouts and green onions. Scatter with sesame seeds.

• Pork mince can be replaced with peeled green prawns or chicken mince.

CX-60 rewrites rulebook

It appears the CX-60 has inveigled its way into the Mazda sports utility vehicle family with the bearing of an imperious European aristocrat.

Indeed, an industry specialist who deals with vehicle brands daily says, at first sight, the CX-60 reminded him a lot of a Jaguar.

Mazda makes no bones about taking the Yellow Brick Road to a spot 'over the rainbow' inhabited by the best mid-size SUVs around and the CX-60 debuts with three sophisticated new powertrains - inline-six turbocharged petrol and diesel engines, in mild hybrid guise, plus Mazda's first plug-in hybrid.

In keeping with Mazda's Premium philosophy there are three highly specified grades – Evolve, GT and Azami – which can be customised further with safety and styling option packs.

The Azami test car included the SP Pack, adding even more luxury to the car's character inside and out.

Naturally, this new-found Mazda style and sophistication come at a cost: \$75,000 if you want the test car equivalent.

In contrast, the similar grade cousin CX-5 peaks at around \$55,000.

The flagship CX-60 petrol Azami is the first Mazda plug-in hybrid – the e-SkyActiv PHEV - which tips the scales at \$85,500.

Full range is covered by Mazda's five-year unlimited kilometre warranty, with roadside assistance, and five years of fixed price servicing.

Mazda CX-60 Azami G40e SP M Hybrid is a handsome beast, worthy of the segment known as Japanese Premium.

Mazda never tires of telling us about traditional Kodo design principles and the new CX-60 is no exception.

Finished in Machine Grey Metallic, the test car, with front-engine and rear-biased all-wheel drive, exhibited a powerful connection to the road.

The long bonnet provided more than ample cover for the workings of the in-line six-cylinder petrol engine, which was designated by a dark 'In-line 6' signature on both wings.

Rear combination lights provided signature illumination

The SP option pack, with 20-inch alloy wheels in black metallic finish, dark-coloured side signature front bumper with gloss black honeycomb-type grille, gloss black exterior mirror and LED headlamps with dark signature was well worth the \$2000 extra.

'Clubby' can best describe the cabin.

Luxury surroundings are matched by space, especially in the back, with the panoramic sunroof opening up the area.

Major leg and toe room complement the soft leather feel.

As with the CX-60 Azami exterior finish, the SP pack added a suede-style dashboard panel, tan Nappa leather seat trim and contrasting stitching, plus a matching two-tone steering wheel.

Boot room is 407 litres with the rear setbacks raised and 477 with them folded (not quite flat). A hands-free remote operated power tailgate does the job when loading / unloading.

While the 12.3-inch infotainment screen is new, it is still controlled by a knob/joystick behind the gearshift and not the touchscreen while on the move.

I'm a fan.

At rest the screen comes to life, by touch, with Mazda Connect.

Satellite navigation and digital radio are included and there is a 12.3-inch TFT LCD multi-information meter, plus a head-up windscreen display.

The Driver Personalisation System, another Mazda innovation, debuts, making it easy for

drivers to achieve their ideal driving position.

Entering their height via the infotainment centre display, the automatic driving position camera detects the location of the eyes and automatically adjusts the seat, steering wheel, active driving display and door mirrors to match the driver's eye position.

The system uses facial recognition to remember each driver's preferences.

Once the driver is detected, the Mazda CX-60 automatically restores more than 250 stored settings.

Premium Bose audio system boasts 12 speakers.

The six-cylinder 3.3-litre turbocharged petrol and diesel engines are both first-timers, with each utilising Mazda's 48V mild hybrid boost technology.

The large capacity improves efficiency with the higher volume of air enabling more complete combustion and a wider lean-burn range leading to lower fuel use and reduced nitrogen oxide emissions

All engines in the range are mated with a newly developed Skyactiv-Drive eight-speed automatic transmission.

The CX-60 recently won a five-star ANCAP rating thanks to such things as adaptive cruise control, autonomous emergency braking, pedestrian and cyclist detection, junction assist (turn-across traffic), blind-spot monitoring, driver attention monitoring, forward obstruction warning, high beam control (auto highbeam), lane-keep assist, parking sensors front and rear, cross-traffic alert, surround camera, traffic sign recognition, tyre pressure monitoring and vehicle exit warning.

Azami adds adaptive LED headlights, cruising and traffic support, adaptive cruise plus lane centring, front cross-traffic alert, 360-degree cameras, including see-through view.

The CX-60 'wears' 10 airbags, including. front-centre airbag across the range.

The Driver Personalisation System, another Mazda innovation, debuts, making it easy for drivers to achieve their ideal driving position.

Entering their height via the infotainment centre display, camera detects the location of the eyes and automatically adjusts the seat, steering wheel, active driving display and door



mirrors to match the optimum position.

The system uses facial recognition to remember each driver's preferences.

Once the driver is detected, the Mazda CX-60 automatically restores more than 250 stored settings.

The e-Skyactiv turbo petrol engine is smooth and responsive, using a wider gear range that delivers a balance between driving and environmental performance.

However, the stubby gearshift lever requires firm action between 'park' and 'drive' positions.

The ride's a bit lumpy too.

The use of a clutch in place of a torque converter is said to produce clean switching between gears, at the same time enabling accurate control of the hybrid boost electric motor in the 48V mild hybrid system.

Mazda claims fuel consumption of 7.4 litres per 100 kilometres on the urban/highway

In city and suburbs, with i-Stop in action, the test CX-60 clocked up 9.6 litres per 100 kilometres and 8.8 litres per 100 kilometres

when let loose on the motorway.

Mazda CX-60's unique composition, with front-engine and rear-biased all-wheel drive give you a feeling of stability and confidence with a powerful connection to the road.

Mi-Drive modes – Normal, Sport, Off-road and towing– bring a unique versatility to the CX-60.

There's much (too much in this space) to say about the mid-size five-seat CX-60 and most of it is good.

The innovation and styling, plus little luxuries, have the CX-60 vaulting into the premium SUV segment.

Pity the price bar might be a bit too high for some.

'Dream end' claims coach

BACK-TO-BACK premierships was hardly on the Kalangadoo radar when the 2023 Mid South East football season kicked off.

The Magpies had lost a few players from the 2022 premiership winning-roster and Alex Lyon had taken over the reins as coach.

The first half of the season did not provide a lot of hope of achieving back-to-back glory, but then the Magpies began to find their mojo.

In the end they finished second after the minor rounds, with just four losses registered, behind Port MacDonnell, who had lost just two games.

The Demons were bundled out of the finals race and Hatherleigh was the opponent in the big game.

The Eagles had enjoyed a similar trajectory in their journey to the grand final, with both sides appearing to peak at the ideal time.

A tough contest was expected and that is how it panned out.

With just minutes on the clock the Kalangadoo lead went from three points to six and when the final siren sounded, the fans erupted.

For Lyon, it was a dream ending to a tough season.

"It was a super game of footy, one of the best games I have been a part of in terms of intensity," he said.

"They (Hatherleigh) were really impressive with how hard they were.

"They were very hard edged and very desperate.

"Both teams had an equal amount of will, but we were just able to get the win which was great."

Lyon recounted the final minutes of the game, including a moment where he dropped the football in front of four Hatherleigh players to allow the Eagles to close the margin.

He said it was a nervous time, but some important flows of play ensured the Magpies remained in front.

"There was a crucial contest with Ethan Maney and Tom Hutchesson with about a minute left on the clock," he said.

"Tom was able to get that footy to ground which was pivotal.

"Mitchell Lowe's effort in the last quarter across centre-half-back line was astronomical with his intercept marks.

"He was absolutely super.

"And our mid-field just didn't stop.

"Lachy Jones was super-impressive and super-desperate."

As for the what the Eagles brought to the grand final, Lyon said it was not what he expected.

"I pride our footy on our pressure," he said.

"Whether our stats guy got this right or not I don't know, but we had 73 tackles and they absorbed every one of them.

"Then they threw it back at us.

"They are known for being a skill-based team that moves the footy quickly with good skills, but they were a different team on Saturday.

"They were tough and hard edged.

"Rigger (Gerard McGrath) has done a superb job with them.

"He lost a few players too and had to develop the side, so he did a really good job."

Once the final siren sounded the reality of back-to-back premierships began to set in, but Lyon said it was more about the achievement on the day.

"Back-to-back premierships does take it to another level," he said.

"But it is a different group from last year.

"There were a few of us who did achieve back-to-back, but it did feel like an isolated premiership in a way.

"From a club point of view we are well aware we went back-to-back and we are very proud of it."

Considering the start the Magpies had to the season, Lyon said it was an extremely satisfying end.

"This season we felt like we hit reset a little bit with the group." he said.

"We showed a lot of strength of character because we weren't looking that flash at the start of the season.
