# Property prices keep up pace

### **By Aidan Curtis**

Housing prices are still trending upwards, according to PropTrack's September Home Price Index.

At a local level, the South East was the best performing region in terms of price growth outside of Adelaide, with an annual increase of 10.94 per cent.

That growth bought the South East's median housing value to \$452,000, up from \$418,000 in September last year.

The report showed prices across regional South Australia rose to a new peak in September, increasing by 0.17 per cent.

While the increase was relatively small, it capped off a 9.86 per cent lift in housing prices since September 2022.

Regional South Australia's housing prices have increased by 52.8 per cent since March 2020.

# Shark victim recovering

A woman who was mauled by a shark is in good spirits as she recovers in hospital a day after the attack.

Pamela Cook, 64, was taken to Mount Gambier Hospital in a serious condition on Monday, October 2, after a shark bit her leg at Beachport.Husband Greg said she was doing "great" despite several stitches and a long rehab ahead of her.

"Pam said the worst part of the whole thing was the drive from Beachport to Millicent," he told ABC Radio on Tuesday.

"The roads were atrocious."

Mr Cook said medical staff were trying

to get her up and walking and believed she would be in hospital for four or five days.

"She'll be fine, she's tough," he said.

Police closed the beach on Monday as State Emergency Service crews searched for the offending shark, which has not been identified. The beach reopened on Tuesday, October 3, with scores of holidaymakers still in the area enjoying the school break.

Mr Cook praised the efforts of rescuers who stepped in to get his wife out of the water and administer immediate medical care.

"We've got such a vibrant and good community down here," he said. "Everything went to plan, basically. If you're going to do a training drill, that's how it happens."

### Marsupial thought to be extinct found in South East

A marsupial once thought extinct in South Australia has surprised one Limestone Coast resident after it was found attacking poultry on his property.

Beachport resident Pao Ling Tsai initially thought a feral cat was behind a string of attacks on his chickens.

However, after coming out to check on panicked chickens first thing on Tuesday, September 26, he was surprised to find a creature he had not seen before in his 20-plus years of living in the region.

Mr Tsai managed to trap the animal in a chicken box with the intent of taking it to a vet, and took to Facebook in the meantime where his local community helped identify it as a quoll. The quoll managed to escape overnight, leaving him with concerns that his chickens could still be in danger.

According to National Parks and Wildlife Service South Australia (NPW) district ranger Ross Anderson, a quoll in the South East is an "incredible sighting" despite the unfortunate loss of chickens.

"Certainly the official records of them being here are over 100 years old, so 1880s had the last official records," Mr Anderson said.

"We had some undocumented sightings back in the 1980s, but they haven't been verified so it's an incredible sighting.

"There's potential that there may be a surviving population out there somewhere."

Quolls were considered extinct in South Australia and are nationally listed as endangered, so Mr Anderson was hopeful the attacks meant there was more than one quoll out there.

"If there's a surviving population out there, this is really incredible," he said.

"Australia is one of the countries with the highest rates of extinction in the world, so if we've got species still existing in areas we didn't know about, that's a really good story.

"It is a turn up for the books."

Mr Anderson said NPW will be unlikely to try and capture any quolls in the area as the stress of captivity and relocation

risked killing them

"If it was escaped from captivity, we would attempt to capture it and return it, but at this stage we haven't had any reports of it being an escaped animal," he said.

"We'll set up some cameras to see if we can get some better imagery of the animal and see if any others are around as well.

"We will be working with the [resident] that has had the chickens killed to see if we can help predator-proof the chicken run."

However, the quoll was later trapped on the property and taken to a vet, where it was treated for mange and subsequently released at an undisclosed location.

Glencoe Hall committee secretary Rebecca Alexander said they were hosting a number of fundraisers to help bring the space back up to scratch, with the next event being a market day.

"So whether there's any tradesman that want to volunteer their time to do some jobs, because obviously our biggest cost is the labour, we can fundraise to purchase the items, the parts, but it's the labour that then costs the same amount." she said.

Both women agreed it was important to keep community halls alive because once they were lost there was nothing to hold the community together.

"If it gets sold, the whole building can be knocked down, so then that's another old building in a rural town regional town that's

### Small win for interstate staff as negotiations continue

A Change in the Department for Education's policy allowing interstate entitlements to be transferred to South Australia has been celebrated by a local Australian Education Union (AEU) representative.

AEU presidential candidate and South East resident Matthew Key congratulated the state government on the change.

Previously, teachers looking to transfer from other states would not be able to have their worker entitlements- such as annual or sick leave- transferred over.

Mr Key said this was a really good step in the right direction, with the union continuing to work alongside the state government for better working conditions.

"We will be able to have a lot more people work, especially as a cross-border community," Mr Key said.

"To know leave can now accrue on either side of the border is great but there is still a vast disparity in South Australia and Victoria."

He said although it was a good start, the policy change "would not go far enough" to bring South Australian teachers in line with other states.

"We are still the worst paid teachers in the country," he said.

"Negotiations are all in progress at the moment and we are pleased after the industrial action the government has come to the table.

"We are now actively negotiating with them in order to get a better deal."

He said the state government still had to ensure teachers looking to transfer into South Australia were well supported in understanding the state's systems as well as ensuring the mentoring programs were improved.

Within South Australia, student teachers in their late stages of university were able to gain "special authority" to teach in regional schools.

Mr Key said although this was a positive

initiative, a lot of the student teachers were placed in some of the "hardest classrooms".

"We do have a teacher shortage and we need to fill that gap but it is not done right at the moment," he said.

"We need better mentoring coming in and creating experienced teachers in those spots and having student teachers in more settled classrooms."

He said there had been conversations around the topics and it continued to be raised.

"The government keeps saying there is not enough money, but there is plenty of money for other things," Mr Key said.

"It is important that parliamentarians continue to talk about regional teachers as anything we can do to create more equity is a positive."

Member for MacKillop Nick McBride also spoke on the change of policy, labelling it as a "huge win" for teachers wishing to move to South Australia. "This is a change in policy that will allow teachers who may have accrued many thousands of hours - and therefore dollars - in sick leave or annual leave to move to South Australia and to not lose those hard-earned entitlements," Mr McBride said.

"This gives an added incentive to come to our state and take up teaching positions, and we know there are many available."

Mr McBride also noted there was a "growing number of unqualified teachers" who were given special permissions to teach in regional areas to fill vacancies in the MacKillop electorate.

"This is not good for students or these student teachers," he said.

"These young teachers are having to sink or swim and they do not have the mentors to help them deal with the behavioural issues of some students which takes them away from doing what they are, ironically, not quite trained to do, which is teaching."

"There has always been pre-polling in the Wattle Range Council area in state elections so I am calling on the AEC to make an adjustment on that and make sure the community do have access.

An Australian Electoral Commission (AEC) spokesperson said during the federal election last year, the Limestone Coast was also serviced by a similar number of pre-polling centres prior to election day.

"It is also important to keep in mind that we cannot always secure centrally located premises for all voters during the pre-poll period in an operation of this size and with five weeks' notice, where we want them," the spokesperson said.

"As always, it is important for people to plan their vote with the majority of people voting on the day itself.

"However, for those that cannot vote on the day, the pre-poll centres are open for those who need it.'

They said if needed, voters could also apply for a postal vote to be delivered to their home.

"Postal voting applications are still open and will be up until 6pm on Wednesday, October 11," the spokesperson said.

"All of these options means that people have a choice about when and where and how they can vote with just a little bit of planning and flexibility - similar to federal elections."

They said Australia has "some of the best access of all electoral processes" around the

"It is a system envied by so many and citizen expectations in the digital age don't always accord with a manual process like elections or referendums," the spokesperson said.

"It does require some planning to see where and when people will vote."

The pre-polling stations will be open on a range of days leading up to the referendum on October 14. On the day of the referendum, a number of other polling booths will be open from 8am until 6pm that day.

### Road branch worry

TWO roads within the MacKillop electorate will be investigated as to whether there needs to be more roadside vegetation clearance.

Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Tom Koutsantonis agreed to investigate roads of concern such as Old Kalangadoo Road towards Penola as well as Penola Road towards Naracoorte after it was brought to his attention.

Member for MacKillop Nick McBride spoke in parliament recently questioning whether Mr Koutsantonis would "consider updating vegetation clearance measurements" and take into account the "current maintenance schedule and the growth of vegetation" along regional roads.

"I have been contacted by a truck driver in my electorate who is extremely concerned about trees that hang dangerously close to his vehicle," Mr McBride said.

"The constituent drives semi trailers and has explained that on numerous roads...the trees pose a safety risk.

"The constituent believes the current maintenance isn't enough and that road users are being put at risk by overhanging branches."

Mr Koutsantonis said he had received advice that the current vegetation clearance envelope in the South East was "sufficient" yet given Mr McBride's concerns he would "ask the department to give [me] an update on whether or not" maintenance needed to be increased.

"I think there is a backlog of road maintenance across our regional roads," Mr Koutsantonis said.

"There are specific issues in the South East and I will now investigate the roads he [Mr McBride] has raised."

### Drop in volunteer numbers sees group fold

A South East LGBTIQA+ community group has initiated winding up procedures due to a lack of volunteers to keep it running.

Limestone Coast Connect (LCC) called time at its recent board meeting, with the group looking to officially wind up operations by December 1.

LCC chair Pat Smith cited low volunteer numbers as the driving factor in the vote to fold, with only three board members remaining to run the group.

"We asked for volunteers to help us and

unfortunately no one really stepped up," Mr

"Community groups like this do need to happen, they do need to thrive, but it needs the community to support itself.

"We were down to three board members, unfortunately, and we need to have strong leadership and strong board members who have skills and the time to commit."

With LCC soon to cease all operations, Mr Smith encouraged people in all South East communities to do their bit to make the region a safer, more inclusive space for all.

He said there were small things people

could do that would go a long way to building a culture of acceptance throughout the Limestone Coast.

"If someone corrects you on their pronouns, say thank you and then work better on those pronouns," he said.

"If you are a business owner or venue manager, make sure you have accessible, inclusive facilities and have that rainbow sticker on your door to show you are inclusive of everybody coming in through your doors.

"Queer people do need their safe spaces and it is imperative we do have safe spaces across the entire region, across all seven LGAs."

### Tourism bonanza

Limestone Coast tourism is going gangbusters after the region recorded its highest ever visitor expenditure in the last financial year.

In the 12 months to June 2023, Limestone Coast recorded a visitor expenditure of \$565 million, exceeding the region's previous record.

It also went well above the region's 2025 visitor expenditure target, which was \$479 million according to the 2025 South Australian Regional Visitor Strategy

Minister for Tourism Zoe Bettison said it was fantastic to see the "achievable" target passed so soon before 2025.

"The Limestone Coast is quite unique in the South Australian regional tourism makeup because they get a lot of tourists coming across the border, people coming on the Great Ocean Road," Ms Bettison said.

"What we see is people wanting to get out and have a bit of adventure tourism, so where else better when you've got caves, snorkelling, the ability to walk around the Blue Lake and enjoy that, and of course mountain bikes.

"I think it's a really attractive destination for families and we want to keep working with the tourism operators there and the councils to keep talking about that more and more."

The 2023 AFL Gather Round played a significant part in the region's success and Ms Bettison said there were already plans to improve on its success in 2024.

"The Gather Round in 2024 is going to be in the middle of the school holidays for Victoria and I recently met with your council to talk about how we can maximise peoples' stays," she said.

"Rather than driving through the Limestone Coast, we get them to stay overnight in the region and see it as a destination on its own.

"That road trip type of work will start to happen now."

While the region, and the state as a whole, has seen a lot of success in meeting or exceeding the 2025 visitor expenditure targets, Ms Bettison said those targets will not be adjusted just yet.

"We have had that conversation, so we've got this ambition for \$12.8 billion by 2023 and as a state, we're at \$9.9 billion now - I just want to see how the next probably 18 months go," she said.

"We've had an incredible bounce back and beyond for tourism, we've put a lot of focus and money into it.

"There are some concerns nationally about a bit of softening due to inflation and interest rate rises, so we just want to see where that lands."

Ms Bettison expects the review to be conducted in 2025.

### Probe into pig outbreaks

Authorised officers from the Limestone Coast Landscape Board have been investigating claims that feral pigs were transported from Victoria to New South Wales and illegally released in the South East.

Within the last 18 months, there have been three recorded feral pig outbreaks with more than 80 pigs culled likely to have been released illegally.

According to the State Government, the first outbreak was less than 20 animals, all of which were successfully removed.

It was uncertain as to whether these animals were intended to be used by an individual or group, or intentionally released to

establish a pest population.

The second outbreak included two pregnant females and discussions with South West Victorian government staff indicated people were actively moving pregnant females across the border to "establish new populations" for recreational hunting.

The latest outbreak included about 12 animals, which were released for personal use to a remote area of the property without the knowledge of the landowner.

Over the course of two to three years, it is understood the population increased to the point "of dispersing onto adjoining properties" when the local landscape board was alerted.

A government spokesperson said DNA samples were currently being tested to provide information on a possible source location.

They said enquiries were "ongoing to identify the person or persons involved".

Minister for Primary Industries and Forestry Clare Scriven said in Parliament recently that PIRSA "worked closely" with the landscape boards, including that in the Limestone Coast.

"The impacts absolutely are very much on the agricultural sector, as well of course on the natural environment," Ms Scriven said.

"Feral animals, particularly feral pigs, have very considerable negative impacts environmentally as well.

"I am advised [there are] between about 1000 and 2000 feral pigs on mainland South Australia."

Ms Scriven said feral pigs were declared for destruction under the Landscape South Australia Act 2019.

"Under that act it is illegal to possess, move, sell or release feral pigs without a permit." she said.

"Sightings of feral pigs or any indication of their presence must be reported to the regional landscape board or the chief executive of the Department for Environment and Water or their delegate."

### Impressive seven-seater

By Alistair Kennedy, Marque Motoring

Although Korean carmaker SsangYong has been in the Australian market for the past 20 years it has never been able to get close to the success of its compatriots Hyundai and Kia.

The company has gone through financial difficulties over the years and been taken over at different times by SAIC, Daewoo, Mahindra and, earlier this year, by a new entrant in the automotive scene – KG Mobility.

SsangYong currently has three models in its range, the Musso ute and two SUVs, midsized Korando and, this week's test vehicle the medium-large Rexton.

Rexton languishes near the bottom of the large SUV segment well below the big hitters like Toyota Prado and Kluger, Ford Everest and Isuzu MU-X, which is a pity because, after our week behind the wheel, we came away highly impressed.

Drive-away prices starting from \$47,990 make it a fair bit cheaper than these competitors with a seven-year warranty adding to the value equation.

Like the ute-based Everest and MU-X, the Rexton sits on the same platform as the SsangYong Musso.

Three variants are offered, ELX, Ultimate and Ultimate Sport Pack, formerly sold as the Black Edition.

A third variant, called Adventurer, will be added later this year that will slot between ELX and Ultimate in terms of both specs and price.

All come with seven seats, a 2.2-litre turbodiesel engine, eight-speed automatic transmission and 3500kg braked towing capacity.

The constraints of fitting three rows of seats don't allow for much flexibility in the roofline of large SUVs and Rexton has the same conservative profile as its rivals.

Most of the work therefore gets done at the front and rear.

Rexton has an attractive intricate diamondstyle grille with the company logo, which few people recognised, at the top/centre.

Both variants come with quad-style LED headlights, LED daytime running lights and LED front fog lights.

At the rear the tail lights and number plate lights are also LED.

The high-mounted stop lights are integrated into the rear spoiler.

Wheels are 18-inch diamond-cut alloys.

Rexton Ultimate adds privacy glass, powered sunroof and tailgate and illluminated front door scuff plates.

There are six colour choices: Grand White, Atlantic Blue, Fine Silver, Marble Grey, Pearl White and Space Black.

The limited Black Edition is based on the Ultimate model and comes with a re-designed front with diamond-shaped grille elements, deep gloss black finish and new-style LED fog lights

Other dark touches include black 20-inch alloy wheels and black painted roof rails.

There are only two colour options: Space Black or Pearl White.

Like most in its class Rexton has a fairly high stance which can challenge shorter occupants, but on the positive side the high seating position provides ideal viewing.

There are thermoplastic polyurethane (TPU) leather-look seats in all three rows.

The front seats are powered, comfortable and supportive as well as being heated and ventilated.

Attractive quilted trim can be found on the seats and around the front console.

Storage space is good with sliding covers for the drink holders and phone charging bay.

The rear seats are finished in the same quilted trim while the second-row seats can tilt backwards to about 50-degrees – subject of course to the approval of any third-row occupants



SsangYong Rexton is an affordable alternative in the family SUV market.

The second-row also has a fold-down armrest with two cupholders and small storage area.

Ultimate adds driver's seat and door mirror memory system, touch-sensing front door locks, heated leather steering wheel, ambient interior mood lighting and third row air conditioning controls.

Access to the third-row seats and space once there provides the usual challenges and are best left for children.

Even then the seating is low and there's only small, triangular windows which provide a claustrophobic feel.

Boot space with all seats in place is limited. The 2.2-litre turbo-diesel generates maximum power of 148kW at 3800 rpm and healthy peak torque of 441Nm from 1600 revs.

Fuel consumption is listed at 8.7L/100km.

The eight-speed automatic comes with the convenience of steering wheel mounted shift paddles.

It has part-time 4x4 with low and high range and an automatic-locking rear differential.

Although Rexton hasn't undergone ANCAP crash testing it does come with a good range of safety equipment in both variants.

They include nine airbags, autonomous emergency braking with forward collision warning, lane change collision warning, safety distance warning, blind spot warning, smart high beam, front vehicle start warning, rear cross traffic warning, tyre pressure monitoring system, Isofix child seat anchors for the outer centre seats and trailer sway control.

There are front and rear parking sensors and a reversing camera, with a 360-degree camera in the Ultimate.

The larger of the two screens is the 12.3-inch digital instrument cluster which can be customised to suit different situations.

At just eight inches, the infotainment touchscreen is smaller than we're used to in the latest vehicles.

It's also relatively basic and doesn't include



built-in satellite navigation in either variant.

There are six physical buttons and a round knob below the screen for the most commonly used functions and more buttons and another knob for the air conditioning controls.

Apple CarPlay and Android Auto are both wired and a wireless smartphone charger is added for the Ultimate.

Despite its modest 148kW power output, 441Nm of torque means the combination of 2.2-litre diesel engine and eight-speed auto transmission pulls the big vehicle along in a smooth, relaxed and surprisingly quiet manner.

It certainly loses nothing in comparison with its better-known and more expensive competitors.

Steering is relatively light and there's a fair bit of body roll through corners, but that's par for the course with large SUVs.

During our test we averaged 9.3L/100km,

reasonably close to the listed 8.7 L/100km.

We haven't tested a SsangYong Rexton for quite a long time and came away pleasantly surprised.

It's very well priced but not at the expense of safety equipment, convenience features or technology.

It not only beats competitors on price but comes with a seven-year unlimited warranty together with seven-year roadside assistance.

Certainly worth a comparative test drive.

On the third and final day of competition fhe shot a possible 25/25 to stamp his authority on the event on his way to a commanding victory.


It was Kent's second SCA national title won in NSW and his second national title in 2023, having won the English Sporting titles at Burrungule Park earlier this year.

"I went off the map and put work in front of football, but that made me miss it even more.


"After five years I decided I wanted my life back, then moved back to Millicent in 2016 to play,"

### Gallio's legacy to live on

Clint Gallio will leave a lasting legacy at the Millicent Football Club.

The four-time Western Border premiership coach is set to return to his former Mid South Eastern club at Mount Burr for season 2024 and will leave the Saints off the back of a history-making three-peat.

Gallio first signed on at Millicent in 2017, after winning back-to-back MSEFL flags with the Mozzies.

From there his career was decorated further, coaching the Saints to a drought-breaking premiership in 2018 and their second ever since joining the Western Border Football League.

It had been 34 years since the club had raised the A Grade cup, but the time between drinks would be much shorter next time.

In 2019 Gallio headed north to compete in the Northern Territory.

That year was a difficult year at Millicent and the reigning premiers finished the season as wooden spooners without a win.

The following year was interrupted by the Covid-19 pandemic, before Gallio returned home in 2021 to coach the Saints to a three-peat of premierships.

They knocked out minor premiers South Gambier in both 2021 and 2022, while the

most recent success came at the expense of North Gambier last month. It was a history-making victory for Milli-

cent, while also a rare feat in the league's history.

No other club has won three consecutive

flags in the league's current format, following the departure of Victorian clubs in 2013.

North Gambier is a partial exception, winning from 2012-2014, while the only other clubs to have achieved a three-peat in the WBFL are South Gambier and Portland.

There is no denying the level of Gallio's coaching ability and he will be a valued asset back at the Mozzies.

Gallio said leaving Millicent was a tough decision, but he is excited for his next endeavour at Mount Burr.

"It is just the right timing for me - footy wise and where I am at with my body and capabilities and all that," he said.

"It was a pretty tough decision."

He was grateful for his time with the Saints, which will always remain a prominent piece of his football career.

"Millicent has been really good to me and I have enjoyed every second," Gallio said.

"I think I have done the best I can and I have had a lot of people and players supporting me (on the journey)."

Mount Burr is in somewhat of a rebuilding phase and finished the 2023 season just shy of finals in fifth position.

Meanwhile, Millicent will be left in the safe hands of Tom Renzi as head coach, with premiership captain Jacob Carger to assist.
