Shift to hydrogen

Hydrogen has remained a hot topic among local politicians recently with Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell and Member for MacKillop Nick McBride throwing their support behind the proposed Hydrogen and Renewable Energy Bill.

The proposed bill would allow for exploration of renewable energy resources and establish an "effective and flexible regulatory framework" for the "construction, operating, maintaining and decommissioning" of re-

newable energy infrastructure and facilities for generating hydrogen for commercial use.

The proposed bill would "facilitate economic prosperity and benefits" for the state "through the development of an industry" in generating hydrogen and renewable energy, and "facilitate the grant of licences" to enable hydrogen and renewable energy projects to co-exist with other land uses.

Millicent Kimberly Clark Australia (KCA) mill manager Adam Carpenter said hydrogen could be a direct replacement for natural gas and as a part of paper product manufacturing,

and the company used a "lot of energy in drying of the products".

Mr Carpenter said the thermal energy would be replaced with hydrogen with the company having a commitment to reducing its carbon emissions associated with its operations.

"We also have a local commitment as well, we wish to reduce our carbon dioxide emissions through to 2030, so we need to look at ways we can replace carbon-based fuels with renewable fuels," Mr Carpenter said.

"As part of the feasibility study we looked into the establishment of the hydrogen hub

and the idea behind a hydrogen hub is that a third party would produce the hydrogen and they would access renewable electricity so that would be via wind farms or solar to generate the hydrogen but it would be used by other users."

He said the idea of having a hydrogen hub near KCA Millicent would be beneficial due to the mill's "large thermal energy consumption".

"We could utilise that hydrogen, but there would also be hydrogen available for other users," he said.

Up to \$10k on offer to help with community projects

Through the Small Grants program, groups could be eligible for up to \$10,000 to help with community projects.


SLS chief executive Roger Babolka said more than \$68,000 was awarded to community projects in 2022 and he encouraged more people to get on board.

Final touches are being made to the Civic and Arts Centre auditorium in preparation for Saturday night's Millicent Met event.

More than 20 local entrants have submitted 24 wearable art costumes for judging on the night.

Shift to hydrogen: Bill to transform energy landscape

"It would make sense to establish an industry hub around the hydrogen hub and we applaud the support we get from the state government."

"We have had the premier on site and one of those discussions we had with him was regarding our future and how that could be supported by the government for a more sustainable option."

Mr Carpenter said KCA had also had discussions around the idea of a hydrogen hub with Mr McBride.

"Renewable energy is the way forward in the region and we have incredible natural resources in South Australia from what we can see with the wind generation here locally," he said.

"The challenge from a renewable energy point of view is being able to have it dis-

patched 24/7 and for major manufacturers that will always be the challenge because we need it 24/7."

Mr Carpenter said he believed the South East was a "good place for hydrogen" as it would complement some of the industries which were already in the region.

"We are also looking at moving into transport and we have a lot of heavy vehicles in the region with forestry and long haul trucks," he said.

"There are other industries which could use hydrogen as well."

Commenting on the bill, Mr McBride said better infrastructure would be needed in order to implement hydrogen in the region.

"All I can say to any government, no matter the colour of their politics, is that we do need good infrastructure across our state so it not only transports energy but is reliable

and safe to use 24/7 rather than switching it off because the winds might be too high," Mr McBride said.

He said the bill gave the "opportunity to license and allow the generation of hydrogen using renewable energy".

"Two of those energies obviously are solar and wind," Mr McBride said.

"In the summer months, we do have more sunshine than in winter months and we also have some large industries which would benefit from this type of energy base if it were allowed to stack up."

Mr McBride touched on the Millicent mill and said if there were access opportunities for KCA to use hydrogen and renewable power to "substitute its high need on natural gas".

Also in favour of the bill was Mr Bell, who reiterated that he believed the South East was a good regional area for hydrogen.

"I keep promoting the South East as an ideal place for hydrogen generation," Mr Bell said.

"When you think about it, putting electricity through fresh water to separate the hydrogen and oxygen atoms of courts needs fresh water, and you need - if it is going to be green hydrogen - renewable energy."

"The South East is abundant in both of those categories, it has more fresh water probably running out to sea every day than nearly any other part of South Australia and with the renewable energy in solar and wind farms along our coastlines it has abundant renewable energy."

He also supported KCA being the main property for a hydrogen hub and applauded the government for "looking at many areas across South Australia" for hydrogen development.

Saleyards still on agenda

Discussions around the Millicent Saleyards continue, despite Wattle Range Councillors voting to close the yard several months ago.

Expenditure on the Millicent Transit Yards will be deferred until next year and a councillor rescinded a motion detailing a possible flat rate for stock agents to use the facility during a heated debate at this week's Wattle Range Council meeting.

Currently, Wattle Range Council managers are working alongside farmers who wish to utilise the transfer facility for the transport of livestock with the facilities expected to have a \$200,000 facelift.

Wattle Range Council chief executive officer Ben Gower noted to elected members during this week's council meeting that procedures and inductions would soon be underway.

He explained the process - which is expected to be implemented in the coming weeks - would include farmers contacting the council office, explaining they wish to use the transfer station.

The farmers would then receive a National Vendor Declaration which would detail the number of stock transported to the facility as well as details of those moving the stock.

Mr Gower stated this was to help biosecurity measures should there be a disease outbreak at the transit yards.

He said the current procedure expected to take place in the future was to charge each farmer \$3.50 per head of cattle which moves through the transit yard and about \$1.50 per head of sheep.

Farmers would receive an invoice from council at the end of each month.

During this week's meeting, Councillor Moira Neagle put forward a motion on notice that elected members allow four stock agents pay a yearly rate of \$500 to utilise the saleyards for transport of stock.

Elected members spoke on the motion - which Ms Neagle later rescinded - with many in disagreement of the original motion despite it being recommended at the June meeting of the Millicent Saleyards Advisory Committee.

Ms Neagle argued it would be a "clean and straightforward" approach and claimed stock agents "wanted to give it a go".

Many elected members disagreed with the motion with Councillor Dale Price stating he was "not comfortable" with the process.

Mr Price told the chamber he believed it was a biosecurity issue and said farmers were responsible for filling out the declaration with council requiring a copy.

He argued council needed to know who was accessing the saleyards and labelled the proposal an occupational, health and safety risk.

"If someone wants to use it [the transit yards] then paying a fee and paperwork is basic," Mr Price said.

He also said councillors were "responsible to ratepayers" for making financial decisions and by having the \$500 flat fee they would be providing a multi-million dollar facility "for nothing".

Mr Gower stated council would still need the declaration forms filled out and handed in yet claimed stock agents "did not want" to fill out the forms themselves and it would instead be up to the farmer.

He also shot down the idea of having a mobile phone attached to a number specifically

to send photos of the declaration forms.

Mr Gower made it clear the declaration forms was so the council would know who was travelling through the transit yards while Councillors Peter Dunicliff and Emma Castine argued if there was a set fee for the stock agents elected members would not be able to determine whether \$500 was "too much or not enough".

Councillor Dennis Muhovics also chimed in on the discussion stating he believed the flat rate was "at least a starting point" for the future of the facility while Councillor Chris Brodie claimed he would prefer to see a per head rate and he "did not think much" of the motion.

Following the debate, Cr Neagle rescinded the motion.

After the discussion, Cr Dunicliff put forward a motion without notice that the expenditure on the transit yards be postponed until the Wattle Range Council Audit and Risk Committee receive a report in February 2024 in relation to its usage and operation.

Mr Dunicliff stated he believed this motion was "on the right track" and said he wanted to know whether the facilities had been used and if so, how much stock travelled through the transit yard.

Mr Gower reiterated to Ms Neagle that the process for signage around the yard's new procedures would still go ahead alongside inductions and the declaration procedure.

Councillor David Walshaw said he saw the transit yards as a "risk" and wanted a reasonable time period to look at how much the yards were being used.

Mr Walshaw questioned whether 30 or 40 cattle being transferred through the facility was worth a \$200,000 upgrade and said if the yards were "underperforming" the money would be better spend elsewhere.

Mr Gower stated there was minimal risk of injury to users of the transit yards while Mr Price suggested the facilities be locked until new signage and procedures were put in place.

During the debate, Ms Neagle stated in her five years as a councillor she had never expe-

rienced more discussion on a topic than the saleyards.

She claimed the "community" was telling elected members they wanted the saleyards and questioned whether council was listening.

Wattle Range Mayor Des Noll interjected, clarifying he believed it was not the entire community stating they wanted the facility to remain open and claimed it was only a small portion.

Ms Neagle reiterated she had not experienced any other issue where people had "come out" other than this.

Elected members voted in favour of Mr Dunicliff's motion with six councillors voting for and four voting against.

Councillors David Walshaw, Dale Price, Peter Dunicliff, Richard Cassidy and Chris Brodie voted for the motion while Councillors Moira Neagle, Dennis Muhovics, Sharon Cox and Deb Agnew voted against it.

Council seeking matched cash for next streetscape stage

Wattle Range Councillors were updated on several major projects this week including the Millicent and Penola streetscape, McLaughlin and McCorquindale Park fire services and the Millicent depot shed.

According to a council report, Sprout has completed its work on the streetscape with the next stage being referred to next year's council budget.

Elected members were told council would "seek matching funding" through both state and federal grant programs.

The report also stated officers were awaiting services consultant Lucid to provide the final costing for the preferred ring main and fire hydrant protection method of McLaughlin Park before entering as two separate business cases for future consideration.

This will also be referred to the budget process for consideration in the 2024/2025 budget.

Other major projects included power being connected to the Millicent depot shed and the overhead crane being fully commis-

sioned.

Floor treatment was expected to be applied in the final weeks of September and early October with officers proposing a tour of the new facility towards the end of the month.

The Millicent Swimming Lake refurbishment was also mentioned in the major projects report stating FMG Engineering has been appointed by officers to undertake a technical assessment and prepare aquatic engineering report with detailed scope for

the required swimming lake upgrade.

A site survey is expected to take place a geotechnical investigation team scheduled to be onsite October 23 to drill exploratory bore holes and find footing dimensions of the lake walls.

Elected members were also informed that the draft tender and contract documents provided by Norman Waterhouse has been forwarded to Chapman Herbert to consolidate ready for tendering at the end of October 23 for the council service centre.

Blue sparks health talks

Millicent's newest sculpture of a large hand, installed two years ago on the corner of Williams Road and Ridge Terrace, has turned blue for the month of October.

The idea is an initiative of the Wattle Range Suicide Prevention Network (WRSPN) to raise awareness of Mental Health Awareness month.

Gaining permission from Wattle Range Council the WRSPN purchased blue covers to place over the existing lights which turn the white hand blue at night time.

Secretary of the WRSPN Marg Chapple said "The network did it this month because October is Mental Health month and we hope it will start conversations.

"It will be lit up for the rest of October." The hand sculpture is on the corner of the parklands that houses the tree painted blue by WRSPN members in February this year as part of the national Blue Tree project.

Both projects are intended to help spark difficult conversations and encourage people to speak up when they have mental health concerns.

Recently the group also supported Vesta service technician John Hutchison, to light up one of the service provider's wind turbines for the third consecutive year.

The 67 metre wind turbine owned by Engie (Canunda wind farm) was lit up blue for mental health and suicide awareness.

Ms Chapple said there was a good crowd at the event which occurred the night before

daylight-saving began.

"Millicent Shares a Plate group supplied free soup for the night and the coffee van didn't charge either but donations were accepted" she said.

"We raised about \$280 dollars for the Shares a Plate group."

Mr Hutchison and WRSPN members Rick Errington and Ben Gower addressed those in attendance about mental health.

"They reminded people to look out for their mates and check in on them," Ms Chapple said.

Growers to benefit from China hay trade deal

South East growers are set to benefit as Australia's relationship with China stabilises, with trade impediments on hay lifted.

In late September, the Federal Government announced hay exports to China would improve with trade impediments in place since 2021 to be removed.

While the Limestone Coast has a diverse range of primary production, Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said the trade news was a great sign for the region.

"Overall, having a positive relationship with China in terms of trade is really important for the Limestone Coast," Ms Scriven said.

"Of course, this follows on from the relaxing of impediments for barley and also for timber.

"There is still quite a lot of work to be done, it's quite important for rock lobster and wine, and hopefully the continued stabilisation of the relationship with China will result in some positive outcomes for those as well."

For the state, the Australian-Chinese hay trade was worth around \$33 million prior to 2021, and Ms Scriven said she hoped to see that start to pick back up.

"The China trade relationship is very important and we're glad that it is improving," she said.



Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said the trade news was a great sign for the region.

"Of course our producers will continue to have diverse markets and to pursue diversification of markets going forward, that is simply good commercial practice.

"Through the hard work of the Federal Government, and of course this comes hot on the heels of the Premier's visit to China a couple of weeks ago, so I'm hopeful that the relationship will continue to stabilise."

Price's voice to the fore

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Like many of your readers I was first introduced to my country Liberal Party colleague Jacinta Nampijinpa Price thanks to Sky Television's free to air service for regional Australians.

I remember thinking what a brave woman Jacinta was.

Her common sense contributions were as refreshing as they were authentic.

Accordingly, when my former colleague Nicolle Flint arranged to host Jacinta in Canberra, I made sure I was in attendance.

Jacinta had travelled to Canberra as Deputy Mayor of the Alice Springs Town Council bringing with her a small number of indigenous women who were seeking to raise the plight of remote indigenous women and children.

They shared their personal experiences of domestic violence and child sex abuse and called on decision makers to address the crisis playing out in Indigenous communities as a first order priority.

Sadly, only a small number of Members and Senators made themselves available to hear these first-hand and harrowing accounts. This meeting left me feeling physically ill.

But my nausea quickly turned to anger when I realised that these brave women had travelled to Canberra to ring the alarm on what was happening in remote indigenous communities but the mainstream media had showed no interest in reporting on this event.

As conservative commentators like Peta Credlin noted at the time, if these events were playing out in a suburban context it would have been labelled a national disgrace, there would have been blanket news coverage and action would be taken.

Instead, Jacinta and her fellow travellers returned to Alice having caused barely a ripple on the surface of Lake Burley Griffin.

That meeting is the reason why I support the establishment of a Royal Commission into child sexual abuse in Indigenous communities.

But I think that meeting was the genesis of so much more.

Speaking to Jacinta more recently I understand that the limited number of Members and Senators willing to attend that meeting in Canberra acted as motivation for her to run for Federal Parliament.

I have previously noted the divisive nature of the Referendum taking place on Saturday and from my perspective the damage it is doing to our sense of national cohesiveness.

The one positive, however, is the profile that this campaign has provided to the now Senator.

The campaign for the Voice has elevated hers and I for one think remote indigenous communities will be better for it.

More news for our readers

A new paper is set to change the news landscape of the Limestone Coast, as SA Today, publisher of The South Eastern Times and Penola Pennant, launches a new masthead.

SA Today, the independent publishers of a number of regional newspapers across South Australia including the Limestone Coast region, have revealed their latest plans to increase local public interest journalism for the Limestone Coast by announcing the launch of a new regional newspaper called Limestone Coast Today.

The new publication will replace the Naracoorte Herald with expanded coverage into Kingston and Robe.

In addition to being a standalone publication, Limestone Coast Today will also form the basis of regional news coverage that will see significant expansion to the Tuesday edition of The Border Watch, the Penola Pennant, South Eastern Times and the Border Chronicle.

Managing director of SA Today Paul Thomas said this expansion will significantly improve the local news coverage for the Limestone Coast region while retaining local news and the legacy of the historic community newspapers.

“We’ll be following the proven success of our other major regional publications, The Border Watch, Eyre Peninsula Advocate, Fleurieu Sun and Plains Producer”, he said.

SA Today launched in July 2020 when it revived The Border Watch, following its closure by the previous owners, and has subsequently revived The Penola Pennant, South Eastern Times and a second edition of The Border Watch on Tuesdays.

In April, SA Today purchased nine historic mastheads from Australian Community Media, including the Border Chronicle.

Lamb Shank Pilaf

Prep time: 15 minutes

Cook time: 3 hours

Serves: 4

Ingredients:

- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 4 lamb shanks (approx. 400g each), fat trimmed
- 2 tbsp mild curry powder
- 1L salt-reduced beef stock

- 400g can diced tomatoes
- 1 red onion, thinly sliced
- 200g basmati rice
- 350g butternut pumpkin, peeled, diced into 3cm cubes
- 1 small bunch English spinach, trimmed, chopped
- 1/3 cup dried apricots, finely chopped
- Toasted pine nuts, chopped, mint sprigs, baby leaf

Method:

Sauce

1. Preheat oven to 180°C (160°fan-forced). In a large snap lock bag place half the oil, lamb shanks and curry powder. Season and rub to coat.
2. Heat a large ovenproof casserole dish over medium-high heat and cook shanks, in 2 batches, if necessary, for 8-10 minutes or until browned all over. Add stock and tomatoes and bring to the boil. Place in the oven for 2-2 ¼ hours or until tender and falling off the bone. Remove shanks from sauce and set aside in a large bowl covered with foil to keep warm. Reserve sauce.
3. Heat a large frying pan over medium-high heat, add remaining oil and onion and cook for 3-4 minutes or until lightly golden. Add rice and stir well. Add pumpkin and 4 cups (1 litre) of reserved sauce, stir well and bring to the boil. Reduce heat to low, cover

and simmer for 20 minutes or until the broth has been absorbed and the rice is tender. You may need to add a little more sauce or stock to the rice throughout the cooking process. Remove from heat and add spinach and apricots. Season, stir well and replace lid for 2 minutes. Place shanks on top of with pilaf and spoon over any remaining sauce.

4. Sprinkle with pine nuts and mint. Serve with baby leaf salad, cucumber and lemon wedges.

TIPS:

- Either serve the shanks whole on the bone or you can shred the meat off the bone and stir the meat through the pilaf.
- For a quick version of the pilaf use lamb leg or rump steaks instead of the shanks.
- You can buy pre-diced pumpkin from most supermarkets or greengrocers to save time.



Easy Microwave Lemon Curd

Prep time: 10 minutes

Cook time: 7-10 minutes

Makes: Approx. 1½ cups

Difficulty: Easy

Ingredients:

- 3 egg yolks
- 1 whole egg

- ½ cup (110g) caster sugar
- 2 tsp lemon zest
- 2/3 cup (160ml) lemon juice (approx. 2 lemons)
- 125g chilled butter, diced
- Pancakes and blueberries to serve
- 100g Greek feta, crumbed

Method:

1. Combine egg yolks, egg, sugar, lemon zest and juice in a large heatproof microwave-safe bowl. Whisk with a balloon whisk until combined.
2. Add the diced butter and place onto the microwave turntable.
3. Follow manufacturer's instructions to reduce microwave power to 50%. Cook uncovered for 7-10 minutes, stirring every minute until mixture is thick enough to coat the back of a wooden spoon. (See tips)
4. Cover the curd surface with plastic wrap to prevent it from forming a skin. Let cool to room temperature, then refrigerate until cold.

5. To serve, spoon lemon curd onto pancakes and top with fresh blueberries

TIPS:

- Begin checking the thickness of the curd at 6 minutes cooking time.
- Dip a spoon into the curd then run your finger over the back of it. If it leaves a clean line in the curd, it's cooked enough and ready to cool.
- Microwaves vary in type, wattage and size, so cooking times may vary. Use cooking times as a guide.
- Curd will thicken as it cools.
- Spoon into a container, cover and refrigerate for up to 2 weeks



Crosstrek 2.0S Hybrid

Crosstrek is the smallest of Subaru's three SUVs, sitting below the mid-sized Forester and larger Outback.

It competes against vehicles such as MG ZS, Mitsubishi ASX, Kia Seltos and Mazda CX-30.

While the name is new, Crosstrek has actually been on the Australian market since 2012 as the XV.

Five Crosstrek variants are offered: 2.0L, 2.0R, 2.0S (petrol), plus Hybrid L and Hybrid S, with prices ranging from \$34,990 to \$45,090 plus on-road costs.

Our test was in the top-spec Hybrid S.

As with all Australian Subaru models, except for the Toyota re-badged BRZ coupe, Crosstrek comes with all-wheel drive.

LED headlights, plus cornering lights, improve visibility at night and add to power savings, while LED rear combination lamps feature a sharp 3-D C-shape.

Rear-view mirrors are smaller, improving aerodynamics and present a less obstructive view.

All Crosstrek variants come with dusk-sensing LED headlights, roof rails and power-folding door mirrors.

Crosstrek 2.0R, 2.0S and Hybrid S also get LED Daytime Running Lights with the top-spec 2.0L and Hybrid L featuring bulb type DRLs.

STYLING

While the general appearance of the Crosstrek is a carry-over from the XV, the bonnet and radiator grille have been updated.

Use of lightweight aluminium for the bonnet contributes to improved pedestrian protection with a softer head impact zone, while aluminium front fenders save two kilograms and optimises weight distribution all round.

While the grille retains the signature hexagonal shape, it's now larger with an aggressively styled honeycomb design.

INTERIOR

The cabin of the Crosstrek Hybrid S has a real premium feel, which it should, given that it will cost close to \$50,000 on the road.

It's light and spacious with a friendly soft-touch material on the dashboard and steering wheel.

The front seats are comfortable and supportive with eight-way power adjustment and lumbar support for the driver in the R and S models.

There's good leg, head and shoulder room, although the centre-rear seat position is best suited to young children as expected in a relatively small vehicle.

Boot space in the Crosstrek hybrid is a reasonable 315 litres although it doesn't come with a spare wheel of any sort.

Instead, it relies on a puncture repair kit, a feature likely to deter those who may be considering using the car's AWD and 220mm ground clearance to take it off-road.

Petrol-only models do get a space-saver spare which reduces the boot capacity to 290 litres.

ENGINES / TRANSMISSIONS

Petrol-only Crosstrek variants are powered by the latest version of Subaru's 2.0-litre four-cylinder horizontally-opposed (Boxer) engine, delivering maximum power of 115kW at 6000 rpm and top torque of 196Nm at 4000 revs.

The same engine in the hybrid models get slightly less power (110 kW at 5800 rpm) but the same torque figure.

The electric motor adds 12.3kW of power and 66Nm of torque and is self-charging, capturing kinetic energy through regenerative braking and coasting.

The electric motor is placed near the vehicle's centre of gravity, while the battery and other components are positioned above the rear axle, providing balanced front/rear vehicle weight distribution.

Drive from the e-Boxer engine is sent to the

all-wheel drive system through a CVT automatic with seven-steps for manual override.

SAFETY

Although it's yet to undergo ANCAP testing the outgoing XV scored a maximum five stars and with a comprehensive range of safety features the same rating is likely for Crosstrek.

Standard features in all variants include nine airbags, blind spot monitoring, front side radar, lane change assist, rear cross traffic alert, rear parking sensors, reversing camera, reverse automatic braking, driver inattention warning, tyre pressure monitoring and Isofix child seat anchor points.

R and S variants add front and side view monitors, high beam assist and a 360-degree camera.

Standard across the range is Subaru's EyeSight Driver Assist system which includes adaptive cruise control, autonomous emergency braking, numerous lane control and pre-collision alerts and braking assist features, speed sign recognition and speed limiter.

The two hybrid models also come with a pedestrian alert system.

INFOTAINMENT

Crosstrek combines an 11.6-inch infotainment touchscreen in the centre of the dashboard with a 4.2-inch Multi-Information Display (MID) in front of the driver.

The central screen is in portrait mode. It has large buttons and fonts and is within easy reach of the driver.

There are physical knobs for the audio system and, although the climate controls are on the touchscreen they can be adjusted with a minimum of distraction.

Wireless Apple CarPlay and Android Auto smartphone connectivity are standard across the range.

The nine-speaker Harman Kardon audio system provided excellent sound reproduction.

It's standard in the two S variants with the lower-spec models getting a more basic six-speaker system.

Likewise, embedded satellite navigation is only available with the top-spec S petrol and hybrids.

All models get USB-A and USB-C ports in the front console and there are also USB charge ports in the R and S.

A wireless Qi smartphone charger is standard.

DRIVING

Unlike most other hybrids which start silently and smoothly under battery power, the Crosstrek Hybrid's engine kicks in immediately, taking away much of the appeal of the EV component.

That means missing out on the instant torque that's such an appealing feature of electric vehicles.

On the plus side the engine will shut down when the vehicle is coasting or in slow-moving traffic and run solely on battery power.

The e-Boxer logic adjusts the power split between petrol and electric to match driving conditions.

It automatically changes between three modes: Motor Assist EV driving; Motor Assist electric (EV) + petrol engine driving and engine-only driving.

The lower centre of gravity and greater rigidity provides excellent driving dynamics, both on and off the bitumen.

When cornering, there is little evidence of body roll and it doesn't get fazed by rapid changes in direction.

The electric power steering is well-weighted and provides plenty of feel on both bitumen and loose surfaces.

The steering wheel is both reach and tilt adjustable.

Crosstrek's 220mm ground clearance is regarded by many as being the minimum for a genuine off-road vehicle.

You wouldn't call it a genuine 4WD in appearance, but under its station wagon body it's close to being one.

SUMMING UP

XV was a consistent seller for Subaru throughout its decade on the market.

There's no reason why the more-sensibly named Crosstrek won't continue that trend.

It's a relatively conservative vehicle designed for couples or small families with all the latest in safety features.

While its ground clearance and all-wheel drive means that it can cope with moderate off-road conditions.

Subaru is at pains to describe Crosstrek Hybrid as a 'mild' hybrid and it falls a fair bit short of the sub-5.0L/100km fuel consumption figures that we're used to from Toyota hybrids such as the similar-sized Corolla Cross.

On the combined urban/highway cycle, Crosstrek hybrid uses a claimed 6.5L/100km compared to 7.2L/100km for the petrol model, making it hard to justify the \$3600 surcharge.

At the same time performance is hampered by the hybrid's extra weight.

Dawson club champion

What a year it has been for Robe's Jordan Dawson.

In his second year with the Adelaide Crows Football Club in the AFL - after a six-year stint with the Sydney Swans - he was named as captain for 2023 and has now topped off a career-best season with the Malcolm Blight Medal.

The Crows held their post-season ceremony on Saturday night, where Dawson polled 132 votes to claim his first club best and fairest award.

He was followed by three-time winner Rory Laird on 115 votes, who he finished runner-up to in 2022, while Taylor Walker rounded out the top three on 98.

The medal - and the golden jacket which accompanied it - add further accolades to Dawson's season, which also included selection in the AFL's 2023 All Australian team.

"It is pretty special to be up here," Dawson said during his acceptance speech.

"Growing up as a Crows supporter... I remember sitting at home watching showdowns and just how much I loved watching the Crows play.

"To be up here wearing this (gold jacket), it doesn't really feel real."

This season had Dawson moved into the midfield full time, where he averaged an im-

pressive 27 disposals a game, along with five marks and more than six tackles.

"I felt like I could play that (midfield) role and I spoke to Nicky (Matthew Nicks) after the first couple of games and they thought it was a good opportunity for me to play more of a defensive-mid role and help the team out," Dawson said.

"I was more than happy to get out of the backline and stop worrying about chasing a bloke around and get a bit more of the ball."

He gave credit to others who polled highly,

while thanked the whole team and coaching staff on a season which showed plenty of promise for the future.

Also among his thanks were those closest to him.

"Milly (Dutton), my gorgeous fiancée, she has been probably the biggest supporter of my footy career," Dawson said.

"In Sydney I was probably not really reaching the heights of where I should have been as a player.

"You have been by my side and helped me

out through those times and been supportive and caring.

"You are probably sick of me talking footy, but you actually add a lot of footy knowledge, which I am really grateful for."

His parents, who attended the night as well, have also been important parts of his football journey.

"I am really grateful for what you have given to me throughout my juniors," Dawson said.

"Being from Robe, you drove me up to Adelaide a fair bit for training and playing and I am really grateful for all you have sacrificed for me and my footy career."

While the Crows missed out on finals this year to finish 10th, they showed signs of greater things to come.

Dawson hoped to build on that foundation in 2024 and was already itching to get back on the training track.

"I have never been more driven in my life," he said.

"I think all the players here know how good we can be, especially on our away record.

"We had a few games we should have been better in, but I definitely think we know how good we can be.

"We are all hard working, we are young, we want to get better and as a group we are growing rapidly.

"I am so excited for next year."
