Named in honour of Mills

A FATHER and son who dedicated 70 years of their working lives to local forestry have been honoured in the naming of a historic Penola reserve by One-FortyOne. Moving to Nangwarry in the 1970s as part of the '10-pound Pom' initiative, Ray Mills brought his young family out from the UK and devoted 25 years of work to the Woods and Forests Department, inspiring his middle son Geoff to follow in his footsteps for 44-years.

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Move to change water plan

AN amendment will be made to the Lower Limestone Coast Water Allocation Plan next year after an 18 month review period.

The review found the plan would need to be changed to remain relevant to the region.

The Limestone Coast Landscape Board (LCLB) completed the review and chair Penny Schulz an amendment would mean the plan would change and the process to determine the necessary changes would involve extensive consultation.

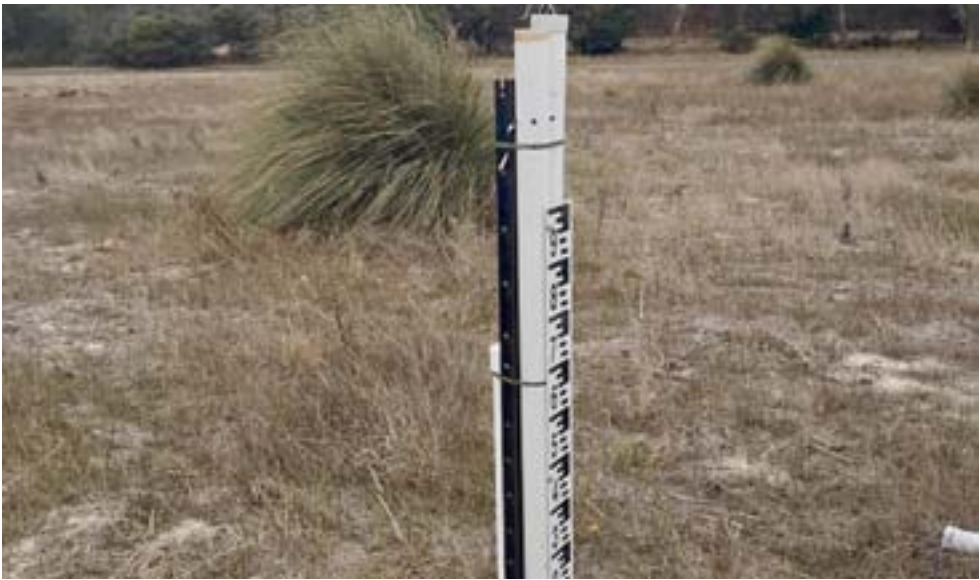
“We recognise amendment will create uncertainty and we are committed to a high level of transparency and stakeholder engagement throughout the process,” she said.

“I encourage people across the Lower Limestone Coast to take up the opportunities to get involved and be a part of developing the revised plan.”

The amendment would focus on new knowledge, sustainable allocation, environmental provisions, legislative and policy alignment, licencing complexity, administrative ease and the water market.

Dr Schulz thanked those who had been involved in the process so far.

“We are grateful for the input and commitment from our community, in particular

of our Stakeholder Advisory Group,” she said.

“Their contribution to the review has been invaluable and we look forward to continuing

to work with them through amendment.”

She said this amendment would ensure the changing climate was appropriately

considered.

“Climate change is an increasingly important consideration for water allocation planning, adding a new layer of complexity,” she said.

The 2013 Lower Limestone Coast Water Allocation Plan introduced important changes that transformed water policy in the Lower Limestone Coast.

It converted area-based water licences to volume and enabled the impacts of commercial plantation forestry to be managed through licensing.

While review recommends that amendment is required, it is only with this foundation that water policy reform in the Lower Limestone Coast is possible.

Dr Schulz said collaboration could ensure a sustainable and resilient water future.

“We are in a strong position as we move to amendment with the data, science and foundations of the current plan to build from,” she said.

All done

THE Beachport and Southend jetties have finally finished their upgrades to maintain structural integrity while also boosting marine activity for the Limestone Coast.

The upgrades for both jetties included repairs to the landings, handrails and protective buffers, decking replacements, new safety ladders and refurbishments for framework and bracings.

More than 300 cubic metres of replacement timber contributed to the upgrades for the Beachport Jetty alone, while Southend's recently completed repairs to its lower landings after sustaining serious damage from swell waves in 2021.

Minister for Regional Development Clare Scriven said it was “fantastic” to see the Beachport and Southend jetties return to their former glory.

(It ensures) commercial users, anglers, swimmers, and tourists can continue to enjoy these iconic jetties for many years to come,” Ms Scriven said.

“I would like to thank the Beachport and Southend communities for their patience throughout these upgrades, allowing us to make these jetties safe and sustainable for everyone to use.

“These two jetties are important infrastructure for locals living in these Limestone Coast communities, as well as the many visitors to this beautiful part of our state.”

Artist Morris' stroke of luck

COLERAINE based artist Jacky Morris was surprised to be reconnected with one of her mother's paintings recently when an unexpected Facebook post popped up on her news-feed.

The Naracoorte Regional Art Gallery hosted an art op shop sale, where people donated "pre-loved or unloved" art, which was then sold on commission to raise funds for the gallery.

A painting had been given to the gallery by a Naracoorte couple that had held onto it for a while and after moving houses, had nowhere to display it in their home.

After recognising the painting on the Naracoorte Art Gallery Facebook page, Ms Morris commented for more information to clarify as she could only see the first name of the artist.

She said she did not recognise the painting itself, but more the style as one of her mother's pieces.

"I definitely knew the style, because it looked very much like my mums," she said.

"I naturally assumed she had painted that in her early days, it looks like her early work."

Sure enough, the painting was a piece from early in her mother's career.

Joan Read's career began in Naracoorte in the 1960's where she learned from the well-known artist John Goodchild and she then went on to have a life-long art career while teaching.

She was a palette knife artist and used oils, pastels and watercolours and stuck to the same style of artistry throughout her career.

Ms Read painted predominantly landscapes and Ms Morris said her mother was "well-known for her ability to do beautiful skies."

She painted plein air, and mostly painted

from going out, taking sketches and notes and heading back to her studio to paint.

"She was a brilliant artist and such a good colourist, she was fantastic with those beautiful tones," Ms Morris said.

Ms Morris said her mother was a highly regarded artist and did well for herself.

"Back then the way that you sold works was that you had them in galleries or exhibitions and mum sold just about everything she did," she said.

"She always did well."

Ms Morris said while she owned a number of her mother's paintings, she did not have any landscape pieces and was thrilled to secure one.

It had been given to the gallery for the op

shop sale by Lester and Sandi Key, who originally bought the painting at the Lions Exhibition in the summer of 1975-1976.

The cottage in the painting is in Terowie, a small town in South Australia.

Mr Key took a particular liking to the painting as he worked on Kalabity Station at Olary and would change trains at Terowie.

Ms Morris said growing up with so much exposure to art through her mother that art came quite naturally to her.

"I was one of those kids that would draw on walls if I did not have something to draw on and I just had it in me that I was going to always be an artist," she said.

She said her mother did not want to be the one to formally teach her, and wanted her to

develop her own style of art, which she did.

She said she considered her mother her inspiration, rather than her teacher.

Now, Ms Morris is predominantly an animal portrait artist, and has recently moved into some landscape painting.

She previously visited the region to hold workshops and paint and sip events and said she planned to visit again soon to check out the John Goodchild exhibition at the gallery, and is excited to reconnect with the area.

"It is like it has had a knock-on effect of me coming back so many years later - 55 years since that painting in fact, back to Naracoorte, where we were when I was a child and now joining back with the art society."

"This will be really nice, to have a reason to go back and get more involved," she said.

After consideration to move back to the region, Ms Morris said she felt this experience was a sign to stay put in Coleraine for now.

"To me, it feels very serendipitous," she said.

"It felt like I'm making the right decision by staying put."

Member of the art gallery board, Adair Dunford said the op shop sale was a win-win for vendors and purchasers.

"We ended up with 250 items available, some pottery, paintings, tapestries, all sorts of things," she said.

"There were about 40 vendors from all over the place. Adelaide, Keith, Bordertown, Wil- lalooka, Mount Gambier, and a few over the border as well."

After a three week run of the sale, Ms Dunford said it was a successful event selling around 40 pieces of art on its opening night.

"We have had really good success with this, it has been pretty amazing," she said.

Three generations set to ring in the New Year

DO YOU KNOW A LOCAL LEGEND?

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Mills have left their mark

A father and son who dedicated 70 years of their working lives to local forestry have been honoured in the naming of a historic Penola reserve by OneFortyOne.

Moving to Nangwarry in the 1970s as part of the '10-pound Pom' initiative, Ray Mills brought his young family out from the UK and devoted 25 years of work to the Woods and Forests Department, inspiring his middle son Geoff to follow in his footsteps for 44-years.

Standing amongst the reserve's towering oaks and cedar trees, Geoff Mills points out the road he walked up as a strapping teenager to face his first and only interview, in 1978.

First copping a grilling by the department head about whether he was the son of the legendary Ray Mills and eyed up and down, he was told, 'you look like a big strong lad, you can start Monday'.

Gaining the nickname of 'Millsy', the teenager was assigned to general gang duties and he quickly learned a day's work could involve anything and everything.

"In the forest, I did hundreds of different jobs like pruning, brake maintenance, planting trees, learning about the machinery – tractors, plows and spray units," he said.

"I even mowed the boss's lawn."

Geoff went on to work at the research department, supervising plots, growth rates and fertiliser trials and spent many days working alongside his father, completing fencing, planting and general firefighting duties.

An essential part of life in the forests involves fire crew duties and Geoff was to face several serious fire scenes in his first decade.

The Caroline fire of 1979, which burned through 7,668 hectares of softwood plantation and native forest was to pale in comparison with 1983's Ash Wednesday, which swept across South Australia and Victoria, claiming 75 lives and destroying 3,000 structures.

In 2008, Geoff was also part of a forestry crew sent by ForestrySA across to assist Victorian fire crews in covering the Black Saturday fires.

Geoff was to spend weeks on site, witnessing the aftermath of one of Australia's deadliest fire scenes and recalled it as a 'sobering experience'.

"It's such a beautiful place to live, but when you see all the burnt-out cars and houses and the police tape around them, I would never want to see that again," he said.

During his decades in the industry Geoff recalled many major advances in technology, however there are areas where mechanisation simply cannot replace a human.

"When it comes to planting pine trees, you just can't beat a person," he said.

"They still manually plant because they haven't got a machine that can plant trees as well as a person can."

Many a friendship was forged over a learning experience and the passing on of skills from the older generation of forest workers, Geoff said.

"When I was a young bloke and all the old

guys are here, that's where you learn how to sharpen an axe, how to prove a tree problem and how to do everything, which is getting to be a dying art now."

Geoff retired at the end of October, 2023, just missing the milestone of 45 years by six weeks. However, at 62, the time felt right, just as it was for his father Ray when he retired at the same age in 1993.

Geoff recalls taking his dad for a drive around the reserve where they'd both spent so many years.

Over the years, workers had planted trees from across the world there – towering oaks, cedars, Norfolk Island pines, maple trees and

it was a favourite spot for the pair.

After announcing his retirement, Geoff said he 'knew something was up' because his boss picked him up and drove him to the reserve, where a surprise awaited him.

More than 60 of Geoff and Ray's friends, family and work colleagues had gathered there, and it was announced the reserve would be named in honour of the father and son who dedicated most of their working lives to the Penola forests.

Only one person was missing at the ceremony, his father Ray, who died in 2022 at 90 years old.

Standing under an oak tree which once cast

a shadow over the old Woods and Forests Department depot in the reserve, Geoff said the next generation of Mills have already made their mark on the reserve.

On a sunny day, Geoff likes to bring his two-year-old grandson down to the reserve for a stroll and occasionally, to plant a new tree.

Retirement will bring more time to spend on his favourite things, including spending more time with his grandchildren, kayaking and fishing at Beachport, live music and perhaps, driving around in his dream vehicle.

"I've got my eye on a 1971 XY Falcon," he said.

"I'll just go cruising around here in that."

Ensuring a safe boat season

MARINE Safety Officers are urging those taking to the water to slow down and be safe while boating this summer.

A new campaign, launching this week, is reminding skippers that speed limits apply in some areas and can vary based on location.

Department for Infrastructure and Transport manager, marine safety and compliance Gordon Panton said it was the responsibility of all skippers to know any restrictions that apply to their vessel, or the waters they are operating in.

“We need to ensure we are creating an environment that is safe and enjoyable for all water users, including marine wildlife,” he said.

“Where there is no signed speed limit, we recommend travelling at a speed which gives you enough time to stop or turn your vessel to avoid any sudden danger.

“Be aware of the impact of your wake and wash on others and adjust your speed as you travel.”

Already this boating season, Marine Safety Officers have issued dozens of expiations for speeding offences to boaters and personal watercraft operators.

Four-knot speed restrictions apply within 50 metres of a person in the water, a vessel or buoy displaying a flag, a person in or on a canoe, kayak, surf-ski, surfboard and within 30 metres of any other vessel, jetty, wharf, or other places a boat is being launched.

Mr Panton said Marine Safety Officers would be keeping an eye on everyone in the water this summer.

“This summer, Marine Safety Officers will be paying attention to vessels in restricted areas, particularly looking out for speeding but also making sure everyone has the appropriate safety gear with them – and penalties will apply for anyone caught doing the wrong thing,” he said.

“We don’t want to be stopping people from

enjoying their day out by sending them ashore or issuing expiations, so make sure you are doing the right thing so everyone can enjoy the water safely.”

Personal watercraft operators must display a ‘RIDE SMART’ sticker on their vessel and always abide by the conditions of the sticker.

Throughout summer, Marine Safety Officers will be on the water and at boat ramps ensuring boaters have the correct safety equipment and are travelling at safe speeds.

Every boat must carry safety equipment - like lifejackets, flares, and torches - suitable for its size and the waters it will be used in, and equipment must be in good working order, readily accessible and protected from the water and weather.

Marine safety crews have been busy this year with the operational clean up following the River Murray floods, however boaters are reminded to be aware of any remaining contaminants and debris that could create risks

for operating vessels.

Unmarked navigational hazards and marine safety concerns can be reported: SA.GOV.AU - Reporting boat incidents (www.sa.gov.au).

Loader on display at museum

NANGWARRY Forestry and Logging Museum has recently seen a new addition to their collection after an exciting donation from OneFortyOne.

The donation, a Raygo Wagner log loader, was first used by Woods and Forests and was retired more than 15 years ago, after catching alight which resulted in extensive fire damage.

Weighing 45 tonnes and spanning across a total of 12 metres long, the machine can be spotted at its new home on the side of the highway in Nangwarry next to the entrance of the museum.

The fire occurred during its use at the Jubilee Sawmill, when the cab of the machine caught fire, leading to enough damage that the loader could not be used from then on.

Green mill scheduler Paul Roughana worked at the Jubilee mill at the time of the delivery of the unloader in the early 1980s.

He drove the machine for around six years and said he used it heavily through the Ash Wednesday fires.

While he was not working the day it caught on fire at the mill, he does remember hearing that the incident happened right after fuelling up, when Terry Bennier was driving it.

Mr Roughana said it is not likely an incident like that would happen now.

"It is definitely a lot safer today," he said.

"Today, they have all got fire suppression units and emergency stops."

This type of truck unloader is not commonly used anymore, but Mr Roughana said it was a good machine back in its prime.

"It used to get up speed and plenty of times I had to pull her up going pretty fast," he said.

"It was quite a good machine to drive I thought, it did its job well."

Owner of the Forestry and Logging Museum, Vic Smith and his team had approached OneFortyOne multiple times trying to source the machine for the museum, but without the funds to have it transported, it stayed as a pipe dream.

"Initially, five or six years ago they said we could have it, but it was our responsibility to get it here and I could not do it," he said.

"We have not got that kind of money. You are looking at thousands and thousands for that."

After giving up on the idea of being able to source the machine, Mr Smith was shocked when John Munn from OneFortyOne reached out offering the machine including delivery.

"When out of the blue they said yes, I was so surprised. And happy too," Mr Smith said.

"He said 'we will deliver it, pick it up as it is and drop it off at the site, the rest is up to you,' and that's what they did."

Winterfields Float Hire, Williams Cranes, Trident Tyre Centre, Lv Dohnt & Co Nangwar-

ry, Wattle Range Council and South Australia police to escort the loader were all amongst the businesses involved with the transportation of the machine.

All businesses offered the help either at minimal cost or none at all, with OneFortyOne covering any costs that were involved for the transportation.

The machine site will include a fence around the raygo and an informational plaque on display.

To have it ready for display, Mr Smith decided to have the jaws of the machine welded open permanently and planned to get started on the restoration of the machine soon.

Restoration will include a fresh coat of bright yellow paint and sourcing a second-hand cab to replace the fire-damaged cab.

His first thought was to have it displayed on the side of the highway and hoped the machine would entice visitors to the area and to the museum.

"It couldn't be in a better place could it?" he said.

Mr Smith said he was overwhelmed by the support from the Wattle Range Council.

"The Wattle Range Council has been fantastic to us," he said.

"I was amazed when they gave us permission to put it there."

The council assisted in putting pads down for the delivery of the machine and supported the removal of tree limbs and shrubs to make room for the machine.

To see the new addition and to have a look through the museum, call into the Nangwarry Forestry and Logging Museum any time.

If the museum is unattended, call Vic or Chris and they will see to have it opened as soon as they can.

There is a small viewing cost of \$5 for adults and \$2.50 for kids.

TRIUMPH SPITFIRE

THE Triumph car originated as a sideline for the successful motorcycle business which unfortunately went bankrupt in 1939, and Triumph was finally bought up by Standard in 1944.

In 1946 the first Standard-Triumph car appeared.

It was the 1800 Roadster which was aimed at the export market and had three-abreast seating, a steering-column gear change and was the last car in the world to offer a 'dicky' seat behind the driver. Initially it was fitted with a 1776cc engine exactly as supplied by Standard for the Jaguar 1.5-litre models, but from 1948 it was equipped with the 2088cc Standard Vanguard engine and was called the 2000 Roadster.

To fill an obvious gap in the US sportscar market between the MG TD and the Jaguar XK120 Standard developed a new sportscar designed around the Vanguard engine and gearbox and so the TR series of Triumphs came into being.

As the TRs gradually became larger, faster and more powerful, Triumph determined to fill the smaller sportscar void created with a new, smaller sportscar, the Spitfire, which would also compete against the popular Sprite/MG Midget cars from the BMC stable.

The Spitfire design utilised a rather unique steel backbone-type chassis frame with a two-seater body adapted from a Michelotti style with the componentry borrowed heavily from the Triumph Herald sedan parts bin and modified to suit.

This included the engine and transmission as well as the all-independent suspension and the steering gear.

Initially the Spitfire developed 47kW from its 1147cc engine with a top speed of 145km/h, and various options were offered including overdrive, wire wheels and a detachable hardtop.

Early in 1965 the Mark II Spitfire was launched with a six percent increase in power and two years later the Mark III entered the marketplace with a new 1296cc engine which boasted 56kW power output giving the car a top speed close to 160km/h.

At the end of 1970 the Spitfire became Mark IV, with a different, swing-spring, type of suspension resulting in very much improved road holding, and a restyled body shell which featured a cut-off tail, and a more angular optional hardtop.

The final derivative, produced from late 1974 to 1980, had a 1493cc engine, a genuine 160km/h top speed when no anti-emission gear was fitted. All in all, the Spitfire was an extremely successful car with a total of over 314,000 being produced during the 18-year production life of the marque.

NEW MINI COUNTRYMAN

THE Mini Countryman has been around since the 1960s when, as a small station wagon, it sold alongside the classic Mini.

After being off the scene for a number of years, BMW brought it back in 2010, this time as the first Mini.

While it could be argued that the Mini Moke that was built in Australia until the early 1980s could be classed as an SUV, the Countryman came with a raft of features not seen in the cute little Aussie Moke.

To start with it had a roof – something that was an optional extra on the Moke!

But back to the present, and the latest version of the Countryman which has just arrived here and will go on sale in the first quarter of 2024.

It comes with innovative new technology including a host of new driver assist technologies, markedly increased versatility and an array of customisable options.

The new design philosophy of 'Charismatic Simplicity' pays homage to the minimalist design of the classic Mini while allowing each individual model to showcase its own unique character.

New Countryman comes with two variants, 2WD C and AWD S. Each has three equipment levels.

C has Core, Classic and Favoured; S has Classic, Favoured and JCW Sport.

Prices range from \$49,990 for the C Core

to \$63,990 for the S JCW Sport.

On-road costs to be added.

New Countryman is marginally longer (13 cm) and taller (6 cm) than the outgoing model.

It does provide a larger luggage volume

than before, up to 505 litres with the rear seat-backs in place and 1530 litres when folded.

The entry-level Countryman C comes with a three-cylinder turbocharged engine that produces 115kW of power and 230Nm of torque.

This allows it to complete the standard sprint from 0-100km/h in 9.0 seconds.

Countryman S gets a four-cylinder turbocharged engine that delivers 150kW of power and 300Nm of torque.

The Countryman C comes as standard with 18-inch light alloy wheels, while the Countryman S receives 19-inch light alloy wheels in its standard kit.

Light alloy wheels of up to 20 inches in various designs are optionally available for further customisation.

Standard safety features include six airbags, ABS brakes with cornering brake control, autonomous emergency braking, blind spot monitoring, lane change warning, dynamic stability control, exit warning, intelligent emergency call, rear collision prevention and rear cross traffic alert with brake intervention.

Driving Assistant Plus package is optionally available for Countryman C and standard for Countryman S.

It adds camera and ultrasound-based assistance including active cruise control with stop and go functionality, collision prevention, surround view, remote 3D View, drive recorder and parking assistant.

Fitted with the new Mini Operating System 9, the Mini Interaction Unit can be operated intuitively via touch or voice, with the user interface reminiscent of an everyday smartphone. The new Mini Countryman now boasts wireless compatibility with both Apple CarPlay and Android Auto.

Air Fryer Taco Boats

- Prep time:** 15 mins

Cook time: 45 mins

Makes: 8 boats

Difficulty: Easy

Ingredients

 - 8 eggs
 - 2 tablespoons milk
- 2 teaspoons garlic powder
 - 1 bunch broccolini, trimmed and cut into 4cm lengths
 - 2 tablespoons olive oil
 - 200g button mushrooms, sliced
 - 2 cups (240g) grated cheese
 - 8 Stand 'n Stuff soft tortilla boats

Method:

1. Whisk eggs, milk and garlic powder together in a large bowl.
2. Steam, microwave or boil broccolini until just tender. Cool under cold water to prevent overcooking. Drain and set aside.
3. Heat oil in a frying pan over medium-high heat. Cook mushrooms until golden and softened, about 5 minutes.
4. Sprinkle half the cheese into the base of 8 tortilla boats. Divide mushrooms and broccolini into boats, pour ½ cup of egg mixture into each. Sprinkle with remaining cheese. Place 4 boats into an

air fryer basket and cook at 160°C for 20 minutes. Repeat with remaining boats.

Tips & Hints:

- Oven method: bake in oven 180°C (fan-forced) for 25-30 minutes.
- Store cooked taco boats in the refrigerator for 2 days, or wrap and freeze separately for 1 month. Defrost in the refrigerator overnight. Reheat in the microwave, or in the air fryer on low for 10 minutes.
- Place unused tortilla boats in a sealed container and refrigerate or freeze.
- Other flavour combinations include chicken and corn, pesto and salami or feta and spinach.

Raspberry Meringue Trifle

Cook + Prep time: 90 mins

Serves: 14

Ingredients

Sponge

- 6 eggs, at room temperature
- 165g (¾ cup) caster sugar
- 150g (1 cup) plain flour
- ½ tsp baking powder
- 70g unsalted butter, melted
- 3 x 125g punnet raspberries

Jelly

- 2 tbsp (28g) powdered gelatine
- 1 litre blackcurrant and apple juice

- 300g (2 ½ cups) frozen raspberries

Custard

- 500ml (2 cups) thickened cream
- 1 tsp vanilla bean extract
- 110g (½ cup) caster sugar
- 1 tbsp cornflour
- 6 egg yolks, at room temperature
- 500ml (2 cups) thickened cream, extra

Meringue

- 6 egg whites at room temperature
- 550g (2 ½ cups) caster sugar
- 180ml (¾ cup) water
- 1 tsp cream of tartar

Method:

Sponge

1. Preheat oven to 180°C fan forced. Grease and line the base of two 22cm round cake tins.
2. Beat eggs and sugar together in the bowl of an electric mixer for 10 minutes or until thick and foamy.
3. Sift together flour and baking powder three times into a bowl. In three batches gently fold the flour into the egg mixture using a large metal spoon. Add the butter and fold gently to combine. Pour into prepared tins and bake for 15–20 minutes or until cakes are golden and spring back to the touch. Allow to cool for 3 minutes in the pan, then invert onto a wire rack to cool completely. Cut each sponge into 4 cm pieces. Set aside.

Jelly

1. Combine gelatine and 250ml (1 cup) blackcurrant and apple juice in a large bowl and stir to combine. Set aside.
2. Place remaining blackcurrant and apple juice in a medium saucepan and bring to the boil over high heat. Pour over the gelatine mixture and whisk to dissolve. Set aside to cool slightly.
3. Pour into the base of a 26cm trifle dish. Scatter over the frozen raspberries and refrigerate for 45 minutes.

Custard

1. Place cream and vanilla in a small saucepan over medium-high heat until almost boiling.

2. Place egg yolks, sugar and cornflour in a small bowl and whisk to combine. Gradually whisk the hot cream into the egg mixture until combined.
3. Return the cream mixture to the saucepan, reduce heat to low, stirring until well combined and the custard is thick. Remove from the heat, pour into a large bowl, cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate until cold.
4. Place extra cream in the bowl of an electric mixer and whisk to stiff peaks. Add the custard and whisk to combine.
5. Spoon half the custard cream over the set jelly. Top with sponge and fresh raspberries and remaining custard cream. Refrigerate. Next make the meringue.

Meringue

1. Place the water, cream of tartar and half the sugar in a medium saucepan over medium-high heat. Bring to the boil and cook for 6 minutes, or until it reaches 115° on a sugar thermometer.
2. Meanwhile, place the egg whites in the bowl of an electric mixer and whisk on high until stiff peaks form. While the motor is running, add the remaining sugar 1 tablespoon at a time, whisking until glossy. Gradually add the hot syrup in a steady stream while the eggs are whisking and whisk for 8 minutes.
3. Spoon onto the trifle, making swirls with the back of the spoon and, using a kitchen blowtorch, carefully toast until the meringue is golden (see tip).

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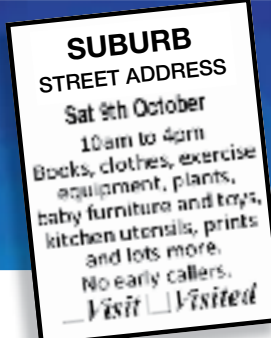

Boxes to help bird populations thrive

NESTING boxes will be installed in the Bool Lagoon area to help save threatened woodland bird species.

Several community groups, Friends of Bool and Hacks Lagoon, Naracoorte District Men's Shed and Birdlife Australia, received a grant from the Limestone Coast Landscape Board (LCLB) to build and install the boxes.

The partnership saw 60 artificial hollows made, with installation expected to take place in 2024.

LCLB team leader habitat conservation Robbie Andrew said he was excited to see first-hand the positive impact these efforts will have on the local woodland bird populations.

"Supporting this local project and seeing so many community organisations work collaboratively to craft the nest boxes has provided a successful outcome," he said.

Limestone Coast Grassroots Grants funding applications will be open in March 2024.
